




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

JONESBOROUGH

The historic Town of Jonesborough, Tennessee, has worked hard to preserve its heritage while developing an eclectic community for the arts. The small-town environment welcomes visitors to this distinctive community while offering an appreciation of the arts usually found in larger cities. There is no shortage of things to do in this charming town.

Founded in 1779, Jonesborough is known as Tennessee's oldest city and retains some of its original buildings. The downtown area is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The oldest surviving building in Jonesborough is the Christopher Taylor house, built in 1777. Originally located about a mile outside the town, the house has been relocated into the historic downtown district. Sightings of the ghost of Andrew Jackson have been reported at the house -Jackson lodged at the residence in 1788.

The Chester Inn, built in 1797, is also among the preserved historic structures. Constructed as a hotel, the inn is now open as a historic site, The Chester Inn Museum. The museum chronicles the history of Jonesborough, and features exhibits detailing the history of the State of Franklin, The Chester Inn, the 1873 cholera epidemic, and much more. The museum also features activities specifically for children, including a scavenger hunt.

The Jonesborough/Washington County History Museum is another opportunity for history enthusiasts. Exhibits bring history to life as they depict scenes from frontier life in Tennessee, provide local education history, and there is also a rotating exhibit honoring veterans. Built in 1886, the Oak Hill School has been carefully restored to look as it originally did, right down to the color of the walls. Visitors can now visit the school and see what education was like for the town's first settlers.

For visitors that prefer a guided tour of the town's historic sites, Jonesborough also offers walking tours of the town several days a week. The tour provides visitors a more comprehensive, detailed history of what town life was like hundreds of years ago.

Known as the Storytelling Capital of the World, Jonesborough is home to the International Storytelling Center. Dedicated to preserving the art of storytelling, the center houses the Mary B. Martin Storytelling Hall, as well as a state-of-the-art performance theater, a gift shop, and rents rooms for weddings, events, business meetings and the like. The center also keeps a 'tellerin-residence' from May through October, featuring a different artist each week.

Perhaps the most well-known aspect of the town is the National Storytelling Festival, held in the beginning of October each year. The festival transforms downtown Jonesborough into a city of tents, from smaller tents to those seating up to 1,600. The tents feature storytellers and performers from around the country. The festival entertains visitors from far and wide with its dedication to oral tradition as a means of preserving culture and history, and of educating and entertaining both young and old. Since its creation in 1973, the festival has grown from a total of 60 people, audience and performers, to now boasting over 30 world-class storytellers and thousands of visitors.

Jonesborough also has much to offer for visitors interested in the other performing arts. The Jonesborough Repertory Theatre offers live performances year round, including the well-known USO show, honoring our nation's veterans.

For music-lovers, musicians from the region perform live every week at Music on the Square. The performances are free, so visitors need only bring a lawn chair and sit back and enjoy the music.

The historic downtown district is also packed with photo studios, art galleries, specialty shops with handmade jewelry, cafes and restaurants, and much more.

Visitors interested in the arts and crafts won't want to miss the McKinney Center, located in the former Booker T. Washington School building. The school houses the Mary B. Martin Program for the Arts, and holds a juried art show for four weeks every year.

Art-lovers can also enjoy Fine Art in the Park, a judged and juried art show occurring the third weekend of each October.

Jonesborough Days is a patriotic festival held every July, and is organized to celebrate America's heritage. The weekend features a parade, games, an animal petting zoo, a children's area, live music on the Main Stage, as well as arts, crafts, food and of course fireworks.

Jonesborough has many distinctive lodging accommodations, with charming bed and breakfasts, historic inns and upscale lodges and suites. For the outdoorsman who wants to experience nature at its best, the town even has campgrounds. With so many unique and historically significant activities, Jonesborough is a perfect destination for travelers looking for a piece of Americana.

<u>PARKS</u>

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As stated on the iconic sign downtown, Bristol is a good place to live. But it's also a great place to visit.

BRISTO

Heralded as the Birthplace of Country Music, Bristol TN/VA offers many attractions for visitors. The city straddles the state line of Tennessee and Virginia - downtown State Street divides the city, with Tennessee on one side and Virginia on the other.

State Street offers a bustling downtown atmosphere, lined with antique stores, historic buildings, charming cafes and restaurants, as well as unique specialty stores and other businesses.

Bristol has always been a supporter of the arts. State Street also features the historic Paramount Theatre and Theatre Bristol, which offer year-round performances in dance, theatre and music.

Also downtown are numerous art galleries offering a plethora of visual treats. Bristol boasts many local artists, and you can see and purchase their works at the many galleries on and around State Street.

If you visit at the right time of year, you can participate in the Haunted Historic GhostWalk in downtown Bristol or watch the annual Christmas parade. In the fall, Bristol features the annual Rhythm and Roots Reunion, a three-day festival held downtown celebrating the city's musical heritage, featuring more than 20 stages with live music. The festival features Americana, bluegrass, folk, Celtic, old-time and progressive Appalachian music.

Just off State Street is the Birthplace of Country Music Museum, featuring photos and exhibits detailing the rich history of music in Bristol, going back to the very first country music recordings on State Street in 1927 by the Carter Family, Jimmy Rogers, Ernest Stoneman and others. The Bristol Sessions are known as the "Big Bang" of country music. Also for music enthusiasts, The Pickin' Porch is located on State Street at the Foundation Event Facility at the Birthplace of Country Music Mural, and features weekly live performances.

But there is much more to Bristol than downtown. Several miles out of the downtown area is the famous Bristol Motor Speedway, a favorite of NAS-CAR fans across the country. Known for its steep-banked turns, the racetrack brings more than 200,000 visitors a year. Furthermore, the Bristol Dragway, also known as Thunder Valley, is located at the complex. And every year during the holiday season, the racetrack features the breathtaking "Speedway in Lights," an annual holiday light show that allows visitors to drive through the complex, including the actual racetrack, ending at the Christmas Village in the center of the track.

For outdoor enthusiasts, Bristol offers many scenic attractions and al fresco adventures. Steele Creek Park and Nature Center covers 2,200 acres in scenic Bristol, Tennessee. The park includes a 54-acre lake, 150 acres of recreational area and almost 2000 acres of undeveloped forested knobs. The forest features numerous hiking trails and beautiful scenery. Water enthusiasts can rent paddle boats or canoes to tour the lake. The park features picnic areas and a rustic lodge that is available for rent, a nine-hole golf course, and even a train that is sure to bring a smile for youngsters. The park also offers a Nature Center that is open to the public year-round, and herb and flower gardens.

Another treat for the outdoor enthusiast is South Holston Lake, which features boating, waterskiing, camping, swimming, and the TVA South Holston Dam, which provides electricity to many of the surrounding areas and offers scenic views of the lake and fantastic photo opportunities. The lake teems with wildlife, the connected Holston River offers some of the best trout fishing in the world.

For the visitor that enjoys shopping, in addition to the many shops available -continued on page 8

downtown, the Bristol Mall also offers several large department stores, small retail shops, a food court and a movie theatre. Another movie theatre complex, Tinseltown USA, is located at Bristol, Virginia's Exit 7 area off of Interstate 81 and offers state-of-the-art theatre experience. Also located at Exit 7 are a plethora of restaurants, shops and hotels.

In case you're looking for that great photo opportunity, Bristol features two "LOVEworks," large outdoor art pieces, one at the Virginia Welcome Center of Interstate 81 and the other on State Street. Furthermore, the huge guitar outside the Bristol Chamber of Commerce on State Street is a favorite of visitors. And while you're here, don't forget to visit the famous Bristol sign on State Street by the historic Trainstation, which declares Bristol as "A good place to live."



BINGDO

The historic town of Abingdon is nestled among the Blue Ridge Mountains of Southwest Virginia. Rich in culture and scenic beauty, Abingdon has something to offer for all visitors.

A designated Virginia Main Street, Abingdon has a charm all its own. The downtown district features brick sidewalks and tree-lined streets that evoke memories of a rich heritage. Established in 1778, Abingdon is alive with history, and played a part in both the Revolutionary and Civil Wars.

One of the town's well-known landmarks is the Martha Washington Inn, a palatial residence built in 1832. In 1858, the home became Martha Washington College, which operated through the Civil War and the Great Depression.



During the "War Between the States," the college doubled as a hospital for wounded soldiers from both sides, resulting in the many ghost stories now surrounding the building. Today, the Martha Washington is an upscale hotel, complete with a fine dining restaurant, tennis courts, a fitness center, a pool, a library and a spa, all of which carefully adhere to the elegance and splendor of the structure's original architecture.

A short walk down Main Street from the Martha Washington is the historic Barter Theatre, established in 1933 during the Great Depression. The Barter was originated with the idea of allowing patrons to pay for their admission with produce from their farms and gardens. The famous theatre



Abingdon also offers many attractions for those interested in the arts. The William King Museum of Art is a premier visual arts facility. The museum inhabits a former school building dating back to 1913. William King features three main galleries, as well as a student gallery and a panoramic gallery that features self-curated shows by local artists. The museum also houses artist studios, a reference library, research archives and an outdoor sculpture garden.

Abingdon is also home to the Arts Depot, a community-based art gallery housed in a 19th century freight train station. The Depot features three galleries, and all art is available for purchase.

A recent addition to the arts scene in Abingdon is Heartwood: Southwest Virginia's Artisan Gateway. Heartwood offers a visitor and sales center featuring the work of artisans and musicians. Visitors can learn about Southwest Virginia's history, heritage, recreation and scenic beauty through songs and stories. The Center features artisan studios, cafes, restaurants, music venues and outfitters, all housed in the eight-acre complex located next to Virginia Highlands Community College.

Outdoor enthusiasts will also find plenty to do in Abingdon. The historic Virginia Creeper Trail, a former railway, is now a 34-mile trail open to biking, horseback riding and hiking. The scenic trail begins in downtown Abingdon and stretches through mountain passes, forests and streams to its culmination at Whitetop, near the North Carolina state line.

The historic White's Mill has been serving the outlying Abingdon community since the 18th century. The mill has recently been renovated, and visitors can now tour the Mercantile, which houses local artwork, handmade quilts, and more. White's Mill also hosts the Harvest Days festival in October, featuring live music, fishing and food.


Speaking of festivals, a great time to visit Abingdon is during the annual Virginia Highlands Festival every summer. The festival is held in downtown Abingdon and features live music, arts and crafts, food, handmade products and more. Each year, Main Street is packed with tents and booths selling anything and everything Appalachian.

For those visitors with a fine palate, Abingdon is also home to the Abingdon Winery and Vineyard. Also, the town hosts a busy Farmer's Market open two days a week, offering fresh, locally grown foods.

Historic Abingdon is home to a plethora of exciting and fun things to do - a town rich in history and cultural heritage with a strong focus on the arts. With too many things to do to include in one listing, visitors won't want to miss a thing when visiting this charming town.



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



SMYTH COUNTY

From history buffs to fishermen, bikers to hikers, music buffs to movie fans, Smyth County can help fuel the passions of many interests.

For the history buff, Smyth County is home to sites of historic importance dating back to the Revolutionary and Civil Wars. Annually, Saltville is host to re-enactments of two major Civil War battles. Saltville is also home to the Museum of the Middle Appalachians that boasts exhibits worthy of major galleries. Its exhibits range from the Ice Age (paleontologists continue explorations in the community) to Saltville's 80 years as a company town. Visitors to the museum can also view and purchase copies from its collection of more than 4,000 photos.

In Groseclose, the Settlers Museum tells the story of the people who settled Southwest Virginia and how its unique culture was formed. The museum grounds include a visitor's center, 1890's one-room school and farm.

In downtown Marion, visitors can explore a variety of exhibits in the Holston River Heritage Center, which showcases history organized by the Smyth County Historical & Museum Society Inc. Marion is also home to Sallie's Crying Tree. It serves as a reminder of Sallie, a child who was purchased and brought to Marion as a slave in 1840. She cried with grief and loneliness from being separated from her family and would wrap her arms around the tree for comfort.

20th-century author Sherwood Anderson lived and wrote in Smyth County and was buried in the community.

Coming soon is the Wayne C. Henderson School of Appalachian Arts being developed in the town's 1908 Schoolhouse that was saved from becoming a parking lot.

The school's name honors Wayne Henderson, a world-renowned musician and luthier of handmade custom guitars, including one for Eric Clapton and another for the late Doc Watson.

The school will offer music and instrument-making classes but will also encompass other traditional arts, including storytelling, writing, art, gardening and preserving.

Many examples of the region's traditional music as well as plays, movies and special 14 DISCOVER events can be found on the stage of The Lincoln Theatre, also in downtown Marion. The 500-seat theater presents a wide variety of performing art shows throughout the year. Restored in 2004, it is one of three existing Art Deco Mayan Revival theaters in the country. Its stage is also home to Song of the Mountains, an ongoing concert series featuring old-time, bluegrass and Americana musicians. The series is aired on PBS stations around the country.

April through December, Marion's arts community hosts the Second Friday Alive After Five art walk in the downtown area.

For outdoor enthusiasts, Smyth County offers a plethora of opportunities.

The world-famous Appalachian Trail crosses through Smyth County near Sugar Grove and Groseclose. The county and Marion are a designated AT community.

Marion is also home to Hungry Mother State Park, where visitors can find easy and challenging hikes, fish from the banks

or take a boat out on the lake, swim from the beach, enjoy a paddleboat ride or have a family picnic. The park offers a variety of camping options from primitive to cabins available for rent.

The about 200,000 acres of National Forest land that make up the Mount Rogers National Recreation Area include a portion of Smyth County. Virginia's two highest peaks are within the Mt. Rogers NRA. The land is home to a herd of wild, free-ranging ponies that many people enjoy photographing. The NRA is open for camping, picnicking, sight-seeing, bird watching, trout fishing, hunting, hiking, bicycling, horseback riding, cross-country skiing and swimming. Over a million visitors come to Mount Rogers every year.

For gentle hikes, a riverwalk is open in Marion and Saltville offers the Helen Williams Barbrow Interpretive Trail in its well fields, which are also a great spot for bird and wildlife watching and learning about history. The Virginia Salt Trail is a multi-use trail running 8.5 miles between Saltville and Glade Spring.

For individuals who prefer to see the county's great views from a motorcycle seat, there's the Back of the Dragon, a 32-mile ride on Rt. 16 between Frog Level in Tazewell County and Marion. The Back of the Dragon offers more than 260 curves and reaches elevation up to 3,500 feet.

In addition to fishing in Hungry Mother Lake, the South Fork of the Holston River in Smyth County features two special regulation areas that have helped earn the river recognition as one of the premier trout fisheries in the state.

If golf is more your style, Holston Hills Community Golf Course offers an 18-hole course as well as a swimming pool. Golfing is also available in Chilhowie and Saltville, and Saltville offers a unique wave pool.


From May through the early fall, multiple farmers markets can be found throughout the community, offering a wide array of fresh produce. With all this activity, folks are bound to get hungry. From fast food to eateries with a pub atmosphere to fine-dining, the community has a variety of dining establishments. The best known is the iconic Hi-Way Drive-In just outside of Marion that's known for its unique Dip Dogs that folks will travel from far away to sample. The red bumper sticker that declares "got Dip Dogs?" has been photographed around the globe.

WYTHEVILLE

Named for George Wythe, the first signer of the Declaration of Independence, Wytheville was founded in 1792. A town rich in history, Wytheville is often known as the "Hub of Southwest Virginia" or the "Crossroads of the Blue Ridge." With plenty of outdoor activities and many cultural and historical sites, Wytheville is located at the convergence of two major interstates and is a

At the time of Wytheville's beginnings, the town was located at the junction of two major western roads - the Ingles Ferry and the Peppers Ferry Trails. Today, the town is home to many fascinating historic sites that recall the early days.

convenient and exciting destination for visitors.

Wytheville was the birthplace of Edith Bolling, who became the second wife of President Woodrow Wilson. Downtown Wytheville now honors this famous First Lady with the Edith Bolling Wilson Birthplace Museum, which is located in the bottom floor of the historic Bolling home. The museum celebrates the history, heritage and romance behind this remarkable woman.

Located just outside Wytheville and overlooking the New River, Shot Tower was built more than 200 years ago to make firearms for early settlers. Lead from nearby mines was melted atop the 75-foot-tower. Guests may now ascend the tower, which is listed among the National Register of Historic Places.

The Wytheville Genealogical and Historical Association offers visitors an extensive collection of books, documents and records about the history of the town. Furthermore, the Wythe County Historical Society operates the Wythe County Historical Library, which is open to the public.

Located in the Wytheville Training School and Cultural Center, the African-American Heritage

Museum explores the role of African-American's in the history of Wytheville. The museum features artifacts and memorabilia as well as information about the important cultural history of the town.

Visitors who are enthralled by history won't want to miss the Halloner-Gibney Rock House Museum. Built in 1823, the house was originally the residence of the town's first resident physician. The museum features furnishings and records from the era, and even a 19thcentury herb garden.

The Thomas J. Boyd Museum also offers visitors a glimpse into the life of the early residents of Wytheville. The collection includes the town's first fire truck, early farming equipment and tools, military uniforms and more.

For visitors who need to quench their thirst after a busy day touring, the WestWind Vineyard and Winery. This fourth-genera-

tion homestead offers hospitality, wonderful views and of course, a plethora of wines for sampling.

The Wohlfahrt Haus Dinner Theatre is a unique and exciting way to experience Wytheville. Featuring a 200-seat arena, the theatre provides four-course meals served and customized to complement the Broadwaystyle productions offered year-round. Also at the theatre is the Matterhorn Restaurant and Lounge, which offers authentic German cooking, and the Bier Garten, featuring café-style dining offered during warmer months.

Those visitors who enjoy scenery will love Big Walker Lookout, a 100-foot lookout tower at an elevation of 3,405 feet. The BW Country Store offers handmade arts and crafts from the region, as well as old-fashioned fudge, jams, jellies and relishes.

Outdoor enthusiasts will also be captivated by the Beartown Wilderness, composed of 5,609 acres and bor-

dered by the Appalachian Trail.

The Beagle Ridge Gardens and Herb Farm features four miles of nature trails, 14 themed

displays, as



Established in 1831 and originally named Jacksonville, the Town of Floyd sits atop a plateau among the scenic Blue Ridge Mountains of Southwest Virginia. Known for its many outdoor activities and thriving music and arts community, Floyd is a great destination for visitors looking for adventure.


