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
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



MANCHESTER — Derek Walker received his diploma in the morning.

He raised a trophy in the afternoon.

In his final high school outing, Walker pitched a complete-game two-hitter, leading No. 2 Littleton over No. 4 Newmarket 3-1 in the Division IV championship at Northeast Delta Dental Stadium on Saturday.

Walker struck out two and walked three, guiding Littleton (17-2) to its second title in three years, and fourth in 11 finals appearances.

It was a perfect ending for Littleton's six seniors, including Walker, who started as sophomores on the 2016 championship team.



A lot of talent, not a lot of spots: exclusivity remains a key feature of our All-Area soccer team. Never an easy process, we've trimmed our list to 12 players, based on merit and regardless of position. In no particular order, we present The Record's 2017 Girls Soccer Dream Dozen.



### **ADDISON COOK**

North Country, Soph., GK

The All-Capital first-team goaltender posted an 8-6 record with six shutout wins, 78 saves, and 20 goals allowed (1.43 GAA). A third of those goals came in a second-round playoff loss to CVU. After missing two games with injury, she allowed just six goals over the next 10 games, including a firstround win over Middlebury (NCU's first playoff win since 2008).

### **ZEKIAH LEWIS**

St. Johnsbury, Jr., D

A hard-nosed center back, the Bermudan youth national team player made an instant impact on the back line for the Hilltoppers, who recorded 11 shutouts and only allowed 13 goals in 16 games. The Record's 2017 Girls Soccer Player of the Year also added two goals and was named to the Division I All-State first team and All-Metro second team.

### **BRIANNA DOTY**

Lyndon, Sr., D

An athletic and veteran presence anchoring the Vikings' defense, the two-vear captain also added a goal and two assists for the Vikings, who played their first season in Division I. One of the toughest defenders around, the senior garnered All-Capital firstteam honors and earned an invite to the Vermont Senior Classic all-star contest.

### **HALEY HODGDON**

Profile, Jr., F

The target of opposing defenses' game plans, the skilled and athletic striker still managed to crack the 20-goal mark for a second straight season. The second-team Division IV All-State pick and Granite State North All-Conference selection led the Patriots with a team-high 24 goals and added 11 assists.

### **GRACE COOKE**

St. Johnsbury, Sr., MF

The Division I All-State and All-Metro first-team standout finished with 11 goals and six assists, giving the four-year All-State. All-Metro midfielder 40 and 20 in her illustrious career. With excellent ball skills and an accurate and powerful right foot, The Record Player of the Year finalist led the Hilltoppers to the No. 4 seed and a spot in the quarterfinals.

### **TAYLOR SIEWIERSKI**

Colebrook, Sr., MF

Colebrook's field general, the Granite State North Player of the Year, D-IV All-State first-team midfielder and Twin State selection collected 13 goals and 15 assists. With great ball skills and a feel for the game, Siewierski finished her five-year career with 54 goals and 71 assists to tie the school's all-time scoring record (Lindsie Lemieux, 2004).



### **JEN ROTTI**

St. Johnsbury, Jr., D

Speed, versatility, skills, toughness - the junior possessed all of the above for the Hilltoppers, who won 11 games and earned the No. 4 seed in the Division I tournament. Finishing with a goal and assist, Rotti was a key piece of St. J's masterful defense (11 shutouts; 13 goals allowed in 16 games), and was rewarded with a nod on the All-Metro second team.

### **MOLLY HORTON**

Lake Region, Sr., D

An instrumental senior leader for Lake Region, Horton brought athleticism and toughness to the pitch for the Division II Rangers. An All-Capital first-team defender the threesport mainstay also collected three goals and three assists in playing, at times, multiple positions.



### **CASEY McALLISTER**

Hazen, Sr., F

The point of the Hazen attack, and oftentimes double-marked, McAllister used a great first touch and her athleticism to notch 12 goals and seven assists. Her offensive success helped the Wildcat earn Division III All-State first-team honors and a spot on the All-Mountain Division first team.

### **MOLLY CLOUGH**

Woodsville, Sr., MF

The catalyst of the Woodsville attack, Clough did her best work setting up teammates. The Division IV All-State first-team and Granite State North All-Conference midfielder finished with nine goals and 16 assists for Woodsville, which advanced to the tournament semifinals

### **LIA ROTTI**

St. Johnsbury, Jr., F

A major presence for the Hilltoppers, who finished as the No. 4 seed in Division I. Possessing a limitless engine with speed to burn. Rotti finished with four goals and an All-Metro honorable mention nod for St. J, which won 11 games and fell a penalty-shootout shy of reaching their second straight final four.

### **CARLEY GIROUX**

NORTH COUNTRY

North Country, Sr., MF

The North Country offense went through the All-Capital first-team midfielder. Giroux compiled five goals and four assists, playing a part in half of NCU's 18 goals this season. She also had three game-winners and scored both goals in the Falcons' first-round,

### **BRADY PERRON**

Lake Region, Sr., MF

A key midfielder for the back-toback Division II champion Rangers, Perron finished the season with 13 goals and six assists. The All-Capital first-team and Division II All-State pick also delivered the game-winning header in overtime of LR's 3-2 title-game win over Harwood, leaving the senior with 57 goals (second all-time in Rangers' boys history) and 47 assists in his career.

### **JOHN GASTON**

St. Johnsbury, Sr., MF

The heady two-way senior leader with a tireless motor was a key figure in the center of the pitch for St. Johnsbury, which won a program-best 15 games and earned its first state final berth. The All-Metro first-team choice and Division I All-State pick finished his final season with 11 assists and five goals.

### **JOSH WOODS**

Lisbon, Sr., F

Despite a target on his back, the clutch, talented striker tallied 32 goals, including five game-winners (three in overtime) with four assists. Woods, a Twin State alternate, was named the Granite State North player of the year and landed on the Division IV All-State team in helping Lisbon to a 14-game win streak during the regular season.

### **RILEY URIE**

Lake Region, Sr., F

The Record's Boys Soccer Player of the Year for a second consecutive season pumped in 22 goals and 18 assists, leaving the star striker with school records in both categories (90 goals, 76 assists). The Capital Division player of the year and Division II All-State pick had four goals and three assists in the playoffs, helping lead the Rangers to their second straight crown.

### **SHEA YOUNG**

Profile, Sr., D

The rock-solid Division IV All-State first-team and Granite State All-Conference defender anchored the Patriots' stellar defense. A Twin State alternate, Young also scored twice and added six assists for Profile, which won 16 games en route to its first soccer championship, a 2-0 win over rival Littleton.

### **MATTEO DILL**

St. Johnsbury, Sr., MF

Shifty in traffic with great pace, the midfielder led the Hilltoppers in goals scored, finishing with 15 tallies and one assist. Dill earned a spot on both the Division I All-State and All-Metro (first-team) squads while playing a key role in St. Johnsbury's historic run to 15 wins and its first state-finals berth.



### **LIAM KENNEDY**

Lake Region, Sr., GK

A Division II All-State and Capital Division first-team selection, Kennedy came through for the Rangers. In 13 regular season games, the senior netminder averaged 8.4 saves and one goal against, posting five shutouts. He was instrumental in the Rangers winning back-to-back titles, making 14 saves in a 3-2 win over Harwood in the D-II championship.

### JEB WENNRICH

Profile, Jr., D/MF

Strong and versatile, the 6-foot-3 Wennrich was a key player in midfield and on defense for Profile, which topped Littleton 2-0 in the Division IV championship to bring home the program's first title. Wennrich, who finished his junior season with six goals and 11 assists, earned All-State first-team and Granite State North Conference honors.

### BEN HAMMER

St. Johnsbury, Sr., D

Returning from an early-season injury, Hammer quickly cemented his status as one of Vermont's premier defenders. The poised and powerful center back, who was also dangerous on set pieces (five goals), earned Division I All-State and first-team All-Metro honors in helping the Hilltoppers to a berth in their first state-title game.

### **TRAVIS GROSSE**

Danville, Sr., MF

A tenacious and relentless midfielder, Grosse's efforts didn't go unnoticed. He was named Mountain Division Player of the Year and landed on the Division IV All-State squad. A three-year captain and the Indians' catalyst, Grosse finished a dazzling senior season with 22 goals and 10 assists.

### **RIAN FRIED**

St. Johnsbury, Sr., MF

A big target on set pieces, the Hilltoppers' talented offensive midfielder had the ability to score in myriad ways, finishing with 14 goals and five assists. A finalist for our Player of the Year honor, Fried was an All-State, All-Metro first team standout for St. J, which won a school-record 15 games and reached its first state final.


### **GONZALO PENA**



MANCHESTER — Hail to the champs!

All their hard work and dedication paid off on Saturday morning for the White Mountains Regional boys when the second-seeded Spartans conquered fourth-ranked Somersworth 5-1.

Way back in January when the winter winds were howling, the WMR boys set a goal to play 20 games this spring and finish at Fisher Cat Stadium. Mission accomplished. After 31 years, the Spartans are champions again.

Winning pitcher Braxton Brown called the feeling amazing. Senior catcher Jacob LaBounty, after three long transitional years, called it awesome. Coach Ben Hicks chose satisfying. The Spartan mentor showed the way and credited his team for putting the work in.

"They set their goal and now have learned how to win. The boys didn't panic. They were prepared. They've matured. We showed up to play."

### LONE RANGERS JUNE 9

BURLINGTON — Thirty seasons after its last shot at glory, Lake Region had another on its hands.

The problem: Lamoille's Nick Fitzgerald had produced a gem of his own to rival that of Rangers' ace Parker Brown.

Until that changed.

Dylan Gagnon roped a two-out single over shortstop to score Noah Royer for the game's only run in the top of the seventh to vault No. 6 Lake Region to a 1-0 victory over top-seeded Lamoille in the Division II high school baseball championship game at Centennial Field on Saturday.

Brown notched the shutout with nothing less than a masterful 15-strikeout, four-hit performance for Lake Region (13-4), which last reached the state final in 1989 when head coach Shawn Perron was on the team.

The crown is the Rangers' first on the diamond.

"I've coached half these boys since they were eight years old and they're not my players, they're my boys. Every one of them," said Perron, in his second season leading the Rangers. "We had some adversity. We had some teenagers being teenagers. Once they figured out the process, what it took to win ballgames, I've never seen a team respond the way they responded."

And Brown, a senior, may just have saved his best stuff for last — which is saying plenty.

Before the Rangers knocked out No. 2 Harwood in the semis, the right-hander crafted a two-hit, 12-strikeout opus to bounce defending champion Otter Valley in the quarterfinals.

"He pitched very well today, he pitched very well in other playoff games that we needed him for," Gagnon said. "But this is going down in history."

Busy shortstop Travis Grosse handled five of six chances. It was a tremendous team performance, one that coach Nick DeCaro called a culmination of three years of hard work.

BURLINGTON — Despite missing two key contributors, the St. Johnsbury girls soldiered on and won their fourth straight title at the Division I outdoor track and field championship at Burlington High School on Saturday.

With last year's leading scorers Katherine Cowan and Grace Cooke (five individual titles, 62 points in 2017) sidelined by injuries, St. J flexed its considerable depth, scoring 134 points to beat runner-up South Burlington by a 44-point

"They're a great group of kids, they work hard," said SJA head coach Chip Langmaid. "Even without [Cowan and Cooke] they stepped right in and kept going."

Leading the Hilltoppers were senior Hannah Wescott, a three-event winner in pole vault, high jump and 100 hurdles, and juniors Jen and Lia Rotti, with Jen winning the 300 hurdles and Lia earning four second place finishes (long jump, triple jump, pole vault and javelin).

Together they scored 89 points, setting the tone for the Hilltoppers, who rose to the challenge.

"I've never gotten in the blocks so shaky before, I know we all felt the heat," Wescott said. "Coming in without [Cowan and Cooke], being unsure how we were going to do, there was so much pressure."

Added Lia Rotti, "We knew we were going to have a huge gap where [Cowan and Cooke] weren't going to score points. But we also had a lot of people we knew could step up. We put a lot of pressure on them and they worked really hard."

### THE AVENGERS MARCH 10

BURLINGTON — Josie Choiniere changed her socks. Then she changed the game.

The superstitious sophomore guard traded in her traditional black socks for a white pair, and proceeded to knock the socks off Champlain Valley Union.

Choiniere tied her season-high with 23 points — the most in a Division I final since 2007 — as top-seeded St. Johnsbury Academy ended the Redhawks' five-year reign with a resounding 48-33 victory in Sunday afternoon's champion-ship game at Patrick Gymnasium.

"Josie Choiniere, holy cow," said St. J teammate Neva Bostic. "She wore her new white socks today it definitely helped. She was insane."

The triumph was sweet redemption for the Hilltoppers (22-2), who avenged their 36-33 loss to Champlain Valley in last season's title game, ended the Redhawks' 22-game playoff



win streak and seized their first title since winning as a 12 seed in 2010.

"CVU is a trigger for us," said Choiniere, who added a team-high seven rebounds and six steals. "We just had so much motivation to beat them. They are a great team, they have a great coach, but this was the one game we wanted."

"They've been the standard in Vermont for a number of years now," said 24th-year SJA coach Jack Driscoll of the second-seeded Redhawks. "For us to beat them today makes this championship a little more special."

It was a special afternoon of basketball for the Hilltoppers, who executed their game plan with brilliance. They played with poise, energy and confidence from the outset, shooting 48.5 percent from the floor, forcing 17 turnovers, handling the taller CVU squad on the glass (24-all in rebounding) and limiting the Redhawks to 30.8 percent shooting.

"We've been talking about having our best game of the year since getting on the bus to leave the Rice game [after Wednesday's semifinals]. To come back and make sure that this last game was our best one, the kids did a pretty darn good job," Driscoll said.

### MOUNTAIN TOPPERS MARCH 6

EAST BURKE — Bombs away.

That's how the St. J Academy boys team skied on Monday and Tuesday, and it resulted in the Hilltoppers' first ever alpine skiing championship.

In combined scoring from the two-day event, the Hill-toppers and Champlain Valley Union crushed the course on Warren's Way at Burke Mountain, with St. J (99 points) edging past the CVU Redhawks (104). Woodstock was a distant third, with 147. Hilltoppers sophomore Hugo Hong ripped the course in 1:30.52, giving him second place among the 81 skiers. Teammate Rian Fried also had a big day, taking fifth place.



Littleton, Jr., F

Leading Littleton to a Division IV runner-up finish, the smooth-shooting Hadlock averaged 14.5 points, 6.0 rebounds, 2.5 assists, and 2.5 steals per game for the top-seeded Crusaders. She was named to the N.H. Basketball Coaches' Organization D-IV All-State, and Granite State Conference-North first teams in guiding Littleton to the state finals.

### **SADIE STETSON**

St. Johnsbury, Jr., G

The electric 5-foot-7 guard averaged 15.6 points, 5.2 rebounds, 4.2 assists and 3.0 steals per game for the Hill-toppers, who finished the season with 22 wins and ended Champlain Valley Union's five-year reign with a 48-33 victory in the Division I championship game. The Metro player of the year, VBCA player of the year, and two-time Gatorade Vermont girls player of the year, Stetson shot 41 percent from the floor, 32 percent from 3 and 79

### **TAYLOR SIEWIERSKI**

Colebrook, Sr., G

Named the Division IV girls player of the year by both the N.H. Basketball Coaches' Organization and Granite State Conference-North, the speedy and talented Siewierski averaged 13.3 points, 7.2 steals, 5.6 assists and 5.1 rebounds per game.
