SHAW JCC'S SOUP FOR THE SOUL - MORE THAN A BOWL OF SOUP

Shaw JCC Executive Director John Keverkamp witnesses daily how critical the Center's programs and services are to the people the JCC serves. Never was this more evident than when the pandemic struck.



While no person or family was unaffected by COVID-19, Julie LeFever, the Shaw JCC's Adult Program Coordinator and Founder of Soup for the Soul, was especially concerned about our community's Senior Adults. To ensure that seniors maintained relationships to the community during this challenging time, she created a program to provide homemade soup to those requesting it.

"It's more than a bowl of Soup," LeFever explains, "It's about connection, about socializing." Connect-

ion is vital, especially for those who are unable or concerned about leaving their homes and contracting the COVID-19 virus. So, pre-registered seniors may pick up their soup on Tuesdays, or choose to have their soup delivered. No matter how the seniors receive the soup, it is always accompanied by conversation and warm, personal contact. Both the body and soul are nourished.

LeFever extends a big thank to all who have supported the program. "You have helped to keep our seniors active and involved in the Akron community. You have made a difference. As one of the program participants has said, 'In the midst of the isolation of the pandemic, my happy day was feeding my soul.'"

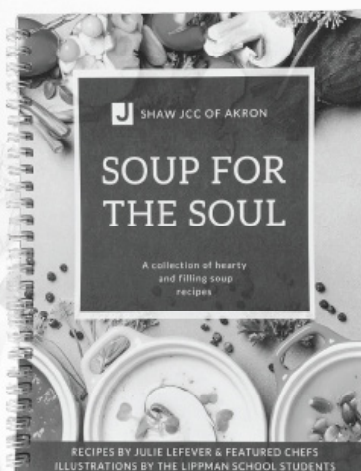

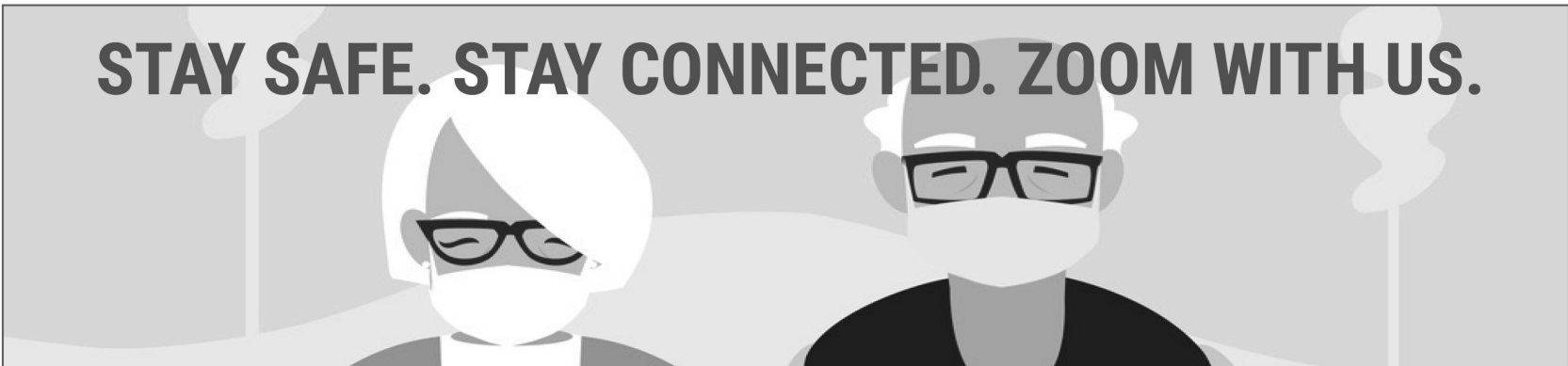

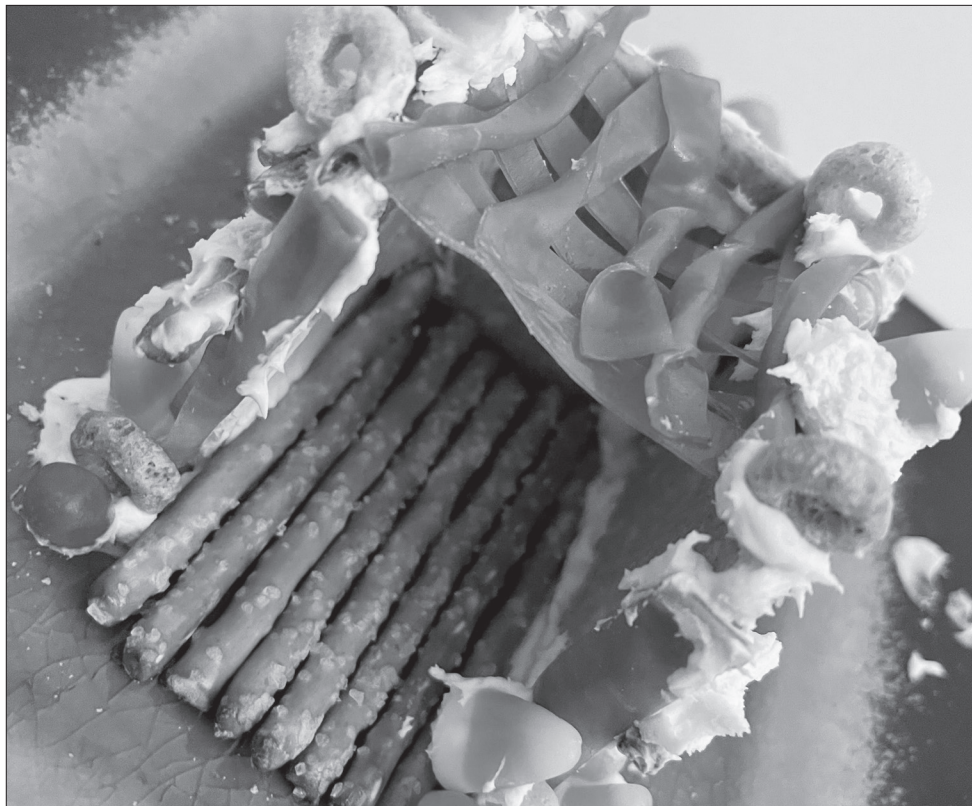

Marianne Kaelter Pressman, 84, a resident of Cedar Village, passed away on September 1, 2021. She was the beloved wife of the late Hal Pressman.
