

Dube's shot was not a fluke. coach Chris Cook said. He pointed out that Dube had made other pivotal 3-point field goals in the tournament against Danville and top-seeded Rivendell.

"He is a senior that showed up," Cook said.

"I noticed that when he was warming up, he was nailing them so we were rotating him.

"Big-time players make bigtime plays," said Dube's teammate Cooper Ingerson.

Dube was not a starter for the Bucks. But on this day, he fit Ingerson's description of a bigtime player.












DELANEY RANKIN

St. Johnsbury, Sr., P

The Record's softball player of the year tallied five shutouts and four one-hitters in 55 innings in the circle, finishing with a 0.89 ERA and averaging 14.1 strikeouts per seven innings while walking just six batters An All-Metro second-team pitcher and North-South senior all-star, Rankin also batted .368 with two home runs. seven doubles, three triples, 18 runs and 14 RBI. In the D-I quarterfinals, she hit a go-ahead double in the top of the 11th, then completed a gutsy complete-game performance (162 pitches, 12 Ks from the circle) as the Hilltonners upset Missisquoi 6-4 to reach their first final four since 2011.

LEXUS MCINTOSH

White Mountains, Sr., P

A two-way leader for the Spartans, the hard-throwing right-hander picked up 10 wins and fanned 150 batters in the circle for the 12-win Spartans The N.H. Division III allstate honorable mention pick also raked in the batter's box, hitting .464 with a .652 on-base percentage. She also collected a home run and eight extra-base hits. "Lexus is a very talented athlete with a true love and passion for the game who also exemplifies great leadership and strength," White Mountains coach Kalie Gonver said.

ISABELLE PRIEST

Lyndon, Sr., CF

The team's table-setter with speed and smarts, Priest was also a deft center fielder for the potent Vikings, who rolled to a 19-0 record and claimed their second Division II title after a 5-3 state-final win over Enosburg. Named the Capital Division co-player of the year and a Vermont North-South senior all-star, she batted .565 while producing 39 hits, six doubles, six triples, 13 walks, 23 RBI and 46 runs "One of the premier leadoff hitters in the state," LI coach Chris Carr said. "She has speed on the bases, covers a lot of ground in center field and has excellent softball knowledge.

ANNA MCINTYRE

Woodsville, Sr., SS

The New Hampshire Division IV player of the year provided a mighty bat to help key Woodsville to a historic season, the Engineers running to a dominant undefeated season. and their second straight state title. McIntyre finished with a .477 batting average, a .568 OBP and a .923 slugging percentage while also belting six home runs, seven doubles, two triples and finishing with 31 RBI and 34 runs. She also hit .500 in the playoffs. "Anna really stepped up big this year," WHS coach Dana Huntington said. "She moved to shortstop flawlessly as well. Anna was a major reason we did so well this year."

BRYDIE BARTON

Lyndon, Sr., OF

A premier athlete with great range in left field and one of the premier bats in the state. Barton provided major power for the back-to-back, undefeated Division II champions. She finished a triple short of the cycle, and collected four RBI in the semifinals, then collected two more RBI in the final — a 5-3 victory over Enosburg. The Capital co-player of the year and North-South senior all-star batted .557 and delivered three HRs, 13 doubles, eight triples, 32 RBI and scored 33 runs. "She's such a strong presence in the batter's box, hits for power and runs the bases exceptionally well, also covers a lot of ground playing left field," LI coach Chris Carr said

ALLIE PILLSBURY

North Country, Sr., 3B

Providing pop in the middle of the Falcon lineup, Pillsbury had a breakout senior campaign after playing sparingly in 2021. Named an All-Metro first-team third baseman, she batted .404 with four home runs. five doubles, three triples and 24 RBI. She was also named the school's 2022 MaryBeth Cargill Award winner "After not playing much her junior year, Pillsbury worked hard in the offseason to improve." NCU coach Travis Bingham said. "Allie was solid offensively all year and put together some big games."

MACKENZIE KINGBURY

Woodsville, Sr., P

Kingsbury paved the way for a spectacular season in Woodsville - the team finishing undefeated with backto-back Division IV titles. Named D-IV pitcher of the year, Granite State North POY and a finalist for The Record POY honor, she went 18-0 with a 0.74 ERA and 229 strikeouts in 94 innings. She did not allow a hit in 10 of 18 games (allowed just 18 hits all season). She also batted .537 with three home runs, five doubles, four triples and 46 RBI 'Mackenzie had a phenomenal year," WHS coach Dana Huntington said. "She had one of the best, if not the best year of any player I have ever

EMMA NEWLAND

Lyndon, Sr., 2B

The No. 2 hitter with major speed, aggressiveness on the base paths and stellar defense, Newland helped guide the Vikings to an unbeaten 19-0 record and a second consecutive Division II state championship — a 5-3 victory over Enosburg. A North-South senior all-star picked to the All-Capital first team, Newland hit .432 with four doubles, five triples, 36 RBI, 38 runs scored and 14 stolen bases. "A strong hitter with softball knowledge, she did a lot of damage on offense," LI coach Chris Carr said. "Speed on the bases. Very solid second basemen that can run down the ball."

LILIAN KITTREDGE

St. Johnsbury, Jr., 1B

A reliable first baseman who also produced in the circle and in the batter's box. Kittredge helped fuel a big season for the Hilltoppers — the club making its first semifinal appearance since 2011. Named an All-Metro first-team first baseman, Kittredge batted .327 with four doubles, a triple 11 RBI and 15 runs scored. She also had a 2.43 ERA with 37 strikeouts in 23 innings. "She is a dedicated, hardworking, passionate player that does whatever it takes to make sure her team is successful," St. J coach Jeremy Roberts said.

ZOE **CROCKER**

Danville, Sr., SS

The biggest bat in the Bears' potent lineup, the fierce and passionate shortstop had a massive statistical senior year at the dish in helping her club to the Division IV final four. She batted a whopping .677, with five home runs, four triples, 10 doubles, knocked in 21 runs and scored 26 times. She had three 4-for-4 games, hit for the cycle, and landed on the All-Mountain second team. "She is an excellent hitter" Danville coach Paul Remick said. "She does everything well. Going

ADRIANA LEMIEUX

St. Johnsbury, Sr., C

A standout, tough-as-nails backstop with a sweet swing at the plate, Lemieux helped the Hilltoppers to a 13-win season and a spot in the Division I semifinals — a one-run loss to eventual champion South Burlington. Named to the All-Metro second team at catcher and a North-South senior all-star for Vermont, she finished her senior year with three doubles, a triple, eight RBI and 17 runs scored. "She is one of the most versatile athletes I have coached, with a tough ness second to none." SJA coach Jeremy Roberts said.


JAYDIN ROYER

An All-Capital first-team choice, she went 11-0 with 105 strikeouts in 105 innings, including a 13K effort in a 5-3 win over Enosburg. She also added pop in the lineup, batting .469 with 23 RBI, 17 runs and three triples, "Jaydin settled well in the circle this year," LI coach Chris Carr said. "As a sophomore, she showed a lot of composure. She fields her position very well and hits for power."

TYLER HICKS

White Mountains, Sr., P/SS

The Record's Player of the Year for a second-straight spring, the hard-throwing right-hander was also named Division III pitcher of the year, D-III player of the year, a Twin State senior all-star and was a 2022 ABCA/ Rawlings High School All-Region 1 Team selection. Hicks batted .587 with a 1.370 slugging percentage and a .694 OBP, with eight home runs, four triples, four doubles, nine steals 25 RBI and 33 runs. On the mound. the captain allowed just 14 hits and 18 walks while striking out 69 batters, and gave up just one earned run (three total) to finish with a 0.198 ERA for the No. 2-seeded Spartans

WILL **FOWLER**

St. Johnsbury, Sr., 3B

The big-swinging lefty was an offensive force for the Hilltoppers, who reached the Division I quarterfinals and came within a run of toppling eventual champion Essex An All-Metro first-team choice and Twin State senior all-star, Fowler batted .392 with a .446 OBP and a .686 slugging percentage to go along with four doubles, three home runs, a triple, 22 RBI and 11 runs. "The team leader in RBI and slugging percentage, Will was an integral part of the team this year both in the field and at the plate," SJA coach Chris Kendall said

TYLER RIVARD

Hazen, Jr., SS/P

The big man delivered at shortstop, on the bump and at the dish for the Wildcats, who earned the No. 1 seed and made a run to the Division III state final. The junior All-Capital first-team pick batted .434 with a .583 on-base percentage. 25 runs, six doubles, a home run and 18 RBI while drawing 16 walks. Rivard also went 3-1 on the bump with a pair of saves while pitching 30 1/3 innings. "Tyler is the ultimate competitor and teammate that you want," HU coach Spencer Howard said. "He is always looking to get better by putting the time in and trusting the process at the plate, on the mound or in the field."

AUSTIN WHEELER

Lyndon, Jr., P/CF

After missing his freshman season (canceled because of COVID) and his sophomore campaign (knee injury), the hard-throwing right-hander starred for the Vikings who reached their first state final since 2009. Named the Capital Division co-player of the year, Wheeler batted .508 with six doubles, four triples home run, 26 RBI, 36 runs, 15 steals and a .634 OBP. He also finished with a 1.54 ERA with 51 strikeouts in 31 IP (opponents' batting average was .132). "Austin is a humble blue-collar type player for us." LI coach Jeremy Wheeler said. "He kept his nose down, worked hard every day and put up big numbers for us."

TREVOR LUSSIER

A star behind the dish who provided thump in the heart of the lineup, Lussier produced a big-time senior season for the Vikings, who made a run to the Division II state championship game. A finalist for The Record POY honor. the All-Capital first-team pick and Twin State senior all-star selection batted .492 with nine doubles, three triples. four home runs, 32 RBI, 26 runs and a .646 OBP. "Trevor always seemed to come up with a huge at-bat for us driving in runs," LI coach Jeremy Wheeler said. "He had an exceptiona year, both behind the plate and at-bat

GRADY MILLEN

Littleton, Sr., P/SS/2B/3B

A versatile piece who played a starring role for the Crusaders, Millen was named the Granite State North player of the year, and selected to both the Division IV All-State first team and N.H. Twin State senior all-star squad. On the rubber, he finished 5-3 with 2.70 ERA, a 1.20 WHIP and 43 Ks in 44 innings Millen also hit .304 with a .444 OBP. 18 RBI and hit three home runs, including two bombs in a senior day win over Lin-Wood "Grady is a pure baseball player" Crusader coach AJ Bray said. "He can play every position and brings a smile to the field every day. He just flat-out loves the game and he plays it well.'

FRITZ HAUSER

St. Johnsbury, Sr., 1B

The Record's basketball player of the year was also a star on the diamond for the Hilltoppers, who came within a run of knocking off eventual champion Essex in the Division I quarterfinals. The 6-foot-7 first baseman hit .392 with a .475 OBP, a home run, three doubles, 16 RBI and scored eight runs while landing on the All-Metro first team and earning a spot on the Twin State All-Star team. "Fritz was a team member who led by example, one who showcased his dedication to the team by putting forth his full efforts every practice and game," SJA coach Chris Kendall said.

LUKE DUDAS

Lyndon, Sr., 1B

A fearless and reliable first baseman, Dudas was also a potent presence in the middle of the Viking lineup. Dudas finished with a .444 batting average and a .593 on-base percentage while supplying nine doubles, a triple, a home run, 22 RBI and 15 stolen bases to help Lyndon advance to its first state championship game since 2009. He was rewarded with a spot on the All-Capital first team "Luke had a great year for us," LI coach Jeremy Wheeler said. "At the plate, he was dangerous with his power and plate awareness.'

EVAN DENNIS

Blue Mountain, Jr., P/SS/1B

The dynamic Dennis did it all for the Bucks, who went undefeated in the regular season and came within a run of capturing the Division IV state title. On the bump, he went 5-0 with 58 Ks and a 0.903 ERA in 31 innings and also batted a whopping .578 with a .621 OBP with four home runs, four triples, six doubles, 26 RBI and 36 runs scored. Dennis was selected to the All-Mountain first team. "Evan had a spectacular 2022 baseball season for the Bucks" BMU coach Scott Blood said. "His dom inating consistency at the plate and on the mound propelled the Bucks to an undefeated regular season."

DAVID PIERS

Lake Region, Sr., SS/P

A strong right-handed pitcher and deft shortstop, Piers powered the Rangers in 2022. The All-Capital first-team pick and Twin State senior all-star batted .310 with two doubles, a triple and a home run. The team's ace battled back from injury in his junior campaign and finished his senior campaign with a 2.56 ERA with 78 Ks in 41 innings. He's headed to play at Oklahoma Baptist University in the fall "After last year's injury, he did a heck of a iob in the offseason getting his arm, his shoulder and his body and mind back into shape," LR coach Shawn Perron said. "He's always putting in extra time trying to get better."

On the rubber, he collected 28 Ks in 21.6 innings and a 0.646 ERA (two earned runs and eight total) while earning spots on the D-III All-State first team and playing in the Twin State all-star game. "While also performing at a high level. Brody brought the joy of the game making everything competitive," Spartan coach Dave Deming said.

Blue Mountain, Sr., SS

A standout leader, Dennis was pivotal in the Bucks' undefeated regular season and run to the finals. He batted .559 with a .680 OBP while collecting three doubles, a triple, 17 RBI, 21 runs and swiping 23 bases. Dennis finished as an All-Mountain first-team selection and played in the Twin State all-star affair, "John was instrumental to our success," BMU coach Scott Blood said. "His performance on the field and as a leader set the tone for an outstanding season. With an errorless regular season and batting average above .500, John played with a level of consistency that was above and beyond what his coaches and



A gifted left-footed striker, the talented senior captain earned The Record's nod for Player of the Year while landing on the Division IV All-State first team and the Granite State North list. Finishing as Profile's career leading scorer (83 goals, 48 assists), McLaren finished the year with 27 goals and



17 assists while guiding the Patriots to their second-ever final four. "She exemplifies what a leader is on and off the field and always carries a team-first attitude," Profile coach Kevin Fraser said.

CHARLI KELLAWAY

North Country, Soph., MF

The sophomore midfielder provided high soccer IQ, an endless motor and great technical ability for the Falcons, who won 11 contests and reached the Division I quarterfinals. Kellaway ended the year with five goals and team-best nine assists while landing on the All-Capital first team. "She has the



ability to see and recognize passing patterns playing her teammates into positions that allow them to exploit space and be successful," NC coach Peter Kellaway said. "She's a very hard worker that can dominate both sides of the field."



But after inbounding once and getting fouled (not in bonus yet), the Cougars were whistled for a five-second call the next inbounds attempt - giving the ball to the Hilltoppers on the baseline with a chance to win it.

With no timeouts, Davis dialed up a play that he'd yet to use in a game — a lob for Hauser at the rim.

Colby Garey-Wright set the play in motion, lofting a soft, pinpoint pass over the defense. Hauser beat his defender to the rim, then elevated over another Cougar and softly banked in the alley-oop for the game-winner that set off a wild celebration.
