creating jobs and growing a Wyoming-made brand. Professionally, I have worked in aerospace and technology. Whether on the ranch, in business, or in public service, I have always been focused on building things, solving problems, and creating opportunities for others.

I am running for office because I believe Wyoming’s best days are ahead of us. Too much of our politics today is driven by division and outrage. The truth is that Wyoming people have far more in common than social media and cable news would have us believe.

I want to help build a Wyoming where our children can afford to stay, raise families, start businesses, and build meaningful lives. We have the resources, the people, and the values to make Wyoming all it can be. What we need is leadership focused on the future, not the next news cycle.

**What is the most pressing issue facing Wyoming, and if elected, what work will you do on the federal level to address that issue?**

One of the biggest challenges facing Wyoming is that we often lack the flexibility to solve our own problems. Too many federal policies are designed for large urban areas and then applied to rural and frontier states.

Healthcare is a perfect example. Rural hospitals and EMS providers are buried under federal regulations, reporting requirements, and mandates that make it harder to deliver care in communities

that are already struggling with workforce shortages and long distances between services.

If elected, I will work to reduce unnecessary federal barriers and advocate for policies that recognize Wyoming’s unique circumstances. Just as importantly, I will build coalitions with other rural states facing similar challenges so that Congress is constantly reminded that solutions designed for New York and Los Angeles are not always the right solutions for Wyoming. Our communities deserve a voice in Washington that understands rural life and fights for practical solutions.

**Public lands are an important part of Wyoming’s economy, culture and recreation opportunities. What is your position on proposals to transfer federal public lands to state ownership or private control?**

Unlike my opponent Congresswoman Harriet Hageman, I do not support - nor will I vote for - the wholesale transfer or sale of federal public lands to private interests. Public lands are central to Wyoming’s economy, culture, outdoor heritage, and way of life. Once those lands are sold, we are unlikely to ever get them back.

That does not mean every acre must remain exactly as it is today. There are circumstances where targeted land exchanges between state and federal entities make sense, particularly when they improve management, access, or economic opportunity. Those decisions should be driven from the bottom up by local communities, not imposed by Washington.

In areas where federal ownership creates challenges

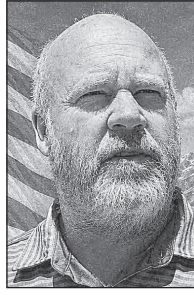
for community growth or infrastructure needs, we should create a process that allows local stakeholders to build consensus and identify solutions. The guiding principle should be simple: keep public lands public and protect local access.

our legacy and empowering our future.

*What is the most pressing issue facing Wyoming, and if elected, what work will you do on the federal level to address that issue?*

The most pressing issue facing Wyoming is the loss of accountability in Washington. The federal government spends money it does not have, piles debt onto our children, regulates rural communities from a distance, and distracts us with political theater.

That debt shows up in fuel, groceries, housing, equipment, interest, and doing business. It also makes Washington more desperate to control land, energy, water, and local decisions.

If elected, I will work to cut wasteful spending, require honest budgeting, oppose unfunded mandates, support Wyoming energy, protect public lands, defend local decision-making, and require plain-language explanations for major votes.

I am also building a working proof of concept at GrassrootsMVT.org so registered Wyoming voters can aggregate their voices on issues like land sales, debt, Social Security, energy, water, and health care.

We need honest books, constitutional limits, and a government that remembers it works for us.

**Public lands are an important part of Wyoming’s economy, culture and recreation opportunities. What is your position on proposals to transfer federal public lands to state ownership or private control?**

I oppose broad transfers of federal public lands to state ownership or private control.

Wyoming’s public lands are not just lines on a map. They are grazing, hunting, fishing, energy, minerals, trails, watersheds, history, and room for our children to know what open country means.

Public lands should stay public, with strong local input and responsible multiple use. That means access for hunting, fishing, camping, grazing, outfitting, energy development, timber, conservation, and recreation where those uses can be managed honestly and sustainably.

I do support practical, transparent solutions: better local consultation, improved access, targeted land exchanges when they clearly benefit the public, and stronger accountability from federal agencies. But selling off or transferring large blocks of land creates a real risk that future budget pressure turns shared land into private inventory.

Public land belongs to the people and to posterity. Once it is sold, we do not get it back.

*Biography and statement of why you are running for office*

**Public lands are an important part of Wyoming's economy, culture and recreation opportunities. What is your position on proposals to transfer federal public lands to state ownership or private control?**

I oppose the outright selling of federal public lands and support a balanced reform of the Roadless Rule. Public lands should remain public, accessible, and actively managed for grazing, recreation, wildlife, timber, and responsible energy development. **Kevin Christensen**  
**Biography and statement of why you are running for office**

I was raised in Wyoming and graduated from the University of Wyoming. I served 27 years in the Army as an officer, AH-64 Apache Attack Helicopter Pilot, and a combat veteran with two combat tours in Iraq. I culminated my career at the rank of Colonel at the Pentagon serving as an advisor to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. My military awards include the Legion of Merit, Defense Superior Service Medal, 2 Bronze Star, and 4 Air Medals. I served in Lockheed Martin Corporation as a senior manager for Army Aviation and missile systems. I served six years as the District Manager the BLM where I managed 8 million acres of public land and 13 million acres of mineral estate across 10 Wyoming counties. In my BLM tenure I permitted over 5,000 new oil and gas wells, mined 1.7 billion tons of coal, and expanded public lands access by 80,000 acres. I am running for Congress because strong, proven leadership is needed. I will represent Wyoming, not a national political agenda.

**What is the most pressing issue facing Wyoming, and if elected, what work will you do on the federal level to address that issue?**

Across Wyoming, families are feeling the impact of inflation. The cost of groceries, fuel, housing, and health care have risen faster than paychecks, and too many hardworking people are struggling. I am passionate about public lands and will not support the sale of public lands. Public lands stay public and private lands state private. I support amending federal laws to provide more authority for the Wyoming Governor over major federal actions. I support the strategic use of land exchanges to improve public access for areas where public access is limited. I support the use of the Land and Water Conservation Fund to purchase easements to enable access to public land that is inaccessible. I managed

public lands in Wyoming with multiple-use and am proud of the reclamation work that ensures the land will be both beautiful and productive for future generations. Public lands are an important part of what makes Wyoming special place to live.

**Richard Dodson**  
**Biography and statement of why you are running for office**

I'm a 4th Generation Wyomingite, an actor and singer with a degree in Spanish and History that I turned into an IT career, a veteran of the Army National Guard as an enlisted man, and an entrepreneur and advocate in homeless services. **What is the most pressing issue facing Wyoming, and if elected, what work will you do on the federal level to address that issue?**

**Biography and statement of why you are running for office**

**What is the most pressing issue facing Wyoming, and if elected, what work will you do on the federal level to address that issue?**

The biggest challenge that Wyoming faces today are the constant attacks on our core industries like ranching and farming, coal, oil and gas, and soda ash. For our producers, I will work to bring back country of origin labeling, address the screwworm outbreak, and go after the meat packing monopoly. These attacks have been going on for decades from the Left. I will work to ensure that west coast states open their ports to our coal. I will roll back regulations to make sure our industries prosper. By fighting for and expanding our core industries, Wyoming will grow our economy. We must also address affordability by reducing inflation through reductions in the debt and deficit. In addition, we must reverse out of control federal regulations.

Not selling public lands is my number one concern, but I will answer that in your next question. My next two issues are health care and affordability. Health care should give families security, not financial anxiety. The cost of insurance makes people drop it or it has doubled their previous premium. Too many Wyoming families, seniors, and small businesses are hurt by rising premiums and limited access to care. We need to increase our insurance pool by working together with other states to combine our pools and lower premiums. We must cut prescription drug costs, expand rural healthcare by protecting Wyoming rural hospitals and clinics, and support small businesses with affordable tax-deductible employee coverage options. In regard to affordability, gas, housing, groceries, healthcare, and everyday costs keep getting harder to afford. I would sponsor bills to reduce income tax for people earning under \$100,000 and reduce FICA for low income people, and continue FICA for the wealthy.

***Public lands are an important part of Wyoming's economy, culture and recreation opportunities. What is your position on proposals to transfer federal public lands to state ownership or private control?***

Wyoming's public lands are part of who we are. I oppose transferring federal lands to state ownership or private control if it risks selling off access for hunters, campers, anglers, hikers, ranchers, recreation, and future generations. These lands belong to the American people, and Wyoming people should always have a voice in

For communities where data centers are the right fit, we should work to get to yes. Only saying no doesn't make sense. Think where Wyoming would be today if we had put a moratorium on coal.

That doesn't mean every project should move forward. It means we do the work, ask questions, protect resources and ratepayers, and use our abundant energy resources.

As governor, I will bring the right people to the table and will take action to make sure we are prepared for these opportunities.

The Governor's first responsibility is to protect our lands, water, ratepayers, personal property rights, and communities. People want to invest in Wyoming because they see our potential. We should leverage the work for us, Wyoming first. If you want to open a data center in Wyoming, there should be some simple rules. 1) You supply in or pay in – you cannot build here if you will increase rates for residents. 2) You must operate a closed-loop cooling system and may not draw from our water supply. 3) You prioritize Wyoming workers in the

construction and operation and assist in the workforce pipeline. 4) You operate openly with the community, not behind closed doors, and are welcomed by your host community. Data centers boost the energy economy and help to win the AI arms race against China, but if a data center wants to locate in Wyoming, then they must do it our way.

***Public lands are an important part of Wyoming's economy, culture and recreation opportunities. What is your position on proposals to transfer federal public lands to state ownership or private control?***  
Public lands are central to Wyoming's way of life. I am a lifelong hunter and outdoorswoman and have benefited greatly from them. They support our ranchers, energy and mineral industries, outfitters, hunters, and tourism economy that make our state special. I do not support broad proposals to sell off public lands or transfer them into private control. On the State Land Board, I have brought proposals to swap federal to state ownership rather than selling to the highest private bidder. Washington, DC too often mismanages these lands through red tape, one-size-fits-all rules, and radical environmental policies that hurt Wyoming. As Governor, I will fight for stronger state and local decision making, multiple-use management, energy and mineral development, grazing rights, conservation, and continued public access. The answer is not to lock up the land or sell it off. The answer is to make sure Wyoming people, not D.C. bureaucrats, have a stronger voice in how Wyoming lands are managed.

***Workforce and attainable housing remains a critical need in many Wyoming communities. What role do you believe the state can play in addressing issues of housing affordability and access.***  
Workforce and attainable housing are critical to keeping Wyoming families in our communities. The state should not become a landlord or force one-size-fits-all mandates on local communities, but it can play an important role in creating an environment that removes barriers and reduces cost for development. As Governor, I would create a statewide initiative on housing, bringing together all of the players involved. Step one is to complete a landscape analysis of deregulation efforts across the state. Step two is prioritizing baseline infrastructure investments, including water and sewer, curb and gutter, and roads. Wyoming should use limited, accountable tools to leverage private investment, not replace it. The goal should be simple: make it easier for families to live in the communities they work in, while respecting local control and keeping the government from distorting the market.

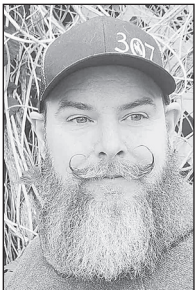

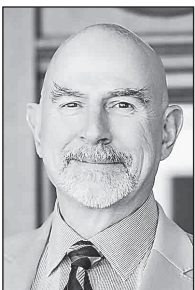

While I understand that some parents and caregivers might want to educate their children outside of public schools, I hope to elevate Wyoming’s public schools - all of them - to a place where parents no longer need to consider alternatives because their local public school is the best choice, not the only choice.

**Do you think Wyoming public schools are adequately funded? Why or why not?**  
While I am pleased that the Legislature acted to remedy the recent underfunding of schools in Wyoming, I agree with Governor Gordon’s action to allow the bill to become law without Executive signature. Similarly, while I agree with the concept of “progress over perfection” I was disappointed that the educational funding recalibration bill, while moving in the right direction, was not moving Wyoming forward as far as I would have liked to see. However, I trust in the 2-year adjustment and 5-year recalibration process that we have mandating that public school funding is reassessed regularly, and that changes are made in an evidence-based and data-driven manner.

**Why are you the best candidate for the job?**  
I am the best candidate for the job because I champion Wyoming, our communities, and the positive outcomes that are possible for our children due to excellent public education. I have always been proud of my Western roots, and consistently came back to Wyoming throughout adulthood, and fostered continued relationships with local leaders doing important and impactful work. I intend to continue reaching out to local communities, asking the right questions, listening to diverse constituents, and addressing the actual problems they face. Too often, solutions are implemented to address presumed problems - at taxpayer and our families’ expense. I am ready to focus on uplifting educators, students, and our communities in ways that enhance and celebrate public schools and the Wyoming way of life.

**How do you balance property tax relief with maintaining funding for local governments, schools, and special districts?**  
Wyoming taxpayers deserve meaningful property tax relief, but we must also ensure that cities, towns, counties, schools, fire districts, hospitals, and other local services remain financially stable. The Legislature has provided several property tax relief programs and exemptions to the taxpayers in recent years. The goal is to provide relief without shifting the burden onto essential community services or creating long-term funding shortfalls. We could codify the Constitutional Amendment residential rate from 9.5% to 8.3% across the board. There is some potential for the state to backfill shortfalls.

**Do you believe Wyoming public schools are adequately funded? Why or why not?**  
Wyoming has invested heavily in public schools, but I believe adequacy is about more than the dollar amount per student. The recent Recalibration Bill still leaves gaps in the funding model such as staffing, facilities, and inflation adjustments, and operational costs so the work is not finished.

**Public lands are an important part of Wyoming’s economy, culture and recreation opportunities. What is your position on proposals to transfer federal public lands to state ownership or private control?**

I oppose the sale or transfer of federal public lands to the state of Wyoming. Public access is not just a political issue — it is part of Wyoming’s way of life. Hunting, fishing, grazing, hiking, camping, outfitting and responsible energy development all depend on access to the land. Any proposal that puts that access at risk must be treated with great caution. Private property rights and public access must be considered together. I oppose land-transfer schemes that could lead to public lands being sold off, locked up or managed in a way that limits access for Wyoming families. At the same time, I believe private land owners deserve respect and protection from government overreach. The people who own, work and care for private lands are essential to Wyoming’s economy, wildlife habitat and rural communities.

**What is the most important issue facing House District 40 specifically?**  
The most important issues facing House District 40 are the issues that affect daily life in Johnson County: recovering from wildfire damage, protecting our agricultural economy, keeping property taxes manageable, and making sure local services stay strong. We also need to support families, small businesses, and the next generation so people can afford to live and work here.”

**July 21 – August 17: Absentee ballots will be accepted during this period.**  
Absentee ballots may be requested at any time in 2026 prior to the day of an election. They must be returned by the time the polls close on election day.

**August 3: Voter registration closes.**  
Prior to this date, new voters can register by mail by filling out this form and having it notarized. After this date, you can register to vote in-person at your county clerk’s office. You will need proof that you’ve been a resident of Wyoming for at least 30 days and that you are a U.S. citizen. Acceptable forms of identification are listed on the secretary of state’s website.

**August 18: Primary election.**  
New voters can register at a vote center on election day. All ballots must be received by the time the polls close on election day.

from the Wyoming Department of Revenue and the Wyoming Department of Audit. See: (https://revenue.wyo.gov/annual-reports). Johnson County only receives 8% of its annual revenue from Residential Property Taxes, with the remaining 92% coming from other sources. Therefore, if all residents in Johnson County were given a 25% property tax cut, the impact on the County’s budget would only be 2%. I will work to give everyone a 50% property tax cut, which can be easily made up by eliminating waste, fraud, and abuse of taxpayer dollars. Surely, our County government, which has seen huge increases in its budget since COVID, can find 2-4% to cut from the existing budget, therefore allowing our hard-working families and residents to receive the tax relief they need and deserve.

***Do you believe Wyoming public schools are adequately funded? Why or why not?***

Wyoming spends between two and three times per child what is spent in most other states. Much of that money is wasted on excessive administrative costs and liberal “Pet Projects,” and this money should be used to fund hard-working teachers and school staff and the tools needed to educate children. I believe the money being spent in our schools should go to teachers and school staff, and more control should be given back to parents and taxpayers.

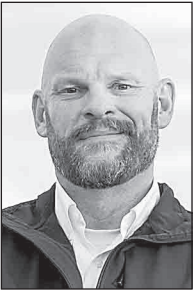

***Why are you running for election?***

We have seen increases in financial exploitation of vulnerable adults, felony thefts, and crimes against children, along with ongoing narcotics-related cases. These reports are taken seriously, and investigations have resulted in multiple arrests.

While no department is perfect, these outcomes show that improvements should come through targeted adjustments rather than sweeping change. Building on current success will allow me to further enhance the sheriff’s office.

***What is the biggest need of the Sheriff’s Department now and what would you do to address that need?***

If elected, the Johnson County Sheriff’s Department is going to need to hire a new Lead Investigator. This is a keystone position within our department staff, and it will be among my highest priorities to fill that position with a personality that aligns with our community and departmental values and culture. As stated previously, I intend to be a working sheriff and will continue to work alongside our Deputies.
