# Vision still unclear for parkway zoning

## County growth official imagines town centers in Cardinal Street area

MIKE WRIGHT Staff writer

That stretch of Cardinal Street in Homosassa where the Suncoast Parkway will intersect is Citrus County's picture of rural.

Five- and 10-acre tracts of small farms and homes sit on private dirt roads. Commercial activity is scarce and limited. There isn't a stoplight anywhere until U.S. 19.

Citrus County planners,

however, predict that will all change in the years after the Suncoast Parkway's interchange opens sometime in early 2022.

The debate hinges on what exactly that vision looks like.

Mike Sherman, the county's growth management director, is proposing a mixed-use zoning concept that combines residential with stores or offices that can be developed on larger tracts, with the minimum being 20 acres.



# Commissioner: Distance learning will continue

TALLAHASSEE — Florida students will be able to continue to learn remotely through the second half of the school year as the state grapples with the COVID-19 pandemic, Education Commissioner Richard Corcoran

said Wednesday. "From the top down in this state, that will absolutely happen. There is no flexibility for anything but that," Corcoran told the State Board of Education.

The reopening of brick-andmortar classrooms, which were shuttered during the early stages of the pandemic this spring, became a political flashpoint after

districts to offer in-person instruction five days a week or be penalized financially.

Gov. Ron DeSantis and Corcoran have maintained that families need to have the option of choosing face-to-face instruction or distance learning for children, arguing that keeping students away from school can have damaging impacts on students' physical safety, mental health and educational progress.

The Florida Education Association teachers union sued the state in July after Corcoran ordered school districts to offer in-person instruction when the 2020-21 school year began.



#### Sorry, Grinch. Virus won't stop NORAD from tracking Santa

WASHINGTON — Children of the world can rest easy. The global pandemic won't stop them from tracking Santa Claus' progress as he delivers gifts around the globe on Christmas Eve.

The North American Aerospace Defense Command has announced that NORAD will track Santa on Dec. 24, just as it has done for 65 years. But there will be some changes: Not every child will be able to get through to a volunteer at NORAD's call center to check on Santa's whereabouts, as they have in years before.

Normally, 150-160 volunteers crowd into a conference room at Peterson Air Force Base in Colorado Springs, taking two-hour shifts to answer the phones as eager children call to see if Santa and his sleigh have reached their rooftops. All together, 1,500 people over 20 hours have participated in the call center in the past, fielding more than 130,000 phone calls, beginning at 6 a.m. Eastern time on Christmas Eve.

This year, due to safety restrictions forced by the COVID-19 pandemic, the number of volunteers has been drastically cut to what NORAD expects will be fewer than 10 people per

"We understand this is a time-honored tradition, and we know undoubtedly there is going to be some disappointment," said NORAD spokesman Preston Schlachter. "But we're trying to keep it safe for everyone involved."

So, some callers may be able to once again get through to a

member of the military or other volunteer when they dial the NORAD Tracks Santa toll-free number, 1-877-Hi-NORAD. But others will get a recorded update on Santa's current location.

Schlachter said NORAD will largely be limiting volunteers to people who already work there and their immediate families. But that could be expanded a bit as the time gets closer.

He said that this year volunteers will answer health questions and have their temperature checked when they arrive, and a cleaning crew will wipe down surfaces throughout the day. There will be wipes and other supplies available, and between shifts the entire calling area will be sanitized before the next group comes in.

Faced with concerns about the virus, officials at NORAD have worked for weeks to figure out a way to ensure that the much-beloved tradition could go

The military command has been fielding calls since 1955. when Air Force Col. Harry Shoup — the commander on duty at NORAD's predecessor, the Continental Air Defense Command — fielded a call from a child who dialed a misprinted telephone number in a newspaper department store ad, thinking she was calling Santa.

A fast-thinking Shoup quickly assured his caller that he was. And the tradition began.

Today, most early calls come from Japan and Europe, and as the day goes on the callers from the U.S. and Canada climb.

Besides the call center, the NORAD Tracks Santa website noradsanta.org — as well as social media pages.



# Changing parameters doomed financial aid for local businesses

"We can't make you apply. If you don't apply, sorry."

s businesses and nonprofits struggle to regain their foothold in the economic landscape amid the novel coronavirus pandemic, the federal government provided a financial lifeline to businesses nationwide.

But, as the window of opportunity came and went, the county has about \$4.7 million in CARES funds left over after spending what it could to assist local businesses and individuals while still

meeting a Monday, Nov. 16, deadline the state set to have the funds accounted for.

That money will go into the general fund to reimburse the county for sheriff's deputies' payroll, which is an allowable use of CARES funds.

To lay the blame on county officials would be wrong, because there's plenty of blame to go around.

The county could have taken the bull by the horns and launched a full throttle marketing campaign to generate buzz and interest. It could have opened a hotline to answer questions, expedite business licenses and even extended the deadline it set for those.

I worked at the post office in Springfied, Virginia, for 18 years, from 1968 to 1986, when I came to Citrus County. I got to know the postal service pretty well and there are many things about it that most of us don't know. The postal inspectors are an example. The inspection service keeps a very low profile. There were many big crimes which the postal inspectors solved and they deliberately urged others to take

I recall a great young carrier who came to us from the Army. He had been in the honor guard. He was outstanding. I wrote letters which his supervisors signed and he became a postal inspector. Interpol, an international investigative agency, recruits from the Postal Inspection Service and he ultimately went to Interpol. When I was about to retire in 1986, he came from Interpol to say goodbye. That was the last time I saw him. I relate this example of a connection between a post office and Interpol to point out the high regard the world at large has for the U.S. Postal Service.

Even before President Trump, Republicans caused the postal service great harm. In 2006, they passed the Postal Accountability Enhancement Act, requiring the prepayment in advance for employees not yet hired. # **Many Americans** flying for holiday despite CDC pleas

PROVIDENCE, R.I. — Millions of Americans bought tickets to fly somewhere for Thanksgiving before the nation's top public health agency pleaded with them not to travel for the holiday.

So what are they doing now? In many cases, they're still crowding airports and boarding planes. That's despite relatively lenient cancellation policies that major airlines have implemented since the coronavirus pandemic emerged earlier this year.

"Consumers should feel comfortable changing their plans and canceling their flights if they need to for health reasons," said John Breyault of the National Consumers League.

Most airlines won't pay cash to refund a flight if you decide to heed national health warnings but they are waiving fees and offering vouchers. Breyault said to "familiarize yourself with the policies" because the voucher specifics vary by airline and can depend on when the ticket was booked.

It's not clear how many people are taking those vouchers. Images that emerged this weekend of crowded airport terminals showed that plenty of people are flying anyway.

More than 2 million people were screened at U.S. airports on Friday and Saturday, according to the Transportation Security Administration. While that's far lower than during the same time last year, Friday was only the second time since mid-March that daily airport screenings topped 1 million.

A day earlier, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said Americans should skip Thanksgiving travel and not spend the holiday with people from outside their household.

The nation's top infectious diseases expert, Dr. Anthony Fauci, said Sunday he's worried that instances of crowding at U.S. airports from Thanksgiving travel could lead to a perilous situation as COVID-19 cases

Fauci told CBS' "Face the Nation" that people at airports "are going to get us into even more trouble than we're in right now." He said that new COVID-19 cases from Thanksgiving won't become evident until weeks later, making it "very difficult" as the virus spirals out of control heading into colder weather and the December holiday season.

For most people, the new coronavirus causes mild or moderate symptoms, such as fever and cough that clear up in two to three weeks. For some — especially older adults and people with existing health problems — it can cause more severe illness, including pneumonia, and death.

Airlines have emphasized what they're doing to sanitize gates and kiosks, shorten lines and gatherings and purify the air. But most are also offering opportunities for people to skip their holiday flights and travel later, though travelers might have to pay more for the replacement flight if it's more expensive.

Some have argued that airlines should do more. U.S. Sen. Ed Markey, a Massachusetts Democrat who has pushed for cash refunds for skipped flights during the pandemic, said people who dropped their Thanksgiving travel are doing the right thing and following public health guidance.

"Airlines, which have already received billions in government bailouts, should provide passengers cash refunds when they are spending the holiday without both family and economic certainty," he said in an emailed statement Sunday.

# Pompeo touts Iran policy in Gulf

## Ahead of Biden presidency, administration continues squeeze

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates -U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo on Sunday defended his tour of Gulf Arab states and the Trump administration's continued efforts to squeeze Iran, even as a new U.S. administration led by Joe Biden prepares to enter the White House in January.

Although Pompeo has not taken questions from U.S.-based reporters traveling with him over the past 10 days, he sat down with the Saudi-owned broadcaster Al-Arabiya in Dubai for brief televised remarks Sunday.

"Our policies don't change. Our duty doesn't change. My responsibilities don't change," he said. "I still have an obligation — every hour, every minute — to defend the American people and to keep them foremost in our efforts, and we'll do that. We'll do that to the very last minute.

TAMPA — Bruce Arians doesn't mince words or offer excuses when he talks about Tampa Bay's struggles in primetime games this season.

"It's just bad football," the 68-year-old coach said. "Bad football and not being ready to

The Buccaneers (7-3) are off to their best start in a decade in their first season with Tom Brady, however they have lost two of three night games and frankly were fortunate to win the one they did.

The team hopes to buck the trend Monday night against the Los Angeles Rams (6-3), who are coming off an impressive victory over Russell Wilson and the Seattle Seahawks.

"It's just another football game, and that's how we've got to treat it. You can't let it get to your head that it's a prime-time game, that you've got to do this, you've got to do that," Gronkowski said.

"No, it's just another football game. It's just at night this time," the 10th-year pro said. "We've got to show up and do what we've been doing all year, no matter what time the game is. There's no excuses.'

The Rams, coming off a 23-16 victory over the Seahawks in which they forced three turnovers and sacked Wilson six times while holding the Seattle quarterback without a touchdown pass, have been dealing with a bit of a schedule quirk of their own.

# Alabama: Unanimous at No. 1

## Northwestern moves up to 11

Alabama is now a unanimous No. 1 in The Associated Press college football poll, and Northwestern moved up to No. 11 on Sunday for its best ranking in 24 years.

For the second straight week, the top eight teams in the poll held their spots. The Crimson Tide received all 62 first-place votes after beating Kentucky 63-3, making Alabama the first unanimous No. 1 this season and the first team to do it in the

regular season since 2018. Notre Dame was No. 2, followed by Ohio State, Clemson and Texas A&M. Florida was No. 6, and No. 7 Cincinnati and

No. 8 BYU also held their spots. The rest of the top 10 was No. 9 Oregon and Miami.

Northwestern moved up eight spots after beating Wisconsin 17-7 to improve to 5-0. The Badgers slipped eight

spots to 18th. The Wildcats were last ranked this highly in 1996. The year after their surprising run to the Rose Bowl, coach Gary Barnett's team reached a high

of No. 10. No. 12 Indiana dropped three spots after putting a scare into Ohio State in the Big Ten's other top-25 matchup Saturday. The Buckeyes beat the Hoosiers 42-35 after leading 35-7.

#### **POLL POINTS**

This is the 80th time in the history of the AP poll, which dates back to 1936, there has been a unanimous No. 1.

It was a rare occurrence in the early days of the poll, when college football was more regional. From 1936-66, only twice was there a unanimous No. 1.

Southern California was a unanimous No. 1 twice during the 1967 season, but not until the 1990s did the unanimous No. 1 become a common occurrence.

From 1992, when Alabama finished the season by getting all the first-place votes in the poll, to last season when LSU did the same, the AP Top 25 had a unanimous No. 1 on 67 occasions.

## Mitchell gets the max

Donovan Mitchell got the life-changing news Sunday and immediately began celebrating. He ripped off his T-shirt, ran out of the house and leaped into the pool.

And just as he did in his first three seasons with Utah. he made a huge splash.

#### **DALLAS**

Willie Cauley-Stein is returning to the Dallas Mavericks on an \$8.2 million, two-year contract, a person with knowledge of the deal told The Associated Press on Sunday.

The Mavericks acquired the veteran center from Golden State before the trading deadline last season, and his impact was minimal before he opted out of the restart following the coronavirus shutdown because of the impending birth of his daughter.

Cauley-Stein declined the \$2.3 million option on the two-year deal he signed with the Warriors. His return gives Dallas another option behind Kristaps Porzingis and Dwight Powell. It's possible Porzingis and Powell will start, with Powell likely filling the traditional role of the center. Dallas also has Boban Marjanovic in a backup role.

The 27-year-old Cauley-Stein averaged 5.2 points and 4.6 rebounds in 13 games for the Mavericks. His career averages in five seasons are 9.6 points

#### **GOLDEN STATE**

The Warriors completed the trade that will bring guard Kelly Oubre to them from the Oklahoma City Thunder. Golden State gave up a conditional 2021 first-round draft pick and a 2021 second-round pick for Oubre, who will help the Warriors deal with the loss of Klay Thompson to major injury for the second consecutive season.

Thompson missed last season with a torn ACL; he'll miss this season with a torn Achilles.

Oubre averaged career-high 18.7 points and 6.4 rebounds in 56 games with Phoenix last season. He was traded to the Thunder last week.

#### **INDIANA**

The Pacers completed the re-signing of Justin Holiday to a three-year, \$18 million deal. Holiday was the only Indiana player to appear in all 73 regular-season games a year ago, averaging 8.3 points.

"Re-signing Justin was one of our main priorities going into free agency," Pac-President Kevin Pritchard said. "His contributions last season were tremendous. He can play multiple positions and is extremely versatile."

#### **L.A. LAKERS**

For the second consecutive season, Marc Gasol will play for the defending NBA champions.

Gasol agreed to a twoyear contract with the Lakers on Sunday, a person with knowledge of the deal told AP. ESPN first reported the agreement.

The 35-year-old was drafted by the Lakers in 2007 but never played for the team — and now will be part of the franchise that his brother, Pau, won two championships with.

#### **PORTLAND** The Trail Blazers an-

nounced the re-signing of Rodney Hood, who agreed to a two-year contract. Hood tore his Achilles in December 2019. "Rodney played a critical

role in our run to the Western Conference Finals in 2018-19 and was off to a great start last year prior to his season being cut short due to injury," Blazers President Neil Olshey in a news release. "Now fully healthy we expect him to make an immediate impact and are pleased he chose to stay in Portland."

#### Florida men's basketball pauses team activities

CLEVEAND — Looking to replace Tristan Thompson, the Cavaliers have acquired center JaVale McGee and a future draft pick from the Los Angeles Lakers for forwards Alfonzo McKinnie and Jordan Bell, a person familiar with the deal told The Associated Press on Sunday night.

The Cavs will get a second-round pick in 2026 from the Lakers, said the person who spoke on condition of anonymity because the teams have not announced the swap.

On Saturday, Thompson, who played nine seasons with the Cavs and helped them win a championship in 2016, agreed to a two-year, free-agent deal

with the Boston Celtics. The 32-year-old McGee spent the past two seasons with Los Angeles after two with Golden State. The 7-footer averaged 6.6 points, 5.7 rebounds and 1.5 blocks

for the NBA champions this past season. The Lakers needed to move McGee in order to open up salary space after getting Marc Gasol to agree to a two-vear contract.

McGee will likely serve as a backup to Cleveland center Andre Drummond, who picked up his \$28 million player option last week to stay with the Cavs.

#### Apple Cup canceled due to coronavirus at Wazzu

SEATTLE — The Apple Cup between Washington and Washington State scheduled for Friday was canceled Sunday due to the Cougars not having enough scholarship players available because of positive COVID-19 tests and contact tracing.

The cancellation raises the possibility that the in-state rivals will not play for the first time since 1944, although both schools say they are hopeful to reschedule if an open date presents itself.

The Pac-12 Conference announced the cancelation and per policy, the game will be declared a no-contest. But there could be potential options for playing the rivalry matchup at the end of the season should neither team end up in the Pac-12 championship game.

# Streb nearly holes out in a playoff for win

"We were planning on the ball kind of knuckling out of there and jumping," Streb said. "You're kind of at the mercy of whatever you get and it came out really well. I was just hoping it would land soft, and obviously it just worked out as good as you could hope for."

Streb was one shot behind until his 6-iron on the par-3 17th took a good hop to 12 feet away for a birdie that allowed him to catch Kisner and close with a 2-under 68.

Kisner, who won at Sea Island in 2015 for the first of his three PGA Tour titles, closed with a 63 and had a 15-foot birdie putt on the 18th in the first extra hole that narrowly missed. Streb had to make an 8-footer to extend the playoff, and he ended it with one swing.

Kisner's tee shot was buried in deep rough, leaving him little Robert Streb now has two PGA chance of holding the green. He saw where Streb hit his pitching wedge and knew he had to hole his long chip, which raced 20 feet by the hole. He made it for a meaningless par.
