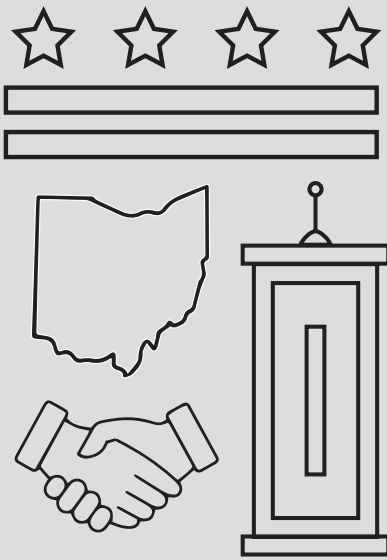

of the current Auditor. To ensure property tax values are as low as legally possible, I will implement a better property appraisal process with qualified appraisers, and provide supporting valuation documentation to property owners.

To stop inviting expensive litigation concerning the handling of public funds, as an 18 year judge and 11 year legislator, I understand and will comply with the law, unlike the current Auditor. I will reduce the Auditor's spending budget by eliminating expensive lawyers from the payroll since the Prosecutor's office provides free legal services to county officers. I will stop double-charging township taxpayers for IT services they already pay for as county taxpayers.

The county's ADP department requires a major overhaul and modernization, which will start by replacing the lawyer in charge with a top-rate IT professional.

How can the Auditor's office better serve county agencies? What changes, if any, would you support in this regard?

While the Auditor's role is to ensure accountability of public funds through cooperative relationships with county agencies, the current Auditor acts like a bully.

I will treat all who interact with the Auditor's office equally, professionally, with open communication, cooperation and respect, which will save taxpayers money by eliminating the unnecessary and expensive litigation invited by the current Auditor.

I will meet with county agencies on a regular basis to facilitate the budget process and eliminate the current Auditor's program of double-charging townships for IT services their taxpayers already pay for through county taxes. Unlike the current Auditor, I will not misuse the Auditor's taxpayer-funded website for political purposes.

The Geauga County Auditor wears many different hats. How will your background help you to succeed in the various roles?

In my professional experience, I too have worn many hats. I have been a nurse, JAG Officer for the Ohio Military Reserve, attorney in private practice, business owner, state legislator, and judge.

As a legislator, I have worked with 10 separate multi-billion dollar public budgets. Unlike the current Auditor who had to be forced by the Ohio Supreme Court to perform his legal duties, as an attorney, former judge, and legislator, I will comply with all laws that establish, limit, and provide processes to perform the many duties of the County Auditor.

I will implement a professional working environment for staff and ensure the various departments of the Auditor's Office are staffed with professionals uniquely qualified for their specific roles.

The County Auditor serves as Chief Administrator of Automated Data Processing (ADP), which provides information technology and data processing services to county agencies. What does ADP do well and where do you think improvements are needed?

The county's IT systems are completely antiquated, resulting in a non-secure environment for our county's valuable governmental information. I will replace the lawyer hired by the current Auditor to run the IT department with a top-rate IT professional, and utilize IT consultants to modernize and secure the county's government information systems.

I will stop charging fees to township taxpayers for providing IT services they already pay for through their county taxes. I will make cybersecurity a top priority to secure our systems from hackers targeting local governments.

I will implement an IT invoice approval process that actually provides checks-and-balances in accordance with the law, to prevent future recurrence of past theft.

What pressing issues will the next Auditor face? If elected, how will you address them?

The current most pressing issue involves the protecting of the County's infrastructure, backbone, and technology from on-going and escalating cyber attacks. Recent events between Russian-Ukraine have drastically increased the risk level for government entities including Geauga County and our local government partners.

We are currently experiencing frequent attempts by nefarious entities to gain access to our infrastructure through malicious email payloads. To address this requires moving some traditionally housed servers to secure cloud providers to lessen our server footprint and vulnerability. In addition, we must advance our anti-virus, anti-spam, and anti-phishing products and methodologies to recognize, block, and quarantine nefarious email intruders.

Lastly, we must continue to migrate our under-roof web presence under dot-net-nuke technology to outsourced hosting facilities using Wordpress to modernize and also reduce our vulnerability

How can the Auditor's office better serve county agencies? What changes, if any, would you support in this regard?

We need to constantly improve on our customer's experience and also champion government transparency by offering more information via the internet.

This should include more virtual meetings for the public, e-filing of Board Revision complaints, and working with the Treasurer to move towards e-payments for vendors.

We also need to expand our offering of advanced county-wide Information Technology services to other local governments and agencies to help them reduce risk and costs.

We need to offer additional training opportunities to other county agencies and local governments on Reserve Funds, Annual Budgeting, 5-Year Planning, Special Improvement Districts, Levy information, Real Property Valuation Appeals, and Information Technology.

The Geauga County Auditor wears many different hats. How will your background help you to succeed in the various roles?

From a fiscal perspective, I have prepared annual budgets, set appropriation measures, and understand the encumbrance process. I also have taught courses on these subjects at state conferences.

My previous experiences as a township fiscal officer and county auditor lend themselves to these disciplines. As the county's chief assessor, I understand commercial, residential and agricultural property valuation and the components that affect them. I leverage my past experience owning, developing, and managing commercial and residential real estate.

From an IT perspective, both my education and having built a successful technology company allows me to fully grasp and lead the county's technology initiatives into the future.

The County Auditor serves as Chief Administrator of Automated Data Processing (ADP), which provides information technology and data processing services to county agencies. What does ADP do well and where do you think improvements are needed?

ADP is an outstanding helpdesk and triage center. Their strength lies in their ability to rapidly and calmly respond to system upsets. They perform this function daily.

Whether the issue is a failed workstation or server, nefarious email payload that was accessed, or natural disaster effecting operational performance, ADP is the best of the best at response, isolation, and remediation.

Our weakness is in forward, long range technology planning, investment, and standardization. Our recently created position of Chief Technology Officer will begin to address this weakness however this cultural shift will take time, persistence, and discipline and needs to be done without negative effect on the day to day operations.

What pressing issues will the Board of County Commissioners face in the coming two years? If elected, how will you address them?

There are a number of issues to include aging buildings, a budget that needs to be adjusted due to the high collection to and influx of federal dollars. There is a risk of creating long term permanent liabilities due to the drive to spend. Outside concerns are driving to change the county culture and risks the future of Geauga.

Do you believe the Board of County Commissioners should offer a virtual option for community members who cannot attend meetings in-person?

Neither agree nor disagree. The response to this question is situational. Virtual meetings can be a useful tool when used appropriately. Virtual meetings can introduce complexity that interferes with the public's need for good order and input. Virtual meetings also create challenges with records retention and add significant cost to meetings. There is no one answer to this question.

The Board of County Commissioners has significant appointment power over many county agencies, including the Board of Mental Health & Recovery Services and the Geauga County Planning Commission. Without a written policy to guide appointments, how will you, as Commissioner, ensure that the public is able to engage with these service opportunities?

This question demonstrates a misunderstanding about how boards that the commissioners make appointments to operate. All are independent boards with bylaws and most often requirements under the Ohio revised code. These boards are responsible to ensure public engagement. It would be inappropriate for the commissioners to create policies for these boards. The commissioners appoint and then let their appointees do their jobs. Relative to choosing appointees there is a policy and practice that includes public notice, interviewing, and then making a choice based on a commissioner's preferences. The law makers choose to give the commissioners latitude in making choices and it is a good practice.

What do you think the funds from the American Rescue Plan Act and the Giant Eagle Opioid Settlement should be used for?

The question demonstrates a lack of understanding of how these funds work. Each fund is governed by the agency providing the fund. The commissioners and/or any elected office must follow the rules established for the funds. Within those rules I believe the funds should be used for priority projects. In the case of the opioid funds, I believe it is important to try


