Citrus County COVID update

According to the Florida Department of Health, 71 new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update. No new hospitalizations were reported; one new death was reported.

To date in the county, 3,927 people have tested positive (including 20 non-residents), 368 have been hospitalized and 147 have died.

7-Eleven opens Wednesday in Inverness

Funding plan hits snag

Attorney’s opinion: Unspent CARES money can’t help businesses in need

The county’s plan to use millions of dollars in unspent CARES Act funds to aid local businesses hit a potential snag Monday with the receipt of a legal opinion that says state law won’t allow it.

Faced with a sudden deadline of having to either award CARES grants or return the money to the U.S. Treasury, County Administrator Randy Oliver had recommended that the funds reimburse the county for sheriff’s deputy salaries, which is an allowable expense.

The county would then have that amount available in the budget to continue a program to provide funds for businesses and individuals struggling to pay rent, mortgage, utilities or payroll during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Commissioners asked for a legal opinion to see if funds

from the county budget could be used in direct payments to support businesses.

The answer, from Tallahassee attorney Heather Encinosa, the county’s outside legal counsel, was that the funds can be used only for “economic development,” which she said meant to assist new or

expanded businesses.

She quoted statute that said the county may use public funds for grants to businesses “for the expansion of businesses existing in the community or the attraction of a new business to the community.”

It’s big picture time for Holly Davis.

And that’s a place where Davis is right at home.

Davis takes the ceremonial oath of office Tuesday, Nov. 17, joining Ruthie Davis Schlabach to start her four-year term as one of Citrus County’s two new commissioners.

Expect Davis to take it all in before she starts dishing it out.

“I’m not one to come in and throw my weight around,” Davis, 54, of Citrus Hills, said. “I can nudge, but in a very respectful, driven way, as opposed to calling people out.”

Davis comes to the county commission having defeated an incumbent — Jimmie T. Smith, who, along with one term on the county commission and three terms in the state House of

Second COVID-19 vaccine looks successful

Moderna: Treatment 94.5% effective

A second experimental COVID-19 vaccine — this one from Moderna Inc. — yielded extraordinarily strong early results Monday, another badly needed dose of hope as the pandemic enters a terrible new phase.

Moderna said its vaccine appears to be 94.5% effective, according to preliminary data from an ongoing study. A week ago, competitor Pfizer Inc. announced its own vaccine looked 90% effective — news that puts both companies on track to seek permission within weeks for emergency use in the U.S.

The results are “truly striking,” said Dr. Anthony Fauci, the U.S. government’s top infectious-diseases

expert. “The vaccines that we’re talking about, and vaccines to come, are really the light at the end of the tunnel.”

A vaccine can’t come fast enough, as virus cases topped 11 million in the U.S. over the weekend — 1 million of them recorded in just the past week — and governors and mayors are ratcheting up restrictions ahead of Thanksgiving. The outbreak has killed more than 1.3 million people worldwide, over 246,000 of them in the U.S.

Stocks rallied on Wall Street and around the world on rising hopes that the global economy could start returning to normal in the coming months. The Dow Jones Industrial

COVID-19 continues to spread within the Citrus County Detention Facility.

A total of 95 inmates at the CoreCivic jail in Lecanto have tested positive since the onset of the coronavirus pandemic, County Administrator Randy Oliver said Monday, Nov. 16, 2020.

It’s an increase of 17 from a

week ago, Nov. 9.

Of the jail’s 30 housing pods, which can each accommodate roughly 60 inmates, three remain quarantined to isolate infected individuals, CoreCivic spokesman Ryan Gustin said Monday.

Gustin said visitations will be postponed through the last week of November.

Another CoreCivic employee

Specifically to the recipients of CARES grants — businesses needing financial due to a drop in revenue due to COVID-19 — Encinosa provided examples that seem to point exactly to what the CARES grant program does: “... Any business grant program aimed at providing revenue replacement for businesses in the county due to decreased commercial activities as a result of the COVID-19 public health emergency

would not increase or expand commercial or economic activity in the County,” she wrote. “Similarly, a business grant program aimed at providing funds to avoid local job layoffs would likely be impermissible as it also does not increase or expand commercial or economic activity in the county; it merely preserves the status quo.” Encinosa said the county could use public funds to assist businesses in rehiring recently laid off workers. Reached late Monday afternoon, Oliver said he hadn’t yet discussed the

legal opinion with County Attorney Denise Dymond Lyn, though he had read it. “That one is pretty complex,” Oliver said. Lyn sent the opinion to commissioners Monday morning, the day before Tuesday’s annual organizational commission meeting where new Commissioners Holly Davis and Ruthie Davis Schlabach take their seats for the first time. Neither the CARES grant status, nor the legal opinion are listed on Tuesday’s board agenda. Oliver said he expected the public to raise the issue. Monday was the deadline

for the county to notify the state how it spent the \$6.5 million first round allocation of CARES Act funds. Josh Wooten, president and CEO of the Citrus County Chamber of Commerce, was disappointed to learn of the legal opinion. He said the county should push the state government to extend the deadline so that it can still find a way to spend CARES funds to help local businesses. “I don’t see any compelling reason why this drop-dead deadline can’t be extended,” he said. “We’re

Representatives, had never lost at the ballot box. Davis is the daughter of a Citrus County icon — former Crystal River Airport fixed-base operator Tom Davis. She’s also a pilot, and is a marketing consultant. So seeing things from a broad view is second nature to Davis, whose big plans on day one in office are not to push a specific issue, but rather a long-term vision. “My big push would be to set goals that are pretty far out there — five, 10, 20 years out,” she said. “We

need to set us up for success.” For example, Davis said the county commission wants its residential roads on a 25-year resurfacing cycle. Even though the board has committed millions of dollars annually for resurfacing, Davis said there is no consistent plan to meet the target. “You set a vision goal that says by X year we need to be here,” Davis said. And while COVID-19 has thrown the economy out of whack, Davis said it gives the county commission the opportunity to expand its horizons for economic growth. Going outside the box is right up Davis’s alley.

“I’ve been paid to see around corners,” she said. That means a methodical, rather than reactionary, approach to county issues as they arise. “I’m never afraid to say, ‘I don’t know. I need more time,’” she said. Davis said she is eager for the challenges. “I’m well aware I’ll make decisions that people are going to disagree with,” she said. “I have the want to do right by this county. Homosassa man dies after crash in Hernando County

A 62-year-old Homosassa man died early Saturday, Nov. 14, 2020, in Hernando County after his vehicle went off the road and struck a utility pole.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) report on the 12:35 a.m. crash, the man was driving a sedan south on Citrus Way.

He failed to negotiate a left curve in the roadway as he approached the intersection with Parsons Loop, according to the FHP report, causing his sedan to leave the road, strike a boulder, spin and strike a pole.

Emergency responders pronounced the man dead at the scene.

Vehicles damaged by sandbags dropped from overpass

A few motorists went through a life-threatening scare on the road after somebody bombarded their passing vehicles with sandbags from atop a Lecanto-area overpass.

According to a Citrus County Sheriff's Office case report, deputies responded to the incident at 5 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 10, 2020, near West Glen Street's intersection with South Frost Point, east of the overpass construction site for the Suncoast Parkway.

They met with three drivers who said an object collided with their vehicles as they traveled under the overpass.

A man driving a Hyundai passenger car said he was headed east on West Glen Street when he spotted something hanging from the bridge before a sandbag fell onto his windshield, forcing him off the road.

Deputies scoured surrounding roadways and questioned nearby residents, but couldn't find suspects or clues, according to the sheriff's office report.

Wrong-way crash kills man

U.S. 19 accident involves four vehicles, injures five others

A wrong-way, four-vehicle collision on U.S. 19 almost two miles south of the Citrus-Levy county line killed a Marion County man and injured five other motorists, including a toddler.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) report, which didn't disclose the identities of those involved in the 6:47 p.m.

crash from Sunday, Nov. 15, 2020, a 65-year-old man from Weirsdale was driving a van south on the highway in a northbound lane near West Cornflower Drive.

At the same time, an SUV, pickup truck and sedan were heading north on U.S. 19, respectively.

When it approached Cornflower Drive, the van collided head-on with the SUV, causing the

van to go airborne and land in the highway median, according to the FHP report.

Emergency responder's pronounced the van's driver dead at the scene.

FHP's report states the collision also spun the SUV into the path of the pickup truck, which struck the rotating vehicle and overturned it onto a grass shoulder.

Inside the SUV, a 30-year-old

man, 25-year-old woman and 2-year-old girl — all from Saint George, Georgia — suffered critical injuries, according to the FHP report.

Unable to stop in time, the sedan sideswiped the truck, continued on the highway's shoulder and struck a tree.

FHP's report states the truck's driver, a 73-year-old man from Crystal River, and the sedan's driver, a 76-year-old man from Old Town, both suffered minor injuries.

The new Wawa at the corner of State Road 44 and U.S. 19 is scheduled to open in spring of 2021.

That's the word from Wawa spokeswoman Jennifer Wolf, who added that the store will need up to 40 employees upon opening.

Wolf said hiring should begin in March and interested candidates should visit www.wawa.com/careers/store-opportunities.

Construction on the Wawa ground to a

halt last year. Ryan Keidel, real estate project engineer for Wawa, said in an email to city officials that he "ran into a bit of an issue" with the 20,000-gallon underground storage tank manufacturer but that has been resolved.

"We look forward to continuing to serve Citrus County with essential resources, employment opportunities and community support," Wolf said.

This will be Wawa's second location in Citrus County. The first site opened in May 2019 on the southeast corner of County Roads 486 and 491 in Lecanto.

Meanwhile, representatives with Dan's Car Wash have submitted a site permit application about locating next to the new

Wawa — in the Suncoast Credit Union spot.

Suncoast Credit Union announced in September it is relocating about 0.7 miles east at 1101 NE Fifth St., about 0.7 miles east on State Road 44 by the RaceTrac.

Crystal River City Manager Ken Frink said the city needs to contact the property owner of the site about Dan's Car Wash application and proceed from there.

"It is moving forward," he said.

City correspondence shows car wash representatives contacted the Florida Department of Transportation about potential vehicle access to the site. The left-turn medians at U.S. 19 and State Road 44 have reduced access to certain sites at that corner.

Inverness council to review utility plans, Valerie Theatre changes

The Inverness City Council is wasting no time in putting a recent \$1.88 million state grant to work eliminating septic tanks along State Road 44 in order to hook up businesses to municipal sewer services.

The council will vote Tuesday, Nov. 17, 2020, whether to hire North Carolina-based Kimley-Horn and Associates to oversee the 7,200-foot-long wastewater project along the west side of State Road 44. The project runs from about east of South Prospect Terrace to North Crestview Avenue.

Kimley-Horn helped the city apply for the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Springs Restoration Fund grant. The cost to the city for Kimley-Horn to oversee the project, permits and create design plans would be \$191,150.

The project encompasses 146 parcels of property and 46 septic tanks and two lift stations that will transport the wastewater to the city's wastewater treatment plant.

"It will also eliminate the need for future septic systems in (the) area to undeveloped properties," Inverness City manager Eric Williams told the council in a letter about the project.

It will also help in developing the commercial district along State Road 44, growing the tax base there, and promoting environmentally safe development, he told the Chronicle when first announcing the grant award.

The grant will not pay for all of

the cost of the \$2.4 million project, but Williams said the grant will greatly ease the financial burden on those businesses to be connected to sewer services.

The council will host several hearings as to the design of the project and how the remaining cost of the project would be paid, he said. The immediate difference in cost will be paid for using the city's utility enterprise fund.

In other city business, the council will consider a memorandum of understanding with the Valerie Theatre Board, which takes most of the operational aspects from the board and allows the board to focus on fundraising, community outreach, volunteerism and programming.

The city will take over operations and financial responsibilities for the theater.

On Tuesday, the all-volunteer Valerie Theatre Board will give the council a presentation as to its plans for the theater in the community and philanthropic targets.

City council meetings are at 5:30 p.m. at the Inverness Government Center, 212 W. Main St., Inverness.

Couple faces child neglect charges after DUI joyride

Deputies also arrested Kristen April Murray, 20, and charged her with child neglect without bodily harm. Her bond was \$2,000, according to arrest reports.

The arrests began when a county deputy was called to the 300 block of East Stage Coach Trail in Floral City in reference to a disturbance.

According to the arrest reports, the deputy found the couple's purple Dodge Durango utility vehicle stuck on the shoulder of the trail and would have to be towed

out, according to arrest reports.

The deputy reported that Murray had a swollen upper lip and that Mills had blood below his lower lip.

According to the arrest report, both admitted to the arresting deputy that they had been fighting. The deputy also reported smelling alcohol on the pair as well as on their breaths.

The arresting deputy reported that both acted irresponsibly by putting a toddler in the vehicle when the driver was intoxicated.

When Mills was taken to the Citrus County jail, he agreed to a breathalyzer test and exceeded the Florida breathalyzer limit of 0.08%, according to his arrest report. He scored a 0.088% and 0.098%.

Police: Man accused of punching actor attacked others

NEW YORK — Prosecutors say the man accused of punching actor **Rick Moranis** is a suspect in multiple other unprovoked attacks on people in New York City.

At a Manhattan Criminal Court hearing on Sunday, prosecutors said **Marquis Ventura**, 35, is charged in five assaults on strangers that took place in the past six months, the New York Post reported.

Ventura allegedly attacked the owner of a liquor store in Soho hours after he punched Moranis in the face on Oct. 1 in what police called a “random, unprovoked assault.” Moranis is well known for his roles in movies like “Ghostbusters,” “Spaceballs” and “Honey I Shrunk the Kids.”

Judge Nicholas Moyné ordered a psychiatric examination for Ventura.

An attorney for Ventura, **Autumn Levine**, said he has a diagnosis of schizophrenia, a serious mental illness, and has previously been in inpatient mental health treatment. She said he was not on his medication, the newspaper reported.

Illusionist halts Vegas show after staffer gets virus

LAS VEGAS — Illusionist **David Copperfield** is suspending his Las Vegas stage show after a crew member tested positive for COVID-19.

The Las Vegas Review Journal reported Monday that the legendary magician has “no idea yet” when his production at MGM Grand will resume.

According to the newspaper, an internal email from MGM Resorts International officials on Friday said one of Copperfield's illusion techs had been exposed to the virus.

Copperfield confirmed the backstage crew member's diagnosis on Sunday. In a statement, Copperfield said his entire crew would be tested again.

His stage show was one of several residency productions across MGM Resorts that reopened Nov. 6.

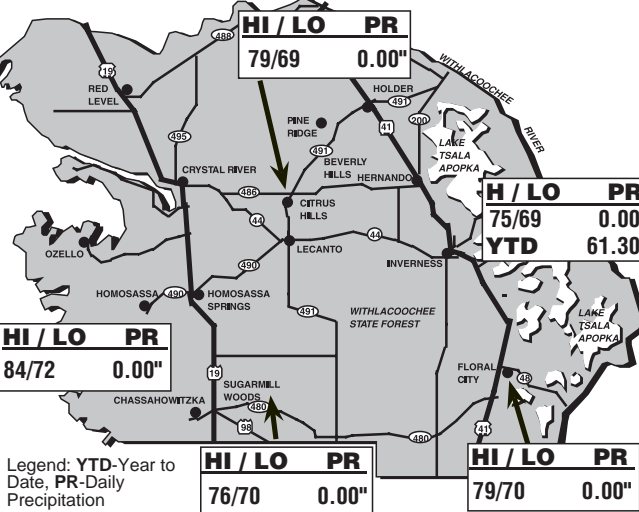
The company said on its website that affected ticketholders will be offered refunds or exchanges.

working at the local jail also contracted the contagious respiratory disease since Nov. 9, Gustin said, bringing the total number of staff cases to eight.

Of those employees, five have recovered and were cleared to return to work.

“The Citrus County Detention Facility has followed the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines, which have evolved over time, since the onset of the pandemic, and we’re continuing to work closely with our government partners to enhance procedures as needed,” Gustin said in an email. “The health and safety of the individuals entrusted to our care and our staff is the top priority for CoreCivic.”

Each of the 14 Cypress Creek Juvenile Offender Correctional Center and Treatment Center employees who contracted COVID-19 also returned to their jobs at the Lecanto facility, according to the latest Florida Department of Juvenile Justice report from Nov. 10.

Each of the infected 24 youth inmates has also left medical isolation, according to the agency.

According to the Florida Department of Health (FDOH), which didn’t update its COVID-19 data from Sunday by the print deadline, 142 cases were reported for inmates housed at correctional centers in the county, and for staff who live locally but could also work at an outside facility.

COVID-19 data on the FDOH dashboard is subject to change as epidemiological investigations reveal new information about a case.

As of Sunday, the FDOH reported 3,927 COVID-19 cases in Citrus County; 368 hospitalizations; and 147 deaths.

Gender gap held steady

Ask Virginia voter Mary Hayes why Joe Biden defeated Donald Trump, and she does not hesitate.

“Women won this election!” says Hayes, 56, a mother of three and Biden supporter from Leesburg, Virginia. In particular, she credits two categories of voters that she herself is part of: Black women and suburban women. Trump had begged the latter group — some of whom he’d alienated by referring to them as “housewives” — to “please, please” like him. But that plea rang hollow, she says.

“We showed America that suburban women are diverse, and are a beautiful collection of ethnicity, race, marital status, occupations and many other categories,” Hayes says. “Suburban women mobilized, determined to remove Trump from office.” And, she says, they succeeded.

From nearly the moment Trump took the presidential oath, it was women who were the face of the resistance — marching in enormous numbers in their pink hats, and fueling Democratic gains in the 2018 midterm elections.

Complicated results

So in 2020, the year women celebrated the centennial of the 19th Amendment guaranteeing their right to vote, many had expected — and some polls suggested — a dramatic repudiation of Trump with a widened gender gap. The results were a bit more complicated.

Hayes is correct that women were crucial to Biden’s victory — simply stated, if only men had voted, Trump would have won. Black women and suburban women, in particular, proved to be pillars of Biden’s coalition. But the election also delivered a reminder of Republicans’ strength with other groups of women.

Trump had a modest advantage among white women, and a much wider share of white women without college degrees, according to AP VoteCast, a survey of more than 110,000 voters. And despite expectations that the much-analyzed gender gap would expand, it remained essentially the same from previous elections, including 2016.

In Congress, the big news was significant gains for Republican women, and overall a record number of women will serve in the 117th Congress — at least 141, including 105 Democrats and 36 Republicans, according to current numbers from the Center for American Women in Politics at Rutgers University.

Overall, the results are “a moving target,” says Debbie Walsh, director of the center. But it was in sum “a good year,” she says, “both for the election of women candidates on both sides, and for the participation of women voters.” And of course, a huge glass ceiling was shattered with the election of the first female vice president, Kamala Harris.

AP VoteCast showed a 9 percentage point difference between men and women in support for Biden and Harris: 55% of women and 46% of men. That was essentially unchanged from the 2018 midterms, when VoteCast found a 10-point gender gap, with 58% of women and 48% of men backing Democrats in congressional races.

Contrary to some expectations, “this was a very average gender gap,” says Susan J. Carroll, professor of political science and women’s and gender studies at Rutgers.

‘Barely a ripple’

The gender gap in support for Democratic candidates has averaged about 8 percentage points in the last 10 presidential elections, according to data from the American National Election Studies.

So for anyone who’d been looking for a wave election on either side, there was

“barely a ripple,” Carroll says. Still, Republican women in Congress, who have long lagged behind their Democratic counterparts, made notable gains: At minimum, a record 36 GOP women will serve in Congress next year, and they’ve already more than doubled their representation in the House.

Among newly elected GOP women who flipped seats: Stephanie Bice in Oklahoma, Michelle Fischbach in Minnesota, Yvette Herrell in New Mexico, Ashley Hinson in Iowa, Young Kim in California, Nancy Mace in South Carolina, Nicole Malliotakis in New York, Maria Elvira Salazar in Florida, Michelle Steel in California.

Groups voted differently

VoteCast showed that Trump narrowly beat Biden among white women, largely on the strength of support in rural areas and small towns. But Biden dominated with women in the suburbs, winning 59% to Trump’s 40% of a group that makes up around a quarter of the electorate nationwide. Biden won overwhelmingly among Black women, 93% to Trump’s 6%, according to VoteCast.

Trump won handily among white women without college degrees — 60% to 39% — while Biden won white women with college degrees by roughly the same margin.

The results show yet again that despite a steady overall gender gap, “there are different groups of women that made a difference for each camp,” Walsh says.

Hayes is one of the suburban women who mobilized early, dismayed at what she called the president’s dog whistles in trying to stoke fears among suburban women that low-income housing would invite crime and ruin their neighborhoods. She formed a Facebook group, “The Real Suburban Housewives for Biden/Harris,” which drew over 5,000 members, including “a few brave men.”

“Some (of us) are housewives, some are career women, some are mothers and some are not,” Hayes says. “Suburban women are thinkers, business owners, and we fight for our families. America should work together like suburban women — maybe they could get something done in the government.”

A key element of the gender gap this year, some advocates have noted, is not about women but men: Men appeared to be somewhat more likely to back Biden in this election than they were to back Hillary Clinton in 2016. VoteCast shows 46% of men supported Biden. In 2016, 41% supported Clinton, according to a Pew Research Center analysis.

That, say advocates, may be at least in part due to discomfort among some men — or misogynistic attitudes — about Clinton.

Hardening partisan map steepens Dems’ climb

WASHINGTON — Pinned six years in the minority, Democrats have an uphill but real shot at wresting Senate control in January, with more opportunities in 2022. Yet as states increasingly sort themselves along hardening partisan lines, it’s complicating Democrats’ drive to win the majority and keep it.

Thanks to this month’s elections, Democrats will own all four Senate seats from purple Arizona and increasingly blue Colorado next year. If they can win January runoff for both seats from Georgia, which has recently teetered toward them, they’ll command the Senate thanks to Vice President-elect Kamala Harris’ tie-breaking vote in what would be a 50-50 chamber.

Yet even as Democrats have made those gains and others since surrendering control in the 2014 elections, they’ve lost foundations of their old majority that will be

hard to recapture. Gone are seats from Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, both Dakotas, Florida, Indiana, Iowa, Louisiana, Missouri, North Carolina and West Virginia, all of which tilt Republican in presidential elections.

In addition, three current Senate Democrats are from states that President Donald Trump carried easily this month despite losing to Democrat Joe Biden. Sens. Joe Manchin, 73, of West Virginia, Jon Tester, 64, of Montana and Sherrod Brown, 68, of Ohio are all proven brand names in states that would be hard for Democrats to hold without them.

All this means a constricted playing field for Democrats to add seats in coming election cycles.

The same is true for Republicans, but it’s on Democrats to gain ground and keep it if they want to control a Senate that, with the Democratic-led House, could make Biden’s legislative agenda more ambitious.

Average gained more than 470 points, or 1.6%, to close at a record high of over 29,950. Moderna stock was up almost 10%.

Both vaccines require two shots, given several weeks apart. U.S. officials said they hope to have about 20 million Moderna doses and another 20 million of the vaccine made by Pfizer and its German partner BioNTech to use in late December.

Dr. Stephen Hoge, Moderna's president, welcomed the "really important milestone" but said having similar results from two different companies is what's most reassuring.

"That should give us all hope that actually a vaccine is going to be able to stop this pandemic and hopefully get us back to our lives," Hoge told The Associated Press. He added: "It won't be Moderna alone that solves this problem. It's going to require many vaccines" to meet the global demand.

If the Food and Drug Administration allows emergency use of Moderna's or Pfizer's candidate, there will be limited, rationed supplies before the end of the year.

Exactly who is first in line has yet to be decided. But Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar said the hope is that enough doses are available by the end of January to vaccinate adults over 65, who are at the highest risk from the coronavirus, and health care workers. Fauci said it may take until spring or summer before anyone who is not high risk and wants a shot can get one.

Neal Browning of Bothell, Washington, who rolled up his sleeve back in March for the first testing of Moderna's vaccine in humans, said he is excited about Monday's "excellent news" but is still carefully wearing a mask and taking other precautions.

"I'm super happy to be a part of this and to try and help bring some kind of peace back to the world," Browning said. "I have a lot of hope."

The National Institutes of Health helped create the vaccine Moderna is manufacturing, and NIH's director, Dr. Francis Collins, said the two companies' parallel results give scientists "a

lot of confidence that we're on the path towards having effective vaccines."

But "we're also at this really dark time," he warned, saying people can't let down their guard during the months it will take for doses of any vaccines cleared by the FDA to start reaching a large share of the population.

Moderna's vaccine is being studied in 30,000 volunteers who received either the real thing or a dummy shot. On Sunday, an independent monitoring board examined 95 infections that were recorded after volunteers' second shot. Only five of the illnesses were in people given the vaccine.

Earlier this year, Fauci said he would be happy with a COVID-19 vaccine that was 60% effective.

The study is continuing, and Moderna acknowledged the protection rate might change as more COVID-19 infections are detected. Also, it's too soon to know how long protection lasts.

Both cautions apply to Pfizer's vaccine as well.

But Moderna's independent monitors reported some additional, promising tidbits: All 11 severe COVID-19 cases were among placebo recipients, and there were no significant safety concerns. The main side effects were fatigue, muscle aches and injection-site pain after the second dose.

Scientists not involved with the testing were encouraged but cautioned that the FDA still must scrutinize the safety data and decide whether to allow vaccinations outside of a research study.

"We're not to the finish line yet," said Dr. James Cutrell, an infectious-disease expert at UT Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas. "If there's an impression or perception that there's just a rubber stamp, or due diligence wasn't done to look at the data, that could weaken public confidence."

States already are gearing up for what is expected to be the

biggest vaccination campaign in U.S. history. First the shots have to arrive where they're needed, and Pfizer's must be kept at ultra-cold temperatures — around minus 94 degrees Fahrenheit. Moderna's vaccine also starts off frozen, but the company said Monday it can be thawed and kept in a regular refrigerator for 30 days, easing that concern.

Beyond the U.S., other governments and the World Health Organization, which aims to buy doses for poor countries, will have to separately decide if and when vaccines should be rolled out broadly.

"There are many, many questions still remaining," including how long protection lasts and if the first vaccines to emerge work as well in older people as in the young, said WHO chief scientist Dr. Soumya Swaminathan. "We also hope the clinical trials will continue to collect data, because it's really going to be important for us to know in the long term."

The vaccine from Cambridge,

Massachusetts-based Moderna is among 11 candidates in late-stage testing around the world, four of them in huge studies in the United States. Collins stressed that more U.S. volunteers are needed for those studies.

Elsewhere around the world, China and Russia have been offering different experimental vaccines to people before completing final-stage testing.

Both Moderna's shots and the Pfizer-BioNTech candidate are so-called mRNA vaccines, a brand-new technology. They aren't made with the coronavirus itself, meaning there's no chance anyone could catch it from the shots. Instead, the vaccine contains a piece of genetic code that trains the immune system to recognize the spiked protein on the surface of the virus.

Pfizer CEO Albert Bourla tweeted that he was thrilled at Moderna's news, saying, "Our companies share a common goal — defeating this dreaded disease."

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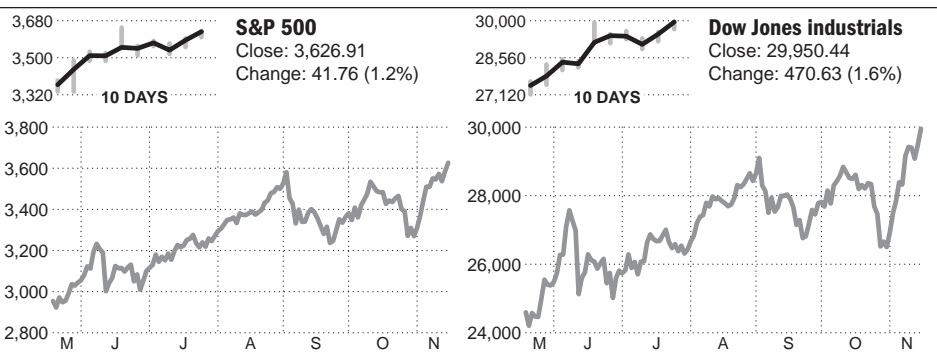

FUNDING RIVERWALK

County will gain from financially backing project

The long-awaited King’s Bay Riverwalk in Crystal River is 75% complete and has buy-in from all affected property owners.

The Riverwalk, talked about for three decades as a top community priority, is a boardwalk along the downtown commercial section of King’s Bay that will be built along the water’s edge.

It is a critical part of the revitalization to the historic downtown district. Visitors will be able to park in one location and walk through both the Main Street district and stroll along King’s Bay. The entertainment and shopping district will grow and thrive.

To complete the project, the city must overcome additional financial burdens that have become clear on the long-delayed construction effort. Cost estimates have gone up.

Even with the \$1.7 million come from the RESTORE ACT (BP oil spill settlement) and \$750,000 from CRA accounts, the project is short on the dollars needed to finish.

The increased cost of the project should create a sense of urgency. The longer the final construction is delayed, the higher the costs will rise.

Crystal River city officials recognize that and have reached out to the Tourism

Development Council (TDC), which offered it support of \$500,000 spread out over a number of years.

The county commission has the final say-so on TDC recommendations and can either reject the TDC vote entirely, alter it or add to it.

County commissioners need to think forward and see the big picture by voting unanimously in favor of the TDC’s recommendation. This is no time for any county commissioner to equivocate, especially one who supported it during the election season.

Crystal River is a large part of the county’s ecotourism boom, because it’s not just the city benefiting from the influx of visitors, but the county as a whole.

It’s an amenity that, once done, will add immensely to the tourism marketing portfolio of Citrus County. Tourists and locals alike will flock to downtown Crystal River to enjoy it. It’ll spur new business and increase waterfront access to those wishing to get a glimpse of the bay. Commissioner Scott Kinnard is right to push for that and other tourism-related infrastructure projects.

If you build it, they will come, but you have to finish it.

Trump campaign drops key request in Pennsylvania lawsuit

HARRISBURG, Pa. — President Donald Trump's campaign is withdrawing a central request in its lawsuit seeking to stop the certification of the election results in Pennsylvania, where Democrat Joe Biden beat Trump to capture the state and help win the White House.

Ahead of a Tuesday hearing in the case, Trump's campaign dropped its request in the lawsuit that hundreds of thousands of mail-in and absentee ballots — 682,479, to be precise — be thrown out because they were processed without its representatives able to watch.

The campaign's revised lawsuit, filed in federal court on Sunday, maintains the aim of blocking Pennsylvania from certifying a victory for Biden in the state, and it maintains its claim that Democratic voters were treated more favorably than Republican voters.

The campaign still contends in the lawsuit that hundreds of thousands of ballots weren't properly processed.

"Our lawsuit in Pennsylvania absolutely still makes an issue of the 682,479 mail-in and absentee ballots that were counted in secret," Trump campaign spokesman Tim Murtaugh tweeted.

Hate crimes in US reach highest level in more than a decade

WASHINGTON — Hate crimes in the U.S. rose to the highest level in more than a decade as federal officials also recorded the highest number of hate-motivated killings since the FBI began collecting that data in the early 1990s, according to an FBI report released Monday.

There were 51 hate crime murders in 2019, which includes 22 people who were killed in a shooting that targeted Mexicans at a Walmart in the border city of El Paso, Texas, the report said. The suspect in that August 2019 shooting, which left two dozen other people injured, was charged with both state and federal crimes in what authorities said was an attempt to scare Hispanics into leaving the United States.

There were 7,314 hate crimes last year, up from 7,120 the year before — and approaching the 7,783 of 2008. The FBI's annual report defines hate crimes as those motivated by bias based on a person's race, religion or sexual orientation, among other categories.

Biden: 'More people may die'

Urges Trump to aid transition

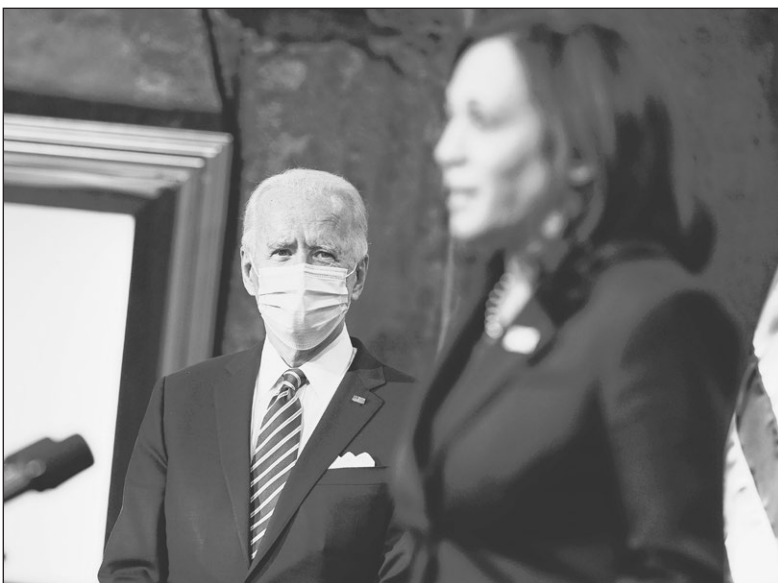

WILMINGTON, Del. — President-elect Joe Biden on Monday warned of dire consequences if President Donald Trump and his administration continue to refuse to coordinate with his transition team on the coronavirus pandemic and block briefings on national security, policy issues and vaccine plans.

The remarks marked Biden's toughest comments to date on Trump's failure to acknowledge his election loss and cooperate with the incoming administration for a peaceful transfer of power.

"More people may die if we don't coordinate," Biden told reporters during a news conference in Wilmington, Delaware.

Biden and his aides have emphasized the importance of being briefed on White House efforts to control the pandemic and distribute prospective vaccines. The Trump administration is working on its own distribution plan, while Biden's chief of staff indicated his transition team will proceed with their own planning separately

because of the obstruction.

Biden called the vaccine distribution a "huge, huge undertaking," and said that if his team has to wait until he takes office to dig into the government's distribution plan, they'll be "behind, over a month, month and a half."

"So it's important that it be done, that there be coordination now, now, as rapidly as we can get that done," he said.

Before taking questions, the Democrat outlined his plans to

alleviate inequality and boost the U.S. economy but said that any structural reforms depended first on reining in the pandemic and delivering more immediate relief.

"Once we shut down the virus and deliver economic relief to workers and businesses, then we can start to build back better than before," he said.

Biden has vowed to spend trillions of dollars to reinvigorate U.S. manufacturing, expand health

care coverage and combat climate change, among other priorities. But his chief priority remains controlling the pandemic, which is surging to record levels and forcing state and local leaders to implement new rounds of restrictions on local businesses.

The president-elect has so far tried to sidestep difficult questions about whether he might support a short-term national lockdown to arrest the surge of coronavirus cases. Since defeating Trump, Biden has devoted most of his public remarks to encouraging Americans to wear masks and embrace social distancing measures.

But members of his coronavirus advisory board have been more specific. One member, Dr. Michael Osterholm, recently suggested a four- to six-week national lockdown with financial aid for Americans whose livelihoods would be affected. He later walked back the remarks and was rebutted by two other members of the panel who said a widespread lockdown shouldn't be under consideration.

Biden was asked Monday whether he would encourage leaders to look at potentially reinstating stay-at-home orders now that the pandemic is surging nationwide. He avoided answering directly and instead called on officials to embrace mask-wearing and criticized those who haven't.

DC in gridlock as virus surges

1 million US infections in the past week

WASHINGTON — With the nation gripped by a resurgent coronavirus and looking to Washington for help, President Donald Trump and lawmakers in Congress have a message for struggling Americans: Just keep waiting.

The urgency of the nationwide surge in virus cases, spiking hospitalizations and increasing death tolls has hardly resonated in the nation's capital as its leaders are vexed by transition politics and trying to capitalize on the promise of a coming vaccine. The virus has killed more than 246,000 Americans this year and infected at least 11.1 million — some 1 million of them in just the past week.

Yet in Congress, where talks over economic relief bills stalled out months ago, lame-duck approval of aid appears is hardly front-of-mind. Across town at the White House, Trump is more focused on getting credit for the vaccine development push and blocking President-elect Joe Biden from getting the information needed to ensure the new administration can smoothly take over the fight against the pandemic.

"Another Vaccine just announced," Trump tweeted Monday morning after Moderna announced that its candidate appeared in early testing to be 95% effective against the virus. "For those great 'historians', please remember that these great discoveries, which will end the China Plague, all took place on my watch!"

On a call Monday with governors, Vice President Mike Pence, who heads the White House coronavirus task force, struck a rosy tone and asked states to give their residents comfort that vaccines are coming and that "America and your state has never been more prepared."

That didn't stop Louisiana Gov. John Bel Edwards from appealing to Pence and Trump for a more unified message on the importance of social distancing and

wearing masks. And Dr. Deborah Birx, the task force coordinator, reported that 27 states were in the "red zone" for widespread transmission of the virus — more widespread and worrisome than spikes seen earlier this year.

Biden, who has warned of a "dark winter" ahead on the virus, called for the Trump administration to share its vaccine distribution plans with his own incoming administration, warning that "more people may die if you don't coordinate."

Saying vaccine plans are vital to repairing the nation's economy, Biden said, "If we have to wait until Jan. 20 to start that planning, it puts us behind."

Biden said he was hopeful that Trump "will be mildly more enlightened before we

get to Jan. 20." He said he understood Trump's "reluctance" to admit defeat and share his administration's plans but called it "a shame."

There's no progress in Congress yet, either: The split-decision election — in which Democrats absorbed sizable losses in House races despite defeating Trump — hasn't sparked any progress or prodded House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., or Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., to move from their pre-election postures.

Pelosi wants to go big, say \$2 trillion; McConnell wants a smaller package in the \$500 billion range that his rightward-tilting colleagues can live with. Moving toward somewhere in the middle would be difficult for both camps.

Hurricane Iota now a Category 5 storm

Nears Central America

MANAGUA, Nicaragua — Hurricane Iota rapidly strengthened Monday into a Category 5 storm that is likely to bring catastrophic damage to the same part of Central America already battered by a powerful Hurricane Eta less than two weeks ago.

Iota has intensified over the western Caribbean on approach to Nicaragua

and Honduras. The U.S. National Hurricane Center said the storm had maximum sustained winds of 160 mph. It was centered about 55 miles east-southeast of Puerto Cabezas, also known as Bilwi, Nicaragua and moving westward at 9 mph.

Authorities warned that Iota would probably come ashore over areas where Eta's torrential rains saturated the soil, leaving it prone to new landslides and floods, and that the storm surge could reach a shocking 15 to 20 feet above normal tides.

That storm surge was on the mind of Yasmina Wriedt on Monday in Bilwi's El Muelle neighborhood, sitting tight against the sea.

"The situation doesn't look good at all," Wriedt said. "We woke up without electricity, with rain and the surf is getting really high."

Cairo Jarquin, Nicaragua emergency response project manager for Catholic Relief Services, had just visited Bilwi and smaller coastal communities Friday.

In Wawa Bar, Jarquin

said he found "total destruction." People had been working furiously to put roofs back over their families' heads, but now Iota threatened to take what was left.

"The little that remained standing could be razed," Jarquin said. There were other communities farther inland that he was not even able to reach due to the condition of roads. He said he heard that Wawa bar was evacuated again Saturday.

Evacuations were being conducted from low-lying areas in Nicaragua and

Honduras near their shared border through the weekend.

Iota is the record 30th named storm of this year's extraordinarily busy Atlantic hurricane season. It's also the ninth storm to rapidly intensify this season, a dangerous phenomenon that is happening increasingly more often. Such activity has focused attention on climate change, which scientists say is causing wetter, stronger and more destructive storms.

The official end of the hurricane season is Nov. 30.

Get tested for COPD: Your lungs will thank you

If you're often short of breath during everyday activities, your chest feels tight, or you cough a lot, you may be chalking it up to getting older, having allergies, or being a smoker (now or in the past).

Fortunately, there's a way to know whether something more may be at play.

Consider getting a lung function test to find out if you have a serious condition called chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, or COPD. Knowing the cause of your cough and breathing problems will not only help you manage your symptoms — it'll help you feel better, too.

COPD includes two main conditions — emphysema and chronic bronchitis. It's usually caused by cigarette smoking or breathing in other irritants, such as dusts or chemical fumes.

In a small fraction of people, a genetic condition called alpha-1 antitrypsin (AAT) deficiency plays a role in causing COPD. More than 16 million

Americans have been diagnosed with COPD, and millions more have it but don't know it, according to the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI).

COPD doesn't have a cure at the moment, but if you seek advice from a health care

provider and get diagnosed early, you can slow down this progressive disease.

During your appointment, your provider will talk to you about your symptoms and your medical history then listen to your breathing. He or she also may recommend one or more

tests to help diagnose COPD.

Spirometry test

The main test for COPD is called spirometry. During this test, a technician at your health care provider's office will ask you to sit down and put a clip on your nose, so you can breathe only through your mouth.

The technician will then ask you to put your mouth around a mouthpiece, which looks like the mouthpiece on a snorkel. It's connected to a machine that measures how well you breathe.

The technician will ask you to take in a deep breath then blow all of your air out as fast as you can. You'll repeat that a few times. It's painless, but it does take some effort.

Your provider will use the test results to determine how healthy your lungs are, if you have COPD and how serious it is, or if asthma or other conditions are causing your symptoms.

Spirometry can also help your provider know if you have

COPD before you even have symptoms, so if you're concerned about your lung health, consider getting a spirometry test.

Ask for a lung function test if you:

- Are over age 40
- Are or were a smoker
- Feel out of breath often
- Bring up a lot of mucus when you cough
- Have already been diagnosed with a lung disease
- Have AAT deficiency
- Are concerned about your lung health

Another factor to consider when assessing your lung health is COVID-19, the disease caused by the coronavirus that has spread throughout the world. Unlike COPD, COVID-19 causes abrupt coughing and trouble breathing, so your health care provider may want to test you for it.

Details on dentures

I am going to talk about dentures this week. Over the past few weeks I have had a number of questions regarding dentures. I will write in general terms while trying to address the questions asked.

I hope this is information helps in your decisions on what to do with your dentures.

There are a number of reasons a patient presents to the dentist about denture issues. They may have broken them, they may be loose, they may not be able to chew as well as in the past, or they simply may not like the way they look in regards to their smile.

Dentures break for all sorts of reasons: they fall to the floor or in the sink. For those of you who have animals, they get chewed on. Most problems like these are easily fixed, either in the office or with the help of a qualified lab.

If your dentures are loose, a reline is often the answer. Relines can improve the fit of a denture, especially an upper denture.

A reline will have no effect on how the denture looks or chews (other than the benefit from it being more stable). This is often the best solution to a problem and can cost less than having a new set of dentures made.

If chewing has become a problem, you are likely a longtime denture wearer that has worn the teeth down from where they were originally. The only way to deal with this is to have a new set of teeth made.

There are many different types of teeth available. Like anything else, denture teeth come in all ranges of quality, from basic to awesome. Your dentist will know what is best for you.

You might also like to know that the quality of the tooth affects the cosmetics of your end result.

While on the subject of cosmetics, though the tooth type is very important it is only one facet that makes a set of dentures look like real teeth.

A lot of denture cosmetics comes from the proper height of the dentures. Some people have the typical denture look depicted by the chin getting closer and closer to the nose — you get a pouty look when your teeth are together or when chewing.

Balanced, pleasing face

What is the cornerstone of a balanced and pleasing face?

Many believe a well defined jawline is the key foundation. Corrective chin surgery (genioplasty) improves the contours of the chin, neck, and jawline.

A skilled facial surgeon can add strength to an otherwise weak or recessed chin thus improving overall facial esthetics.

Over the past few years, a surgical paradigm shift has occurred where innovations have allowed surgeons to utilize volume enhancement preferentially to produce more youthful appearances while being less invasive.

The best candidates for this procedure are those who are bothered by their weak or recessed chin. The procedure not only improves facial harmony, but also improves the definition of the neck/jawline and helps reduce the appearance of a double chin caused by a small chin.

There are two approaches for a genioplasty each having their advantages and disadvantages. First, depending on the shape of the chin and patient preference, a surgeon may elect to cut through the chin bone and advance it forward and down with titanium hardware.

This can be done from the inside of the mouth without external scars.

The second type is with a stock or custom-made implant placed from below the chin from the face through a small and well-hidden incision.

Both surgeries can augment the size and shape of the native chin in order to achieve a more appealing balanced look.

The traditional approach for a genioplasty is to use the patient’s own chin and reconstruct it from the inside of their mouth using a small incision from inside their mouth. The shape and advancement of the chin is secured with low profile titanium hardware.

With the advent of CT scans and three-dimensional reconstruction, an accurate duplication of the patient’s facial skeletal and soft tissue anatomy can be recorded.

These newer technologies allow fabrication of custom implants to restore facial harmony and symmetry.

Furthermore, computer programs are available to demonstrate how facial profiles will change with different implants post procedurally.

The custom implant allows the surgeon to vary the shape of the implant three dimensionally depending on the patient’s aesthetic goals.

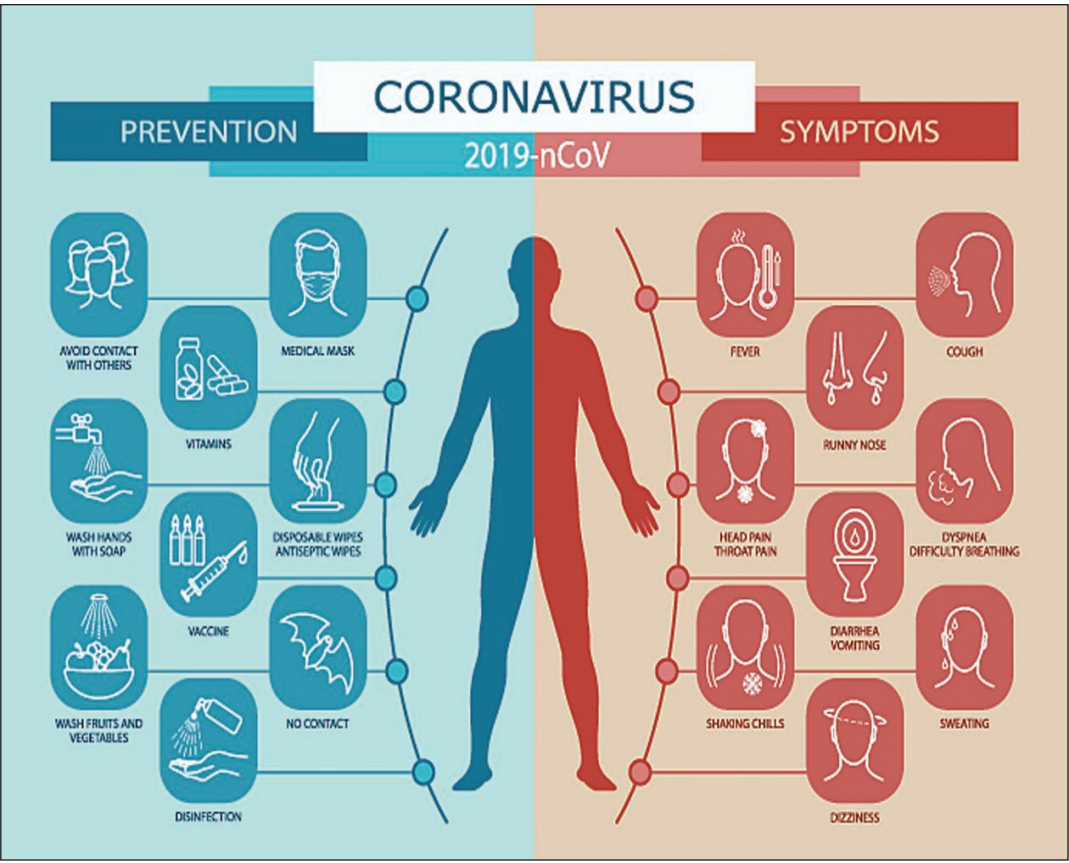
The anatomic shape of the chin is highly discrepant in all three planes across different individuals from various races. There are gold standards of ratios that the surgeon aims to emulate that define facial harmony and aesthetics.

Chin implant surgery is usually an outpatient procedure performed using general anesthesia. The typical time for the procedure itself is 1 to 2 hours though postoperatively down time for patients is less than a week.

A majority of patients experience minimal operative pain which is easily controlled with medications.

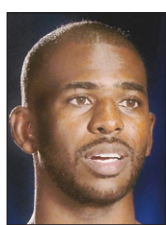

The University of Maryland-Baltimore County pulled off one of the greatest upsets in American sports history at the 2018 NCAA Tournament, knocking off Virginia to become the first No. 16 seed to beat a No. 1.

The madness kept coming that March from Pittsburgh to San Diego. Top-ranked Xavier lost in the second round and so did No. 2 seeds North Carolina and Cincinnati. Two third-seeded teams were bounced early, as were three No. 4 seeds during an opening weekend that epitomized the beloved spectacle the NCAA Tournament has become.

That coast-to-coast excitement won't happen this season: The NCAA announced on Monday it plans to hold the entire 2021 men's tournament in a single geographic area to mitigate the risks of COVID-19. It is in talks with Indianapolis

to serve as the host city.

Instead of all those upsets, buzzer beaters and star-turning performances being spread out at venues across the country, the bracket will be played out at sites in one city, a sort of one-stop shopping version of the sprawling tournament typically played in every region of the U.S.

The news comes nine months after the coronavirus pandemic led to the cancellation of the 2020 tournaments, a severe economic blow not just to the host cities but scores of athletic departments across the country.

"It will be a very controlled environment," NCAA senior vice president of basketball Dan Gavitt said. "It'll be different, it'll be historic and it'll be hopefully something we all treasure and experience just once, hopefully not ever again."

There was no immediate word on the women's tournament, which runs concurrently in March and early April.

The original plan was for the 67 games of the 2021 NCAA Tournament to be played at 13 sites across the country, starting with the First Four in Dayton, Ohio. Regional sites were set for Minneapolis,

Miami has 3 games postponed by virus

No. 12 Miami had its remaining three games postponed Monday because of COVID-19 cases in the program, forcing the Atlantic Coast Conference to reschedule a total of six games over the last month of the season.

Georgia Tech at Miami scheduled for Saturday is now tentatively set for Dec. 19, the date of the ACC championship game. Miami's game at Wake Forest that was scheduled for Nov. 28 was moved to Dec. 5, and its game against North Carolina was moved back a week to Dec. 12.

"What we know is we don't have a coronavirus-in-college-football problem. We have a coronavirus-in-America problem," Miami coach Manny Diaz said Monday. "And everyone, I hope, can see or I would hope can see — you can't say everyone can see, because the way things are in 2020 everybody can't agree on anything — but certainly the math is saying that the numbers are really, really getting to a bad place."

Georgia Tech, which had its game last week against Pittsburgh postponed because of COVID-19 issues with both teams, joins No. 5 Texas A&M and Arizona State as teams that will now go two weeks without playing.

The number of games across major college football scheduled for this weekend that have already been called off is up to seven after four went down Monday, including Mississippi at Texas A&M and Charlotte at No. 15 Marshall.

Lightning laying off 30 workers

Just months after winning the Stanley Cup, officials with the Tampa Bay Lightning said Monday that they are eliminating 30 positions in a sign that even winning a championship does not spare a team from the effects of the coronavirus.

The positions were across the company and effective immediately, team officials said. The layoffs represent less than 10% of the team's workforce.

"Rest assured, these decisions were not made lightly," Lightning and Vinik Sports Group CEO Steve Griggs told the Tampa Bay Times. "But with the sports and entertainment industry being impacted like at no other time in modern history, this was a necessary step as we position ourselves for maximum recovery."

Because the National Hockey League's postseason was played in bubbles in Canada, the team did not earn any revenue from the playoffs. The Lightning lost money last season and is expected to do so again during the upcoming season, team officials said.

Brady-led Tampa Bay working to establish offensive identity

TAMPA — By Tom Brady's own admission, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers are still trying to establish an offensive identity.

The six-time Super Bowl winner is surrounded by an impressive collection of playmakers that have helped him lead the team to its best start in a decade. However, the Bucs (7-3) have not performed with the consistency Brady feels is necessary to realize the team's vast potential.

"I think we're trying to figure it out. It's going to change from week to week based on who we play. That's what teams are all about," Brady said.

"Football is a tough sport," the 43-year-old quarterback added. "There's different matchups every week, there's different elements to every game that are a challenge. It's never really the same."

That was before Sunday's 46-23 rout of the Carolina Panthers, which saw the Bucs rush for 210 yards, gain 544 overall and score on nine consecutive possessions after an early fumble positioned the Panthers for a quick 7-0 lead.

It was exactly the kind of response Brady and coach Bruce Arians were looking for coming off a 38-3 loss to the New Orleans Saints the previous week.

Ronald Jones scored on a 98-yard run and finished with 192 yards rushing as Tampa Bay revived a ground attack that had been nonexistent the previous two weeks, including a league-record-low five carries for 8 yards against the Saints.

Brady, meanwhile, enjoyed better pass protection and threw for 341 yards and three touchdowns without an interception while completing throws to eight players, including Mike Evans, Chris Godwin, Antonio Brown and Rob Gronkowski.

Arians said the dominant performance was a significant step in the right direction, evidence it is possible for the Bucs to have numerous players involved in the offense without force feeding anyone.

"It's all about their egos," the coach said Monday. "If you check your ego at the door and it's all about winning, it's not hard at all."

The Bucs improved to 3-0 in games following a loss this season. They've scored 31, 38 and 46 points in those victories.

"It's a team sport, so the team has got to come together and understand the things we need to improve," Brady said, explaining his knack for rebounding from losses with strong performances.

"Football, it's tough. It's not a game of perfect," Brady added. "You've got a lot of talented players, you've got a lot of talented coaches, and you've got to figure out ways to win. Every week is a little different."

WHAT'S WORKING

The Bucs are 7-3 for the first time since 2010, when they finished 10-6 but didn't make the playoffs. They've already matched their win total for all of last season, while they failed to earn a postseason berth for the 12th consecutive year. That's the second-longest playoff drought in the league.

WHAT NEEDS HELP

The Bucs have played three games with prime-time starts and started slowly in each, losing to Chicago and New Orleans and barely holding off the New York

So, we were not surprised when she told us two years ago that she was "talking" to someone.

If you feel that there is any type of abuse going on, encourage her to seek immediate help. Losing her spouse of 38 years is a traumatic event. A professional therapist could help her regain independence and see this relationship clearly.

Chris Paul sent to Suns in blockbuster trade

Chris Paul holds a \$44 million option for the 2021-22 season, a massive payday that may have kept some teams from trying to trade for the All-Star point guard.

The Phoenix Suns weren't deterred. They have a pair of All-Stars in their backcourt now, with hopes the duo of Paul and Devin Booker — one of the league's most dynamic young scorers — will be enough to get the franchise back to the postseason for the first time since 2010.

The trade sending Paul to the Suns from Oklahoma City was completed Monday night, a blockbuster to start what could be a wild few days of NBA transactions before training camps begin next month.

The particulars: The Suns get Paul and forward Abdel Nader, while the Thunder get Kelly Oubre Jr., Ricky Rubio, Ty Jerome, Jalen Lecque and a protected 2022 first-round pick.

Cousins, Vikings beat Patterson, Bears 19-13

CHICAGO — Kirk Cousins threw for 292 yards and two touchdowns, and the Minnesota Vikings overcame a 104-yard kickoff return by Chicago's Cordarrelle Patterson to beat the Bears 19-13 on Monday night.

Cousins won for the first time in 10 career Monday night starts. He hit Adam Thielen with a 6-yard touchdown early in the fourth quarter to put Minnesota ahead 19-13, and the Vikings (4-5) hung on for their third straight win. They also

snapped a four-game losing streak against Chicago (5-5).

Patterson joined Josh Cribbs and Leon Washington as the only players with eight kick returns for touchdowns when he ran back the opening kickoff of the second half to give Chicago a 13-7 lead. It was the longest kickoff return in franchise history, surpassing Gale Sayers' 103-yarder against Pittsburgh on Sept. 17, 1967.

Big 12 title game Dec. 19 with tickets on sale

IRVING, Texas — The Big 12 plans to play its football championship game Dec. 19 after previously listing that Saturday and the preceding one as tentative dates.

The conference's first public acknowledgment of a set date came Monday when it announced that a limited number of tickets will go on sale to the public Friday for the game at AT&T Stadium, the home of the NFL's Dallas Cowboys.

While the Big 12 didn't provide a specific number for public sales, the Cowboys have averaged 25,750 fans for its five home games so far at the 80,000-seat stadium, with a high of 31,700 against the Pittsburgh Steelers on Nov. 8.

About 10,000 tickets will be held back for allocation to the schools who play in the game.

The SEC and ACC, the other Power Five conferences allowing fans at games this season, are also scheduled to play their championship games Dec. 19. The Big Ten championship game is also scheduled Dec. 19, a day after the Pac-12 title game.

Denver, New York City and Memphis, Tennessee.

As COVID-19 cases across the country spiked and wreaked havoc on the college football season, it became clear to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee that multiple sites would not work.

"We coalesced around a decision that we were not going to be able to host the tournament through 13 different sites," Kentucky athletic director and committee chair Mitch Barnhart said. "Through the pandemic, it was unreasonable to expect that."

Centralizing the tournament will allow a controlled environment with venues, practice facilities, lodging and medical resources all near one another. Indianapolis, the only city the NCAA is currently negotiating with, made the most sense since the Final Four was already scheduled

there for April and NCAA headquarters is on the edge of downtown, walkable from various sites.

The NCAA set a Nov. 25 start date for the season as it tries to bounce back after the cancellation of the 2020 NCAA Tournament led to a \$375 million shortfall in revenue distributed to member institutions.

Schools have scrambled to fill schedules while the coronavirus has ripped through college football, causing the cancellation of more than 60 games. Multiple basketball programs are currently on pause due to COVID-19 and the Ivy League announced last week the cancellation of winter sports, including men's and women's basketball.

Gavitt said there is no plan to change the start date and the NCAA Tournament is expected to be played in March and April as scheduled. No determination has been made on whether fans will be allowed, a decision that will also face individual conferences as their tournaments approach in March.

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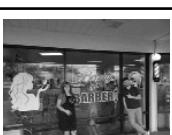
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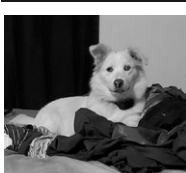

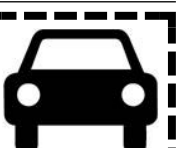
