County votes to take over EMS

Transition set for Oct. 1 after commissioners express frustration with financial problems

Frustrated with the faltering finances of Nature Coast EMS and its repeated need for more subsidies, the Citrus County Commission voted 3-2 to end its

contract with the private ambulance company and take over the service by Oct. 1.

Also as part of the plan to fold the emergency transport business into the county's fire rescue department, the county board agreed to pay Nature

Coast enough money to cover its operating expenses for the rest of September and to bring over its emergency workers as temporary employees at their newly agreed upon wages until they can be made permanent county staff.

But bringing the ambulance service under the county's wing won't be cheap.

County Administrator Randy Oliver told commissioners that the program would cost about \$2.6 million annually. Nature Coast EMS was slated to

receive \$850,000 next year. Its chief and CEO, Scott Baxter, was at the regularly scheduled commission meeting to ask for an additional \$768,000 beyond that to shore up the struggling

Hallowell sentenced to life

'There is no rehabilitation for a psychopath,' Howard says of defendant

Carlos Hallowell took a courtroom microphone into his cuffed hands and began apologizing to his adoptive mother, Denise Hallowell.

"Although she's not with us, I know she's listening," the 19-year-old said. "Mom, I'm so very sorry. Words can't describe how I feel right now, how much I miss you, how sorry I am for what I've done and everything I've done throughout my entire life with you ... I love you so much."

Hallowell will spend the rest of his life in state custody for murdering 57-year-old Denise Hallowell the afternoon of July 13, 2019, inside their Inverness-area home.

Citrus County Circuit Court Judge Richard "Ric" Howard announced the order Tuesday, Sept. 14,

finding Hallowell is an "incorrigible offender" who can never be rehabilitated.

Hallowell showed little emotion after the judge ordered his punishment; he shook his head gently as bailiffs escorted him away.

Hallowell faced a prison term of between 40 years and up to life after jurors in July found him guilty of Denise Hallowell's premeditated murder.

"Your honor," Hallowell said Tuesday to Howard, "the only thing I ask is for justice for my mom, and mercy for me."

While charged as an adult, Hallowell wasn't eligible for the death penalty because he was a 17-year-old minor when he plunged a full-sized axe into the back of Denise Hallowell's head as she slept.

Hallowell's age also required Howard during the sentencing to consider 10 factors focused on the

nature of the crime, its impacts to the victim's family and how Hallowell's mentality contributed to it.

Howard's decision came after the judge heard almost two days of evidence, starting Sept. 9, from attorneys trying to either mitigate Hallowell's criminal acts or stress their severity. Howard also presided over Hallowell's trial.

Denise Hallowell, a single mother, adopted Hallowell from Guatemala when he was 4.

Howard said Hallowell excelled in his new mother's nurturing environment, earning scholastic and athletic achievements.

"From early childhood to early adolescence, the defendant was a happy child," he said. "Ms. Hallowell funded the defendant's college savings account, and covered all bills for the family."

After hearing concerns over design uncertainties, a developer decided to redo their pitch to build a mix of condos, shops and offices in Crystal River.

Rob Benjamin, Heritage Development

Company's vice president, told city council the evening of Monday, Sept. 13, he would amend his application to rezone and reclassify part of the 51-acre lot at 8800 W. Pure Lane, along U.S. 19.

"I don't mind stepping back," he told city officials on behalf of the property owner, Crystal

River LTD. "If there's a way to work with the city, we're willing to do it."

TALLAHASSEE — Saying the state's system of standardized testing in public schools is "quite frankly, outdated," Gov. Ron DeSantis on Tuesday announced that lawmakers will consider a proposal during the 2022 legislative session to end the Florida Standards Assessments.

The statewide exams in English-language arts and math, known as the FSA, are given annually to students in third through 10th grades. DeSantis said he wants to eliminate the exams and

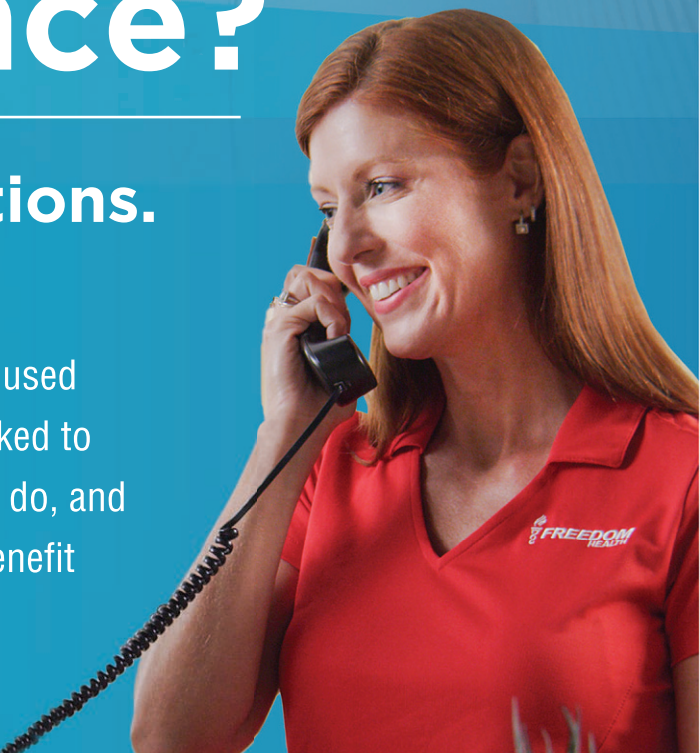

Attempted-murder cases move forward

A doctor is expected to evaluate the mental health of Casandra Hallmark, the homeless 30-year-old from Hernando accused of striking a man with a medieval battle axe.

Assistant Public Defender Charity Braddock told Citrus County Circuit Court Judge Richard “Ric” Howard at Hallmark’s court hearing Tuesday, Sept. 14, her client’s interview was scheduled for Oct. 28. Braddock said witness depositions are also being set up.

Howard slated Hallmark’s next court appearance for Nov. 9.

After Hallmark’s June 26 arrest without a bond, prosecutors charged her with attempted first-degree murder with a deadly weapon.

It’s alleged Hallmark struck a

man twice in his head with a double-sided axe at a Hernando address.

Citrus County Sheriff’s Office deputies responding to the scene learned a steel plate implanted in the man’s head shielded the axe blows, putting him in a daze and leaving him with an inch-long cut inches away from his spinal cord.

A witness also corroborated the injured man’s statements, adding Hallmark, who is homeless, was staying in a shed on his property the evening before. He said he let Hallmark into his house to get cigarettes when she must have grabbed the weapon from off his wall display.

According to her arrest report, Hallmark told deputies the witness, in her mind, told her to murder the man.

“She advised that she has several voices in her head but that she is not crazy,” the arrest report states. “The defendant stated that her intentions were to satisfy the witness’ need for her to commit violence.”

Also Tuesday in court:

Howard had to hold off

sentencing Crystal River 34-year-old Patrick Stambaugh for the attempted murder of a woman he struck multiple times with his fists.

Since Stambaugh wasn’t present at his court hearing, because the county jail didn’t transport him, the judge and attorneys agreed to present testimony Tuesday for Howard to announce a sentence Friday, when Stambaugh is present.

Stambaugh left his fate up to the judge in July after he pleaded no contest to his charge in exchange for a prison term of up to 10 years. Prosecutors dropped Stambaugh’s other two charges of aggravated battery and battery involving strangulation, court records show.

Sheriff’s office deputies arrested Stambaugh on Jan. 15 during their response to a domestic incident at an address off

of West Mayo Drive in Crystal River.

Assistant State Attorney Patricia Diaz on Tuesday called on Detective Michael Kelly, who testified to deputies finding an emotional Stambaugh standing outside, brandishing a large knife.

Stambaugh dropped the knife after deputies ordered him to with their sidearms drawn.

After speaking with Stambaugh and the woman, Kelly testified, deputies learned Stambaugh was mixing alcohol with medication for his bipolar and schizoaffective disorders.

When the woman kept him from leaving intoxicated with the car keys, Stambaugh attacked her.

Along with striking the woman, Kelly testified, Stambaugh admitted to putting her in a chokehold and holding a knife up to her throat, threatening to kill both her and himself.

Assistant Public Defender Alex Lizanich, Stambaugh’s lawyer, called on a handful of witnesses, including members of Stambaugh’s family and the woman he struck, to help miti-

gate Stambaugh’s punishment.

They said Stambaugh is an intelligent and “gentle soul” with no history of violence or criminality, calling the incident out of his character.

“This was an isolated incident,” the woman said. “He’s never exhibited animosity or any type of hatred towards me.”

Stambaugh was medicated for his mental health, according to his supporters, but he couldn’t afford his prescription after losing his computer engineering job and health insurance because of COVID-19.

Stambaugh’s family told Howard their loved one needs treatment and not incarceration, adding they would take Stambaugh back to live with them in New Jersey.

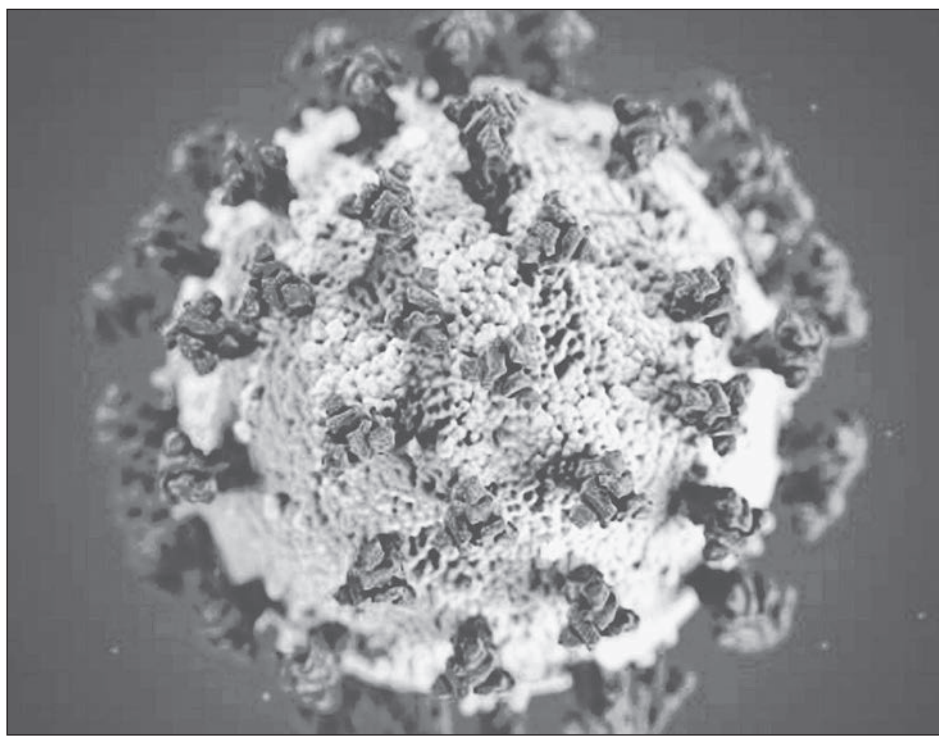

Citrus County vaccination rate stalls

Through the summer, ever more of Citrus County’s eligible population got vaccinated against the coronavirus.

But after an increase in the county’s vaccination rate every week and after reaching 58% of the eligible population getting vaccinated, the percent has stalled. Only 578 people got vaccinated in Citrus County during the week ending Sept. 9, according to the Florida Department of Health website. That was about half the number who got the vaccine during the week that ended Sept. 2.

There were almost 900 new cases of COVID-19 in Citrus County, according to the Florida Department of Health.

Florida’s vaccination rate among those eligible is 69%, more than 10 percentage points greater than that of Citrus County. But Florida also last week failed to see an increase in vaccinations after weeks of climbing rates.

Twenty people died in Citrus County during the past seven days ending Sept. 12 because of the virus, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The good news: That number is almost half that of the previous seven days.

The data is the latest available since President Biden announced last week he was stepping up vaccine requirements to curb the spread of the virus, especially in states like Florida which recently saw record infection rates.

The new mandate requires workers at large companies to get the vaccine or be tested weekly for the virus.

The mandate also includes a requirement that the staff at hospitals participating in Medicaid and Medicare programs also get the vaccines.

In Citrus County, vaccination rates at both Citrus Memorial Hospital and Bayfront Health Seven Rivers were below the county’s vaccination rate.

The Chronicle asked both hospitals if they had a plan to follow the latest White House mandate that health care facilities have their employees vaccinated against the coronavirus.

The Chronicle also asked whether hospital executives were concerned that some employees might quit their jobs rather than get vaccinated. And if that happened, what was the hospital’s plan to compensate and would that include cutting or reducing services?

Bayfront Health regional spokeswoman Jennifer Siem sent the following email to the questions.

“Our hospitals and their

caregiving teams will work to comply with the president’s order requiring COVID-19 vaccination and look forward to further guidance from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) about its implementation,” she wrote.

Katie Myers, spokeswoman for Citrus Memorial Hospital, said her hospital was reviewing the mandate.

“We are reviewing the details of President Biden’s plan and will respond accordingly,” she emailed the Chronicle. “We work to ensure a safe environment by following guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as well as the Occupational Safety and Health Administration and our infectious disease experts have been strongly encouraging vaccination as a critical step to protect individuals from the virus.”

“Additionally, Citrus Memorial Hospital follows guidance outlined by the CDC regarding protocols for vaccinated and unvaccinated individuals including universal masking for our caregivers, patients and visitors,” she wrote.

Jury panel dismissed over clerk of courts comment

FORT LAUDERDALE — A panel of South Florida jurors was sent home after defense lawyers claimed that they were potentially poisoned by welcoming comments from the clerk of courts.

Broward County Clerk of Courts Brenda Forman quipped that those who do the crime have to serve the time when she spoke to a jury pool that arrived at the courthouse on Monday morning, the South Florida SunSentinel reported.

Forman’s office says the comments were taken “out of context,” while defense lawyers say the phrase could encourage

guilty verdicts.

The issue was raised by Assistant Public Defender Melinda Blostein, who was in the panel of prospective jurors on Monday, the newspaper reported.

She wrote a notarized letter notifying officials about the comments, which Blostein paraphrased.

A statement released by the clerk’s office late Monday said that Forman “takes the time to thank jurors for their service whenever possible,” adding that “it appears that some comments were taken out of context. The matter is resolved and will not be an issue going forward.”

Norm Macdonald,
former 'SNL'
comic, dies at 61

NEW YORK — Comic **Norm Macdonald**, a former "Saturday Night Live" writer and performer who was "Weekend Update" host during the 1990s, has died.

Macdonald, who was 61, died Tuesday after a nine-year battle with cancer that he kept private, according to Brillstein Entertainment Partners, his management firm in Los Angeles.

The son of two schoolteachers raised in Quebec City, Canada, Macdonald was a standup comic and briefly a writer for the sitcom "Roseanne" when he was picked to join the cast of "Saturday Night Live" in 1993.

After leaving the show in 1998, he created and starred in the comedy "The Norm Show" for ABC, playing a former NHL player kicked out of the league for gambling and tax evasion and forced into community service as a social worker.

He became known for his esoteric impressions, including **Burt Reynolds**, who gave **Will Ferrell's Alex Trebek** character grief on "Celebrity Jeopardy." He also impersonated **Bob Dole**, **Larry King** and **David Letterman**.

Macdonald was anchor on the "Weekend Update" desk in a prime era for news-based jokes, with **Bill Clinton**, **Michael Jackson** and **O.J. Simpson** frequent targets.

Macdonald, a comedian and former cast member on "Saturday Night Live," died Tuesday, Sept. 14, 2021, after a nine-year battle with cancer that he kept private, according to Brillstein Entertainment Partners, his management firm in Los Angeles. He was 61.

The actor shared the good news on his website on Monday, saying his tumor shrank from 12 inches to the size of a marble. But in an update he said he wrote back in March and is sharing only now that he's feeling better, Bridges said he and his wife, **Susan Geston**, were infected with COVID-19 in January while he was undergoing chemotherapy.

"Covid kicked my a** pretty good, but I'm double vaccinated & feeling much better now," he wrote.

Bridges said Geston spent five days in the hospital, but he was stuck in a hospital bed for five weeks and was even "getting close to the Pearly Gates" at one point because his immune system was shot. Recovery was difficult, he said — until recently, he's needed oxygen support just to walk around. But with the help

of an excellent medical team, he was finally able to walk his daughter, **Hayley**, down the aisle and dance with her at her wedding to "a wonderful guy, **Justin Shane**." Bridges, 71, posted a video of the father-daughter dance, as well as a trailer for "The Old Man," a television series he's starring in and executive-producing. The FX series had been scheduled to premiere this year, before cancer and COVID-19 got in the way. "I'm excited to get back to work," he wrote.

Bridges has been an advocate for mask-wearing and social distancing since early in the pandemic, even doing a public service video for the hospital association of Montana, where he's a part-time resident, showing how far he stays away from The Dude, his character from "The Big Lebowski."

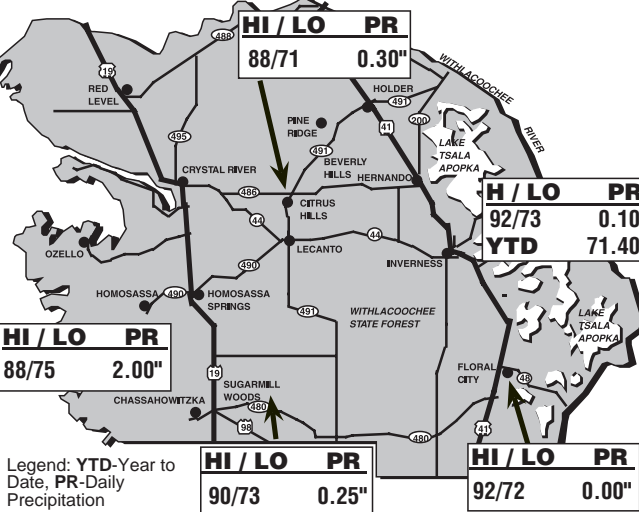

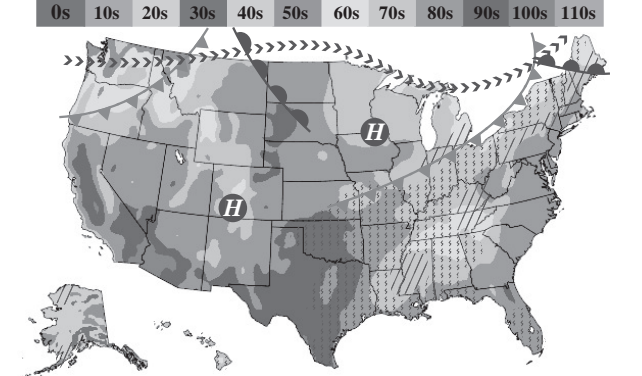

but restricts them to a specific blueprint council still has to approve.

After working with city staff for roughly a year, the developer asked council to designate 32 acres of the parcel's northwestern corner to high-density residential, allowing for up to 384 multi-family dwellings within multi-story apartments.

Remaining acreage will remain unchanged as highway commercial, providing for shopfronts and offices.

Brian Herrmann, director of city planning and development, presented the developer's conceptual plan to council, but acknowledged the rezoning request wouldn't bind builders to a specific design.

Herrmann said the layout would be a dense combination of housing and businesses connected by sidewalks, green space, lakeside trails and playgrounds.

"We want to come in and do something different than what we've done in past," Benjamin said. "we felt this was the best option for us to develop this land."

Councilman Robert Holmes was first to voice questions over the

development's height in relation to the neighboring Crystal River Airport, its potential impacts on wetlands, stormwater runoff and traffic on West Pure Lane, which doesn't have a traffic signal with U.S. 19.

"We're going to have issues with this if this happens," he said, echoed by other council members. "You got to do it right."

Herrmann noted construction permits would have to be later approved by the city, the the Federal Aviation Administration, and other regulatory agencies before ground breaks.

Jackie Brooks, who lives behind the property, said destroying the wetlands for the development's stretch of impervious surfaces would destroy the

wildlife and worsen the flooding she and her neighbors already endure after a day of rainfall.

"If you build something high behind me, there's nowhere for water to go but to us," she said. "This is not a good project for anyone."

Herrmann said other communities have been able to sustain dense developments amid their wetlands. Environmental rules also prohibit a development from contributing to more stormwater runoff.

Holmes said there "ain't no way in God's green earth that can happen" with how the land slopes to surrounding lowlands and golf courses.

A tree line, 150 feet of space and an old railroad

line will separate the development from the adjacent subdivision to the west.

Council was OK with Heritage Development Company listing the property on its website for \$5 million. In 2020, the the Citrus County Property Appraiser valued the lot at \$423,690.

Benjamin said it's his company's intent to develop the lot before it's sold.

"It's my job to get sites we have developed," he said. "It might be for sale; everything's for sale."

Council asked Benjamin why he didn't pursue a PUD application, which, the officials said, would help give a better picture of what's in the developer's mind.

Benjamin said he went this route because other communities have denied PUD applications.

"If a PUD can help us and help you," he said, "then we're open to it."

■ Council voted Monday to approve final assessment rates for the 90 properties impacted by the city's Indian Waters Phase One Sewer Expansion Project.

Expected to break ground in 12 to 14 months, the project will take 77 septic tanks offline and hookup lots to Crystal River's sewer system.

City officials pursued the project to help reduce nitrogen leaking from septic tanks. Affected residents were going to pay the balance of what the city couldn't cover for the \$2,152,677 project.

In the end, council's vote gave property owners the option to either prepay the \$5,976 cost or pay an annual assessment of \$832 on their tax bill over the next 10 years, starting in November.

Residents were facing either an annual assessment of \$861 or an upfront charge of \$10,304.

City staff, however, was able to get an additional \$500,000 in state funding to help offset higher-than-budgeted costs, allowing for assessment reductions. Crystal River also contributed \$100,000.

City Manager Ken Frink said the city is applying for

grants to try and cover the \$3,200 fee each affected property owner is estimated to pay to connect their home within 365 days after city sewer is available.

■ Council voted Monday to keep Waste Management — formerly Advanced Disposal — as Crystal River's trash hauler until at least Sept. 30, 2028.

While Waste Management's original quotes were higher compared to its two competing bidders, city staff and their consultants recommended the company because of its unwavering service.

Following negotiations with city staff, Waste Management agreed to set the residential pickup rate at \$23.90 a month — a \$7.91 increase from the current rate. Waste Management will also unload commercial dumpsters at \$7.75 per cubic yard instead of \$8.73.

There were no changes to how trash and recycling will be collected from the curbsides or dumpsters within the city. Waste Management also agreed to take glass recycling.

To haul waste away from Crystal River, Waste Management must pay the city \$140,000 a year in equal monthly payments.

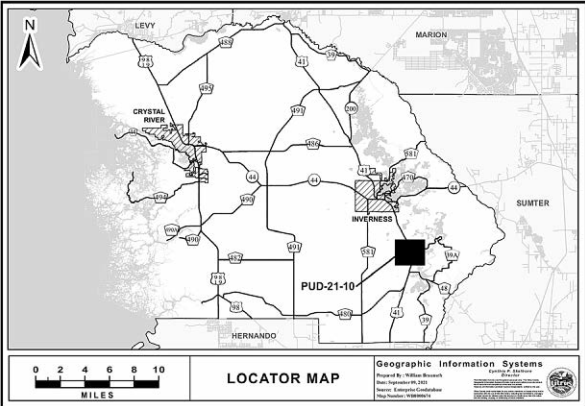

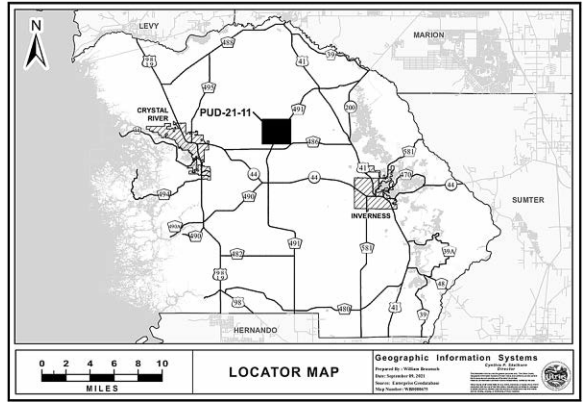

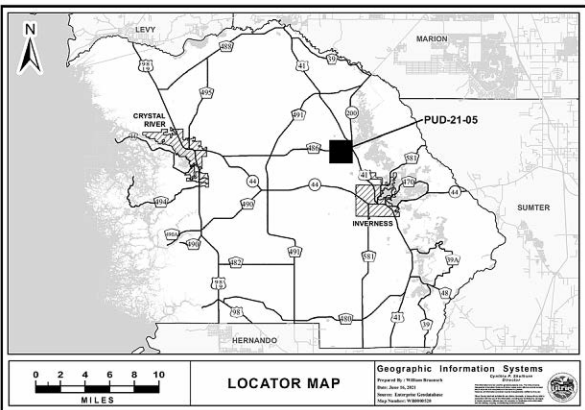

ambulance service provider’s need for more money. Oliver told the commission that the changeover would require a tax millage increase of between 0.10 mills and 0.20 mills to generate the needed money. Commissioners Ruthie Schlabach and Jeff Kinnard voted against the move. Schlabach wanted to give Nature Coast the additional money but with the directive to develop plans for a future merger with the county. She said

that voting to take over the service in 16 days would be a “knee jerk reaction” on her part. Kinnard said that Baxter had inherited many problems from Nature Coast’s previous administration, but had made great progress during the past 14 months. Other commissioners didn’t agree it was good enough. A frustrated Commissioner Ron Kitchen, who made the motion to take over the service, told Baxter the board had given Nature Coast “every dime you’ve asked for” in the past year but that the organization has “mismanaged” the money. He also

said Nature Coast failed to hire a chief financial officer who could have helped the nonprofit better handle and predict its financial needs. The public wants consistency and predictability in its law enforcement, fire services, and ambulance service, Kitchen said, and the public wasn’t getting it from Nature Coast. Commission Chairman Scott Carnahan told Baxter he didn’t blame him for the company’s faults, but said that the only way he would continue to fund Nature Coast was if its board was dismantled and new members appointed who could make the difficult decisions that were needed.

He said he didn’t see that immediate willingness from Mary Hedges, president of the Nature Coast board, who spoke during the meeting. Kitchen said that ultimately the public turns to the county commission to ensure it gets ambulance service and without last-minute demands for more money. Kitchen said the only way to ensure that was to take charge of the service. “If we’re going to get the blame, give us the responsibility,” he said. “We can’t have million dollar surprises,” he said of Baxter’s request for more money. “I just have a problem throwing money

after money after money.” Commissioner Holly Davis said she was torn over the issue before finally voting for the move. Philosophically, she said, she thought such a service should fall under the county’s operation. “They are too critical to fail,” she said of Nature Coast and ambulance service. Kitchen said his motion was no “knee jerk reaction” and that he had been mulling this over for the past three years. “I don’t make this motion lightly,” he said. Kitchen said he would rely on his county fire chief, Craig Stevens, for final guidance and

withdraw his motion if Stevens thought he couldn’t do it by Oct. 1. But Stevens told the commission he and his department could, with his first focus on providing good ambulance service to the county’s residents and keeping Nature Coast EMS employees at their jobs. But it won’t all be smooth, he warned. “I can tell you we’re going to run into some issues (during the transition),” he said. “(But) the biggest part will be your support.” Contact Chronicle reporter Fred Hiers at fred.hiers@chronicleonline.com or 352-397-5914.

move to a different way of evaluating students. “We are going to be ending that, and we are going to be replacing it with progress monitoring, which many school districts are doing anyway. This is short, individualized check-in assessments three times per year. This will take hours, not days, to be able to do these assessments,” DeSantis, flanked by legislators, education officials, teachers and parents, said during a news conference in Doral. DeSantis said the proposal would lead to assessing students in the fall, winter and spring, which would reduce the amount of time spent each year on testing. The state Department of Education said the proposed system will be dubbed F.A.S.T., Florida’s Assessment of Student Thinking. The governor described the proposed system as more “nimble” than administering standardized tests at the end of each school year. “It also informs teachers in real time during the school year, so that they can better help students. These progress monitoring tools will be customizable, it will even be unique to each student. It gives the ability to have timely data during the

school year, so you can make the necessary corrections,” DeSantis said. The move would make Florida the first state in the nation to “switch from end of the year assessments to state standards-aligned progress monitoring,” according to a news release from the governor’s office. It also would mark a change from the approach that many Florida Republican leaders have taken during the past two decades. Former Gov. Jeb Bush spearheaded that approach, arguing that

statewide standardized testing and accountability were needed to improve the education system. Patricia Levesque, executive director of the Foundation for Florida’s Future, which Bush founded, released a statement Tuesday that pointed to a need for “high expectations for students, strong summative assessments that are aligned to these expectations, school grading that holds the education system accountable for helping every child make progress and achieve, transparent and

clear information for parents on their child’s progress and performance, and strong interventions and supports for students and schools that need it.” Levesque expressed support for part of the DeSantis proposal to move “statewide assessments to an online and adaptive testing approach,” which she said “could provide teachers and more flexibility to teach

and students more time to learn, shorten testing time, allow tests to identify student performance more quickly, and return results back to parents and teachers more expediently.” But she said other parts of the proposal raise questions, such as whether changes could create “high stakes stressors on students three times a year” and whether the spring

progress-monitoring test would “simply be a replacement for the end of year test and result in teachers having less time to cover the full year of content.” Legislation to carry out the proposal has not been filed, but DeSantis said the current school year will be the last time the standardized tests will be administered if lawmakers approve the change.

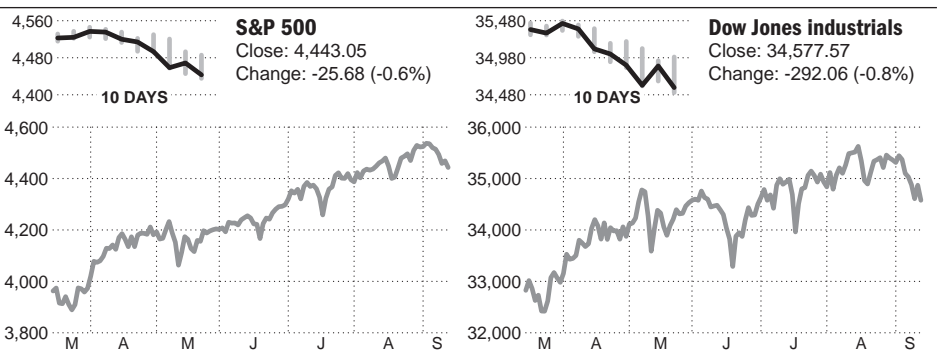

County to crack down on local internet cafes

People planning on opening an internet café in Citrus County might want to think twice. County commissioners Tuesday voted unanimously to crack down on café operators by directing the county attorney to draft an ordinance with more severe fines and longer jail time. The new ordinance allows deputies to fine operators per machine. So if a café had 30 games, the penalty would be a \$15,000 fine and five years in jail. A misdemeanor carried a 60-day jail term or \$500 fine.

Commissioner Jeff Kinard, who called for the ordinance, said he wanted to stop such places from opening. Period. State legislators in 2019 reduced the penalty for illegal activities at an internet café from a felony to a misdemeanor. That same year, the Citrus County's Sheriff's Office arrested several people at at least two such cafés when they found illegal gambling and drug activity. "We're not talking about minor crimes either," Lt. Craig Callahan told commissioners at the meeting. Callahan ticked off several serious crimes

occurring at the cafés, including strong-arm robbery and gun violence. Callahan said the sheriff's office had identified one internet café in Lecanto but that has been dealt with. Right now, there are none and he wants to keep it that way. The ordinance will be patterned after Marion County, which had 48 internet cafés in February. Within a week of passing the ordinance, all 48 were shut down, Callahan said. Contact Chronicle reporter Michael D. Bates at 352-563-3205 or mbates@chronicleonline.com. Legacy program rewarding for veterans, students

Twenty-nine years ago, Navy Korean War veteran Gene Rudd founded Citrus County’s Veterans Appreciation Week to preserve the legacy of those who serve our country in uniform during peace and war.

The cornerstone for preserving their legacy of service was the creation of a Veterans In The Classroom (VITC) program as a Veterans Appreciation Week activity where veterans would visit local school classrooms to share their firsthand experiences, adventures and travels with students.

During its first year, approximately a dozen veterans signed up, with about eight classrooms visited. Since that very modest beginning, the full cooperation of school officials, strong support of teachers, and forward-thinking program management of the local chapter by the Military Officers Association of America have matured the VITC into a model program that has received national recognition.

The heart of the VITC, however, is the participating veteran. Tailoring his or her classroom presentations to their unique service experiences, assignments and skills, they bring history alive for students by beguiling them with their real life adventures and aweing them with their stories of worldwide service while in uniform.

For participating veterans, their interaction with local

students from kindergarten through grade 12 is such an unforgettable and rewarding experience that once hooked they come back year after year as participants.

THE ISSUE:

Veterans in the Classroom.

OUR OPINION:

Bridging the past with the future through the eyes of veterans.

Nonetheless, since the VITC attained its peak a number of years ago, with well over 100 veterans and close to 300 classrooms visited, age, illness and relocation have slowly dwindled the number of participating veterans with a precipitous 20% drop in just the past two years. With the number of participating veterans now down to 60, the vitality of the program could be in jeopardy if this trend is not reversed.

Given that Citrus County is home to over 20,000 veterans, program manager Mark Bodenheimer has sent out a call for volunteers to sign up for the VITC program. Both new and past participants are asked to sign up by Oct. 13 using the recently adopted online registration system at www.citrusschools.org/home.

Local veterans are encouraged to rally to the call, not only to preserve their legacy of service in uniform, but by serving as a bridge for connecting the past with the future for local students.

Three decades ago, Gene Rudd had a dream that was made possible over the years by many participating veterans and supporters. Now, more veterans are needed to step forward to keep the dream alive.

Prepare for rising sea levels

Since I started the One Rake at a Time project in 2009, we have been working very diligently cleaning up and restoring King’s Bay over the past 12 years. Looking back now, I find it amazing how much energy was mustered to keep the project going. I am very glad that other people in the community also stepped up to help clean and restore the springs along the Nature Coast in a few other locations. All of our freshwater springs are important. We are a great example.

But all the work that has been done will be lost if we do not protect our springs from the rising sea levels in the future. There are many places in the world that have built dikes and levees to protect the land from saltwater intrusion. We need to take a close look at that and start designing plans and ways to protect the freshwater springs from the rising oceans.

As phase 1 of the Save Crystal River project wraps up in 2023, what is next?

How about a phase 2 where we keep the project going and clean up the areas that were not cleaned and replanted in phase 1, like Miller Creek and the canals around Bunts Point? We should never stop cleaning and restoring and protecting our freshwater springs.

My suggestion is that we should once again be the example and provide leadership. Let

us once again strive to be a good role model for other areas of Florida to follow.

We must aggressively start to explore ways to protect our land. I don’t think anyone wants to see all our hard work at restoring our springs here in King’s Bay, Crystal River, Homosassa Springs, Halls River or Chassahowitzka get flooded by the ocean and go under water.

It should be possible to build a dike and levee system that can protect our precious land and the freshwater springs it produces. Take a look at New Orleans. Their levee protection system was repaired and protected the city from a very powerful Hurricane Ida.

There needs to be a way to create a lock system here that will allow boats to navigate, and still keep out saltwater. We need to look around and use the latest technology to protect where we live.

Let’s create a safe manatee ladder that will allow our manatees to still access the warm water springs for a refuge in the winter months.

As I said, let us show leadership and be an example of how to do things smartly. Let’s start

planning now to be prepared for the future whatever it may bring.

Maybe restoring some of the old oyster beds and installing reef balls that can help limit large waves crashing against our shores would be a good idea. Oysters provide filtering of the water to help clean it. It would provide jobs. And it would provide locally grown food for us to eat. Oysters can be very successful and a natural fit for Crystal River and the Nature Coast.

A final note: The overcrowding that occurs sometimes on weekends at Three Sisters and other popular spots does not have to be destructive.

We need more public restrooms that are easily available for people to use so we are not forcing them to urinate and defecate in our nice clean spring water. Install anchor stations for boats so they don’t rip up the eel grasses on the bottom. Put a park ranger out there to help the police regulate excessive drinking and noise.

On this 26th year of Save Our Waters Week, let’s think about what comes next and prepare for the next 100 years. Let’s be a good example.

Months of progress wiped out as delta variant still rages

COVID-19 deaths and cases in the U.S. have climbed back to levels not seen since last winter, erasing months of progress and potentially bolstering President Joe Biden's argument for his sweeping new vaccination requirements.

The cases — driven by the delta variant combined with resistance among some Americans to getting the vaccine — are concentrated mostly in the South.

While one-time hot spots like Florida and Louisiana are improving, infection rates are soaring in Kentucky, Georgia and Tennessee, fueled by children now back in school, loose mask restrictions and low vaccination levels.

The dire situation in some hospitals is starting to sound like January's infection peak: Surgeries

canceled in hospitals in Washington state and Utah. Severe staff shortages in Kentucky and Alabama. A lack of beds in Tennessee. Intensive care units at or over capacity in Texas.

The deteriorating picture nine months into the nation's vaccination drive has angered and frustrated medical professionals who see the heartbreak as preventable. The vast majority of the dead and the hospitalized have been unvaccinated, in what has proved to be a hard lesson for some families.

"The problem now is we have been trying to educate based on science, but I think most of the education that is happening now is based on tragedy, personal tragedy," said Dr. Ryan Stanton, an emergency room physician in Lexington, Kentucky.

In Kentucky, 70% of the state's hospitals — 66 of 96 — are reporting critical staff shortages, the highest level yet during the pandemic, the governor said.

"Our hospitals are at the brink of collapse in many

communities," said Dr. Steven Stack, Kentucky's public health commissioner.

The U.S. is averaging over 1,800 COVID-19 deaths and 170,000 new cases per day, the highest levels respectively since early March and late January. And both figures have been on the rise over the past two weeks.

The country is still well below the terrifying peaks reached in January, when it was averaging about 3,400 deaths and a quarter-million cases per day.

The U.S. is dispensing about 900,000 vaccinations per day, down from a high of 3.4 million a day in mid-April. On Friday, a Food and Drug Administration advisory panel will meet to discuss whether the U.S. should begin giving booster shots of the Pfizer vaccine.

On a positive note, the number of people now in the hospital with COVID-19 appears to be leveling off or even declining at around 90,000, or about where things stood in February.

California governor faces recall

LONG BEACH, Calif. — With Gov. Gavin Newsom's fate at stake, Californians on Tuesday cast the last of the ballots that will decide whether he continues to lead them or if the nation's most populous state veers in a more conservative direction amid anger over his actions during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Newsom, a Democrat who is leading in polls, is only the fourth governor in U.S. history and the second in California to face a recall. He was elected in a landslide less than three

years ago. "I'm feeling good, as long as we can get out that vote," Newsom said after greeting volunteers in San Francisco hours before the polls closed.

A recall election has a less predictable dynamic than a regular election, he said.

"They designed this to catch us while we're sleeping," Newsom said. "But I think you've seen in the early voting Democrats have been coming out strong, and I'm just humbled by that."

The leading Republican candidate is conservative talk show host Larry Elder, who is seeking to become California's first Black governor.

Newsom got a final push late Monday from President Joe Biden, who warned that the contest could shape the country's direction on the pandemic, reproductive rights and the battle to slow climate change. The results also are likely to influence the 2022 midterm elections, when control of Congress will be in play again. The party that controls the White House historically loses seats in midterms.

Biden said the issues that defined the 2020 presidential race have been resurrected in California, with potentially disastrous results if Newsom is removed. Speaking to hundreds of cheering supporters during a

twilight rally in the coastal city of Long Beach, south of Los Angeles, Biden referred to Elder as a "clone" of Trump.

"The eyes of the nation are on California," he warned. The recall vote is "going to reverberate around the nation and ... around the world."

Elder staged his capstone rally in nearby Orange County, where he urged supporters to reach out to friends and neighbors to vote. The GOP will need a heroic Election Day turnout to catch Democrats, who have been turning in mail ballots in larger numbers. Nearly 8.6 million of California's 22 million voters already have cast mail-in ballots.

Book: Top brass huddled with China

Chairman of the Joint Chiefs reportedly feared Trump actions

WASHINGTON — Fearful of Donald Trump's actions in his final weeks as president, the United States' top military officer twice called his Chinese counterpart to assure him that the two nations would not suddenly go to war, a senior defense official said Tuesday after the conversations were described in excerpts from a forthcoming book.

Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Mark Milley told Gen. Li Zuocheng of the People's Liberation Army that the United States would not strike. One call took place on Oct. 30, 2020, four days before the election that defeated Trump. The second call was on Jan. 8, 2021, just two days after the insurrection at the U.S. Capitol by supporters of the

outgoing chief executive.

Trump said Milley should be tried for treason if the report was true.

Milley went so far as to promise Li that he would warn his counterpart in the event of a U.S. attack, according to the book "Peril," written by Washington Post journalists Bob Woodward and Robert Costa. The Associated Press obtained a copy of the book. Details from the book, which is set to be released next week, were first reported by The Washington Post on Tuesday.

"General Li, I want to assure you that the American government is stable and everything is going to be okay," Milley told him in the first call, according to the book. "We are not going to attack or conduct any kinetic operations against you."

"If we're going to attack, I'm going to call you ahead of time. It's not going to be a surprise," Milley

reportedly said.

According to the defense official, Milley's message to Li on both occasions was one of reassurance. The official questioned suggestions that Milley told Li he would call him first, and instead said the chairman made the point that the United States was not going to suddenly attack China without any warning — whether it be through diplomatic, administrative or military channels.

Milley also spoke with a number of other chiefs of defense around the world in the days after the Jan. 6 riot, including military leaders from the United Kingdom, Russia and Pakistan. A readout of those calls in January referred to "several" other counterparts that he spoke to with similar messages of reassurance that the U.S. government was strong and in control.

Boy Scouts settlement reached with primary insurer

DOVER, Del. — One of the primary insurers of the Boy Scouts of America announced Tuesday that it has reached a tentative settlement agreement with the organization and with attorneys representing tens of thousands of men who say they were molested decades ago by scoutmasters and others.

Under the agreement, insurance company The Hartford will pay \$787 million into a fund to be established for the men, the company said in a news release.

The proposed settlement is part of an ongoing effort by the Boy Scouts, which declared bankruptcy in February 2020, to forge a reorganization plan that must win approval by a majority of abuse victims and the court.

Tropical Storm Nicholas slows, dumps rain along Gulf Coast

SURFSIDE BEACH, Texas — Tropical Storm Nicholas slowed to a crawl over southeastern Texas and southwestern Louisiana Tuesday after blowing ashore as a hurricane, knocking out power to a half-million homes and businesses and dumping more than a foot of rain along the same area swamped by Hurricane Harvey in 2017.

Nicholas could potentially stall over storm-battered Louisiana and bring life-threatening floods across the Deep South over the coming days, forecasters said.

Nicholas made landfall early Tuesday on the eastern part of the Matagorda Peninsula and was soon downgraded to a tropical storm. It was about 50 miles east of Houston, with maximum winds of 40 mph as of 4 p.m. Tuesday, according to the National Hurricane Center in Miami. However, weather radar showed the heaviest rain Tuesday afternoon was over southwestern Louisiana, well east of the storm center.

Woman accuses fertility doctor of secretly using own sperm

A woman is suing a New York fertility doctor, claiming he used his own sperm to secretly impregnate multiple patients — something she said she discovered when DNA genealogy tests revealed she had at least nine half-siblings.

The lawsuit was filed Saturday by the 35-year-old daughter of a woman who got fertility treatments from Dr. Morris Wortman in Rochester in the 1980s. It said he falsely told the family the sperm donor had been a local medical student. He kept the truth a secret, the lawsuit said, even after the woman, his biological daughter, became his

gynecology patient.

Wortman was with patients and unavailable for comment Tuesday, his Rochester office said. The office did not immediately respond when asked for the name of an attorney who could speak on his behalf.

The case is one of more than 20 instances in recent years where fertility doctors have been accused of using their own sperm, rather than samples from anonymous donors, to treat patients. The discovery of such scenarios has been made possible with the rise of genealogy sites like Ancestry.com and 23andMe.

Haiti prosecutor seeks to charge PM in killing, is replaced

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — A new chief prosecutor was sworn in Tuesday just hours after his predecessor asked a judge to charge Prime Minister Ariel Henry in the slaying of the president and to bar him from leaving Haiti, a move that could further destabilize a country roiled by turmoil following the assassination and a recent major earthquake.

The request filed by Port-au-Prince prosecutor Bed-Ford Claude, who was fired by Henry, came on the same day that the prosecutor had asked that the prime minister come to a meeting and explain why he spoke twice with a key suspect in the assassination of President Jovenel Moïse just hours after the killing.

German far-right party allowed to keep 'Hang the Greens' ads

BERLIN — A German court has ruled that a small far-right party can continue to put up election posters with the slogan "Hang the Greens" that authorities in an eastern city ordered removed.

But the administrative court in Chemnitz said Tuesday that the posters put up by the tiny III. Weg (Third Way) party must be kept at a minimum 328-foot distance from the Green party's posters, news agency dpa reported. The environmentalist Greens are one of three parties running for the chancellor in Germany's Sept. 26 parliamentary election.

Minister pledges Taliban govt won't allow militant attacks

KABUL, Afghanistan — Afghanistan's new foreign minister said Tuesday that the Taliban governing the country remain committed to not allowing militants to use their territory to launch attacks. But he refused to say when or if the country's new rulers would create a more inclusive government.

The Taliban received sharp criticism last week after they announced a Cabinet made up entirely of men.

How to spot signs of cyberbullying

Signs to recognize

Despite its relative infancy, the internet has become so prevalent in daily life that it's hard to imagine a time when it wasn't so widely available. Yet that time wasn't so long ago. In fact, many adults who are now entering or in middle-age made it through their secondary educations without the internet. That's not so for today's students, and that divide can sometimes make it difficult for parents to spot signs that their children are victims of cyberbullying.

Cyberbullying refers to the use of electronic communication to bully a person, typically by sending intimidating and/or threatening messages. These messages may be sent in various ways, including through apps or via social media platforms. According to StopBullying.gov, a website managed by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, research has shown that a quick and consistent response to bullying is an effective way to convey that such behavior is unacceptable. But parents first must learn to recognize signs of cyberbullying, which is not always as easy to spot as other bullying behaviors.

The Anti-Defamation League notes that hateful words and rumors are often a component of cyberbullying. In such instances, that abuse can follow young people home, giving them the

idea that the bullying is inescapable. In decades past, bullying victims could at least see their homes as safe havens. That's no longer the case, which is why it's vital that parents learn to recognize the signs of cyberbullying.

Young people may exhibit their own unique symptoms if they're being victimized by cyberbullies. In addition, the ADL notes that parents can look for these signs and then

take immediate action if they suspect their children are being cyberbullied.

- A child becomes upset, sad or angry during or after being online or using their phone.

- A child withdraws from family or friends.

- A child expresses reluctance or refuses to participate in activities previously enjoyed.

- A child has an unexplained decline in grades.

- A child refuses to go to school or expresses anger or dissatisfaction with a specific class or school in general.

- A child increasingly reports symptoms of illness for which he or she wants to stay at home.

- A child shows signs of depression or sadness.

The ADL urges parents who see any of these signs to respond to them immediately. Take a gentle,

supportive tone during any discussions with children, making sure to express your concerns while also listening to the child when he or she explains what is so upsetting.

Parents who have confirmed or suspect their child is a victim of cyberbullying should contact their children's school immediately. More information about how to respond to cyberbullying and prevent its recurrence is available at www.StopBullying.gov.

Mistakes, penalties lead to FSU's start

Seminoles 0-2 for third time in five years

TALLAHASSEE — Mike Norvell said he believes in his players and that Florida State has lost two games to start the season they should have won. But they haven't.

Any ascent from a 3-6 season in 2020 has instead been halted by a demoralizing loss where the Seminoles took two steps back. Florida State has struggled to get started in September, dropping five straight season openers.

This September has been a wild ride — an overtime loss to No. 9 Notre Dame that seemed to indicate signs of

improvement but then a stunning 20-17 loss to FCS Jacksonville State on Saturday.

"I believe in who these kids are and what they're about," Norvell said. "But obviously that's not occurring and we're not doing that for 60 minutes to the level. So, yes, the first week, we lost a game I believe we should've won. Same thing happened Saturday night. First week, people are happy we played hard. Well, that's going to be the standard. We're going to play hard."

The Seminoles are 0-2 for the third

Choi and Lowe homer, Tampa Bay beats Blue Jays 2-0

TORONTO — Drew Rasmussen combined with four relievers on a three-hitter. Brandon Lowe and Ji-Man Choi homered and the Tampa Bay Rays became the first AL team to reach 90 wins by beating the Toronto Blue Jays 2-0 Tuesday night.

After losing four of their previous five, the East-leading Rays hit the 90-win mark for the eighth time — all in

the past 14 seasons.

Pitching well and playing good defense to defeat a post-season contender put the Rays in an October frame of mind.

"Mike Zunino came in after the game and said 'That's what a playoff game feels like,'" Rasmussen said. "To go out there and see how well our pitching staff did, and also how well our defense played, that really gives our team a lot of confidence. We can match up with the best of them."

Lowe also sensed a playoff energy in the game.

"It definitely felt very postseason-like," Lowe said. "Every at bat was tense, on both sides of the diamond."

Tampa Bay (90-55) stopped a two-game losing streak. The Rays have not lost three in a row since July 25-28.

Blue Jays right-hander José Berrios (11-8) allowed one run and four hits in seven innings before leaving because of

Cantlay named top PGA player

Patrick Cantlay closed out another victory, this time without hitting a shot.

Cantlay was voted PGA Tour player of the year by his peers, capturing the Jack Nicklaus Award that could be seen as a referendum on how players value winning the FedEx Cup.

His solid year became so much more over the final two weeks of the season when Cantlay won a six-hole playoff at the BMW Championship over Bryson DeChambeau and then captured the FedEx Cup with a one-shot victory over Jon Rahm in the Tour Championship.

"The fact that it's voted on by my fellow PGA Tour players, I think that means a lot to me," Cantlay said Tuesday. "It wasn't something that I necessarily thought was on the radar middle of the year, but then I closed really well and played a lot of really nice golf towards the end."

It presumably was a tight race over Rahm, the No. 1 player in the world who won the PGA Tour money title and the Vardon Trophy for the lowest scoring average.

The PGA Tour, however, does not reveal the final vote or even how many players voted, wanting the focus to be more on who won instead of who didn't.

But it was hard to separate the two on the golf course and on paper.

Cantlay had four victories last season, twice as many as anyone else, and he wound up

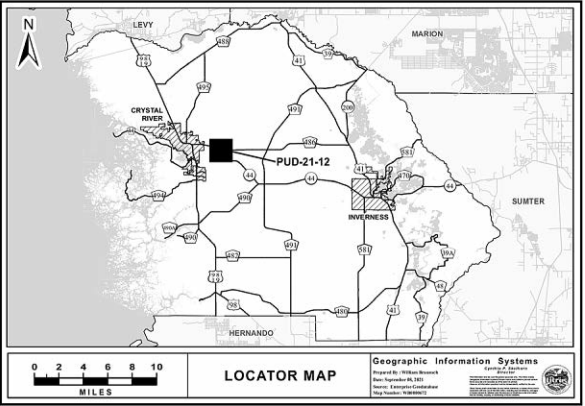

Rescue, rehabilitate, release

Nature World Wildlife Rescue in Homosassa cares for around 1,200 animals a year

The call came on a recent Saturday when Sonja Bussiere was answering the phone for Nature World Wildlife Rescue in Homosassa.

Susanna Marren of Inverness was on the line. Her son, Michael S. Marren, had spotted a large sandhill crane in their yard with what seemed to be a broken leg. Could someone from the rescue come and get the bird?

Bussiere told the Marrens it would be better if they tried to catch it. Because the bird was in their yard, it was more used to them than to her. She told them: Throw a blanket or large towel over the bird, "wrap him up like a burrito," and bring him in.

She cautioned the Marrens to wear glasses because the bird might try to peck their eyes. Wrap up his feet, as well, she told them. He can kick and scratch with those.

Michael J. Marren said his son, Michael S., did "99%" of the work after that. Within 45 minutes, the Marrens had bundled up the bird

and toted him over to the rescue in their 2007 Toyota Tundra with the windows open so the bird "could feel a fresh breeze," according to Michael J.

All the way, Michael S., whom his dad said is "strong as hell," held the bird by his neck, stroking it and telling him, "You're going to be OK."

The bird "calmed down tremendously," Michael J. said.

Upon arrival, Bussiere made an initial assessment and tried to fix a dislocated knee.

The Marrens returned home with the hope the bird would return to their yard. The recovery time might take three to five weeks.

Michael J. said when the bird returned, he wanted to celebrate its homecoming. The family also proposed names for the bird: "Susan" if it were a girl and "Mikey" if it were a boy.

HOW TO HELP

Bussiere said the bird rested at the rescue for a couple days. Then she and the rescue's Director Mary Opall took the bird to Midway Animal Hospital in Homosassa.

Opall said an X-ray showed the bird had an old break between his heel and ankle, with two bones broken. A knot had formed on the bird's knee as his body tried to repair itself. Above the knot, his leg was dislocated. The leg would have to be amputated above the knee.

"Given all that, Midway chose to put him down," Opall said. "He wasn't making it."

She said having to euthanize "something so strong and so good" is not a choice the rescue and the veterinarian make lightly.

The rescue was founded in 1985 by the former Homosassa Springs Nature World attraction and by Midway veterinarians K.C. Nayfield and Mark Lowe.

And their work goes on. As Bussiere spoke about her role in the crane rescue, she reported she was riding around in her jeep, rescuing baby squirrels and raccoons. As she talked on the phone, a woman met her in a parking lot and gave her a young squirrel, bringing the total to five small squirrels in the jeep.

There also were four baby raccoons and a baby opossum.

Opall said the rescue's mission is to rehabilitate wildlife and release the animals into nature. "We want them to go and be wild," she said.

The rescue relies entirely on donations. Bussiere said the animals' food bill is \$30,000 a year. And the rescue, of course, has many other expenses.

Bussiere said it was unfortunate the crane didn't survive, but she said she was impressed by the Marrens.

She said she was "blown away" when the Marrens "showed up with a beautiful adult crane. ... It was just amazing."

Bussiere, who previously lived in Maine and Boston, said she's often inspired by "the dedication of some of the Floridians. ... I love the people here. They care so much about the animals."

When informed the crane had died, Michael J. Marren said, "We tried. That's a shame." He said he had been unfamiliar with the rescue until his wife started making phone calls. He said he was impressed with the rescue and the volunteers and said he hopes some good might come from telling his story.

Opall said before COVID, the rescue cared for about 1,200 animals a year. The group doesn't rescue alligators or large cats, although they have cared for a bobcat. They do rescue birds, squirrels, raccoons, and opossums,

among other wildlife.

"My passion is to see them be released," said Opall, who has been with the rescue since 1996.

Bussiere said the rescue always welcomes contributions.

The group also could use a volunteer to help with paperwork and write grants, she said. Opall said one thing the rescue needs is a mobile X-ray machine.

Annie's advice

Dear Annie: You recently printed a letter from two physicians with an alcoholic daughter. Al-Anon is the organization that supports friends and families of alcoholics, and Alcoholics Anonymous is support for the individual with a drinking problem. You recommended Alcoholics Anonymous.

We were in this couple's shoes recently. Our daughter finally saw an addiction specialist, who prescribed a once-a-month shot to eliminate the desire for alcohol. She took the shot for a year, and it was expensive, but it worked. It's been three years now, and she has no desire to drink. The shot saved her life.

I am sending this letter in the hope that other families can learn of this life-changing, once-a-month shot. — **A Relieved Mother**

Dear Relieved Mother: Thank you for sharing a suggestion that saved your daughter's life. Hopefully, it can help others struggling in similar situations. The next letter is from another reader whose family also struggled with addiction.

Dear Annie: I want to address the physicians whose daughter is experiencing advanced alcoholism. Advising that she must "reach a bottom" is conventional wisdom, and it has its place. I would add that empirical studies of alcoholism and addiction have shown that many people recover in stages as their motivation increases.

An excellent source is the book "Beyond Addiction: How Science and Kindness Help People Change" by Jeffrey Foote, Carrie Wilkens, Nicole Kosanke and Stephanie Higgs.

I have found help with my approach to my loved ones in Al-Anon, and I am a 12-stepper myself for food addiction. Beyond my own experience, I was encouraged when I learned that there are ways that family members can help, besides waiting for the alcoholic or addict to reach a bottom.

In my case, there was heroin addiction in my adult child. A lot of times, this addiction will kill a person before he or she "hits bottom." I learned ways to change my own attitudes and behaviors. I was helped also by the Center for Motivation and Change in New York City, which made available to me trained lay counselors over the phone for free. They can be found online.

I was not the cause of my adult child's recovery; that is between the person and God. But I was able to help, and there were moments when I was the catalyst for a step in the right direction.

I am grateful today that my child lives with sobriety, grateful more than I can express. My heart goes out to other parents and partners of suffering people. I have intact adult children and a beautiful grandchild. — **A Friend in Pennsylvania**

Dear Friend in Pennsylvania: Thank you for your letter. It brings up an important flaw in the "hit bottom" theory, which is that by the time some people reach it, it is too late for them. My hope is that anyone struggling feels your friendship and hope for them that they have the courage to change.

Dear Annie: Loved the idea of giving the cellphone a rest for a few days. When we were raising our kids, my wife and I had what we called "pioneer night."

Once a month, we would shut the power off in the house for a few hours. We shut everything down but the fridge. And yes, we were careful with the candles.

This practice allowed us to have some good quality time together. I miss those pioneer nights at times. — **Pioneer Nights**

Dear Pioneer: Thank you for your letter. I love your family tradition of literally unplugging everything. Maybe when the kids and grandkids come to visit, you can have another pioneer night. I hope your letter inspires other families to do the same.
