175 YEARS IN BUSINESS ...

Local Education In An Age Of Globalization

John Tyler was President. The country featured only 26 states. Its population was 17 million people.

It would be nearly 20 years before the Confederacy fired its first shot on Fort Sumter, igniting the American Civil War.

It was 1842, 175 years ago. And the private St. Johnsbury Academy, like The Citadel and The University of Notre Dame, opened for classes.

Consistency is the school's key to longevity, said Academy Headmaster Tom Lovett.

"Our mission has not changed much since 1842 in that we are dedicated to serving local youth, to teaching a comprehensive and relevant curriculum, to preparing hearts and characters as well as minds, and striving to form an educated, responsible and active citizenry empowered to lead the world's democracies," said Headmaster Tom Lovett.

The key to consistency is the school's private status, Lovett said. The school is managed by a board of directors and accepts tuition for local teenagers and for boarding students from abroad.

"Our independent governance ensures institutional stability, and our tradition of 'Those who go before take care of those to come after' has resulted in a very generous alumni body," Lovett said. "Our independent financing through entrepreneurial programs and other private funds has helped us stay in business even in tough times."

Despite rock-solid consistency, Academy educational focuses periodically shift. For example, the school under former Headmaster Bernier Mayo, who died last year, successfully enlarged its Advanced Placement offer-

Now, globalization is the word, Lovett said.

"What has changed within the last decade is our role in global education as a renowned international boarding school and as a partner with the founding of St. Johnsbury Academy Jeju, we have established a global presence and send students all over the world," Lovett said. "The Academy has always seen itself as an educational leader, and we continue to play a leading role among independent schools and in the educational landscape of New England."

St. Johnsbury Academy Jeju is on Jeju Province in South Korea. Academics aside, the Academy's benefit to St. Johnsbury is measurable by the dollar. The school in 2012 contracted economist Art Woolf for an impact assessment.

It determined that the Academy annually contributes more than \$700,000 to the community via volunteer efforts, facilities use, monetary contributions, and operation of the St. Johnsbury Recreation Department for only

150 YEARS IN BUSINESS ...

Past, Present & Future Of Education

LYNDON CENTER - This is a very big year for Lyndon Institute: 2017 marks the independent high school's sesquicentennial.

On Nov. 20 of 1867, LI's charter was signed. The LI community will be celebrating the anniversary all year, according to spokeswoman Gloria Bruce.

It was founded as The Lyndon Literary and Biblical Institution and was made up of clergymen of the Freewill Baptist denomination from around the area, along with other prominent citizens.

In its August 1870 catalog, the first term for the school, board with local families was advertised for \$3.25, including the use of a room and washing.

About 50 pupils were in attendance for the first term, according to the school's history.

The school hit financial trouble in 1881, when the fall term had to be suspended, leading to a Lyndon man Dudley Hall, Esq, creating the school's first endowment.

Two years later, Sumner Thompson bought the school for the liens upon it. He added a provision that the school be maintained on a non-sectarian basis; his conditions were accepted and the school opened in the fall of

T.N. Vail, a trustee for many years, and generous benefactor who managed the school, purchased property in the middle of the village and developed the campus between 1911 and 1915.

The school began its first baseball team in 1920, and in 1921, LI was the Vermont State Football Champions.

It was not until May 5, 1923 that the school legally changed its name to Lyndon Institute.

The campus served as home to the Lyndon Commercial College from 1886 and in 1910, Theodore Newton Vail, the first president of New England Telephone Company and the American Telephone and Telegraph Company (AT&T) founded the Vermont School of Agriculture on the campus.

Vail served on the Board of Trustees for twenty years. As chairman, he saved the institution from financial ruin in 1912.

Elmer Darling also served as president of the Lyndon Institute's Board of Trustees.

When the Institute's main building was completely destroyed by fire in 1922, Darling led a successful campaign to raise funds to replace the building.

In 1923, the school was officially renamed Lyndon In-

From 1923 to 1951, the Institute provided both secondary and post-secondary educational programs to area students. In 1951, the post-secondary programs moved to the newly founded Lyndon State College.

In 1931, local benefactor Elmer Darling died and left two funds to the school, one in memory of his sister Louise, the other in memory of his brother, Scott.

The school has long seen investment from local citizens, and has flourished because of its community support, while it has also





180 YEARS IN BUSINESS...

The Caledonian-Record Remains Independent

ST. JOHNSBURY — On Aug. 8, 2017, The Caledonian-Record will celebrate the 180th anniversary of its first printing.

First, some history In 180 years, the Caledonian has had only nine editor/publish-

Albert G. Chadwick began the newspaper as a weekly called the St. Johnsbury Caledonian. Under Chadwick's editorship, the masthead on every edition read: "Here shall the Press the People's rights maintain, Unawed by the influence and unbribed by gain; Here patriot Truth her glorious precepts draw, Pledged to Religion, Liberty and Law.'

From 1855 to 1910, the Stone family owned the newspaper under editors Charles M. Stone and his son Arthur Stone. Walter J. Bigelow purchased the paper in 1910 and held it until 1918 when he sold it to William Dudley Pelley. Under Bigelow, on Sept. 6, 1918 the paper became a daily. Pelley was at the helm for only a year before turning it over to Herbert A. Smith.

Smith also purchased the Barton Record and 1919 marked the merging of the St. Johnsbury Caledonian and Barton Record into the Caledonian-Record.

The paper has remained in the Smith family for the past 93 years under the leadership of four publishers: Herbert A. Smith, Herbert G. Smith, Mark Smith, and present publisher, Todd Smith.

The current location on Federal Street in St. Johnsbury was built in 1949. Mark Smith remembers Labor Day weekend of that year when they moved from their location at the corner of Eastern Avenue and Main Street. "They went to press early Saturday morning [on Main Street], then immediately started ripping everything down and went to press Tuesday at 6 p.m. with the same equipment

[on Federal Street]. A family affair

Both Mark Smith and Todd Smith began their newspaper careers before most of us knew what a career was.

"I was born into it," said Mark Smith. "The morning my mother went into labor and called my father, he said he'd be home after they went to press that evening." His father did get home in time to get her to the hospital and Mark began his first paper delivery route at 8 years old.

Todd Smith has memories of stuffing inserts into newspapers at age five. "I got a penny a paper. When my dad left the room, the pressmen would stuff a bunch of papers and put them on my pile so that when my dad came back, I was surrounded by huge stacks of papers." The line between family dinner and family business was also blurred. "We had public policy debate-style meals. I definitely think there's something to growing up in a newspaper family and being connected to the community."

Both men grew up learning a particular work ethic. "My father's attitude was don't expect anybody to do anything you haven't done and that you don't know how to do," said Mark. Both Mark and Todd worked their way up through the various departments, learning each of the tasks that goes into

creating a complete newspaper. The intersection of technology and theory

The work ethic has never changed, but the way they get work done has changed significantly in the last 25 years.

"Technology totally changed how we do things ... A newspaper is a tangible object and less than a decade from now people won't have a need for that," said Todd. "But in a democratic society there has to be a future for objective

third party content providers." His father Mark agrees. "Newspapers have a future, but you have to adapt from the concept of newspaper to being an information provider and get customers to recognize the importance of local information." He notes that while the younger generation wants things in digital format, that's simply a change in the method of delivery.

"It bothers me no end that politicians would love to see the death of the newspaper. There'd be no one there to challenge what they're doing. That's being done by local newspapers and television stations. When someone stands up and challenges their right to go into executive session, who do you think that is?"

The march of technology affected how quickly the younger Smith came to the helm, according to the more responsibility much quicker gy poses." than I got from my father," said

Mark. "It's because we went from one generation to the next with very few changes in technology. Now there are technology changes that I can't keep pace with."

"It's pretty unusual to be my age and running a daily newspaper network," Todd added. "That only happens in a family newspaper."

An independent local source When asked how the newspaper stays truly independent in a local community, Mark pulls out 1967 and 1994 police log clippings that he keeps in his desk. They chronicle his and Todd's own youthful brushes with the law. Do you really think that if we don't protect members of our own family that we're going to keep something

else out of the paper? he mused. "The only thing we have to sell is that we're honest about what we do and we play no favorites. It doesn't matter if you don't buy a paper or you're our biggest advertiser. Our integrity is our only guarantee."

As people transition from getting their news on newsprint to screens, Todd is confident that the Caledonian-Record suite of papers can stay ahead of the curve. "The future will be an amalgamation of different end use receivers: phone, tablet, desktop, streaming on your television set, or a technology we don't know yet. We're going to be there. 

Vianor Spells Customer Service

The Vianor Tire & Service Center on 1836 Memorial Drive in St. Johnsbury Center has long been changing tires and performing vehicle maintenance at its tire showroom and repair shop facility next to the Green Mountain Mall.

Store manager Kip Doyon says it's no mystery what the main ingredient and winning formula are.

"Customer service," said Doyon while the mechanical sound of high speed wrenches whir in the nearby service bays. "That's the first priority. Good service generates repeat business."

He then moves to work the counter in the tire showroom section of the building which stands out as a landmark along Route 5 due to it's distinctive curved facade. It includes a customer waiting area and extensive displays of tires and other products used by Vianor. Doyon moves fast in processing paperwork and dealing with a customers.

"Don't worry about it," he tells one customer with a billing question. "We will get that figured out."

During a break in the action Doyon says it's important that the focus on customer service extends beyond him to all five of his employees. He says it's doubly important when things don't go as expected, because sometimes those situations can present important opportunities to build on the store's relationship with its customers.

"If you turn something negative into a positive and they trust you then the rest of the business of takes care of itself," said Doyon.

Doyon said Vianor bought the store from Goss Tire about a decade ago. He has been store manager for six years after transferring in from the Vianor Store in Montpelier. The St. Johnsbury location has four technicians that operate out of the service bays in the back of the building, which is located between the Green Mountain Mall and the Center Tower gas station on

"We supply tires to all makes and models of vehi-

cles," said Doyon. "We provide the service that customers want. We try to do a full maintenance service shop as well. But preventive measures are one of our big focuses. Brakes suspension - routine stuff, like oil changes as well as changing a head-light bulb. Any major stuff - it's based on the comfort of the technician. We try to be a one-stop shop and fulfill what the customers' needs are."

Doyon is a Kingdom guy who grew up in Woodbury and has lived in Walden since the 1980s. He worked his way up from tire technician to mechanic to shop foreman then to assistant manager and finally

Doyon said he tells his employees that creating customer satisfaction is a goal everyone has to be working toward together.

"One thing I always try to stress is the customer is coming here for the service, so as an individual you represent not only the company but yourself," said Doyon. "Remember to treat the customer the way you'd like to be treated and things will work both ways."

According to the company's web site, Vianor Tire & Auto Service sells and installs snow tires, all-weather and all-season tires from manufacturers like Nokian Tyres, Bridgestone, and Firestone at over 1,400 stores in 27 countries.

Their service centers offer everything from performing factory scheduled maintenance, oil changes, suspension work, air conditioner service and transmission flushing to cooling system maintenance, exhaust repair, brake repair and computerized alignments.

Vianor is owned by the Finnish company Nokian Tyres which has company-owned and franchise outlets around the world in countries such as Switzerland, Russia, Norway, Finland and Sweden. Its 12 stores in the United States are located in Vermont, New Hampshire, New York and Massachusetts.

Vianor stores can be found in countries including Ukraine, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Kazakhstan, Armenia, Moldova, Georgia, Belarus, Poland, Germany, Czech Republic, Slovakia and Bulgaria.





110 YEARS IN BUSINESS ...

Community Involvement Helps Littleton Regional Hospital Thrive

Littleton Regional Healthcare has grown a lot in 110 years.

But it remains true to its roots.

"What you're really doing at a small community hospital [is] taking care of your friends, your loved ones, and your neighbors," said Warren West, LRH past president from 2006 to 2015.

Littleton Regional might be small when compared to medical facilities elsewhere, but it makes a big impact in the North Country.

LRH now employs about 525, pays about \$37 million in annual salaries and wages, and contributes an estimated \$74 million to the local economy each year.

Beyond its economic impact, LRH is the North Country's care center, where babies are born and adults are screened for wellness, where injuries are diagnosed and diseases are treated.

In 2016, Littleton Regional admitted 1,900 patients and had 10,780 emergency room visits, with private practices on the LRH campus reporting an additional 72,000 patient visits.

Those numbers reflect growth at Littleton Re-

The hospital began on Cottage Street, where it was located from 1907 to 2001, growing from a small 15-bed facility to a 64-bed complex with a maternity ward, operating room, laboratory, pharmacy, radiology and emergency departments, and

Toward the end of the 20th century, LRH had outgrown the old hospital building. So a new hos-

pital was built. Littleton Regional moved into a state-of-the-art

174,000 square foot facility at 600 St. Johnsbury Road on Jan. 25, 2001. A three-story, 63,000 square foot Medical Of-

fice Building was added in 2010. One-hundred-and-ten years after it began, Littleton Regional has become the area's health care hub, offering a wide range of inpatient and outpatient services, with nearly 20 private practices

In 2012 the organization changed its name, from Littleton Regional Hospital to Littleton Regional Healthcare, to reflect its transformation into something more than a place where the ill and injured seek treatment. Today LRH is also focused on wellness, healthy living and preventative measures.

"We help to be a partner in their health now, as opposed to them just coming when they're sick,"

"We've gone from taking care of an illness after it happens, and taking care of the immediate impact, to being part of a person's life and keeping them well and happy," said current LRH president Nick Braccino.

Moving forward LRH has entered into a four-hospital regional partnership, North Coun-

try Healthcare, in order to tackle the economic challenges of rural health care in northern New Hampshire.

In 2016 four hospitals — Androscoggin Valley Hospital in Berlin, Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital in Colebrook, Weeks Medical Center in Lancaster and LRH — entered into a four-year partnership to consolidate administration and purchasing costs in order to bring down health care costs and health insurance premiums.

It was a necessary step for LRH which saw its operating margin shrink from \$2.8 million in fiscal year 2006 to \$104,000 in 2016.

"By putting the four hospitals together, you have a lot larger population that can deal better with the funding mechanisms that are available in health care," said West, now CEO of North Country Healthcare.

"The environment continues to change and we can't survive on our own, so we've joined our forces with the three other North Country hospitals, to make sure we position ourselves to continue to be financially viable."

LRH is also looking to partner with local home health agencies and federally qualified health clinics (Ammonoosuc Community Health Services and Indian Stream) to streamline and improve health care.

Those efforts represent change.

But one constant at Littleton Regional is the auxiliary, which has been around since the beginning, and which in recent years has provided nearly \$30,000 annually to support numerous programs, services and scholarships.

Another constant is the hospital's volunteers, who currently number around 250, and include greeters, shredders, patient visitations, and various types of alternative therapies including art, music and dog therapy.

"They are an indicator of community involvement," West said.

So how is LRH doing at 110? Great, according to Braccino.

One measure of how great, he said, is patient feedback.

He said patients consistently gave the hospital high marks for its quality of care. And one recent patient stood out.

"About two weeks ago, I had a retired New York first responder to [the Sept. 11 terror attacks], a policeman, come in and he felt so great about the care he received, he had to tell somebody about the doctor he saw, the way he was treated, about all the nurses, even the housekeeper," Braccino said. "He said 'I've seen it all and I've never seen a place like this, and I just had to tell you about

It was a heartwarming story, Braccino said. And after 110 years it proves that Littleton Regional — no matter how much it grows or changes remains true to its founding principles.

Said Braccino, "To me it's about caring for peo-



95 YEARS IN BUSINESS ...

Work, Winter & the Wild Outdoors

For nearly a century, Caplan's Army Store has been where the Northeast Kingdom gears up for work, winter and the wild outdoors.

Need hiking boots? Go to Caplans. Need hip waders? Go to Caplans. Need work pants? Go to Caplans. Need to stay warm, dry, and comfortable in any conditions?

Well, you get the idea.

Founded by second-generation Lithuanian immigrant Abraham "Al" Caplan in 1922, the store was born out of the family business: Buying military surplus in Plattsburg, New York, and then selling it on barnstorming tours of the northeastern United States.

St. Johnsbury had been a particularly successful stop — so successful, in fact, that Al gave up barnstorming and opened a store.

The business (originally called the U.S. Army Surplus Store) began on Eastern Avenue and relocated twice along Railroad Street, once in 1933 and again to the current location in 1946.

There were tragedies along the way.

Al's wife died in the early 1930s and his 19-yearold son, Myron, was killed while serving with the U.S. Marine Corps at the Battle of Iwo Jima in 1945.

A year later, in 1946, the second Caplan's location (a shared space with an IGA supermarket) burned to

the ground. But the business survived.

After the fire, Caplan's moved into its existing location, built on land owned by Al.

Nine years later, in 1955, Al was stricken with tuberculosis and his other son, David, returned to take over the business.

David was raised in the store. "It used to be my playground, I'd come down, run through the aisles, and hide downstairs," he said. He was in his third year of a business degree program at American International College in Springfield, Mass., when he

David was a two-sport athlete at St. Johnsbury

Academy, playing football in the fall and outdoor track in the spring, but during the winter, he said, "I didn't do much because my father wanted me in

Now 83, he continues to run Caplans and remains involved in its day-to-day operations.

Working alongside him is store manager Gary Ely,

who has worked there for nearly as long — 63 years. "I love this store, I love the customers, I can hardly wait to get here in the morning and hate to leave at night," said Gary, 79. "I'd rather be here than home.

I don't know if that's a good thing." Over the years the store has weathered many storms: economic recessions, a decline in hunters, and increased competition from the Internet and big

In response Caplan's has focused on providing superior customer service and offering high-quality warm, weatherproof and rugged clothing and foot-

wear for work and play. "It's been a struggle but we're still here," David said. "It is getting more difficult with all the online buyers and we have Wal-Marts on three sides of us,

it's not as easy as it was.' Added Gary, "We probably try to work harder and serve the customer. We're battling the Internet and different things so we do alterations, extra services for people, and people appreciate that."

"I remember in 1961 or 1962, when Ames opened its second store in St. J, those were the original discount stores, we just sidestepped and carried something they didn't carry, the higher quality items, and you have a following of people that want a higher quality."

So what's the secret to maintaining a business for 95 years?

Hard work, for one thing.

And the ability to adapt to any circumstances,

'You just kind of roll with the punches," Gary said. "We think we'll be successful this year. We have to buy a month in advance and hope the economy stays stable. But we've rode with the waves for quite a long time."





The Goulets have been recognized by local newspapers before, and are bemused that they are still operating much as they have been.

Some people still remember the company's days as a Chevrolet dealership, but that ended six years ago. They don't have to carry a line of vehicles on the property, because they source what they need for customers online.

PEACHAM - The Berwick Agency, a second-generation local insurance company, is marking its 60th year of serving the community this year.

Jeff Berwick bought the family business from his father, Francis, in 2005, he said.



ducer" status.

President Maurice Chaloux, with 45 years of experience, warns that the current buyers' market and low interest rates probably won't last much longer. "Buyers have to act quickly or they will lose out," he said. "Real estate interest rates are still so low, it's ridiculous. I thought back in the 1980s, if interest rates were under 10 percent, we'd be golden," Chaloux added with a laugh.

While he described current real estate sales trends as an urban recovery, rural local areas will soon be experiencing the same uptick, he noted. The market entered a buyers' market in 2009 following the last major economic downturn.

Indications of a price rebound have already begun in some places like Danville and Burke where good news about the ski area continues. Property on lakes like Harvey's in West Barnet and Joe's Pond in West Danville have continued to hold their own, even as other existing homes have taken big hits during the 2002-2008 period when buyers needed to sell them, Chaloux noted.

A graduate of St. Johnsbury Academy and Lyndon State College where he earned a business administration degree, he has served local communities as a lister, moderator, selectman, a House representative for St. Johnsbury and as president of the Northeast Kingdom Board of Realtors since 1984.

Chaloux is joined at Parkway Realty Associates by Patricia Emery with more than 40 years of experience and Danica Rolfe, who is a third generation real estate agent with 11 years at Parkway. The realty, founded by Realtor Ernie Begin in 1967, has operated under different names. It became Parkway, named for the big neon sign in front of the rooming house in St. Johnsbury where its first office was located, Chaloux said, explaining Emery is also an owner of

"It's definitely better than it was," said Emery of the real estate market from her viewpoint as office manager of the Lyndonville office. "One thing I am really excited about is that snowmobilers are back in the market. We haven't seen that since 2005, and they are more affluent so they're not buying camps."

Land sales are still slow. There really is more value in existing housing than building new, because of the cost of building supplies, she said. In the Lyndonville office, there is a strong market for second

"It doesn't hurt that the United States Ski Team is here," she said. "That's a reason to be optimistic."

The part of being a real estate agent that Danica Rolfe likes best is the daily variety. She lives in Kirby but grew up in Lyndonville.

"It's fun to help people search for their dream house or crunch numbers for them to find the perfect investment opportunity," she said. "It was really fun in 2005 but by 2008-2009, it was not fun anymore that's when the bubble burst. But, now there are some rays of hope. In 2016 there's been a little more activity."

Chaloux said his office was the first in the region to join the Multiple Listing Service (MLS). He has also developed an extensive direct mail program, ads in the local newspaper and regular publications, plus developing a personal web site and relocation booklet that all contribute to Parkway's reputation





NVRH Shares Birthday With Valentines Day

Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital (NVRH) has come a long way since it admitted its first patient on Valentine's Day, 1972.

45 years later, NVRH sits at the center of its own little medical city on Hospital Hill in St. Johnsbury, treating thousands of patients each year and employing over 500 workers including doctors, nurses, specialists, staff and support personnel.

According to "A History of Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital" by Robert B. Michaud, the first patient was Lyndonville resident Jane Aubin who had been admitted to the Brightlook Hospital Special Care Unit (SCU) on Summer Street two days before NVRH opened.

When moving day came Aubin was the first to be transferred.

"With the help of the nurses of the Brightlook SCU, accommodations for Miss Aubin were made to avoid discomfort of detaching monitoring equipment in a move of hospital locations. The NVRH SCU and all it's equipment was in place and ready for an early move into it."

Two weeks earlier a crowd estimated at 5,000 had showed up for the official NVRH dedication attended by then-Vermont Gov. Deane Davis and tours of the gleaming new medical center.

NVRH was built to consolidate the town's two hospitals - Brightlook and the former St. Johnsbury Hospital on Prospect Street. Construction took nearly two years and was paid for by over \$800,000 in local fundraising, federal grants and loans.

Since that time, NVRH has grown with the medical needs of its community

Today, it's an acute care, critical access hospital, and one of two Vermont hospitals designated as a "Baby Friendly" hospital by the United Nations. It provides primary and preventive care, surgical and specialty services, inpatient and outpatient care and 24-hour, physician staffed emergency services.

Its presence has also driven a medical cottage industry that has risen up around it and into what has become an entire campus dedicated to public health.

NVRH has grown to include The Fresenius Dialysis Center, the Norris Cotton Cancer Center-North, and the Northern Vermont Center for Sleep Disorders. It's also branched out to operate several other family care centers in Caledonia County including St. Johnsbury Pediatrics, Kingdom Internal Medicine, Corner Medical in Lyndon and the Women's

The Hospital Hill area now includes The St. Johnsbury Health & Rehabilitation Center, the CALEX Ambulance Emergency Services building and numerous physician and medical professional offices.

In the last several years alone NVRH has devel-

oped a new Day Surgery center, a business and conference center, as well as many other upgrades in medical technology.

"With changing technology and changing people and changing expertise you gotta keep up to date and more than up to date," said NVRH Chief Executive Officer Paul Bengtson. "I'm always a believer you gotta be sort of out in front of a lot of this stuff. We've just had to accommodate and to think and plan strategically over the years."

Bengston says the next challenge NVRH will face are changing demographics in Vermont that will increase patient needs and stretch the supply of primary care doctors.

"The next thing over the next five years is replacing people who are retiring - not just in the Northeast Kingdom but all over Vermont Because Vermont's population is predicted to be flat over the next 15 years - with sharp growth in the over-65 population...the population is gonna be flat but the demand for physicians is actually going to increase over what

Bengston says NVRH has already been investing in trying to grow its own workforce by supporting nursing programs through the Vermont State Colleges. Bengtson says NVRH invests about \$100,000 a year into the nursing program and he's hoping to find a similar program to develop primary care phy-

"I've tried and I'll continued to try to build some creative ideas in this area to start producing our own physicians," said Bengston. "We have demographic issues, we have work force issues, the technology issues. We'll just have to keep learning."





40 YEARS IN BUSINESS ...

Chimney Sweep II Helps Heat The Region

Peter L'Esperance of Walden has the 1970s-oil crisis to thank for his career.

He co-owns Chimney Sweep II in Barre and The Chimney Sweep in Shelburne. L'Esperance manages the Barre store, and his brother manages the Shel-

The Barre store is turning 40-years old. It is beside McDonald's on the Barre-Montpelier Road.

L'Esperance maintains myriad customers in Caledonia County and the Northeast Kingdom.

"We do a lot of business up there," he said. "You have to have a big territory in this business because the product lasts for 25 years."

The company's name is a misnomer. It does not sweep chimneys, but instead sells and installs woodstoves, gas stoves, and fireplace inserts, along with items like grills from companies including Vermont Castings and appliances from Heartland.

L'Esperance followed his brother into the business. His brother established The Chimney Sweep Shop in Chittenden County in 1973.

"He was qualified to be an English teacher but after college there weren't any jobs," L'Esperance said. The oil crisis quickly arrived. Demand for wood-

stoves skyrocketed. L'Esperance skipped college to join his brother in

"I got into the business putting fireplace doors in at first, and then I took them off during the oil embargo," L'Esperance said.

He quickly gained an ownership stake in the company. The endeavor soon developed into Chimney Sweep II in Barre.

L'Esperance, besides the business' misleading name, has no regrets. He likes the work.

"I've always enjoyed chatting with people," he said. "And we help people install items right. It takes a lot of knowledge.

New technology is fascinating to him as well. Recent EPA-pollution regulations have totally rewritten heating equipment.


For example, old-school woodstoves emit 50-100 grams of smoke per hour, L'Esperance said. Modern EPA-certified woodstoves emit less than 5 grams per hour, he said.


"We're now replacing a lot of the old technology," he said. "With the new stoves you don't see any smoke except maybe a puff when they're started because they re-burn the gasses. They don't make hardly any creosote. You also burn 25 percent less wood." Even stricter pollution standards are expected in 2020, L'Esperance said.

To incentivize traditional-woodstove owners to upgrade, the state of Vermont is offering a rebate program that can result in up to \$1,000 in savings off a new model. Heating dealers handle the paperwork and discount the purchase price accordingly.

Chimney Sweep II sells a 50-50 mix of woodstoves and gas stoves, L'Esperance said. Gas was particularly hot last year because of low fuel prices. The store features more than 2,000-square feet,

and crackling stove displays. "It's nice and toasty in here," L'Esperance said.

Center Tower Features Service In St. Johnsbury Center

Center Tower is more than a gas station and convenience store.

It's also a landmark that has stood for 25 years over St. Johnsbury Center.

The ground floor of the three-level building houses the store. The upper levels are the offices of Center Tower owners Jim and Lorraine Impey - who built Center Tower in 1992 along Route 5 just south of the Green Mountain Mail.

"We wanted an office up and out of the way," said Lorraine Impey,

"We didn't want it in the same floor," said Jim Impey. "We wanted it so you could look down and see everything. So that created another floor and we didn't want to make it all second story so that's kind

of how it came about." 25 years later Center Tower remains as an anchor in the St. Johnsbury Center business community and as one of the few independent family-owned and operated gas stations in the

In addition to a store packed with merchandise and a full deli and dining area, the Center Tower complex also features Irving brand gas pumps outside and the "Mr. Suds" car wash in back. The Impeys also operate a storage business on-site under the name "Center Storage." The newest addition to the Center Tower array of services is a high-speed diesel fuel island.

The store is a major destination for workers at the St. Johnsbury-Lyndon Industrial park and other businesses and manufacturing facilities on the north side of town.

"We get NSA, Northeast Precision, Twin State Electric, UPS," said Lorraine Impey.

"[There's] traffic back and forth to the industrial park. People either traveling to work that way or coming back," said Jim Impey.

The Impeys own the real estate development company Impey Real Estate - which owns multiple properties in the area. The Impeys have been involved with and owned multiple businesses over the years including Center Tower.

Both have deep local roots.

Jim Impey went to St. Johnsbury Academy and is now a SJA trustee. Lorraine Impey went to Lyndon Institute where she now serves as a corporator.

They met skiing at Burke Mountain and, in addition to building on their various business interests, they've raised four kids.

The Impeys started by buying a building on Portland Street that was later the home of the St. Johns-

bury Food Coop. Then they kept building their business and, until recently, owned the Horizon's Deli property on Railroad Street - which they have since sold to St. Johnsbury businessman Ed Poginy.

The Impeys already owned the Center Tower property when they decided to build the Center Tower Building. They had already been operating the original Mr. Suds car wash there when they redeveloped the site.

It made sense at the time because business was booming at the Green Mountain Mall and at other businesses in the St. Johnsbury Center.

But it wasn't actually their

the "Party Tyme" store. The property was owned by the Impeys and the store was Gilding's.

Jim Impey said Gilding wanted to expand to the north side of town and convinced him and his wife to build the store that would become Center Tower.

But Gilding's interest would not last, leaving the Impeys as unexpected store keepers by the end of the project.

"He wanted to run a place up here," said Jim Impey with a laugh. "He talked us into it and then he got cold feet at the end."

Until 2014 the Impeys also owned and operated

another St. Johnsbury gas station - Western Avenue Station on Western Avenue - which offered full-service gas. That full service is now being offered at Center Tower twice a week from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The Center Tower store also features its now-famous Prize Wheel which customers who spend more than \$5.00 can spin to win prizes.

The Mr. Suds car wash behind the store features both a touch-less automatic car wash, as well as two self-service wash bays that are open daily, as well as a vehicle vacuum stations.





Finding Buyers For Seller's Stuff

LISBON - The Ammonoosuc River Auction Co., a business that does antique, estate, real estate, and farm auctions, is celebrating 15 years. The business was born of the passion of its founder, Mike Carver.

"When I was a kid, I worked part-time for an auction company down near Cape Cod," said Carver, who runs the company with his wife, Jan Carver. "I've also been dabbling in antiques for well over 30 years. The auction business is a passion I wanted to start for several years."

He took the retail route first, getting his name out there and then moving on to auctions.

Licensed in Vermont and New Hampshire, Carver is a graduate of the Mendenhall School of Auctioneering in North Carolina.

"I thought they were wonderful," he said. "They give a good base training for auctions, then I started doing them."

He headquarters his business on his Lisbon property, which includes a fully renovated and heated three-story barn, one that was "just a shell" when he bought it but began to take shape after 465 sheets of drywall and ample insulation.

Carver's full-service auction company also does machinery auctions, business liquidations, and estate and insurance appraisals as well as marketing that advertises auctions and other appraisal services specializing in antiques, collectibles, and decorative

Since he opened, he's done at least two auctions a month, and sometimes four or five in one month. Auctions tend to last four to five hours, though an

entire estate can take six or seven hours. He auctions on site and also conducts them in his barn, and he's done everything from antiques to

"You just never know what you're going to find,"

An Indian basket made of porcupine quills, not much larger than a softball, once sold for about

This past spring, he auctioned a grandfather clock, dated to 1810, with a model frigate ship in its face. "When I dropped the hammer, it sold for \$9,000,"

The painted face was on brass and the body made of solid cherry. "It was a nice clock," said Carver. "It has been in the Astle family from Whitefield for-

A William and Mary breakfront bookcase from Pennsylvania from about 1730 that was owned by Alexander Todd, grandfather to Mary Todd Todd, President Abraham Lincoln's wife, fetched \$10,000.

It had glass doors up top and tombstone panels and had been in the family for generations, said

"There isn't much I haven't sold," he said. He jokingly refers to himself as "the equalizer," and there's more than a bit of truth to it.

"I just love it," he said. "I represent the seller, not the buyer, and my objective is to get as much as I can for the seller. I can't control the market, but can sway it in my direction, which is nice. Knowledge is power in this business ... If I don't know what it is, I will know before it goes on the block. Every once in a while you get something you've never seen

He also does appraisal work for attorneys, and has been doing more as the Baby Boomer generation comes of age and passes away.

His work takes him all over Vermont, as far north as Newport, and New Hampshire, and Carver said, "I've hauled stuff as far south as Pittsburg, Chicago and New Jersey. I'll go anywhere if the work war-

He is also a collector, appraiser, buyer, seller and auctioneer of antiques and home accessories, specializing in 18th- and 19th-century American furni-

"I'm a collector myself and love the Federal furniture period, from 1800 to 1810," he said.

Though a small company, Carver said his business telephone rings seven days a week. It's a sign, he said, that after a decade and a half he has a business that is working.

"One of my favorite lines is a third [of auctioned items] will go high, a third low, and a third right in the middle, where it's supposed to be," he said.

It's crucial in his business to be honest with peoole and it's a nice feeling when he can deliver them a good check, he said.

"I want to do people justice and do a good job for them," said Carver. "That's been my thing my whole life.'

Day & Night Service For Truckers

So your big rig went off the road in the middle of a stormy winter night and you need help?

Don't worry - Dennis Bouffard has you covered. "It's the people part I love," he said. "It's helping people, and I like being able to help.'

Bouffard, a former state trooper turned trucker, and his wife, Kathy, run Lyndon Truck Center, a 24/7 emergency commercial towing, recovery and repair business that celebrates 10 years in 2017.

One word could describe its trajectory - growth. "In April 2007, I rented the place in Lyndonville

and started my business," he said. "It was touch-andgo for a few months, but then things started picking up and we never looked back."

The native of Newport, Vermont, had been a Vermont State Police trooper until 1981, when he left to follow his passion for trucking.

"It was a toss up between trucking and the state police," he said.

He chose trucking, and did it for 28 years, running his own rigs. But he always had a desire to open a

At one time, he had up to 17 trucks and several employees, but in 1995 cut back on his business and resumed trucking by himself, hauling heavy equipment for the military and for Caterpillar Inc., the construction machinery and equipment company.

In addition to 24/7 emergency commercial truck towing, recovery services and emergency roadside repair, he offers local and long-distance commercial towing, A/C charging and repair, pickup and commercial truck tires, Minimizer fenders, and safety products, and is a dealer for ALEXRIMS forged aluminum wheels.

Bouffard also runs a licensed Vermont state inspection facility and a federal truck and trailer inspection station.

When Lyndon Truck Center was first opened, the initial months were slow because not many people knew he was there. Fortunately, the Great Recession that would hit later that year had little impact.

"By September, we were in full bloom," said Bouffard. "By the following March, we were looking for help. We've had steady, non-stop growth for 10 years

Last winter, though, was a challenge because of essentially no snow.

"Everybody suffered through that," he said.

But the future looks bright, and Bouffard and his five employees remain busy with 24/7 service calls, emergency road work, towing, accident recovery, and breakdowns as well as general repairs and maintenance in a facility that is open six days a week.

In January 2016, he opened a second location, a parts store at 1838 Memorial Drive in St. Johnsbury,

where he also makes repairs and has a warehouse. His Lyndonville location is at 83 Hemlock Lane.

Between the two stores, he has five truck bays as well as a mobile service shop and a couple of shop

Bouffard also has a wrecker in each location, two Freightliners, one 30 tons, the other 50 tons.

One wrecker bears the battle scars that sometimes come with the job.

"I've got one in the hospital now," said Bouffard. We recovered a rig in Lyndonville last week and it got away from us and went down a bank."

Some mornings he rises early, such as at 4:30 a.m. on the day of the interview for this story.

"We don't get to pick our times when we go out," said Bouffard. "People are out there in the bad weather so we have to be, too."

Some calls are seasonal, and the volume depends on the season.

"In the summertime, we'll do six or eight a week, mostly breakdowns," he said. "In the winter, it's not uncommon to do six or eight a day."

Accidents have tapered off greatly in the past two decades, in large part because of the push for driver safety education and better equipment, he said. Other than inclement weather, accidents are mostly few and far between, he said.

Bouffard estimates his customer base in the hundreds, and his business is not limited solely to the Northeast Kingdom.

"We work for companies all over the country and Canada," he said. "We have 14 fleets in Canada we

While business is good, Bouffard is not resting on his laurels.

Having recently established a second location, Bouffard is already looking at another expansion.

"We'll go wherever the business takes us," he said.

And the business has a ways to go yet. "I may be old and crusty, but I ain't stopping until I

die," he said. "At my age, it's not about money. I enjoy what I'm doing. I have good people working for me and have a good customer base and love working with people. And I love the challenge. It's my reason to get out of bed every morning."



WELLS RIVER - Lee Foster spent many years in the ATV business and had just about retired.

But about a decade ago, a friend of his sold one business with a plan to open one like Foster's.

"He asked me about it, one thing led to another, and we ended up going into business together," said Foster, owner-president of Absolute Powersports, which sells a wide range of ATVs and tractors for work and play. "Now we have two stores."

That friend, Jim Tees, runs the store in Gorham, New Hampshire, and Foster runs the one in Wells

The Vermont store has seen good times since it opened in June 2007.

"We've added a lot of product here and I think we probably have four times what we started out with," said Foster. "We've added tractors and different manufacturers, so we have quite an array of stuff to sell."

The business was born when he bought out a Polaris dealer in Groton who was going out of business. "We bought this building and renovated it and

moved it here next to the highway," he said.

He launched it at a dicey time - at the start of the Great Recession.

"We started relatively small and so didn't have as much exposure as the existing businesses," said Foster. "We weathered it fairly well and we've increased every year by adding different products. This past year has probably been a little slower for us, because of the election."

The shop that is located at 70 Industrial Park Road, at the Junction of Route 302 and Interstate 91's Exit 17, sells and services Polaris and Ski-Doo snowmobiles, Polaris ATVs and Rangers, Can-Am Commanders and Mavericks, CFMOTO Side-by-Sides and ATVs, Slingshots, RZRs, and Rangers.

Absolute Powersports also carries Mission utility trailers for customers to haul machines, toys and

The store also carries Yanmar compact tractors and has added Mahindra, the world's best-selling

The business website sums it up: "We look forward to becoming the absolute best place for you and your family's powersports needs. We have the ability to meet all of your powersports needs and dreams year-round."

In addition to new products, pre-owned inventory is available.

Customers, too, can take advantage of factory pro-

Foster said his customer base runs the gamut and includes local residents as well as people coming up on the weekends, some with second homes and from states as far away as Connecticut, New York and New Jersey, seeking recreation.

"It's surprising how many people travel here to play in the North Country," he said.

Technology has also boosted some sales.

"With the Internet, we have business from far away that you probably wouldn't normally have in days past," said Foster.

The business, which is open six days a week except for Sunday, employs a staff of seven. Foster's wife, Deb, runs the office.

Foster said Absolute Powersports is not likely to expand, at least not any time soon.

"I think it will stay this size for now and we'll see how everything shakes out in the next year or two and decide what to do from there," he said.

"Everything we sell is motorized," he said. "We have everything for what you want to do outdoors."
