Citrus County COVID-19 cases

According to the Florida Department of Health, 11 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update.

No new deaths were reported, for a total of 420.

To date in the county, 10,170 people have tested positive (including 85 non-residents).

Three new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 662 hospitalized.

Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

Vaccine registration system open

DOH-Citrus' preregistration system to schedule COVID-19 vaccine appointments for individuals 50 and older and frontline health care workers is now available.

Individuals can now be added to a waiting list for vaccine appointments and be notified when appointments are available in Citrus County by visiting myvaccine.fl.gov or by calling 866-201-0442; TTY is 833-476-1036.

As part of the statewide preregistration system, each county has a designated number that individuals can call and preregister with if they do not have internet access. Citrus County's designated helpline number is 833-540-2058.

Vaccine supply remains limited and appointments may not be available for several weeks.

Board may have broken law

Charter school held closed meeting in apparent violation of Sunshine statute

The Academy of Environmental Science charter school board appears to have violated the Florida Sunshine Law when the board members met behind closed doors and

away from the public to discuss two applicants for principal.

The board voted publicly at the March 18 meeting to not hire either of the two applicants, but banned the public from hearing their backroom discussions about what

they thought about the applicants and their reasoning behind the decision to reject them.

The board's chairwoman Michelle Leeper told the Chronicle on Tuesday, March 23, that she believed as long as the vote was public, such

closed door meetings were consistent with Florida's laws requiring open public meetings and records, known as the Florida Sunshine law.

Virginia Hamrick, a lawyer with Florida's First Amendment Foundation, disagrees.

The First Amendment Foundation is a private, non-partisan, nonprofit organization that promotes the public's right to access government through Florida's Sunshine and Public Records Law.

County OKs hike in impact fees

Commissioners vote 4-1 to raise single-family home charge to \$6,017

After almost two hours of brisk debate, county commissioners Tuesday voted 4-1 to raise impact fees for a single-family home from the current \$4,809 to \$6,017.

The \$1,208 increase will take effect in 90 days.

The fee for multi-family homes will decrease: from \$3,644 to \$3,322.

The new fee schedule

was the result of a last-minute discussion between Steve Lachnicht, assistant county administrator and Duncan Associates, the consultant hired to do an impact fee study.

The fee for single-family homes is lower than the \$6,172 the consultant previously recommended.

The fees for transportation and roads will continue to be calculated at the current 50%

formula rate and the remaining six categories at 100%.

Commission Chairman Scott Carnahan cast the sole dissenting vote and his motion to keep current fees intact was defeated 3-2.

"I think we need to compete with our surrounding counties (and) I see an unstable economy headed our way," Carnahan said.

The county is already seeing that in terms of

higher gas prices, he said.

But his colleagues didn't see it that way. They believe the county will grow and the money will be needed to fund roads, schools and other infrastructure.

An alternate motion by Commissioner Ron Kitchen Jr. that raised fees passed 4-1.

Commissioner Jeff Kinnard sided with Carnahan's original motion. He panned the consultant's

report and said the numbers don't accurately reflect the county's projected growth.

"We have a report that I have absolutely no confidence in," Kinnard said.

Lachnicht said he contacted the consultant and cleared up a discrepancy regarding the law enforcement fee, which helped reduce the fee hike.

Subsiding virus has city mulling larger events

Social distancing to still play key role, though

Citing a lull in COVID-19 infections, Crystal River City Council is comfortable moving ahead with larger city events on a modified scale.

Council members at their regular meeting the evening of Monday, March 22, told city staff to start planning the city's modified July 4 fireworks event.

City Manager Ken Frink told council beforehand local COVID-19 transmissions in recent weeks have lessened, prompting city staff to start thinking

about reopening grander events.

"We need to be in the planning stages," he said. "We need to start planning for the future."

Citrus County's seven-day average positivity rate for COVID-19, which is the ratio of positive test results to total tests taken, has hovered around 5% since February's end but had a slight uptick in mid-March.

COVID-19 forced council last March to cancel its July 4 event.

City Events and Marketing Director Leslie Bollin said she's trying to plan the city's Independence Day fireworks so

attendees are scattered throughout the city's downtown, and not packing into Kings Bay Park ahead of the show.

Council members were in favor of Bollin's strategy.

"We should pursue it," Mayor Joe Meek said. "I think you're seeing folks become more comfortable and aware of what's going on."

"I totally agree, unless something crazy happens," Councilman Ken Brown added. "It could, but I don't think it will."

Also on Monday, in a 5-0 vote, council approved

AstraZeneca vaccine hits snag

Company accused of 'cherry-picking' trial data

WASHINGTON — AstraZeneca may have included "outdated information" in touting the effectiveness of its COVID-19 vaccine in a U.S. study, federal health officials said Tuesday in an unusual public rift that could further erode confidence in the shot.

In response, AstraZeneca said that it is working on more

up-to-date information and that the more recent findings are consistent with its initial announcement that the vaccine offered strong protection. It promised an update within 48 hours.

In an extraordinary rebuke, just hours after AstraZeneca on Monday announced its vaccine worked well in the U.S. study, an independent panel that oversees the study scolded the company for cherry-picking

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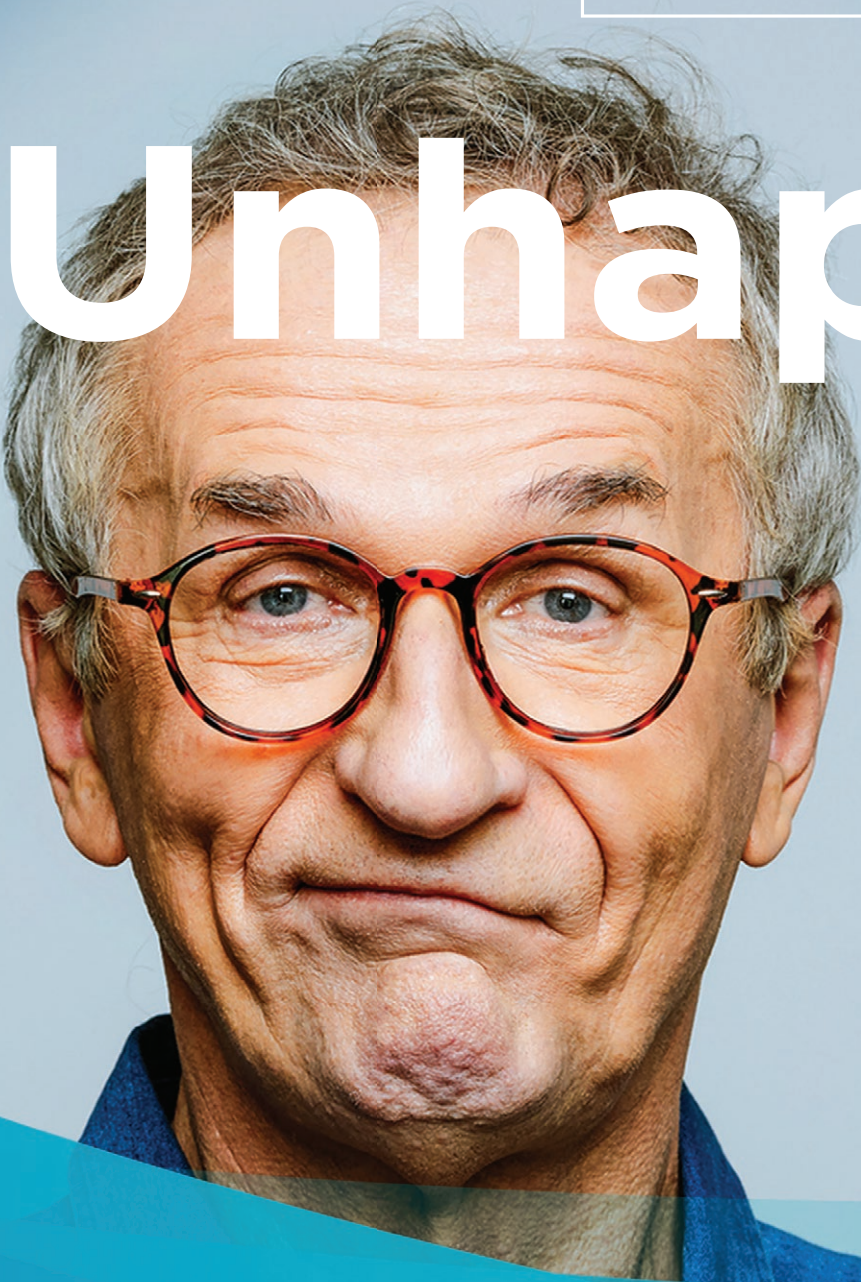

Mini makeover

Fort Cooper State Park gets native plants

Wild coffee, dotted horsemint, gopher apple, muhly grass and "horrible thistle," garberia, rusty lyonia, seaside goldenrod and a magnolia baby gem tree — on Tuesday, members of the Citrus County Native Plant Society and the Friends of Fort Cooper State Park planted these varieties of native Florida plants in an area of the park's parking lot down by the lake that once was just a patch of grass.

Lowes donated 21 plants for the project and the Friends of Fort Cooper State Park purchased more than 35 plants from Anson's Nursery in Lecanto.

"Not only are the plants native to Florida, but they are native to this particular park," said Sue Wasserman, co-president of the native plant group.

As she explained, every state park has its own unit management plan (UMP) that details which plants are native and non-native.

"We're only allowed to install plants here that are native to this park," she said.

The main benefit to planting native plants — very little maintenance.

"We use no commercial fertilizer, maybe just a bit of

compost, and no soil amendments," Wasserman said.

As for watering, she said the plants only need watering to get established.

"After that, they should not need any supplemental watering," she said. "If we have a deluge or even a drought, they tolerate both; they tolerate the heat and the cold that we get."

"Even if they die back, they usually grow back, or many of these reseed themselves," she said.

Native plants are also best for the native fauna, from insects to animals.

Butterflies particularly love horrible thistle and horsemint, and gopher tortoises like the

fruit from the gopher apple plant.

"For the insects, we like to clump together the plants they like, to make it easier for them," Wasserman said.

Donna Carrigan, with the native plant society, designed the garden area both with aesthetics and function in mind.

"This was just grass," said Diane Clayton, president of the park's friends group, "and now that it's done, it's beautiful."

CCSO investigating woman's abduction attempt; tips welcome

Citrus County Sheriff's Office investigations continue into the attempted abduction of a 52-year-old Homosassa woman while she was driving.

An arrest has yet to be made in connection with the kidnapping attempt from the night of March 15, according to the sheriff's office on Tuesday, March 23.

Sheriff's office detectives are welcoming the public to submit tips and information to their agency's non-emergency line, 352-249-2790.

Tipsters can also remain anonymous and be eligible for a cash reward by contacting Citrus County Crime Stoppers at 888-269-8477.

According to a sheriff's office incident report, deputies were dispatched at around 11:35 p.m. March 15 to respond to an urgent wellbeing check at the RaceTrac gas station in Homosassa, on the corner of U.S. 19 and West Homosassa Trail.

Deputies met with a couple who said they were driving west on West Grover Cleveland Boulevard, near the intersection of South Lake Terrace, when they were flagged down by a woman alongside the roadway.

When the couple asked her what was wrong, according to the report, the woman jumped into their vehicle and screamed for them to "get me out

of here."

When deputies offered the woman, who had just left the RaceTrac's restrooms, medical assistance, she repeatedly told them she was attacked.

According to the report, the woman told deputies she stopped by RaceTrac earlier to get gas after leaving a party alone off of West Homosassa Trail.

She said she was inside the gas station for "only a couple of minutes" before she got into her vehicle and drove away. While driving on West Grover Cleveland Boulevard, the woman said, an unknown man emerged from the backseat of her truck and began to attack her.

Due to its open and active investigation, the sheriff's office is not releasing how the man tried to abduct the woman, agency spokeswoman Jodi Sanders told the Chronicle.

Sanders said the woman wasn't able to get a clear visual of her attacker.

According to the report, the woman was able to escape from her truck, which was then stolen, and run away before she flagged down the couple driving by.

According to the report, the woman had to be treated for injuries at the Bayfront Health ER Citrus Hills.

Deputies later recovered her truck March 16 at the intersection of South Rock Crusher Road and West Nobis Circle in Homosassa, Sanders said.

Funding debate remains in Bright Future bill

TALLAHASSEE — A Senate panel on Tuesday scaled back a bill that would have reduced Bright Futures scholarships for students pursuing certain degrees, but opponents are now focusing criticism on whether the measure will jeopardize future funding for the program.

The measure (SB 86), sponsored by Sen. Dennis Baxley, R-Ocala, drew a massive outcry in recent weeks because it would have reduced or even eliminated Bright Futures scholarships for students seeking degrees deemed unlikely to lead to jobs.

But Baxley filed an amendment to delete that part of the bill, with the Senate Education Appropriations Subcommittee approving the change Tuesday. The Republican-controlled panel then voted 6-3 along party lines to advance the remaining bill.

"I got well over 2,000 communications regarding this

bill, so this is a very popular bill," Baxley said of the controversial proposal, eliciting laughs from some lawmakers on the panel.

After the outcry that included a student-led opposition campaign, most controversial parts of the bill have been eliminated. But Baxley said Tuesday the proposal will still be a step in the right direction of bridging the gap between higher education and the workforce.

"This strike-all (amendment) is a result of that ongoing dialogue that we've had with senators and constituents. The bill shifts the focus to providing information so that students can make an informed decision about their programs of study," Baxley told the panel.

Under Baxley's amendment, the state university system's Board of Governors, the State Board of Education and Independent Colleges and Universities of Florida would craft and publish lists of degrees they deem not likely to lead to employment.

Banksy painting raises \$23M for UK health charities

LONDON — A Banksy painting honoring Britain's health workers in the pandemic has sold for a record 16.8 million pounds (\$23.2 million) auction house Christie's said Tuesday. Proceeds from the sale will be used to fund health organizations and charities across the U.K., it said.

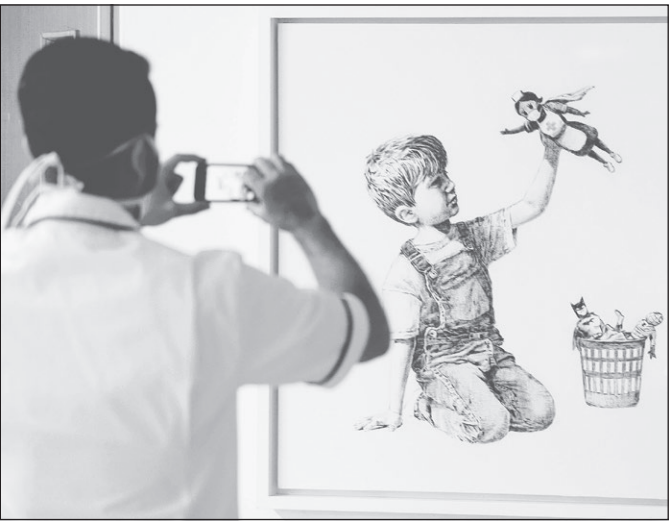
The work by the mystery street artist, titled "Game Changer," first appeared on a wall at Southampton General Hospital in southern England in May, during the first wave of the pandemic. The black-and-white picture depicts a young boy sitting on the floor playing with a nurse superhero toy, as Batman and Spiderman toy figures lie in a wastepaper basket next to him.

At the time it went up, the hospital said Banksy left a note for workers there saying: "Thanks for all you're doing. I hope this brightens the place up a bit, even if it's only black and white."

Christie's said the sale price was a world auction record for Banksy. The auction house said it will donate a "significant portion" of the buyer's premium to health organizations.

A reproduction of the picture will stay at the hospital for patients, visitors and staff, Christie's added.

"Banksy is an extraordinary artist who is a constant barometer of nationwide sentiment," said auction house expert Katharine Arnold. "With the perfect image of a little boy playing with his superhero doll, a nurse sporting the international Red Cross, he perfectly captured the essence of this moment in time."

Limbaugh's syndicator to keep his voice alive on radio

NEW YORK — The replacement for Rush Limbaugh is...

Premiere Networks, the company that syndicated Limbaugh's afternoon program to some 600 radio stations across the country, said Monday that it would continue airing a series of guest hosts that play archival audio footage of the late personality. Limbaugh died of cancer on Feb. 17.

"No one can replace Rush Limbaugh, and Premiere Networks will continue to provide millions of loyal listeners with the voice of Rush for the long term," said Rachel Nelson, company

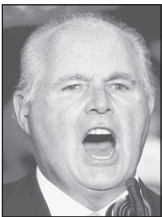
spokeswoman.

Through Limbaugh's absence for cancer treatments and since his death, the show has had guest hosts such as Todd Herman, Ken Matthews and Brett Winterble, who guide listeners through clips of Limbaugh talking on various issues.

The announcement indicates there has been no serious erosion in listeners for the program in Limbaugh's physical absence, said Michael Harrison, publisher of the trade publication Talkers

magazine.

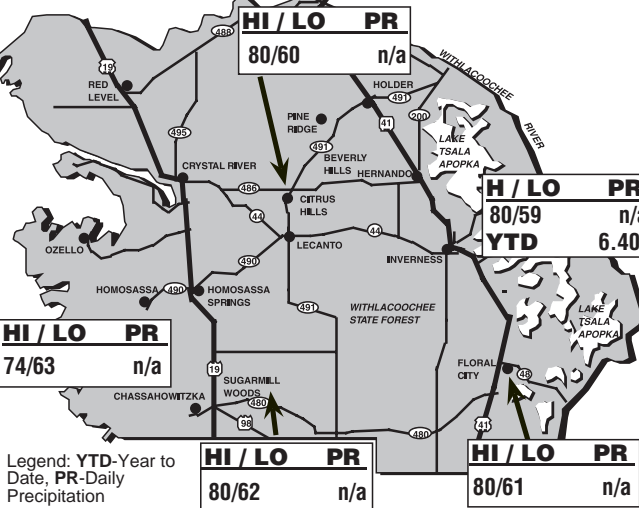
There will almost certainly be an effort by competitors to siphon off some of the stations that Limbaugh held, Harrison said.

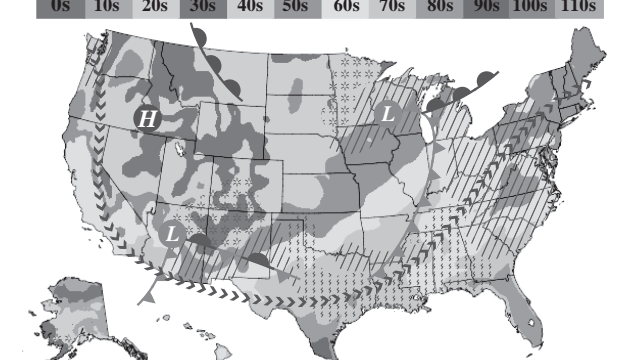

Bartow man asleep in rented truck accused of drugs, stealing scooter

A Bartow man was arrested and faces drug and auto theft charges after Citrus County Sheriff’s deputies say he fell asleep in a rented U-Haul with a stolen scooter parked nearby.

The arrest of Christopher William Fredrick Everly, 27, began Sunday, March 21, when deputies received a complaint from an Inverness business employee that a U-Haul and scooter were parked in front of their business and that they wanted them to leave, according to the arrest report.

The arresting deputy said that when he arrived at All About It electronics at around 10 a.m., he found a man and woman in the back of the U-Haul sleeping.

The arresting deputy reported that when he woke the woman, she told him the moving truck had run out of gasoline and they were waiting for daylight to drive to a gas station to buy fuel, according to the arrest report.

The woman and her boyfriend then walked to the truck’s cab and knocked on the door and awoke Everly. The deputy

also processed the license plate of the scooter and found that the scooter was stolen from the Kissimmee Police Department, according to the arrest report.

The deputy reported that when he asked who the scooter belonged to, none of the three answered. When the deputy asked who rented the U-Haul, Everly replied he rented it but it was under a friend’s name.

The deputy asked if he could search the truck and whether there were any drugs inside. Everly replied that a woman had previously been in the cab with him and she might have left illegal drugs behind, according to the arrest report.

The deputy searched the cab and found a black bag on the front seat and inside a baggie containing a substance later testing positive for methamphetamine, according to the arrest report.

The deputy said he also found on the floorboard of the driver’s side a syringe containing a brown liquid and on the dashboard a drill bit container containing a brown liquid. Both later tested positive for heroin, according to the arrest report.

The man and woman in

the truck said Everly was giving the couple a lift to Gainesville from Lakeland and they knew nothing of the stolen scooter. They also said they didn’t know anything about the girl that shared the front cab with Everly, where she had gone to, or how she got to the truck, according to the arrest report.

The deputy found in the back of the U-Haul the ignition system that had been removed from the scooter. On the scooter was a receipt for a \$6.99 gas can purchased the day before. The store later provided a still photo of Everly at the Tractor Store buying the gas can.

The woman who had been asleep in the back when the deputy arrived said the scooter was already in the truck when Everly picked them up, according to the arrest report.

The deputy arrested Everly and charged him with two counts of possession of a controlled substance, theft of an auto, and possession of drug paraphernalia. His bond was \$7,000.

“In the absence of a specific statutory exemption, meetings of a public board to discuss personnel matters are subject to the Sunshine Law,” Hamrick told the Chronicle.

“I could not find a relevant statute to exempt the portion of the meeting (to discuss the job applicants),” she said.

“Absent a specific exemption, private discussions between the board members on a matter that would come before the board would violate the Sunshine Law,” Hamrick added. “Moreover, any decision made during a closed meeting would be void. Decisions made in violation of the Sunshine Law can be cured, but only after independent action in the open.”

When a Chronicle reporter asked Leeper why she wanted to hold a meeting away from the public, Leeper responded, “There has to be an opportunity for us to discuss freely.”

Leeper said the board members behind closed doors discussed the candidates, their credentials, and how they came across to the board during their interviews. She said she wanted to meet away from the public to provide the applicants a measure of privacy.

AES’ attorney, Karen Gaffney, said this

about the issue:

“The volunteer board very often does not have the tools or training to fully understand the complexity of the government in the Sunshine Law,” explained Gaffney, who also represents the Citrus County Chronicle as its attorney. “In the event a non-public meeting was in fact held, the AES board of directors now understand that the most important thing, other than the students, is compliance with the Florida Sunshine law.”

Gaffney said the jobs will be reposted and “every board meeting will be in public relative to the hiring of a new employee.”

The charter school’s board members are appointed by the other AES school board members. It is a volunteer position and they are not paid. There are nine members.

The charter school is funded by the state, but its staff are Citrus County School Board employees. The Citrus County School Board also has a contract with AES as to its curriculum, its academics, students, class sizes, enrollment, financial accountability and reporting.

In essence, even though AES is a charter school, the local school district provides oversight. For example, the local school district has final say if the charter school wants to build an addition to its facility and over AES’

decision for its new principal, said school district spokeswoman Lindsay Blair.

“At this point, AES’ lawyer is going to conduct Sunshine Law training with the entire AES board and we are satisfied with that,” Blair said. “If something like this should happen again in the future, we will address it at that time.”

When it comes to charter board meetings, the contract between the charter school and the school district reads that “to ensure that parents/guardians will have ready access to the governance of the school, board meetings will be open to the public in accordance with §286.011, Florida Statute, and public notice shall be given in a timely manner.”

In addition, the contract reads “the meetings must be noticed, open and accessible to the public, and attendees must be provided an opportunity to receive information and provide input regarding the school’s operations.”

Leeper said it was the “consensus” of the charter school board to hold a closed door meeting.

Asked if she could cite the Florida statutes that allowed the closed door meeting, Leeper replied, “No I cannot, (but) it’s always been done that way.”

Impact fees are one-time charges on new construction to pay for infrastructure, such as roads, schools and parks, that are necessitated by growth.

The county hired the consultant for \$98,000 to make recommendations for new impact fee equations to reflect the growth and demands of the county. The change in equations is reflected in the additional \$1,208 the consultant determined was needed to cover that growth at the current 50% and 100% ratios.

Kitchen said the consultant’s recommendations cannot be thrown out in favor of “pulling numbers out of the air with no corresponding reasoning.”

People will still build in Citrus County and there will be growth, he said.

The question, he added, is how to pay for it?

Kitchen said the county also has to guard against legal challenges.

“What we’ve done here is spent \$98,000 on a study that is legally defensible,” he said.

Folks who have accessory buildings on their property also got a break. Formerly, they had to pay the fee for a single-family home. But the board created a separate accessory dwelling unit category with an impact fee of \$2,401.

Commissioners also asked staff to draft an ordinance that broadens the limits for accessory dwelling units to be brought back at a future meeting.

Several in the audience spoke against any increase. They also allowed that a modest increase would be palatable. If the schools and roads categories had been raised to 100%, the county was

looking at an impact fee rate of over \$10,000.

But that option was never seriously considered.

Stacey Worthington, president of the Citrus County Building Alliance, said the consultant’s report was flawed.

“The most glaring thing missing from the impact fee study is COVID-19,” she said. “That changed everything.”

Realtor Rob Tessmer Jr. said affordable homes are already out of reach for many and imposing higher impact fees on the cost of a new home would “crush” people who want to move here and open a business or build a home.

“If they can’t buy here, they will buy in one of our neighboring counties,” Tessmer said.

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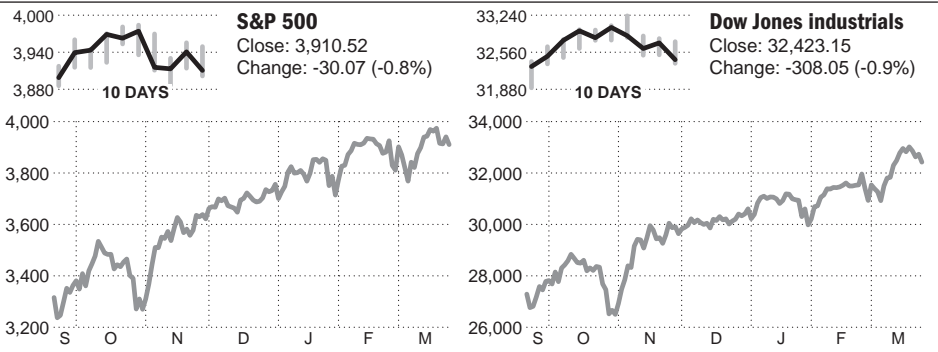

the waiver of the city’s open-container policy for the city’s and Crystal River Main Street’s First Friday events on May 7 and June 4.

This agenda item also led councilmen Robert Holmes and Brown to broach the subject of creating a city ordinance allowing for open alcohol containers along Citrus and Fifth avenues.

“Whatever we can do to support that,” Brown said, “and the community’s ready for it.”

Frink said he’d have staff draft a proposed ordinance in the near future.

Philip Cote said his opposition with council over the city’s endeavor to relocate its Third Avenue boat ramp within the Crystal River Preserve State Park, either at the Mullet Hole or the former yacht club site at the end of North Sailboat Avenue.

Cote said he collected 150 petition signatures, which was sent to council and the Chronicle, from his likeminded neighbors of the Citrus County’s Indian Waters subdivision bordering the state park.

Having a new ramp in the park, Cote said, would increase traffic on West State Park Street, creating pollution and congestion on the neighborhood’s main thoroughfare. Cote said the added boat launches and activity would also destroy the park’s marshlands.

“It would have a disastrous effect,” he said. Meek told Cote city staff will try to incorporate his concerns into the city’s long-term lease proposal to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, which runs the park.

According to its proposal to FDEP, the city is looking for a 4 to 6 acre site to accommodate a boat ramp, 60 parking spots for vehicles and trailers, a turnaround area, restrooms and a tie-up dock.

It’s the city’s plan to

apply for Florida Boating Improvement Program grants to fund the site’s design, permitting, engineering and construction, including an environmental assessment.

Crystal River is also working with county officials to strategize traffic-calming measures for West State Park Street — a county roadway.

Crystal River City Hall received 129 responses to city surveys asking the public about its thoughts on replacing the city’s boat ramp at the end of North-west Third Avenue, which is slated to be closed in March 2022 to make way for the city’s King’s Bay Riverwalk boardwalk.

GIVING AWAY WATER

Water deal not in state’s best interest

There’s no such thing as a free lunch, that is, unless you’re a multi-million-dollar corporation that wants to suck water from the Floridan aquifer.

Last month, the Suwanee River Water Management District approved a deal to let a private company pump nearly a million gallons of water a day from Ginnie Springs for a plastic bottling plant. Seven Springs, which profits greatly through its contract with Nestlé, paid a \$115 fee to apply for a permit. That’s all! Nestlé says it pays Seven Springs for the water, but how much is not clear.

The company pipes water from Ginnie Springs, a privately owned park in Gilchrist County, to a nearby Nestlé plant, where it is bottled for personal consumption.

Critics are rightfully outraged, saying the deal is a blow to the environmental stewardship of the state’s natural resources. Seven Springs representatives disagreed the water withdrawal would harm the environment and said water flow issues were reviewed by the water district. The water district initially turned down the permit, but an administrative law judge overturned the decision, so the district said it had no choice but to issue the permit.

Water is both a precious resource and a valued

commodity. As such, commercial businesses, industries and most residents have their water metered and must pay for the water consumed. There is no legitimate or rational reason why an international bottling company, or any company, should be allowed by the state to withdraw gargantuan amounts of water for the ridiculous bargain of a permitting fee.

The underlying legal issues need to be addressed so this sort of thing cannot happen in the future, but in the meantime, a for-profit company should pay to extract our water.

Two state legislators have introduced bills that would set fee schedules for water withdrawal. The extraction tax would be used for wastewater treatment and stormwater management.

Water is an important commodity in the life of the state; why would Floridians want to give it away for free?

State Rep. Anna Eskamani, D-Orlando, said the deal would be a step backward for the state’s environment.

“The fact that a private company with a small permit fee can be granted permission to pump upwards of a million gallons of water constantly is something that every Floridian should be upset by, no matter where you live in the state,” she said in an online news conference after the decision.

We couldn’t agree more.

THE ISSUE:

State gives a for-profit company the OK to withdraw nearly 1 million gallons of water a day for the cost of a \$115 permit.

We must fight to protect public’s right to watch their elected officials

For democracy to function, citizens must have the right to know what their elected officials are doing and saying. The right to full and public notice of when elected officials are discussing or making decisions must be ensured.

As a nonpartisan government watchdog and taxpayer-research institute that focuses on promoting government accountability and transparency, Florida TaxWatch supports the use of public notices in local newspapers of record by government entities to notify all of their citizens of meetings and votes. Unfortunately, current proposed legislation would allow local government websites to be the only required source for public notice posting.

Overall, the changes put forth in the proposed legislation mean that local newspapers would in most cases no longer be required to house and circulate public notices, thus causing Floridians to be less informed about current government issues.

Since newspapers and their websites possess a larger audience due to a wealth of information across a breadth of issues, the fact that these media

outlets would no longer be required to house public notices results in less written information provided to the people. An independent poll by Mason Dixon shows that Florida citizens overwhelmingly want wider access to the public notice information, as 78% of respondents want local governments to carry public notices in newspapers, and 61% said they would not seek out information on government websites.

In addition, the proposed legislation shifts delivering public-notice information from an active to a passive stance. Newspapers reach out to their

audience through intentional delivery, also offering accessibility to those without the means to an internet connection. A notice strictly available on government-run websites would eliminate the critical neutrality and independence of a newspaper or other third party. It would be much more likely for government entities to miss notification deadlines, leave out critical information or make changes electronically to items on their websites without public knowledge. When something runs in the newspaper, it is permanently printed

Suspect's family reportedly thought he was mentally ill

BOULDER, Colo. — The suspect accused of opening fire inside a crowded Colorado supermarket was a 21-year-old man who purchased an assault weapon less than a week earlier, authorities said Tuesday, a day after the attack that killed 10 people, including a police officer.

Ahmad Al Aliwi Alissa bought the weapon on March 16, just six days before the attack at a King Soopers store in Boulder, according to an arrest affidavit. It was not immediately known where the gun was purchased.

Alissa, who is from the

Denver suburb of Arvada, was booked into the county jail Tuesday on murder charges after being treated at a hospital. He was due to make a first court appearance Thursday.

Investigators have not established a motive, but they believe Alissa was the only shooter, Boulder County District Attorney Michael Dougherty said.

A law enforcement official briefed on the shooting said the suspect's family told investigators they believed Alissa was suffering some type of mental illness, including delusions. Relatives described times when Alissa told them people were following or chasing him, which they said may have contributed to the violence, the official

said. The official was not authorized to speak publicly and spoke to AP on condition of anonymity.

The attack was the nation's deadliest mass shooting since a 2019 assault on a Walmart in El Paso, Texas, where a gunman killed 22 people in a rampage that police said targeted Mexicans.

In Washington, President Joe Biden called on Congress to tighten the nation's gun laws.

"Ten lives have been lost, and more families have been shattered by gun violence in the state of Colorado," Biden said at the White House. Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer vowed to bring forward two House-passed bills to require expanded background checks for

gun buyers. Biden supports the measures, but they face a tougher route to passage in a closely divided Senate with a slim Democratic majority.

The shooting came 10 days after a judge blocked a ban on assault rifles passed by the city of Boulder in 2018. That ordinance and another banning large-capacity magazines came after the 2018 mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, that left 17 people dead.

A lawsuit challenging the bans was filed quickly, backed by the National Rifle Association. The judge struck down the ordinance under a Colorado law that blocks cities from making their own rules about guns.

Dems demand diverse nominees

Two senators slam Biden administration over racial makeup

WASHINGTON — Two Democratic senators lashed out Tuesday at the lack of Asian American and Pacific Islander representation in President Joe Biden's Cabinet and even vowed not to support nominations until the White House better promotes diversity — moves that could stymie their own party's administration in filling key posts.

Illinois Sen. Tammy Duckworth, one of only two senators of Asian American heritage, said she raised the issue with top Biden advisers on Tuesday and afterward called the situation "not acceptable."

"I've been talking to them for months and they're still not aggressive, so I'm not going to be voting for any nominee from the White House other than diversity nominees," Duckworth told reporters. "I'll be a no on everyone until they figure this out."

That prompted Hawaii Sen. Mazie Hirono, the only other senator of Asian American heritage, to say, "I'm joining her in that." Hirono

said they would like the White House to commit to a more diverse representation in the Cabinet and senior White House positions.

Katherine Tai, who is Taiwanese American, is in the Cabinet as Biden's top trade envoy. Dr. Vivek Murthy, the son of Indian parents, was confirmed Tuesday as surgeon general, a sub-Cabinet position.

Biden defended the makeup of his Cabinet to reporters Tuesday evening, saying, "We have the most diverse Cabinet in history." He added, "We have a lot of Asian Americans that are in the Cabinet and in sub-Cabinet levels."

The threats to withhold support could nonetheless complicate matters for Biden as he moves forward with other high-level administration and judicial appointments that require confirmation in an evenly divided Senate where Vice President Kamala Harris holds a tie-breaking vote.

Asian American and Pacific Islander elected officials and activists are hoping that last week's shootings at spas around Atlanta that killed eight people, six of them women of Asian descent, will prompt the

community to demand greater representation in government.

"We're not just calling for API's. This is not about pitting one diversity group against them. So I'm happy to vote for a Hispanic or Black person and LGBTQ person and AAPI person," Hirono said. "I just like to see more diversity representation."

Duckworth is of Thai descent and was mentioned as a possible vice presidential pick for Biden before he settled on Harris, the first Black and Indian American woman to hold the vice presidency. Duckworth, who had also been under consideration for a Cabinet role, noted that presidents over the last 20 years have included AAPI people in their Cabinets.

Hirono, who also spoke to senior Biden advisers, said she has expressed dismay about a lack of representation.

"I shared the frustration that the AAPI community has that there's not been a significant number of AAPIs at the Cabinet level," she told reporters. "I don't think the trade representative is what the community understands (as) a Cabinet level."

Mars copter to carry Wright Bros. part

CAPE CANAVERAL — A piece of the Wright brothers' first airplane is on Mars.

NASA's experimental Martian helicopter holds a small swatch of fabric from the 1903 Wright Flyer, the space agency revealed Tuesday. The helicopter, named Ingenuity, hitched a ride to the red planet with the Perseverance rover, arriving last month.

Ingenuity will attempt the first powered, controlled flight on another

planet no sooner than April 8. It will mark a "Wright brothers' moment," noted Bobby Braun, director for planetary science at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

The Carillon Historical Park in Dayton, Ohio, the Wrights' hometown, donated the postage-size piece of muslin from the plane's bottom left wing, at NASA's request.

The swatch made the 300 million-mile journey to Mars with the blessing of the Wright brothers' great-grandniece and great-grandnephew, said

park curator Steve Lucht.

"Wilbur and Orville Wright would be pleased to know that a little piece of their 1903 Wright Flyer I, the machine that launched the Space Age by barely one quarter of a mile, is going to soar into history again on Mars!" Amanda Wright Lane and Stephen Wright said in a statement provided by the park.

Orville Wright was on board for the world's first powered, controlled flight on Dec. 17, 1903, at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. The brothers took turns,

making four flights that day.

A fragment of Wright Flyer wood and fabric flew to the moon with Apollo 11's Neil Armstrong in 1969. A swatch also accompanied John Glenn into orbit aboard space shuttle Discovery in 1998. Both astronauts were from Ohio.

NASA's 4-pound helicopter will attempt to rise 10 feet into the extremely thin Martian air on its first hop. Up to five increasingly higher and longer flights are planned over the course of a month.

Stocks close broadly lower on Wall Street as banks stumble

Stocks closed broadly lower on Tuesday and gave back nearly all of their gains from a day earlier as technology, industrial and bank stocks fell.

The S&P 500 fell 30.07 points, or 0.8%, to 3,910.52. Technology stocks were the biggest drag on the market and pushed the Nasdaq 149.85 points lower, or 1.1%, to 13,227.70. The Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 308.05 points, or 0.9% to 32,423.15.

Stocks of smaller companies, which have far outpaced the rest of the market this year, fell even more. The Russell 2000 index gave back 3.6%.

Industrial and health care companies also accounted for a good part of the selling. Energy stocks helped drag down the market too as oil prices fell.

Bond yields declined. That weighed on banks and other financial companies which look to yields as a benchmark for the interest rates they charge on mortgages and other loans.

Investors continue to be focused on the future outlook for the U.S. economy as millions of Americans get vaccinated every day. Investors are wavering between optimism that coronavirus vaccines that might allow business and travel to return to normal and fears of higher inflation after struggling economies were flooded with credit and government spending.

Oakland launches guaranteed pay plan for low-income people

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — The mayor of Oakland, California, on Tuesday announced a privately funded program that will give low-income families of color \$500 per month with no rules on how they can spend it.

The program is the latest experiment with a "guaranteed income," an idea that giving poor people a set amount of money each month helps ease the stresses of poverty that often lead to poor health while hindering their ability to find full-time work.

The idea isn't new, but it's having a revival across the U.S. after some mayors launched small, temporary programs across the country in a coordinated campaign to convince Congress to adopt a national guaranteed income program.

NC House members file bill on transgender students in sports

RALEIGH, N.C. — Several North Carolina Republican legislators have filed a bill that would block men and boys from joining women's high school and college athletic teams, joining the culture-war tussle that has swept several states.

Their bill, which would apply to middle and high

schools and colleges — both public and private — comes as legislators in nearly 30 other states have proposed similar prohibitions. Bills in Idaho and Mississippi have become law, while others are being debated in several more state legislatures.

A bill sponsor acknowledged he knew of no controversies in North Carolina when a transgender had joined a team or competed in a sport designated for women. But it was important to be proactive in addressing the issue in North Carolina, said Rep. Mark Brody, a Union County Republican.

"I do not want to wait until biological females are pushed out of female sports, and all of their records are broken, scholarships lost and benefits of excelling are diminishing before this is addressed," Brody said on Tuesday at a Legislative Building news conference.

Brazil posts record single-day toll of 3,251 virus deaths

RIO DE JANEIRO — Brazil reported more than 3,000 COVID-19 deaths in a single day for the first time Tuesday amid calls for the government and the new health minister to take action to stem the nation's resurgence of coronavirus infections.

In recent weeks, Latin America's largest country has become the pandemic's global epicenter, with more deaths from the virus each day than in any other nation. Tuesday's record toll of 3,251 deaths was driven by the state of Sao Paulo, Brazil's most populous, which recorded 1,021 new deaths, far above the previous high of 713 last July.

Myanmar junta defends actions, accuses Suu Kyi of graft

YANGON, Myanmar — Myanmar's military junta on Tuesday took the offensive to try to justify last month's coup and subsequent actions against those opposed to it, even as street demonstrations continued against the takeover.

At a news conference in the capital Naypyitaw, the military presented a video of a former political colleague of ousted national leader Aung San Suu Kyi claiming he had handed over large amounts of cash and gold to her personally, in what the military has characterized as corruption. Such allegations were previously denied by her lawyer.

Many of the protests Tuesday were staged in a way that avoided confrontations with authorities, who have not hesitated to use lethal force to break up demonstrations. Some marches were held before dawn in Yangon, the country's biggest city, and elsewhere and went unmolested. Other protests adopted the tactic of having signboards or other inanimate objects lined up in the street to serve as proxies for human demonstrators.

Pandemic overwhelms school counselors

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. — To help her students keep up with school this year, counselor Nadia Pearce has tried it all.

She reminds them of goals they had before the pandemic, for college or a career. She calls parents and goes over how their children are supposed to log in for distance learning. She begs. She pleads. She practices tough love.

"I really have to say, 'You're in this nest right now. This is high school and we are pampering you. But when you leave here, you're going to be an adult and you have to make your own decisions and there won't be a Ms. Pearce to come advocate for you,'" she said. "So you have to get it together, now."

School counselors everywhere have played important roles in guiding students through the stress and uncertainty of the pandemic, but the burden has been especially heavy in urban, high-needs districts like Bridgeport, Connecticut, where they have been consumed with issues related to attendance and engagement.

In a nation where poor districts typically have fewer counselors per student, those demands highlight one way the pandemic is likely to worsen inequities in the American education system as those with the most on their plates have the least amount of time to help students plan for the future.

Well before school buildings shut down last spring, addressing chronic absenteeism was a time-consuming chore for Pearce and her colleagues. Since the shift to distance and then hybrid learning, her students at Fairchild Wheeler Interdistrict Magnet school have taken on more responsibilities at

home, working jobs or caring for siblings.

Counselors regularly run reports to identify students who are missing consecutive days of school or not logging in for class. From there, they analyze whether it's a case of illness, or perhaps flagging motivation, and discuss strategies that could work for each student.

"Attendance, attendance, attendance," Pearce said. "The data for attendance is like that emoji where there's an explosion."

There is one guidance counselor for every 350 students in high school in Bridgeport, Connecticut's largest city where three quarters of the students in the low-income district are Black or Hispanic. That compares with much smaller ratios in neighboring, largely white Fairfield County communities including 1 for every 220 in Greenwich, 206 in Darien and 162 in Weston, according to federal data.

Nevertheless, counselors in Bridgeport generally need to spend more time engaging families and connecting them with resources outside of school, said Michael Testani, Bridgeport's superintendent and a former school counselor.

"There's a lot of areas that a school counselor in Bridgeport needs to cover outside of just the academic guidance and support that you may see in the suburbs, where kids are getting all of their needs met at home and in the community," Testani said.

Nationally, high school counselors who serve predominantly students of color attend to 34 more students than others, according to a 2019 report by the American School Counselor Association, the Education Trust and Reach Higher. It also found that schools serving the most students from low-income families tend

to have fewer counselors.

Still, Pearce has made time for students who lean on her for college planning.

Pola Indyk, a senior whose mother is from Poland and was unfamiliar with the college application process, said Pearce guided her through every step, even working after the school day on a last-minute request for a recommendation.

"It was very nerve-racking. I'm a pretty anxious person as it is. I just felt really overwhelmed," Pola said. "She checks up on me. She knows that I have a lot of plans and aspirations."

In a crisis year, counselors and other school staff members in many areas have been occupied with making sure students have meals and support for emotional struggles, never mind declines in student performance and college application rates. A shift to emphasize student attendance and well-being — and not necessarily academic counseling — has taken place even in suburban districts, said Amanda Fitzgerald, an assistant deputy executive director at the school counselor association.

"I think the college and career readiness piece is, in some communities, still a number one priority. And I think in most communities, the social and emotional well-being of students is the number one priority," Fitzgerald said.

In Cheshire, Connecticut, a New Haven suburb where the vast majority of students go on to college, counselors have been called upon to provide extra support addressing student's social and emotional needs, which had been rising rapidly in many places even before the pandemic, district counseling director Michelle Catucci said.

The pandemic, she said, has brought further stress, including the uncertainty around planning for college and whether students will be comfortable going away for higher education.

"It's just increasing — the demands on our students as far as what success means and being successful and managing the social pieces, especially with social media," said Catucci, who is also executive director of the Connecticut School Counselor Association. "But since the pandemic, we're obviously still dealing with some of those issues, but also with supporting students through this unprecedented time and the emotions that come with it."

In Bridgeport, Pearce said she has adopted the role of an "auntie," checking in on students and their parents alike.

"I told a mother, 'Look, I know that you work. My sister's a single mom, too. So I get it. You're doing a lot of different things,'" she said. "But you know, we've got to help our little friend cross the finish line. Can you just check her assignments? Just to make sure she's doing what she needs to do?"

She also has success stories.

Masengo Nkuili, a junior, said distance learning has been disrupted by distractions at home and there have been days she didn't feel like getting out of bed. She said Pearce has helped to keep her motivated and guided her toward scholarship opportunities to help fulfill her dream of attending a historically Black college.

"If I am just not feeling something or I don't feel like going, it's, 'Masengo you have to go to class,'" she said. "She always gives me advice like that. Her energy is always amazing."

AP Poll: Learning setbacks a top concern for parents

BOSTON — Parents across the U.S. are conflicted about reopening schools. Most are at least somewhat worried that a return to the classroom will lead to more coronavirus cases, but there's an even deeper fear that their children are falling behind in school while at home.

Sixty-nine percent of parents are at least somewhat concerned that their children will face setbacks in school because of the coronavirus pandemic, including 42% who say they're very or extremely worried about it, according to a new poll from The University of Chicago Harris School of Public Policy and The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research.

Nearly as many, 64%, say they are at least somewhat concerned that in-person instruction will lead to more people being infected, but it's only 33% who say they are very or extremely worried about the risk.

That tension reflects the fears of a nation on the cusp of a widespread return to classroom teaching. More than a year after the pandemic started, more schools are now opening their doors to students or plan to do so in coming weeks.

Parents' concerns about their children falling behind were even stronger in an AP-NORC poll last July, after the school year was interrupted in the spring by

the burgeoning pandemic. Concerns about the spread of the virus in general also have ticked down to a low point as many look hopefully to a chance to ease back to normal.

Pressure to reopen schools has come from parents, state officials and President Joe Biden, who has vowed to have most of the nation's elementary schools open five days a week in his administration's first 100 days. Even as many schools already offer some level of in-person teaching, there's growing demand to bring students back every day.

For parents, concerns about the pandemic's impact go beyond academics — most also worry at least some that their children will fall behind socially and lose access to school sports and other activities, the poll found.

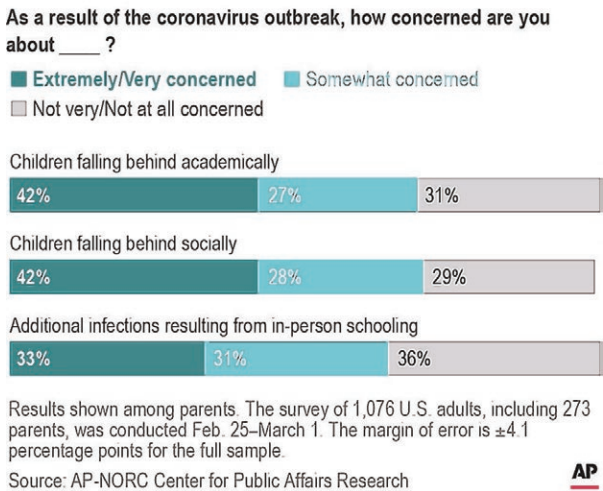
Last month the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released guidelines saying schools can safely reopen with masks, social distancing and other measures even if teachers have not received vaccines.

Even in areas with higher virus rates, the agency said, younger students are generally safe to continue with classroom instruction.

Despite the CDC's guidance, however, Americans remain divided over what's needed for a safe reopening. Most say masks are important, but it's not a universal expectation: 62% say it's essential to require masks among students and teachers, while 22% say it's important but not essential, the poll found.

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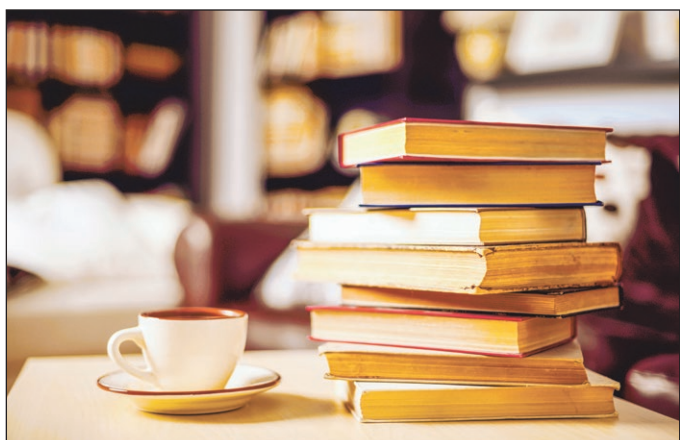

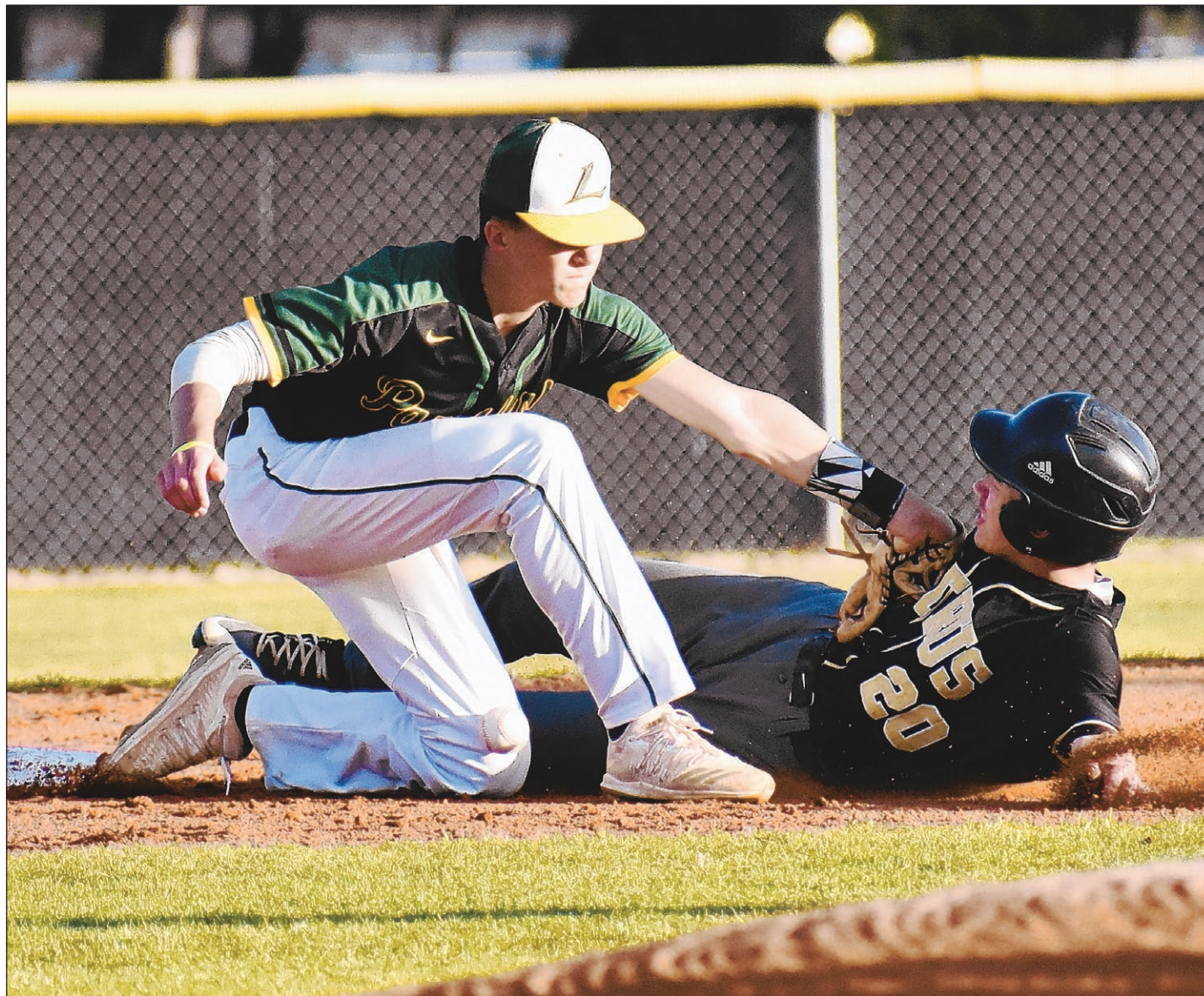

Citrus wins first 'Plate Game' over county rival Lecanto, 3-0

LECANTO — The postgame celebration was subdued. There was no huddling together for a team picture.

The hype may not have built up yet, but what coaches hope will be a new tradition finally got its start on Tuesday night at Lecanto's baseball field. The Panthers and visiting Citrus played in the very first "Plate Game," with the Hurricanes taking home the brand new traveling trophy following a 3-0 victory.

"First annual Plate Game, it's a good feeling," Citrus head coach Jon Bolin said. "It's a rivalry game. It's good to see our kids play hard in a rivalry game like this. They were pumped up, they were excited for it."

"I hadn't really said anything about The Plate Game all year until yesterday. It kind of pumped them up a little bit."

Lecanto and Crystal River have the Joe D. Rigney Memorial Bat Game, an annual event started in 1991 that involves a 6-foot tall replica Louisville Slugger being passed back and forth depending on the winning team.

It made senses to the Lecanto coaching staff that there should be a similar game against their other county rival, and so they created a trophy featuring a large, flat baseball mounted on top of a giant home plate painted half green with a Lecanto logo and half black with a Citrus logo.

However, when the pandemic cut short all spring sports seasons a year ago, what was scheduled to be the first Plate Game was canceled and delayed until now.

"It's not to that point (of The Bat Game) yet, obviously. It's the first one. But I think it'll get there. It'll be something that we'll play for, for years," Lecanto head coach David Logue said. "It was supposed to be here last year."

The Padres said Tatis had discomfort in his non-throwing left shoulder and would be reevaluated on Wednesday.

Tatis went into the hole to backhand a grounder in the third inning hit by Cincinnati's Jonathan India in Peoria, Arizona. Tatis' throwing motion seemed off, even though he got the out.

The 22-year-old Tatis began to leave the diamond and was met by manager Jayce Tingler and a trainer. After a few minutes in the dugout, Tatis headed toward the clubhouse accompanied by a trainer.

Tatis signed the longest contract in baseball history on Feb. 22, a \$340 million, 14-year deal.

Tatis had singled against the Reds, raising his spring average to .391.

Blotz sails to first Outlaw win of season

Eric Sharrone sets new Mini Stock track record

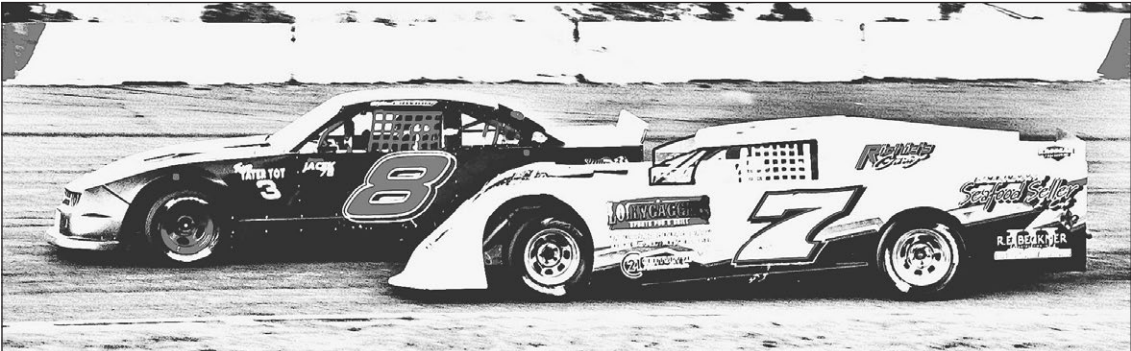
INVERNESS — Travis Blotz set a blistering pace and drove off to his first Outlaw Street Stock win of 2021 at Citrus County Speedway on Saturday night.

Blotz started outside the second row and wasted no time in ousting Joe Gerard from the lead before driving off to a half-lap advantage over the field at the half-way point of the race. By the end of 25 laps, Blotz had a 9.359 lead over second-place finisher AJ Waller. Gerard finished third after pressuring Waller early in the 25-lap event but lost momentum. Pole-sitter Lauren Lanier and Jonathan Appleby rounded out the top five, respectively.

Eric Sharrone set a new track record in the Mini Stock division, but lost the race to Thomas Peet.

The pair started the 25-lap event side-by-side on the back row and quickly made their way to the front with Sharrone in command of the race by lap no. 5. Sharrone's powerful run set a new track record of 54.126 mph on the quarter-mile asphalt oval and gave defending division champion Thomas Peet an open lane to follow.

Peet made his way to second when early race leader Steven Wyatt pushed high out of the turn

and immediately began to reel in the race leader. By lap No. 18, Peet was able to make his move to the low groove for the top spot and drove on to win the event by 3.372 seconds over Sharrone. Brayden Boardman followed in third, Jason Simons fourth and Wyatt fifth.

Larry Welter Jr. took the early lead of the Pure Stock 25, but was no match for Jason Waller who, after taking the lead on lap No. 6, was able to pull to a comfortable 4.802 second lead for the uncontested win.

“There’s probably 10 or 15 cars that can win any given night,” Waller said from victory lane. “They’re all really close together and they’re really good cars.”

Welter held on to finish second with Kleav Lewis, Danny Maddox and Sport Wilson following him to the line.

It was a slow start for the 32-car Ford Outlaw feature to get going, 21 minutes throughout multiple cautions in the first two laps, but once the field settled down it was Thomas Peet in

control all the way to the finish. Neil Hern followed Peet to finish nearly a half-lap behind for second. Melvin Fockler, Michael Cox and Dora Thorne rounded out the top five.

Derek Pugh came from outside the front row to lead all 50 laps of the Florida Pro Truck Challenge 50. Division hot shoe Becca Monopoli made a last-lap pass for second over fast qualifier Jimmy Frazier. Brennon Pletcher, who ran second most of the event, finished ahead of Chase King in fourth.

A clutch issue for Kevin Harrod gave the veteran driver his first DNF of the season and Kasey Kilfoyl the opportunity to win the event over one of the best Mod Mini drivers in the division.

Only seven cars showed for the divisions' first race of the season. Harrod started on the pole and led the first 19 laps when his car lost power out of the fourth turn. Foley, who has a long history of competing in the division, had been glued to Harrod's rear deck

lid and could all but spin the leader for the event's only caution. Once it was known of Harrod's mechanical issue, Foley was given the lead, but he too had issues and slowed as he drove down the backstretch with just five laps to go.

Kilfoyl took command of the event and led the remaining three cars on the track to the finish, cut short due to a light rain shower. Tyler Simpson followed Kilfoyl to the finish ahead of Foley and David Newell.

circumstances, provide stand by assistance with bathing, or actual help with bathing, dressing and other activities of daily living.

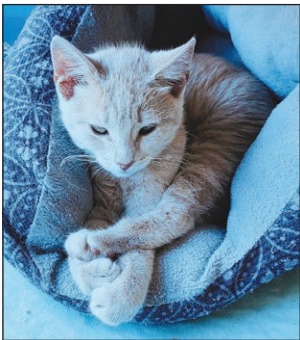

As a child, she loved the outdoors, said her daughter, Judy Cogswell. She hunted and fished, skied and tobogganed.

Her father was an electrician — and the sheriff — and her mother liked to cook and feed the neighbors.

“They did a lot of canning and freezing fresh vegetables from the garden,” Cogswell said.

Dottie attended school

at Fryeburg Academy, which is where she met her husband, Erwin.

The couple had a small grocery store and rental cabins at the base of Jockey Cap Rock, a historical landmark in Fryeburg.

Dottie also worked in a doctor’s office, waited tables and was the town clerk.

She and Erwin came to Florida in 1975 and settled in Citrus Springs.

“She’s one sharp lady,” said Anita Marshall, New Horizon activities director. “She loves when we

do trivia — she’s a brainiac. We’re all amazed at how much she remembers.”

Dottie said she didn’t have a secret to living to 100 except maybe “do all things in moderation.”

As for a birthday present for someone turning 100, she said that’s a hard thing.

This week, The Mini Page goes on a virtual adventure to the Amazon River Basin in South America. ¡Vamos!

A vast river

The Amazon River begins high in the Andes Mountains and flows about 4,000 miles across the continent. Only the Nile River in Africa is longer.

The Amazon River has more than 1,100 tributaries. (A tributary is a stream or river that feeds a larger river or lake.) Seventeen of these are more than 900 miles long. The Amazon carries one-fifth of all the river water flowing into the oceans of the Earth. The mouth of the river is 200 miles wide where it enters into the Atlantic Ocean.

What is a basin?

We use **basins**, or sinks and bowls, to hold things, especially water. Our planet Earth has basins, too.

A **drainage basin** collects rainwater, which drains into a common outlet, like a river.

The Amazon River Basin covers more than 2.4 million square miles. This river system flows in seven countries, including about half of Brazil, and covers land in Bolivia, Colombia, Ecuador, French Guiana, Guyana, Peru, Suriname and Venezuela.

People along the Amazon

Each year, for a six-month period, the banks along the Amazon flood. People, plants and animals in the area adjust to these changes. Waters rise from 20 feet to 50 feet

and flood an area as far as 50 miles from the river. Many houses are built on **stilts**, or designed to float on the river.

Most of the river basin is covered with **rainforests**, so this large area is home to a comparably small number of people, about 30 million. About 2.7 million of those are **Indigenous people**, or those whose ancestors first inhabited the area.

People living in the Amazon River Basin are farmers, growing soya beans, nuts, rice and corn. The river provides fish for food.

Who else lives there?

“Bio” means life, and “diversity” means variety. The biodiversity is probably greater in rainforest areas than anywhere else.

Hundreds of different species, including mammals, fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and insects, thrive in the warm, damp climate.

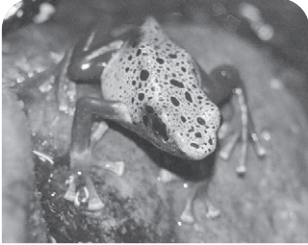
Some of the creatures who live there include:

- **Jaguars** are the largest cats in the Western Hemisphere.



Emerald tree boa constrictors coil around prey and squeeze it to death.

- The **tapir** is related to the rhinoceros. It spends most of the time in the water.



The bright blue color of the poison dart frog is a warning to predators not to attack.

Living in layers

Animals in the rainforest live on different levels, from the ground up to the top of the trees. That is why so many of them can live in small areas.

Emergent layer: The tallest trees with thick leaves are homes to lightweight birds, bats and butterflies.

More animals live in the canopy than in any other layer. Many of the trees have tough and shiny leaves. Some animals never go down to the ground.



Understory: Because of the thick leaves above, not much direct sunlight reaches this area. Many plants have huge leaves. Snakes might live here.

Floor: This layer is dark and quiet. Animals that hunt, such as jaguars, live here. Many insects crawl on the ground.

Cook's Corner

Black Bean and Beef Stew

You'll need:

- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 celery stalk, chopped fine
- 2 carrots, chopped
- 2 onions, chopped
- 3 garlic cloves, chopped fine

- 1 bell pepper, chopped
- 1 (14 1/2-ounce) can stewed tomatoes
- 1 pound stew beef, cut into cubes
- 2 (16-ounce) cans black beans, drained

What to do:

1. Cook celery, carrots, onions, garlic and bell pepper in vegetable oil in a large pot over medium heat for 5 minutes. Stir often.
2. Add tomatoes and beef. Cover. Lower heat to simmer and cook for 30 minutes. Stir every 5 minutes.
