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

It was just natural for us to be together without being married. We've never spent the night away from each other, except when Mike's gone


on a hunting trip. But with the kids going to school, it bugged me that I didn't have their last name. We're planning on staying together forever, so he finally asked me.

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Premarital Counseling

lanning a wedding can entail hundreds of hours of preparing for a single day or weekend of festivities. But the divorce rate in this country would suggest that that care and consideration may not be similarly into planning for life after the wedding.

That's where premarital counseling can be helpful.

Ashley and Patrick Ruddy mentioned how beneficial it was for them to do premarital counseling with Pastor Jim Proctor of Lyndonville United Methodist Church. So we called Proctor to learn about the process.

"I can really only answer what people can expect from me," Proctor began. "There are all kinds of people doing all kinds of things and approach it differently.'

He begins with the concept that a marriage takes work and he wants to prepare couples for that. "A lot of people don't anticipate that - they love each other, so of course all will be well," he said. "Most of what I do is ask questions on anything and everything."

He asks couples about things like what they believe love is, why they're getting married and why to this person, their families of origin, the traditions and practices that are important to them, finances, how they handle conflict, children, faith, and more.

"It's pretty much all on the table," Proctor said. "Our goal is to prepare them for a lifetime together by opening up plain lines of communication."

He said that often couples will have topics that they've already covered and feel comfortable with, but invariably there's at least one that catches them short and requires further explora-

Proctor expects to spend at least 6 to 8 hours with a couple.

If either or both have already had a divorce or trauma, he'll dig deeper. "I always ask them, What did you contribute to the divorce?" Proctor said. "What did you learn from it that will be useful to you in entering this marriage? How has it impacted you in ways that might affect you in negative ways in this new marriage? Some people are pretty uncomfortable talking about this stuff, but this is life and we can't sweep it under the rug and pretend it didn't happen."

He also asks couples to consider what circumstances might cause them to seek a divorce.

"They're like - wait a minute! We're not thinking about that! We're getting married, we're going to spend the rest of our life together," Proctor said. "But we both know that there's a ton of marriages that don't make it to 'til death





do us part. So it would be really good to know what's on your mind ... There's a reason why we put on our seat belts. We're not planning on getting into an accident, but accidents happen."

Ultimately, Proctor wants to help people understand that the most important of making a commitment to another person is not about why you love the person, but who you intend to be within the marriage. "It's the promise that I'm making to you about who I am."





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We could talk to each other about everything. And being friends I think is a big, big plus. I had no secrets with him.

He got interested in Bosnian culture and showed that he cares. He started to learn the language. He made me feel so comfortable, he always made me feel at home. That's part of Bosnian culture - that when somebody comes to your house, you make them feel at home.

Of course we were attracted to each other, but that doesn't mean anything when you're not mentally attracted to somebody.







I was impressed by his dedication to his work and his relationship with family. He's just a very genuinely nice guy. And I really love his family, so that was a bonus – to be able to love your in-laws!

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
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Advice As You Begin Planning

"Everyone got those to take home so they could plant them," Jaimie said.



The Keys To A Wedding Video

photographer is a given, some local couples also opt to have videos made of their big day.

One local videography outfit is The Wedding Dudes in St. Johnsbury, run by Nate Somers and Mike Deterling.

"Being outside, shooting people having a good time is enjoyable," said Deterling.

We asked the Dudes about what couples should know if they choose to do a wedding video.

"Ideally we like to have

a rough list of what time things are going to take place throughout the day," said Deterling. "We have wireless audio gear that we're using throughout the day to make sure we get good audio for the ceremony and the reception and toasts."

"Prior to the wedding date, we really stress with the bride and groom the importance of having a list of events, which they're usually really good at giving to us. We usually talk to the wedding planner, if there is one," added Somers. "As long as everybody stays in good communication and we

have a rundown of events, we can do a good job."

While many weddings are made up of a number of standard elements, the Dudes said it's important for a videographer to know ahead of time about anything special or unusual that will happen so they can be prepared.

'We try to be unobtrusive during your wedding day," said Deterling. "We try not to interrupt too much, and get nice shots while they're enjoying their day. It's just for them to be themselves and enjoy their wedding."

After the wedding, the Dudes send a DVD to the couple with an initial draft of the footage. The couple can request edits whether it's a song, or a particular shot they want adjusted.

Another popular thing that videographers are offering is a bite-size version of the wedding video that is perfect for Facebook. "It's usually less than three minutes long," explained Deterling. "Almost every bride and groom now wants to have that, so they post it on social media."

In order to find the right videographer for your wedding, the Dudes suggest meeting them in person and viewing their demos. Review the contract and make sure your comfortable with the terms and read online reviews.

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Adventures In Budgeting

It's the big question for every couple: how much money will we spend on our wedding? Here are some of the factors that affected the bottom line for our couples.



THE DeWITTS

Second-guessing decisions - I hired photographer for a smaller package, so he wasn't there for as much time. He was so great that I wish I'd hired him for the full day.



Crafty friends - I paid for all our sunflowers at Four Corners Farm in Newbury, Vermont. Then my friend Savannah went to Walmart and got roses and baby's breath and burlap. She made all the bouquets and the flowers on the tables with that, and I only spent about \$200 on flowers.

Mounting costs – I think we would have stuck with our budget ... well, maybe we wouldn't have. Having that many people with food, it's expensive. When we thought we were going to do the tent and tables and chairs [rather than renting a venue], that would have been \$4,500 [of the original

\$6,000 budget]. It's just expensive to get married.

re met in high school in 2005. We dated for a while then parted ways." When they got back together, they got serious and Chelsea became pregnant in March 2010. 





The Benefits Of Hiring A Wedding Coordinator

ne of the benefits of booking your wedding at a resort like Jay Peak is that part of what you're paying for is a wedding coordinator who will help you to plan your wedding day.

We spoke with Jason Bertrand and Meg Loscomb at Jay Peak to get an idea of how that process rolls out (keeping in mind that every venue and every wedding coordinator is different.)

First thing to know: there's a difference between a wedding coordinator and a wedding planner. According to Bertrand, a coordinator is attached to a particular property; a planner can help you look at multiple properties and choose the one that's best for you.

"They say, I have a certain budget and I need certain things," Bertrand said. "We'll work with them in that process of helping them get ready for their wedding here at the resort."

When you make the initial phone call to a resort or other all-inclusive venue, you can expect to talk about venue fees and menu fees. The coordinator is likely to ask for a guesstimate of your head count so they can help you choose an appropriate space and better approximate the fees involved.

"It's very preliminary," said Bertrand of that first phone call. "Asking about our property, asking about what we have to offer."

The next step is visiting the venue to take a

tour of the property including accommodations and ceremony and reception sites. Jay Peak offers periodic on-site wedding expos (they call them "tastings") that include both food tastings and a meet-and-greet with their preferred ven-

Speaking of vendors, the venue has established relationships with a variety of vendors whom they recommend. "Those are vendors we have personally selected that know our property and know our coordinators," Bertrand said. "We don't have to think twice about them showing up because we're always in constant communication with them."

At Jay Peak, the couple is required to book their own vendors, but their coordinator will help with drafting emails, etc. The coordinator can also help with writing a time line for the wedding day, narrowing the guest list, and other

While Bertrand said that they suggest booking your venue a year to 18 months in advance, Loscomb told us that they can pull an event together in as little as a month when necessary.

On the day of the event, the coordinator will be present to see the couple through the festiv-

"We're behind the scenes making sure all the vendors are arriving and setting up okay, making sure the food is on track," Bertrand said. "If they

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

have an outdoor wedding, we're keeping an eye on the hourly forecast and preparing the backup location if need be."

"We might be with the bride fluffing her dress

and making her feel special," Bertrand continued. "When she walks down the aisle, that's where we duck into the shadows."





Getting The Shot THE RUDDYS

Do you want a first look photo session? Should all photos happen during the cocktail hour? Choosing where photos fit in your time line can affect the whole day.





THE ARMSTRONGS

We did a first look before the ceremony - I'm not a superstitious person. We really wanted a lot of family photos, so we scheduled in time to do that. Our photographer helped us with scheduling stuff to make sure we got in all the pictures we wanted.

We didn't want to spend the day taking photographs. We told the photographer that was the goal. I had done a spreadsheet of who we needed to get photos of. Because Patrick has such a large family, at the hotel before his family even got transported to the wedding site we did a photo session with one of the photographers with his family. So we got those out of the way before they even came to the ceremony. We did the same with my family. And we did my photo session before the ceremony as well. So after the ceremony, as everyone

was walking [down the hill from the ceremo-

ny to the reception], we snuck away for 20 minutes and did the rest of the photos.

themselves.






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

THE McDANIELS


"We went to a few different shops in Burlington and came back to Needlemans [in Newport]," said Mikayla. "When you start crying you know it's the dress!"

Best Laid Plans vs. Overlooked Details

Planning a wedding takes time and energy. Here are some of the highs and lows our couples went through in that process.



What was the most fun part of planning your wedding? What was most stressful?


THE RUDDYS

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

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Open Bar or Cash Bar

Alcohol can have a major impact on the budget. Here is how each of our couples chose to deal with it.



We bought a bottle of red wine and white wine

for each table, plus we had the table set up for the Bosnian schnapps. That was free, then anything else people would bring their own.

THE RUDDYS

We were at a private venue and we didn't want liquor laws saying we had to shut the bar off. So I bought all of the liquor and we did it all ourselves. I have girlfriends whose parents spent \$10,000 on the wedding bar. I spent \$4,000 on all the booze and the soft drinks and all of that. No one ran out of a drink. You could have anything you wanted.

THE KINGS

We didn't have any alcohol.

THE ARMSTRONGS

We did a cash bar and my dad gave drink tickets to certain people in the wedding party and some family members. With 145 people, I didn't want my dad to be responsible for that.

THE McDANIELS

We did it BYOB. Everybody brought their own drinks and we had punch and the soda for the kids. Make sure you put it on the invitation and everybody will bring their own.

THE CHAFFEES

We did BYOB for insurance reasons at the venue. If we supplied the alcohol, we would have been liable and would have had to get extra insurance.

THE DeWITTS

We had a cash bar. It's a real budget breaker for people and I don't really drink myself, so I didn't think it was a big deal to have a cash bar.

THE BENNETTS

We did Bring Your Own Beer.



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Tips To Keep Yourself Organized

Planning a big event is an organizational task as much as a creative one. Here's how some of our couples kept themselves on track, including websites and apps they found useful.

THE McDANIELS

Mikayla found a Facebook group where people sell the things they used at their own wedding - tablecloths, centerpieces, even dresses. "That's how I did my wedding so cheap ... You can buy them super cheap because they're just trying to get rid of things, so you don't have to buy them full price," she said. "You can find some really awesome stuff on these cheap sites. You can put a lot of questions on it if you need help, and brides-to-be or brides-who-have-already-gotten-married comment to try to help people."

She also used Google frequently. "You can find a lot of cheap things as long as you go through a lot of websites," Mikayla said. "Make sure you order everything three to four months in advance, so that if something is wrong you have time to replace it."

THE DeWITTS

I used The Knot for their calendar because it has a task list. You can cross out the tasks that don't apply to you, so it's a nice reminder list in case there was anything I might have forgotten.



For our invitations, instead of RSVPs I listed a call-back number and it was easy to keep track that way. I used my cell phone so they could either text or call me, and I also made a Facebook group to track it. I could use that to send out remind-

THE BENNETTS

I'm a wicked Post-It notes person. They were everywhere!

The most important tool was a shared Dropbox file that all pertinent parties had access to in real time: my mom and dad, a wedding planner. Patrick could log in himself and see anything he needed to see. I had different tabs for budget, guest list, RSVPs. Everything was on an Excel sheet that people could see in real time. More than anything is super helpful for me as the ringleader to always have the information at my fingertips.

THE STEELES

We had a couple lists, and we would just get on the phone. He'll do one call for a tent and I'll do another one for a DJ, and then we would check it off the list when it was done.

THE KINGS


I had a planner and a binder. I started from the top and said, if we want to get married in August, we have this many months to plan. So I divvied it all up so we wouldn't stress too much all at once.



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
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
