Citrus County COVID-19 update

Twenty-three new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest FDOH update. Two new hospitalizations were reported; three new deaths were reported.

To date in the county, 2,983 people have tested positive (including 12 non-residents). 308 have been hospitalized and 124 have died.

Survivor of domestic violence shares story of how she found freedom

Editor's note: October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Centers for Disease Control statistics say 1 in 4 women will suffer some sort of domestic abuse in her lifetime, whether it's emotional abuse or physical violence.

To spotlight the need for awareness and the reality that this is happening to your friends, family members and co-workers who *might be trying their hardest to* hide their shame, the Chronicle is telling the story of Christy, one woman who successfully got her life back after living a nightmare of abuse.

Dry season prompts opening of water structures

It's the middle of October and the dry season has started, causing lake levels to drop.

Mark Fulkerson, chief professional engineer with the Southwest Florida Water Management District, said the agency has opened the water structures on the entire Tsala-Apopka lake

This summer, the chain of lakes "filled up nicely" from rainfall and inflows from the Withlacoochee River, Fulkerson said. The district closed the structures in mid-September after the lakes hit their target levels.

But recently, lack of substantial rain has caused lake and river levels to drop so several are still high and inflows are evaporation and leakage to the being shared by all three pools in the chain, Fulkerson said.

Reopening the structures now takes advantage of temporarily available Withlacoochee River inflows, Fulkerson said.

The river is currently about 1 foot higher than the Floral

"But the river has peaked and is now dropping, so we probably have about a three-week window of available river water before river levels drop below lake levels," he said. "We are now moving river water in to help top off the lakes for this year's wet season and store as much water as possible going into the dry season.

"Overall, I don't expect lake levels to rise too much, but the tranquil now. A broad area of

The structures are being opened slowly at first to help mix river and lake water. But in the coming days, they will open more, he said.

Once river levels naturally drop below lake levels, the structures will close again to help conserve water in the lake chain during the upcoming dry season, he said.



Barrett tells doubtful Dems she'd keep open mind on court

WASHINGTON — Supreme Court nominee Amy Coney Barrett presented herself Wednesday in her final round of Senate confirmation questioning as a judge with a traditional approach, holding deep personal and religious beliefs but committed to keeping an open mind on what would become a 6-3 conservative majority court.

Senate Republicans are championing President Donald Trump's pick, who adheres to a strict reading of the Constitution. Doubtful Democrats are digging deeper into the judge's approach to health care, abortion, racial equity and voting rights, but they are running out of time to stop her quick confirmation.

The conservative late Justice Antonin Scalia was a mentor, but Barrett said when confronted with his rulings and outspoken comments that she is her own judge.

"When I said that Justice Scalia's philosophy is mine, too, I certainly didn't mean to say that every sentence that came out of Justice Scalia's mouth or every sentence that he wrote is one that I would agree with," Barrett told the Senate Judiciary Committee,

Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., opened the final day of her testimony praising Trump's nominee as an "unashamedly pro-life" conservative who is making history as a role model for other women.

Her nomination to replace the late Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg has ground other legislative business to a halt as Republicans excited by the prospect of locking in a 6-3

conservative court majority race to confirm her over Democratic objections before Election Day.

"She's going to the court," Graham said. "This is the first time in American history that we've nominated a woman who's unashamedly pro-life and embraces her faith without apology."

As virus surges anew, Italy under pressure again

MILAN — Coronavirus infections are surging anew in the northern Italian region where the pandemic first took hold in Europe, putting pressure again on hospitals and health care workers.

At Milan's San Paolo hospital, a ward dedicated to coronavirus patients and outfitted with breathing machines reopened this weekend, a sign that the city and the surrounding area is entering a new emergency phase of the pandemic.

Months after Italy eased one of the globe's toughest lockdowns, the country on Wednesday posted its highest ever daily total of new infections at 7,332 - surpassing the previous high of 6,557, recorded during the virus's

most deadly phase in March. Lombardy is again leading the nation in case numbers, an echo of the trauma of March and April when ambulance sirens pierced the silence of stilled cities.

So far, Italy's death toll remains significantly below the spring heights, hovering around 40 in recent days. That compares with the high of 969 dead nationwide one day in late March.

In response to the new surge, Premier Giuseppe Conte's government twice tightened nationwide restrictions inside a week. Starting Thursday, Italians cannot play casual pickup sports, bars and restaurants face a midnight curfew, and private celebrations in public venues are banned. Masks are mandatory outdoors as of last week.

But there is also growing concern among doctors that Italy squandered the gains it made during its 10-week lockdown and didn't move quick enough to reimpose restrictions. Concerns persist that the rising stress on hospitals will force scheduled surgeries and screenings to be postponed — creating a parallel health emergency, as happened in the spring.



It's alleged Hallowell struck his adoptive mother to death with an ax while she was sleeping.

He then told responding Citrus County Sheriff's Office authorities someone broke into the house, but future investigations contradicted Hallowell's statements, leading to his arrest in September and his indictment in October.

If convicted, Hallowell, who has no prior criminal history, could be sentenced to up to life in prison. He's ineligible for death row since he was a minor when the alleged murder happened.

■ Another court date was set for Michael Kenneth Ball, the Beverly Hills 63-year-old accused of fatally shooting his 32-year-old neighbor, Taylor Dorbert, outside his home during an argument.

Victim of abuse says others can get help, rebuild

By the time Christina De-Bruyn left her husband, she had been in and out of hospitals for anxiety and depression and her weight was down to 83 pounds.

"I was so skinny," she recalled about her abusive relationship, "people must have thought I was doing drugs because I was so skinny."

When she began dating her future husband, she didn't see the signs that he would become controlling. Soon enough, he stopped her from continuing college, kept her from getting a job, dictated what friends she could see, and got electronic access to her phone call records and emails.

DeBruyn, now 36, wants other women to avoid the mistakes she made. The Chronicle interviewed her in 2017 when she was still attending a support group for abused women that was hosted by the Citrus County Abuse Shelter Association (CASA).

"What was I thinking?" DeBruyn told the Chronicle recently, shaking her head stayed with her husband as long as she did.

She said he later used economic fears to try and keep her from leaving.

So when DeBruyn tried to leave the relationship, in retrospect about why she said her husband reminded her, "You can't make it on your own. You don't even have a job."

And as with many domestic abuse cases, children were involved.

DeBruyn said she had become like a mother to her ex-husband's two children, as well as mother to a child they had together.

DeBruyn thought she was alone until she went to CASA for help and met other women in similar relationships.

Control and intimidation were common themes that ran through all the abusive relationships.

Every month, the National Domestic Violence Hotline receives more than 27,000 calls for help. It's estimated that more than 10 million Americans annually are the victims of emotional or physical harm from their partners.

DeBruyn said the first time she recognized her ex-husband was controlling was the day they married. She recalls he had been Domestic Violence. drinking and said she now belonged to him.

She remembers thinking, 'what the hell did I do' marrying this man?

Things only got worse. But DeBruyn said she wanted the relationship to

According to Mental tims stay for many reasons.

Her reasons for staying in About 50% of men and the relationship were common among abuse victims: children, promises to change, fear of being on your own, thinking their partner loves them, or often domestic partners are maybe thinking they denot physically abusive, but serve the abuse and can't find anybody better.

> To keep peace, she said she would often put their children to bed and try to be asleep when he came home from work.

> That was about the time she was losing weight and suffered anxiety attacks, severe enough she went to emergency rooms.

> Studies show that domestic abuse, whether physical or emotional, often becomes too much for its victims who then suffer from depression and often see

Partner problems were identified in 26% of all suicide cases, according to a study published in 2019 in the Journal of Injury and Violence Research. Domestic violence played a role in 43% of suicides, according to the study.

Regardless, DeBruyn said her ex-husband was bound to be mad about something and would let it out on her or her son from a previous relationship.

About 42% of people stay in abusive relationships between one to three years. More than 10% stay seven years or longer.

In 2016, she decided to leave her ex-husband and requested the court grant her a protective order. She said the court did.

But like many women, she gave him another chance when he promised he would change. He didn't.

In 2017, DeBruyn finally left her ex-husband.

One of the reasons was her stepdaughter encouraged her to leave her father, DeBruyn recalled.

DeBruyn left and took her two children from a previous relationship with her, along with their shared daughter, and moved in with her parents in their twobedroom, two-bathroom home. It was crowded, but it was better than her home with her ex-husband.

She attended support groups hosted by CASA and enrolled in college again and in 2019 earned her degree in health care administration. She got a job as a victim advocate working for CASA.

She enrolled in Habitat for Humanity, where her home is currently under construction.

She said that only after she left her ex-husband did her son tell her he had also been violent against him when DeBruyn wasn't

Arnold said part of the process was not to only empower CASA's women of

suicide as their only way abuse, but also the children who were exposed to the domestic abuse.

'Children can learn it from watching mom and dad," Arnold said, warning that children will often grow up to abuse their spouses. "For some of them, that's how they saw their dad treat mom.

The job is then to educate children that the domestic abuse they saw was not acceptable.

One in 15 children are exposed to domestic violence annually, according to a survey by the National Survey of Children's Exposure to Violence. Of these children, 90% are eyewitnesses to this domestic violence.

Domestic violence also costs financially.

Between 21-60% of victims of domestic violence lose their jobs because of reasons related to their abuse, according to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence. The cost of partner violence is estimated to exceed \$8.3 billion annually.

Like most people who have been the victims of domestic abuse, DeBruyn said she is especially sensitive to potential signs that she is around someone who could be an abuser.

She also periodically reviews her notes from CA-SA's support group meetings to make sure she never again becomes involved with an abuser. Her goals, and the goals

she thinks would help many others, are to be independent, not rely on others, and be able to pay her own bills. And don't think it can't happen to you, DeBruyn

warned. "A lot more people than you think are in (abusive) relationships than you think," she said.

Backers of a new animal shelter also want it built in Lecanto, centrally located, which would also free up potentially valuable county property near the Inverness Airport where the shelter now sits.





Law school dean accidentally emails bar exam results

COLUMBIA, S.C. — The dean of South Carolina's largest law school is apologizing for forwarding an email that contained the names of students who failed the exam to become a lawyer and the confidential bar exam grades of every student.

Carolina School of Law Dean William Hubbard said he was so excited last week when he got the official email that 82% of his students passed that he forwarded it without noticing

the attachments that were

supposed to remain private.

"It was totally an accident, an accident I deeply regret," Hubbard told The State newspaper. "I've sent a personal email to every one of those students, and I've had an email dialogue with some of them and some phone conversations and plan to make myself available to any stu-

dent who wants to meet." Names of students who fail the bar exam are supposed to never be published and scores for those who passed are not revealed.

Hubbard said he thought he was just forwarding a letter with the overall results for the

Hubbard took over as dean of the law school in August. He was once on the university's Board of Trustees and is a former president of the American Bar Association.

G-20 suspends poor nations' debt payments again

WASHINGTON — The Group of 20 nations, representing the world's biggest economies, say they have agreed to extend the suspension of debt payments by an additional six months to

support the most vulnerable countries in their fight against

the coronavirus pandemic. The G-20 announcement was made on Twitter during a meeting of the group's finance ministers and central bank governors. The suspension of more than \$14 billion in debt payments had been due to expire at the end of the year. Wednesday's decision gives developing nations until the end of June 2021 to focus spending on health are and emergency stimulus programs rather than debt repayments.


The virtual discussions are being held at the start of this week's meetings of the 189-nation International Monetary Fund and the World Bank, which are also being conducted virtually because of the coronavirus pandemic.

"We still need to do more." Mohammed al-Jaardan, the finance minister for Saudi Arabia, this year's chair of the G-20, said at a news conference after the meeting. "We must ensure these nations are fully supported to tackle the COVID-19 pandemic. We have agreed to extend the debt suspension initiative by six months.'

Al-Jaardan said there will be further discussions at next year's spring meetings to decide whether the suspension should be extended further. He stressed that the pandemic has threatened the fiscal stability of many countries. particularity the poorest.



COVID deaths in perspective

Don't you find it strange that the news media likes to compare COVID deaths to the number of deaths in this war, that war, or these wars combined?

Why aren't they comparing COVID deaths to other health related deaths? Perhaps because the number is not as alarming and catastrophic?

Don't get me wrong, COVID-19 is serious and some of the people who survive have had a tough go of it. However, I thought it would help to put a health death perspective on this. The following are final death totals

from the CDC for 2017: Total number of deaths: 2,813,503. Heart disease: 647,457. Cancer: 599,108. Accidents: 169,201.

Stroke: 146,383. Alzheimer's: 121,404. Diabetes: 83,564.

Influenza and Pneumonia: 55,672. Kidney disease: 50,633. Suicide: 47,173.

Lalso suspect some fraction of our COVID deaths are ones that occurred with the disease instead of because of it.

Electric vehicles would strain power grid

I read with interest the letter last week extolling the virtues of electric vehicles (EVs). It painted a very rosy picture of the future that may not have been completely accurate. Our electric grid is able to support a small percentage of EVs but any large number is untenable.

I don't want to get too technical, but a basic understanding of the electric grid is necessary. I spent half a century in the electric utility business and need to point out that our grid is an extremely synchronized and balanced system; to maintain the parameters necessary for proper operation of electrical equipment, generation supply must almost exactly equal demand. Theoretically, when you turn on a 100watt light, a power plant somewhere must increase generation by 100 watts. If area demand exceeds generation capacity by even a small percentage, the result is a blackout.

A fairly efficient EV (e.g., Tesla S) uses a little over 300 watts/mile. Over the course of a year driving 15,000 miles, it consumes about 5000 kW hours. This is an amount equal to around four month's usage of the average house. So for every three EVs, we put the equivalent of another home on the grid. The U.S. has around 300 million autos, so even if only half (150 million) are changed to EVs, we have added the equivalent of 50 million new homes to the grid.

A large power plant, like the new Duke plants, produces enough power (850 megawatts) to supply about 650,000 homes. Simple math shows we will need a minimum of 80 new plants, and in reality to account for maintenance and outages, probably 100. These numbers assume most charging will occur in the evenings and not during the day at peak load times — probably unrealistic. The U.S. builds the equivalent of 35 Duke Citrus plants every year to replace retiring units and to support increased demand. The 100 number will be in addition to those.

The use of solar is often suggested as a solution but it also has drawbacks a solar field capable of providing a single megawatt covers around 4 acres; i.e. an 850 megawatt solar plant would cover around 3,500 acres - and since it only works during the day, it actually supplies a maximum of 425 megawatts per (sunny) day!

Yes, EVs are way cool and futuristic, but don't plan on getting rid of that gas guzzler.

Opponents question information on Florida toll road project plans

"Tracking it this way has allowed the department to ensure the topics mentioned by the public were discussed at task force meetings. This means that, in the event the proposed corridors meet environmental and financial feasibility, the task forces have had the opportunity to consider all actionable feedback and input via multiple productive discussions."

Frady noted environmental and financial feasibility studies will be conducted in the next phases of the program. A transportation corridor must be environmentally and financially feasible to be built.

Support for the roads has come from groups such as the Florida Chamber of Commerce, Associated Industries of Florida, the Florida Ports Council and the Florida Trucking Association.

Proponents say the roads would prepare the state for future growth and aid in disaster evacuations. Opponents have expressed concerns about urban sprawl and threats to wildlife.

The task forces will hold daylong virtual and in-person meetings and evening open houses next week.

The Southwest-Central Florida Corridor Task Force, which is working on the project linking Collier and Polk counties, will meet Monday. An open house on the road is planned Tuesday at the Charlotte Harbor Event and Conference Center in Punta Gorda.

The Suncoast Corridor Task extension of the Suncoast Parkway, will meet Tuesday. An open house is set for Thursday at the Madison County Church of God in Madison.

The Northern Turnpike Corridor Task Force, which is working on the turnpike extension, will meet Wednesday. An open house is Thursday at the Plantation on Crystal







Joey Wendle hit a go-ahead, tworun single two batters after another critical error by José Altuve, and the Rays beat the Houston Astros 5-2 on Tuesday night for a 3-0 lead in the AL Championship Series.

Kiermaier, a three-time Gold Glove winner in center field, saved multiple runs for the Rays with two outstanding catches before leaving with a hand injury. Hunter Renfroe, acquired from the San Diego Padres last December, made a pair of terrific grabs in right.

"We've played just tremendous defense all season long," Tampa Bay manager Kevin Cash said. "It's a credit to the guys how hard they work at it."

Towering righty Tyler Glasnow, who grew up just north of Los Angeles, tried to complete the series sweep and deliver the Rays their first pennant in 12 years Wednesday night when he opposed Zack Greinke in Game 4.

Kiermaier, the longest-tenured Tampa Bay player, said it was "an amazing feeling" to be so close to going to the Fall Classic.

"I knew that this group would be capable of getting to this point. I had no doubt in my mind," the 30-year-old Kiermaier said, praising everyone from the front office to the coaches to the players. "This is what it's all about. I'm so proud to be a part of this and have so much fun with these guys."

Defending West champion Wisconsin and No. 24 Minnesota are expected to battle it out again for the division title.

Just getting to this point has been an adventure. The Big Ten initially put out a 10-game schedule on Aug. 5 only to cancel the season six

days later in the name of player safety. As the ACC, Big 12 and SEC pushed forward with plans to play, the outcry against the Big Ten's decision was relentless. Nebraska hinted it might schedule games on its own and eight of its players sued the conference. Groups of players' parents demanded further explanation from Commissioner Kevin Warren and demonstrated near league headquarters. President Donald Trump phoned Warren and encouraged him to play.



Tdo all of my hunting while on the ground using whatever cover is available as much as I can, to hide myself. As a fat guy, I honestly hide better on the ground by blending into the landscape than skylighting myself

up a tree. I think that for some folks, treestands or other elevated platforms can be a distinct advantage, but let's face it, even camo'd and in the treetops, my big behind isn't really fooling much. At times, I could almost hear the deer discussing it.... "Hey Ned, that a hunter up there?"

"Naw, too big, I think it's a giant squirrel's nest.'

'Yeah, then why is it eating a

Back in the day, we didn't have a lot of camo clothing options. Growing up in the 70s, we usually

wore blue jeans and military surplus, woodland camo T-shirts or jackets. Camo's purpose is to blend hunters with their surroundings, giving us an edge on their prey. However, there weren't camo patterns available for every type of terrain and habitat in the early days like there are today. With minimal search effort, we can now acquire camo to suit just about any terrain.

Most all of y'all know that bulky camo encumbers and restricts movement. Often, walking or moving in this type of clothing requires more effort and really brings on the perspiration. So, choose your camo from companies which design their hunting clothing around athletic cuts that maximize your range of motion. We need to be able to walk, move and draw our bows or raise our firearms with ease. Most restrictions occur at the hips, knees, elbows and shoulders, so when first trying it on, pay attention to these pressure points.

Camouflage is really a system with many working parts. The best hunting apparel manufacturers offer tops and bottoms for all types of weather, and believe me, investing in a pair for all three stages of the season is worth it if you want to be the most effective predator possible. And don't forget that your face and hands are big standouts in the woods; face masks, gloves or grease paints are highly advised.

Blending in goes deeper yet. My grandfather, who never wore camouflage, was one of the most successful hunters I've ever met. He used to say, "the best way to hide, was to sit downwind in the shadows and move with the woods.' Basically, what he taught me is to time my movements to match the speed of movement in the surrounding foliage. On windy days you can get away with more, but on light breezy days, if you have to move, time your movements accordingly and if there's no wind, remain perfectly still. Don't let yourself stand out by contrasting with the movement of your cover or all of the pains taken to blend in via color and pattern will be wasted.

"One of the things I want to encourage was whatever our local health officials come and out say, 'This is the number of people that we're going to allow at the game right now," Mullen said. "I want to encourage those people to come in, bring the energy, bring the excitement into the stadium and help our team to win and bring that energy that they bring of what makes the Swamp such a special place to go play in."

Stricklin made it clear Wednesday that Mullen overstepped his area of expertise and added that the plan for the rest of 2020 would be to allow up to 17,000 fans (25% ca-

pacity) at Florida Field for home games. 'That number will change one day. I don't know when they'll change," Stricklin said. "But until that changes, this is where we're going to be."

NEW YORK — The NFL has canceled next January's Pro Bowl scheduled for Las Vegas.

During an owners meeting held virtually on Wednesday, the league opted to call off the all-star game, hoping to replace it with a variety of virtual activities. The NFL needs flexibility in January in case it needs to move regular-season games to that month because of the coronavirus pandemic.

If there is a Pro Bowl in 2022, the 32 owners voted to return it to the new Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas.

A fan vote for Pro Bowl rosters still will be held, beginning Nov. 17. The rosters will be announced in December. Players, coaches and fans vote for the Pro Bowl.

Angels give White Sox OK to interview La Russa

CHICAGO — The Los Angeles Angels granted the Chicago White Sox permission to interview Hall of Famer Tony La Russa for their managing job, a person familiar with the situation said Wednesday.

The person, confirming a USA Today report, spoke on the condition of anonymity because the Angels typically do not comment on personnel matters.

A three-time World Series-winning manager, the 76-year-old La Russa joined the Angels prior to this season as senior advisor of baseball operations.

The White Sox agreed to split with Rick Renteria after a disappointing finish to a breakthrough season in which Chicago made the playoffs for the first time since 2008.

La Russa, who started his managing career with the White Sox during the 1979 season, hasn't managed since 2011, when he led St. Louis past Texas in the World Series. He also won championships with Oakland in 1989 and the Cardinals in 2006.

If hired, he would be the oldest manager in the major leagues by five years.

La Russa is 2,728-2,365 with six pennants over 33 seasons with Chicago, Oakland and St. Louis and was enshrined in Cooperstown in 2014. Only Hall of Famers Connie Mack (3,731) and John McGraw (2,763) have more victories.

ow can so many things go through your mind at once? Today is Jesse's third birthday, which means all the usual birthday festivities with cards, gifts, a special supper, and the likes.

This morning his bright smiles hardly fit on his shining face as we sang, "Happy Birthday" for him. I am so happy for him, but then there is also an ache, as I stare off in the distance, wondering why his adoption could not be finalized a year ago as the foster agency had told us it would?

My mind then flips back to a little over two years ago, when our excitement knew no end; the birth parents had told us they made the heartbreaking decision to sign their rights over to us. Even though our hearts throbbed with theirs, and it looked like a major step on our part, we were completely thrilled to be forever family.

The year before was when we received that first call from the foster agency, asking if we would take a 15-month-old biracial girl and her newborn baby brother. Even though I was five months into my pregnancy with Elijah, we immediately knew there was no question that God was calling us to take this leap in faith.

Yes, since that call, my life has never been the same. I have come to love and cherish these two little dears as my own. Only God knows the valleys and tears this house has seen since then, yet it has been worth it all.

You know how it is, the more rough spots you plow through, the richer the relationship in the end. Both my husband, Daniel, and I can testify to the truth of that little statement.

Now, as three years roll around since they first became a part of our family, I find myself wiping more tears and asking God if we have waited long enough now for the adoption to be finalized.

I then sense the love that only He can give as He tenderly acknowledges how much my mother heart has longed to call these children my own and be free from the "what ifs" lurking in the back of my mind. He has seen it all; there is no

question.

I am reminded of the promise God gave early on during the foster process, while the biological parents were still trying to do what they could do to have their children reunited with them.

Several times when I felt overwhelmed, thinking of all they could yet be facing in these tender young years, God brought this verse to me, "No man is able to pluck them out of My Father's hand."

How comforting. In my mind, I could see the Father's hand, outstretched, with our two beloved foster children completely safe inside. I knew it might not all be easy, yet God remains Lord, even over the little ones entrusted into our care.

Mark Twain wrote, "Fiction is obliged to stick to possibilities. Truth isn't.'

In truth, today's deal contained several possibilities. South was in three no-trump. West led the heart four: six, queen, eight. East returned the heart two: jack, king, seven. West played a third heart. Declarer led a diamond to her queen, then played a diamond to the king. East won with


the ace and led her last heart, after which South claimed the balance for plus 600.

What do you think of the bidding, declarer play and defense? North should have raised straight to three no-trump. Don't use Stayman with 4-3-3-3

distribution. West guessed well to lead a heart. I would have chosen the ineffective spade 10.

East knew that her partner had only four hearts. (South wouldn't have opened one no-trump with a singleton.) So, there was a strong case for East's shifting to the club 10 at trick two, which would have worked beautifully here. Also, West knew that the hearts were 4-4. So, after winning the second trick, she should have switched to the club king. This defense would have defeated the contract also.

Declarer knew that to get home she had to drive out the diamond ace. But she was worried that she might lose one diamond and four hearts. So, declarer held up the heart ace until the third round. But when East returned the heart two at trick two, it announced that she had started with four hearts. If hearts were 4-4, holding up couldn't help. Declarer should have taken the second trick and played on diamonds.

ear Annie: I am depressed and deeply heartbroken over the final breakup with a man whom I have loved for eight years. I went to endless therapy and even went to a wellness center in Germany to help me get over him. Nothing has worked. Here's the backstory.

"Steve" has hurt me deeply

m a n y times, and after few weeks or months of my begging him to come back, he always did. He's broken up with me SO m a n y

times, ruined my birthdays and holidays, and he's excluded me from family functions when his ex-wife and adult kids would attend.

I met "Steve" while he was separated from his wife. He said that he was essentially divorced, though they hadn't gone through the formal process yet. A year in, I learned that he didn't even have a lawyer. It took him five years to get divorced. I was promised that once he was divorced, I'll be allowed to attend family functions. We even got engaged. However, after he told his four older sisters about the engagement and they were angry, he broke it off.

We got back together again after that, only for him to break up with me the day after we got back from my birthday trip on which he told me he loved me and promised no more breakups.

This year, I had no contact with him from February until the end of May, when his dad

We got back together for three weeks. But at the end of June, he told me that he'd made a mistake. He is almost 62 years old; I am 54.

When I told him that he'd used me and treated me as a friend with benefits, his reply was, "I thought our feelings were mutual." I told him that he knew I loved him, but he insisted he thought we could just hang out. He said that he's not in love with me. I feel so used and dirty; it almost feels like I was violated. The thought of our intimacy during those three weeks nauseates me. I feel unloved, and I miss how he used to love me.

How can a human being act so kind, caring and loving, and then say, "I'm not in love with you"?

This has been a pattern, and I cannot get over it. My head knows; my heart, however, is bleeding. How do I stop hurting and missing him? — Depressed, Heartbroken and

Missing Him Dear Depressed: You can get hooked on a person in a way that is not dissimilar from getting hooked on a drug. That's not just a figure of speech: A 2017 report published in the journal "Philosophy, Psychiatry, & Psychology" explains that "so numerous are the superficial similarities between addictive substance use and love- and sex-based interpersonal attachments, from exhilaration, ecstasy, and craving, to irregular physiological responses and obsessive patterns of thought, that a number of scientific theorists have begun to argue that both sorts of phenomena may rely upon similar or even identical psychological, chemical, and neuroanatomical" substances. In toxic or tumultuous relationships such as yours, these addictive effects could be even more pronounced.

Just as the vast majority of people cannot simply will themselves out of addiction, you're going to need more than just logic to get over Steve. You're going to need time and support. Cut off all contact. Block his number and email address, and block him on social media. Join a support group such as Co-Dependents Anonymous (https://coda.org), and return to therapy. It won't be quick or easy, but it will be so worth it. And remember, you are worth it.
