Purchasing Agent Bobby Jones provided the Board with information regarding the construction of the Shady Grove Walking Path outlined in the Cooperative Endeavor Agreement between the Ouachita Parish School Board and Police Jury in extending funds for the walking path construction. As specified in the quote from Traxler Construction, the project will require 1,100 lineal feet of 8' fencing, two (2) walk bridges, one (1) walk through gate and approximately 3,000 lineal feet of trail, 6' wide. Mr. Jones told the Board that any money expended by the Board during its construction will be reimbursed by the Police Jury up to \$82,800.00. Upon the execution of the contract, the project will commence and must be completed by July 15, 2015. An additional 8% fee will be paid to Land 3 Architect for their oversight services during the construction of the path. Mr. Jones advised the Board that the fee amount will not exceed \$7,200.00 and all payments made for the trail shall be submitted to the Police Jury for reimbursement.

Business Director Juanita Duke gave a report on the May 19, 2015 quarterly Finance Committee meeting. Several items were taken under consideration by the committee. Accountant Sharon Bridges presented an investment report, stating that investments and cash balances are tracking about the same as last year. The budget approved by the Board at the end of August 2014 is progressing as projected. The status of the revised budget was discussed and will be presented for approval at the June 23, 2015 Board meeting, which will be available for viewing by the public in a public hearing in the Board room of the central office prior to that meeting.

Duke continued her Finance Committee report with an update on group insurance cost increases. Costs are increasing about 10% and will be offset some by the reduction expected in our retirement contribution rates, which will also affect the balance in the general fund. With the help of the committee, details for the 2015-16 Budget are being formulated and the Board will be informed on their progress.

In conclusion, Duke emphasized the need for developing policies that improve our financial management practices. Whenever the Board goes out for bonds, Mrs. Duke feels that these bond agencies will be looking for financial management practices that prioritize their business operations in a responsible manner and believes it will also help improve our bond ratings in general. Once developed, these management policies will be brought back to the committee for their review.

According to the Director of Business Juanita Duke, Supplemental Salaries Sales Tax collections are up 6.7% compared to the end of March last year for the 13th check. However, Duke could not determine the amount of the 13th check until final collections are calculated and staff can be counted. Three more collection payments are to be received before they are remitted to us. Collections increased 5.7% July through March compared to last year for the 1995 Sales Tax 14th check. The M & O Sales Tax or District #1 Sales Tax collections increased 5.6% July through March compared to last year and the West Ouachita Sales Tax collections increased 4.8% July

The Louisiana Department of Health / Office of Public Health routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to federal and state laws. The following table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2014. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It is important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not pose a health risk.

We detected the following regulated contaminants at levels BELOW the maximum contaminate level.

Our water system tested a minimum of 15 monthly samples in accordance with the Total Coliform Rule for microbiological contaminants. During the period covered by this report we had one positive sample returned for the month of July 2014. Additional sampling of the site, upstream, downstream, and all source wells returned negative results.

In this table you will find many terms that you may not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we have provided the following definitions: Action Level (AL) - is the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow

Microbial contaminants - such as viruses and bacteria. which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agriculture livestock operations, and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants - such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses. Pesticides and Herbicidessources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses. Organic chemical contaminants - including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are byproducts of industrial processes, petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems. Radioactive contaminants - which can

Millirems per year (mrem/yr) – is the measure of radiation absorbed by the body.

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) - is a measure of the clarity of the water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal - The "Goal" (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Contaminant Level - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/l) – is the measure of radioactivity in water.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (ug/l) – one part per billion corresponds to one minute in two thousand years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) – one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Maximum residual disinfectant level (MRDL)- The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum residual disinfectant level goal (MGDLG)- The level of drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MGDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Coliforms- Bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are found in more samples than allowed and this was a warning of potential problems.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer, undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. The typical source for all contaminants listed in the table including radionuclides is erosion of natural deposits. Other

sources include: The typical source for lead and copper comes from leaching of wood preservatives, or corrosion of household plumbing systems. Typical source of TTHM and HAA5 is the byproduct of drinking water disinfection and chlorination. Typical sources for cadmium: corrosion of galvanized pipes, discharge from metal refineries, runoff from waste batteries and paints. Typical sources for dichloromethane: discharge from pharmaceutical and chemical factories. Typical sources for fluoride: Water additives, discharge from fertilizer and aluminum Nitrates and Nitrites: run-off from fertilizer use, factories. leaching of septic tanks, sewage. Arsenic: Run-off from orchards, glass and electronics production wastes. Typical sources for Dalapon: Run-off from herbicide use on rights of way.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. West Monroe Water Systems is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing

components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead and copper exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the safe drinking water hotline or at http://www.epa.gov/safewater.lead.

Some people who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous systems, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

In the table above, we have shown the regulated contaminants that were detected. Chemical sampling of our drinking water may not be required on an annual basis: therefore, information provided in this table refers to the latest year of chemical sampling results.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottle water which must provide the same protection for public health. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility.
