There was something about Mary

Former resident dies abroad in Bali; couldn't return during pandemic

Mary Castro spent the early teenage years riding horses at her rural Homosassa home, and excelling in Lecanto

She left Citrus County for a jet-set life — modeling in Miami, surfing at Malibu, living overseas — but would return on occasion to visit with her mother, Joan Bracken. Sometimes she stayed a few months, sometimes a year.

Then off again: the last nearly two years in Bali, where she was working as a freelance journalist and dating an

Her mother would hear bits and pieces. A phone call, sometimes text messages. Mary stayed in touch, at least on the surface.

'She kept her adult life very secret," Joan said. And so when one of Mary's friends called shortly before dawn on May 28, 2021, to say her 41-year-old daughter was dead, Joan plunged into grief and confusion.

"Her death is so mysterious," she said. "She wasn't the way those articles depicted her."

The Bali media said she was drinking. It said drugs were found in the villa. Stories reported she was out late, at a nearby bar, with two men.

The men accompanied her back to her villa and they relaxed out by the pool. The next morning, one of the men said, Mary didn't wake up. The authorities were called. She never regained consciousness.

send officers for up to 16 days to Texas and Arizona, he said.

Through May the U.S. Border Patrol logged nearly 930,000 enforcement encounters at the border this year, more than double 2020 encounters.

DeSantis said the state's spiking crime rate isn't "organic to Florida" but spurred by the new administration's rescission of Trump immigration policies.

"This was a crisis created by going against policies that would be working just 'cause you don't like your predecessor," DeSantis said, noting Florida is first state to respond to the call for mutual

15 months later, **Radio City reopens** with Dave Chappelle

NEW YORK — Fifteen months after shuttering for the pandemic, New York's Radio City Music Hall reopened its doors Saturday for the Tribeca Festival premiere of a new **Dave** Chappelle documentary for a full-capacity, fully-vaccinated audience.

The debut of "Dave Chappelle: This Time This Place," which chronicles Chappelle's pandemic stand-up series held in rural Ohio cornfields, marked the first time the hallowed midtown hall was yet again packed since closing in March 2020 — a shutdown that put a year-plus's worth of concerts, including Radio City's famous Rockettes, on ice for easily the longest spell since the Art Deco venue first opened in 1932.

The premiere Saturday evening, the closing night gala for the 20th Tribeca Festival, was seen as a symbolic reawakening of the arts in New York, where many of the world's most famous stages — Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Broadway theaters remain dark.

But after so many pandemic months of silence, that's quickly changing. On Sunday, Madison Square Garden will host its first full-capacity concert with the Foo Fighters. "Springsteen on Broadway" is set to resume performances on June 26.

After the screening, Chappelle dramatically took the stage to a thumping beat from DJ Clark **Kent** and a raucous standing ovation. The comedian paused for a moment to apologize for those who lost someone during the pandemic before signaling a note of revival.

"But, man, let's get up," said Chappelle. He soon after introduced a New York feast of hiphop acts who performed according to their native borough, including Q-Tip, Talib Kweli, Fat Joe, A\$AP Ferg, Redman, Ghostface Killah and De La Soul.

Masks weren't required inside Radio City but proof of vaccination was. In announcing the event in May, New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo said it would "go a long way towards bringing back this state, overall.'

Directed by Julia Reichert and Steven Bognar, makers of the Oscar-winning "American Factory" (and fellow Ohioans whom Chappelle called his neighbors), "This Time This Place" shows Chappelle realizing his quixotic vision for keeping stand-up and live performance going through the summer of 2020 and beyond.

In the rural town of Yellow Springs (population 3,700),

Chappelle mounted a stage on a friend's farm and flew in a parade of comics, some of whom showed up dying for an audience, others who were rusty from months of quarantine. Among them: Chris Rock (who was in attendance Saturday), Jon Stewart and Tiffany Haddish — along with regulars Michelle Wolf, Donnell Rawlings and Mo Amer.

The film captures an uncharacteristically nervous Chappelle before his first appearance, the considerable safety precautions taken (including Chappelle and others wincing at a swab up their nose), their battles with the local zoning board, the protest and pain that followed the death of George Floyd, and, ultimately, the profound benefits of comedy and community.

"Look at what we did," Chappelle said on stage at Radio City. "Imagine what we can do together."



Police guessed she died of a mixture of drinking and drugs, or of an unknown illness. The police chief in Kuta, Bali, reached that conclusion without an autopsy.

"The victim's face and body also looked blue when examined," the website www.tribun-bali.com quoted the chief as saying.

Mary's friends are convinced

there's more to it.

"I know Mary well enough to know I doubt she'd take something out of the norm," Mike Florian, who lives in Homosassa, said. "It doesn't jive with who Mary was.

Laura Pattinson, a Lecanto High School cheerleader with Mary who had stayed in touch since then, said the story being told in Bali seems impossible to consider.

Mary didn't do hard drugs," Pattinson, who now lives in Charlotte, North Carolina, said. "She liked her wine and her laughter."

They moved to Homosassa in 1988 from the St. Petersburg area when Mary was 9. Mary was in third grade; her half-brother, D.J., starting kindergarten, both at Lecanto Primary School.

Joan Bracken, who had divorced from Mary's father, said her kids grew up riding horses in the rural Homosassa lands east of U.S. 19.

Mary did well academically and in her social life. She was a popular girl in school.

Like a lot of teens, Mary was eager to start a new life out of her hometown.

She wanted bigger things," Joan said. "She had bigger dreams.

In her senior year, Mary told her mother that her best friend's boyfriend was into drugs, and she needed to get away. Joan removed Mary from Lecanto High and placed her in a private Dunedin school, where she graduated in 1997.

Joan bought Mary a condo on Bayshore Boulevard in Clearwater, and she started working as a waitress at Hooters. She met Tampa Bay Bucs players, and one team official was so taken by her that he introduced Mary to a modeling agency, thus starting her career.

Mary moved to Miami and lived the life of high society, her mother said. Details, though, were scarce.

"Not as much as I wished," Joan said. "She's not in my reach anymore. She was having a lot of fun, I

Mary met a Los Angeles attorney who took her to the Left Coast, and

where she continued modeling and freelance writing. And enjoying life. She told her mother of surfing with the Hiltons at Malibu.

Mary and the lawyer had a falling and she returned Homosassa.

"He texted her, 'don't come back," Joan said.

It was a difficult time for Mary. "She was really hurting," Joan said. "She was with me for about a year. She was just so depressed. I told her, 'you're too young for that. You're going to go out and get a job."

Mary worked at a radio station and then at the power plant. She volunteered her time, too, with the Citrus County Chamber of Commerce where, as with other elements of her life, Mary made an

Joan Bracken said she paid \$11,000 to have her daughter's body returned to Florida from Bali, a sum she attributed to pandemic-related costs.

She has spent these past two weeks reflecting on her daughter's life and dreams.

Spacewalking astronauts install new solar panel

CAPE CANAVERAL — Spacewalking astronauts equipped the International Space Station with the first in a series of powerful new solar panels Sunday, overcoming suit problems and other obstacles with muscle and persistence.

It took two spacewalks for French astronaut Thomas Pesquet and NASA astronaut Shane Kimbrough to install and unfurl the panel to its full 63 feet in length.

The solar wing unrolled like a red carpet once the final set of bolts was released, relying solely on pent-up energy. The slow but steady extension took 10 minutes, with station cameras providing live TV views.

"It is beautiful," Pesquet called out.

"Well done, both of you," Mission Control replied once the operation was complete. "That was great to see."

As the 6 1/2-hour spacewalk concluded, Kimbrough, who has three children, wished "Happy Father's Day" to all the flight controller dads. "Thanks for working with us on a Sunday."

Pride parade crash appears unintentional

FORT LAUDERDALE -A member of a men's chorus group unintentionally slammed into fellow chorists at the start of a Pride parade in South Florida, killing one member of the group and seriously injuring another, the group's director said Sunday, correcting initial speculation that it was a hate crime directed at the gay community.

Wilton Manors Vice Mayor Paul Rolli and Fort Lauderdale Mayor Dean Trantalis said the early investigation shows it was an accident. The 77-year-old driver was taken into custody, but police said no charges have been filed and the investigation is ongoing.

The elderly driver had ailments that prevented him from walking, according to a statement Sunday from Fort Lauderdale Police, who said he was cooperating with the investigation and there was no evidence drugs or alcohol was involved.

Cops arrest man wanted in 3 **Oregon deaths**

NORTH BEND, Oregon — A man sought in the killings of his father and two other people at a casino campground and in a shooting at a marijuana dispensary in a small Oregon city turned himself in to police in Milwaukee, authorities said Sunday,

Investigators believe Oen Evan Nicholson drove the over 2,000 miles from the coastal city of North Bend to Wisconsin, said Coos County District Attorney R. Paul Frasier.

He is believed to have abandoned his father's truck after crashing it in Oregon on Friday.

Nicholson is suspected in the death of his father, Charles Simms Nicholson, whose body was found in a trailer in an RV campground of The Mill Casino in North Bend on Friday.

Nicholson was charged with first-degree murder in the deaths of his father, Oyster and Davidson as well as second-degree attempted murder, first-degree assault and failing to help a person injured in a traffic accident, Frasier said.

12 dead in Alabama due to Claudette, including 10 children

ATLANTA — Tropical Depression Claudette claimed 12 lives in Alabama as the storm swept across the southeastern U.S., causing flash flooding and spurring tornadoes that destroyed dozens of homes.

Ten people, including nine children, were killed Saturday in a fiery multi-vehicle crash about 35 miles south of Montgomery on Interstate 65, according to Butler County Coroner Wayne Garlock.

He said the vehicles likely hydroplaned on wet roads, with eight children, ages 4 to 17, killed in a van belonging to a youth ranch for abused or neglected children operated by the Alabama Sheriffs Association. Two people died in separate vehicle, Garlock told local news outlets — 29-year-old Cody Fox and his 9-month-old daughter, Ariana, both of Marion County, Tennessee.

"He was a great guy and we're Unit.

really gonna miss him," said Aaron Sanders, who worked with Fox at the emergency management agency in Marion County. He said Fox also ran a hot tub business with his father and doted on his daughter. "He just loved her to death and that was his life.'

Multiple people were also injured.

The National Transportation Safety Board tweeted that it was sending 10 investigators to the area Sunday to investigate the crash, which photos showed included at least four burned vehicles, including two large trucks. It said the inquiry would focus on vehicle technologies such as forward collision warning systems, fuel tank integrity and occupant survivability.

Meanwhile, a 24-year-old man and a 3-year-old boy were killed when a tree fell on their house just outside the Tuscaloosa city limits

The deaths occurred as drenching rains pelted northern Alabama and Georgia late Saturday. As much as 12 inches (30 centimeters) of rain was reported earlier from Claudette along the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

Flash flood watches were posted Sunday for northern Georgia, most of South Carolina, the North Carolina coast, parts of southeast Alabama and the Florida Panhandle. A tropical storm warning was in effect in North Carolina from the Little River Inlet to the town of Duck on the Outer Banks. A tropical storm atch was issued from South Santee River, South Carolina, to the Little River Inlet, forecasters said.

WBRC-TV reported that search efforts were also under way for a man believed to have fallen into the water during flash flooding in Birmingham. Crews were using boats to search Pebble Creek.

The eight children killed in the Saturday, said Capt. Jack Kennedy van were returning to a youth ranch of the Tuscaloosa Violent Crimes near Camp Hill, northeast of Montgomery.

Progress made in Vienna at Iran nuclear talks

VIENNA - Top diplomats said Sunday that further progress had been made at talks between Iran and global powers to try to restore a landmark 2015 agreement to contain Iranian nuclear development that was abandoned by the Trump administration.

They said it was now up to the governments involved in the negotiations to make political decisions.

It was the first official meeting since Iran's hardline judiciary chief won a landslide victory in the country's presidential election last week.

Some diplomats expressed concern that Iran's election of Ebrahim Raisi as president could complicate a possible return to the nuclear agreement.

Enrique Mora, the European Union official who chaired the final meeting of the sixth round of talks between Russia, China, Germany. France. Britain and Iran, told reporters that "we are closer to a deal, but we are not still there."

The U.S. did not have a representative at the table in Vienna. However, President Joe Biden's administration has signaled willingness to rejoin the Iran deal under terms that would broadly see the United States scale back sanctions and Iran return to its 2015 nuclear commitments.

Gunmen kill at least 14 in border attacks

CIUDAD VICTORIA, Mexico - Gunmen in vehicles opened fire in the Mexican city of Reynosa on the U.S. border, killing at least 14 people and causing widespread panic, authorities said. Security forces killed four suspects, including one who died near a border bridge.

The attacks began Saturday afternoon in several neighborhoods in eastern Reynosa, which borders the Texan city of McAllen, according to the Tamaulipas state agency that coordinates security forces. Images posted on social media showed bodies in the streets.

Authorities did not immediately comment on a possible motive for the attacks. The area's criminal activity has long been dominated by the Gulf Cartel, but there have been fractures within the group.

Armenia votes in election triggered by war defeat

YEREVAN, Armenia -Polls have closed in Armenia's national parliamentary election that was held to try to resolve tensions over last year's defeat in fighting against Azerbaijan over the separatist region of Nagorno-Karabakh.

Sunday's early election was called by Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan in a bid to ease public anger over the peace deal he signed in November, which set off months of protests demanding his resignation.

The Moscow-brokered agreement ended six weeks of fighting between Armenian and Azerbaijani forces, but saw Azerbaijan reclaim control over large parts of Nagorno-Karabakh and surrounding areas that had been held by Armenian forces for more than a quarter-century.

Thousands of Armenians took to the streets in the capital of Yerevan to protest the deal as a betrayal of their national interests.

New leaders, new era:

US-Israel relations reach crossroads

WASHINGTON — Their countries at crossroads, the new leaders of the United States and Israel have inherited a relationship that is at once imperiled by increasingly partisan domestic political considerations and deeply bound in history and an engrained recognition that they need each other.

How President Joe Biden and Prime Minister Naftali Bennett manage that relationship will shape the prospects for peace and stability in the Middle East.


They are ushering in an era no longer defined by the powerful personality of long-serving Prime Minister Benjamin Netayahu, who repeatedly defied the Obama administration and then reaped the rewards of a warm relationship with President Donald Trump.

Bennett's government says it wants to repair relations with the Democrats and restore bipartisan support in the U.S. for Israel. Biden, meanwhile, is pursuing a more balanced approach on the Palestinian conflict and Iran.

The relationship is critical to both countries. Israel has long regarded the United States as its closest ally and guarantor of its security and international standing while the U.S. counts on Israel's military and intelligence prowess in a turbulent Middle East.

But both Biden and Bennett are also restrained by domestic politics.

Bennett leads an uncertain coalition of eight parties from across main point of convergence was on

In a conversation with Secretary of State Antony Blinken on Thursday, Lapid said the two agreed on a "no surprises" policy and to keep clear deal that President Barack lines of communication open.

Long slams Rays, Mariners sweep

Tampa Bay drops sixth straight

SEATTLE — Shed Long Jr. hit a grand slam with two outs in the 10th inning, lifting the Seattle Mariners over the Tampa Bay Rays 6-2 on Sunday for a four-game sweep.

"I knew I won the game. I didn't know it would be a grand slam off the bat," Long said. "It was unbelievable, honestly. Unbelievable. Just a great feeling. It's one of the coolest things you can do in baseball."

The Rays owned the best record in the majors before their current six-game losing streak.

Long's first homer of the season came against Diego Castillo (2-4). It was the first grand slam and game-winning home run of Long's career.

"It was the pitch I wanted to throw, and he just connected the way he wanted to connect," Castillo said.

Long started the season on the injured list with a stress fracture in his right shin. This was his 11th game since returning on

Dylan Moore started Seattle's 10th with a bunt hit when Castillo's throw to third was too late to catch designated runner Taylor Trammell, who was pinchrunning for Ty France.

Trammell then got caught in a rundown between third and home on Jake Bauers' grounder for the first out. Luis Torrens drew a walk to load the bases and Jake Fraley popped out to shallow right before Long's shot to right field.

France and Torrens also homered for the Mariners, who have won seven of eight.

It was the first time the Rays had been swept in a four-game series since the Tigers did it in a series finishing on July 3, 2016.

The Mariners trailed in all four games, and had the game-winning run come in the final inning three times in the series, including the last two in

Birdies the last 2 holes to become the first Spaniard to win US Open

AP golf writer SAN DIEGO — Two career-changing

putts for Jon Rahm brought two trophies Sunday. He cradled his 3-month-old son,

Kepa, as he walked off the 18th green at Torrey Pines on Father's Day. And then he collected the silver U.S. Open trophy after a performance filled with passion and absent of blunders that wiped out everyone else.

Rahm made a bending 25-foot birdie putt on the 17th hole to catch Louis Oosthuizen. He buried another curling, left-to-right birdie putt from 18 feet on the final hole for a 4-under 67 and a oneshot victory.

"Little man, you have no idea what son on the practice range when he won. "You will soon enough.'

The 26-year-old Rahm became the first Spaniard to win the U.S. Open, finally getting the major prize to go along with his enormous talent. His victory also returned him to No. 1 in the world.

On a back nine filled with double bogeys by so many contenders and a shocking meltdown by defending champion Bryson DeChambeau, Oosthuizen was

the last to fall.

Trailing by one shot, Oosthuizen drove into the canyon left of the 17th fairway for a bogey that left him two shots behind, and then he missed the fairway on the par-5 18th that kept him from going for the green for a look at eagle to force a playoff.

He settled for a birdie and a 71. It was his second straight runner-up in a major, and his sixth silver medal since he won the British Open in 2010 at St.

"Look, it's frustrating. It's disappointing," Oosthuizen said ."I'm playing good golf, but winning a major championship is not just going to happen. You need to go out and play good golf. I played good today, but I didn't play good enough."

Only two weeks ago, Rahm was on the this means right now," Rahm said to his cusp of another big win. He had a sixshot lead at the Memorial after 54 holes, only to be notified as he walked off the 18th green at Muirfield Village that he had a positive COVID-19 test and had to withdraw.

Worse yet, his parents had flown in from Spain to see their new grandson, and Rahm was in self-isolation and

couldn't be there for a special moment. Sunday made up for it. His parents were at Torrey Pines to witness a

world-class performance capped off by one of the great finishes in U.S. Open history.

"It had to happen in a beautiful setting like this," Rahm said. "Three generations of Rahms on this green. One of them doesn't know what's going on.'

For so much of the back nine, it was utter chaos with blunders that can define a U.S. Open.

DeChambeau, trying to become only the fourth player since World War II to win back-to-back in the U.S. Open, took the lead with an 8-iron that stopped inches away from a hole-in-one on the par-3 eighth. He had gone 30 consecutive holes without a bogey.

And then his lack of accuracy off the tee cost him. A bogey on No. 11. A bogey from deep rough on No. 12. And then on the par-5 13th, DeChambeau went from deep rough to deep rough to bunker, blasting out of the sand over the green next to a beer box, making double bogey.

He took a quadruple-bogey 8 on the 17th hole with a shot in the canyon and a shank. He shot 44 on the back nine for

THIS DATE IN BASEBALL

1916 — Rube Foster of the Red Sox pitched a 2-0 no-hitter against the New York Yankees. Foster struck out three, walked three and pitched the first no-hitter at Fenway Park.

1939 — The New York Yankees announced Lou Gehrig's retirement, based on the report that he had amyotrophic lateral sclerosis. The 36-year-old star remained as the team captain.

1941 — Lefty Grove's 20-game consecutive win streak at Fenway Park ended with a 13-9 loss to the St. Louis Browns. The streak spanned from May 3, 1938, to May 12, 1941.

1956 — In a rare double one-hitter, Chicago's Jack Harshman outdueled Connie Johnson and George Zuverink of Baltimore as the White Sox beat the Orioles 1-0.

1964 — Jim Bunning of the Philadelphia Phillies pitched a 6-0 perfect game against the New York Mets in the opener of a Father's Day doubleheader. Bunning threw 89 pitches and struck out 10, including John Stephenson to end the game. The no-hitter gave Bunning one in each league and Gus Triandos became the first catcher to handle no-hitters in both leagues.

2006 — Jose Reyes hit for the cycle in the New York Mets' 6-5 loss to Cincinnati.

She says it isn't a problem, but I have to disagree. Every night she will drink between

six and eight drinks. It starts right after she g e t s home and continues until she goes to bed. S h e

will often **DEAR** go down-**ANNIE** stairs to be alone and drink while "working" on

her computer, or go "run an errand." I'll later find the cans in her car or the basement. This is all while I get the kids ready for bed and read to them, which I don't mind at all. But we have three small children, and sometimes it's not easy handling all of them on my own every night. But I love spending time with them. I've tried to talk to her and

see if there is anything personal going on, anything at work, that may make her feel stressed to feel the need to drink this much every day. But she insists she's fine. It's ended up in many fights. I've tried just not buying alcohol. I've tried limiting it. I've tried to not even care and just let her drink as much as she wants (as long as she isn't driving our kids anywhere). It has gotten to the point now where I've become numb to it and feel like it's a battle not worth my time.

I want to help her, but she thinks she doesn't need help. — Helpless Husband

Dear Helpless Husband: Get in touch with Al-Anon today. You sound like a wonderful husband and father. Your wife's alcoholism is a disease — not a lack of willpower or a moral failing on her part. But until she admits she has a problem, she will stay in denial and drunk.

If you have to hire babysitters so you can attend Al-Anon meetings, so be it. You will discover that you are not alone, and you will be given support and suggestions for coping.

Dear Annie: I'd like to share something with the high school senior struggling with financial aid for college. There are myriad resources available to help! Since she is planning to start at the community college, the college's financial aid office should have counselors available to help her complete the FAFSA (Federal Aid for Student Assistance), which is mostly online now. Yes, it can be very overwhelming when

one has not experienced it. They can also let her know about potential scholarships, if eligible for grants, and walk her through the student loan process. They also may have on-campus jobs available, usually called work study. These jobs were a vital part of my college education, and they were great because often I was able to study or do homework while on the job (working in the library and at the desk of the student center). And while student loans sound scary, repayments don't start until six months after you have completed school. Then the lender can work out a repayment option that may take longer but at an amount you can afford.

Education is a fabulous investment in one's self that no one can ever take away. If "E and O" is determined, then the financial concern should not be as huge a barrier as it seems right now. Good luck! — Been There

PHILADELPHIA — Trae Young and the Hawks are taking their stunning turnaround to the Eastern Conference finals.

Young made a late 3-pointer and scored 21 points to help Atlanta win for the third time in the series in Philadelphia, a 103-96 victory over the top-seeded 76ers on Sunday night in Game 7.

Under coach Nate McMillan, the Hawks turned into birds of prey and Young led a charge into the postseason for the first time since 2017 that kept rolling with a first-round win over New York.

Embiid, the NBA MVP runner-up, Simmons and a highpriced cast of stars were supposed to put the upstart Hawks in their place. It never happened.

Young shook off an otherwise off night from the floor — 5-for-23 and kept shooting until he hit that 3 for a 93-87 lead with 2:31 left in the game.

Huerter, who led the Hawks with 27 points, sealed the win with three free throws and the packed house of 18,624 fell as silent as it was when the season opened without any fans.

Suns 120, Clippers 114

PHOENIX — Devin Booker's first exposure to playoff basketball continues to be a revelation.

Not necessarily for him, but for the rest of the NBA.

Booker had 40 points, 13 rebounds and 11 assists for his first career triple-double and the Phoenix Suns overcame Chris Paul's absence to beat the Los Angeles Clippers 120-114 on Sunday in Game 1 of the Western Conference finals.

"I don't understand why everyone's acting surprised at this point," Suns forward Jae Crowder said about Booker's big day. "This is his first time on this stage but he's capable. He's more than capable. He're more than ready. He prepares like no other."

Paul sat out because of COVID-19 health and safety protocols. Clippers star Kawhi Leonard missed his third straight game because of a sprained right knee.

Tied at 93 to start the fourth, the Suns went on a 12-2 run and pulled ahead 105-95 on Cam Johnson's dunk with 8:08 remaining. The Clippers wouldn't go away, though, cutting a 10-point deficit in the final two minutes to 116-114 when Terance Mann

hit a 3-pointer with 22 seconds left. But that's where the rally stopped for Los Angeles.

"I have no excuse," Clippers coach Tyronn Lue said. "I thought we played hard and competed. A little credit they were making shots and we didn't. But I loved our fight. I loved what I saw."

Booker scored on a dunk on the next possession to seal Phoenix's eighth straight victory, getting a free lane to the basket on the blown defensive coverage. The sixth-year guard was a surprising omission from the All-NBA teams released a few days ago but he certainly looked the part on

"I'll let you guys do the rankings," Booker said. "I'm just going out there to win every game possible. I've been saying this since the start of the playoffs — every next game is the biggest game."

Game 2 is on Tuesday night in Phoenix.

Deandre Ayton had 20 points and nine rebounds for the Suns. Cameron Payne started for Paul and had 11 points and nine assists.

Reggie Jackson added 24 points for the Clippers.
