The Headliners Committee announced the lineup for the Springtime of Youth music festival Tuesday, and the university is making campus greener than ever before.

Bielema's Burgers is set to replace Slim Chickens on campus for the 2015 fall semester, UA officials announced April 1.

The announcement should come as no surprise, as Bret Bielema has often expressed interest in branching out beyond football and has recently tweeted multiple pictures of his meals from home.

The opening of Bielema's Burgers in Founders Hall will be the first of several locations to come to the Fayette-ville and Rogers area in the future.

"I've always wanted to run my own restaurant," Bielema said. "Now I finally get to, and I'm so excited to bring the food I make and take pictures of at home to campus."

The menu features several burger options and combos, including the TE Throwdown Burger and BA's Rollout Combo.

Collins' Curly Fries are the feature side item, and as curly and unpredictable as the running back's routes themselves.

Underground Coke Ring Discovered on Campus

University officials uncovered an underground Coca-Cola ring Tuesday night beneath Pomfret Hall.
