

We think about that a lot. The acute problem is the residence halls. I think we can add faculty. You can't just do it instantly, though. We have classroom space, though it is not ideal. You can make sufficient use of those classrooms...What's difficult is the residence halls because you can't just magically wave your wand and have a new residence hall. So we're going to have to come up with some

niors can't live in the dorms. I don't know how many beds that frees up, it may not be enough. I do think it's very important for freshmen and sophomores, if they want to, to live in the dorms... We are going to do something with Kerr-Drummond in the next two or three years, and we will build a dorm where the current track facility is, but that's two or three years off.

What's your opinion on the Westwood Neighborhood Association's restrictions that are being implemented west of campus?

We just want Westwood to remain a viable neighborhood. It's a very important neighborhood. We don't want to happen there what happened on the north side of campus. To do that, it's important to have families living there. Certainly, students can still live there, but students

We were very much in favor of the Westwood rules and regulations. Actually, Stillwater had a lack of restrictions that you commonly see in college towns. SGA approves election rules changes

The Election Agency Reform Act of 2012, which the noticeably flawed SGA elections of last spring brought on, was passed on Wednesday.

The bill, which amends Title IX of the SGA Constitution, passed on a vote of 25-1, with three abstentions. Senate vice chair Mike Merit authored the Act.

Title IX lays out the composition, powers and duties of the SGA Election Agency. The agency enforces the election code and monitors all electionrelated matters.

Last spring, OSU was subjected to four executive elections due to appeals when the agency failed to follow its bylaws.

Title IX amendments include a change from 11 to eight members, pre-

venting freshmen from membership, interviewing applicants, appointing the Senate vice chairman to election agency chair, preventing a campaigning member from serving and allowing the Senate chair to advise the election agency, among other items.

The Senate also passed the executive appointments of Stephanie Easterly for special events coordinator and Trey Mitchell for historian.

In other Senate business, all available liaison and representative positions were appointed and passed.

Liason positions include freshman representative council liaison Dalton Downing, OSU Tulsa liaison Mike

Merit, OSU Oklahoma City liaison Nichelle Huber, OSU Institute of Technology liaison Evyn Larsen and GPSGA liaison Zachary Cray.

Representative positions include Board of Regents for A&M Colleges representative Aaron Dale, Board of Regents for Higher Education representative Shane Jemison, and Faculty Council representative Temitope Akande.

The next SGA Senate meeting is scheduled for Wednesday on the fourth floor of the Student Union in Case Study One at 7 p.m.

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Football player misses court date Wednesday

Defensive tackle Christian Littlehead pleaded guilty to possession of drug paraphernalia in February.

did not appear at his court date Wednesday afternoon. Special Judge Michael Stano scheduled Littlehead to appear at 1:45 p.m to discuss an application to revoke his probation.

Littlehead pleaded guilty on Feb.

27, for possession of drug paraphernalia and received a six month deferred sentence, according to court documents.

The state attorney filed an application on Aug. 15 to accelerate Littlehead's deferred sentence after he was charged with assault and battery in Cherokee County in March, according to the application.

The assault and battery charge was dismissed the same day the application was filed.

Littlehead is punishable up to one year in prison, a fine of \$1,000 or both if Stano finds him to be in violation of his probation.

In May, Littlehead was arrested in Tahlequah for public intoxication when police received a noise complaint, according to the report.

Littlehead must appear in court at 1:45 p.m. Friday or the warrant will be issued, an employee at the Payne County Clerk's Office said.

SNAP helps city maintenance

If there is a problem in Stillwater, put down the phone and get on the Internet.

The City of Stillwater recently launched an online service request form to better serve its residents' maintenance needs. Many cities have such online request forms already in place.

What is unique about the Stillwater Needs Assistance Program is that it is interactive. Residents are able to post maintenance problems online and track progress on a Google Map. Anyone can view pending or previous requests on the website.

It is not possible for the city

to be aware of all the myriad problems that are a daily issue for any city maintenance crew, which is why the system is in place.

City spokesperson Sherry Fletcher said the city wanted more feedback from its residents.

"Oftentimes, we don't know that there is a problem," Fletcher said.

The website can more efficiently handle service requests than a call center, provided residents are aware of the service.

Dorothy Nixon, a retired staff member at the College of Arts and Sciences was vaguely familiar with the new service.

"I'd probably call the city rather than (use SNAP)," Nixon said.

The city is targeting a more ity tech-savvy crowd. It plans to roll out a mobile version of the service request site in the coming months.

Solomon Throckmorton, an Oklahoma State alumnus, said he was not aware of SNAP.

"If the problem was severe enough and it was necessary I would rather use SNAP (than call the city)," Throckmorton said.

The city has not experienced a shift in the way that residents make service requests since the release of the system. The city is trying to spread awareness of the availability of SNAP through its YouTube channel (youtube.com/Cityof-StillwaterOK), cable channel (Suddenlink 23) and the city website (http://stillwater.org/ snap).

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At the event, there was an NCAA and Call of Duty tournament that went on throughout the day.

"I think we've raised peoples' awareness about OrangeTech," Baker said. "A lot of people didn't know what we were or what we were about or had to offer, but now we're really on their spectrum."

He said wants Nology Fest an event that will continue in the future.

"We received a lot of feedback from the vendors to make this better for next year," Baker said. "So I'm hoping it could be an annual thing."

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OSU forward reflects on her commitment

A simple conversation with her father: that's what it took for forward Megan Marchesano to decide to attend Oklahoma State and join the Cowgirl soccer team.

Marchesano, a Bixby native, said she wanted to get out of Oklahoma. Although Oklahoma State was interested in her, she had visited Pepperdine, UCLA and other schools in California.

Her club soccer team, the Lonestars Soccer Club '91, was playing in a tournament in California when the talk began with her dad.

"He told me 'It would be so awesome if you could go out here, but I'm never going to be able to see you play," Marchesano said. "That really made the decision for me. I'm really close to my family.

"My parents have been such a big part of my life. It was my junior year when I decided I wanted to stay close to home and obviously Oklahoma State was a great program and a great school so it was a good fit."

Marchesano joined the Cowgirls in 2009 and immediately made an impact, playing in 17 games her freshman season and scored her first of her 21 career goals against SMU.

She said the transition from high school to college is difficult for some student athletes because more is expected at the collegiate level.

Luckily for Megan, she said there were older members of the team who set a good example on and off the field.

"I really looked up to (former Oklahoma State player)

Siera Strawser a lot," Marchesano said. "She was a senior when I was a freshman and she went to my high school in Bixby. Sierra always made good grades and always did well on the field. She was a great person and great player."

Fast-forward three years and it's Marchesano's turn to set the example. She is the active leader in career goals and assists for the Cowgirls, with 21 and 15. The 15 assists puts her in the top 10 in school history.

Coach Colin Carmichael said her success is a product of the hard work she's put in every vear.

"She worked so hard in the offseason, in the weight room and on her fitness," Carmichael

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said. "She's a stronger kid-you can look at her and see a difference physically. She's developed into a really aggressive forward. She's able to hold the ball better for us, and I just think all around she's become a better player."

Marchesano she says one of her favorite goals was her sophomore year in the NCAA Tournament.

The Cowgirls were playing Duke for the right to advance to the Elite Eight.

Marchesano said her ankles had been bothering her and she didn't start, but when Carmichael asked her to go in, she was ready.

"He put me in, and I think it was maybe five to 10 minutes I get the ball and end up beating three defenders and scoring our first goal," Marchesano said. "I remember being so proud of myself because I could have sat there and made excuses."

When people think of forwards, goal scoring comes to mind, and Marchesano has done plenty of that. But her assist total is something Carmichael said is more telling of Marchesano.

"You never put a number on it, because you can create a ton of goals without actually scoring," Carmichael said. "But the fact she has a ton of assists and goals really speaks for how hard she works and how active she is up front."

Marchesano's impact is not limited to the score sheet, ei-

"When you have a lot of new girls coming in, there are a lot of people trying to figure out what's going on," Marchesano said. "You have to talk with them and work with them and be able to have that positive mentality to help. I think when you have that it kind of spreads around the team.

"So if I can be vocal and help

them out in some way, they can help each other and hopefully that spreads and helps us become better as a team."

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When Marchesano joined the Cowgirls, they had just completed their third straight season with an NCAA appearance. Although the program was consistent, it was not recognized as elite.

Since then, Oklahoma State has turned into a regular presence in the later rounds of the NCAA Tournament and is a familiar sight near the top of the rankings in the country.

Marchesano said her favorite thing about playing for OSU has been turning the team into a national contender every year.

She said the team should take pride in that not everyone on the team is part of a national team, but everyone worked hard to get the program where it is.

"To be able to watch each year as the team improves, and see how much the individuals have improved and the program has shifted in the past few years," Marchesano said. "That's probably the most exciting part. That's something we'll be able to look back on and be like, 'Man, we did that, that was our team, that was really cool.""
