day morning after a self-inflicted gunshot wound

to the head, Stillwater police Capt. Randy Dickerson said. A service will be held at LifeChurch at 10 a.m.

Dickerson said a school resource officer found Poulos' body lying by a handgun just before 8 a.m. in a hallway at Stillwater Junior High School. He did not say where Poulos obtained the gun but said the registered owner would likely not face prosecution.

"Police don't anticipate prosecuting anyone for the way (Poulos) came in possession of the gun," he said.

Following the shooting, students were placed on lockdown and bused to nearby Cimarron Plaza, Stillwater Junior High principal Trent Swanson said via email.

Johnson, 20, is charged with possession of controlled drug with intent to distribute within 2,000 feet of a school, possession of a controlled drug without a tax stamp affixed and unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia.

Johnson's attorney ordered a continuance last Friday, according to the court document.

Johnson's next day in court will be 10 a.m. on Nov. 5.

Methylone is a drug known as "M1" and is similar to MDMA or ecstasy.

A team of agents from the Drug Enforcement Administration and U.S. Customs, along with a Payne County

lice officers, reportedly arrested Johnson at the Stillwater Post Office on Aug. 30. The package from China containing the methylone that Johnson's ordered was intercepted by U.S. Customs in San Francisco, according to the affidavit.

OSU Sgt. Daniel Ray arraigned a controlled delivery of the package with Tulsa Postal Inspector Al Chapa. Johnson picked the package up at the Stillwater Post Office and was arrested by police before leaving the parking lot, according to the affidavit.

Officers obtained a search warrant for Johnson's on-campus dorm room in the Village Apartments. The officers found 1,200 unidentified blue pills and a black safe containing \$11,000 in U.S. dollars, methylone, pill bottles containing steroids and Tamoxifen, according the court document.

If Johnson is convicted of all three counts, he faces a 15-year prison sentence, according to Oklahoma law.

Johnson remains is custody on a \$500,000 bond.

Oklahoma State University was the site of the 75th annual Cowboy Jamboree on Saturday, and to nobody's surprise the course was dominated by the hosts yet again.

The Cowboys and Cowgirls both won their individual races, taking their titles for the third straight year.

The Cowboys, ranked second in the nation, finished with a time of 24:44.11, ahead of Colorado Mines and Western State.

Junior Shadrack Kipchirchir led the way for the Cowboys, finishing with a time of 24:29.17 to capture the individual title.

Kipchirchir beat out UTEP's Anthony Rotich by nine hundredths of a second.

The rest of the Cowboys dominated the field, taking seven of the top 10 spots.

Senior Girma Mecheso finished his final Jamboree in fourth place, and was a part of his third Jamboree-winning team.

The school resumed its normal schedule Thursday, but extra police patrols were sent to assist students with getting to class safely, Dickerson said.

Later that night, pastor Derrek Belase hosted a prayer service at Highland Park United Methodist Church for an audience of nearly 150 people.

Belase told the crowd Poulos found his place in heaven and said everyone is connected to each other in some way.

"God created Cade, and God loved him until the very end," he said. "This morning, God welcomed him home."

Stillwater police detectives are still working on their investigation into the motive for Poulos' death, Dickerson said.
