Since 1938 Elections are held each year so Candidates can run and try to win a seat on the Colville Tribes Business Council

NESPELEM, WA.—An Election was held on a proposed Constitution and By-laws, and Colville Tribal Members either voted by Absentee Ballot or at one of the polling places located within the Reservation on Saturday, Feb. 26, 1938.

The results showed that 503 voted in favor of the Constitution and By-laws, and 76 voted against it, and that over 30 percent of those entitled to vote cast their ballot. The Commissioner of Indian Affairs, John Collier, approved the results on April 19.

The first election for selecting Tribal Members to the Colville Business Council was held on June 4. According to paragraph two, Section 1, Article III of the Constitution, the two Candidates who received the most votes in the Inchelium, Nespelem, and Omak Districts would serve two years, and the Candidate with the highest number of votes in the Keller District would also serve two years.

Also the two Candidates in 3rd and 4th place in the Inchelium, Nespelem, and Omak

District would serve one year, the Candidate with the 2nd highest votes in the Keller District would serve one year.

The next year (1939) those seven (7) Council people elected for a one-year term had to run for re-election! Four of those original seven Council people kept their seat on the Council, and would serve a two-year term. After 1939, elections were and are still held every year for seven Council positions.

Four of the events or changes that have occurred since 1938-1939 are as follows:

*For the first time a PRIMARY ELECTION was held on May 14, 1983...and afterwards the GENERAL ELCTION was held on June 18, 1983!

*Colvillle Tribal Members voted in June 1984 on two proposed Amendments: Amendment VIII (Referendum) passed with 1,304-Yes votes and 532-No votes...and Tribal Members said no to Amendment IX (Four-year term on Council), the vote was 598-Yes votes and 1,247-No votes!

*Since 1983 the four candidates who received the highest number of votes in the Inchelium, Nespelem, and Omak Districts in the Primary Election advanced to the General Election...where the two candidates with the highest number of votes won a seat on the Council in each of their respective districts.

In 1991, the Council passed a Resolution stating that each Council position in the Inchelium, Nespelem, and Omak Districts will be numbered. One will be identified as Position One, and the other as Position Two. The two Candidates who received the highest number of votes for each specific position advanced to the General Election.

*And on June 21, 1997, Tribal Members said no to three Referendums: REFERENDUM A—Enrollment (Yes-818 and No-857)...REFERENDUMB—Colville Business Council Four Year Terms (Yes-490 and No-1,192)...and REFERENDUM C—General Election held in November instead of June (Yes-655 and No-1,026).

ABSENTEE BALLOT (1938)—Above is an Absentee Ballot that was not counted. Apparently the number (1261—in the upper right hand corner) is the number assigned to the Ballot. The Delegates of the Constitution Committee selected the three people to serve on each election Board: Nespelem District...Hiram B. Runnels, Judge; Louie Wapato, Clerk; and Joe Redthunder, Teller; KELLER DISTRICT—Thad Moore, Judge; Norma Peasley, Clerk, and Joe Monaghan, Teller; and INCHELIUM DISTRICT...Herman Stone, Judge; Louis E. Quintasket, Clerk; and John Seymour, Teller. The three officials for the OMAK DISTRICT are unknown!

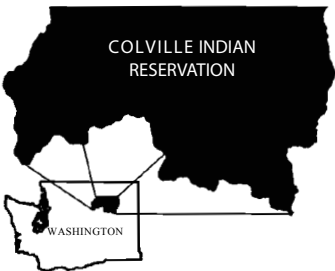
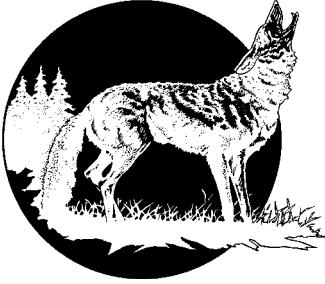

Greetings:
This past month has been a busy one with the mining hearings and finally the vote; the drug busts, (2) totaling approximately \$2 million; the 181D money payment and the certification of both the mine vote and candidates for this year's election which total 18 candidates, not including the incumbents. This is

quite a field. Keep in mind that you can only vote for one per position number and once by poll vote or absentee; please vote.

I was talking with an individual about voting and the possibilities if "we" all voted in every election. We could control Okanogan and Ferry Counties; we could get qualified

tribal members elected into the State House or Senate; we would have more control of the federal legislatures. In the end, we would have more control of our fate as a sovereign. There are no strings attached to your vote. It is your right given to each of you by your forefathers.

I am glad that the Mining issue is settled and the "no" vote prevailed. I voted "no" and will continue to do so at every opportunity. I believe mining would have been our downfall as a people and a Tribe. It would have destroyed our environment, our

Hutchinson Update

Spring Greetings:
This past month has been busy, but exciting and productive work. On March 28, Brian Gunn, and I attended the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs hearing on Trust Reform. This hearing is important to the Colville Tribe, because of title II and VI, of the bill to eliminate the Office of Special Trustee, and other concerns we have. On this same day, we met with Pete Modaff, Legislative aid to Representative, Norm Dicks. This meeting was to seek their support for the restoration of \$630,000 for Lake Roosevelt, and to update them on the Colville Tribe's work on Trust Reform. Then on Wednesday, we met to review my testimony. We met with Representative, Cathy McMorris, to

let her know how important the Trust Reform legislation was to the tribe. In addition, informed her about the Float Planes, and the drug smuggling from Canada. We also met with Jean Bumpus, the top Republican staff person for the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs, and her boss is Senator John McCain. We provided a full account of the drug activities happening on the reservation, with the floatplanes, and drugs. We asked for homeland security funding to go directly to the Tribe, and not pass through the State, or at least earmarked for tribes. Thursday, we met with Representative, Jay Inslee; I was very impressed, because he came out of a hearing to meet with us. We very briefly educated him on the tribe's

interest on the settlement of the Cobell litigation. Then, finally, that afternoon I got my chance to testify. The Chairman, asked me to represent him in Washington, D.C., to testify before the House Interior Appropriations Subcommittee, on March 30. My testimony was for the restoration of Lake Roosevelt Management and Enforcement Funds, and direct access to Homeland Security Funding, and Border Security. I would like to thank Brian Gunn for the wonderful work he does for his tribe, and for the contacts he maintains in D.C. We met with his friend David Mullon, who works for Senator McCain, a very powerful staff person, on the Cobell hearing, and what it meant, and this was not even a scheduled meeting, so contacts are so very important.

culture and traditions. I believe there was no thought of such things as the influx of people on the reservation, of all nationalities, causing all sorts of problems with our infrastructure, e.g., court system, police services and emergency services to name a few.

There are other ways that we could increase the revenues and jobs for our Tribal membership. The power producing area is opening up to Indian County. There is potential for bio-fuel production on the reservation. This could improve your livelihood if you are faring or have land that could be irrigated. Electrical power production is a real possibility. Electrical power production possibilities exist from small dams, the power plant at CIPV, possible wind energy and using the slash from logging on the reservation. The power arena will create good long term jobs for our membership and reduce the cost of heating our homes without destroying our eco-system. We here in the Nespelem area have 2 of the largest energy producers in the US and are paying among the highest for electrical power usage. This has been going on for over 60 years without any attempt by the Nespelem Valley Electric Cooperative to lessen the financial pain this has caused the membership except to blame the price of our high electrical power on salmon.

Here are some more possibilities for earning some income and creating jobs. I always thought the housing construction area was always a viable industry for the reservation. The reasons I think it would be a good enterprise is because of our 2 sawmills. One makes dimension lumber and the other makes plywood. There are no great costs for shipping to speak of. We have enrolled members who have been trained as carpenters, electricians, plumbers, etc. that could be employed for a long time considering the housing shortage across the reservation and perhaps other reservations and non-reservation communities. There are opportunities out there that would allow large companies to set up plants on the reservation for little to nothing because of tax breaks they would get and other depressed areas incentives which could provide good jobs that pay livable wages to our members. All we need to do is look for these opportunities and proposals.

A number of other council members and myself are involved in "Trust Reform" and we are prevailing. The Affiliated Tribes of Northwest Indians has joined forces with the Southern and Eastern Tribal Organization and NCAI in rewriting the McCain bill to settle the Cobell case and take care of the government's creation of another bureaucracy to control us Indians. They are trying to abrogate the U.S. Government's trust responsibilities to Indian Nations.

In another arena, we are still awaiting word from a 3-judge panel on the Wenatchi fishing issue as to a court date. The suit is still proceeding for cleanup of the Columbia River. We are talking with the state on Columbia River water issues and on jurisdiction on the Columbia River where it borders our reservation.

Another ongoing problem facing the Tribes and its membership via our children is problems with local school districts. The school boards, administrators and teachers appear to be totally ignorant of the problems our "Indian students" are having at all levels, from the administration, down through teachers. I've been told time and again that our children are troublemakers. I say no. It's not a troublemaker who wants to be treated like the non-Indian children are treated. It's their right. They are called troublemakers when the teachers don't teach. They are not troublemakers when the school doesn't follow the student's Individual Education Plan and the student fails.

I will close with that. As with every letter, I ask that each of you take time to exercise your right to vote and do so. By this act we can do many things such as get the federal responsibility back to where it is supposed to be; we could get CTEC headed in the right direction; we could get IHS headed in the right direction.

PROPOSED CODE AMENDMENT Cover Sheet

1. Please give a brief summary of the proposed amendment;
Section 2-1-100 is the arraignment provision. The purpose of setting arraignments in a timely fashion is to prevent the unnecessary incarceration of an individual prior to a hearing. Arraignments should be timely; however, under the current practice criminal suspects arrested on the day before an official holiday must be arraigned strictly within a seventy-two (72) hour period with no allowance made for weekends or holidays.

2. Please provide the reason for the proposed amendment;
If the arraignments are not held within the 72-hour period, the charges against the defendant are dropped. The current court practice is to schedule a judge, court clerk, prosecutor and public defender to come to court, most usually on a holiday that falls on a Monday, to go through the formal arraignment process. It also necessitates a Tribal Police Officer making a round trip with the person in custody to Tribal Court for the proceeding to occur. It is the intent of this code amendment to eliminate these holiday proceedings and to create a bail schedule in order for the incarcerated person the ability to bail out.

ORIGINAL ARRAIGNMENTS & PLEAS; TRIAL DATES

2-1-100 Arraignment
As soon as reasonably possible after arrest, but not more than seventy-two (72) hours thereafter, or within the period designated on the citation, the defendant shall appear or be brought before a judge and the defendant shall again be informed of his rights under the Constitution of the Colville Confederated Tribes and under federal law, including his right to counsel at his own expense. If the defendant desires, but does not presently have a spokesman, he will be given a reasonable time to secure a spokesman before entering his plea.

PROPOSED CODE AMENDMENT

ARRAIGNMENTS & PLEAS; TRIAL DATES

2-1-100 Arraignment
As soon as reasonably possible after arrest, whether an initial arrest or upon warrant, but not more than seventy-two (72) hours thereafter, exclusive of Saturdays, Sundays or holidays, or within the period designated on the citation, the defendant shall appear or be brought before a judge and the defendant shall again be informed of his rights under the Colville Civil Rights Act, including his or her right to counsel at his or her own expense. If the defendant desires, but does not presently have a spokesman, he or she will be given a reasonable time to secure a spokesman before entering his or her plea.

Tribes Establish Protocols for Libraries, Archives, and Information Services

A gathering at the Northern Arizona University (NAU) in Flagstaff, Arizona occurred April 5-7, 2006 where nineteen invited participants established the best practices for “Native American Protocols for American Libraries, Archives, and Information Services.” The protocols will serve as national guidelines to assist non-tribal organizations and institutions with the management of tribal materials in libraries, archives, and information services.

Currently there are many non-tribal collecting institutions that hold archival materials documenting indigenous people native to North America. Since non-tribal institutions and archival professionals are not academically or professionally trained to manage tribal materials they remain committed to intellectual freedom and equal access to everyone. Unfortunately this applies to tribal materials without consideration to culturally sensitive materials including sacred and secret information. When tribal materials are managed outside their native land by non-tribal institutions they may harm, depict, misinform or display a negative affect rather than demonstrate the beauty and complexities of tribal culture, history and traditions.

An ideal standard would compel non-tribal institutions to make all ethical, moral and professional efforts to return tribal materials to their native land. However, the reality of such efforts is near impossible once materials become property of these facilities. In rare cases out of good faith non-tribal institutions may be willing to return tribal materials to their native land but not all tribes have proper facilities to manage materials. Consequently, the lack of financial resources available to tribes may result in collaboration with local and state government agencies, universities, and historical societies to “hold in trust” tribal materials until a permanent facility is established. The heartbreaking truth is not all tribal materials will most likely ever return home imposing tribes to endure non-tribal institutions to be responsible for the physical and intellectual control over their tribal materials.

It’s essential a commonality of ethical best practices is created for the appropriate care, use and preservation of tribal materials. The protocols have the potential to impact tribal communities on many levels and assist in the preservation of and access to tribal culture knowledge. In

recent years the archival community, professional organizations, and tribal communities discovered the need to create a united stewardship for tribal materials managed outside their native land. As sovereign nations with unique government rights it puts tribal materials in unique status leading conference participants to discuss the following topics:

- The balance between preservation and access in perpetuity
- Intellectual freedom and individual and communal privacy
- Intellectual property rights
- Accessibility & Use
- Sensitivity and censorship
- Sacred and secret materials
- Library description practices
- Sovereignty and the public trust
- NAGPRA

Conference participants will introduce and present the protocols for discussion and endorsement at the upcoming scheduled events: the Society of American Archivists (August 2006), American Library Association (June 2006), the International Indigenous Librarians Forum (September 2006), the American Association for State and Local History (September 2006), and the Society of Applied Anthropology (April 2007).

Karen Underhill, Head of Special Collections at the NAU Cline Library is responsible for gathering tribes to initiate the significant steps to materialize the protocols. Over the course of the next few months Karen will capture the essence of the conference and format the best practices which will undergo many collective reviews and revisions. During the revisions conference participants will work together to explore native organizations to accept responsibility for the protocols including copyright control. Karen is humble in words to assure conference participants she will not claim authorship in the final product and is prepared to handover copyright control as the primary recorder. Her dedication to support tribal communities is exceptional and I believe her inspirational efforts will be acknowledged for many years to follow.

The participants during the conference included the following tribes, professional organizations and institutions: Anishinabe/Ojibwe, Colville Confederated Tribes, Mohawk/Akwesasne, Shoshone, Mohave, Seneca Nation, Navajo Nation, Hopi Tribe, Heiltsuk/First Nations, Comanche, Kiowa/Tohono O’odham, Confederated Tribes of Grande Ronde, Yorta Yorta (Australia), Northern Arizona University Cline Library,

Arizona State Museum, Wheelwright Museum, the Society of American Archivists, University of Oklahoma, Burke Museum, Smithsonian National Anthropological Archives, and the University of California.

This is a unique opportunity for tribes to educate non-tribal librarians, archivists and closely related professionals through the development of the protocols. Upon completion the final product will serve as a collaborative tool among tribes and non-tribal institutions.

In closing, I extend my appreciation to Karen Underhill (NAU) for the invitation to attend and participate in these valuable efforts to assist tribes in the preservation of cultural

materials. Thank you to conference participants, facilitators and presenters for the opportunity to share and contribute my professional knowledge. Lastly, the conference would not have been successful without the “behind the scenes staff” and sponsors and I would like acknowledge NAU Cline Library, NAU Special Collections staff, NAU food & beverage servers, Nancy Pitz (NAU), Willow Powers (Wheelwright Museum), National Library of Medicine and various grant agencies.

Tribal TANF Update

TANF Overview: The overall goal of the Tribal TANF program is to assist families to become self-sufficient, consistent with specific principals and culturally relevant strategies that will lead towards this end. Tribal TANF is offered in a way that emphasizes work while promoting responsibility, independence, and education to secure family stability and self-sufficiency.

Participants who specify interest and readiness may be eligible to receive employment counseling & job search assistance after which a job search readiness assessment will be made in order to place the participant in a Work Experience program. WEX programs are intended to provide training for TANF participants, and enable the participant to gain work experience. Community service job skills directly related to employment may also be paid to enhance the participant’s employability.

A new program under the TANF umbrella has just made it through council and became Resolution. Individual Accounts savings program will allow eligible participants to deposit a fraction of earned income into a 3 to 1 matched savings account. Income accrued from the WEX stipends or other forms of earned income can be deposited into these high yield savings accounts to help participants overcome obstacles such as buying a house or starting a small business. First home buyer classes and business planning classes will be offered as well as consumer credit counseling.

Tribal TANF also offers incentives ranging from \$25 to \$500 for achieving program goals. There is a \$200 incentive for obtaining a driver’s license, \$300 incentive for earning a high school diploma or GED, and a \$200 incentive for the completion of a drug or alcohol inpatient or outpatient programs. On the average, the tribal TANF program awards over 400 Incentives per month to TANF participants for achieving goals which lead towards self sufficiency.

The Tribal TANF program initiated a start up grant and received a \$500,000 from the Federal Office of Child Support Enforcement to develop a fully comprehensive child support program. Collecting Child Support for children is only one of the objectives of the Colville Tribal Child Support program whereas the main objective is to secure family stability and personal responsibility. The Child Support program is expected to generate federal funds and make available performance incentives that will strengthen the bond between the non-custodial parent and their children (i.e. parenting and visiting programs, training and skills building programs to assist non-custodial parents get and keep jobs, re-entry programs for incarcerated parents.) The tribal TANF program will be utilizing survey tools and community outreach events to collect input & information as well as identify issues of concern and possible barriers.

The Colville Tribal TANF program successfully renegotiated the Intergovernmental Agreement with the State of Washington, Department of Social & Health Services for another 3 year term. There was no reduction in funding for the new three year term. As part of the Intergovernmental Agreement, the Colville Tribal TANF program now reports quarterly on six “Measures of Success.” These measures of success include:

- Clients leaving TANF due to earnings
- Job Training Work Experience
- Work Participation Rate
- Receiving alternate sources of income/assistance
- Receiving Incentive Awards
- Leaving TANF within 6 months
- The Measures of Success is used as a gauge as to how well the Colville Tribal TANF program is doing in assisting TANF families to achieve self sufficiency.

The Colville Tribal TANF program benefits from a cooperative working relationship with the State of Washington Department of Social & Health Services.

Tribal TANF has developed a referral process that provides TANF recipients an option to attend classes at Northwest Indian College at the Colville Site. By taking classes, TANF recipients can satisfy elements of their self-sufficiency plans and earn college level credits, concurrently. Some TANF recipients are now in their third quarter of attending NWIC. Upon completion of their program of study, students can earn an Associates of Arts and Sciences Degree or an Associate of Science Transfer Degree. For TANF recipients that do not qualify for

- 2 grants for Down Payment Assistance in the amount of \$9,785.00 for homes valuing \$251,500.00
- 14 grants for Rental Assistance in the amount of \$15,178.50
- 19 move-ins were processed.
- 72 annual inspections were conducted.
- Continued with modernization on the 43-9 units.
- Continued with Phase I of White Buffalo Meadows in Nespelem.
- Continued funding with Tribal Police for Animal Control Program.

The circulation time line for books and tapes is longer at our tribal libraries than what patrons would encounter should they live in the larger town/city off the Reservation.

CONFEDERATED TRIBES OF THE COLVILLE RESERVATION

Introduction

Substance use and misuse among Native Americans has been the subject of a great deal of inquiry. Much of the research has focused on general factors that are assumed to apply to all Indian peoples. More recently researchers have been calling for tribal specific and community specific research to address the fact that Indian communities are not homogeneous. In fact, while there are assumed to be many pan-Indian characteristics that aboriginal people in the United States may share, there is increasing awareness that there are also many differences among Native communities and each community would be best served by learning directly from its own members.

This research will provide information that will help the community gain a better understanding of substance among young adults on the Colville Reservation. We want to ask the young adults directly about their alcohol and substance use experiences and also about their cultural identity and practices. It is our intention to evaluate and explore the relationship between cultural identity, values, and practices and substance use behaviors.

Young adults were chosen as a focus for this study because it is a group of community members who often do not have a voice. They are not usually asked directly about their experiences in these areas so it is an area about which we would like to learn more. In addition, young adults have probably been using substances for less time than older adults and their behavior may be more able to change if we can understand how to help them change it. This group is also the future of our community and will be raising the generations after them. We would like to understand their experience and attempt to help them build healthy lives for themselves, their children and grandchildren. A first step is to understand their experience from their point of view.

The study findings will belong to the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation. They can be used to better understand the interrelationship between cultural identity, practices, values and substance abuse. Whatever learning is generated can then be used by tribal programs, community groups, and individuals to help address substance abuse problems in the community.

The study will be a survey conducted among young adults on the Reservation of the Colville Confederated Tribes. For the purposes of this study, young adults are defined as people ages 18 through 24 who are enrolled tribal members and/or who reside on the Colville reservation or in the surrounding area. The participants will be invited to participate by posting flyers all over the community and through a mailing to enrolled tribal members who fit the selection criteria. Participants will be invited to attend a community gathering that will include food served to them. The community gatherings will be held in each of the four reservation districts – Inchelium, Keller, Omak, and Nespelem – in order to increase the likelihood that people will come.

This study will be descriptive in that it will give us information about substance use and cultural practices that can be reported as descriptive

data. It will also be confirmatory in that it will test the hypothesis that there is a relationship between cultural identity, cultural practices and substance abuse.

We hope to have everyone's complete cooperation when the surveys will be given in each district. Any questions please call Dorothy

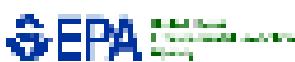

Randy Brown participated in the small business planning course organized and sponsored by the Colville Tribes’ Small Business Resource Center (SBRC). The course was the first of what have been five offerings to Tribal members. The Colville Tribes’ SBRC has worked

in partnership with ONABEN to provide business planning assistance to our members and others in our community.

Eastside Espresso and Deli is the result of some hard work put forth by Randy Brown with a little help from the SBRC and ONABEN. I remember Randy’s business plan from his class’ graduation, he said back then that he wanted to provide great customer service and a perfect cup of coffee.

Well it appears he has stuck with his business plan because they strive on getting your espresso done just right and they are now delivering deli sandwiches to the area.

Drop by and grab yourself a cup of coffee from “Eastside Espresso and Deli,” located behind the “Ideal Automotive” car dealership in Omak. Look for Randy’s sign on the highway next to the dealership.

Response to the Misconception Article

Yes, the land is ours that's why we don't want it poisoned. Many tribal members live off the land., which is their way of life. However, white people call it subsistence.

Yes, education is importance for the survival of our reservation in the world as it exists today. However, one persons education can't ensure what is right for our Indian people. I have lived all my life on the Colville Rex except to attend college. But I seen extremely unsafe acts in our control, and others still continue today. Many previous actions have caused serious accidents, some fatalities in our control of the operation of business. CTEC has had multiple fatalities occur at the work site; therefore, they are not superiorly flawless as one might think.

For the EIS process on the Colville rez, there is zero accountability. I have heard the NEPA coordinator state that their boss gave direction that no information is allowed to get out to the public until it is finalized by the council. That mentality is how the Referendum meetings were conducted. It is not what the people want, as illustrated by the vote, rather just a handful of people who would benefit a hell of a lot more than other tribal members.

Our tribal economy has been going down hill. I was a program manger and every year we had to attend a managers meeting that told

us we were getting a 30% or more budget cut. That went on for at least 7 years. At one, I asked why was the Colville Tribe advertising during prime time during the Olympics that they were the largest employer in the North Central Washington if we were in such shortfall of money. The response I got from the form BIA superintendent was that the Colville Tribes can't appear to be too rich or we will lose grant money.

Sticking uneducated "yes" people in \$50,000 a year positions is what is causing the Colville Tribe go into debt, not economic recession. Until we get rid of all of the old timer council people who do not vote on behalf of all 9000+ members, then nothing will change and the Colville's will continue to decline in prosperity, culture and health.

Mining is not the solution. Changing the legislative candidates in office will make growth for the tribe. So don't vote for the same old person. Pay attention how they vote. For instance, Management and Budget chairperson voted against the summer youth program to put youth to work. Natural Resource chairman voted to sell our water for \$1,000,000 to the farmers on the Columbia basin. Where's the money?

Mismanagement must stop, today!

plunder the Colville Tribal Forest with no opposition from personnel who have the responsibility to manage the timber, we are headed for termination.

How’s it going this month! Can you believe the year is going by so fast. Short talk this month, hope that’s OK. I think this will be about our 5th “fun guy” that we’ve checked out. It’s a fungus and it hits Ponderosa and lodgepole pines. We’ve been working in some areas where quite a few of the trees are being hit hard. Sorry I don’t have a photo. We’ll use our good visualization skills. The best way to identify this fun guy is to look for the “galls” that form on branches and stems. These “galls” are round swellings. It’s like an explosion of plant tissue, stimulated by the attack of the fungus. I think it’s a lot like a “tumor” in us humans. It’s not good. These galls can shut off the circulation of water and nutrients to the trees’ needles. The needles will die and the branches will have a “flagging” look. You’ll look up into a tree, see these “galls” on the middle of the branch and dead needles on the end. This is not good.

A tree can tolerate only so much of this. Insects and other fungi can also attack the galled plant tissue and make things worse. These galls can also form on the main stem of a tree and are called “cankers”. These “tumors” really weaken the tree and can result in windbreakage. This time of year, a fresh gall can look bright orange with some yellow. This is when it releases spores, which are carried by the wind to perhaps infect more trees. As with other fungi that harm our trees, moisture and poor air movement are involved. By keeping trees thinned out, we can improve air circulation and keep the above ground environment a little drier. The fun guy spores have a tougher time in dry air. Fortunately, we can reduce the negative impacts of this guy with forestry treatments. Overstocked trees (poor air movement) can be thinned out. Infected trees standing tall in the overstory (spreading spores) can be harvested.

This fun guy is called “western gall rust”. Latin name *Endocronartium harknessii*. These “galls” are very distinctive. Something interesting, that you may see, while you’re enjoying a day in the forest.

In other fun news, we’re having an “open house” on May 17, to discuss upcoming projects. We have a “public field trip” scheduled for June 6, to visit the Swimptkin Creek project. We have a “public meeting” scheduled for June 21, to get your input on the Swimptkin Creek project. Please check out our announcement in the Tribune for specific times and locations. You can always call us at 634-2566 also.

For you faithful readers that follow our trivia contests and are wondering what movie I was referring to last month; here it is. Our word was “notion”. The movie is “Sometimes a Great Notion”. It’s been a long time, but I remember that it was good. Have a safe, great spring. We’ll talk with you again next month. ☺

Winter Report from the Youth Program

Winter has been long and cold but here at Fish & Wildlife, it didn’t slow us down; the youth and I did some major things in the schools and a lot of ceremonial hunting for deer, elk, and turkeys. This winter I visited different schools in the four districts of the reservation to work with the kids in the classroom. One of the things I worked with was introduction to brain tanning of hides.

I started at Inchelium School and learned a little, a different method of teaching for different schools in order to fit in with their schedules. I learned that you need to be prepared for whatever the kids and teachers throw at you on the interest part as well the time you are allowed to teach. Well, Inchelium district has a very good native studies program and that made it easy to fit in; we tanned one deer hide in this class so they got to keep it for the use on other projects.

This project went on to Lake Roosevelt High School, Keller Middle School and Skilskin alternative school. I noticed that you have to embarrass some of the tribal kids to get them involved but in all I think a lot of the kids will come to learn more in a different environment.

Some of the schools went on to learn to make drums. Would you believe we made twenty-seven of them in a week with the help of other students in other classes? These kids involved took a drum home with them after we had finished.

Some of the other projects we worked on was building salmon hook molds to prepare the kids for our adventures at Chief Joe Dam this summer that starts in late June or early July so you need to get your paperwork in.

A lot of time is spent on gathering food for these ceremonies on the reservation; I took four kids in the program that already hunt and worked with them on their skills as a hunter as well to prepare the food for the cooks. During this time I show them the other things we can do with the hide, horns and bones as well as making sinew. During this time together, I get to know these young adults and grow fonder of their efforts as growing up and learning to share their knowledge with others and showing me they have things to offer me as a coordinator.

I have taken the youth ice fishing in cold weather and they didn’t complain a bit; we fished the San Poil in the early spring. During these times there have been adults who are willing to share our moments by just helping out or even talking to them. This is a positive way to change the way we see our youth and for them to see adult’s ideas.

I have been to different educational programs to learn different resources of education such as Hunter’s Education Instructor Training through the state, archery for the 4-H program. Through these programs I learned there are a lot of people out there willing to work with the youth

during their free time.

During spring break, Rick D. and I had a Hunter’s Ed class in Nespelem. There are fourteen kids out there with more education in hunting safety. There are three more classes scheduled on the reservation; these are the dates for two of them: June 22 & 23 Inchelium; June 29 & 30 Keller. If you are interested please contact me at 634-2151. I will get back to you on any other Hunter’s Ed classes.

As for you archery hunters, I

had the R-RAC 3-D archery shoot in Omak already! This event was scheduled for the public to come and shoot at targets with our archery equipment. We had a total of 123 people show up and shoot within two days. During this shoot, I had a lot of door prizes and a raffle to help pay for the shoot and help the Omak archery club get started.

During these meetings the planning for the ceremony will be made. Please show support for your traditional beliefs and help others learn these traditions.

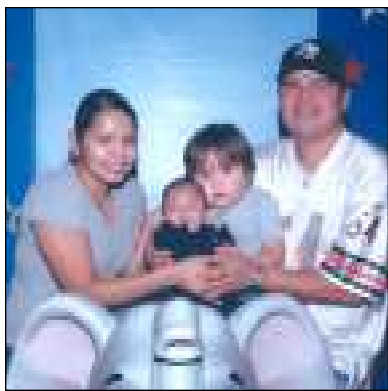

Purpose: One of the principal goals in WIGA’s Mission Statement is to promote tribal economic development and self-sufficiency. The WIGA Scholarship Program is designed to promote tribal self-sufficiency by providing scholarships for Native American students in Washington, seeking to advance their own self-sufficiency and broaden their personal and professional potential through higher education. Students pursuing degrees at community colleges, four-year colleges, and in post-graduate and professional schools are eligible.

Timeline: Scholarship awards will be available for the academic years beginning fall 2006-2007.

The Scholarship Committee has discretion in determining the amount of each award and the number of student recipients, depending on the availability of funds and the pool of applicants each year. For the first academic year, 2006-2007, the available scholarship fund is \$5,000. The amount in future years could be more or less; however, it is the intention of WIGA to increase the amount available each year. Applicants should indicate the amount of student aid requested.

Award Distribution: Scholarship awards will be made directly to the financial aid office of the institution for which the recipient is attending, in the name of the student. WIGA scholarships may be used to cover tuition, fees, books, room, and board. Scholarships may also cover only those expenses stated in the “student budget” of the institution. Among the trade show highlights, Kevin Leecy, Chair of the Bois Forte Band of Chippewa in Minnesota was elected President of NIGA. Current NIGA Committee member, Nation Gaming Officer, Tracy Burris, was elected treasurer. They will be their two secretaries in NIGA Washington. Wapato, majority of the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation Executive Director, as recipient of the 2006 Chino Award. The NIGA’s highest honor, after the late Wendell D. Boyce, was given to Mescalero, Apache, and Mexican Indian Gaming, honoring Wendell’s work in 1999 in fact, it was his wife, the late Star, who first envisioned the award. The award is named for Wendell, a man who has generated 555,000 jobs and programs for Indians in the Bloomfield, Coordinator of the National Indian Gaming Association, said Chairman Steven Applebach, “this is about Indian gaming. I would tell you that reaches far beyond one reservation.” said NIGA Executive Director Mark Van Norman.

“The local, state and Federal taxes and revenues it generates are paying to fund education, health care and build the necessary infrastructure like roads, bridges and water systems.”
