Two Deserving Couples Earn Gala Honors

Annual Campus Gala on Nov. 10 Will Honor Rob & Andrea Minster and Alan & Janice Woll

This year's Campus Gala honorees are Rob and Andrea Minster, recognized for their longstanding devotion to the Akron Jewish community. Since birth, both have been actively involved in the community. In fact, the couple met as JCC sports camp counselors in 1977.

Rob graduated with a Master's in Taxation from University of Akron where began his career as a CPA. Later, he joined his family as the fourth generation to work at Belenky, Inc. where he still works today. Andrea was granted one of the first athletic scholarships under Title IX to play tennis at Kent State University where she graduated with a B.S. in health and physical education. She and her mother started a window treatment company, Pretty Panes, in 1985 that she still owns and operates. Andrea was also a tennis coach for Copley High School for 18 years.

Rob has served on various boards from JCBA, JCC, JFS and Beth El to West Akron Baseball League and Akron Blind Center. He is a past president of JCBA and JFS and is the current president of Hillel at Kent State, where he has been a board member since 2006 and was one of the campaign chairs to raise funds to build the Cohn Jewish Student Center. Andrea has served as the co-president for Women's American ORT, was a member of the first ORT National Young Leadership

Alan and Janice Woll will receive the Tikkun Olam award at the Campus Gala this year. Committed to giving back, the Wolls are role models in the Jewish community for both philanthropy and personal commitment to making Akron, and the world, a better place to live.

"The community has been good to us," say the Wolls. "We, along with our children and their children, grew up here, and we are still very much a part of the Jewish community that has nurtured us throughout the years. We want to continue ensuring and supporting a strong Jewish future in Akron."

Alan and Janice started dating in tenth grade at Buchtel High School and married in 1968. Their children are Rachel and Scott Arnopolin, Jerrod and Andrea Woll, and Michael Woll and Gregory Orenstein. They have been blessed with four grandchildren – Raleigh and Cori Arnopolin and Jovie and Bodhi Woll.

In high school, Alan earned several letters in football and track and field and broke the Litchfield Middle School record by running the 100-yard dash in 10.3 seconds. He attended the University of Akron where he played football on a full athletic scholarship. In 2017, Alan was inducted into the Akron Jewish Sports Hall of Fame for his achievements.

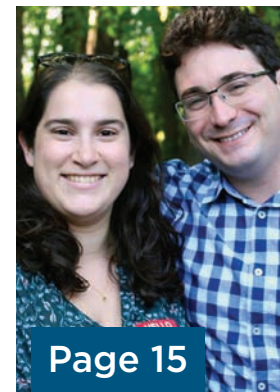

Group, served on the JCC Women's Auxiliary, Na'Amat, Beth El Sisterhood, JCBA Women's Board, JCC Board, and various community committees such as Super Sunday where both she and Rob served as committee chairs.

Rob and Andrea have each received the Young Leadership Award from Federation. Rob was honored by Hillel at Kent State in 2014 and is a frequent blood donor to the American Red Cross, with over 100 donations. Andrea was inducted into the Akron Jewish Sports Hall of Fame as well as the Copley Sports Hall of Fame. With all of their accomplishments, their most meaningful one has been watching their family grow to become successful, happy and equally philanthropic adults.

Both Rob and Andrea have been raised to understand the importance and responsibility of community service from their families. Stan Minster is a past president of the JCC and was the chair of the Lippman Day School expansion. MaryAnn has been involved in Na'Amat and the Center Auxiliary for decades. Their contribution has been, and continues to be, an inspiration to everyone in the Minster family. Rob and Andrea are motivated by their children, Stacey, Kevin and Emily, their spouses Devin, Lori and Mike and their grandson Benjamin to continue to provide a Jewish future full of family, tradition and a sense of community.

"The community has done far more for us and my family than we have done for the community," Rob and Andrea say. Alan began his career as a salesman for Akron plastics maker E. Helman Company. In 1986, he co-founded Network Polymers and later started Diamond Polymers. In 2013, he sold the business to A. Schulman and started the Alan J. Woll Family Fund of the Akron Community Foundation and the Alan and Janice Woll Family Philanthropic Fund of the Jewish Community Board of Akron, so he and his family could give back to the community they love.

Janice is a retired art teacher, having worked for several years in the Akron Public School District and later at St. Hillary's. Before she went back to teaching, she worked several years as an education consultant for Carson-Dellosa Publishing and owned her own giftware company that specialized in personalized gifts. The arts were her passion, so she returned to school to get her art degree so she could teach art.

Over the years, Alan and Janice have been involved in numerous Jewish and community causes.

Both are long-time members of Beth El Congregation. For many years, Janice was an avid Friday minyan-goer. She was a volunteer with the Knitzvah project and a member of the Beth El Sisterhood. Alan served on Beth El's Endowment Committee. For several years, the Wolls funded the luncheon for the Synaplex program. Janice was also active in Daughters of Israel. She worked with Bonnie Cohen, Kathy Salem, Karen Halpern and Esther Hexter to create the mosaic tile project found on the walls of the Shaw JCC lobby. The project raised \$30,000 for arts programming in the community. In 2007, Janice chaired the gala opening event at the Akron Art Museum, where she also served as a docent.

Alan served as president of Rosemont Country Club and chaired its golf tournament in addition to supporting charitable causes such as the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, CJD, the Akron-Canton Regional Food Bank, University Hospital, The University of Akron and the Northeast Ohio Medical University.

The impact of their philanthropy can be seen and felt throughout the Schultz Campus for Jewish Life. In 2015, they helped make the Shaw JCC indoor pool renovation a reality. And in 2017, they helped to transform The Lippman School's library into a new innovation center filled with cutting-edge technologies for students and the community alike. The library was renamed the Woll Family Center for Innovation in their honor. The Tikkun Olam Award honors all the Woll's accomplishments in the community.

New Book Looks at Life of Akron-bred Inventor Ovshinsky

He was considered one of the 20th Century's most brilliant inventors. And his roots are right here in the Akron Jewish community. Stanford R. Ovshinsky was an unconventional genius, who invented, among many things, the rechargeable nickel-metal hydride batteries that have powered everything from portable electronics to hybrid cars.

In the book *The Man Who Saw Tomorrow: The Life and Inventions of Stanford R. Ovshinsky*, authors Lillian Hoddeson and Peter Garrett tell his story. On June 9, at 1 p.m., Hoddeson will be at a book signing at Barnes & Noble in Fairlawn.

This is the first full-length biography of Ovshinsky, who was born in Akron in 1922 to Lithuanian Jewish immigrant parents. With the help of his father Ben, a scrap dealer, Stan Ovshinsky apprenticed in a motor manufacturer while still in high school. Without any formal education past high school, he went on to set up his own machine and lathe manufacturing shop in 1946. His first patent was for a novel lathe design.

That design spurred the New Britain Machine Company in Connecticut to buy Ovshinsky's company in 1950, which he ran until 1952 when he became director of research at Hupp, a motor manufacturer in Detroit.

In 1960, he and his second wife, Iris, founded an invention and development lab, Energy Conversion Devices (ECD).

In a fifty year-span, Ovshinsky was granted well over 400 patents. He holds patents relating to rewritable CD and DVD discs, flat-panel displays and electronic-memory technology. He contributed to the development of thin, flexible solar energy panels, and ECD is credited with developing solar roofing shingles.

Time Magazine called Ovshinsky a "Hero for the Planet." At the end of his life, Ovshinsky kept working to combat global warming by making solar energy "cheaper than coal."

Ovshinsky's contributions to energy management leave an important legacy.

A Leader with a Legacy

The Akron Jewish community recently lost one of its giants. David Lockshin is remembered for being a leader, consummate fundraiser and advocate. He took his duty to the Jewish community extremely seriously, once saying of his obligations, "It is a responsibility I need to pay and do."

Never one to be happy as only a "doer," Lockshin led in more than one role. He served as president of the Akron Jewish Center (now Shaw JCC) and the Jewish Federation of Akron (now JCBA). While president of the JCC, he oversaw the building of Center Towers.



Through the years, Lockshin served a role model to others who became leaders themselves, and he didn't shy away from asking others to do their part. As someone who never said "no" himself, Lockshin was a tireless fundraiser, and in his lifetime, he raised thousands and thousands of dollars for Akron and Israel.

Wanting the Akron Jewish community to thrive beyond his lifetime, Lockshin ensured it was part of his estate plan. He set up a PACE fund with JCBA so that his gift to the Annual Campaign would be maintained in perpetuity. He also remembered the community through planned giving, so the institutions he led during his lifetime would continue to thrive.

The Akron Jewish Community is saddened to have lost one of its most beloved leaders, but David Lockshin left us with a beautiful legacy as well as the memory of a warm, engaging smile and a litany of corny jokes.

Gain Tax Benefits When You Donate Real Estate

Selling a home can be one of the most stressful events in your life. Having to make your home look perfect, negotiating a sale price, arranging inspections— these can all create incredible stress and all while you are moving to a new home. If your home is free of mortgage or lien obligations, you could alleviate those stresses, receive a large tax deduction, and help the Jewish community by donating your house or condo to the Jewish Community Board of Akron.

You do not need to wait until you move to donate your home. You can donate it while you are still living in the home. You will just pay taxes and fees and may be able to take a tax deduction for the full fair market value the home. Then, when you decide to move, or you pass away, the home will be donated to JCBA. You (or your heirs) will not be responsible for selling your house.

Donating real estate is much more complicated than donating stock or other assets because legal documents need to be drawn up. However, the tax benefits for you and the positive impact on the community can be worth the extra work. For people whose homes have greatly appreciated, the tax advantages can make donating real estate an attractive option.

Educators, students, and parents from The Lippman School recently enjoyed a two-week adventure in China.

The group of sixteen journeyed to Dali Town (Foshan) in mainland China, where they spent three days at Lippman's Chinese partner school, The Dali Experimental Elementary School. Students engaged in classes alongside their Chinese buddies while teachers and parents visited classrooms to discuss American life and interact with students. The group learned how to make and host a formal tea, spent an evening with their buddies' families from the Dali School, and participated in a school-wide Education and Culture Day. The entire group contributed to a service project where they made and delivered dumplings to elderly in the surrounding community.

"We have much to learn from one another, and both our communities benefit when we can share our cultures and spend time in one another's communities," says Matt Russ, teacher and curriculum coordinator at Lippman. "What we bring home in the way of knowledge and deeper understanding is invaluable."

Two educators continued in residence at The Dali School for ten days: Technology Specialist John Bennett and Lyndsey Kirk, a reading, math and social studies teacher. Meanwhile, the rest of the group traveled to Yangshuo, visiting a centuries-old Confucius Temple and Yulong River Ecological Park. They also spent time in the Yan Mountains, accessing a remote, original portion of The Great Wall. In Beijing they visited The Temple of Heaven (Tian Tan), attended a performance of the Beijing Opera, and more.

Thank You for a Year of Learning Together

Hello, everyone!

As you all probably know by now, we are returning to Israel at the end of August, and this will be our final article for the newspaper. It's been an amazing year for us, and we wanted to take the opportunity to thank you all for being an amazing community that really made our stay here incredible, fulfilling and rewarding. Thank you for opening your hearts and homes to us, for being a family for us far away from our own, and for teaching us so much. Though we are sad to be leaving, we are excited to bring back and share with everyone back home all that we've learned here and to help shape Israel as a home to Jews all over the world.

So Much to Bring Back to Israel

We want to share with you all that we've learned over the past year. In the past few years, the Jewish Agency's goal has changed significantly and there's a stronger emphasis on not only on what we bring with us to the community in which we serve but what we can bring from the community to Israel. This year has filled us with memories and experiences but also with thoughts, questions and information that we think are important to bring to light in Israeli society.

We hope that you believe that change and progress is gradually occurring in Israel, and we can act as your mouthpiece. This is the first time we've been in a position where we feel like we have a lot of influence, and we tried to make it meaningful. Returning to Israel, we hope to continue speaking out and acting toward change. It'll be hard for us to go back to Israel and suddenly not be "interesting" anymore (or have to pay for our own food!) but that will not stop us from moving forward.

One of the first things we realized when we came here was that the U.S. is not all New York City, Florida and Texas. Sometimes it can seem that way when all you know of the country is from TV and movies. Coming to Akron and Canton, two communities that feel so much like home, gave us a new perspective on what America is truly about. We met all you amazing people here and found a new family for ourselves—you didn't let us have even a single night alone at first. You made

sure that we were happy and doing well here, and we have never stopped appreciating it. We want to let you all know that if you ever are looking for a home in Israel, our door will always be open for you. And, if you're planning on visiting, let us know! We'd love to take you around.

Embracing Diversity

Another very important thing that we quickly realized was just how diverse and amazing Judaism is. Growing up in Israel, most of our friends had a passing, if any, connection to our people's religion, and we mostly took it for granted. Even celebrating the holidays and living in a Jewish country, we mostly knew of one kind of Judaism, even though we learned of different streams in other major religions. Coming here, we were lucky to be part of a diverse community, with many interpretations and practices of our roots and faith. It is amazing to us to see the different synagogues cooperating and celebrating their Jewish identity together and the community coming together without being tied to any one building.

The story of our marriage (if you haven't heard it yet, come speak with us!), just like the community here, is for a symbol of what Israel can be like one day. Though we are still far from a reality that acknowledges and celebrates the many beautiful streams of Judaism in Israel, we are slowly getting on the right track, and many small changes are happening at the grassroots level. We are proud to be part of this forward momentum and to keep the connection between Israel and the Jewish communities abroad evolving and strong. We better understand today how Israel looks from here, through both Jewish and non-Jewish eyes, and how things may be done better.

Exchanging Insights

Many things that we thought were obvious appeared to need further discussion, and some things that were shrouded in mystery slowly became clearer to us.



We hope that the programs we did this year helped better showcase the Israel that we know and love, and the complexity (and fun!) of it. It was a great opportunity for us to sit down and think hard about what is important for us to talk about and what we want to bring with us. Being so flexible also gave us the opportunity to interact with the non-Jewish community in a meaningful way unlike we've done back home, and we think we better understand what it is like to work for your religion and culture and what being a minority in such a large place is like.

We've also had a lot of small funny realizations and moments of insight. For example, we've learned that Chag Sheni – the second meal or gathering of the holiday—is the day after the holiday itself and not the day of (like it is in Israel). We learned how to work a calendar, flit between two communities with different needs, and how to leave voice messages!




