You always make us proud'

Inverness crime rate remains unchanged despite more visits to growing city

Crime in Inverness remained about the same nearing the end of 2021 despite the city's growth and rebounding tourism, but the trends are changing.

That is according to the quarterly report, from July 1 to Sept. 30, from the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, which contracts with the city for enhanced law enforcement protection. CCSO Lt. Chris Ball warned the

Given that the city will now add more events to its calendar as the COVID-19 pandemic subsides, '(we) only expect that to rise.'

The city also saw 111 arrests during those three months, just up from 100 in 2020, but down from 139 in 2019, according to the

The CCSO also handed out months, up from 2019 when the CCSO issued 719 in Inverness Ball told the council that issued

warnings and arrests are likely to increase during the coming months now that the city has two community resource officers. That's one more than previous vears

The city now pays \$999,865 annually for enhanced law enforcement service which involves a greater deputy presence.

The council agreed earlier this year that given the increase in events, tourism, and people moving there, the additional deputy was needed to ensure Inverness remained safe.

Septic phase-out plan on BOCC agenda

County commissioners will hold a public hearing Tuesday to discuss a septic tank phase-out plan in Old Homosassa Springs.

If approved, staff will submit it to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP).

Jacksonville, Florida-based Jones Edmunds prepared a report for the board outlining the scope of constructing a sewer collection system and removing septic tanks in the Old West Homosassa neighborhood.

Nitrogen and phosphorus discharges from septic tanks are conwaterways, the FDEP said.

Septic tanks contribute 16% of the overall nitrogen-loading to the Homosassa River.

The phase-out plan identifies nine project areas along Homosassa River that currently have septic tanks.





Astro. founding member of UB40, dies at 64

Terence Wilson, a founding member of UB40 who was known by fans of the pioneering reggae band as Astro, has died following a short illness. He was

Wilson's death was confirmed Saturday on the official Twitter page for his group, UB40 featuring Ali Campbell & Astro.

"We are absolutely devastated and completely heartbroken to have to tell you that our beloved Astro has today passed away after a very short illness," the statement read. "The world will never be the same without him."

The current, separate iteration of the band UB40, which Wilson left in 2013, also confirmed the singer's death. "Our sincere condolences to his family," the band tweeted.

UB40 formed in Birmingham, England in the late 1970s, when reggae was becoming an outlet for the country's working class youth to express their feelings about issues including racism and poverty. UB40 took their name from the British unemployment benefits card, a form they replicated as the cover of their 1980 debut album Signing Off.

"I went through the same rigmarole as most black people in the late 70s," Wilson told The Guardian in an interview in May, referencing the era's stop-andfrisk "sus law," which often unfairly targeted men of color. "It was a weekly occurrence. We found it harder to write love songs than militant lyrics, because it was a lot easier to write about stuff you had witnessed or read about. It seemed natural to

The four-time Grammy-

nominated band topped the U.K. singles chart with the cover "Red Red Wine," a crossover American favorite, as well as a cover of the Elvis Presley classic "(I Can't Help) Falling In Love With You" and "I Got You Babe" featuring The Pretenders' Chrissie Hynde.

In 2013 Wilson left UB40 and formed his own version of the band alongside former members Ali Campbell and Mickey Virtue.

"Since Astro rejoined my band, it's been a renaissance for us," Campbell said in a 2016 interview. "Me and Astro is enough to make the fans happy, they're voting with their feet.'

Wilson and Campbell continued to release music and perform, and were planning a 2022 tour for their last album, Unprecedented, up until Wilson's death.

Earlier this year, another founding member of UB40, the group's saxophonist and songwriter Brian Travers, also died following a battle with cancer.







The top concerns of Floridians are the economy and the environment. The following initiatives below would have a positive impact for either concern, and should be used to determine the appropriate candidate.


- Using available Federal Funds for the unemployed during a pandemic.





High wind delays SpaceX crew homecoming

CAPE CANAVERAL — High wind off the Florida coast has prompted SpaceX to delay the return of four space station astronauts in orbit since spring.

The U.S., French and Japanese astronauts were supposed to leave the International Space Station on Sunday, with their capsule splashing down in the Gulf of Mexico on Monday morning. But with gusts exceeding safety limits, SpaceX bumped the departure to Monday afternoon, with a nighttime return to conclude their six-month mission.

The good news is that their trip home will now last eight hours, less than half as long as before. The toilet in their capsule is broken, and so the four will need to rely on diapers while flying

SpaceX still is aiming for a Wednesday night launch, at the earliest, of their replacements.

Schools take lead role in promoting vaccines for kids

With the approval of the COVID-19 vaccine for younger children, many elementary schools around the U.S. are preparing to offer the shots, which educators see as key to keeping students learning in person and making the classroom experience closer to what it once was.

Some district leaders say offering vaccine clinics on campus, with the involvement of trusted school staff, is key to improving access and helping overcome hesitancy — particularly in communities with low overall vaccination rates.

Still, many school systems are choosing not to offer elementary schools as hosts for vaccination sites after some middle and high schools that offered shots received pushback.

More than 250 families signed up for vaccinations that began Thursday at elementary schools in Duluth, Minnesota, which organized clinics immediately after the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention gave the final signoff to Pfizer's kidsize COVID-19 shot for children ages 5 to 11. Superintendent John Magas called the vaccines a "game changer."

"This brings us one step closer to moving from pandemic to endemic," Magas said. "It allows us to reconsider things like social distancing and masking and things like that as safety permits.'

First test: Federal workers

About 4 million federal workers are to be vaccinated by Nov. 22 under the president's executive order. Some employees, like those at the White House, are nearly all vaccinated. But the rates are lower at other federal agencies, particularly those related to law enforcement and intelligence, according to the agencies and union leaders. And some resistant workers are digging in, filing lawsuits and protesting what they say is unfair overreach by the White House.

The upcoming deadline is the people to get vaccinated. Beyond the federal worker rule, another mandate will take effect in January aimed at around 84 million private sector workers, according to guidelines put out this past week.

On Saturday, a federal appeals court in Louisiana temporarily halted the vaccine requirement for businesses with 100 or more workers. The administration says it is confident that the requirement will withstand legal challenges in part because its safety rules preempt state laws.

"The president and the administration wouldn't have put these requirements in place if they didn't think that they were appropriate and necessary," Surgeon General Vivek Murthy said Sunday on ABC's "This Week." "And the administration is certainly prepared to defend

If the mandates are a success, first test of Biden's push to compel they could make the most serious dent in new coronavirus cases since the vaccine first became available, especially with the news this past week that children ages 5-11 can get the shot making an additional 64 million people eligible. But with two weeks remaining until the federal worker deadline, some leaders of unions representing the employees say that convincing the unvaccinated to change their mind is increasingly challenging.

Vaccines have a proven track record of safety, backed by clinical trials and independent reviews showing them overwhelmingly effective at preventing serious illness and death from COVID-19.

More than 222 million Americans have received at least one vaccine dose and more than 193 million are fully vaccinated. More than half of the world population has also received a shot.

Ortega seeks re-election in questioned vote

MANAGUA, Nicaragua Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega sought a fourth consecutive term in elections Sunday against a field of little-known candidates while those who could have given him a real challenge sat in jail.

More than 13,000 polling places opened Sunday morning even as the opposition denounced more arrests of its leaders in activists around the county in the hours leading up to the vote and Ortega railed against alleged interference from the United States.

The opposition called on Nicaraguans to stay home in protest of an electoral process that has been roundly criticized as not credible by foreign powers.

The election will determine who holds the presidency for the next five years, as well as 90 of the 92 seats in the congress and Nicaragua's representation in the Central American Parliament. More than 4.4 million Nicaraguans age 16 and older were eligible

Ortega's Sandinista Front and its allies control the congress and all government institutions. He first served as president from 1985-1990, returning to power in 2007. He declared his wife, Vice President Rosario Murillo, his "co-president."

Sudan forces disperse anticoup protesters

KHARTOUM, Sudan -Sudan's security forces dispersed demonstrators and rounded up more than 100 people Sunday in the capital of Khartoum, in the latest crackdown on pro-democracy protesters after last month's military coup.

The Sudanese military seized power Oct. 25. dissolving the transitional government and arresting dozens of officials and politicians. The coup has drawn international criticism and massive protests in the streets of Khartoum and elsewhere in the country.

The takeover has upended the country's fragile planned transition to democratic rule, more than two years after a popular uprising forced the removal of longtime autocrat Omar al-Bashir and his Islamist government.

Teachers and education workers protested the coup outside the Education Ministry in Khartoum's district of Bahri, according to the Sudanese Professionals' Association, which led the uprising against al-Bashir.



Larson caps comeback

Ends Cup Series season with 1st NASCAR title

AVONDALE, Ariz. — Kyle Larson

No surprise, right? He was, after all, the overwhelming 2-1 betting favorite to win NASCAR's season-ending championship race.

Suspended nearly all of last season for using a racial slur, Larson closed his comeback season in NASCAR with his first championship Sunday with a title-winning victory at Phoenix Raceway.

Larson was in tears during his cooldown laps as he reflected on his rebuild from out-of-work NASCAR driver to Cup champion.

"Eighteen months ago, I didn't even think I'd be in a Cup car again. Strapping in for the Daytona 500 didn't even seem real, let alone winning the championship." Larson said. "It's definitely been a journey, a rollercoaster. I'm very thankful for my second chance and every opportunity I've been given in these last 18 months. Life's a crazy thing. Just stay positive through it."

Truex has finished second in the championship standings three times in the four seasons since his 2017 title.

"Ultimately, we needed to beat him off pit road. It's unfortunate, but we win and lose as a team," Truex said. "That's three times we've been second, and that sucks. Second hurts, I'm not going to lie, especially with the car we had and the job the guys did."

Hamlin, who raced Larson all season for the regular-season title that ultimately went to Larson, has firmly maintained that Larson should be the champion. But it didn't soften the blow of another title defeat for the three-time Daytona 500 winner. "Any time you can win 10 races in a

Daniels spent 58 races running the No. 48 team for Johnson and they closed their run together with a fifth-place finish in last year's season finale as Johnson crossed the finish line behind the four title contenders.

Daniels and his crew welcomed in Larson the next week, won 10 points races and the \$1 million All-Star race, and now the Cup title. The win by Larson halted Toyota's

bid to sweep championship weekend. Toyota drivers won the Truck and Xfinity Series titles to open the weekend, but Larson gave Chevrolet the biggest trophy of them all.

"I wish I could putt like I did today more often," said Hovland, who made 28 birdies for the week at El Camaleon. "It was just a Thomas Pieters shot a blast all week."

Hovland finished at 23-under 261 and moved to No. 10 in the world ranking.

Ortiz made a 30-foot par putt after a plugged lie in the bunker on the 18th for a 66 to finish alone in second, a difference of \$144,000 if he had twoputted for bogey and tied with Thomas, who also saved par on 18 for a 69.

Thomas had an early bogey and didn't make as many birdies to make up a three-shot deficit on Hovland, especially the way Hovland was putting.

"I just didn't drive it well, didn't get off to a good enough start to really put any pressure on Viktor," Thomas said.

The strongest challenge came from Scheffler, who starred on the final day in the Ryder Cup and is hopeful his first PGA Tour victory is around the corner. Sunday wasn't the day.

Scheffler missed a pair of short-range birdie putts only to ram in an 18-foot birdie on the 12th to get to within three shots. Hovland answered with a 35-foot birdie putt on No. 9, and the lead was back to four shots.

Scheffler's chip just right of the 13th green hit the pin and bounced about 5 feet away, which he made for eagle. Hovland made an 18-foot birdie putt on the 11th moments later.

Scheffler blinked first. His tee shot on the 16th peeled to the right into the mangroves. After a penalty drop, he did well to get it up near the green, only to have mud on his ball and watch his long pitch go over the back onto the collar and make double bogev.

Scheffler shot 66 and finished alone in fourth.

"Viktor's playing some good golf so he's obviously going to be tough to catch," Scheffler said. "I had to make a few more birdies towards the end and wasn't able to do that.'

It was Pieters' fifth European Tour win in 171 starts. His last victory had come two years ago at the Czech Masters.

"It felt like a long time between victories," the 29-yearold Pieters said. "It's hard. I was happy to come up to the 18th with a two-shot lead."

Pavon, who shared the lead entering the final round, lost ground after a triple bogey on the par-5 12th. when he twice found the water. He ended with a 1-under 70 after making two more bogeys coming in.

Bjerregaard had five birdies on his last nine holes to close with a 5-under 66, while Hoigaard made his only bogey of the day on the 18th to finish at 7-under 64 for the best round on Sunday.

Padraig Harrington closed with a 4-under 67 to finish nine shots off the lead in a tie for 12th place. Richard Bland was among those who finished a shot ahead of him in a

Alker caps dream stretch by winning on Champions Tour

BOCA RATON — Steven Alker had to qualify for his first **PGA Tour Champions event** three months ago and kept playing all the way to the Charles Schwab Cup final.

Alker capped off his amazing run when he closed with a 4-under 68 for a two-shot victory in the TimberTech Championship, easily moving into the top 36 players who advance to the Charles Schwab Cup Championship.

"Golf's always about giving yourself chances and eventually it will happen," Alker said.

Locked in a duel with Jim Furvk on the back nine of The Old Course at Broken Sound, Alker holed an 18-foot birdie putt on the 15th hole to take the lead, and then finished with a birdie he didn't need to win by two over Furyk and Miguel Angel Jimenez.

"It always stings to finish second, I'll say that," Furyk said. "But I told him on the 18th green I was real happy for him. To come from really no status out here on the Champions Tour ... to now making the Tour Championship in only nine events, that's playing some good golf."

Alker won \$305,000, pushing his total to \$896,207 in just nine tournaments since he qualified for the Boeing Classic outside Seattle in late August for his Champions debut.

That's more than the Kiwi made in his entire career on the PGA Tour, which featured only three full seasons as he toiled on the Australasian and European tours and spent a fair bit of his time in America on what now is the Korn Ferry

He finished at 17-under 199 and moved from No. 46 to

No. 22 in the Schwab Cup standings, which accounts for the last two years because time off from the pandemic led to a "super season" for the 50-and-older set.

Alker turned 50 on July 28 and two weeks later qualified for the Boeing Classic. He tied for seventh, which earned him a spot in The Ally Challenge the following week for being in the top 10. He finished third there, and four more top 10s followed.

By the time Alker finally finished out of the top 10 — a tie for 16th in North Carolina he was eligible for the tour's postseason. And in the second of three events, he cashed in.

Looking back, it was hard for him to grasp. Alker didn't have too many expectations except for trying to earn spots through qualifying early in the week.

"I thought, 'Well, if I can come out and do some Mondays, Tuesdays, do some events and try to qualify and get some events under my belt, that would be great," he said. "To be standing here and talking to you guys with a win, it's amazing.'

Bernhard Langer goes to the final event next week in Phoenix as the No. 1 seed followed by Furyk, who could have at least closed the gap on the 64-year-old German by

Furyk, who shared the 36-hole lead with Tim Petrovic, fell back early with a pair of bogeys, regained a share of the lead with two birdies on the 12th and 13th but then had to settle for pars the rest of the way. He had to settle for a 71.

Jimenez birdied the 18th for a 66 and is No. 3 in the Schwab Cup. Petrovic shot 74 and was never in the mix along the back nine.

Shane Bertsch was the only player who fell out of the top 36, replaced by Alker performing well, just like he's been doing the last 12 weeks.

Hemric snatches Xfinity Series crown

Gibbs collects championship

AVONDALE, Ariz. — Daniel Hemric made the first victory of his career one of the biggest NA-SCAR upsets — a championshipwinning overtime stunner against the reigning champ.

Hemric beat Austin Cindric in a door-to-door sprint across the finish line Saturday night at Phoenix Raceway to give Joe Gibbs Racing its first championship of the weekend.

JGR raced Sunday for the Cup title with both Denny Hamlin and Martin Truex Jr., and Toyota, which won the Truck Series championship Friday night, could sweep all three of NASCAR's national series with another upset.

"DH!!! Let's goooo!!!" tweeted Hamlin, who answers to "DH." "So well deserved. Kid has worked his butt off and finally gets the biggest win on the biggest stage. Proud of you."

Hemric, winless in 119 starts in the Xfinity Series and racing for the final time for Gibbs before moving to Kaulig Racing next season, was the fourth seed in the playoffs and the overlooked driver in the championship four. Noah Gragson is a showman, and Cindric and AJ Allemendinger were the two superior teams.

And it was going to be Cindric's night as he led six times for a race-high 119 laps. The reigning champion was trying to close out his Xfinity career with a second consecutive title before his promotion next season to replace Brad Keselowski at Team Penske.

Hemric two career-defining had a mechanical issue on the to catch Cindric when a caution froze the field and sent the race into overtime. In the two-lap sprint to the finish, the two raced side-by-side with everything on the line and Hemric won the race to the finish by less than a half-second.

"I blacked out, just knew I had to be the first one to the line," Hemric said about the final two laps. "We were not going to be denied."

Cindric finished second, but Team Penske won the owners championship. The driver's title is awarded to the first of the championship four to cross the finish line.

Cindric, winner of five races this year and 11 the last two seasons, was annoyed to have the payoff stripped away because of three cautions in the final scheduled 20 laps and then a sprint to the finish.

"If everyone in the stands enjoyed it, it's good racing," Cindric said from pit road. "I'm very appreciative of the opportunity to race on such a big stage. It would have been awesome to finish this out.

"I felt like we had a dominant racecar. I felt like we did everything right. Come up a little bit short, sometimes it's like that way."

Gragson, who won last week at Martinsville Speedway to make the finale, finished 12th. He banged hard against the wall in a desperate attempt for the win after driving his way through the field to third.

Allmendinger was 14th and was never in contention. In fact, his late spin brought out a caution that Allmendinger apologized for because he believes Cindric had the race won until that yellow.

Hemric is a NASCAR blueblood in that he's from Kannapolis, North Carolina, home of the late Dale Earnhardt. The win was his first in 207 NASCAR national races, and crew chief Dave Rogers noted Hemric will never again be asked when he'll win his first face.

"You'll never have to answer that stupid question again,' Rogers radioed as Hemric crossed the line.

"Never again," Hemric replied.


Later in victory lane, Hemric said he was unusually emotionless as he grappled with the enormity of his victory.

"I don't want people to think I'm not emotional because I'm probably one of the most emotional guys there are," Hemric said. "When you go through as much, I think back immediately, honestly, to 2019 when I lost my ride. I felt like my life was unraveling before me."

He will be teammates next season with Allmendinger because he's taking Justin Haley's seat in a promotion to Cup as Kaulig expands into NASCAR's top national series.

Hemric had a Cup ride for Richard Childress Racing in 2019 but was replaced after one season. He got a job in the Xfinity Series with JR Motorsports last season, drove for Gibbs this year and will leave as the champion.





The Crimson Tide (8-1, 5-1 Southeastern Conference, No. 2 CFP) preserved their national championship hopes in a game that was as tight as some meetings when both were nursing such ambitions. The injury-depleted Tigers (4-5, 2-4) and lame-duck coach Ed Orgeron didn't act like 29.5-point underdogs.

It wasn't over until the final play, a Hail Mary that fell incomplete in the end zone. The Tigers came up empty in three fourth-quarter trips into Alabama territory, including that quick venture to the 30 in the final minute.

Young, the Heisman Trophy front-runner, completed 24 of 37 passes with a couple of touchdowns, including a 58-yarder to Jameson Williams. Williams caught 10 passes for 160 yards. LSU harried Young all night and held Brian Robinson Jr. to 18 yards on 13 carries.

But Alabama returned the favor with Will Anderson Jr. racking up 12 tackles, 1 1/2 sacks and four tackles for loss.

Max Johnson completed 16 of 32 passes for 160 yards with two touchdowns and an interception for LSU. Tyrion Davis-Price ran for 104 yards.

No. 7 Oregon 26, **Washington 16**

SEATTLE — Travis Dye rushed for a career-high 211 yards and a touchdown, they had the ball in the first half Anthony Brown ran for a score and passed for another and Oregon overcame a sluggish start to beat Washington.

The Wolverines (8-1, 5-1 Big Ten) were coming off a deflating defeat, blowing a 16-point, third-quarter lead in a 37-33 loss to rival Michigan State last

The Hoosiers (2-7, 0-6) have lost five straight games, collapsing in a season that started with them hoping to contend for at least a division title.

Haskins had 27 carries with a heavier burden in the backfield because Blake Corum left the field with an undisclosed injury early in the game. Corum, who has been among the nation's leading rushers all season, ran once for 4 yards and dropped a perfect pass in the flat for the second straight week before leaving the game.

No. 16 UTSA 44, UTEP 23

UTSA wasted no time in taking control, as running back Sincere McCormick darted through a big hole for a 75-yard touchdown on the second play after the opening kickoff. McCormick finished with 169 yards on 21 carries.

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Hendon Hooker threw a career-high four touchdown passes, including a 6-yard insurance score to Cedric Tillman early in the fourth quarter, and Tennessee held off Kentucky.

The Volunteers (5-4, 3-3 Southeastern Conference) struck quickly in a back-and-forth game between border rivals that totaled 1,073 yards combined. They needed just three plays and 37 seconds to score their first two TDs, drove 35 yards in 16 seconds for a goahead field goal before halftime, and ticked off only 37 seconds on the way to another go-ahead touchdown in the third quarter.

Northwestern (3-6, 1-5) pulled to 17-12 with 2:21 remaining on Andrew Marty's 31-yard touchdown pass to Evan Hull and quickly got the ball back after Iowa went three and out. But Dane Belton immediately sealed it with his second interception, sending the Wildcats to their third straight loss.

No. 20 Houston 54, **South Florida 42**

TAMPA — Clayton Tune was 21 of 26 for 385 yards and three touchdowns, Ta'Zhawn Henry had a 97-yard TD run and Houston held off South Florida. The Cougars (8-1, 6-0 American Ath-

Today's deal is a classic example – although a good declarer would make this contract doubled or undoubled. How should South play in six spades doubled after West leads a low diamond, taken with dummy's ace?

Two clubs was strong and artificial; two diamonds was a "waiting" response, probably made with 0-7 points, but maybe more with no good suit to show. After spades were agreed, South used Roman Key Card Blackwood. North's response showed two key cards (either one ace and the trump king or two aces) but denied the trump queen. West, thinking he had two trump tricks, doubled.

Declarer embarked on a plan to reduce his trump length. At trick two, he ruffed a diamond, the pivotal play. After a spade to the king confirmed the bad news, South continued with his plan, trumping another diamond. He cashed the heart ace-king, ruffed the heart queen on the board, trumped a third diamond and cashed the club ace-king, reducing West to three trumps. When declarer led his last club, West had to ruff and lead

seven years ago of brain cancer. My father died suddenly of COVID-19 18 months ago.

I am unable to work because of my illness, yet I keep getting denied disability because it is a mental health issue.

The family friends who were the executors of my father's estate royally screwed up my trust fund and cost me tens of thousands of dollars on expenses they never gave me the price for. Now I am in a very bad place. My health is bad because I self-medicate since meds don't work. I've tried transcranial magnetic stimulation, electroconvulsive therapy and talk therapy. NOTHING works.

I do not leave my bed. I have been suffering bone-crushing depression my whole life and can honestly say that my life has been a horror show because the chemical imbalances in my brain keep me locked in a cycle of depression, mania and delusions.

Your father's sudden death was a great shock to your system, and with professional help, you will be able to process the loss and move forward with less pain and depression. You don't want to

die; you want the pain to die. Dear Annie: I am curious about your thoughts and advice on a moral issue that my friends and I are debating.

The issue is that a woman was sleeping with a married man. After a few years, they ended things amicably. Now, a year later, the "other woman" is struggling with the question of whether she should apologize to the wife for her actions and tell her what happened. She is torn.
