COMEBACK KIDS

Littleton was outshot, outscored and outplayed in the first half. But the Crusaders never quit.

LHS roared back to erase a two-goal deficit and beat defending champion Sunapee 3-2 (4-3) on penalty kicks in the Division IV championship on Nov. 8.

Freshman Kaitlyn Ilacqua converted the decisive PK, junior Emily Mainous made the championship-clinching save, and Littleton claimed its second girls soccer crown, and first since 2012.

The come-from-behind victory was historic — LHS becoming the first New Hampshire girls team to rally from a two-goal deficit and win a championship in 126 state finals.

"It was just pure joy," Mainous said.

It was a gritty performance by Mainous, who took over in goal for the Crusaders this season.

She held Sunapee scoreless for the final hour of play and made four straight stops to end the shootout.

"She's a dirt dog," Brown said. "When we do PKs or any kind of goalie work in practice, she is all over the place. She ends up walking away covered in mud and she doesn't care. The dirtier she gets the better she feels. It's just the way she plays."

In a season like none other, Littleton persevered.

JACK YOUNG

North Country, Sr., CF

A premier center fielder who played errorless ball this spring, Young batted .448 with a home run, two triples and 13 RBI while landing on the All-Capital first team. "During the last game of the season, his first at-bat he was hit by a pitch in his hand (later to find out, a clear fracture of one of his metacarpals). Jack finished the game with two perfect bunts, not being able to swing the bat," NC coach Jay Gonyaw said.



JOSH FINKLE

Littleton, Sr., P

A workhorse on the mound and a versatile defensive piece off of it, the D-IV All-State first-team and Granite State North pick led Littleton to the state championship game. The Crusader ace also played catcher, first base, third and outfield. On the mound, the righthander went 8-3 with a 2.56 ERA and 79 strikeouts in 60 innings. He also batted .304 with a team-high 19 RBI. "We don't make it to the championship game without Josh. It's that simple." LHS coach AJ Brav said



LYLE ROONEY

Hazen, Soph., P

A gamer with talent to back it up, Rooney was named Mountain League Co-Player of the Year in his first season of high school ball. The hard-throwing right-hander went 8-4 with a 2.84 ERA in 51.2 innings. He fanned 89 batters and had a .168 batting average against in helping guide the Cats to the D-III semifinals. "Lyle is the kid every coach wants, he is always looking to pitch and the ultimate competitor that you have to pry the ball out of his hand." HU coach Spencer Howard said

TYLER HICKS

White Mountain s, Jr., P/SS

The Record's Baseball Player of the Year was nearly unhittable on the rubber. The hard-throwing right-hander (88 mph fastball) allowed just two hits and one earned run all season (0.36 ERA, .025 batting average against) while striking out 54 batters (2.19 Ks per inning) and combining with his teammates on three no-hitters in 243/3 innings. A standout shortstop, the Division III All-State first-teamer batted .395 with 26 RBI while leading the Spartans to a 14-3 mark and the D-III semifinals.



EVAN DENNIS

Blue Mountain, Soph., P/SS

The All-Mountain first-team selection had a monster season in leading the Bucks to the Division IV title game. The right-hander fanned 73 batters and had a 2.69 ERA in 41.2 innings. At the dish, he hit .547 with three home runs, eight doubles, four triples and 22 RBI. His home run at Centennial field in the title game was the first home run by a high schooler at Centennial since the field has been revamped. "He is a strong competitor at the plate and in the field," BM coach Scott Blood said.



TREVOR LUSSIER

Lyndon, Jr., C

A big bat in the heart of the lineup and a reliable backstop behind the plate, the All-Capital first-teamer was key for the Vikings, who

snagged the No. 4 seed in a competitive D-II. He batted .400 with a HR, six doubles and 17 RBI. Lussier also had two doubles off U-32 starter Owen Kellington, who was drafted in the fourth-round of the June MLB amateur draft. "Trevor's power and ability to hit the ball hard against any pitchers we faced made him a very hard out." LI coach Jeremy Wheeler said.

SHANE STEVENS

Lake Region, Soph., OF/P/3B

A versatile piece in the Rangers' nine, Stevens played outfield, third base and even picked up a win on the bump. The All-Capital first-team choice also shined at the plate. He hit a team-leading .509 with seven doubles, a pair of triples, a home run, 14 RBI and five stolen bases. "Shane never let his failures get him down he just continued to focus and learn from those mistakes. He's a joy to have on our team," said LR coach Shawn Perron.



TYLER HOLM

St. Johnsbury, Soph., SS Switching early in the season from

second base to shortstop, Holm turned into an All-Metro second-team shortstop. The Hilltopper also batted .346 with six RBI, five runs, four steals and three doubles. "Tyler is aggressive at the plate and on the bases. He generates plus bat speed," SJ coach John Lenzini said. "Defensively, he has good

range and a strong arm.'



DYLAN MILLER

Lyndon, Jr., 3B

The table-setter for a potent Lyndon lineup, Miller's speed and ability to make contact proved critical for the Vikings, who put together a 10-3-1 record in the regular season and earned the four seed in a tough Division II. The All-Capital first-team pick batted .417 with six doubles, 14 RBI and only three strikeouts. "Dylan was our leadoff batter that seemed to set the tone for us all year," LI coach Jeremy Wheeler said.



KARTER DEMING

White Mountains, Soph., P/SS

A breakout player for White Mountains, the Division III All-State second-team selection played a key role for the 14-3 Spartans, who reached the state tournament semifinals. The right-hander finished with a 2.03 ERA over 26 % innings, allowing just 12 hits and six earned runs. He averaged 1.43 Ks per innings and limited foes to a 136 batting average against. Splitting time at shortstop, Deming batted .384 with a pair of homers and 19 RBI.



TYLER RIVARD

Hazen, Soph., SS

A major presence in the middle of the lineup, the All-Mountain first-team selection batted .481 with a .563 on-base percentage for the Wildcats, who nearly picked off top-seeded Thetford in the Division III semifinals. Rivard had seven doubles and 20 RBI, but also had 15 steals and scored 22 runs. "Tyler is the leader offensively that you want. Calm, cool and collected battling every pitch," HU coach Spencer Howard said.




BRYCE GUNN

"A model student-athlete," North Country coach Jay Gonyaw said.





ZOE CROCKER

Danville, Jr., SS

A high-energy player and a stalwart shortstop, Crocker had a big junior campaign for Danville, which ran off 14 straight wins before rolling past Proctor to win the Division IV title. Crocker batted .380 and belted two grand slams among her three home runs. She also contributed a team-leading 31 RBI and 24 runs in the heart of the lineup while leading in defensive assists. "She had a heckuva year," DHS coach Paul Remick said. "She worked her butt off; a real good hitter."



KOREY CHAMPNEY

North Country, Sr., 3B

One of the NEK's premier athletes, the star hockey player was also prolific on the diamond. An All-Metro first-team choice, Champney commanded the hot corner and powered the offense in leading NC to the D-I quarterfinals. She finished with a .558 batting average to go along with two home runs, seven doubles and 16 RBI. "An absolute threat offensively, and carried the team all year with consistent play both offensively and defensively," Falcon coach Travis Bingham said.



CARLIE BELIVEAU

Danville, Sr., 2B

Consistent and aggressive out of the leadoff spot, the senior captain was a spark plug for a potent Danville lineup. She batted .420 with 33 runs scored and 20 stolen bases. She also added 18 RBI for Danville, which ended the season on a 14-game win streak, capped by a rout of Proctor to claim the Division IV championship. "A great kid and the leader of our team," Danville coach Paul Remick said. "When things didn't go our way, she picked the team up."



KELLEIGH SIMPSON

Lyndon, Sr., P

A force in the circle, the star pitcher powered the Vikings to the Division II state title while reeling in all of the individual awards: The Record's Player of the Year, Gatorade Vermont softball POY and Capital Division POY. She went 10-1 with 116 strikeouts and a 1.16 ERA in 72½ innings, including throwing the school's first perfect game among her three no-hitters. Simpson also hit .444 with four triples and 25 RBI. "Kelleigh made everyone around her better," LI coach Chris Carr said.



EMILY PREST

Woodsville, Sr., 3B

The New Hampshire Division IV Co-Player of the Year and the Granite State North POY, the power-hitting Prest had a monster senior season. She batted .500 (.561 OBP) with six home runs, 13 doubles, 37 RBI and a 1.000 slugging percentage. Prest also stole 23 bags and scored 43 runs for the Engineers, who brought home the program's first title since 2013. "Defensively she shut down other teams bunting against us," WHS coach Dana Huntington said.



ADRIANA LEMEIUX

St. Johnsbury, Jr., C

The sweet-swinging catcher turned in a rock-solid season, landing on the All-Metro second team while helping guide the Hilltoppers to 11 wins and the No. 6 seed in the Division I tournament. A powerful bat, Lemieux batted .384 with four home runs, six doubles and 15 RBI. She also crossed home 21 times, had nine steals, and added a .882 fielding percentage behind the plate. "Adriana consistently performs at the highest level," said St. J coach Jeremy Roberts.

She batted .362 with a pair of home runs, four doubles and 10 RBI while turning in a .886 fielding percentage for the Hilltoppers, who won 10 games and reached the Division I quarterfinals. She also added 22 runs and 11 steals. "Taylor's perseverance led to another strong season," coach Jeremy Roberts said.

Danville, CF, Sr.

had pop in her bat as the team's No. 2 hitter. The hard-hitting captain batted .480 with four HRs, two triples and 26 RBI. She also scored 29 runs for Danville, which after a season-opening loss, reeled off 14 straight wins en route to the Division IV championship. In the game with Proctor, Hale started an 8-2-1 double play that helped seal the crown. "She was a helluva outfielder," DHS coach Paul Remick said. "A leader. She worked hard."

North Country, Sr., C

A trusted center fielder, Hale also A sound, strong-armed defensive backstop, Pothier could also pound the ball at the plate. The All-Metro honorable mention pick helped the Falcons reach the D-I quarterfinals while batting .407 out of the leadoff spot. Pothier also hit four home runs, one coming in NC's first-round upset of Brattleboro. She also added two triples and three doubles. "Hailey is excellent behind the plate with a strong arm," Falcons coach Travis Bingham said.

Lyndon, Jr., CF

Priest's speed and overall play was crucial to the Vikings' stellar 15-1 record and their run to the Division II crown. Named a Capital Division first-team center fielder, the stalwart defender also wreaked havoc from the leadoff spot. She batted .472 with a .574 on-base percentage while tallying 17 RBI, 27 runs, 12 stolen bases and 13 walks. "Our leadoff hitter with constant contact, and speedy on the bases," LI coach Chris Carr said. "She covered a lot of ground in the outfield too."



DELANEY RANKIN

St. Johnsbury, Jr., P

An all-around standout, Rankin earned All-Metro second-team honors for the Hilltoppers, who won 11 games and nearly reached the D-I semifinals. The hard-throwing hurler posted a 7-3 record with a 3.68 ERA and a .909 fielding percentage. She was a tough out at the plate as well, with a .394 batting average, five HR and 21 RBI. She also scored 19 runs and stole 10 bases. "Delaney has a great passion

and understanding of the game,"

St. J coach Jeremy Roberts said.



MACKENZIE KINGSBURY

Woodsville, Jr., P/SS

Dominant on the mound and at-bat, Kingsbury starred on the diamond during the Engineers' Division IV championship season. In the circle, the Granite State North and All-State second-team pick went 17-1 with 155 strikeouts and 1.20 ERA in 81 innings pitched. As the cleanup hitter, she batted .627 (.695 OBP) with two home runs, 11 doubles, three triples and a whopping 43 RBI. "She was outstanding; she hit for power and average," WHS coach Dana Huntington said.

Littleton, Sr., F



their first state title since 2012.




