ORDINANCE NO. 832,  
FOURTH SERIES  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SHAKOPEE, MINNESOTA, AMENDING CITY CODE SECTION 5.34, SUNDAY SALES. THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHAKOPEE, MINNESOTA, ORDAINS:

Section 1: City Code Section 5.34, Sunday Sales is amended to read as follows:

SEC. 5.34. SUNDAY SALES.

The electorate of the City having heretofore authorized the same, a Sunday liquor license may be issued to hotels, restaurants, or clubs, as herein defined, which hold an on-sale intoxicating liquor license and have facilities for seating not less than thirty (30) guests at one (1) time between the hours authorized by Minnesota Statutes, in connection with the sale of food. Sales authorized hereunder may begin at 11:00 A.M. 10:00 A.M. on Sunday morning.

Section II: Effective Date. This ordinance becomes effective from and after its passage and publication.

ADJ. REGULAR SESSION

Mayor Schmitt called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with Council members Matt Lehman, Pat Heitzman, Steve Clay and Pamela Punt present. Also present Mark McNeill, City Administrator; Jim Thomson, City Attorney; Judith S. Cox, City Clerk; R. Michael Leek, Community Development Director; Jamie Polley, Parks, Recreation and Natural Resources Director; and Jeff Tate, Police Chief.

Clay/Punt moved to approve the agenda. Motion carried 5-0.

Mark McNeill, City Administrator, stated that several people who have served completed terms on various City Advisory Boards are traditionally presented with a plaque of appreciation. Mr. McNeill said the following people earned plaques but were unable to attend the meeting to receive their plaques in person. They are Eric Braun, Shakopee Public Utilities Commission; Jeanie Penning, Park and Recreation Advisory Board; Lisa Overn, Transit Commission; and Tami Kurtzweil, Planning Commission.

Mayor Schmitt presented plaques to Jay Whiting, Historical Preservation Advisory Commission and Michael Huber, Historic Preservation Advisory Commission.

Lehman/Heitzman moved to approve the Consent Agenda. Mr. McNeill read the consent agenda. Motion carried 5-0.

Lehman/Heitzman moved to declare 77 recovered and found bicycles as surplus property. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda)

Lehman/Heitzman moved to authorize staff to contract with Duke's Sewer Root Control Specialists for the price of \$1.59 per lineal foot for sanitary sewer root control with payment to be expended from the Sanitary Sewer Fund. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda)

Lehman/Heitzman moved to authorize staff to utilize the repurchase agreement with Ag Power Enterprises, Inc. for unit #132, 2008 John Deere 5425 Tractor for the price of \$8,443.13 and the funds to be expended from the Internal Service Equipment Fund. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda)

Lehman/Heitzman moved to approve the bills in the amount of \$641,720.65 and electronic transfers in the amount of \$699,283.04 for a total of \$1,341,003.69. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda)

Lehman/Heitzman moved to approve the minutes of April 6, 2010. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda)

Lehman/Heitzman moved to approve the following inter-fund transfers for 2009: from General Fund to Recreation - \$1,204,160; General Fund to EDA - \$28,468; Telecomm to General Fund - \$106,500; Telecomm to Building Fund - \$718,595; Recreation Fund to Building Fund - \$384,947; Transit to General Fund - \$11,200; EDA to General Fund - \$19,200; State Aid Fund to General Fund - \$90,000; State Aid Fund to 2009 Improvement - \$163,694; State Aid Fund to 2009 Improvement - \$187,694; Sewer Fund to 2009 Improvement - \$154,782; Surface Water to 2009 Improvement - \$99,340; Sewer Fund to General Fund - \$50,000; Surface Water to General Fund - \$50,000; TIF #12 to EDA - \$1,571; TIF #13 to EDA - \$2,681; 1997B Debt to CIF - \$35,000. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda)

Lehman/Heitzman moved to adjust the reservation of General Fund - Fund Balance for 2009 building permit related activities by \$334,303, from \$1,011,596 to \$677,293 as per the Springsted model and the agreement with the Builders Association of the Twin Cities. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda)

Lehman/Heitzman moved to remove the Outdoor Learning Center Building Permit Fees from the table. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda)

Lehman/Heitzman moved to require the payment of building permit fees for the School District's Outdoor Learning Center and approve the reduction of the School District's contribution toward the construction of the sidewalk/trail extension on Fuller Street by a like amount; and, authorize the use of the Capital Improvements Fund for the difference caused for the Fuller Street sidewalk/trail extension. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda)

Lehman/Heitzman moved to adopt the revised Short and Long Term Goals for use by the City for 2010-2011 decisions, as part of its visioning process. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda) (Doc No. CC - 475)

Lehman/Heitzman moved to accept and file the 2009 Telecommunications Activities Annual Report. (Motion carried under the Consent Agenda) (Doc No. CC - 476)

Clay/Lehman/ moved to recess for an Economic Development Authority meeting. Motion carried 5-0.

Mayor Schmitt reconvened the meeting at 7:14 p.m.  
Jamie Polley, Parks, Recreation and Natural Resources Director, presented Council with the Future Recreation Facilities Improvements.

Ms. Polley introduced Brad Tabke, chairperson for the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB). Mr. Tabke said that on November 23, 2009 the PRAB identified three goals that they felt were priorities that would greatly enhance the Parks, Recreation and Natural Resource Department.

The three goals are a senior center which would include congregating dining, multipurpose facility/2nd sheet of office, and a second floor to the Community Center fitness facility. The PRAB chose these three because they would be the most cost effective, increase revenue, and offer the citizens of Shakopee the most opportunities. Comments from residents and discussion by Council members followed.

Clay/Heitzman moved to direct staff to bring back recommendations for consultants for architectural feasibility studies and preliminary design services; ice operational studies; and a community survey. Motion carried 5-0.

Lehman/Clay moved for a recess at 8:30 p.m. Motion carried 5-0.

Mayor Schmitt re-convened the meeting at 8:40 p.m.

Randy Sampson, CEO of Canterbury Park, presented the upcoming events to the City Council because of the complaints against them last year regarding a concert where profanity was expressed over the speaker system.

Clay/Lehman moved to adjourn to Tuesday, April 27, 2010 at 7:00 p.m. Motion carried 5-0.

From the Shakopee Valley News, 1985

**June 9, 1960** - The 1960 Shakopee Chamber of Commerce float in the Third district American Legion convention parade in Shakopee. The unit advertises the pure sparkling water of Shakopee.

**April 29, 1910** - A company of Calvary from Fort Snelling passed through town on their way to Eden Prairie.

**June 24, 1910** - Sparks from a passing locomotive set fire to the meadow in the vicinity of the Theodore Detienne home about 4 miles east of Shakopee.

**May 29, 1985** - Every service station in the city dropped its price for regular gasoline to \$.99/gal. Gasoline hasn't been that cheap for seven years and may drop lower because OPEC recently reduced crude oil prices to \$1/barrel.

**June 16, 1960** - Flying Cloud Drive-in Theater, 5 miles north of Shakopee now playing R. Burton, "The Bramble Bush," in color and Jerry Lewis in "Visit to a Small Planet."

**June 4, 1985** - Bert and Bonnie Notermann, owners of Lions Tap, are in the final phase of an expanding and remodeling project. Originally opened as Peterson Bros Roadside Market in 1933, Sears and Irene Lyons introduced the now famous hamburger in 1958.

**Oct. 7, 1885** - Over 300 teams crossed the bridge last Monday besides a large amount of stock. Thus showing the value of the bridge to Shakopee.

**April 8, 1910** - At exactly 12 o'clock on Wednesday, the entire force of men engaged in construction of the sewer struck for higher wages. They were being paid \$1.75 per day and struck for an increase of 25 cents per day. The men were out just two hours, including the dinner hour, and at 2 o'clock word came from the construction company that the demand would be met if the men would go back to work. The Argus is pleased to congratulate them
