#### **Driver strikes** motorcycle, two killed

A 56-year-old Hernando man traveling south in the late evening hours Thursday, May 27, on State Road 200 in Marion County struck a motorcycle head-on with his pickup truck, killing both occupants, according to a Florida Highway Patrol report.

The man entered the north lane to pass traffic at a high rate of speed at 9:10 p.m., when he struck the motorcycle head on, killing both the driver, a 38-year-old man and a 31-year-old woman, both from Weirsdale. The deceased, who were not identified in the report, were pronounced dead on scene, the report stated.

The Hernando man had minor injuries and was transported to Ocala Regional Medical Center. The roadway was closed for six hours as troopers conducted their investigation and clean-up, the report

The man, not identified by the FHP, was southbound on U.S. 41 and crashed into the structure at 2746 N. Florida Ave. He also struck a standing power pole and Sprint phone box while driving a 2020 Kia Rio, the report states. The man told troopers he had swerved to avoid a vehicle that stopped in front of him.

Troopers noted they could smell the very faint odor of alcohol on the driver, but did not observe any signs of impairment during their contact with him. No blood test was administered, per the report.

Eyewitnesses on the scene told troopers they did not see any other vehicles in the area, according to the report.

The man was transported via helicopter to an Ocala Regional Medical Center as a trauma alert.

# Memorial Day: Expect crowds in state

MIAMI — Expect crowded airports and busy hotels, and tough luck finding an inexpensive rental car if you're traveling to Florida for the Memorial Day holiday weekend. But if you need a last-minute COVID-19 shot, Miami International Airport is the place to be.

'We are now expecting more than 115,000 passengers each day this weekend through Tuesday, which is equal to what we had pre-pandemic in 2019," Greg Chin, communications director for the Miami-Dade Aviation Department, said in an email.

As an added bonus, travelers are being offered the COVID-19 vaccine in some spots.

The Greater Miami Convention and Visitors Bureau is anticipating hotel occupancy levels to surge above pre-pandemic levels, the agency's CEO Rolando Aedo told the Miami Herald. The visitors bureau projects countywide hotel occupancy to be as much as 8% higher on Saturday than it was on the same day in 2019.

'We've gone through so many crises as a destinabeen fairly consistent," said Aedo. "We tend to outpace other destinations in recovery.'

But the crowds aren't they just heading to South Florida. The Orlando area is also booming with travel-

The new liveaction origin story about the black-and-white-haired cartoon supervillain is less about a maniacal dalmatian-skinner than an aspiring designer with a punk sensibility out to disrupt the stuffy ways of the past in 1970s London.

Departments like hair and makeup and costume design work overtime to blend into the fabric of a film. But in "Cruella," the story itself gives them the spotlight. So director Craig Gillespie and star and producer **Emma Stone** enlisted some of the best in the business to help: Two-time Oscar-winning costume designer Jenny Beavan, who has mastered everything from Merchant Ivory period films like "A Room with a View" to the post-apocalyptic looks of "Mad Max: Fury Road," and BAFTA-winning hair and makeup designer Nadia Stacey, who transformed Stone into an 18th century social climber in "The Favourite."

"I never thought I would do it. It was never a film that would come up in my range of stuff because I'm not really into fashion," said Beavan. "Of course, I was around in the '70s. This film and script triggered my memory of what it was like."

With the script and Gillespie's comprehensive mood board and soundtrack in mind, Beavan and her team set off both designing originals and scouring London's vintage stores for real pieces and things that had at least the

spirit of the '70s, when the buttoned up styles of Dior and Balenciaga were giving way to the likes of Vivienne Westwood with zippers and holes everywhere.

"It was just really fun," Beavan said. "Every time we produced something new, (Stone) seemed to take to it like a duck to water and make it work. She is absolutely and without a doubt, totally fabulous."

One of the final looks that stood out for Beaven was Cruella's military-styled jacket paired with a big skirt and Doc Martens.

Stacey said she was given one rule for Cruella: The black and white hair needed to be on the same sides as in the cartoon. Anything else was fair game.

"I sort of went at it with a punk spirit, like, you know, I'm just going to do this and go for it and see what happens," Stacey said. 'The punk revolution was such a change in fashion and music and makeup and hair. It does really kind of follow the narrative of

Cruella as well."

Stacey found inspiration not only in Nina Hagen but Blondie frontwoman **Debbie Harry**, who she said often paired edgy stylings with pink lipsticks.

"That sparked an idea that I could make stuff punky or messed up but keep a beauty element to it, which makes it not just period and punk, it gives it a fresh take and makes it modern," Stacey said. "So if you are doing a really graphic, harsh (look), you can do a softer beauty lip with it. Or if she's hanging off a garbage truck, she can still have pink and blue jewels that contradict with the situation. There's that kind of juxtaposition, a real clash of things that I tried to keep in mind when creating."

The whole endeavor was an epic undertaking with a reported \$200 million budget. There were some 277 costumes for the principal cast, 47 changes for Cruella/Estella and 33 for Emma Thompson's Baroness.



# Voice of Disney's 'Sebastian the Crab' dies at age 72

COLUMBIA, S.C. — Samuel E. Wright, the South Carolina native who famously voiced "Sebastian the Crab" in Disney's "The Little Mermaid" and had an acting career spanning five decades, died this week. He was 72.

Wright died Monday, May 24, in New York after a three-year bout with prostate cancer, according to his family's obituary.

"My beautiful, strong, loving daddy is off to his next adventure," one of Wright's daughters, Dee Kelly, wrote Tuesday on Facebook. "My heart has so much to say but I'm still processing the fact that the light that was and is my daddy will not be able to physically be here with me."

Born in Camden, South Carolina, in 1948, Wright got his start in acting while a student at South Carolina State University in the 1960s, achelped launch an

department. A standout athlete, an iconic series of Fruit of the Loom Wright also performed in shows including Tennessee Williams' "Summer and Smoke" and the Greek tragedy "Medea."

Sam was a very kind heart. He was a sweet young man," said Sandra Salley, who served for nearly 40 years as the drama department's secretary. "He was very lovable."

Moving to New York City in 1968 to try his hand on the stage, Wright ultimately landed roles in more than 18 Broadway productions, replacing Ben Vereen in "Pippin" and becoming an original cast member of "Jesus Christ Superstar." He was twice nominated for Tony awards: in 1984 for "The Tap Dance Kid," and in 1998 as the original "Mufasa" in Γhe Lion King.'

There were movie roles as well — Wright played jazz legend Dizzy Gillespie to Forest Whittaker's Charlie "Bird" Parker in the Clint Eastwood film, and he frequently showed cording to the school, where he up on the small screen: In the 1970s, acting Wright portrayed the purple grape in

underwear commercials.

In 1984, Wright co-founded the Hudson Valley Conservatory, a performing arts school in Walden, New York. On its Facebook page, the organization announced the creation of a scholarship in Wright's memory, saying it was "overwhelmed with the love being sent our way."

But it was in 1989 that Wright received a role that would introduce him — or at least his voice — to new generations: that of "Sebastian the Crab" in Disney's "The Little Mermaid." Wright was awarded a best original song Grammy for "Under the Sea," which also achieved double platinum status.

"As a kid, I was fascinated with The Little Mermaid' and more so now after learning that Mr. Wright was the voice that brought so much joy into our lives," said Davion Petty, S.C. State's alumni relations director.

A family service was held for Wright on Thursday.



# Tech, health care lead way

Stocks capped a listless day of trading on Wall Street with modest gains Friday and the S&P 500's first weekly gain in three weeks.

Gains in technology and health care companies outweighed a slide in communications stocks, retailers and elsewhere in the market. The S&P 500 rose 0.1% and notched a 1.2% gain for the week.

The benchmark index closed out the final day of trading in May with a monthly gain of 0.5%. That's the index's fourth straight monthly increase and follows a bumpy few weeks in the markets as investors moved past a stellar corporate earnings season and focused on the tug-of-war between the economic recovery and rising inflation.

Wall Street largely shrugged off a report indicating consumer spending increased last month, the latest economic snapshot to show inflation accelerating in the U.S. economy. Treasury yields fell, including the yield for the benchmark 10-year Treasury. Typically, worries about rising inflation fuel expectations of higher interest rates, which can cause bond yields to rise.

"It's an indication that inflation is going to be transitory," said Tom Martin, senior portfolio manwith Globalt Investments. "Today was just generally an up day, plus the volumes in the market have been pretty light lately, especially this week."

The S&P 500 rose 3.23 points to 4,204.11, its third straight gain. The Dow Jones Industrial Average added 64.81 points, or the

0.2%, to 34,529.45. The weekend is another signal tech-heavy Nasdaq gained 12.46 points, or 0.1%, to 13,748.74.

Smaller company stocks, which have outperformed the broader market this year, fell. The Russell 2000 index lost 4.10 points, or 0.2%, to 2,268.97.

Inflation remains a key concern for investors, particularly if the global economic recovery hampered if governments and central banks have to withdraw stimulus to combat rising prices. It's partly why stocks fell two out of the past three weeks. Still, analysts expect any rise in inflation to be tied to the growing economy and will likely be more moderate.

Investors did not react harshly to the latest hotter-than-expected inflation data. The Commerce Department said Friday that personal consumption expenditures, a measure of inflation used by the Federal Reserve, rose by 3.6% in April. Excluding volatile food and energy prices, inflation was still high at 3.1%, and well above the Federal Reserve's long-term target of inflation of around 2%.

Bond yields remained steady on the news, with the 10-year U.S. Treasury note trading at 1.58%, roughly where it's been all week.

"You're not seeing big spikes in rates when inflation data comes out a little high and that's a sign of relief for the markets," said Jamie Cox, managing partner at Harris Financial Group.

The calm rise of the market this week, steady bond vields, and a lack of a reaction to the latest inflation data signals that investors are less worried about long-term inflation issues than they were a few weeks ago. Investors also got key economic measures of GDP growth and falling unemployment this week.

The market didn't have much of a reaction to the White House's unveiling of President Joe Biden's proposed \$6 trillion budget for next year. The budget, which is piled high with new safety net programs for the poor and middle class, depends on taxing corporations and the wealthy to keep the nation's spiking debt from spiraling out of control. While only a proposal, the budget would be the highest level of spending as a segment of the economy since World War II.

Democrats control both the House and Senate, and the Senate can pass budget-related items without needing the 60-vote threshold, so it's likely a good number of Biden's items will make it into the final version.

Salesforce.com rose 5.4%, the biggest gain in the S&P 500, after reporting solid results for its latest quarter. Meanwhile, electronics maker HP fell 8.9% for the biggest decline in the S&P 500 after the company issued a weak full-year forecast to investors.

Americans hit the road in near-record numbers at the start of the Memorial Day weekend, as their eagerness to break free from coronavirus confinement overcame higher prices for flights, gasoline and

#### Frenchman killed after stabbing, shooting three police officers

PARIS - A man with severe schizophrenia who had been on a watch list for Islamic radicalism stabbed a police officer at her station Friday in western France and shot two other officers before police killed him, authorities said.

The slain suspect was a Frenchman in his 40s who had been on a watch list for Islamic radicalism because of his "rigorous" religious practices, Interior Minister Gerald Darmanin said. The assailant had recently been released from prison and was under monitoring by psychiatric services, he said.

The three officers were wounded but none is in life-threatening condition, the minister said.

The motive for the violence in the Nantes suburb of La Chapelle-sur-Erdre was unclear, but Darmanin told reporters at the scene that the man "clearly wanted to attack police."

#### **SolarWinds** hackers target **150 orgs** with phishing

BOSTON - The statebacked Russian cyber spies behind the SolarWinds hacking campaign launched a targeted spear-phishing assault on U.S. and foreign government agencies and think tanks this week using an email marketing account of the U.S. Agency for International Development, Microsoft says.

The effort targeted about 3,000 email accounts at more than 150 different organizations, at least a guarter of them involved in international development, humanitarian and human rights work, Microsoft Vice President Tom Burt said in a blog post late Thursday.

it did not say what por tion of the attempts may have led to successful intrusions but said many of those targeting Microsoft customers were blocked automatically. "We're also in the process of notifying all of our customers who have been targeted," Burt said.

#### Japan extends virus emergency with safe **Olympics at stake**

TOKYO - Japan extended a coronavirus state of emergency in Tokyo and other areas for 20 more days on Friday, with infections still not slowing as it prepares to host the Olympics in just over 50 days.

Cases remain high and medical systems in Osaka, the hardest-hit area in western Japan, are still overburdened, Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga said in announcing the decision.

"I am aware that many people are voicing concern about holding the Olympics and Paralympics," he said. "I take them seriously, and I will proceed with preparations for a safe and secure games."

He said the next three weeks are "an extremely important time for us to achieve results" in a twopronged battle to control infections while expanding vaccinations.

The Olympics are scheduled to start July 23 after a one-year postponement due to the pandemic, and worries about new variants and Japan's slow vaccination rollout have triggered calls from the public, medical experts and even a sponsor to cancel the games.

Suga's public support ratings have plunged to about 30% from around 70% when he took office in September.

# Mask guidance loosens for summer campers

NEW YORK — Kids at summer camps can skip wearing masks outdoors, with some exceptions, federal health officials said Friday. Children who aren't fully vacci-

nated should still wear masks outside when they're in crowds or in sustained close contact with others – and when they are inside, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said. Fully vacciindoors or outside, the agency said.

The guidelines open the door to a more conventional camp experience and came out in the nick of opening in some parts of the

The guidance is the first in a wave of updates that will incorporate the CDC's recent decisions on masks and social distancing. Earlier this month, the agency said Americans don't have to be as cautious about masks and distancing outdoors, and that fully vaccinated people don't need

The church's parish advisory council also chose this day to burn their 21-year mortgage, having paid off their \$1.7 million debt just days before.

Johnson added that Bishop Gregory Parkes of the Diocese of St. Petersburg had also designated Sunday, May 23 as the ending of the general dispensation for the obligation to attend weekly Mass.

"We'd been noticing an increase of people coming back over the last couple months; they're being vaccinated and they're comfortable coming back," Johnson said. "With the dispensation lifted and the obligation to attend Mass is back, the parish council thought this would be a good day to have a 'Welcome Back'

Some things are still not fully the way things were pre-pandemic. Although most of the pews are open, some are still "every other row."

Mask-wearing and social distancing are still encouraged, offerings are still being collected into one central basket in the main church aisle, the communion cup has not yet returned, neither has shaking hands during the "passing of the peace.


Even so, Sunday was truly a celebration.

"In the midst of this pandemic, we've done well and you've been fantastic," Johnson said during a reception prior to the mortgage burning. "As you know, it's been a very challenging year with the pandemic, and we went through a time when we weren't allowed to have public Masses. And then when they returned, people were hesitant.

"But even when we didn't meet, you mailed in your contributions and gave electronically ... and now we're here to burn the mortgage," he said. "This is a great feat, a great welcoming back, and there's a great spirit that's here today."



#### THIS DATE IN BASEBALL

1916 — Christy Mathewson defeated beat the Atlanta Braves 4-1. It was the the Boston Braves 3-0 for the New York Giants' 17th consecutive road win.

1922 — The U.S. Supreme Court ruled organized baseball was primarily a sport and not a business, and therefore not subject to antitrust laws and interstate commerce regulations. The suit had been brought by the Federal League's Baltimore franchise.

1928 — Bill Terry hit for the cycle to lead the New York Giants to a 12-5 win over Brooklyn at Ebbets Field. Terry became the first player in major league history to include a grand slam as part of the cycle.

1942 — New York's Lefty Gomez, self-described as the worst-hitting pitcher in baseball, banged out four hits while pitching a 16-1 four-hitter against Washington.

1946 — In a reverse integration role, Edward Klep became the first white to play in the Negro leagues in a game played in Grand Rapids. Klep pitched seven innings for the Cleveland Buckeyes against the American Giants in his debut with the Negro American League

1956 — Dale Long went hitless for the Pirates, ending his major league record streak of home runs in eight consecutive games. The Brooklyn Dodgers beat Pittsburgh, 10-1.

#### **Inter Miami fined** \$2 million after inquiry

Major League Soccer has fined Inter Miami \$2 million and imposed other sanctions following its investigation into the 2020 signing of French international Blaise Matuidi.

The league's investigation determined Miami violated roster designation rules for Matuidi and Andrés Reyes. It also found the team didn't disclose agreements that led to underreported salaries for Leandro González Pirez, Nicolás Figal and Julián Carranza.

Matuidi, who played for the 2018 World Cup winners, came to Miami from Juventus in August. The team said it used targeted allocation money to sign him. The league's investigation, launched in March, determined Matuidi should have been a designated player.

The league found no wrongdoing on the part of team co-owner David Beckham, the former English star, and other owners. Managing owner Jorge Mas was fined \$250,000 because he had an obligation to make sure the rules were followed. In addition, Inter Miami's allocation dollars for 2022 and 2023 were reduced by \$2,271,500.

# IndyCar veterans still going strong

# Careers winding down for some of the best ever in racing

INDIANAPOLIS — Tony Kanaan sat in Chip Ganassi Racing's suite one day this May, savoring a rare second IndyCar farewell tour.

At age 46, running a part-time schedule with no future guarantees and a talented crop of young drivers chasing them, Kanaan and his fellow veterans can see the sunset approaching for one of IndyCar's greatest generations.

Four of the 33 starters in Sunday's Indianapolis 500 are listed among the top 12 in career wins. Ryan Hunter-Reay is tied for 24th. Kanaan needs one win to tie Hunter-Reay with 18 and Juan Pablo Montoya is just two behind Kanaan despite spending 13 seasons in Formula One and NASCAR.

These magnificent seven, all in their 40s, have combined for 207 victories, 14 series championships and nine Indianapolis 500s since emerging as the series' most revered stars over the last two decades. And their passions and personalities from around the globe have changed the sport.

"Every year that goes by, I realize how special those years were," Kanaan said Thursday, referring to the four drivers who suited up in Michael Andretti's garage in the 2000s. "What we had, what we did is we showed that you could race against each other and still have a lot of fun with your teammates."

It became a blueprint for repairing the damage from the years-long split of American open-wheel racing series.

Andretti's team featured Kanaan, the bubbly Brazilian; Dario Franchitti, the resolute Scotsman; Bryan Herta, the laid-back American; and beloved British driver Dan Wheldon.

On the track, they were a powerhouse. Franchitti won 31 races and three 500s before a horrific crash forced him into retirement in November 2014. The beloved Wheldon won 16 times, twice at Indy, but died at age 33 from injuries suf-

whose son Colton qualified second for the grief in their eyes at the very mention Sunday's race, had four series wins. And Kanaan captured the 2004 series title and the 500 in 2013.

Off the track, they goofed around, became close friends and played pranks like hiding all of Wheldon's drivers shoes or sawing Kanaan's mountain bike in half while he was doing a television interview, changing Gasoline Alley

"I think it speaks to the camaraderie in the series," two-time series champ Josef Newgarden said when asked about the pranks still being pulled today. "We're just as competitive as any other sport, but off the track there's this casualness among us. We all get along.'

It explains why every driver lined up to congratulate Marco Andretti on pit row when he captured the Indy 500 pole last year and why those who raced against Wheldon, who helped test drive the Indy car of the future before his fered in a 2011 crash at Las Vegas. Herta, death, or the late Justin Wilson can't hide

of their names.

And with all those budding young stars starting to catch up to IndyCar's elder statesmen, others continue to outrun Father Time.

Scott Dixon of Chip Ganassi Racing is a six-time series champ, the points leader and Sunday's pole-sitter. Should he win a second 500 this weekend, Dixon would tie Mario Andretti (52) for second all-time in wins and stay in position to join A.J. Foyt as only the seven-time Indy-Car champion. If he leads 82 laps, Dixon would break Al Unser's career mark for most 500 laps led (644).

There's a reason the 40-year-old New Zealander has remained on top.

"I love what I do. I think that passion is at the forefront of it," Dixon said. "Chip and Mike Hull are two of the most competitive people I know and that push is definitely at the forefront of it.'

It's also true of the others in this generation, which made physical fitness ple getting along."

Kanaan competed in triathlons. Threetime Indy 500 winner Helio Castroneves incorporated weight training, biking, swimming, even dancing into his fitness routine. Hunter-Reay took up free

There's little doubt it helped.

Hunter-Reay, age 40, hopes to claim his second 500 crown after qualifying seventh last weekend. He's one spot ahead of Castroneves, the exuberant 46-yearold Brazilian with Michael Shank Racing who again is chasing a record-tying fourth race win.

'It's a great group of guys and I learned a lot from them," Castroneves said. "That's what makes you better and I probably wouldn't have been as successful without them pushing me."

They haven't stopped.

Two-time Indy winner Juan Pablo Montoya, the 45-year-old Colombian, will make his first IndyCar start in four years from the No. 24 spot with Arrow McLaren

If France's Sebastian Bourdais puts Foyt back in victory lane, the four-time series champ and 37-race winner will become the third-oldest first-time 500 winner at 42 years, 91 days.

Will Power, the 40-year-old Aussie with Team Penske, faces the most daunting task after qualifying 32nd. But a win would move him ahead of Al Unser (39), breaking a tie for fifth on the career wins

"It's actually really cool to be a driver in this era because it's kind of like the first era after the split," Power said. "It's really the highest quality field in history because of the parity, the data, the onboard stuff. You've got nine winners in this year's race and you probably haven't seen that since the '90s. But it's more now about the drivers and the engineers and getting it right down to the simplest, smallest details."

And if one thing is clear, it's this: Kanaan's not ready to park his car even though he can see a changing of the guard coming even in his own garage with teammates like Marcus Ericsson and Alex Palou.

They remind me a lot of what we had with Andretti," Kanaan said. "You can see it. I think we showed people something special. You look at the world now, and it's pretty cool, pretty cool to see peo-



# Changing of the guard in men's tennis?

Forgive Novak Djokovic if he's just a little bit tired of hearing about, and being asked to address, how much longer he, Rafael Nadal and Roger Federer can stay at the top of tennis.

Or, put another way, whether a younger generation of men finally is poised to consistently win Grand

"I mean, I said it a thousand times. I don't know how many times people want me to repeat it. Of course the 'Next Gen'" — a marketing slogan pushed by the ATP—"is there, is coming, whatever. But here we are, still winning the biggest tournaments and Slams. I don't know what to tell you other than that," Djokovic said.

"I'm not focused on the 'Next Gen,' even though I know ... it creates a story. People like to talk about it. Fine. The guys are there. They are already establishing themselves in the Top 5, Top 10 of the world. Nothing new," he continued, then noted with pride: "But we are still there."

When the French Open begins in Paris on Sunday, it will feel in some ways like order restored after the 2020 edition was altered in two significant ways because of the coronavirus pandemic: Only 1,000 spectators were let into Roland Garros per day, and competition started in September instead of May. Back in its rightful spot on the calendar — well, delayed by a week because of COVID-19 concerns, but close enough — and with about 5,300 fans allowed in each of the first 10 days, then 10,000 or more each of the last five days, could the clay-court championship serve as the setting for a symbolic changing of the guard?

Or, to Djokovic's point, will the elders remain in charge?

"A lot of people underestimate the time and the era we are playing in, with by far the three best players in the history of the game," said Dominic Thiem, whose U.S. Open title last September makes him the only first-time major men's champion since 2014. "It's more than clear that it's incredibly tough to win Grand Slam tournaments, having to beat, most of the times, two of them.'

A glimpse at the dominance:

■ 15 of the past 16 Grand Slam tournaments were won by the Big Three;

■ starting with the 2005 French Open, they col-

lected 54 of the past 63 major titles;

■ in that same span, 23 Slam finals involved one of these matchups: Djokovic vs. Nadal, Djokovic vs. Federer, or Nadal vs. Federer.

That can't happen at Roland Garros because they are in the same half of the bracket for the first time at a Grand Slam tournament. No. 1 Djokovic could face No. 8 Federer in the quarterfinals; one of them could meet No. 3 Nadal in the semifinals.

The other half includes No. 5 Stefanos Tsitsipas and No. 6 Alexander Zverev, who are among the 20-something men considered contenders to grab a first major trophy, along with No. 2 Daniil Medvedev (although even he would acknowledge not in Paris, where he is 0-4 so far) and No. 7 Andrey Rublev.



# Annie offers advice

ear Annie: I work in health and wellness for the largest retailer in the world. I love my job, but there are so many things I don't understand.

Management is always on us about making money (which I understand), but no matter what we do, it is never enough. We reside in a depressed area and really do quite well for where we live.

With all the pressure management puts on us about sales and eliminating waste, our district mana g e r

demands

that we

work such wasteful hours. We are at the office until 8 in the evening even though no one comes in that late.

I keep looking for something to do. We work from 12 to 5 on Sundays, and usually there are no customers — just people walking by asking, "Why are you working on a Sunday?" On Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day and other holidays, we work from 9 to 6. It is not unusual to have customers who are on vacation and want trial contact lenses because theirs are ripped or lost. When we can't give them what they want (we need a doctor's permission to give out contacts), they become irate. Sometimes it gets intense. This is pretty much how the day goes dealing with irate customers and getting no sales.

What can we do to let members of management know there are better ways to treat their employees and still save money? They simply will not listen. It's typical top-down management. Things are good for those who are on top but frustrating for those who aren't so far up the ladder. -Love My Job but Just Don't **Understand** 

Dear LMJBJDU: Many companies today have wised up to the value of employee feedback and started conducting periodic reviews. If your employer does, take the opportunity to share your insights. Focus on what the company stands to gain by cutting back during low-traffic hours.

Your case will be more convincing if you can offer some concrete examples — so the next time you're working one of these shifts, take notes on sales, staffing, etc. Because it's such a huge retailer with stores nationwide, there may be blanket policies that your managers have to follow even if they don't make much sense at your location. But it's worth at least proffering your two cents.

If management brushes you off and things continue not to change, it might be time to channel your frustration into filling out some job applications — preferably with smaller companies, where you might be able to play a bigger role.

**Dear Annie:** While shopping at our local grocery, I overheard an elderly woman complaining that the new digital coupons limit her from getting the reduced price. She does not have a smartphone with which to pull up the coupons, nor does she know how to use a computer.

She expressed that this is unfair to older people (many of whom really need the reduced prices) who would like to be able to participate in this program. I wonder whether any of the companies that have gone digital have considered this problem. —Digital Age Discrimination

Dear Digital Age Discrimi**nation:** A smartphone isn't always necessary, as many companies allow customers to download and print coupons from their websites — but that still presents a frustrating obstacle for seniors who aren't familiar with using a computer or don't have access to one.

Rather than give up, I would encourage anyone in this boat to call the Eldercare Locator (800-677-1116) to find a class for people new to technology.

• INSIST ON CASH

4. IF POSSIBLE, GO TO THE BANK

- Don't accept a check for more than the selling price. You can bet it's a scam.
- · Inform the Buyer that you'll wait two weeks before sending any merchandise.
- Never use money from a check to send gift cards, money orders, or wire money to strangers or someone you just met. Many scammers demand that you send money through money transfer services like Western Union or MoneyGram, or buy gift cards and send them the PIN numbers. Once you wire money, or give someone the gift card PINs, it is like giving someone cash. It's almost impossible to get it back.
- Toss offers that ask you to pay for a prize. If it's free, you shouldn't have to pay to get it.




