Mayor John Eberhart is leading mayoral opponents Frank Turney and City Councilman Jim Matherly in campaign donations and expenditures, according to recently filed 30-day campaign finance disclosure forms.

As of Friday, Eberhart received a total of \$24,728.49 in

donations, compared to Mather-Īy's \$22,812.52. Matherly filed his report Tuesday.

The Eberhart and Matherly campaigns Eberhart dwarf Turney's.

The self-described candidate of conscious awareness said he's received about \$400 in

campaign contributions as of Tuesday afternoon, the largest donation being \$150. Turney filed a munici-

pal exemption Matherly form in August.

Alaska statute says candidates who file for an exemption cannot receive more than \$5,000 in contributions and they cannot spend more than \$5,000.

The incumbent mayor received donations from notable area residents such as Fairbanks North Star Borough Mayor Karl Kassel and Tanana Chiefs Conference President Victor Joseph. They donated \$100 and \$250 respectively.

Fairbanksans show support for pipeline protest in North Dakota

Roughly 200 people filled Golden Heart Plaza in downtown Fairbanks on Wednesday to rally in support of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe, which is

Female WWII pilot finally laid to rest at Arlington

ARLINGTON, VA. - After flying military planes during World War II, raising a family, visiting all seven continents and bungee-jumping in New Zealand at 83, Elaine Harmon had one final, seemingly simple wish: to be laid to rest at Arlington National Cemetery.

Harmon got her wish Wednesday, at a funeral with military honors and a flyover, but it took a lobbying campaign by her family and an act of Congress.

In the process, the campaign helped bring to light the long-forgotten exploits of

DELTA JUNCTION – After being burned to the ground more than two years ago, the Clearwater Lodge has been reconstructed, and on Sunday, the lodge's bar reopened.
