Citrus County COVID-19 cases

According to the Florida Department of Health, 20 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update.

One new death was reported, for a total of 421.

To date in the county, 10,190 people have tested positive (including 85 non-residents).

Three new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 665 hospitalized.

Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

DOH-Citrus' preregistration system to schedule COVID-19 vaccine appointments for individuals 50 and older and frontline health care workers is now available.

Individuals can now be added to a waiting list for vaccine appointments and be notified when appointments are available in Citrus County by visiting myvaccine.fl.gov or by calling 866-201-0442; TTY is 833-476-1036.

As part of the statewide preregistration system, each county has a designated number that individuals can call and preregister with if they do not have internet access. Citrus County's designated helpline number is 833-540-2058.

Family asks for cross back

Roadside memorial for 17-year-old who died in crash mysteriously removed

Michelle Anderson was getting ready to honk her horn as she was about to drive by the roadside cross engraved with her daughter's name, Leilani.

Anderson honked every time she passed the 17-year-old's memorial on the northern shoulder of West Stage Coach Trail, west of the roadway's intersection with South Brittle Road.

However, on the morning of Monday, March 22, Anderson didn't honk. She stepped on the brakes and pulled over.

"Because it was gone,"

she said about the custom-made wooden cross her Homosassa family planted a month after Leilani died from a vehicle crash the night of April 15. "I was hysterical."

Anderson searched the area, scouring beyond the wood line.

"To see if maybe someone took it out and threw it over there," she said. "It wasn't there, it was nowhere to be found."


Anderson said the cross was covered with rosaries, leis, decorative butterflies and weather-treated photograph of Leilani, an aspiring lawyer who was a student at Crystal River High School and the

Renaissance Center in Lecanto.

"Everyone who knows my daughter goes there,' Anderson said about the memorial. "She had a happy personality. ... extremely outgoing; her smile would light up a

County seeks clarity on roads

Officials, civic leaders quiz state secretary on local transportation plans

TALLAHASSEE Amid a pandemic, Citrus County's Legislative Days might not have had the numbers it had in the past, but the clout remains, as evidenced by an hour-long meeting with Kevin Thibault, secretary for the Florida Department of Transportation.

About a dozen county officials and civic

leaders sat with Thibault, seeking clarity on where the Suncoast Parkway will conclude, while reaching out about the reclassification of Turkey Oak Drive, widening U.S. 41 north from Inverness and the Fort Island Trail multi-use path.

As Thibault pointed out, there are currently provisions in Senate Bill 10 to design a route weaving the Suncoast Parkway north along U.S. 19 to connect with Interstate 10 in Madison County. Part of that plan includes making sure the parkway runs to U.S. 19 at Red Level.

"If the consensus is to go through Citrus County with the Parkway, does it make sense to to build it over (County Road) 486 or do a terminus/exit?" questioned Josh Wooten, executive director of the Citrus County Chamber of Commerce.

That's not for certain. Thibault said, but one such aspect he wants to be ready for is "what's the vision as you continue north." He pointed out the design flaw when the terminus ended at U.S. 98 but then years later, lawmakers opted to extend the parkway into Citrus County.

"They actually had to go back, what a waste," Thibault said. "Why didn't we plan for that in the first place? When we built the Veterans (Express), the flyover was there, but we had to take it out because it wasn't wide enough."

Kevin Cunningham queried Thibault about the potential for creating a bypass around Crystal River; using Turkey Oak Drive has been discussed in the past few months.

Sugarmill Woods seeks parkway trail access

Depending on where you live in Sugarmill Woods, you're not going to be far from the Suncoast Parkway Trail, now being built parallel to the toll

Some residents have asked county commissioners to make it easy to access that trail by building a multi-use path from Corkwood Boulevard to the parkway trail, a distance of almost a half-mile.

Commissioners said they like the idea and asked staff to explore costs and design.

The \$135 million Suncoast Parkway 2 Phase 1 project is already under construction, extending the road 12.7 miles from U.S. 98 at Sugarmill Woods to State Road 44 in Lecanto. It is scheduled to open in early

The Citrus County leg of the 42-mile Suncoast Trail will connect with the existing route in Hernando, Pasco and Hillsborough counties. A pedestrian

overpass is being built over U.S. 98.

Several Sugarmill residents could park at the community clubhouse and go bike riding right to the trail. Others, especially near the Oak Village section, could access it from their home.

The new bike/pedestrian path received unanimous support from residents who were asked their thoughts on an email blast from community.

House bill would set rules for next state health crisis

 ${\tt TALLAHASSEE-A}$ series of proposals from requiring the governor to justify closing schools and businesses to limiting the authority of local governments have been lumped into a House bill aimed at bracing Florida for the next health care crisis as it continues to grapple with the COVID-19 pandemic.

The House Pandemics & Public Emergencies Committee voted 14-4 on Wednesday to approve the measure, which also would require a stateowned stockpile of perprotective sonal equipment and direct the state surgeon general to develop a plan to "ensure the state is prepared for every foreseeable public health emergency."

What remained of Leilani's cross on Monday was a hole surrounded by a rainbow of flowers planted there before.

A pair of white crosses touched. Of those crosses, Anderson said, one is for Leilani and the other is for Inverness 18-year-old Franklin Delano Cooper, who also died in the single-vehicle crash involving Leilani.

Cooper was driving Leilani and two other teenagers in a 2016 Ford Focus, traveling west at around 11:34 p.m. on Stage Coach Trail, according to prior Chronicle reports.



Actor Segal dies at 87

LOS ANGELES — George Segal, the banjo player turned actor who was nominated for an Oscar for 1966's "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" and worked into his late 80s on the ABC sitcom "The Goldbergs," died Tuesday in Santa Rosa, California, his wife said.

"The family is devastated to announce that this morning George Segal passed away due to complications from bypass surgery," Sonia Segal said in a statement. He was 87.

George Segal was always best known as a comic actor, becoming one of the screen's biggest stars in the 1970s when lighthearted adult comedies thrived.

But his most famous role was in a harrowing drama, "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?", based on Edward Albee's acclaimed play.

He was the last surviving credited member of the tiny cast, all four of whom were nominated for Academy Awards: Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton for starring roles, Sandy Dennis and Segal for supporting performances. The women won Oscars, the men did not.

To younger audiences, he was better known for playing magazine publisher Jack Gallo on the long-running NBC series "Just Shoot Me" from 1997 to 2003, and as grandfather Albert "Pops" Solomon on the "The Goldbergs" since 2013.


Books win Lukas project awards

NEW YORK — Books about slavery, immigration and drug treatment are among this year's winners of awards presented by the J. Anthony Lukas Project.

Parks, for "Diary Of a Misfit."

The Lukas project, based at Columbia University, is named for the late investigative reporter and author. The awards were established in 1998 and have previously been given to Robert Caro, Isabel Wilkerson and Jill Lepore among others.





New study triples estimate of red snapper in Gulf

Associated Press

NEW ORLEANS There are about three times as many red snapper as previously estimated in the Gulf of Mexico, according to a study released Wednesday about the popular game and table fish over which recreational anglers and federal regulators have fought for years.

The \$12 million Great Red Snapper Count estimated that the Gulf holds about 110 million adult red snapper — those at least 2 years old. A 2018 National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration marine fisheries' estimate was about 36 million.

"This new information should translate into greater access and longer fishing seasons for families," Republican U.S. Sen. Bill Cassidy said in a news release Wednesday.

Clay Porch, director of NOAA's Southeast Fisheries Science Center Director in Miami, said peer reviewers will be going over the science for the Gulf of Mexico Fisheries Management Council, which is likely to consider revising quotas in April, Porch said Tuesday.

For various reasons, the quotas are unlikely to be tripled, he said.

The increased population estimate is almost entirely because federal scientists previously have relied on information from a fishery concentrated on natural and





Global access to vaccines necessary

Since COVID-19 began in the United States, there have been over a half-million deaths and untold economic damage.

And while every day brings greater access to vaccines locally, there is a huge global push for vaccine access in poor countries. Because of emerging variants and mutations, the vaccines we use today may not be effective in the near future if vaccines are not available to all the world's populations, because, as we have witnessed, viruses don't respect borders.

There are major roadblocks for developing country access to these vaccines and treatments that have been written into rules at the WTO (World Trade Organization). These rules are called the Trade Related Intellectual Property Rights, or TRIPS.

TRIPS rules, written by the pharmaceutical industry, require that drug monopolists maintain control of global production and distribution of these life-saving medicines and vaccines, even though they are desperately needed to crush COVID-19.

For these reasons, there is a huge effort underway to convince President Biden to support a temporary waiver of certain TRIPS rules so that these vaccines and other effective drugs and testing supplies may be produced and distributed in as many countries as possible, as quickly as possible.

Unfortunately, the United States and a few wealthy countries are blocking this action at the WTO. These misguided actions, if not cancelled could come back to haunt us all.

Big Pharma will say, in their own defense, they spend a lot of money on research and development, and therefore must hold these rights in order to protect their profits. The reality is that the people, through our tax dollars, have spent billions subsidizing

The few corporations holding these patents cannot possibly ramp up production to effectively cover the entire world in the short time necessary to stop the emerging variants and mutations of COVID-19.

No country is safe from a global pandemic unless everyone is safe. That is why 431 organizations, including Public Citizen, Citizens Trade Campaign, Alliance for Global Justice, Doctors Without Borders, Oxfam, Human Rights Watch and hundreds of others have petitioned President Biden to stop blocking the TRIPS waiver and support finally ending this pandemic.

Trump led opposition to the TRIPS waiver since South Africa and India first proposed it in October 2020. Let's hope that Biden overrules Trump's block. Morality and practicality demand COVID-19 vaccines and treatments be offered to all.

Biden taps VP Harris to respond to immigration crisis

WASHINGTON — President Joe Biden has tapped Vice President Kamala Harris to lead the White House effort to tackle the migration challenge at the U.S. southern border and work with Central American nations to address root causes of the problem.

Biden made the announcement as he and Harris met at the White House on Wednesday with Health and Human Services Secretary Xavier Becerra, Home-Security Secretary Alejandra Mayorkas and other immigration advisers to discuss the increase in migrants, including many unaccompanied minors, arriving at the border in recent weeks.

In delegating the matter to Harris, Biden is seeking to replicate a dynamic that played out when he served as President Barack Obama's vice president. Obama turned to Biden in his first term to lead the White House effort to draw down U.S. troops in Iraq and oversee implementation of stimulus in response to the Great Recession.

"When she speaks, she speaks for me," Biden said, noting her past work as California's attorney general makes her specially equipped to lead the administration's response.

Biden, who has faced stiff criticism from Republicans over the increased flow of migrants, is hoping to show Americans he's taking the situation at the border seriously. He also wants to prevent the growing humanitarian and political challenge from overshadowing his administration's ambitious legislative agenda.

But the high-profile assignment for Harris, who ran for the Democratic presidential nomination in 2020 and is expected to run for the White House again in the future, could be politically fraught.

"Needless to say, the work will not be easy," Harris said. "But it is important work.'

Harris is tasked with overseeing diplomatic efforts to deal with issues spurring migration in the Northern Triangle countries of El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras, as well as pressing them to strengthen enforcement on their own borders, administration officials said. She's also tasked with developing and implementing a long-term strategy that gets at the root causes of migration from those countries.

Biden suggested President Donald Trump's decision to cut \$450 million funding in 2019 to the region was partly to blame for the situation.

Tasters savor fine wine that orbited Earth

BORDEAUX, France — It tastes like rose petals. It smells like a campfire. It glistens with a burnt-orange hue. What is it? A 5,000-euro bottle of Petrus Pomerol wine that spent a year in space.

Researchers in Bordeaux are analyzing a dozen bottles of the precious liquid along with 320 snippets of Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon grapevines — that returned to Earth in January after a sojourn aboard the International Space Station.

They announced their preliminary impressions Wednesday — mainly, that weightlessness didn't ruin the wine and it seemed to energize the vines.

Organizers say it's part of a longer-term effort to make plants on Earth more resilient to climate change and disease by exposing them to new stresses, and to better understand the aging process, fermentation and bubbles in wine.

Boston has first Black, first female mayor

BOSTON — Kim Janey, who as a child had rocks hurled at her school bus during Boston's desegregation era, marked her historic elevation as the first woman and first Black person to serve as mayor of the city with a ceremonial swearingin event Wednesday.

Janey replaces fellow Democrat Marty Walsh, who resigned Monday to become President Joe Biden's labor secretary. She was the City Council president and will serve as acting mayor until a mayoral election in the fall.

Janey hasn't said whether she'll run. But she embraced the groundbreaking nature of Wednesday's transition.

"Today is a new day. I stand before you as the first woman and the first Black mayor of Boston, the city that I love," Janey said during the City Hall event. "I come to this day with life experience that is different from the men who came before

Senate OKs transgender doc for key post

Voting mostly along party lines, the U.S. Senate on Wednesday confirmed former Pennsylvania Health Secretary Rachel Levine to be the nation's assistant secretary of health. He is the first openly transgender federal official to win Senate confirmation.

The final vote was 52-48. Republican Sens. Lisa Murkowski of Alaska and Susan Collins of Maine joined all Democrats in supporting Levine.

Levine had been serving as Pennsylvania's top health official since 2017, and emerged as the public face of the state's response to the coronavirus pandemic. He is expected to oversee Health and Human Services offices and programs across the U.S.

Virginia officially outlaws death penalty

JARRATT, Va. - The governor signed legislation Wednesday making Virginia the 23rd state to abolish the death penalty, a dramatic shift for the commonwealth, which had the secondhighest number of executions in the U.S.

The bills were the culmination of a yearslong battle by Democrats who argued the death penalty has been applied disproportionately to people of color, the mentally ill and the poor. Republicans argued that the death penalty should remain a sentencing option for especially heinous crimes and to bring justice to victims and their families.

Virginia's new Democratic majority, in full control of the General Assembly for a second year, won the debate last month when both the Senate and House of Delegates passed the measures banning capital punishment.

Pope cuts pay for cardinals. other officials

VATICAN CITY — Trying to save jobs as the pandemic pummels Vatican revenues, Pope Francis has ordered pay cuts for cardinals and other clerics, as well as nuns, who work at the Holy See.

In a decree published online Wednesday by the Vatican's official newspaper L'Osservatore Romano, Francis said that starting in April cardinals' salaries will be reduced 10%. Superiors of the Holy See's various departments, who, with few exceptions, are clerics, will be hit by 8% cuts while lower-ranking priests and nuns will see 3% vanish from their paychecks.

In the decree he signed on Tuesday, the pope noted that the Holy See's finances have been marked by several years of deficit. Worsening those financial woes, the pope wrote, was the COVID-19 pandemic, "which has impacted negatively on all the sources of revenue of the Holy See and Vatican City State."

Massive cargo ship wedged in **Suez Canal**

ISMAILIA, Egypt — A skyscraper-sized container ship has become wedged across Egypt's Suez Canal and blocked all traffic in the vital waterway, officials said Wednesday, threatening to disrupt a global shipping system already strained by the coronavirus pandemic.

The Ever Given, a Panama-flagged ship that carries cargo between Asia and Europe, ran aground Tuesday in the narrow, manmade canal dividing continental Africa from the Sinai Peninsula. Images showed the ship's bow was touching the eastern wall, while its stern looked lodged against the western wall - an extraordinary event that experts said they had never heard of happening before in the canal's 150-year history.

Democrats vow action on new gun bills

WASHINGTON — Democrats said they are pushing toward a vote on expanded gun control measures as the nation reels from its second mass shooting in a week. President Joe Biden said "we have to act," but prospects for any major changes were dim, for now, in the closely divided Congress.

Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer vowed Tuesday morning to bring to the Senate floor legislation passed by the House that would require background checks for most gun sales and transfers. He said the Senate "must confront a devastating truth" after a lack of congressional action on the issue for almost three decades.

ferent," Schumer, D-N.Y., said a day after a shooting at a crowded Boulder, Colorado, supermarket, killed 10 people, including a police officer. "The Senate is going to debate and address the epidemic of gun violence in this country."

While a Senate vote on new gun control would be the first in several years, Democrats do not have the votes to pass any significant reform. They are not even united themselves, as Sen. Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., told reporters Tuesday legislation on background checks.

The Senate Judiciary Committee held a hearing Tuesday on proposals for gun control. It is unclear whether any of the bills up for consideration — most of them involving more

checks — would have made a difference in the Colorado case. A 21-yearold man charged with killing eight people in the Atlanta area last week had purchased a 9 mm handgun hours before the murders, prompting advocates to push for longer waiting periods for purchases.

In brief remarks responding to the shooting, Biden urged Congress to move quickly to close the loopholes in the background check system and to ban assault weapons that he opposes the House and high-capacity maga-– an effort that would be even more difficult to achieve politically. According to a police affidavit, the Colorado with Biden in the White shooter had purchased an House and Democrats assault rifle six days

Vice President Kamala Harris said Wednesday in an interview with CBS News that Biden would not exclude taking executive action on gun control measures, but "if we really want something that is going to be lasting, we need to pass legislation."

Sen. Richard Blumen-

thal, D-Conn., who has aggressively pushed for expanded gun control since the 2012 shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School that killed 20 children and six educators, expressed optimism about the chances for new laws controlling the House and the Senate. He called it "the dawn of a new era."

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


Once more when the final team score was tallied Lecanto sat atop the standings,

TAMPA — Defensive lineman Ndamukong Suh has agreed to a one-year contract worth \$9 million to remain with the Super Bowl champion Tampa

Bay Buccaneers, a person familiar with the deal told The Associated Press. The person

spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity Wednesday be-

cause the agreement, as well as a salary-cap friendly extension given to offensive lineman Donovan Smith, had not been announced by the Bucs.

Smith, who was to earn \$14.25 million in 2021, agreed to a two-year, \$31 million extension that frees space under the salary cap as general manager Jason Licht continues the team's effort to keep as much of a championship roster together as possible.

The left tackle, who including playoffs started 19 of 20 games last season, joins Tom Brady in negotiating extensions that improve the prospects of keeping several high-profile players from leaving the team via free agency.

It's the third straight winter Suh has agreed to a one-year deal with the Bucs, who've led the NFL in run defense each of the past two seasons. He earned \$10 million in 2019 and \$8.5 million in 2020.

The 34-year-old who was the No. 2 overall pick in the 2010 draft had six sacks last year, hiking his career total to 641/2 in 11 seasons with the Bucs, Detroit Lions, Miami Dolphins and Los Angeles Rams. He had 1 1/2 sacks in the Super Bowl, helping Tampa Bay slow down Patrick Mahomes during a 31-9 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs.

Suh's deal ensures all 11 starters on defense will be under contract for next season. Linebackers Shaquil Barrett and Lavonte David signed new contracts rather than test free agency, and reserves Rakeem Nunez-Roches and Kevin Minter are staying, too.

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


What do you think of the bidding, and how should South plan the play in five clubs after West leads the heart king? What should North do if West opens four hearts?

After North used the Unusual No-Trump and South expressed a preference for clubs but limited high cards, North should have continued with three hearts.

Then South, holding a heart stopper, would have bid three no-trump and had nine top tricks: one heart, three diamonds and five clubs. When North invited game by raising to four clubs, South moved on because he seemed to have two useful honor cards and a ruffing value in diamonds.

Since declarer's trumps are so low, South should assume diamonds are 4-3 and allow for a 4-1 trump break. Win with the heart ace. unblock the diamond queen, play a trump to the dummy, ruff a diamond in hand, draw the remaining trumps and run the diamonds. Declarer loses only two spade

Finally, if West opens four hearts, North overcalls four no-trump to show at least 5-5 in the minors.


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



- Toss offers that ask you to pay for a prize. If it's free, you shouldn't have to pay to get it.
