Landfill sets additional drop-off day

Citrus County Landfill's Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) disposal program offers an additional drop-off day each quarter for no additional charge. The next quarterly HHW drop-off day will be from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Oct. 9 at the Citrus County Landfill, 230 W. Gulf-to-Lake Highway in Lecanto.

As a reminder, residents who can use the regular HHW program on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday of each week are encouraged to do so. This Saturday collection is no different from their weekly program, but is meant to facilitate residents who work or are otherwise unable to participate during the week.

Wait times will be longer on a Saturday HHW drop-off day. Assessed households may bring up to 10 gallons (or 60 pounds) of household hazardous waste for proper disposal from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

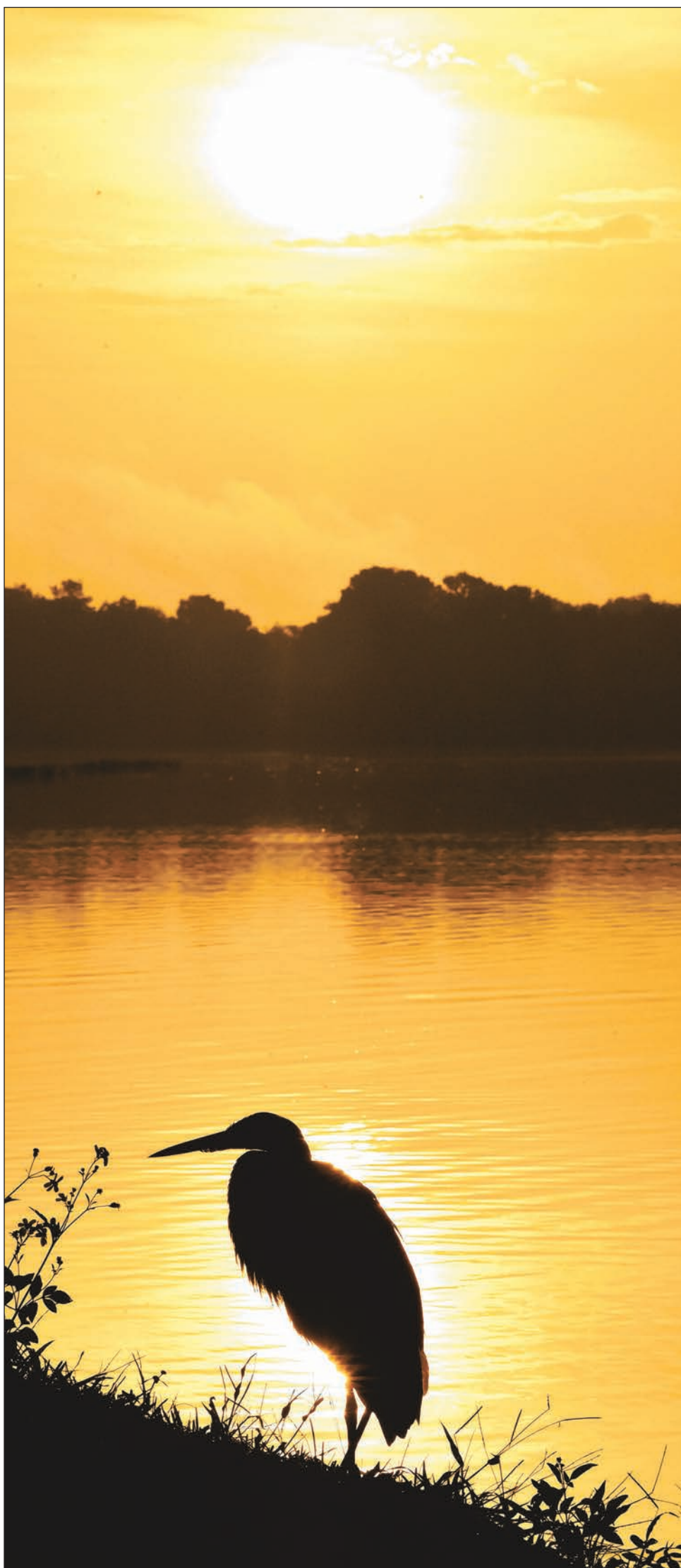

How to find out if your road was resurfaced

In 2020, gas tax revenue was used to resurface 120 roads in Citrus County — almost twice as many as the 67 the previous year.

So far in 2021, the county has resurfaced 73 roads with gas tax money, according to data provided by the county's Office of Management & Budget.

The department also provided the Chronicle with a list of local roads resurfaced from gas taxes since 2019. To see if your road was on it, visit tinyurl.com/3j9hvux9

After county commissioners broached the possibility of putting a sales tax hike on a referendum to help pay for road resurfacing, the reaction from local residents has been overwhelmingly negative.

A similar referendum in 2014 was overwhelmingly shot down by voters.

The Chronicle has received scores of emails, Facebook posts and Sound Offs from people wondering why the money collected from the 1-cent gas tax is not doing that job.

It can and is being used for that purpose but the problem is, it's not enough, County Commissioner Holly Davis told the Chronicle.

In fiscal year 2019, the county netted \$8.9 million

Florida families seek to block mask order

TALLAHASSEE — Attorneys for families of children with disabilities have asked a federal appeals court to block an executive order by Gov. Ron DeSantis aimed at preventing school mask requirements during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The attorneys filed a 34-page motion Thursday at the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals seeking an injunction against the executive order while an appeal of a lower-court ruling moves forward.

In the lower-court ruling, U.S. District Judge K. Michael Moore last month refused to issue a preliminary injunction against DeSantis' executive order. But the filing Thursday said children with disabilities are at a "heightened risk of severe illness or death if they contract COVID-19" and can't safely attend school without mask requirements.

CH golf cart unit burns down for second time

85 carts destroyed in fire

The golf cart storage building at Citrus Hills Golf and Country Club has been destroyed by a fire for the second time in seven years.

At approximately 12:15 a.m. Oct. 8, Citrus County Fire Rescue responded to the 10,000 square foot storage building, which was engulfed in flames, according to a press release. The previous incident occurred Dec. 15, 2014.

Responding to the scene were firefighters from Connell Heights, Kensington, Citrus Springs, Pine Ridge, Hernando and Highlands. A safety captain and the rehab unit from Citrus Springs also responded.

According to fire rescue, the building was unoccupied at the time of the fire and no injuries were reported. The fire was under control at 1:25 a.m. In addition, the building did not have a fire sprinkler system.

The Florida State Fire Marshal's Office was called to the scene to investigate and the last unit cleared the scene at 4:34 a.m.

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Police: Driver was going 116 mph before crash

PALM HARBOR — A Florida man who investigators say was driving his Tesla at least 116 mph before crashing into a house was arrested Friday and charged with two counts of vehicular homicide.

Vaughn Mongan, 43, didn't have his car in autopilot mode when he ran a stop sign last month, hit an embankment, went airborne and crashed into a house, killing one of its occupants, according to the Florida Highway Patrol.

One of the three passengers in the car also died. Mongan and two other passengers were seriously injured, the department said. Mongan was driving in a residential neighborhood in a 30 mph zone. Mongan was also charged with three counts of reckless driving resulting in serious injury and one count of reckless driving resulting in property damage.

General Manager of the club, Anthony Lambert, said 85 carts were destroyed in the fire and the cost of damages have not yet been estimated.

Lambert said the cause of the fire is still unknown, but he believes it was an electric or battery issue. "We'll find a fleet of golf carts to rent until we can work to get a brand new fleet," he added.

He said the course will have to close for a few days to coordinate the rental. "We're not going to be able to snap our fingers today and have carts tomorrow," Lambert said.

In addition, the course will have to replace and rebuild the storage building.

"It's part of business," Lambert said. "Things happen and we gotta react to it."

from the gas tax. In 2020, it was \$8.8 million. The final receipts are not yet in for the 2021 cycle.

County Administrator Randy Oliver said the county needs about \$10 million per year to resurface all residential roads on a 20- to 25-year cycle," Oliver said.

Commissioners at their Nov. 9 meeting will discuss the gas tax and other options to pay for road resurfacing. One option will be a half-cent or full-cent sales tax increase.

The allocation of gas tax funds is a complicated process and counties are restricted by Florida Statute as to uses.

Colleen Scott, director of the office of management and budget, provided to the Chronicle this breakdown:

- Citrus County levies 1 cent on every net gallon of fuel sold within the county.
- Citrus also has a Local Option Gas Tax divided into two parts: The first tax of 6 cents is on every net gallon of fuel sold in the county and is used to fund transportation expenditures.
- The second tax of 5 cents is only on motor fuel (excluding diesel).
- Citrus County receives a constitutional fuel tax of 2 cents. The allocation of these funds is based on geographic area, population, and gas collections. Any surplus funds can be used for acquisition, construction, and maintenance of roads.

The road resurfacing issues will come up at 9 a.m. Nov. 9 at the Citrus County Courthouse, 110 N. Apopka Ave., Inverness.

The underlying lawsuit contends that the state has violated the Americans with Disabilities Act and another law, the Rehabilitation Act, that protect the rights of people with disabilities. DeSantis' executive order and subsequent Florida Department of Health rules were designed to give parents of schoolchildren the ability to "opt out" of mask requirements — though some school districts have refused to go along with DeSantis on the issue.

"The governor's order unlawfully discriminates against the families (of children with disabilities) by prohibiting local school districts from adopting universal masking mandates as a reasonable accommodation for the families' disabilities," Thursday's motion said. "By requiring schools to give parents and their children an unqualified right to opt out from masking, the governor's order has removed the one reasonable means that would permit disabled children to attend school without risking their health."

The motion was the latest development in a series of legal battles in state, federal and administrative courts stemming from the July 30 executive order. DeSantis argues that parents should be able to decide whether

children wear masks, and the state Department of Education is pursuing financial penalties against districts that restrict the ability of parents to opt out of mask mandates.

The disabilities lawsuit was filed in August and includes the families of 15 children with a variety of disabilities such as Down syndrome, autism-spectrum disorders and chronic kidney disease.

In his Sept. 15 decision rejecting a preliminary injunction, Moore wrote that the plaintiffs should have pursued administrative claims before filing the lawsuit. He said the plaintiffs have different circumstances, requiring "unique solutions."

"The court finds all plaintiffs would be substantially benefited by pursuing administrative remedies that can provide tailored solutions to each child's individual needs,"

Moore wrote.

The plaintiffs filed a notice Monday of appealing Moore's decision and followed with the motion Thursday seeking an injunction against the executive order while the appeal is pending. The motion took issue with Moore's ruling that plaintiffs should have exhausted administrative remedies before filing the lawsuit.

"The families do not challenge the quality of their children's education at their public schools," the motion said. "They instead seek a reasonable accommodation that permits their disabled children to safely enter their schools. Every other federal court to consider a similar claim by disabled students against a universal masking bar in schools during COVID-19 has found that the claims do not require exhaustion."

If the Atlanta-based appeals court does not grant the injunction, attorneys it "expedite" briefing and peals court does not grant for the families asked that arguments in the case.

Senator wants answers

Marco Rubio asks questions about prison rape scandal

MIAMI — U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio told the director of the U.S. Bureau of Prisons he's "deeply concerned" over the failure to protect inmates at a federal prison in Florida.

In a letter to director Michael Carvajal, the Florida senator also inquired about the Federal Correctional Complex Coleman's handling of a recent audit that reviewed how incidents of rape behind bars are handled.

The Miami Herald reported in August about the agony of survivors frustrated that no criminal charges have been brought against prison officers for raping and abusing women housed at the women's facility in Sumter County.

The father of Carleane Berman, who died of a drug overdose after her release, has publicly pushed for criminal charges against the officers who raped her, the Herald reported.

The U.S. government paid out around \$12 million earlier this year in a settlement with 15 women who claimed sexual abuse at the prison. At least six of eight Coleman corrections officers admitted to "sexual conduct" with female inmates at the sprawling prison complex, the Herald reported. Seven have resigned or retired.

Rubio questioned an audit conducted in April. The audit is required under the Prison Rape Elimination Act, which requires correctional

facilities to have safeguards to protect inmates from being sexually attacked or abused, whether by fellow inmates or staff members.

He asked why no female inmates were interviewed when auditors visited the prison in April.

"It appears that all

A lawsuit filed by female inmates alleged that prison officials often moved them to solitary housing at a local county jail, to keep them silent or in fear. They also said officers took them to "dead spots" in the women's facility, where surveillance cameras could not capture them being raped.

"The allegations made by inmates at FCI Coleman raise serious questions as to the facility's compliance with PREA and the conduct of its officers," wrote Rubio, citing coverage in the Herald and the Tampa Bay Times.

The Herald said the bureau of prisons declined comment on Rubio's letter, saying it responds directly to members of Congress and their staff.

Ron Berman, the father of Carleane Berman, said he's glad that the Bureau of Prisons is getting public pressure, and he wants more elected leaders to demand answers.

Nonprofit helps at-risk girls to succeed

When Avon Hambrick, now 66, graduated from high school at age 17, she didn't have a clue what to do next.

As she would tell you, she went on to make some mistakes in life, but she has learned from them.

She said she used to look back on her life and think, "If only I had help in this area," or "I wish someone would've taught me that."

And then one day she realized if she had those thoughts, there must be others who also don't have a clue.

So, in 2007, Hambrick started a nonprofit organization, Life Skills Service Center, specifically targeting young, at-risk teen girls, working with them as a mentor in the areas of financial, physical and spiritual wellness.

Hambrick, who lives in Wildwood and has thus far worked with girls from Sumter and Lake counties, recently opened a thrift store in Inverness, hoping to expand her ministry in Citrus County.

She said her tie to Inverness is Bishop Larry Chester, the former pastor of Citadel of Life Church in Inverness, where she attended church for many years, and also her friendship with Bishop Doug Alexander.

"What I've been doing, we have a partnership with Sumter Prep Academy, the alternative school in Wildwood, and Life Skills provides personal care packages for the students," she said.

"Then we have a summer program called 'Trade for Training.' We partner with Career Source and Manpower, and Career Source identifies the girls that would be summer interns with us and Manpower pays them for their hours."

Hambrick said she hopes to do something similar in Citrus County.

She said she works with small groups, about four at a time.

In summer 2020, because of COVID, she had two girls in the program.

"The first thing I do is find out

about them, what their passion is, what their gifts are," she said. "There's a lot of self-discovery."

She gets them to find out who they are, what they want to do, what they're good at, and then build on that.

They learn about budgeting and finance, scholarships, the types of vocations they can get training for in a year or less to get them started in life.

"You know girls, they have to have their nails done, their hair done, go out to eat. So I have them make a list of what they spend their money on, and they're surprised," she said.

"So we work on a budget, how much money they need to make."

One girl was having trouble with math, so Hambrick brought in a tutor for her.

"Whatever is needed for them to succeed," she said. "My whole thing is preventative. Get them now before they make mistakes that set them back."

She brings them to volunteer, and they do creative projects and

Inverness man accused of stealing from veterans group

An Inverness man was arrested after stealing ramps and railings from a local veterans organization to recycle for money, according to a Citrus County Sheriff's Office arrest affidavit.

Alan Lemay, 60, was arrested and charged with grand theft and two counts of trafficking or endeavoring to traffic in stolen property. Bond was set at \$12,000.

On Sept. 14, deputies worked a theft case where aluminum ramps and railings were stolen from the Citrus County Veterans Coalition and brought to Crystal River Metal Recycling. They were valued at \$3,000.

Deputies arrested Lemay's co-defendant and later discovered he also took part in the incident. On Oct. 7, deputies made contact with him at his residence.

In Lemay's yard was a black Chrysler, the same vehicle the manager of Crystal River Metal

Recycling alleged dropped off the stolen metal.

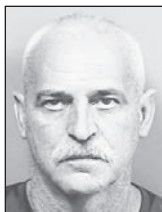
Post Miranda, Lemay reportedly told deputies he loaded the aluminum in his van and transported it to the Inverness boat ramp to try and attach railings to a boat he did not own. He then said

he returned to this location and put the aluminum back where he found it and did not see it again.

Deputies told Lemay the manager of Crystal River Metal and Recycling provided a photo of his car when the aluminum was recycled on Aug. 12 and 16. A witness also saw Lemay loading the aluminum into his van with the co-defendant.

The co-defendant reportedly told deputies Lemay was present during the incident. When deputies showed Lemay the photos taken by the manager, he said he had been deceived, but did not say by who and pleaded the Fifth (Amendment).

Lemay was placed under arrest and transported to the Citrus County Jail.

Motorcycle gang shootout on Interstate 4 leaves one woman near death; one man arrested

LAKELAND — Two motorcycle gang members got into a shootout on a Florida interstate early Friday, leaving a woman riding with the instigator near death from a bullet to the head, authorities said.

Polk County Sheriff Grady Judd said Ronald Donovan and other members of the Sin City Deciples motorcycle gang were driving eastbound on Interstate 4 between Tampa and Orlando shortly after midnight when members of the Thug Riders passed them.

Judd said that offended Donovan, 38, who opened fire on the Thug Riders, hitting one in the back and causing a running gun battle at speeds of 100 mph. The wounded rider, whose name was not released, returned fire, hitting Donovan's passenger in the head, Judd said. He said the woman, 33, is not expected to survive.

The Thug Rider and witnesses called 911.

Judd said that when deputies arrived, they saw a motorcycle driving off from where the Sin

City Deciples had parked. They found no guns or gang paraphernalia and believe the fleeing rider took those with him, Judd said.

He said Donovan refused to cooperate, but witnesses told investigators what happened. Bullet casings lined the highway, which was closed for several hours, he said.

Judd warned against the shooting leading to further violence between the gangs.

"We can expect the Sin City Deciples ... and the Thug Riders to get all dusted up and be mean-mouthing each other on social media. Let me tell you, retaliation will get you all locked up," he said.

Donovan is charged with two counts of attempted murder for shooting the Thug Rider and for precipitating the shooting of his passenger, authorities said. Under Florida law, committing certain felonies that result in an indirect death can be charged as murder.

Donovan was being held without bail pending a court hearing. It is unknown if he has a lawyer who could comment.

Cuba's danzón
genre: '150 years
later, it's still alive.'

MATANZAS, Cuba — A man in a white guayabera approaches a woman and stretches out his hand, palm up, inviting her to dance. She stands up and waves her fan. On the dance floor, they get closer.

Such a scene at the end of the 19th century in Cuba was scandalous in some circles. It was also a new musical genre, the danzón.

Now some danzón scores from that time that were lost in the archives in the Cuban city of Matanzas have been rediscovered. Four of them were recently recorded by the Failde Orchestra, highlighting what became the national dance of Cuba and later spread to other countries in the region.

Recording the scores is important so that society today and future generations "have a reference for what was their identity," said musicologist **Maria Victoria Oliver**.

She and colleagues found the scores after checking the archives of several Matanzas institutions, including the provincial library, the concert band and the local museum. Even though the danzón started in the city in 1879, there were few written records of it until the early 20th century.

The 16 pieces that were discovered included both danzones and danzonetes, the latter being a variation that incorporated vocal interpretation and other changes. Several are part of the album "Joyas Inéditas," or "Unpublished Jewels." It is produced by the Egrem label, with arrangements and performance by the Failde Orchestra, led by

flutist **Ethiel Failde**, a great-great-grandnephew of the creator of danzón.

"It is a great joy to be able to find unpublished scores that allow us to demonstrate an evolution of the genre," said Oliver. The work was cumbersome and included "translation" of the scores, since the 19th century writing method was different from that of today and arrangements had to be made to update the music without losing its essence.

Located 60 miles east of Havana, Matanzas had electricity even before the capital, thanks to its huge bay, a transit point for Cuban sugar exports as well as the arrival of enslaved people to work on sugar plantations in defiance of European bans on slavery.

The city retains vestiges of the sugar boom: stately mansions and other old homes with wood-lined walls and high ceilings that hosted the emergence of danzón, a precursor of other musical genres such as the mambo or chachachá.

The danzón spread to the Dominican Republic and Mexico, where it has passionate followers today.

The first danzón had origins in the old Spanish contradanzas, danced in pairs but physically distanced, and it incorporated the Cuban musical heritage that had roots in Africa.

It was premiered by **Miguel Failde** and his orchestra from Matanzas in 1879 and titled "The Heights of Simpson."

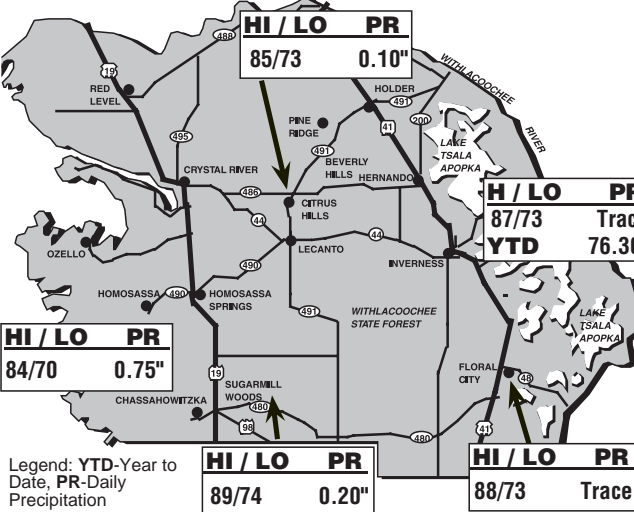
The album "Joyas Inéditas," recorded in February, includes the rescued danzones "El Naranjero," "Cuba Libre," "A La Habana me Voy" and "Nievecita" by Miguel Failde himself.

"I am happy because it will be my tribute to Miguel Failde," said descendant **Ethiel Failde**, who now conducts the orchestra, made up of artists mostly in their 20s.

"It is one of the Cuban genres that has lasted the longest," Failde said. "150 years later, it's still alive."

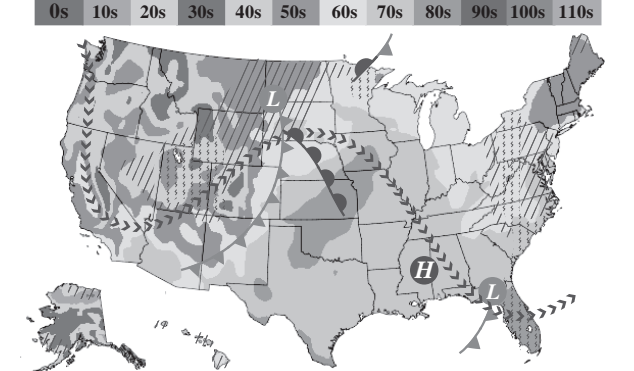

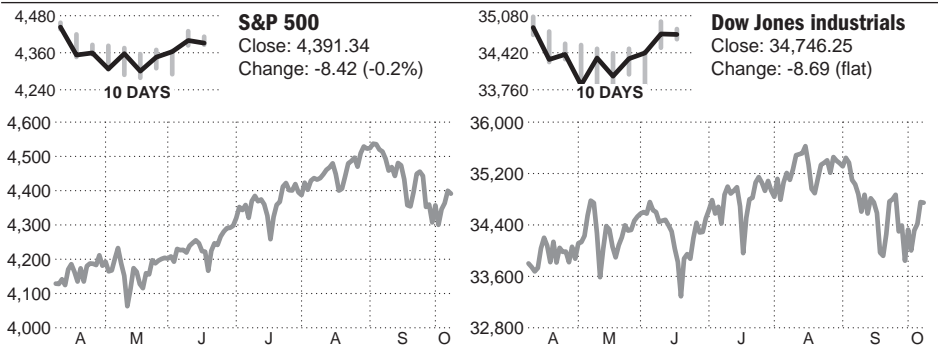

Stock indexes close lower

Wall Street capped a wobbly day of trading with a broad slide for stocks Friday, after a weak jobs report raised questions about the Federal Reserve's timeline to pare back its immense support for markets.

The S&P 500 fell 0.2% after wavering between small gains and losses for much of the day. The modest drop snapped a three-day winning streak for the benchmark index. Even so, it managed a 0.8% gain for the week, less than half of the index's loss last week.

Wall Street reacted with uncertainty and disappointment to the highly anticipated September jobs report. U.S. stocks moved up and down throughout the day, as did Treasury yields.

The yield on the 10-year Treasury climbed to 1.60% from 1.57% late Thursday after initially dropping to 1.56% immediately following the jobs report's release.

Small company stocks fell more than the broader market. The Russell 2000 index dropped 17 points, or 0.8%, to 2,233.09.

Much of Wall Street assumed the job market had improved enough for the Fed to soon begin paring back its monthly purchases of bonds meant to hold down longer-term interest rates. Investors had also pegged the central bank to begin lifting short-term interest rates late next year. Current super-low interest rates have been one of the main forces driving stocks to record heights.

But Friday's jobs report showed that employers added just 194,000 jobs last month, well short of the 479,000 that economists expected. Many investors still expect the Fed to stick to its timetable, but the numbers were weak enough to at least raise questions about whether it may wait longer to taper its bond purchases or to

eventually raise short-term rates.

Underneath the surface, the numbers don't offer much more clarity. The unemployment rate ticked down to 4.8% from 5.1%, and the government revised past months' hiring numbers higher. But last month's hiring was still the weakest since December 2020. Average wages also rose a bit faster from August than expected, which helps workers but adds to worries about inflation.

Inflation remains a big concern for investors after climbing to its highest level in at least a decade, in part because of snarled supply chains as the global economy reboots from its pandemic-caused shutdown. Those supply chain issues will be a key point for investors as they review companies' next round of quarterly financial reports

Life as we know it is precious, precarious and, at times, short.

One minute, we’re young and invincible. Life sets in and we realize, we’re not as young, nor as invincible as we once thought.

However, when we lose children, regardless of their age, it’s hard to understand. We learn just how precious life is.

We will never see what path Antonio Hicks’ future might have had in store for him. Neither will his family, his teammates, classmates or teachers after his collapsing at practice Tuesday, Sept. 28, and dying at Citrus Memorial Hospital.

“This is beautiful, but I have a message for you: God don’t make no mistakes. I love my son, but it was God’s time for him,” said Henry Hicks, Antonio’s father, speaking directly to the young people in the crowd, said.

Hicks’ father reminded his teammates, peers and others, his son left Earth “doing exactly what he loved to do.”

“My son’s message to everyone is ‘Be great ... and follow Christ,’” Henry Hicks added. But Hicks’ accomplishments in 16 years should not be lost on any of us.

“It fills my heart with joy that God gave me 16 years with this young man who touched so many people. I’m truly thankful,” Antonio’s mother, Lakesha Harrison, said at the vigil.

As we mourn, we should all strive to have such a positive impact on others’ lives the way Antonio Hicks did in his 16 years.

Diet can prevent breast cancer

Every October Breast Cancer “Awareness” Month rolls around and there are a flurry of articles about the importance of early detection. Yes, it is true, if detected early enough, many breast cancers are curable, if not treatable. What we do not see is any information on how to prevent breast cancer from forming in the first place. Did you know that only 3% - 5% of breast cancers are genetically linked? That means that most breast cancers are linked to lifestyle factors and the primary one is diet.

Most breast cancers are hormone-driven (estrogen), so the key is to reduce your exposure to excess estrogen over your life. Unfortunately, our food is dripping in added hormones. Dairy is the biggest culprit. Milk, by definition, is made by cows that are pregnant or breastfeeding, both of which are high estrogen situations. This mammalian estrogen is passed to humans and is biologically active in humans when it is consumed. Cheese is essentially concentrated estrogen (not to mention all the

saturated fat and antibiotics you get with it as well). Other animal products, such as chicken, are injected with hormones to promote rapid growth and these are passed along to use when we eat them. Eating animal protein has also been shown to increase the rate of growth of all types of cancer cells.

Other lifestyle factors to avoid are alcohol consumption and smoking. It is also important to maintain a healthy weight as fat cells actually make estrogen, which makes estrogen sensitive cancers develop and grow.

Other than ditching dairy and reducing or eliminating animal protein what can you do to reduce your risk of breast cancer? Increase the fiber in your diet. Fiber sweeps up extra estrogen in your gut and eliminates it from your body. Have at least one serving of soy a day, soy milk, tofu and tempeh are all great choices. Despite a myth that does not seem to go away, soy is protective against breast cancer. It decreases your risk of getting breast cancer in the first place and if you have had breast cancer it reduces the chance of recurrence.

Bottom line, the power to prevent breast cancer is in your hands.

Make a few diet changes and your risk drops dramatically. Let’s make breast cancer history.

IS bomber kills 46 inside Afghan mosque, challenges Taliban

KABUL, Afghanistan — An Islamic State suicide bomber struck at a mosque packed with Shiite Muslim worshippers in northern Afghanistan on Friday, killing at least 46 people and wounding dozens in the latest security challenge to the Taliban as they transition from insurgency to governance.

In its claim of responsibility, the region's IS affiliate identified the bomber as a Uygher Muslim, saying the attack targeted both Shiites and the Taliban for their purported willingness to expel Uyghers to meet demands from China. The statement was carried by the IS-linked Amaq news agency.

The blast tore through a crowded mosque in the city of Kunduz during Friday noon prayers, the highlight of the Muslim religious week. It was the latest in a series of IS bombings and shootings that have targeted Afghanistan's new Taliban rulers, as well as religious institutions and minority Shiites since U.S. and NATO troops left in August.

Biden won't invoke executive privilege on Trump Jan. 6 documents

WASHINGTON — President Joe Biden will not block a tranche of documents sought by a House committee's investigation into the Jan. 6 insurrection at the U.S. Capitol, setting up a showdown with former President Donald Trump, who has pledged to try to keep records from his time in the White House from being turned over to investigators.

In a letter to the Archivist of the United States, White House counsel Dana Remus writes that Biden has determined that invoking executive privilege "is not in the best interests of the United States." This comes days after Trump lawyers sought to block the testimony of former Trump officials to the House committee citing executive privilege. On Friday, a lawyer for Steve Bannon said the former White House aide won't comply with the House committee's

investigation because of Trump's claim. In the letter, Remus writes that the documents reviewed "shed light on events within the White House on and about January 6 and bear on the Select Committee's need to understand the facts underlying the most serious attack on the operations of the Federal Government since the Civil War."

100-year-old denies being accessory to murder at Nazi camp

BERLIN — A 100-year-old man on trial for his alleged role as a Nazi SS guard at a concentration camp during World War II told a German court Friday that he was innocent.

The defendant is charged with 3,518 counts of accessory to murder at the Sachsenhausen concentration camp near Berlin, where he allegedly worked between 1942 and 1945 as an enlisted member of the Nazi Party's paramilitary wing.

German news agency dpa reported that the defendant, who was identified only as Josef S. in keeping with German privacy rules, said on the second day of his trial before the Neuruppin state court that he didn't know the Sachsenhausen camp.

Texas moves to reinstate nation's toughest abortion law

AUSTIN — Texas on Friday asked a federal appeals court to swiftly reinstate the most restrictive abortion law in the U.S., as some abortion clinics in the state resumed normal services for the first time since early September.

The request by Republican Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton came two days after a judge in Austin suspended the law known as Senate Bill 8, which bans abortions once cardiac activity is detected, usually around six weeks.

His office is seeking an emergency order that would freeze the ruling issued Wednesday by U.S. District Judge Robert Pitman, who called the law an "offensive deprivation" of the constitutional right to an abortion.

Mandates drive vaccine increase

Demand set to spike in coming weeks

The number of Americans getting COVID-19 vaccines has steadily increased to a three-month high as seniors and people with medical conditions seek boosters, and government and employer mandates push more workers to take their first doses.

Demand is expected to spike in a few weeks if regulators authorize the Pfizer vaccine for elementary school children, and some states are reopening mass vaccination clinics in anticipation.

In Missouri, a mass vaccination site at a former Toys R Us store is set to open Monday. Virginia plans to roll out nine large vaccination centers over the next few weeks, including one at the Richmond International Raceway.

Colorado opened four mass vaccination sites in mid-September, largely to deal with employer mandates, and officials saw a 38% increase in vaccinations statewide during the first week.

The total number of doses being administered in the U.S. is climbing toward an average of 1 million per day, almost double the level from mid-July — but still far below last spring. The increase is mainly due to boosters, with nearly 10% of the nation's over-65 population already getting third shots, but there are signs of increased demand from other groups as well.

On Thursday, 1.1 million doses were given, including just over 306,000 to newly vaccinated people, said Dr. Cyrus Shahpar, the White House COVID-19 data director.

Organizers of the effort to reach the roughly 67 million unvaccinated American adults say the rise in demand can be traced to approval of the Pfizer booster, mandates that have forced employees to choose between the shot and their jobs and sobering statistics that show nearly all COVID-19 deaths are among the unvaccinated.

"We're seeing people who need the shot to keep a job," said Dr. Ricardo Gonzalez-Fisher,

who runs a mobile vaccine clinic mostly for Latinos in Colorado.

Last weekend, his clinic delivered 30 shots to people outside the Mexican Consulate in Denver. "On these days, 30 is a very good number," he said.

Virginia's state vaccine coordinator, Dr. Danny Avula, said opening the large vaccination centers, will allow local health departments to focus on reaching underserved communities. "This should really help relieve the burden for our local providers," he said.

Vice President Kamala Harris stopped Friday at vaccine center in Newark, New Jersey, where she met with patients and health care workers and encouraged people to get the shot.

"There will be an end to this," she said. "We really feel we are starting to get in front of this."

Roughly 28 million more U.S. children could be eligible for reduced-dose kids' shots as early as November if regulators give their approval. Regulators have yet to take up the question of booster shots for people who got the Moderna or the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, but that's likely coming soon.

Brazil tops 600,000 virus deaths

SAO PAULO — Bars in Brazil's biggest metropolis, Sao Paulo, are full again for Friday happy hours and lawmakers in the capital have nearly done away with video sessions via Zoom. Rio de Janeiro's beaches are packed and calls for strict social distancing seem but a memory.


These developments are part of Brazil's bid to return to pre-pandemic normalcy, even as its death toll tops 600,000, according to official data on Friday from the health ministry. Relief in both COVID-19 cases and deaths have been particularly welcome given experts' warnings that the delta variant would produce another wave of destruction in the

country with the second-most victims. So far, that hasn't materialized.

The country's average daily death toll has hovered around 500 for a month, down sharply from more than 3,000 in April. Almost 45% of the population is fully vaccinated, and a booster shot is being administered to the elderly, an online research site.

Improvement has

encouraged mayors and governors to admit fans into soccer matches, and let bars and restaurants stay open until the wee hours. Some are even contemplating the end of mask mandates, which people often ignore already. And Rio's mayor has announced plans to bring back the city's massive New Year's Eve party on Copacabana beach.

'Who am I?'

Church's FamilySearch.org helps answer genealogical questions

For the past 100 years, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has been collecting and making available family history records to help answer the fundamental question, "Who am I?"

And for the past 20 years, the church has been digitizing those records, a large portion of which are now available.

According to KSL.com, "Throughout the digitization process, the Church has released the records as they were digitized. Now at the finish line, 2.4 million rolls of microfilm were digitally saved, preserving the records of over 11.5 billion people from over 200 countries and principalities, and making them accessible for their descendants and family history enthusiasts. The documents contain over 100 languages."

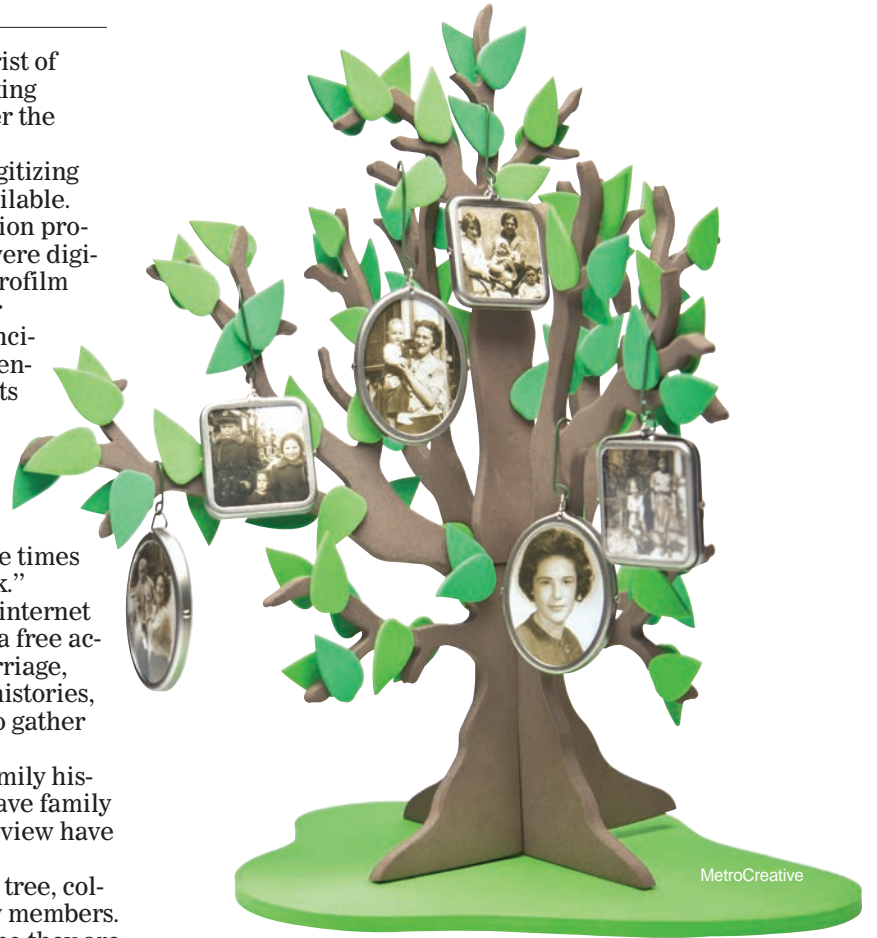

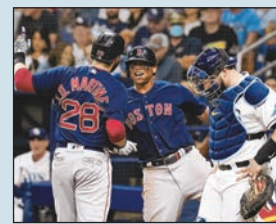

Big play Warriors roll past Bell Creek

LECANTO — The second play from scrimmage was a sign of things to come for the Seven Rivers Christian offense Friday night at Warrior Park.

Brent Summers took the handoff, broke through the middle of the Bell Creek Academy defense and raced 90 yards for a touchdown, just a little over two minutes into the game.

"It builds me up. After that I knew the safeties were going to crash and I just had to run it right up the middle," Summers said. "We ran that play a couple times. Every time there was just a huge gap right down the middle of the field. It was just a matter of getting past the defensive line and after that I was free."

The Warriors rolled up 577 yards of offense and had touchdowns of 90, 35, 17, 8, 73, 41 and 45 yards in a 46-21 triumph over the Panthers.

Summers finished the night

with 217 yards rushing on just 13 carries, for an incredible 16.7 yards per attempt.

"Brent's a hard runner. He did a great job seeing the hole. He hit it as hard as he could. It was a good night for him," Seven Rivers coach Monty Vann said.

Nehemiah Vann passed for 223 yards and three scores and ran for 34 yards and another touchdown. Mario Aguilera was his favorite target on the night, catching five passes for 157 yards and a trio of TDs.

"I trust my offense to do anything, whether it's pass or run," Summers said.

Lecanto's Malmberg rushes for 246 yards, 3 TDs against CR

LECANTO — Sometimes, it pays to keep it simple.

The Lecanto offensive coaches didn't call too many different plays on Friday night. They didn't have to. Out of their first 49 offensive snaps, the Panthers ran the ball on 47 of them, and most were of the pound-it-up-the-middle variety.

Luke Malmberg made sure they didn't need to do anything else. The senior padded his county-best rushing statistics with 246 yards and three touchdowns, as Lecanto repeated as county champion with a 30-6 victory over

visiting Crystal River.

"It feels really good to go back-to-back two years in a row," Malmberg said. "We've been working on a new play and it just worked well. Our O-line blocked their butts off and we did really well."

What exactly was the new play? Even that answer was simple.

"Power," Malmberg said.

It seemed like the Pirates (2-5) had the early momentum, forcing a three-and-out that was followed by a short

punt on the game's opening drive. But Crystal River couldn't fully take advantage of the short field and settled for a 30-yard field goal by Zach Van Fleet.

Za'mauri Johnson recovered a fumble on the ensuing possession and Crystal River carried that 3-0 advantage into the second quarter. Yet Lecanto (3-3) forced a punt and things quickly began to turn.

The Panthers ran 21 offensive plays in the first half; 20 of them were carries by Malmberg. In fact, he accounted for the team's first 24 rushes.

He had runs of 18, 9 and 11 yards before a 3-yard touchdown up the middle

Red Sox power way past Rays

Boston captures Game 2 14-6 to even ALDS 1-1

ST. PETERSBURG — J.D. Martinez hit a tiebreaking, three-run homer in his return to the lineup and the Boston Red Sox backed Tanner Houck's clutch relief effort with a franchise postseason record five home runs, beating the Tampa Bay Rays 14-6 Friday night to even their AL Division Series at a game each.

Kiké Hernández had five of Boston's 20 hits, including a homer and three doubles, becoming Boston's first player with four extra-base hits in a postseason game.

Xander Bogaerts, Alex Verdugo and Rafael Devers also connected for the Red Sox, who rallied for a blowout win after ace Chris Sale allowed a first-inning grand slam to Jordan Luplow and was pulled following just three outs.

Hernández's leadoff homer in the fifth off Collin McHugh tied it before Martinez went deep against Matt Wisler (0-1) four batters later.

Houck (1-0) kept Boston in the game after Sale was rocked for five runs in the first inning. The rookie right-hander came out of the bullpen to start the second inning and allowed one run and two hits over five frames, retiring his first 11 batters before yielding a two-out single to Wander Franco in the fifth.

Ji-Man Choi entered as a defensive replacement for Luplow and had the only other hit off Houck, a two-out solo homer in the sixth. Houck struck out five.

Martinez had four hits after missing Tuesday night's wild-card victory over the New York Yankees and Game 1 of the ALDS with a sprained left ankle. He was injured stumbling over second base while heading to the outfield during last weekend's regular-season finale at Washington.

"It felt all right hitting," Martinez said. "Didn't feel good running, but felt all right hitting."

Bogaerts, Verdugo and Hernández had solo shots to steady the staggering Red Sox, who lost the opener 5-0 Thursday night. Martinez then delivered the lead.

Devers' two-run homer off Michael Wacha hiked Boston's advantage to 11-6 in the eighth. Christian Vazquez had an RBI infield single in the ninth, which Hernández followed with a two-run single. Bogaerts, Verdugo and Vazquez had three hits each.

The Rays hadn't allowed 14 runs in a game since Boston beat them 20-6 on Aug. 11.

Verdugo also stole an out in left field, leaning over the short wall in foul territory in the sixth inning to catch Nelson Cruz's pop.

A night after Randy Arozarena became the first player in major league history to homer and steal home in a postseason game, the Rays got off to another

fast start that whipped a yellow towel-waving crowd of 37,616 — up from 27,419 for Game 1 — into a frenzy.

Rays rookie Shane Bieber became the second pitcher in big league history to start a playoff game with three or fewer career regular-season appearances. Matt Moore was the other, doing it with the Rays in Game 1 of the 2011 ALDS at Texas.

In using Bieber and Game 1 winner Shane Bieber to begin the series, AL East-winning Tampa Bay joined Oakland as the only teams to start rookie pitchers in the first two games of a playoff series. The Athletics began the 2012 ALDS at Detroit with Jarrod Parker and

Tommy Milone.

Boston, meanwhile, has only gotten 2 1/3 innings combined out of its starting pitchers through two games. Sale, who returned from Tommy John surgery in August to make nine starts down the stretch, was pulled after giving up five runs and four hits in the first inning. That followed an abbreviated outing by Eduardo Rodriguez on Thursday.

Luplow's grand slam was the sixth homer Sale has allowed in 26 career postseason innings.

HE'S IN, HE'S OUT

Boston replaced injured right-hander Garrett Richards on the ALDS roster with reliever Matt

Barnes. Richards has a left hamstring strain and will be ineligible for the AL Championship Series roster if the Red Sox advance.

UP NEXT

Nathan Eovaldi will start Game 3 for Boston. He allowed one run and four hits over 5 1/3 innings of Boston's wild-card win over the Yankees. The right-hander is 2-1 with a w1.63 ERA in seven career postseason appearances, including three starts.

Rays manager Kevin Cash hasn't announced a starter for Sunday. He could go with right-hander Drew Rasmussen or opt for a bullpen day.

Tellez sparks Brewers' wins

Homer, throw leads to a 2-1 Game 1 victory over Braves

MILWAUKEE — Rowdy Tellez fouled off Charlie Morton's pitch in a scoreless game, then headed toward the dugout for a deep breath and a new bat.

Just the break the Milwaukee Brewers needed.

Tellez spoiled Morton's gem by hitting a two-run homer in the seventh inning, leading the Brewers over the Atlanta Braves 2-1 Friday in the opener of their NL Division Series.

"I'm still out of breath," Tellez said. "It was a crazy moment."

Corbin Burnes, Adrian Houser and Josh Hader combined on a four-hitter that gave Milwaukee the early lead in this best-of-five series. Game 2 is Saturday in Milwaukee.

Former Brewer Orlando Arcia grounded to second with runners on the corners to end the game. That came after Milwaukee catcher Omar Narváez — who combined with first baseman Tellez on a key first-inning double play — blocked Hader's 1-2 pitch in the dirt to keep Freddie Freeman at third base.

Neither team produced much offense until the Brewers finally broke through in the seventh.

After Morton (0-1) plunked Avisail García with a 1-2 pitch to start the inning, Tellez ripped another 1-2 offering from Morton over the center-field wall to break a scoreless tie.

"Even in those at-bats, I got them where I wanted to be," Morton said. "I just didn't finish them off. I hit Avi, and then I grooved one to Rowdy."

Tellez was 1 for 13 against the Braves this season until delivering that 411-foot drive, which came immediately after the hefty, bearded slugger fouled a pitch off.

"I don't know if I broke that bat," Tellez said. "I just saw something

fly off of it. I was like, 'I need all the help I can get right now.'

"I walked back, and the bat boy didn't even realize. I kind of just collected my breath and calmed myself, got back to the box, and I said, 'Keep my foot down and just see the pitch and hit the ball hard.' That's all I wanted to do."

The big hit capped quite a comeback for Tellez, who was activated from the injured list Saturday after missing about three weeks with a right patella strain.

Atlanta's Joc Pederson lofted a pinch-hit homer off Houser (1-0) with two outs in the eighth.

Morton's 85th and final pitch to Tellez was among the few mistakes he made all day. He struck out nine, walked one and hit a batter to continue his recent history of exceptional postseason performances.

Burnes was every bit as good in his first career postseason start.

The NL Cy Young Award contender opened the game with two straight walks and threw 40 pitches in the first two innings but settled down from there. The right-hander struck out six and gave up two hits and three walks in six shutout innings, throwing 91 pitches.

After the Braves put runners on

the corners with nobody out but failed to score in the top of the first, nobody got a runner past first base until Tellez homered.

Neither team had a hit until Milwaukee's Lorenzo Cain had a one-out single to right in the third. The Braves' first hit came when Eddie Rosario led off the fifth with a bloop single to center.

Atlanta's best scoring chance came at the start of the game.

Burnes walked the first two batters he faced — Jorge Soler and Freeman — with Soler advancing to third on a passed ball.

Ozzie Albies followed with a sharp grounder down the first-base line that Tellez caught just before stepping on the bag. When he noticed Soler was trying to score from third, Tellez threw to the plate.

Narváez caught the one-hop throw and tagged Soler to complete the double play. Counsell called it the play of the game.

"I made a terrible throw," Tellez said. "I've got a good catcher back there. He's an All-Star for a reason. Made a great tag. That whole play doesn't happen without him."

Freeman advanced to third on a wild pitch, but Burnes struck out Austin Riley to end the threat.

Ridder, Ford help No. 5 Cincinnati rout Temple

CINCINNATI — Desmond Ridder threw for 259 yards and three touchdowns and No. 5 Cincinnati routed Temple 52-3 on Friday night for its 23rd straight home victory.

Jerome Ford ran for a career-high 149 yards and two scores to help the Bearcats (5-0, 1-0 American) avoid a let-down after their big victory at Notre Dame last week.

The home streak is the second-longest in the country, behind Clemson at 31. Temple is the last team to beat the Bearcats at Nippert Stadium, edging them 35-24 in 2017.

Temple (3-3, 1-1) has played Cincinnati tough in recent years with the previous three meetings decided by a combined 20 points, including a 15-13 victory by the Bearcats in the last meeting in 2019.

Reynolds, Charlotte hold off Florida International

MIAMI — Chris Reynolds passed for 203 yards and four touchdowns, Shadrick Byrd had two long kickoff returns that led to points and Charlotte defeated Florida International 45-33 on Friday night.

An interception returned 39 yards for a touchdown by Jon Alexander with 5:45 left in the game sealed the win for Charlotte, although FIU scored again on a one-play, 75-yard drive in 10 seconds and then appeared to recover an onside kick before losing it to an illegal touch penalty.

The 49ers (4-2, 2-0 Conference USA) earned their first road win this season and are off to a 2-0 conference start for the first time. Charlotte has its best start to any season at the FBS level.

Charlotte opened the second half with a crisp, three-minute drive ending with a 22-yard scoring pass down the seam from Reynolds to Victor Tucker, extending their lead to 24-6. Reynolds was 4-for-4 passing on the drive, the TD catch was Tucker's 13th.

FIU (1-5, 0-2) responded in two plays, cutting the gap to 24-13 after a 25-yard run up the middle by D'vonte Price and a 50-yard scoring heave from Max Bortenschlager to Kris Mitchell, who caught the ball in stride at about the 6.

Price, who finished with 89 yards rushing, became the sixth FIU player to gain more than 2,000 career rushing yards.

Bortenschlager added three more touchdown passes for FIU, connecting

with Tyrese Chambers for a 59-yarder that pulled the Panthers into two-score game, 31-20 with 11:10 remaining. Then, after throwing the pick-six, found Chambers again on a 75-yarder.

He found Sterling Palmer from the 8 with 14 seconds left.

Bortenschlager was 19-for-30 passing with career-highs of 466 yards and four touchdowns.

Reported racist comment from Gruden draws rebuke

A report that Jon Gruden used a racist comment about NFL Players Association leader DeMaurice Smith in an email 10 years ago drew a strong and quick rebuke Friday from the NFL.

A Wall Street Journal story noted that Gruden, then working for ESPN and now coach of the Las Vegas Raiders, referred in a racist way to Smith's facial features.

"The email from Jon Gruden denigrating DeMaurice Smith is appalling, abhorrent and wholly contrary to the NFL's values," NFL spokesman Brian McCarthy said. "We condemn the statement and regret any harm that its publication may inflict on Mr. Smith or anyone else."

The league is looking into the matter and a person familiar with that probe told The Associated Press that disciplinary action is possible for Gruden. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because details of any league probe are not made public.

Gruden's comment in an email to then-Washington Football Team President Bruce Allen came during the 2011 lockout of the players by the NFL.

Gruden told the newspaper he was angry about the lockout during labor negotiations and he didn't trust the direction the union was taking. He also apologized for the remark, the Journal reported.

"Dumboriss Smith has lips the size of michellin tires," Gruden wrote in the email reviewed by the newspaper.

Gruden led the Raiders from 1998 until he was traded to Tampa Bay after the 2001 season. He immediately led the Buccaneers to a Super Bowl title — against the Raiders.

He lasted through the 2008 season in Tampa before being fired, then headed to the "Monday Night Football" booth.

The Raiders, then in Oakland, rehired Gruden in 2018 with a 10-year, \$100 million contract. The team moved to Las Vegas last year and has not made the playoffs since his return. But the Raiders are 3-1 in 2021.

Florida seeks bounce-back performance

Host Vanderbilt coming off loss to Kentucky

GAINESVILLE — Florida needs a pick-me-up, and there are few better cures for a broken-hearted Gators team than having Vanderbilt next on the schedule.

The 20th-ranked Gators will host the skidding Commodores for homecoming Saturday. It's a chance for Florida to move past a gut-wrenching loss at Kentucky that essentially knocked coach Dan Mullen's team out of contention in the Southeastern Conference's Eastern Division and gain some confidence and momentum with No. 2 Georgia on the horizon.

"That game is in the past," Florida tight end Kemore Gamble said. "Don't let that game bring you down, keep playing hard. Keep playing for your family, your friends, the fans and most importantly your teammates."

Florida (3-2, 1-2 SEC) is counting on a bounce-back performance against Vandy (2-3, 0-1), which has dropped 14 consecutive games in league play.

Vanderbilt's last league victory came on Oct. 19, 2019, against Missouri. Its last road win in SEC play came on Oct. 27, 2018, at Arkansas. The Gators are 38 1/2-point favorites, according to FanDuel Sportsbook.

"The environments are unforgiving on the road," first-year Commodores coach Clark Lea said. "I think that's also exciting for us. We look forward to playing in those hostile environments. We'll get up for that."

Playing on the road doomed the Gators a week ago. Florida was flagged 15 times for 115 yards, including eight false start penalties, in a 20-13 loss that came down to the final series.

The Gators ran six plays inside Kentucky's 10-yard line in the waning seconds, failed to

score and lost in Lexington for the first time since 1986.

"You can't dwell on it," Florida cornerback Tre'Vez Johnson said. "You can't keep focusing on what you did wrong. We fix the little mistakes and move on to next week. The only way we're going to move forward is staying positive and coming out here ready to work."

The Gators have won seven in a row and 29 of the last 30 in the series, with the last loss coming at Florida Field in 2013. Despite the success, Mullen insisted his players won't overlook Vanderbilt and will be ready to regroup.

"If you would have been out on a run with me this morning and we got within the last half mile, I'm going to sprint and beat you," Mullen said. "And

that was just going on a nice morning jog. ... I like winning. It's a heck of a lot (nicer), and that's just going for a walk down the street.

"Go play a friendly game of pickup hoops and it gets close, don't be surprised if you get an elbow in the eye. And that's just lunchtime hoops. I promise this: It's certainly not hard to get motivated to go play an SEC game. I don't care whether we play on Friday morning at 6 a.m. in the parking lot or we play at noon in the Swamp. I don't care. But we'll go play."

SNAPPING SKIDS

The Commodores already have ended three different skids under Lea. Their victory at Colorado State snapped a 13-game losing streak against Football

Bowl Subdivision teams, an 11-game skid overall and also a 10-game skid on the road. Their 30-28 win over UConn last week ended an eight-game skid at home.

RICHARDSON READY?

Florida backup quarterback Anthony Richardson played just six snaps last week at Kentucky, leaving many to wonder whether he could have made a difference in the loss. Richardson has been dealing with a strained right hamstring for a month, but Mullen insists he's fine.

AIR VANDY

Vanderbilt's Ken Seals is coming off his best game of the season. The sophomore quarterback threw for 333 yards

with two touchdowns in Vanderbilt's win over UConn. The Commodores also had a pair of 100-yard receivers in that victory, something they hadn't done since Nov. 26, 2016. Will Shepard had 119 yards and two TDs, and Chris Pierce caught nine passes for 103 yards.

OLYMPIANS HONORED

Eight former Florida standouts who won Olympic medals in Tokyo will serve as honorary "Mr. Two Bits" cheerleaders before the game. The group includes Caeleb Dressel (swimming), Bobby Finke (swimming), Natalie Hinds (swimming), Kieran Smith (swimming), Grant Holloway (track), Taylor Manson (track), Mark Kolozsvary (baseball), and Aubree Munro (softball).

Tar Heels look to stay hot at home against Florida State

North Carolina has looked like the team many expected in the preseason when playing at home. That could give the Tar Heels a chance to string together a win streak in the first half of October.

The Tar Heels enter Saturday's visit from Florida State with all three wins coming at home by comfortable margins, including by 20 points against Virginia and 31 points against rival Duke last weekend. This will be the second of three straight league home games before a nonconference trip to No. 14 Notre Dame.

"Usually you've got to win at home before you can win on the road," UNC coach Mack Brown said. "You've got the comforts of home. You've got crowds, momentum changes are easier. ... To be a good team, you've got to win at home. To be a great team, you've got to win on the road."

To listen to Brown, the Tar Heels (3-2, 2-2 ACC) are stuck somewhere in between in the third year of his second coaching stint in Chapel Hill. They have lost both road games, first to Virginia Tech in the season opener and later a lopsided loss at Georgia Tech.

North Carolina averages 52 points and 587.3 yards per game in its three home games compared to 16 points and 361.5 yards on the road, going from No. 10 in the preseason AP Top 25 and the preseason Coastal Division favorite to unranked before October.

The Seminoles (1-4, 1-2) are coming off a win against Syracuse on a final-play field goal. But they have lost all five of their road games so far under second-year coach Mike Norvell. The only one this year was a mistake-filled 35-14 loss at No. 19 Wake Forest with six turnovers.

"I thought our guys, there was a fair balance of the excitement of a win, the celebration you get to have, but also the sense of urgency for improvement," Norvell said of practicing after the Syracuse win. "That's our ultimate focus, are we playing our best football?"

Some other things to know about Saturday's FSU-UNC game:

HONORING BOBBY

UNC is honoring late FSU coaching great Bobby Bowden, who died in August. The school tweeted that it

has put up the Bowden logo, featuring his preferred practice hat and his signature, in Kenan Stadium near the section where visiting fans typically sit for games.

QB PLAY

Florida State quarterback Jordan Travis has battled injuries but is coming off a big performance against Syracuse.

He broke the program record for career rushing yards by a quarterback (now 932) during his career-high 113-yard performance. Former Heisman Trophy winner Charlie Ward held the previous record of 889 yards.

Travis is listed atop the depth chart this week ahead of UCF graduate transfer McKenzie Milton, who nearly sparked an upset of Notre Dame in the opener in his return from a serious leg injury from 2018.

"Jordan Travis started the season as our starting quarterback for a reason," Norvell said.

PERFECT MARK

Florida State has yet to lose to Brown, a 1973 graduate of the school.

The Seminoles have won all 10 meetings, the first three coming

when Brown was at Tulane between 1985-87. The next six came during Brown's first stint in Chapel Hill, where he built the Tar Heels into top-10 status in 1996 and 1997 but couldn't beat the Seminoles operating at their 1990s peak.

BETTER DEFENSE?

Florida State and North Carolina have had some recent defensive improvement.

The Tar Heels held the rival Blue Devils to a single touchdown. And the Seminoles had a run of holding Louisville and Syracuse scoreless for 12 straight drives in the past two weeks while allowing them to convert just 3 of 20 third downs in the last six quarters.

A YEAR LATER

Florida State pulled off a big upset in last year's game, building a huge early lead and then holding on late to beat the then-No. 5 Tar Heels in Tallahassee. This is FSU's first trip to UNC since 2009.

"We kind of had everything we wanted in front of us and we kind of lost it all right there," UNC quarterback Sam Howell said, adding: "We definitely, definitely want this one bad."

Burns in contention in Las Vegas event

Not only has Burns won twice in the last six months, he also lost in a playoff at a World Golf Championship and finished one shot out of a playoff at Riviera this year. The 25-year-old is comfortable at the top, and it's showing.

"What we tried to do is just last week is last week," he said. "This week is Shriners and preparing for this week, trying to make sure Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday that we are giving ourselves the best opportunity to play well this week."

"Obviously, incredibly honored that I won last week and such a fun time, but just trying to kind of leave that there."

Adam Schenk had a 65 to match Burns at 13 under. Aaron Wise was another stroke back after a 62.

Frustrated Rahm near lead in Spain

MADRID — The big crowds following Jon Rahm in his return to Spain are starting to bother the world's top-ranked golfer.

Rahm couldn't hide his frustration with some of the fans after a lackluster second round at the Spanish Open on Friday, when he carded a 4-under 67 to stay one shot behind leader Wil Besseling going into the weekend at Club de Campo Villa de Madrid.

"It is wonderful how many fans we have out here and it's great that they are so passionate about it. I just wished they would remember to put their phones in silence, that's it," he said.

Besseling was two shots ahead of Spaniard Adri Arnaus, India's Shubhankar Sharma and first-round leader Ross McGowan of England, who started with a course-record 10-under 61 but couldn't keep up on Friday.

Jin Young Ko leads Founders Cup
