Thayers Welcomes Guests For 175 Years

Thayers Inn has been under new management for the past year and it's been a time of big changes.

"We made a lot of improvements to the hotel and inn and restaurant," said general manager Gary Plourde. "The biggest thing for us is to increase the business, and we've had very good growth in the last year."

Upgrades have included a new wi-fi system, new reservations system, new website, a new boiler, new beds and bedding, a multitude of room improvements, and refreshing the outside of the

"They're all big-ticket items, but that's the infrastructure you need to keep people warm and happy," Plourde said.

He and his wife Sandra both have backgrounds in hotel management, and more recently have begun taking over management of struggling hotels and turning them around. Their first project was Christmas Farm Inn in Jackson, New Hampshire. Now they're working hard at Thayers and hoping to make a mark on Littleton's Main Street.

"Before we took it over, it didn't have a buzz. It was this dark

hole. You walked by and nobody took notice because nothing was happening," Plourde said. "Our ambition is to make it a thriving focal point for Main Street. I think Main Street in Littleton is a really cool place. I like the shops and restaurants and places like Schillings. To be part of that, and a hub where people can stay and congregate and be part of the town, that's what our goal is."

The five-story hotel has a storied history, having played host to presidents and movie stars. At 175 years old, Plourde said it is the oldest hotel in the White Moun-

That is a big draw for people from Europe, where the Plourdes have set up contracts to open new avenues for tourism.

"We brought a whole bunch of international to Littleton and the hotel ... We'll be seeing a lot of Europeans in town now," Plourde said. "They don't want to stay at the Holiday Inn or the Hampton Inn, which is just another hotel. They want to stay in something that's uniquely New England. And Thayers is definitely that."

The Plourdes took over management of the hotel in a joint venture agreement with the current owner, Thomas Carpi, who currently acts as a "silent owner."

"We have four years to take ownership," Plourde explained. "Everything is going in the right direction. We have some benchmarks that we want to achieve to make sure we have cash in the bank to do what we want to do."

While the timeline for purchase is not yet set, Plourde is optimistic. The goal is to show a significant uptick in business and strong financials so that a bank will offer attractive financing for the pur-

The Plourdes are grateful for the support they receive from locals. People travel from all over the area to dine at Grille One Eleven, the restaurant on the lower level of the hotel. They have also recently created a new event facility for meetings and functions.

"There's really not much meeting space in Littleton, so we're hopeful that will grow for us,"

Having spent much of his career working in Europe, where "old" is measured on a different scale than in the United States, Plourde said that they are thrilled to be part of a venture with such a long and rich history as Thayers.

"175 years - we even have Europeans who say, 'That's old!'" Plourde said. "To be part of that history is cool."

F. W. BAPTIST CHURCH, MASONIC HALL, SAVINGS BANK, MAIN STREET, &C.

This year marks the 165th anniversary of a local landmark and major institution in the region: Passumpsic Savings Bank.

Passumpsic Savings Bank was officially chartered when Gov. Erastus Fairbanks, of St. Johnsbury, signed the act creating the bank on Nov. 23, 1852. This marked the formation of the first savings institution in St. Johnsbury and the new bank started business soon after that, opening its doors for the first time on Feb. 24, 1853. It was founded by prominent members of the community as a mutual saving bank, which had no stockholders. At that time, the fledgling bank

shared office space with the old Passumpsic Bank, a commercial bank, in a building on Main Street near where the fire station is now. On its first day of operation, 17 people deposited a total of \$863 in the bank. The first depositor on the books was Samuel W. Slade, a St. Johnsbury attorney and one of the bank's original corporators.

The creation of the bank filled a void for residents of the growing town, who before that had to travel to Danville to save their money. Danville was the county seat then and housed the only other repository for savings accounts in the immediate area.

While the bank catered to a community need, for the first few years it was only open one day a week, Thursdays – and even then its operating hours were from 2-5 p.m. Despite these constraints the bank grew and finished its first year with \$32,208.99 in assets and paid its treasurer \$100 for his year of work.

Town and Bank Grow Together

The birth of Passumpsic Savings Bank coincided with an era of notable growth in St. Johnsbury. On Nov. 28, 1850, the first train arrived from Boston on the newly completed railroad. In 1851 St. Johnsbury was further connected with the world by the stringing of the first telegraph line to town and in 1855 St. Johnsbury became the county seat and construction of the Caledonia County Courthouse was completed.

Population was also on the rise during this time as St. Johnsbury had a population of 2,760 people in 1850 and by 1860 the population had grown to 3,470.

In the early years the bank moved back and forth across Main Street several times, bouncing from room to room and house to house, depending on who the current treasurer was and where there was space.

During this time accounts were opened with as little as a single dollar. Depositors were encouraged, though, to notify the bank in advance if they wanted to withdraw funds from their account as the bank's first rule book explained.

In 1884, the bank obtained the deed to a piece of Street and began construction of the three-story brick structure that was some of the bank's investment operations today.

The building was constructed by local artisans using locally produced bricks that cost one cent apiece and the total price tag of the building, including the land, was \$15,000. That same year the bank treasurer was receiving \$1,650 a year, which included money for a clerk and \$500 for a bookkeeper.

The bank, then situated in a permanent home, continued to grow in customers and business through its centennial celebration weathering world wars, recessions and even the Depression. In 1953 the bank boasted assets of over \$6.2 million.

Geographic Expansion

Since then, Passumpsic Savings Bank has had significant growth both geographically and financially.

The bank expanded to Newport when it opened it first branch in 1964 and then into Lyndonville with another branch in 1974. Additional branches followed in Newport, St. Johnsbury, Lyndonville, St. Johnsbury Center, Danville and Island Pond in 2002.

In 1995 the bank also opened a loan center in Littleton, marking its first expansion out of state. A

Fourth-Generation Siblings Setting **Up Business** For The Fifth Generation

LANCASTER — They say the older you get, the more you slow down.

Not Fitch Fuel Co., run by four generations of the Fitch family, which this year celebrates a young 95 years in Lancaster and offers a range of services that have expanded through the decades.

"It's been really busy," said company secretary and treasurer Marilyn Fitch Foss, a fourth-generation Fitch who owns the business with her brothers, Charles Fitch III, company president, John Fitch, vice-president, and Patti Fitch Rexford, office manager.

"We picked up 85 new customers since the cold snap," she said.

But what began as a business that saw its busiest season during winters, has turned into an enterprise that sees much activity year-

Today, the company has more than 2,000 customers as far north as North Stratford and Columbia, as far south as Littleton, and as far west as Maidstone, Lunenburg, and Gilman in Vermont.

"We go quite a ways," said Fitch Foss. "Our guys are busy."

Fitch Fuel distributes home heating oil and propane, sells diesel fuel and kerosene, has a propane filling station on site at its 178 Summer St. location, and offers 24-hour plumbing and heating services through fully licensed plumbers and servicemen

It also offers 24-hour emergency service when customers, experiencing plumbing, heating or other emergencies, need it, even on weekends and holidays.

Fitch Fuel had humble beginnings and was founded in 1923 by Foss Fitch's great-grandfather, Charles Fitch, in the Fitch family home on Winter Street.

He started out distributing coal, range fuel, and ice for ice boxes that area residents had before refrigerators became available.

In the 1940s, the business was changing to fuel oil, though Fitch Fuel continued delivering coal un-





"It was founded in 1928 by Chester Marshall in an effort to offer competition," said Gregory Westcott, who currently owns Marshall Insurance with his wife, Lynette Westcott, making for four generations of owners. "Back then, there wasn't much. He literally started out selling farm insurance."

He started out called the Farm Bureau and then changed the name to the Marshall Agency.

Chester Marshall's son, Rodney Marshall, entered the business as it grew.

In the early 1970s, John Brooks, Lynette's father, bought into the agency as a partner with Rodney Marshall.

Greg and Lynette, who met while they were serving in the Navy, joined the business in the latter half of the 1980s.

They did, and bought Marshall Insurance from John Brooks in the late 1990s.

ness: GSCS began because of a deep desire in the community for a Catholic School after Catholic Central closed in 1971. In 1996 a group of St. John the Evangelist parishioners and clergy met to discuss the possibility of re-opening the former Catholic Central School, closed in 1970, or establishing an entirely new Catholic School. With the blessing of Father Joseph Lively, the pastor of St. John's, a steering committee of 15 parishioners formally began plans to start a new Catholic school. 

Lyndonville Auctioneer Reg Lussier **Keeps Making Local Crowds Smile**

For decades Lussier Auction has been in the business of selling off pretty much anything that needed to go for the best possible

The Lyndonville company is in its third generation with the children and grandchildren of founder Roger Lussier now involved in the

Roger Lussier started Lussier Auction in 1952 and his son Reginald P. "Reg" Lussier joined him in 1973 and is now marking his 45th year in the business.

"There's not may people that want one," said Lussier.

Today he works with his son Toby Lussier and son-in-law Matt Young to run the company which is licensed, bonded, and insured in Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts and Connecticut. They have all equipment needed for a successful auction including tents, chairs, public address system and cattle ring.

Each year Lussier Auction kicks off the Caledonia County Fair with a benefit auction just before the fair officially opens for its annual late summer run.

The auction began the year after the original fairgrounds grandstand burned to the ground on Aug. 18, 1993 - just a few days after the fair had closed. In 1995, the all-metal grand stand was built. But it was expensive. Proceeds from the annual Lussier auction go to help pay off the bank note.

Lussier says the golden era of auctioneering was in the late 1970s and early 1980s and that the world of digital devices and the Internet has had a big impact on the auction business. But those purchasing antiques through a smart phone are missing out on the fun of attending a live auction, said Lussier.

He says the entertainment aspect of live auctions remains alive and well and it's that connection with audiences he embraces as he continues the family tradition on behalf of his clients. He says it also helps business.

"If you can make your crowd smile and laugh a bit you can do better," said Lussier.







Jackson Mitchell Logging Turns 50

Mitchell said. "I worked for \$3 a

day. Every summer I tried to get my

Jackson Mitchell began logging with horses and handsaws.

Today he uses grapplers and skidders, loaders and excavators.

Much has changed over the years, but Mitchell remains the same, a hard-working son of the Northeast Kingdom who has made his living in the woods, one tree at a time. And he has the scars to prove it.

"I'll tell you what, if you work in the woods you earn every dollar,' Mitchell said. "It's hard work."

He traces the origin of Jackson Mitchell Logging back 50 years to when he attended the Lyndon Campus School and a teacher, June Elliott, hooked him up with a fire-

"This was before I even had a driver's license," Mitchell said. "[Mrs. Elliott] got me an order of firewood for the St. Johnsbury House, they wanted some white birch firewood."

This was back when Mitchell was assisting his father, Jackson Sr., a Korean War veteran who spent time working for the railroad and Fairbanks Scales before settling into a logging career, beginning on

the John Hall Farm in Newark. The only boy among four children, Mitchell was raised in the logging industry, in the days before

skidders, and quickly grew to like it. "[My father] started out with a horse, I used to help him, I used to ride the horse back and forth,"

dad to go up another buck a day." The firewood business grew

slowly over time, with Mitchell originally charging \$16 per cord, loading the wood into the back of his father's truck, and making deliveries half a cord at a time.

Eventually they replaced the horses with skidders, the handsaws with chainsaws, and added various other heavy equipment to make the difficult and dangerous job a little easier and safer.

In time Mitchell graduated from Lyndon Institute and took the business over. He would buy properties, log them, then sell them. He estimates owning 1,500 acres at one

Today the business maintains around 200 steady customers and annually sells over 400 cords of wood. They also cut logs for lumber

"It's grown into a real good business," Mitchell said.

Over time there were challenges, with mounting regulations and fluctuating prices, but Mitchell persevered thanks to Yankee wisdom, that big pine tree is still standing." sharp business mind, and good relationships with customers.

He also practiced ethical logging. Sure, he was complying with regulations, but he also had an awareness of forest management, knowing that over cutting was bad for the

environment. "You've got to take care of the forest and leave it good for the next generation," he said.

That next generation includes sons Jackson III and Matthew, who are expected to carry on the business when Mitchell retires, which he expects will be sooner, rather than later. He's earned it. Mitchell sports all

manner of scars. He's been struck by falling limbs, nicked by an axe, and cut with a chainsaw. It speaks to the dangerous nature of logging.

"You name it, it happened," Mitchell said. Something else that happened:

Mitchell developed a soft spot for trees. Some of them, at least.

For the past 20 years he has occasionally left old, tall trees standing. He can't quite explain why, but there's a connection between the logger and the tree, who have both spent decades in the forests of the Northeast Kingdom.

"I'm getting old, and some trees I just won't cut. I'll just let it grow," Mitchell said. "I've left a few great big pine trees on a hillside, where the only person that really knows the tree's there is me. I can come down [Interstate] 91 and see where I've cut, and I can look over and see

In a time when loggers are fewer and further between, Mitchell is a throwback to a different time, and he considers himself fortunate to have grown up in the timber indus-

From horses and handsaws, to skidders and grapplers, he's enjoyed

Said Mitchell, "I've had a great life in the woods and I love it."







Miss Lyndonville Diner Turns 40

LYNDONVILLE — When Vermont Life Magazine named the Miss Lyndonville Diner as the best place to have homemade pie for breakfast a few decades back, that one article alone put the place on the map.

"Those are the ones that have been there from the beginning," said Burnor.

Burnor said, "I would say the diner is 50 percent us, and what we do, and 50 percent of what the people bring to it. The atmosphere of the diner is so unique."

That atmosphere, she said, "is definitely created by the energy between our customers and our staff." People pick up on a conversation they started the day before, and the rapport is infectious, she said. "Even when tourists come in, they can recognize that ... It's where you come to meet your neighbor. It's almost like anything that's going on in the community goes on in the diner. It's wonderful, it's so special, and I do think it's unique."

Regulars of the Miss Lyndonville have been on a first name basis with longtime staff for decades in some cases.

Roy Grant has been eating at the diner twice a day for years, he said. He's been a customer since before the Gray family owned it. He estimated he's been a regular for a half-century. On a radio program sponsored

by Grant's construction business, people are told they can find him at his second office, the diner. He starts his day there at 5:30 a.m. most days, he said, and comes back later in the day for lunch. Grant was good friends with

the late Ashley Gray, and continues to come to the diner where he gets both good food and fast service, and camaraderie with the staff and locals he's friends with. "The food is good," said

Grant, saying the diner is like his second home — it's such a big part of his life. He's not alone. The diner has

many locals that are that fiercely loyal, and who patronize the diner at least once a day — if not "I know the people here, the

Old Coins Is Key Component At Route 5 Antiques & Collectibles

LYNDONVILLE — A lot of changes have taken place since Wayne Comeau first started dealing in antiques and collectibles back in 1993. Those changes have affected the business greatly, especially the EBay phenomenon, and the next generations of adults that don't have an interest in collecting antiques and items, like their parents and grandparents once did.

Wayne started the business in 1993 as a hobby — "it started out as a hobby, then I kind of fell into it." Previously, he ran a successful excavating business in the area for many years. He wanted to "simplify his life."

At first, Wayne rented a spot in an antique store which operated out of a building on Broad Street in Lyndonville, which at one time housed a fitness center. Deciding he wanted to be on his own, he and his wife Pam purchased the building at their present location, now Route 5 Antiques & Collectibles at 277 Main St. in Lyndonville, and have been there ever since, at one time living in the apartment over the store.

Wayne has rented "booths" to vendors, for many years having up to 35 individuals using space in the store. The age group of these These vendors would have spaces rented all over New England, when antiquing was so popular.

or moved on, there was decline in people wanting to get into the business. Now he is down to three

Wayne also deals with "pickers," people who purchase truckloads of items and bring them to his store. When they show up, he has to buy the whole load. Then the next day, customers show up to see what his recent purchases consisted of. He has always kept track of what his customers are looking for, so he can give them a call when an item they are looking for shows up.

In order to cut down on inventory, Wayne will group together enough items to fill a trailer and bring them to auction. He believes it's better to sell them for whatever he can get, as opposed to sitting in his store and not going anywhere.

The top seller in the store is collectible coins, Wayne said. This aspect of the business — buying and selling old coins - is still going strong. Wayne takes this part of the business very seriously and wants to give his customers a fair price when buying their coins, or selling them the coins they've been looking for.

Wayne talked about a collector in Panama City, Fla., Larry Lee, owner of Coin and Bullion Reserve, who showed up in Route 5 dollars in 2013 and made national news. When Lee showed up at

As these vendors passed away Route 5 Collectibles, Wayne realized who he was. When asked why he purchased the nickel, Lee said "he trusted that nickel more than I trust the banks." Lee has returned to Route 5 Collectibles for the last two years, and has actually purchased some coins from

"It has been a good business, up until about 10 years ago when EBay came out," Wayne said. Before EBay, people didn't have many options for selling their merchandise. "Now they put it online, but they never get what they think they're going to get," he added.

Wayne still has on display a collection of dishware, toys, tools, furniture, etc. At one time, he would purchase from estate sales, but not so much anymore. People are into selling their own items, not realizing that most of those items are not as valuable as they once were. "The younger generations just aren't interested in collecting and antiques."

Wayne has a warning for those who are "pack rats." He said, "there's no way I'm going to leave my house like some do, for their kids to clean up" after their gone.

His words of wisdom, "Don't fall in love with something that doesn't breathe!"

All About Flowers: 20 Years Of Joy In St. Johnsbury

Founder Lallie Mambourg Still Helps Out on Holidays

ST. JOHNSBURY — All About Flowers has been a happy, hopeful fixture near the top of the hill on Eastern Avenue for the past 20

The business was originally named Lallie's Secret Garden, begun by Lallie Mambourg, who still can be found in the shop on holidays, including Valentine's Day, helping out, said manager Jessie Toney. Toney has been with the business since she asked for part-time work, while studying floraculture at a college in New York state in the summer of 2001.

The shop has been owned the past 10 years by Marc and Diane LaRose, though Diane is handsoff, running a second family business right next door in the building the couple owns, Armstrong's Better Hearing Service.

Lallie received a cancer diagnosis the year she began the flower shop, said Toney, "It made her think about what she was doing and what she wanted to be doing. Her husband knew she loved flowers and suggested opening a flower shop."

"Lallie's mom had been a house cleaner and she always left small arrangements of flowers for her clients," explained Toney. "Lallie would help arrange the flowers. They developed a reputation in the community and started doing some small events."

Toney said, "She opened Lallie's Secret Garden in 1998 and had it for three years. Then Vivi Begin became her partner for three years. After that Sandy Lazerick partnered with her until Marc and Diane purchased it."

The name was changed to All About Flowers when Begin joined the business, a few years after the flower shop had been opened.

A career firefighter who retired few years ago, Marc LaRose said he was looking for something to keep him busy after he retired, and when the flower shop went on the market and stayed on the market for awhile, he was concerned it may not survive. He didn't want to see it fade into history.

Since he was looking for a business, LaRose said he decided it may be a good one to get into. The staff had been there a long time and the business wa

s doing well, so he and his wife bought it. But she told him this was his baby, she was busy with the hearing business next door.

The LaRoses have been restoring the more than century-old Lambert Packard-designed brick building for several years, going so far as to return the front windows to nearly floor length, making the front display space eye-catching and creating a warmer shop and work space for the employees.

Marc LaRose said when he talked to the staff about his idea to buy the business, "They convinced me to buy it and let them run it for me!" He said he didn't know a lot about flowers 10 years ago, but today he does. It wasn't the business he thought he'd end up running in retirement, but he's

happy he does. LaRose said of the original owner, "We still get Lallie in

"There's something about her laugh!" added Toney, saying it still fills the shop when she returns to help out on the busy holidays.

The building the shop is in was built in 1896 and was originally built for the Knights of Pythias, said LaRose. He and his wife live in an apartment on the upper floor of the restored building.

The cooler in the front of the shop is overflowing with a choice of many exotic, fresh blooms, and the floral arrangers on staff can create a custom bouquet or arrangement to order.

The shop is committed to supporting local artisans and feature products made and grown in Vermont, including wine, chocolate, flowers and plants. Workshops and events, such as wine and beer tastings are offered to the community, as well.

"We try to put a unique twist on an arrangement," said Toney. The business does flowers for special occasions from weddings to funerals and everything in-between. "We put the extra care into everything, from our arrangements to hand-tied bouquets."

The shop's motto is "Elegantly Vermont."





20 Seasons Of 'Cornfusion' In Danville

NORTH DANVILLE — As far businesses go, The Great Vermont Corn Maze, which turns 20 this year, is a lost cause.

But that's the point. If visitors didn't get lost a few times while navigating the numerous "cornfusing" pathways of the maze, it wouldn't be challenging enough to sustain its two-decade status as a recreation destination found in the farmlands of North Danville.

Mike and Dayna Boudreau are the co-owners of the attraction, operating the largest maze in New England.

"After some research we actually believe it may be the largest on the East coast but we are confident about being the largest in New England," Mike said. "We not only have the largest in size but, according to our mazers who visit from all over the world, we have one of the most complex and challenging mazes."

Making an a-maze-ing attraction

The Boudreaus start planning the maze each January. The design is chosen and a conversation begins about things to be added at the attraction. Planning for the DEAD NORTH haunted event also com-

"Once the snow is gone we start building as much as we can in DEAD NORTH and whatever we add to the maze or our play area, PRETENDIN," the Boudreaus statea.

The corn is planted at the end of

"While waiting for the corn to sprout we are straight out with maintenance and building and we move stuff into the cornfield like our bridges, boat and other photo ops."

They start picking the maze the beginning weeks of June. It's "sun up to sun down" work in the field trying to pick the entire maze before the corn is knee high, the Boudreaus noted. The maze is picked and the trails are tilled and packed to make walking easier.

The preparation of the maze continues ahead of an Aug. 1 opening

Once open for the season, it takes about two hours each morning to open the maze including cleaning, restocking, caring for the animals, etc. The maze is open each day from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. At night the Boudreaus work on the DEAD NORTH attraction.

"We do this 7 days a week until we close mid-October," the Boudreaus stated.

"We usually sleep in December. Then we work as physical therapists assistants in the winter to support the maze.'

The family that maze together stays together

Mike, 51, and Dayna, 44, have two children who have grown up with the business, working alongside their parents.

The Boudreaus' son, Jake, was still a baby when the maze venture began. He's now 21 and will graduate from The University of Vermont this spring. He is planning to raise Lowline Angus grass fed beef on the farm and will continue being a "bridge guy," helping mazers in the

Rian, now 19, hadn't been born when the Great Vermont Corn Maze opened. She is now in college pre-

paring to be a physical therapist like her parents. Another year, another design

When the Boudreaus create their

20th maze this year, it will be their 20th different design. No maze over the last two decades has resembled any of the others.

The Boudreau family looks to Mike each year to come up with the theme of the maze. He proposes some ideas and the family gets together to make the selection. Once the theme is decided Mike designs the maze. The family offers input about how it should flow.

"Jake has spent the second most time in the corn helping lost people (second to Mike) so he has good feedback on how certain flows worked or didn't work," the Boudreaus said.

More than a maze

In addition to the main attraction maze, there is a smaller scenic maze which is usually about a 40-minute walk, according to Mike. Adding to the attraction is the PRETEN-DIN play area for children, which is designed to be a fun reward for little kids after a day of mazing. It includes a kid-size western village, 100 feet of underground tunnels, a rubber climbing silo, a hay barn, petting zoo, and HIDENSEEK For-

"It's exhausting but it is a such a rush to see an idea come together," the Boudreaus said. "Whether it's the laughter of little kids in our PRETENDIN play area, the excitement and bonding of families or

couples solving the maze after 21/2

hours of effort, or hearing the con-

stant screams of people enjoying DEAD NORTH."

Dayna said she enjoys visiting with returning mazers and the ability to have worked with and spent time with the Boudreau's children.

"The worst part is that we have picked a business that has to be built from the ground up every year," they said. "And we have created such a unique attraction that it is very difficult getting new visitors to understand exactly what we are offering and why they should arrive before noon and in August or September."

20th anniversary plans

"Currently I have a million ideas falling out of my brain and we are making plans for our 20th year," said Mike. He said there are specific plans to enhance the DEAD NORTH experience. "We will also be doing new stuff, as always, at the maze and PRETENDIN," he said.

As the Boudreaus reflect on a past that gets them to their 20th anniversary this year, they have no plans to end their adventure in the future.

"We have such a great fan following and so many of our mazers have become like family that we see once a year, we just cannot imagine not opening the maze Aug. 1st," they said. "As exhausting as the whole thing is, it is part of our lives.

"Most of our hardcore mazers (people who do not want clues until they have tried for about 2 hours) are great fun to visit with and we look forward to seeing them every year. After 20 years we are now seeing third generation mazers."

Some direction before wandering off

The experience of running the Great Vermont Corn Maze for so long has given the Boudreaus good insights for people to remember before stepping into their maze.


The maze is not good for large groups or corporate outings, they said, because in those cases "it's just too many chefs in the kitchen." Thousands of decisions have to

be made to solve the maze. Also, it's not a good idea for

one couple or group to have varying fitness levels since some may tire easily while others in the same group might get bored at walking too slowly. "Good mazers are people who

can laugh at themselves, are easy going, like to hike, like challenges and don't have a melt-down when frustrated," they said.

City Cinema Continues History Of **Screening Movies In Newport City**

Owners Share Love Of Movies, **Movie Theaters**

NEWPORT CITY — Showing movies gets in your blood.

Just ask Karen Robinson. She was assistant manager of the former Merrill's cinema in Waterfront Plaza when she was 17 years

She went on to work as a paralegal for many years, but when the opportunity to run the cinema, then called Waterfront Cinema, came up again three years ago, Robinson jumped at the chance.

The cinema has been in operation nearly continuously since the 1980s, first as Merrill's, then under Hoyts, as Cinema 1,2,3 and then Waterfront Plaza.

The plaza and building owner Tony Pomerleau decided to shut it down in 2014, after the business had declined and was in disrepair under the previous owner.

Pomerleau was open to seeing the cinema continue, having a feeling that the community would support it if it was renovated and run well, and put out a request for proposals.

Robinson and her partner in life and business Erik Lawson, who ran Village Pizza in Derby and now in Orleans, contacted Pomerleau in September 2014. He said no at first, Robinson said, but in

the end agreed to their proposal. Pomerleau did all the renovations, from floors to walls and ceilings and bathrooms, especially the bathrooms, Lawson said.

He did it to their design, includ-

ing the distinctive wood paneling, Last Jedi. Robinson said.

upgrades, an expensive proposition to change over to a digital movie operation that was required throughout the industry.

The doors opened Sept. 4, 2015. Part of the antique reel system they took out is now incorporated into a sculpture that stands in the lobby, created by Cory Spaulding of Auto Outfitters. He also did the outdoor signs.

There are three regular parttime employees and another couple who come in for some shifts The cinema business is tied to

the concession stand. The studios take 60 percent of the ticket sales and there's a 6 cent sales tax. The food and drink is what

keeps the cinema open, Lawson said. That's why they urge their patrons to not bring in food but buy in-house to keep the cinema



Located in a former snack bar on Route 114 in Lyndonville, Libbey's is a hidden jewel for foodies - and those simply seeking good food - in the Northeast Kingdom. Everything they sell is fresh, free of preservatives and antibiotics, and cut to order.

Among their most popular products are a line of marinated meats (chicken breast, tenders and wings, steak tips, pork tips, and more) and fresh made sausage (20 different varieties, chicken, turkey, pork and beef).

For those worried about breaking the bank, think

again. Libbey's has something to offer every household, regardless of budget. Yes, they sell filet mignon, but they also offer package deals, allowing people to fill their freezer and save a few bucks.

After 30 years of working and living in Vermont, Libbey (whose family dates back to the 1800s in Lyndonville) understands the economics of the NEK.

"Some people get the impression that because we do offer high quality products, that everything in the store is expensive," Libbey said. "But you can get a \$20 a pound piece of meat or a \$2 a pound pork chop. We try to offer the whole range. We're not just highend caviar and scallops, but everything we put out



there, even the lesser cuts, are the best we can find." And it's not just the product. Libbey's prides itself on superior customer service.

Not sure what you want? Just ask. Want to plan an event? They can help. Looking for a recipe? Come

"We go the extra step, not just offering you your meat, but we can give you ideas on how to properly cook that," Libbey said.

A self-described "Army brat," Libbey was born in Germany and spent his formative years in the greater Boston area. He was introduced to the food industry through his grandmother's restaurant, The Menu, located in an industrial park in Woburn, Mass.

"I washed dishes there as a teenager, then I started cooking, because one Wednesday night one of the cooks didn't show up and they were shorthanded. They put me on the line," he said. "My grandmother wanted me to be a lawyer, not a cook, but I hopped in and had a knack for it. The next thing, they scheduled me for shifts. I learned from guys who did it

That was the beginning. He continued his education at Boston area hotels, and then Vermont inns and restaurants, working under experienced chefs and taking classes through the Culinary Institute of

Before opening the meat market, he spent 14 years at St. Johnsbury Academy, where he ran the culinary arts department with his wife, Sue (they met working together at the restaurant, The Border, in Derby). He ran the culinary side: Sue taught restaurant management.

When an injury sidelined him, Libbey exited the school and began planning for the meat market with consultation from cousin Ronnie Cerra (who owns a meat market in Massachusetts) and Bob Egizi (the longtime owner of R&J Meat Center in St. Johnsbury). He also relied on advice and support from Sue, who remains with the Academy.

"She is influential in every aspect of the business,"

Libbey's Meat Market opened in 2013 with one display case, a few employees and modest expectations. Today they have four display cases, six employees, with over 100 customers per day during the busiest months.

They supply four local restaurants (The Foggy Goggle, Burke Publick House, and Bailiwick's locations in St. Johnsbury and Littleton, N.H.) and have doubled their in-store selection, branching out to include fresh, made from scratch soups and soup

In other words, they've been busy.

"We're working everyday, as hard as we can to keep up," said Libbey.

One day they might be learning about the end of the Passumpsic River dam, another day cheese making and all the sciences and the arts that surround the topics.

The school is the opposite of the formula in some schools where everyone is learning the same thing at the same time.

When asked to describe what makes East Burke School unique, Mazur says he tells parents "it's the small setting that really sets us apart.' And the teachers find them-

selves freed to do more teaching than they had in formal school settings. Students have time set aside to focus on what they are passionate about, and the teachers find that the students are willing to learn all the facets of that topic as a result.
