INTRODUCTORY STATEMENT

1. This is an action in which plaintiff, Davien Wilson, seeks compensation for personal injuries and damages suffered by him when he was 16-17 years old, and he was sexually assaulted by an employee or employees of Eagleton School, Inc., who were negligently hired, trained, and supervised by the defendant Eagleton School, Inc.

JURISDICTION AND VENUE

2. The jurisdiction of this Court is based upon a matter in controversy exceeding the sum of \$75,000.00 exclusive of interest and costs and is between citizens of different states.

PARTIES

- 3. The plaintiff, Davien Wilson, resides in Lincoln, Nebraska, County of Lancaster.
- 4. The defendant, Eagleton School, Inc., is a for profit business corporation. Its registered agent and president both reside at 592 Rhodes & Bailey Road, New Marlborough, Massachusetts, County of Berkshire.

BRIEF STATEMENT OF FACTS

The plaintiff provides this brief statement of facts in summary form which is not intended to be all inclusive. The plaintiff reserves the right to provide additional information through usual discovery means applicable to this action.

- 5. The defendant, Eagleton School, Inc., operated a school at 446 Monterey Road, Great Barrington, Massachusetts, from 1977 until April of 2016.
- 6. The defendant, Eagleton School, Inc., represented that "Eagleton School students are surrounded by trained professionals who have created a nurturing family-like atmosphere over the past 30 years with a low staff to student ration. We share a commitment to helping each student realize his self-worth and self-discovery through trust and acceptance of himself and his peers while taking advantage of all the opportunities that surround him."
- 7. The defendant Eagleton School, Inc. represented that "Eagleton School is located on a 40-acre campus in one of the most invigorating and scenic parts of Western Massachusetts. The beautiful mountains serve as a backdrop to a peaceful New England landscape that promotes adventure, serenity, and self-reflection."
- 8. The defendant Eagleton School, Inc. published its mission statement which reads "Eagleton School has continually evolved its philosophy and services to meet the needs of our students and we believe that every boy entrusted to our care deserves a quality education and a safe environment in which to flourish. Our mission is to enhance the self-worth and sense of hope of our students and their families by focusing on their strengths and uniqueness."
- 9. The defendant Eagleton School, Inc. represented that its groups "provide a time and place for students to deal appropriately with their issues within a safe, structured environment."
- 10. The defendant Eagleton School, Inc. represented that "The safety and security of our residents is important to us. We know that the boys and young men in our care have had past difficulties with making healthy decisions, and that we must assure solid supervision as a prerequisite for treatment programming. Digital cameras provide constant observation of community living areas in the homes and educational facilities on a 24-hour basis. Motion detectors cover all public areas of the homes and all windows and doors are equipped with security alarms. Every staff member is issued a two-way radio for constant communication and an Administrator on Duty monitors all resident transitions on the campus. All Eagleton employees are required to complete CPR and First Aid training and are NAPPI (Non Abusive Psychological and Physical Intervention) trained and certified."
- 11. Based upon these and other representations as to the quality, safety, and benefits of its school, a decision was made through which plaintiff, Davien Wilson, then a minor, became a resident there in 2005.

- 12. Shortly after his enrollment in Eagleton School, plaintiff was sexually assaulted multiple times by an employee or employees of Eagleton School, Inc., which he reported to Eagleton School, Inc. and to which he was told to "keep his mouth shut" because "nobody would believe him."
- 13. At all times relevant to this action, defendant Eagleton School, Inc. was the employer and supervisor of the employee or employees who sexually assaulted plaintiff.
- 14. At all times relevant to this action, defendant Eagleton School, Inc. controlled and directed the hiring, training, supervision, and retention of the employee or employees who sexually assaulted the plaintiff.
- 15. At all times relevant to this action, plaintiff was a child who was enrolled at Eagleton School, Inc.
- 16. During his enrollment in Eagleton School, Inc., plaintiff was sexually assaulted, battered, and raped in different locations at Eagleton School, Inc.
- 17. Plaintiff brings this cause of action pursuant to Clause (i) of M.G.L. c. 260, §4C½.
- 18. Defendant knew, or in the exercise of reasonable care should have known, Eagleton School, Inc.'s system of supervising its employees was not in accordance with good employment practices and was likely to provide potential sexual perpetrators with opportunities to abuse children in its care.
- 19. Defendant knew, or in the exercise of reasonable care should have discovered, that its employee or employees were engaged in illegal and inappropriate sexual conduct with plaintiff.
- 20. Defendant failed to train its employees properly, which had access to young boys such as plaintiff.
- 21. Defendant failed to supervise its employees properly, which had access to young boys such as plaintiff.

COUNT ONE

- 22. Plaintiff realleges and incorporates by reference the allegations contained in each and every other paragraph of this Complaint.
- As a direct and proximate result of the defendant's breach of its duties, the plaintiff was sexually assaulted and raped. He suffered bodily harm, humiliation, severe emotional distress, and permanent psychological damage. He has incurred expenses, and will incur future expenses, for medical and psychological treatment, and has suffered a diminishment in earning capacity.

WHEREFORE, the plaintiff herein demands a trial by jury and judgment and compensatory damages of the defendant herein, plus interest and costs.
