

CITY COUNCIL ACTIONS — Action taken by the City Council at the regular meeting of January 27, 2014 included award of the bid for a new five-year residential refuse hauling contract to LJP Enterprises; approval for execution of a contract with the City of Nicollet for the City of Saint Peter to provide building inspection services in Nicollet; approval for execution of contracts with Nicollet County for the County to provide part-time senior services to the City and the City to provide library services to County residents living outside of the City limits; and approval for purchase of a replacement street sweeper to be funded by the 2014 Equipment Certificate. The Council also held a closed session to discuss land sale negotiations.

The next regular meeting of the City Council will be Monday, February 10th at 7:00 p.m. in the Governors' Room of the Community Center. PLACEMENT Please help us help the refuse drivers and others who use the roadways by correctly placing your refuse and recycling curbies on collection day.

Curbies are to be placed ON the boulevard (not in the street). In the winter that means some shoveling needs to be done so that there is a clear spot on the boulevard. Don't wheel the curbies up a hill of snow for collection. Instead, shovel out a nice spot where both the refuse and recycling

curbies can be placed and still be three feet apart. This allows the drivers to have a safe spot to collect the materials without posing a hazard to others on the road.

MAKES ME WONDER (BY CITY ADMINISTRATOR TODD PRAFKE - Pavilion....This is a topic I have not written about here for a number of months. Many may recall the Mayor's Task Force of

30 plus people who made the recommendation to the Council of how the new building should look. WINTER HOME SAFETY TIPS - Here are some tips to keep you safe in your home during these continuously cold winter nights:

- If you use a portable heating device make sure it is listed by UL, ETL or CSA so you know it is safe. Keep it clear of combustibles and make sure it is placed on a flat surface so the family pet can't knock it over. When leaving the room or going to sleep, be certain to turn it off or unplug it.
- 2. Perform routine inspections and maintenance such as changing furnace filters monthly, removing garden hoses from the outside connection to prevent pipes from freezing, clearing snow from outside vents, carefully removing snow build-up from around the gas meter (by hand!) and checking smoke and carbon monoxide detectors monthly to make sure they are working.
- Keep an emergency kit stocked with flashlights, portable radio, extra batteries, and some nonperishable foods. Keep your kit in a place that is easy to find in the event of an emergency.
- 4. If you need or want to use a candle, make sure to keep it away from combustibles like paper, wood, and plastics and place it so that pets can't accidentally knock it over. Anything located above a candle should be at least two feet away from the flame and most importantly, never leave candles unattended!
- 5. If you have bedrooms in the basement or the lower level keep snow clear from the front of the window and from the window well so the window can be opened if you need to get out.

FIREPLACES - Home heating bills have gone through the roof for a lot of home owners. If you are one of them, you may be thinking of adding a fireplace of some type to your home. Here are some things to keep in mind when looking for a fireplace.



- Always look for a fireplace with a UL listing (Underwriters Laboratories Inc.).
 This listing will let you know that the fireplace has been tested to meet safety requirements.
- Follow the manufacturer's specifications for installation. Each manufacturer sets guidelines on how the equipment is to be installed. The installation manual must be available for the

- Building Inspector to review during the rough-in inspection.
- A permanently mounted, gas, vent-free heater/fireplace cannot be legally installed in a home, but can be installed in a garage or shed.
 If you have any questions about installation of a fireplace please call the Building Department at 934-0662 before you buy.

REFUSE HAULING CHANGES – With the award of the bid for residential refuse hauling to LJP Enterprises, changes will be coming for City refuse customers.

Days of collection, what is collected, and how the process works will be identical. However, the green curbies that everyone has now will be switched out for new curbies from LJP Enterprises. The new curbies will be a different color, but the recycling curbie will still have the yellow/gold top. City staff and LJP staff will be meeting to discuss the transition in the next few days and customers will be notified through public access, the City's Facebook page and website, reports at Council meetings, and in the Hot Sheet. As the transition plan progresses, check all these sites for more information. We hope to make the transition as seamless as possible for our customers.

Construction Values - Depending on where you live or travel in Saint Peter, you might not see a lot of growth occurring. But did you know that a total of 20 single family homes were permitted for construction in 2013? The total value of the single family construction equaled \$3.7 million. That is more than double the number of single family home permits issued in 2012 (9 single family homes were permitted in 2012 for a total value of \$2.2 million) and just a taste of the growth that continues in our community.

Commercial/Industrial construction building permits totaled \$12.5 million in 2013 which is an increase from 2012 which saw a value of only \$7.8 million. So things are definitely moving in the growth direction.

What does this mean? One way to look at it is that Saint Peter's economy and that of our region continues to improve and a lot of people think Saint Peter is a fine place to build and grow.

SNOWSHOES FOR RENT - Bundle up, get outside (when the weather cooperates!), and experience nature. Enjoy the winter by taking a snowshoe stroll through the woods. The Saint Peter Recreation Department and Treaty Site



History Center provide adult and youth size snowshoes for rent. Rental fees: \$5 per pair per day, \$10 for the weekend, (Deposit of \$50 per pair due upon pick up). LOOKING AHEAD TO SUMMER - It's not too early to plan for your spring or summer reunion/event, company picnic, graduation party, or groom's dinner at one of our local park shelters. Shelters are available at Minnesota Square Park. Gorman Park, Gault Park, and Riverside Park (Mill Pond). If you are interested in reserving a shelter, please visit the City website www.saintpetermn.gov and to "Facility qo Availability". Follow the instructions to find out when the park shelter is available. (Note that if the month you are checking doesn't show up on the page then no reservations have been made.)

Once you select a date and time contact the Recreation and Leisure Services Department to finalize your reservation of the facility; call 934-0667 or email the office at heidis@saintpetermn.gov. The fees for use of the park shelter are \$40 for City of Saint Peter residents or \$52 for those that live outside of the City limits. A \$100 damage deposit is also required.

Wastewater Operators - One entry level and one Class "C" or higher Wastewater Operator in the Department of Public Works. Both positions will have the opportunity to advance to an "A" license Wastewater Operator Minimum qualifications include a high school diploma or equivalent; possession of a State of Minnesota Class "D" Wastewater Treatment Facility Operator Certificate or ability to obtain within one year of the date of employment with the City OR Class "C" Wastewater Treatment Facility Operator Certificate; possession of a State of Minnesota Type IV Biosolids Operator or ability to obtain within one year of the date of employment with the City; possession of a valid driver's license - State of Minnesota Class A driver's license with Air Brake Endorsement and Tanker Endorsement or ability to obtain within six months of the date of employment with the City; possession of an American Heart Association Certification as a Basic Rescuer or ability to obtain within six months. Desirable qualifications: Satisfactory completion of a technical school program related to wastewater systems operations; up to six years of responsible experience as a wastewater system operator with at least two years' experience in the operation of a Class A, B, or C system or facility, or similar industrial facility; knowledge of the principles, practices, chemicals, and equipment used in wastewater treatment, biosolids treatment and disposal, and pumping operations; ability to perform a wide variety of tests on raw and treated wastewater, raw and treated bio-solids; knowledge of the principles of plumbing and hydraulics; knowledge of and ability to operate Supervisory Control And Data Acquisition (SCADA) system; knowledge of the functions and service requirements mechanical equipment and machinery: knowledge of OSHA regulations and safety precautions of the trade; demonstrated ability to operate a variety of wastewater plant pumping, treatment, and control equipment, biosolids treatment and disposal equipment; demonstrated ability to diagnose problems conditions emergency and corrective action; knowledge and experience in the operation of equipment including but not limited to backhoes, dump trucks, iet rodder machine, tanker trucks, main line TV cameras, and line locators. NOTICE: The successful candidate must complete and pass a preemployment physical and drug test and is subject to post-accident, random, reasonable suspicion, return to duty, and follow-up drug and alcohol testing required by federal regulations. Starting pay range: Entry-Level Wastewater Operator \$18.44 - \$19.59 per hour. Class "C" Wastewater Staring pay range: Operator \$20.73 - \$24.41 per hour.
