Citrus County COVID-19 cases

According to the Florida Department of Health, 20 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update.

One new death was reported, for a total of 421.

To date in the county, 10,190 people have tested positive (including 85 non-residents).

Three new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 665 hospitalized.

Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

Vaccine registration system open

DOH-Citrus' preregistration system to schedule COVID-19 vaccine appointments for individuals 50 and older and frontline health care workers is now available.

Individuals can now be added to a waiting list for vaccine appointments and be notified when appointments are available in Citrus County by visiting myvaccine.fl.gov or by calling 866-201-0442; TTY is 833-476-1036.

As part of the statewide preregistration system, each county has a designated number that individuals can call and preregister with if they do not have internet access. Citrus County's designated helpline number is 833-540-2058.

Vaccine supply remains limited and appointments may not be available for several weeks.

# Family asks for cross back

## Roadside memorial for 17-year-old who died in crash mysteriously removed

Michelle Anderson was getting ready to honk her horn as she was about to drive by the roadside cross engraved with her daughter's name, Leilani. Anderson honked every time she passed the

17-year-old's memorial on the northern shoulder of West Stage Coach Trail, west of the roadway's intersection with South Brittle Road.

However, on the morning of Monday, March 22, Anderson didn't honk. She stepped on the brakes and pulled over.

"Because it was gone,"

she said about the custom-made wooden cross her Homosassa family planted a month after Leilani died from a vehicle crash the night of April 15. "I was hysterical."

Anderson searched the area, scouring beyond the wood line.

"To see if maybe someone took it out and threw

it over there," she said. "It wasn't there, it was nowhere to be found."

Anderson said the cross was covered with rosaries, leis, decorative butterflies and a weather-treated photograph of Leilani, an aspiring lawyer who was a student at Crystal River High School and the

Renaissance Center in Lecanto.

"Everyone who knows my daughter goes there," Anderson said about the memorial. "She had a happy personality. ... extremely outgoing; her smile would light up a room."

## Officials, civic leaders quiz state secretary on local transportation plans

TALLAHASSEE — Amid a pandemic, Citrus County's Legislative Days might not have had the numbers it had in the past, but the clout remains, as evidenced by an hour-long meeting with Kevin Thibault, secretary for the Florida Department of Transportation.

About a dozen county officials and civic

leaders sat with Thibault, seeking clarity on where the Suncoast Parkway will conclude, while reaching out about the reclassification of Turkey Oak Drive, widening U.S. 41 north from Inverness and the Fort Island Trail multi-use path.

As Thibault pointed out, there are currently provisions in Senate Bill 10 to design a route weaving the Suncoast Parkway north along

U.S. 19 to connect with Interstate 10 in Madison County. Part of that plan includes making sure the parkway runs to U.S. 19 at Red Level.

"If the consensus is to go through Citrus County with the Parkway, does it make sense to build it over (County Road) 486 or do a terminus/exit?" questioned Josh Wooten, executive director of the Citrus County Chamber of Commerce.

That's not for certain, Thibault said, but one such aspect he wants to be ready for is "what's the vision as you continue north." He pointed out the design flaw when the terminus ended at U.S. 98 but then years later, lawmakers opted to extend the parkway into Citrus County.

"They actually had to go back, what a waste," Thibault said. "Why didn't we plan for that

in the first place? When we built the Veterans (Express), the fly-over was there, but we had to take it out because it wasn't wide enough."

Kevin Cunningham queried Thibault about the potential for creating a bypass around Crystal River; using Turkey Oak Drive has been discussed in the past few months.

# Sugarmill Woods seeks parkway trail access

Depending on where you live in Sugarmill Woods, you're not going to be far from the Suncoast Parkway Trail, now being built parallel to the toll road.

Some residents have asked county commissioners to make it easy to access that trail by building a multi-use path from Corkwood Boulevard to the parkway trail, a distance of almost a half-mile.

Commissioners said they like the idea and asked staff to explore costs and design.

The \$135 million Suncoast Parkway 2 Phase 1 project is already under construction, extending the road 12.7 miles from U.S. 98 at Sugarmill Woods to State Road 44 in Lecanto. It is scheduled to open in early 2022.

The Citrus County leg of the 42-mile Suncoast Trail will connect with the existing route in Hernando, Pasco and Hillsborough counties. A pedestrian

overpass is being built over U.S. 98.

Several Sugarmill residents could park at the community clubhouse and go bike riding right to the trail. Others, especially near the Oak Village section, could access it from their home.

The new bike/pedestrian path received unanimous support from residents who were asked their thoughts on an email blast from the community.

# House bill would set rules for next state health crisis

TALLAHASSEE — A series of proposals — from requiring the governor to justify closing schools and businesses to limiting the authority of local governments — have been lumped into a House bill aimed at bracing Florida for the next health care crisis as it continues to grapple with the COVID-19 pandemic.

The House Pandemics & Public Emergencies Committee voted 14-4 on Wednesday to approve the measure, which also would require a state-owned stockpile of personal protective equipment and direct the state surgeon general to develop a plan to "ensure the state is prepared for every foreseeable public health emergency."

What remained of Leilani's cross on Monday was a hole surrounded by a rainbow of flowers planted there before.

A pair of white crosses nearby was also left untouched. Of those crosses, Anderson said, one is for Leilani and the other is for Inverness 18-year-old Franklin Delano Cooper, who also died in the single-vehicle crash involving Leilani.

Cooper was driving Leilani and two other teenagers in a 2016 Ford Focus, traveling west at around 11:34 p.m. on Stage Coach Trail, according to prior Chronicle reports.

For unknown reasons, Cooper lost control of the car, which went off the road and struck a tree. Emergency responders pronounced Cooper dead at the crash scene. Leilani was transported to Ocala Regional Medical

Center, where she later died.

Uncle John's Woodshop, a local business, crafted and donated Leilani's cross to Anderson, who said she reported its disappearance to the Citrus County Sheriff's Office on Tuesday.

Sgt. Lee Carey, a sheriff's office spokesman, told the Chronicle Wednesday the agency is aware of the incident and is looking into it.

Deputies told Anderson, she said, construction crews in the area may have removed the cross in order to do some road work.

Anderson said her family knew the cross had to be planted far enough from the road. She noted road workers would have also taken the other two crosses, which were almost parallel to and within feet of Leilani's cross.

"If you're going to take mine," Anderson said, "you're going to take those too."

Citrus County

spokeswoman Veronica Kampschroer told the Chronicle Wednesday the county's road maintenance staff did not remove the cross.

In the end, Anderson just wants her daughter's cross to be returned so Leilani's 12-year-old sister, Avery Sanchez, and 7-year-old brother, Jacob Sanchez, can pay their respects.

"I would just like someone to put it back," she said, "that way, her siblings have something to visit."

"How can we make it happen, for safety and also for the traffic that will just get dumped out from the parkway and get jammed up at (State Road 44) and 19?" he asked the DOT secretary. "Has there been any further discussion about it?"

Thibault told officials and civic leaders funding might be available through the County Incentive Grant Programs, which would offset the impact or improve a state road, such

as State Road 44. In addition, SB 100, if passed, would allocate monies toward improving two-lane arterial roads, such as Turkey Oak.

"That's good, real good," said Ken Frink, Crystal River city manager.

Thibault told the Citrus County contingency that from S.R. 44 to the Withlacoochee Trail Bridge prior to Middle School Road is fully funded and construction will begin in 2023. From Middle School Road to Live Oak Lane will begin in 2025; the final segment — from Live Oak Lane to Arlington — has to yet to fully acquire all of

the necessary right of way to widen the thoroughfare, Thibault explained.

The biggest hurdle is the right of way acquisition, he said.

"Right of way is almost as much as construction," he said, noting the real estate market plays a role in it.

Jeff Kinnard brought his excitement and fervor about the 9-mile-long Fort Island Trail multipurpose trail straight to Thibault. But he also brought his understanding of the county doing it without state help.

"We cannot get there on our own," he said of the project that could cost

upward of \$19 million. The county commissioner told Thibault the county is putting skin in the game, setting aside money aside to begin the project at Fort Island Beach and work east toward U.S. 19.

"While it's certainly not the 9-mile trail we want to have there, we're getting those cyclists and runners off the road and improving safety," he said.

Thibault expressed shock at the cost estimates, which showed as high as \$60 million. Kinnard said that figure is bothersome to him as well, because it was for an elevated boardwalk for the entire stretch

of the roadway.

"No cyclist will ever ride that," said Kinnard, who stressed the need to the project on the priorities list.

Thibault said key is getting it on the Suntrail Network, which could open it to funding as officials seek to connect trails statewide. When completed, the Fort Island Trail multipurpose path would link up with the Crosstown Trail in Crystal River.

"It's a good project," Kinnard said.

Committee Chairman Tom Leek, R-Ormond Beach, said the effort seeks "to improve state preparation for a pandemic or public health emergency" and "ensure that our emergency management system and response efforts are as transparent and as accountable as possible."

While the proposal is expected to move rapidly through the House, Sen. Danny Burgess, R-Zephyrhills, said this week the Senate Select Committee on Pandemic Preparedness and Response, which he chairs, has met for the last time.

Before advancing the bill, the House committee rejected several Democratic amendments, including proposals to limit pre-emption of local government authority and require the state to compensate owners and employees of any businesses closed by executive orders.

Rep. Carlos Guillermo Smith, an Orlando Democrat who described business closures last year early in the pandemic as "knee jerk," said adding the monetary requirement to executive orders would bolster part of the bill that would require the governor to justify business or school closures.

"If they're going to

mandate a closure of an entire industry for a protracted period of time, reasonable compensation would be expensive," said Smith, one of four Democrats who voted against the bill (PCB PPE 21-01). "So, it would certainly serve as the motivation to be very strategic with that closure and also be very intentional about the who and why we would be doing that, which is not what we've seen in the past."

A House staff analysis of the bill said its fiscal impact would be "indeterminate," noting the most significant requirement could be the requirement for the Division of Emergency Management to acquire and maintain an inventory of personal protective equipment. The agency also would have to replace the inventory as necessary to ensure supplies have not expired.

Other potential fiscal impacts could come from

the Department of Health having to create a comprehensive public response guide for future crises and a requirement that the auditor general conduct reviews related to emergencies.

The committee also rejected an amendment that would have required the governor to use money in a proposed Emergency

Preparedness and Response Fund before seeking to use money budgeted for other purposes.

Leek said if the amendment was in law last year, Gov. Ron DeSantis could have been blocked from shifting resources between state agencies to address the online unemployment system when it was overwhelmed

by jobless claims.

The House measure, however, would require the governor to submit a budget amendment when redirecting money from general revenue or the Budget Stabilization Fund, which is a state reserve. It also would provide the Legislature with the ability to line-item veto parts of emergency orders.

# Scout troops honored

## Withlacoochee district scouts named ‘District of the Year’

Recently, scouting’s local Withlacoochee District was named the 2020 District of the Year.

The district was “commended for the speed and efficiency with which we responded to unprecedented circumstances,” Brandon Kathman of the Greater Tampa Bay Area Council stated in a letter to the district families.

The award recognizes all counties in the district for their success in areas such as membership increase, fundraising and this year, pandemic response.

The Withlacoochee district includes Citrus, Hernando and Sumter counties. As of December 2020, the district has a total of 44 active units.

Most notably, the district has worked harder on food drives than ever, “with over 6 tons raised for local pantries this February,” Kathman said. This made it a record breaking year for the district, despite the difficult circumstances.

During food drives, each unit picks an area to collect food donations. These efforts have been made

possible by hard-working scouts and “professional leadership and volunteer leadership,” Kathman said.

With the persistence of the pandemic, units began looking for COVID-19 friendly activities and were forced to get creative.

As a result, the district implemented a new outdoor program called “Kayak Cleanup.” The scouts began this new initiative to help clean local waterways. Hernando and Citrus units were involved in a trash cleanup via kayak.

Additionally, in 2020, a total of 28 district members completed their Eagle Scouts project, the program’s highest honor. Along the way, they organized several new troops and units.

“The pandemic has forced us to adapt,” Kathman said. Despite the difficulties of the past year, “we never allowed those challenges to become obstacles,” he added.

“Leaders of our districts worked really, really hard,” said John Cople, volunteer district commissioner and Crystal River High School teacher.

Cople said the troops

“did a lot of Zoom meetings,” while working on whatever badges they could from home.

Cople explained he was a scout himself and in 1989, he was asked to join the cub scouts along with his son as a volunteer. Today, Cople’s grandkids are scouts.

The Withlacoochee District’s ability to keep their

units afloat is not only important to the community, it’s important to the continuation of generational traditions for families like Cople’s.

This was achieved by leadership from people like Kathman, who was presented with an “Executive of the Year” award. “I was humbled and honored,” stated Kathman.

Although some troops are meeting in person again, all are still carefully following COVID-19 protocols.

Kathman said, “In-person meetings vary unit to unit.” He added, “Every unit’s going to face different circumstances” and each “has its own role in determining their response to the pandemic.”

## Inverness women arrested during separate drug raids

Two women face separate drug-dealing charges after authorities raided their respective Inverness homes.

Citrus County Sheriff’s Office deputies took 42-year-old Vanessa Lee Wall and 53-year-old Nicole Celeste Andre into custody within the 11 a.m. hour on Friday, March 19, according to arrest reports obtained Wednesday.

Wall faces charges of possessing fentanyl with intent to sell, owning or leasing a drug dwelling, possessing ammunition as a convicted felon, possessing a controlled substance and possessing drug paraphernalia.

According to Wall’s arrest report, members of the sheriff’s office’s Tactical Impact Unit executed a warrant to search a residence on the 1200 block of Lonely Oaks Drive.

Narcotics detectives escorted Wall and two others outside the house before they searched it.

In Wall’s bedroom, deputies found a syringe filled with 50 ccs of fentanyl along with four buprenorphine strips inside a teddy bear hanging on a wall. Deputies also found three boxes of .22-caliber ammunition near a BB gun in the garage.

Authorities researched Wall’s criminal history,

which showed she had three felony convictions from 2007 and 2016 for selling cocaine, possessing cocaine and providing false information to a pawn broker, according to the arrest report.

Wall was jailed under a \$23,000 bond, and is scheduled to be arraigned April 5.

Andre faces charges of possessing drug paraphernalia and two counts of possessing a controlled substance with intent to sell.

According to Andre’s arrest report, Tactical Impact Unit authorities served a warrant to search a house on the 900 block of Hawk Crest Lane, where they detained Andre and four others.

Deputies found 13 grams of mixed methamphetamine and fentanyl in the garage alongside a scale and glass dish covered with drug residue. There were also 10 grams of meth and fentanyl inside a folded dollar bill found within a pouch.

A couple of other baggies laced with meth and fentanyl were also discovered.

According to her court-filed arrest report, Andre told deputies she used to sell drugs to make ends meet but had stopped, adding the mixture of meth and fentanyl was for her personal use.

Andre was jailed under a \$11,000 bond, and her arraignment was scheduled for April 5.

## Beverly Hills man faces third DUI charge

A Beverly Hills man was arrested for his third DUI offense after blocking traffic on County Road 491 when he abandoned his car to strike another car on the road.

The arrest of Matthew Peter Hreschak, 41, began when a Citrus County Sheriff’s deputy was sent to the intersection of North County Road 491 and West Mustang Boulevard to help another deputy over a possible DUI, according to the arrest report.

The deputy on scene told the arresting deputy he saw Hreschak at the intersection, and watched Hreschak get out of his 2014 Honda and begin hitting another driver’s vehicle.

The first deputy reported that when he stopped his cruiser, Hreschak tried to stagger off but fell against another vehicle in the roadway, according to the report.

The first deputy on the scene also reported that Hreschak had an interlock device on his car, which kept the deputy from pushing it out of the roadway. The deputy called Hreschak’s mother to deactivate the device so the car could be moved away from traffic and onto a Regions Bank parking lot.

The arresting deputy reported that when he tried to talk with Hreschak, his pupils were pinpointed and not reactive to light and his eyes were blood-shot, according to the arrest report.

The arresting deputy also reported that Hreschak slurred his words.

The deputy reported that he told Hreschak that he was investigating the incident as a DUI, and Hreschak replied that he was not drunk and did not drink alcohol.

The arresting deputy asked if Hreschak was willing to perform some field sobriety tests and at first said no because on a previous occasion he performed them for a deputy, thought he did well, and the deputy arrested him anyway.

The arresting deputy reported that Hreschak finally relented and agreed to do the tests.

The arresting deputy reported that Hreschak failed badly and could not perform multiple tests without swaying and falling.

The deputy arrested Hreschak and took him to the county jail. There Hreschak agreed to a Breathalyzer test and the device showed he was 0.16, twice the legal limit, the report stated.

He was charged with DUI with two prior convictions, with the first being more than 10 years older than his latest charge. His bond was \$5,000.

Actor Segal dies at 87

LOS ANGELES — **George Segal**, the banjo player turned actor who was nominated for an Oscar for 1966's "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" and worked into his late 80s on the ABC sitcom "The Goldbergs," died Tuesday in Santa Rosa, California, his wife said.

"The family is devastated to announce that this morning George Segal passed away due to complications from bypass surgery," **Sonia Segal** said in a statement. He was 87.

George Segal was always best known as a comic actor, becoming one of the screen's biggest stars in the 1970s when lighthearted adult comedies thrived.

But his most famous role was in a harrowing drama, "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?," based on **Edward Albee**'s acclaimed play.

He was the last surviving credited member of the tiny cast, all four of whom were nominated for Academy Awards: **Elizabeth Taylor** and **Richard Burton** for starring roles, **Sandy Dennis** and Segal for supporting performances. The women won Oscars, the men did not.

To younger audiences, he was better known for playing magazine publisher Jack Gallo on the long-running NBC series "Just Shoot Me" from 1997 to 2003, and as grandfather Albert "Pops" Solomon on the "The Goldbergs" since 2013.

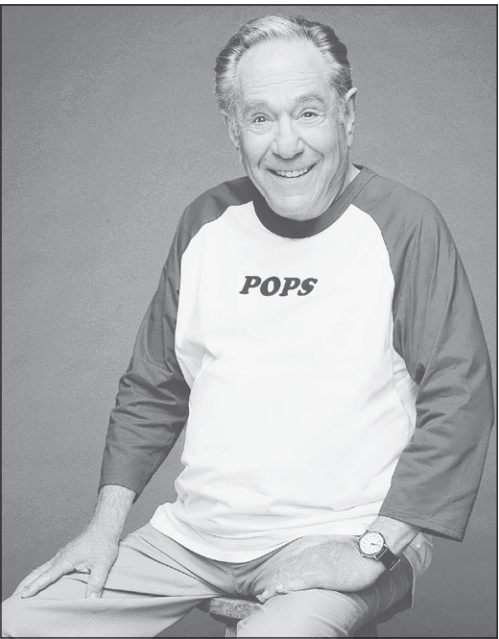
Books win Lukas project awards

NEW YORK — Books about slavery, immigration and drug treatment are among this year's winners of awards presented by the J. Anthony Lukas Project.

**Jessica Goudeau**'s "After the Last Border: Two Families and the Story of Refuge in America" won the Lukas Book Prize, a \$10,000 honor for a socially or politically themed work which demonstrates "literary grace, commitment to serious research, and original reporting."

The Lukas project, based at Columbia University, is named for the late investigative reporter and author. The awards were established in 1998 and have previously been given to **Robert Caro**, **Isabel Wilkerson** and **Jill Lepore** among others.

Bono, Cruz to star in animated series on vaccine importance

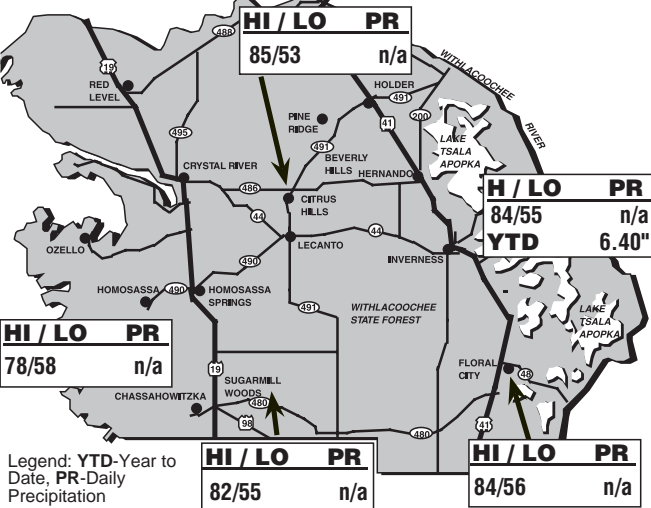

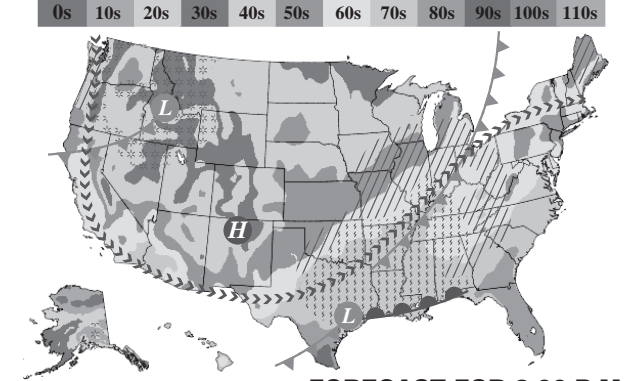

# New study triples estimate of red snapper in Gulf

NEW ORLEANS — There are about three times as many red snapper as previously estimated in the Gulf of Mexico, according to a study released Wednesday about the popular game and table fish over which recreational anglers and federal regulators have fought for years.

The \$12 million Great Red Snapper Count estimated that the Gulf holds about 110 million adult red snapper — those at least 2 years old. A 2018 National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration marine fisheries' estimate was about 36 million.

"This new information should translate into greater access and longer fishing seasons for families," Republican U.S. Sen. Bill Cassidy said in a news release Wednesday.

Clay Porch, director of NOAA's Southeast Fisheries Science Center Director in Miami, said peer reviewers will be going over the science for the Gulf of Mexico Fisheries Management Council, which is likely to consider revising quotas in April, Porch said Tuesday.

For various reasons, the quotas are unlikely to be tripled, he said.

The increased population estimate is almost entirely because federal scientists previously have relied on information from a fishery concentrated on natural and

artificial reefs, while the new study also looks at the immense spaces in between, Porch said.

More than 60% of the red snapper were in areas

that previously had not been checked, according to the study by 20 scientists from 14 universities and NOAA.

"Sand and mud makes

up the vastness of the Gulf of Mexico," but it is dotted with remnant oyster reefs, salt domes, holes scoured out by currents, shipwrecks, fallen shipping

containers and other bottom features that would attract red snapper, lead researcher Greg Stunz of Texas A&M-Corpus Christi said Monday.

Suspended sediment makes the area west of the Mississippi River so murky that researchers designed new acoustic equipment for the project, Stunz said.

The report estimated that about 48 million adult red snapper swim off Florida, 29 million off Louisiana, 23 million off Texas and 10 million off Mississippi and Alabama.

That included about 31 million in previously unchecked areas off Florida. An estimated 17 million live in such areas off Louisiana, 16 million off Texas and 4 million off Mississippi and Alabama.

That means "we have a reserve that is not directly targeted" for fishing, Stunz said.

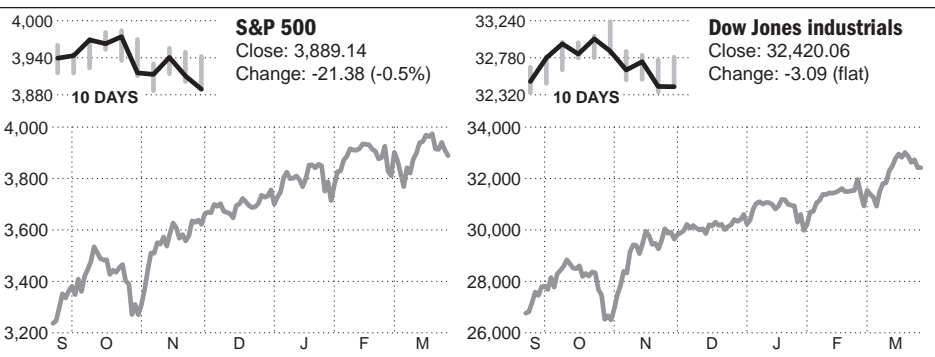

Tech slide leads stocks lower

A late-afternoon burst of selling on Wall Street erased an early gain for stocks Wednesday, pulling the market further below the all-time high it reached just a week ago. The S&P 500 dropped 0.5% after having been up 0.8% in the early going. Technology and communication services companies accounted for the heaviest selling, outweighing gains in financial, energy and industrial stocks. Bond yields mostly fell after rising earlier this week. The S&P 500 fell 21.38 points to 3,889.14. The benchmark index is on

track for its second straight weekly decline. The Dow Jones Industrial Average slipped 3.09 points, or less than 0.1%, to 32,420.06, after a 364-point gain vanished by late afternoon. The Nasdaq slid 265.81 points, or 2%, to 12,961.89. Smaller company stocks fared worse than the broader market. The Russell 2000 index lost 51.42 points, or 2.4%, to 2,134.27. Investors had their eye on Washington, where Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell and Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen spoke before the Senate about the government's efforts to combat the economic impact of the coronavirus

pandemic. The Biden administration is considering up to \$3 trillion in additional spending on infrastructure, green energy, and education. Yellen believes the U.S. government has more room to borrow, but said higher taxes would likely be required in the long run to finance future spending increases. Meanwhile, Powell reiterated that the recent jump in the yield on the 10-year Treasury, which soared from less than 1% at the beginning of the year to 1.62% Wednesday, was mostly a sign of confidence among investors that the economy is improving.

### SEEKING SOLUTIONS

## Schlabach hears resident concerns for roads and pool

When District 3 commissioner Ruthie Schlabach met with constituents earlier this month, she heard some familiar concerns in her district: the terrible condition of county roads and the need for resolution on the Beverly Hills pool issue.

With some roads in the district not having been paved in more than 30 years, they are in widespread disrepair; some reaching the point of deterioration where repaving may not be possible and the roads will have to be rebuilt to properly resurface them.

During the meeting, she acknowledged the problem, but also pointed out the limits on what funds can be allocated for road resurfacing and what cannot. For example, a half-cent sales tax could be used for resurfacing, but when her fellow commissioner Jeff Kinnard conducted town halls on the issue, there did not seem to be support for the sales tax.

What this essentially means is that there is agreement on the problem, but not on the right solution and how to fund it.

The issue is similar for the now-defunct Beverly Hills swimming pool. Some residents want it repaired, some want to build another one and some want the pool

converted into pickleball courts, but there doesn't appear to be agreement on either the solution or how to fund it.

As a commission candidate, Schlabach committed to working with residents on these long-standing issues, and we commend her for living up to that promise. The question now is how she can transfer listening to concerns into coming up with workable solutions.

This is her challenge, but also her opportunity. If she can work with fellow commissioners to come up with a plan to fund an increase in road surfacing, and if

she can work with the community to come up with a satisfactory plan for dealing with the pool issue, and get commissioners to agree on funding for the project, she has the real opportunity to make a difference by helping negotiate solutions to long-standing problems.

We are under no illusion that this will be easy, or that the county will be able to come up with solutions that will please everyone, but we are encouraged that Schlabach has committed to addressing these issues and we are hopeful that, with her creative leadership and work with fellow commissioners, the county can resolve them.

#### THE ISSUE:

District 3 commissioner Schlabach meets with residents to hear concerns.

## Sales tax bill gives local businesses parity

Imagine walking into your local furniture store, sitting on a bunch of couches to find the one you love. Then you walk out of the store only to visit an online out-of-state retailer and purchase the couch because you know you might save the 6% sales tax. This happens all the time across Citrus County and our state.

Currently, retailers that have a physical presence in Florida must collect and remit sales taxes for items sold in the state. Unfortunately, there is no requirement for out-of-state retailers to collect sales taxes on purchases made by Floridians. The inequity places the local job-creating, tax-paying local business at a disadvantage to the out-of-state business that does nothing to

support Florida and our economy.

The Florida Legislature is looking to correct this wrong and the Citrus County Chamber of Commerce supports this action. The Legislature is not asking for a new tax, but demanding out-of-state sellers remit the sales tax due to our state. In Florida, this is a tax that has always been due. The responsibility has simply been on the taxpayer to submit the tax to the Florida Department of Revenue for online purchases.

The proposed legislation also requires marketplace providers, such as eBay or Amazon, to collect and remit sales tax on behalf of their sellers. Since the pandemic, even more retail sales have occurred online and

this legislation levels the playing field for local businesses and their internet counterparts.

This bill is important to Florida's business community because it places Citrus County main-street businesses on equal footing with out-of-state businesses and remote sellers. Tax collection is streamlined for consumers by requiring remote businesses and marketplace providers to collect and remit the tax.

The Citrus County Chamber would like to thank Rep. Chuck Clemons and Sen. Joe Gruters for moving forward with this important tax reform for Florida businesses and I encourage you to contact your lawmakers and ask for their support.

#### Global access to vaccines necessary

Since COVID-19 began in the United States, there have been over a half-million deaths and untold economic damage.

And while every day brings greater access to vaccines locally, there is a huge global push for vaccine access in poor countries. Because of emerging variants and mutations, the vaccines we use today may not be effective in the near future if vaccines are not available to all the world's populations, because, as we have witnessed, viruses don't respect borders.

There are major roadblocks for developing country access to these vaccines and treatments that have been written into rules at the WTO (World Trade Organization). These rules are called the Trade-Related Intellectual Property Rights, or TRIPS.

TRIPS rules, written by the pharmaceutical industry, require that drug monopolists maintain control of global production and distribution of these life-saving medicines and vaccines, even though they are desperately needed to crush COVID-19.

For these reasons, there is a huge effort underway to convince President Biden to support a temporary waiver of certain TRIPS rules so that these vaccines and other effective drugs and testing supplies may be produced and distributed in as many countries as possible, as quickly as possible.

Unfortunately, the United States and a few wealthy countries are blocking this action at the WTO. These misguided actions, if not cancelled could come back to haunt us all.

Big Pharma will say, in their own defense, they spend a lot of money on research and development, and therefore must hold these rights in order to protect their profits. The reality is that the people, through our tax dollars, have spent billions subsidizing R&D.

The few corporations holding these patents cannot possibly ramp up production to effectively cover the entire world in the short time necessary to stop the emerging variants and mutations of COVID-19.

No country is safe from a global pandemic unless everyone is safe. That is why 431 organizations, including Public Citizen, Citizens Trade Campaign, Alliance for Global Justice, Doctors Without Borders, Oxfam, Human Rights Watch and hundreds of others have petitioned President Biden to stop blocking the TRIPS waiver and support finally ending this pandemic.

Trump led opposition to the TRIPS waiver since South Africa and India first proposed it in October 2020. Let's hope that Biden overrules Trump's block. Morality and practicality demand COVID-19 vaccines and treatments be offered to all.

## Biden taps VP Harris to respond to immigration crisis

WASHINGTON — President Joe Biden has tapped Vice President Kamala Harris to lead the White House effort to tackle the migration challenge at the U.S. southern border and work with Central American nations to address root causes of the problem.

Biden made the announcement as he and Harris met at the White House on Wednesday with Health and Human Services Secretary Xavier Becerra, Homeland Security Secretary Alejandra Mayorkas and other immigration advisers to discuss the increase in migrants, including many unaccompanied minors, arriving at the border in recent weeks.

In delegating the matter to Harris, Biden is seeking to replicate a dynamic that played out when he served as President Barack Obama’s vice president. Obama turned to Biden in his first term to lead the White House effort to draw down U.S. troops in Iraq and oversee implementation of stimulus in response to the Great Recession.

“When she speaks, she speaks for me,” Biden said, noting her past work as California’s attorney general makes her specially equipped to lead the administration’s response.

Biden, who has faced stiff criticism from Republicans over the increased flow of migrants, is hoping to show Americans he’s taking the situation at the border seriously. He also wants to prevent the growing humanitarian and political challenge from overshadowing his administration’s ambitious legislative agenda.

But the high-profile assignment for Harris, who ran for the Democratic presidential nomination in 2020 and is expected to run for the White House again in the future, could be politically fraught.

“Needless to say, the work will not be easy,” Harris said. “But it is important work.”

Harris is tasked with overseeing diplomatic efforts to deal with issues spurring migration in the Northern Triangle countries of El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras, as well as pressing them to strengthen enforcement on their own borders, administration officials said. She’s also tasked with developing and implementing a long-term strategy that gets at the root causes of migration from those countries.

Biden suggested President Donald Trump’s decision to cut \$450 million funding in 2019 to the region was partly to blame for the situation.

# US vaccinations up, deaths fall

## Reports show brightening picture for coronavirus pandemic

More than three months into the U.S. vaccination drive, many of the numbers paint an increasingly encouraging picture, with 70% of Americans 65 and older receiving at least one dose of the vaccine and COVID-19 deaths dipping below 1,000 a day on average for the first time since November.

Also, dozens of states have thrown open vaccinations to all adults or are planning to do so in a matter of weeks. And the White House said 27 million doses

of both the one-shot and two-shot vaccines will be distributed next week, more than three times the number when President Joe Biden took office two months ago.

Still, Dr. Anthony Fauci, the government’s top infectious disease expert, said Wednesday he isn’t ready to declare victory.

“I’m often asked, are we turning the corner?” Fauci said at a White House briefing. “My response is really more like we are at the corner. Whether or not we’re going to be turning that corner still remains to be seen.”

What’s giving Fauci pause, he said, is that new

cases remain at a stubbornly high level, at more than 50,000 per day.

Nonetheless, the outlook in the U.S. stands in stark contrast to the deteriorating situation in places like Brazil, which reported more than 3,000 COVID-19 deaths in a single day for the first time Tuesday, and across Europe, where another wave of infections is leading to new lockdowns.

The gloom in Europe is compounded because the vaccine rollout on the continent has been slowed by production delays and questions about the safety and effectiveness of AstraZeneca’s shot.

Public health experts in

the U.S. are taking every opportunity to warn that relaxing social distancing and other preventive measures could easily lead to another surge.

Dr. Eric Topol, head of the Scripps Research Translational Institute, sees red flags in states lifting mask mandates, air travel roaring back and spring break crowds partying out of control in Florida.

“We’re getting closer to the exit ramp,” Topol said. “All we’re doing by having reopenings is jeopardizing our shot to get, finally, for the first time in the American pandemic, containment of the virus.”

# Democrats vow action on new gun bills

WASHINGTON — Democrats said they are pushing toward a vote on expanded gun control measures as the nation reels from its second mass shooting in a week. President Joe Biden said “we have to act,” but prospects for any major changes were dim, for now, in the closely divided Congress.

Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer vowed Tuesday morning to bring to the Senate floor legislation passed by the House that would require background checks for most gun sales and transfers. He said the Senate “must confront a devastating truth” after a lack of congressional action on the issue for almost three decades.

“This Senate will be different,” Schumer, D-N.Y., said a day after a shooting at a crowded Boulder, Colorado, supermarket, killed 10 people, including a police officer. “The Senate is going to debate and address the epidemic of gun violence in this country.”

While a Senate vote on new gun control would be the first in several years, Democrats do not have the votes to pass any significant reform. They are not even united themselves, as Sen. Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., told reporters Tuesday that he opposes the House legislation on background checks.

The Senate Judiciary Committee held a hearing Tuesday on proposals for gun control. It is unclear whether any of the bills up for consideration — most of them involving more

restrictive background checks — would have made a difference in the Colorado case. A 21-year-old man charged with killing eight people in the Atlanta area last week had purchased a 9 mm handgun hours before the murders, prompting advocates to push for longer waiting periods for purchases.

In brief remarks responding to the shooting, Biden urged Congress to move quickly to close the loopholes in the background check system and to ban assault weapons and high-capacity magazines — an effort that would be even more difficult to achieve politically. According to a police affidavit, the Colorado shooter had purchased an assault rifle six days earlier.

“It should not be a

partisan issue,” Biden said. “This is an American issue. It will save lives, American lives.”

Vice President Kamala Harris said Wednesday in an interview with CBS News that Biden would not exclude taking executive action on gun control measures, but “if we really want something that is going to be lasting, we need to pass legislation.”

Sen. Richard Blumenthal, D-Conn., who has aggressively pushed for expanded gun control since the 2012 shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School that killed 20 children and six educators, expressed optimism about the chances for new laws with Biden in the White House and Democrats controlling the House and the Senate. He called it “the dawn of a new era.”

### Tasters savor fine wine that orbited Earth

BORDEAUX, France — It tastes like rose petals. It smells like a campfire. It glitters with a burnt-orange hue. What is it? A 5,000-euro bottle of Petrus Pomerol wine that spent a year in space.

Researchers in Bordeaux are analyzing a dozen bottles of the precious liquid — along with 320 snippets of Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon grapevines — that returned to Earth in January after a sojourn aboard the International Space Station.

They announced their preliminary impressions Wednesday — mainly, that weightlessness didn’t ruin the wine and it seemed to energize the vines.

Organizers say it’s part of a longer-term effort to make plants on Earth more resilient to climate change and disease by exposing them to new stresses, and to better understand the aging process, fermentation and bubbles in wine.

### Boston has first Black, first female mayor

BOSTON — Kim Janey, who as a child had rocks hurled at her school bus during Boston’s desegregation era, marked her historic elevation as the first woman and first Black person to serve as mayor of the city with a ceremonial swearing-in event Wednesday.

Janey replaces fellow Democrat Marty Walsh, who resigned Monday to become President Joe Biden’s labor secretary. She was the City Council president and will serve as acting mayor until a mayoral election in the fall.

Janey hasn’t said whether she’ll run. But she embraced the groundbreaking nature of Wednesday’s transition.

“Today is a new day. I stand before you as the first woman and the first Black mayor of Boston, the city that I love,” Janey said during the City Hall event. “I come to this day with life experience that is different from the men who came before me.”

### Senate OKs transgender doc for key post

Voting mostly along party lines, the U.S. Senate on Wednesday confirmed former Pennsylvania Health Secretary Rachel Levine to be the nation’s assistant secretary of health. He is the first openly transgender federal official to win Senate confirmation.

The final vote was 52-48. Republican Sens. Lisa Murkowski of Alaska and Susan Collins of Maine joined all Democrats in supporting Levine.

Levine had been serving as Pennsylvania’s top health official since 2017, and emerged as the public face of the state’s response to the coronavirus pandemic. He is expected to oversee Health and Human Services offices and programs across the U.S.

### Virginia officially outlaws death penalty

JARRATT, Va. — The governor signed legislation Wednesday making Virginia the 23rd state to abolish the death penalty, a dramatic shift for the commonwealth, which had the second-highest number of executions in the U.S.

The bills were the culmination of a yearslong battle by Democrats who argued the death penalty has been applied disproportionately to people of color, the mentally ill and the poor. Republicans argued that the death penalty should remain a sentencing option for especially heinous crimes and to bring justice to victims and their families.

Virginia’s new Democratic majority, in full control of the General Assembly for a second year, won the debate last month when both the Senate and House of Delegates passed the measures banning capital punishment.

### Pope cuts pay for cardinals, other officials

VATICAN CITY — Trying to save jobs as the pandemic pummels Vatican revenues, Pope Francis has ordered pay cuts for cardinals and other clerics, as well as nuns, who work at the Holy See.

In a decree published online Wednesday by the Vatican’s official newspaper L’Osservatore Romano, Francis said that starting in April cardinals’ salaries will be reduced 10%. Superiors of the Holy See’s various departments, who, with few exceptions, are clerics, will be hit by 8% cuts while lower-ranking priests and nuns will see 3% vanish from their paychecks.

In the decree he signed on Tuesday, the pope noted that the Holy See’s finances have been marked by several years of deficit. Worsening those financial woes, the pope wrote, was the COVID-19 pandemic, “which has impacted negatively on all the sources of revenue of the Holy See and Vatican City State.”

### Massive cargo ship wedged in Suez Canal

ISMAILIA, Egypt — A skyscraper-sized container ship has become wedged across Egypt’s Suez Canal and blocked all traffic in the vital waterway, officials said Wednesday, threatening to disrupt a global shipping system already strained by the coronavirus pandemic.

The Ever Given, a Panama-flagged ship that carries cargo between Asia and Europe, ran aground Tuesday in the narrow, man-made canal dividing continental Africa from the Sinai Peninsula. Images showed the ship’s bow was touching the eastern wall, while its stern looked lodged against the western wall — an extraordinary event that experts said they had never heard of happening before in the canal’s 150-year history.

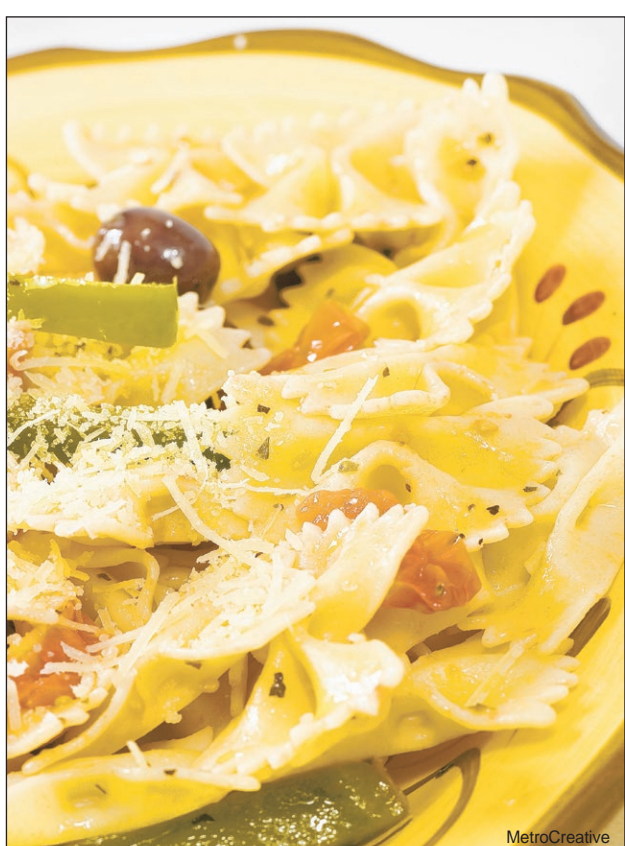

# Fresh flavor of springtime

Warm weather, blue skies and time spent outdoors are hallmarks of spring. Springtime is a season of rebirth and renewal. That's evidenced by budding trees and the return of frolicking animals. Spring also can be a time to refresh meal-making.

Now is the time to trade in those hearty, filling dishes that are perfect for cold winter nights for lighter fare. - 2 cups cauliflower florets
- 2 cups sliced fresh mushrooms
- 1/2 cup sliced carrots (cut on the diagonal)
- 2 cups sliced zucchini
- 6 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 teaspoon minced fresh garlic
- 1 cup asparagus tips or 3/4 cups snow peas
- 1 cup chopped green onions
- 2 cups heavy cream
- 9 ounces of your favorite pasta

**Seasoning mix**

- 2 1/2 teaspoon dried sweet basil leaves
- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme leaves
- 3/4 teaspoon white pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder

Combine the seasoning mix ingredients thoroughly in a small bowl.

Heat olive oil in a 12-inch skillet over high heat. When oil is very hot, add the prosciutto, cauliflower, mushrooms, carrots, and zucchini.

Add the butter and, as it melts, stir in the garlic and the seasoning mix. Stir in asparagus tips or snow peas and green onions. Stir well and cook just until the vegetables are crisp-tender, about 4 to 5 minutes. Stir in the cream and bring to a boil. Lower the heat to medium and cook until the sauce has thickened a bit, about 3 minutes.

Cook the pasta according to package directions; drain. Add the cooked pasta to the skillet, toss well and remove from the heat. Serve immediately.

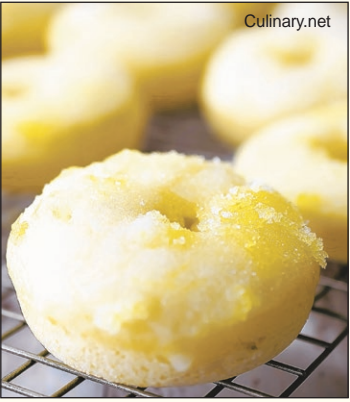
## Baked Lemon Donuts

*Serves: 12*

- 2 cups flour
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup buttermilk
- 2 eggs
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice

In large bowl, combine 1 cup flour, baking soda, baking powder and sugar. In separate bowl, combine mashed bananas, canola oil, eggs and vanilla extract.

Add banana mixture to dry ingredients, stirring until just combined. In small bowl, toss bacon and remaining flour until bacon is lightly coated.



- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon lemon zest

**Lemon Sugar Topping**

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon lemon zest
- 1/2 cup butter, melted

Heat oven to 350 F.

In large bowl, whisk flour, sugar, baking powder and salt.

Add buttermilk, eggs, butter, lemon juice, vanilla extract and lemon zest. Stir until combined.

Pipe batter into donut pan.

Bake 9 minutes. Cool on wire rack. To make topping: In bowl, combine sugar with lemon zest. In separate bowl, place melted butter.

Place donut face down in melted butter then face down in lemon sugar topping. Repeat with all donuts.

Fold flour-coated bacon into batter. Pour batter into prepared loaf pan.

Bake 70-80 minutes, or until toothpick inserted near center comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack 20 minutes before inverting bread onto wire rack to cool completely.

Cut and serve.

We've been itching to hatch some quail. Bless Daniel's heart, he took charge of it, and finally, 21 days ago, he placed 30 eggs into our incubator. He turned them several times a day. The children watched and waited, wondering if the eggs would ever really hatch. Honestly, Mom and Dad were beginning to question the possibility and

even have some doubts. Once, one of the children accidentally cracked a couple of them. On another occasion, little Joshua, who is quite the explorer by now, pulled the cord, unplugging the heat for who knows how long. - 1/4 cup shredded cheese of your choice
- 3 tablespoons mayo
- 1 tablespoon prepared mustard

- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2 teaspoons pickle relish
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- a pinch black pepper

Mash or finely chop eggs. Add remaining ingredients, stir gently to combine. Chill an hour or until ready to serve. Delicious on toasted bread, as a wrap, with crackers, or with fresh veggie slices such as carrots or cucumbers, or tomatoes.

Cover and refrigerate leftovers.

## Gators point guard Mann declares for NBA

*Led Florida in points and assists this season*

GAINESVILLE — Florida point guard Tre Mann, the program's best one-on-one playmaker since Jason Williams more than two decades ago, is leaving school early and turning pro.

Mann is expected to hire an agent and does not intend to return to college. The 6-foot-5 sophomore from Gainesville led the Gators with 16 points a game and 83 assists this season and was the team's second-leader rebounder, averaging 5.6 a

game. He also shot 40.2% from 3-point range.

He elevated his play down the stretch, averaging 20.9 points over Florida's final seven games. His four consecutive 20-plus-point games matched the longest streak by a Florida player over the past 25 years (Nick Calathes, Matt Walsh).

"I would like to thank Coach White and his staff at the University of Florida for believing in me and helping to shape me into the man and player I am today," Mann said Wednesday in a statement. "Thank you to all my teammates who shared the Gator

uniform with me for the last two seasons.

"Thank you to my family for always providing me with love and support. No words can ever describe how grateful I am to you."

Mann tested the NBA waters after his freshman season, in which he averaged 5.3 points off the bench. He ended up returning to Florida and becoming the team's best player following Keyontae Johnson's collapse in early December.

Coach Mike White revamped his offense following Johnson's still-unexplained crumple to the court and health condition, switching from a dribble-drive scheme designed to take advantage of Johnson's slashing strengths to a heavy dose of ball-screen action that proved to be a perfect fit for Mann.

Mann's quickness, ball skill and range made him difficult, maybe even downright impossible, to guard. His step-back jumper became a go-to shot late this season.

NBA scouts surely noticed, seeing a still-growing playmaker who looks ready for the next level. White seemingly saw it coming, too.

"You want these guys to realize the dream," White said earlier this month. "All these guys want to play at the highest level, and if any one of these guys have a realistic shot in the spring and they're getting positive feedback from the NBA, I'll be the first one to tell them, 'Hey, man, if you feel like you get something and we can get something guaranteed, go.'"

"I'll be the first one to open the door for you and, 'Hey, get out of here.'"

## AP source: Suh stays

TAMPA — Defensive lineman Ndamukong Suh has agreed to a one-year contract worth \$9 million to remain with the Super Bowl champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers, a person familiar with the deal told The Associated Press.

The person spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity Wednesday because the agreement, as well as a salary-cap friendly extension given to offensive lineman Donovan Smith, had not been announced by the Bucs.

Smith, who was to earn \$14.25 million in 2021, agreed to a two-year, \$31 million extension that frees space under the salary cap as general manager Jason Licht continues the team's effort to keep as much of a championship roster together as possible.

The left tackle, who including playoffs started 19 of 20 games last season, joins Tom Brady in negotiating extensions that improve the prospects of keeping several high-profile players from leaving the team via free agency.

It's the third straight winter Suh has agreed to a one-year deal with the Bucs, who've led the NFL in run defense each of the past two seasons. He earned \$10 million in 2019 and \$8.5 million in 2020.

The 34-year-old who was the No. 2 overall pick in the 2010 draft had six sacks last year, hiking his career total to 64½ in 11 seasons with the Bucs, Detroit Lions, Miami Dolphins and Los Angeles Rams. He had 1 1/2 sacks in the Super Bowl, helping Tampa Bay slow down Patrick Mahomes during a 31-9 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs.

Suh's deal ensures all 11 starters on defense will be under contract for next season. Linebackers Shaquil Barrett and Lavonte David signed new contracts rather than test free agency, and reserves Rakeem Nunez-Roches and Kevin Minter are staying, too.
