City frowns on tobacco

Crystal River council moves to further discourage smoking, vaping at facilities

A little less cigarette smoke and butts could be rising and falling at Crystal River's public venues.

City Council members voted 5-0 at their meeting the evening of Monday, Sept. 28, 2020, to pass a res-

olution establishing tobacco-free zones for city parks and recreational facilities.

Officials with the Citrus County Tobacco Free Partnership, a part of the Florida Health Department in Citrus County, proposed the action to help discourage smoking and vaping in community environments.

"It's a wonderful, wonderful thing that we're going to do this," Councilman Pat Fitzpatrick told attending partnership members before calling the resolution to a vote.

Signage will be posted by the partnership at Yeoman, Little Springs, Kings Bay, Hunter Springs,

Copeland and Jim Legrone Memorial parks.

Inverness City Council passed a similar measure in June 2020.

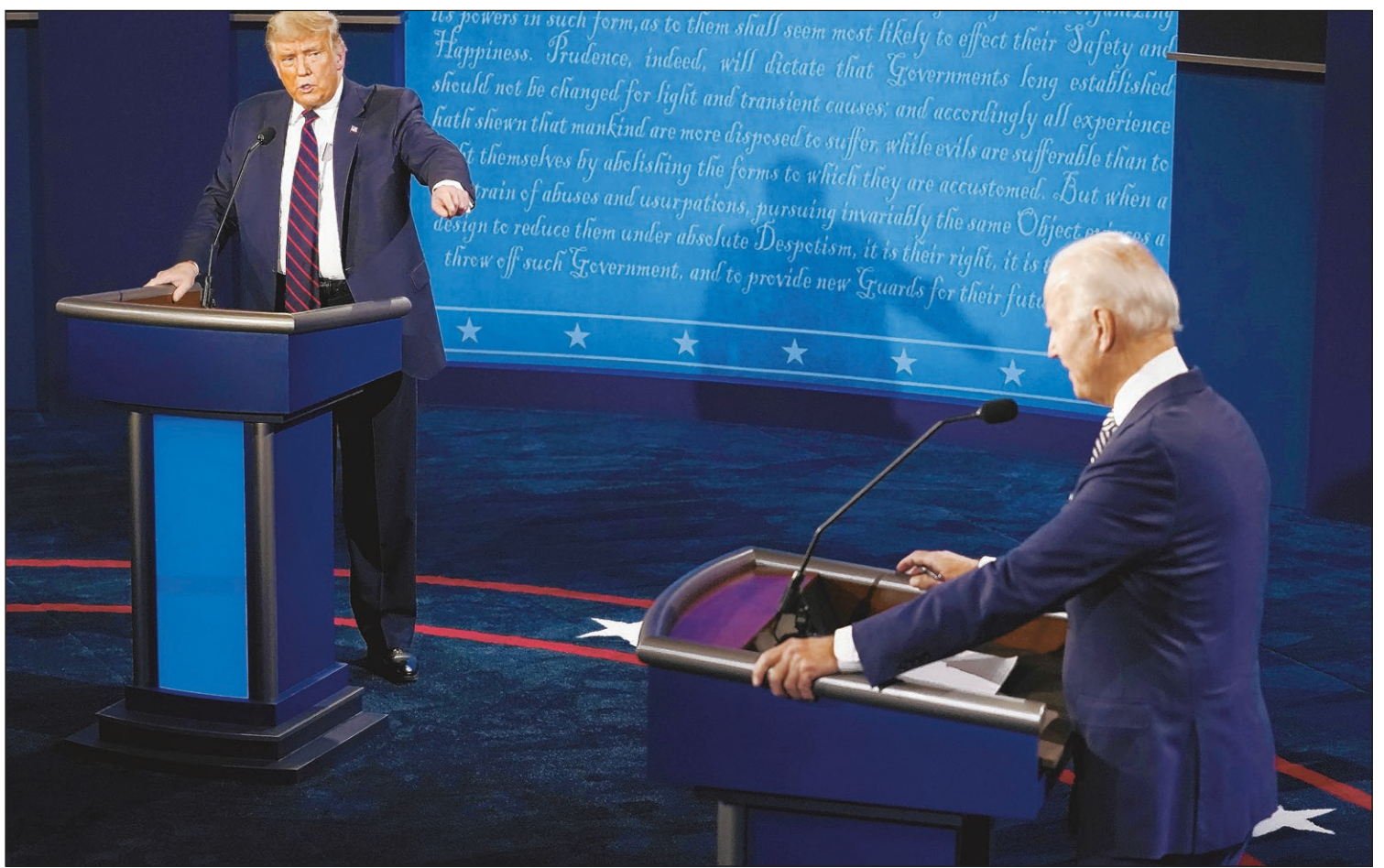
"There's no safe level for secondhand smoke," Citrus County Tobacco Free Partnership President Lorrie Van Voorthuisen told the Crystal River Council on Monday.

"Cigarette smoke contains more than 7,000 chemicals, 69 of which have been known to cause cancer."

She went on to say current research on electronic-cigarette also shows aerosols emitted from those devices contain lead, nickel and tin.

No pulling punches at debate

Exchanges grow heated as Trump, Biden meet on stage for first time

CLEVELAND — Marked by angry interruptions and bitter accusations, the first debate between President Donald Trump and Democratic challenger Joe Biden erupted in contentious exchanges Tuesday night over the coronavirus pandemic, city violence, job losses and how the Supreme Court will shape the future of the nation's health care.

In what was the most chaotic

presidential debate in recent years, somehow fitting for what has been an extraordinarily ugly campaign, the two men frequently talked over each other with Trump interrupting, nearly shouting, so often that Biden eventually snapped at him, "Will you shut up, man?"

"The fact is that everything he's said so far is simply a lie," Biden said. "I'm not here to call out his lies. Everybody knows he's a liar."

Trump and Biden arrived in Cleveland hoping the debate would energize their bases of support, even as they competed for the slim slice of undecided

voters who could decide the election. It has been generations since two men asked to lead a nation facing such tumult, with Americans both fearful and impatient about the coronavirus pandemic that has killed more than 200,000 of their fellow citizens and cost millions of jobs.

Over and over, Trump tried to control the conversation, interrupting Biden and repeatedly talking over the moderator, Chris Wallace of Fox News. The president tried to deflect tough lines of questioning — whether on his taxes or the pandemic — to deliver broadsides against Biden.

The president drew a lecture from Wallace, who pleaded with both men to stop interrupting. Biden tried to push back against Trump, sometimes looking right at the camera to directly address viewers rather than the president and snapping, "It's hard to get a word in with this clown."

But despite his efforts to dominate the discussion, Trump was frequently put on the defensive and tried to sidestep when he was asked if he was willing to condemn white supremacists and paramilitary groups.

Founding leader at Pace Center for Girls leaving for new role

Growing a nonprofit's next endeavor to heal area children is nothing new to Sheila A. Jordan.

So when the Pace Center for Girls Citrus planned to open Jan. 7, 2019, within the Roger Weaver Lecanto Educational Complex, leaders of the alternative schooling program called on her.

"We knew it took somebody who understood the girls we work with but also had the ability to engage

communities." Pace National Chief Operating Officer Jessica Cangel said. "Looking back, we absolutely feel we have the right person with Sheila because she has been able to build, in such a short time, very strong relationships."

Since her almost two-year tenure as the founding executive director of Pace's local location — its first in Florida — Jordan helped take the campus beyond its enrollment and financial expectations.

Hospital board wants millions in lawsuit

The Citrus County Hospital Board is getting closer to recouping potentially more than \$12 million in pension fund losses that the board's lawyers claim was due to bad financial advice from Aon Hewitt Investment Consulting.

The hospital board's consulting lawyer Taylor Ford told the hospital board that his expert witness estimated that Aon caused a loss of as much as \$12 million to the fund when Aon failed to monitor its own proprietary investments for the Citrus Memorial Hospital pension fund and failed to liquidate the investments when the cash was needed for the lease of the facility.

"I'm not interested in getting 50 cents on the dollar," said an angry hospital board member Dr. Mark Fallows during the hospital board's monthly meeting this week.

At the head of the year-old federal lawsuit is the Foundation Resolution

Corp., which is the remains of the organization that operated Citrus Memorial Hospital before it was leased to Hospital Corporation of America.

The hospital board owns the hospital on behalf of the public. The hospital board had to loan the FRC \$17.5 million to wind down the pension to ensure all the hospital's employees were paid after the loss. Hospital board attorney Bill Grant said the hospital board has oversight of the issues involved, but not control, but does have final approval to any settlements.

Fallows said he wanted at least the full \$12 million FRC's expert Kent Smetters says is due. He also wants Aon to pay attorney's fees.

"I want Aon Hewitt to get a message from this," Fallows said.

Smetters is the Boettner chair professor at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School and a faculty research fellow at the National Bureau of Economic Research.

“What do you want to call them? Give me a name. Give me a name,” Trump said, before Wallace mentioned the far right, violent group known as the Proud Boys. Trump then pointedly did not condemn the group, instead saying, “Proud Boys, stand back, stand by, but I’ll tell you what, somebody’s got to do something about Antifa and the left because this is not right-wing problem. This is a left wing problem.”

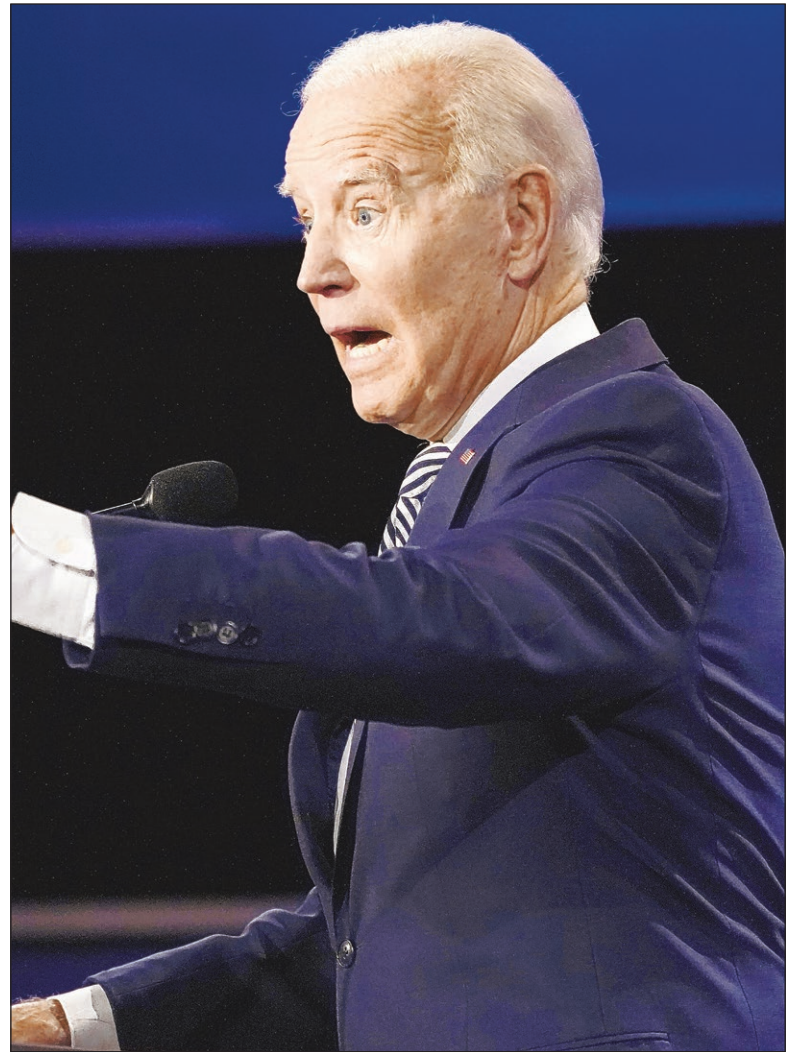
The vitriol exploded into the open when Biden attacked Trump’s handling of the pandemic, saying that the president “waited and waited” to act when the virus reached America’s shores and “still doesn’t have a plan.” Biden told Trump to “get out of your bunker and get out of the sand trap” and go in his golf cart to the Oval Office to come up with a bipartisan plan to save people.

Trump snarled a response, declaring that “I’ll tell you Joe, you could never have done the job that we did. You don’t have it in your blood.”

“I know how to do the job,” was the solemn response from Biden, who served eight years as Barack Obama’s vice president.

The pandemic’s effects were in plain sight, with the candidates’ lecterns spaced far apart, all of the guests in the small crowd tested and the traditional opening handshake scrapped. The men did not shake hands and, while neither candidate wore a mask to take the stage, their families did sport face coverings.

Trump struggled to define his ideas for replacing

the Affordable Care Act on health care in the debate’s early moments and defended his nomination of Amy Coney Barrett, declaring that “I was not elected for three years, I’m elected for four years.”

“We won the election. Elections have consequences. We have the Senate. We have the White House and we have a phenomenal nominee, respected by all.”

Trump criticized Biden over the former vice president’s refusal to comment on whether he would try to expand the Supreme Court in retaliation if Barrett is confirmed to

replace the late Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg.

The president also refused anew to embrace the science of climate change.

As the conversation moved to race, Biden accused Trump of walking away from the American promise of equity for all and making a race-based appeal.

“This is a president who has used everything as a dog whistle to try to generate racist hatred, racist division,” Biden said.

Recent months have seen major protests after the deaths of Black people at the hands of police. And Biden said there is

systemic racist injustice in this country and while the vast majority of police officers are “decent, honorable men and women” there are “bad apples” and people have to be held accountable.

Trump in turn claimed that Biden’s work on a federal crime bill treated the African American population “about as bad as anybody in this country.” The president pivoted to his hardline focus on those protesting racial injustice and accused Biden of being afraid to use the words “law and order,” out of fear of alienating the left.

Dr. Dragomir Mijic brings extensive training, the latest techniques, and a dedication to his patients in Citrus County with shoulder and elbow issues. As the only shoulder and elbow fellowship-trained surgeon in the area, he treats a wide range of complex shoulder and elbow issues including revision surgeries right here, so patients don't need to travel elsewhere for care.

An orthopedic surgeon with the Center for Bone and Joint Disease, Dr. Mijic has advanced training in shoulder and elbow replacement and arthroscopic shoulder and elbow surgery. He joined the Center for Bone and Joint Disease, which has offices in Homosassa, Brooksville, Hudson, and Lutz, two years ago.

Patients with shoulder pain generally have arthritic issues involving the joint or muscle, tendon and ligament issues, said Dr. Mijic.

“A patient may have arthritis, which results in a loss of range of motion and pain. As with most problems, we start with a conservative treatment plan – cortisone injections, anti-inflammatory medication, and physical therapy. If that doesn't relieve the symptoms, the patient may be a candidate for a total shoulder joint replacement,” he said. A patient that has both arthritis and rotator cuff tear may present with a much more severe shoulder dysfunction “weakness”, as well as pain and range of motion loss.”

For chronic rotator cuff injuries with joint arthritis, Dr. Mijic performs a relatively new procedure called “reverse shoulder replacement,” in which the orientation between the shoulder joint ball and socket are reversed.

“We put the ball where the socket was,” he explained. “The advantage is that this procedure makes the deltoid muscle more able to compensate and gives it the same function as a rotator cuff did.”

Elbow issues include repetitive stress injuries, sometimes known as “Tennis Elbow” or “Golfer's Elbow”. For these injuries, Dr. Mijic may recommend Platelet-Rich Plasma (PRP) Therapy, which uses injections of a concentration of the patient's own growth factors from the blood to accelerate the healing of injured tendons, ligaments, muscles, and joints.

“PRP helps the body heal itself. It's a cool technology that we've had a lot of success with,” he said.

Dr. Mijic uses 3D imaging during his preoperative planning for shoulder replacements, something that is unique to his practice when compared to others in the area.

“Using 3D imaging of the patient's shoulder gives me the ability to virtually place implants, and plan for the implant position, and size that offers the best fit for the patient and translates into optimal function. It gives me optimal accuracy,” he said.

Along with the training and technology, Dr. Mijic gives his patients something a bit old-fashioned: time.

“I take a personal approach to patient care. I take time to explain procedures in detail, so my patients are aware of what to expect and they are well educated about their procedure and recovery. Time before surgery can be a confusing and overwhelming time for them. I try to ease them into it, so they are prepared,” he said. “I also call each patient a few days after surgery to see how they are doing and answer questions.”

Not buckling up results in trip to jail

Homosassa man denies knowledge of drugs found in his vehicle

A 37-year-old Homosassa man who left drug paraphernalia in visual sight during a traffic stop Monday, Sept. 28, 2020, earned a trip to the Citrus County Detention Facility on a number of drug-related charges, according to a Citrus County Sheriff's Office arrest affidavit.

Deputy Donald Hunter arrested and charged Ryan Michael Smith with possession of a controlled substance with intent to sell; possession of a controlled substance; and possession of drug paraphernalia. His bond was set at \$8,000.

According to the arrest report, Hunter was driving eastbound on West Grover Cleveland Boulevard when he observed the driver, later identified as Smith, not wearing his seatbelt. While trying to pull Smith over, the defendant accelerated around another vehicle while Smith appeared to be reaching around inside the vehicle.

Smith finally came to a stop at South Suncoast Boulevard and West Grover Cleveland Boulevard, the report states.

Upon making contact with him, Hunter observed a clear plastic bag containing multiple other small plastic baggies next to Smith, the deputy noted in his report. In the passenger seat was a pack of Good Times rolling papers, commonly used in narcotics transactions and usage.

According to the report, during an agreed-upon search of the vehicle, Hunter found a baggie with heroin on the floorboard in between the driver's seat and the door. The baggie weighed 0.93 grams. While searching Smith,

Hunter found \$705 cash in one of his shorts pockets.

Inside the glovebox, the report stated, Hunter found a glass pipe and digital scale, both with residue, which tested positive for methamphetamine. Inside the sunglass compartment of the vehicle, Hunter found a baggie containing methamphetamine. It weighed approximately 9.64 grams.

Post Miranda, Smith denied knowledge of the drugs and paraphernalia. He said the money in his pocket is from selling catalytic converters.

Smith was then transported to the Citrus County Detention Facility.

Florida's mail-in ballots reach 5.1 million

More of state's voters opt to stay home as election draws closer

About 5.1 million vote-by-mail ballots have been sent to Floridians — or were in the process of being sent — as the Nov. 3 election nears.

As of a Tuesday morning count, 5,091,513 vote-by-mail ballots had been provided or were in the process of being provided but had not been returned by voters, according to numbers posted on the Florida Division of Elections website.

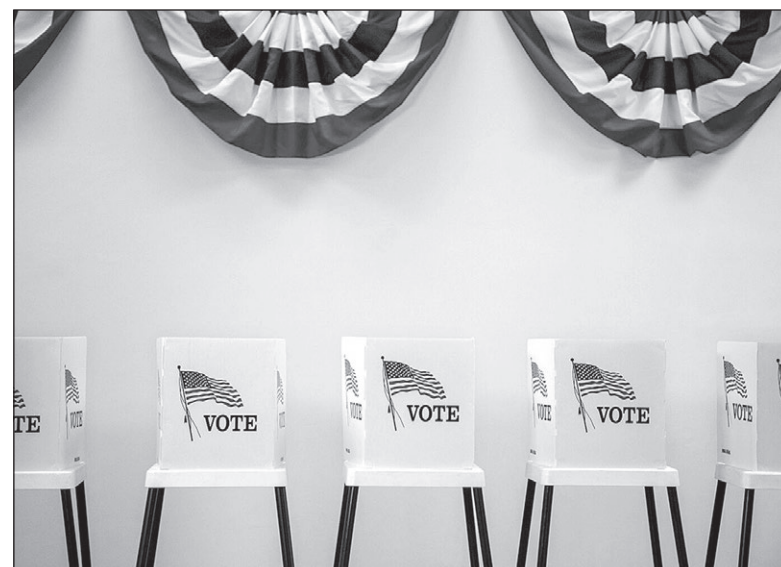
Democrats made up 2,346,384 of those voters, while Republicans totaled 1,605,139 and unaffiliated voters were 1,078,494. The remaining 61,496 were third-party voters.

As of Tuesday morning, 34,018 vote-by mail ballots had been returned, with 18,209 coming from Democrats and 9,343 coming from Republicans, according to the Division of Elections website.

Rapid test kits headed to Florida

Florida will receive 400,000 rapid-test kits a week that can be used to detect COVID-19 infections at schools, senior centers and long-term care facilities, Gov. Ron DeSantis said Tuesday at a news conference in Clearwater.

The Florida Division of Emergency Management will take the lead in distributing the test kits, which are coming from the federal government, said division Director Jared Moskowitz, who joined DeSantis at Morton Plant Hospital for the announcement. "We will do our part to make sure that this gets out as fast as possible," said Moskowitz, whose agency has been in charge of distributing personal protective equipment, such as gowns, face shields, gloves and masks to long-term care facilities. The federal government

requires that the tests be performed in settings that operate under what is known as a CLIA Certificate of Waiver, which, DeSantis said, requires that the tests be conducted by nurses. But DeSantis said the state will request a waiver of that requirement, saying it isn't a good use of nurses' time.

The rapid test is one of two diagnostic tests for COVID-19 that indicate whether a person has an active coronavirus infection. Molecular tests, such as RT-PCR tests, detect the virus' genetic material, but can take from a day to a week to get the results. Antigen tests detect specific proteins on the surface of the virus and come back within 15 minutes. However, antigen tests can have false negatives, and results may need to be confirmed with molecular tests.

Nevertheless, DeSantis said Tuesday that he may use some of the rapid test kits coming to Florida to supplant PCR testing that

the state is conducting, saying it would reduce costs by 75%. In all, DeSantis said Florida would receive 6.4 million rapid test kits under the federal government's plan to provide more than 150 million kits across the nation.

Justices refuse to hear insurance benefits fight

Little more than a week after receiving the case, the Florida Supreme Court on Tuesday declined to take up a constitutional dispute about the controversial insurance practice known as "assignment of benefits."

The court issued a one-page order saying it would not hear an appeal by Anchor Property and Casualty Insurance Co. As is common, the order did not explain the court's reasons.

The case went to the Supreme Court on Sept. 21, as Anchor wanted justices to overturn a

ruling by a panel of the 5th District Court of Appeal in a lawsuit stemming from a home damaged by Hurricane Irma in 2017. Homeowner Wayne Parker filed a damage claim with Anchor, his insurer, and then entered into an assignment of benefits agreement with Speed Dry, Inc. Under the agreement, Speed Dry would do repair work, handle claim negotiations and receive direct payment from the insurer. But Anchor refused to pay Speed Dry, leading to a lawsuit.

Anchor pointed to what are known as "alienation restrictions" in the Florida Constitution about homestead property, "contending that any insurance proceeds resulting from a loss to homestead property are constitutionally protected to the same extent as the homestead property itself and cannot be assigned pursuant to an AOB (assignment of benefits)," the appeals court said. A Seminole Court circuit judge agreed with the insurer, but the appeals court overturned that decision.

"Alienation is a term of art used in real property law that refers to the transfer of title to real property," the appeals-court ruling said. "An assignment of post-loss insurance benefits does not transfer title of real property. Rather, it is an assignment of contract rights that places a third party in the shoes of the homeowner and in privity with the insurance company. As such, that assignment gives the third party, here, Speed Dry, the right to collect benefits under the insurance contract. The AOB conveys no interest in the homestead property."

Property insurers in recent years have repeatedly blamed assignment of benefits for increasing costs, and the Legislature last year passed new restrictions on the practice. Those changes were not part of the Anchor case.

Billboard Awards: Keys, Bad Bunny, Malone to perform

NEW YORK — Alicia Keys, Bad Bunny, Luke Combs and leading nominee Post Malone will perform at the 2020 Billboard Music Awards.

NBC and dick clark productions on Tuesday announced the performers for the show, which will broadcast live from The Dolby Theatre in Los Angeles on Oct. 14. With restrictions set due to the coronavirus pandemic, it wasn't clear if the performances will be live or pre-taped.

The awards show was originally supposed to take place in April but was postponed because of the coronavirus pandemic, which caused a halt to live performances and TV and film productions. Kelly Clarkson will host the Billboard Awards, and Garth Brooks will receive the ICON Award.

Malone's 16 nominations include top male artist, top rap artist and the show's biggest prize, top artist. Others competing for the top honor include Billie Eilish, Taylor Swift, Khalid and Jonas Brothers.

Barry Jenkins to direct 'Lion King' follow-up

NEW YORK — The Walt Disney Co. will make a follow-up to the 2019 live-action "The Lion King," with Barry Jenkins, the director of the Oscar-winning "Moonlight" and the James Baldwin adaptation "If Beale Street Could Talk," set to direct.

Disney announced plans Tuesday for a kind of prequel to last year's poorly reviewed but highly popular photorealistic

remake. The new "Lion King" grossed more than \$1.6 billion worldwide, so a sequel was perhaps always likely. Less expected was a "Lion King" with Jenkins directing. The film, Disney said, will explore the mythological of "The Lion King," including Mufasa's origin story.

"Helping my sister raise two young boys during the '90s, I grew up with these characters," Jenkins said in a statement. "Having the opportunity to work with Disney on expanding this magnificent tale of friendship, love and legacy while furthering my work chronicling the lives and souls of folk within the African diaspora is a dream come true."

Jenkins earlier this year completed shooting on the Amazon limited series "The Underground Railroad," based on the Colson Whitehead novel. He won an Oscar for the script to the best-picture-winning "Moonlight" and was nominated for the

screenplay to 2018's "If Beale Street Could Talk." He also last year made plans to direct a film based on the life of choreographer Alvin Ailey for Disney's Searchlight Pictures.

Disney didn't announce any further plot details or casting on the new "Lion King" project, which was first reported by Deadline Hollywood. Jeff Nathanson, who wrote the 2019 movie, is returning to pen the follow-up.

Directed by Jon Favreau, "The Lion King" featured a voice cast including Donald Glover, Chiwetel Ejiofor, Beyoncé Knowles-Carter, Jon Oliver, Billy Eichner, Seth Rogen and James Earl Jones. Reviews weren't good (52% fresh on Rotten Tomatoes) but it was more lucrative than any other "live-action" remake of a Disney classic. Unadjusted for inflation, 2019's "Lion King" ranks as the seventh highest grossing film ever.

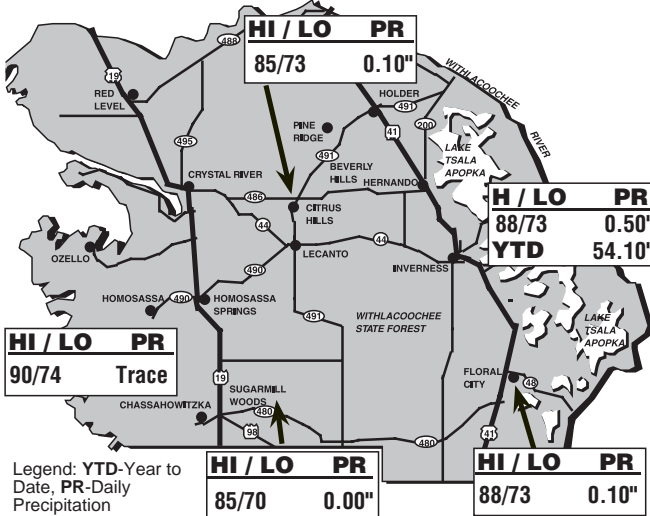

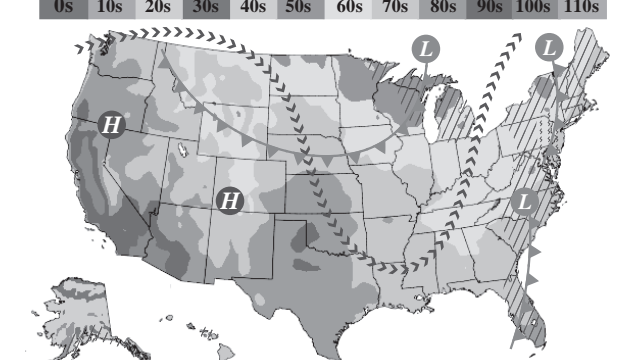

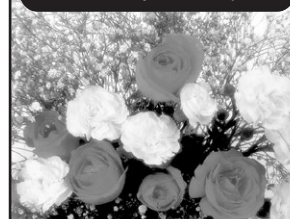

"All of this work it took to establish the center would not have happened without the support of a really welcoming, supportive and giving community that, even as I leave, has a great foundation here for the girls in Citrus to continue getting amazing, amazing services," Jordan said.

"She's set Citrus up for success," Cancel added. Jordan's last day with Pace Citrus is Wednesday, Sept. 30, 2020.

She starts Thursday at Pace Volusia-Flagler in Ormond Beach, an existing center with a different set of needs for Jordan to tackle.

"She's going to breathe a very different air into Pace Volusia," Cancel said, "so we're excited about how that evolves."

Jordan said she's been ready to introduce herself.

"I'm always excited about meeting the girls and meeting the staff; the people make every experience for me," she said. "It'll also be fun to be near the beach."

Replacing Jordan is Pace Marion's executive director, Carole Savage, who helped create the initial partnership between Pace and the Citrus County School District.

"She's very familiar with the district and hired initial staff, including me," Jordan said.

Jordan credits her time as a youth advocate in two states and abroad for why Pace eyed her for its upcoming job.

She was introduced to the nonprofit, City Year — "a domestic version of the Peace Corps" — while working at a hospital in her birthplace of Columbus, Ohio.

It began Jordan's 12-year tenure with the organization.

She was chosen in 2004 to found a City Year site in Johannesburg, South Africa, before moving two years later to found two more locations in Louisiana six months apart.

She then ran her own nonprofit while also working for the Pelican State's children behavioral health system for seven years before she was hired by Pace in November 2018.

It was also Jordan's 10-year game plan to move to Florida after she got a feel

for Sunshine State weather.

"After I got out of the snow," she said, "I decided I wasn't living in snow again."

Pace centers serve girls in middle and high schools who've suffered through trauma, and, as a result, are having difficulties adapting to a school or social setting.

"They're having challenges ... adjusting or coping in the school environment so their academic success and their social skills are impacted," Jordan said. "We serve them in an approach that is what we call: strength-based, trauma-informed and gender-responsive."

Girls enrolled at Pace have access to a full day of academics and a personal counselor who sees students in individual and group sessions.

"Anybody can refer them," Jordan said.

It's the goal of Pace Citrus to reintroduce its students back into their home school in time for graduation, or at least get them on a path toward a GED, college or a career.

When Pace Citrus first started, eight girls were enrolled.

Jordan said she was disappointed the campus didn't begin with 10, but Pace leadership told her it's been the highest so far.

Now, enrollment is up to 53 and hasn't dwindled. Jordan said five girls were also able to graduate from their high school through Pace Citrus.

Jordan said the growth is a testament not only to the center's success but also its demand.

"There is definitely a need for these types of services," she said. "Behavioral health services are not readily available unless you're in a major city."

There is no cost to the student or their family to attend Pace. Funding is sourced by the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice, the Florida Department of Education and fundraising efforts by Pace officials.

During her first full school year, Jordan and the Pace Citrus board of directors raised more than \$100,000, beating her unofficial fundraising goal and earning the campus a "financial leadership" award.

It was also Jordan's mission to increase enrollment up to 50 students within a year, which was accomplished after 13 months.

"I have goals around everything," she said. "My goal is always to meet every goal."

Hospital board member Dr. Jeffrey Wallis said jokingly that he wanted Aon to pay \$25 million “so they don’t do it again.”

If the FRC recoups the money from Aon, it will hand that money over to the hospital board to repay the board’s loan to the FRC. The board would in turn give the money to the charitable foundation.

If a settlement is reached, the hospital board could allow Aon to hand over the money directly to the charitable foundation and list it as a gift and reclaim some of it in taxes.

The lawsuit is scheduled for trial early next year.

■ Also in hospital board business, hospital board members said they were not satisfied with the Citrus County Community Charitable Foundation’s level of insurance coverage and if necessary the hospital board would pay for better coverage. The board members voted that if better coverage was available, and coverage that was retroactive, the board would pay for it and reimburse itself by withholding the money from its next contribution to the foundation.

The foundation was created by the Citrus County Hospital Board in 2014, the same year that the hospital board leased Citrus Memorial Hospital, and its satellite properties, to Hospital Corporation of America as part of a 50-year lease agreement. The hospital board owns Citrus Memorial Hospital and related properties on behalf of the public.

The hospital board created the foundation and gives it funds from the lease to disburse to local charities in the form of grants to promote health and address medical needs of Citrus County residents.

The hospital board said the foundation needs better insurance coverage considering that it controls millions of dollars in investments.

The criticism by the hospital board arrives on the heels of a recent county audit report that the foundation had violated several of its own operational guideline and bylaws. The audit mirrored a 2019 audit that found similar problems.

In short, the foundation’s 11-member board balked when its insurance carrier, Philadelphia, raised its rates from about \$2,000 annually to nearly \$12,000, citing, in part, the 2019 audit problems.

The foundation failed to renew and by May 5, 2020 was without insurance. By June, it acquired insurance again through Alliance for

Non-Profits, with \$1 million in coverage and \$250,000 in legal fees coverage, said Greg Hagar, president of The Hagar Group, the insurance broker for the hospital board. The foundation’s new coverage was not retroactive to cover the lapsed month, but costs only about \$4,000.

“This is definitely something the board needs to address,” hospital board lawyer Bill Grant told the board. “At the end of the day you want the coverage.”

Hagar told the hospital board that it would be difficult to now find insurance for the foundation that also included retroactive coverage, and it would likely be costlier.

■ Also in hospital board business, the hospital board voted unanimously to appoint Citrus County Commissioner Jimmie T. Smith to the charitable foundation’s 11-member board. Last month, Smith was defeated in his race for reelection to the commission.

Smith sat on the foundation board as a county commission representative. He will now sit on one of two public seats vacated by former CCCCF president Sophia Diaz-Fonseca. Fonseca had originally been appointed to a two-year term and then won a four-year term. Members are limited to eight years on the CCCCF board. Fonseca held one of two seats elected by voters. The other nine members are appointed by county municipalities, institutions, and organizations. The hospital board member also sits on the CCCCF board.

Smith was the only applicant to the seat that properly filled out the application, said hospital board chairwoman Debbie Ressler.

■ Also in hospital board business, the hospital board approved hiring the Maitland law firm of Snyderburn, Rishoi & Swann to consider the charitable foundation’s request to change the way it generates grant money. Currently, the foundation invests its money and uses 80% of its revenues to fund local charities. The remaining 20% goes back to the principal investment.

The problem, said foundation member Dr. William Dixon, is that any given year with no revenue would mean local charities getting no money. The foundation members are proposing instead to take 4% of the principal annually to ensure local charities can count of foundation help regardless of market performances.

The law firm will analyze the risks and create bylaws that would allow the change or propose creating a similar revenue mechanism.

Tampa airport says it will test passengers for coronavirus

ST. PETERSBURG — Floridians saw a flurry of positive coronavirus news Tuesday, from an announcement that the state will receive more than 6.4 million rapid tests to one that said Tampa International Airport would begin testing passengers for the virus in the terminal.

The announcements come just days after Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis lifted all restrictions on restaurants and other businesses in Florida,

and banned local fines against people who refuse to wear masks as he seeks to reopen the state’s economy despite the spread of the coronavirus.

DeSantis spoke again during a news conference Tuesday about the need to get the economy in gear.

“I really believe you can do things safely, and telling people no, that they can’t earn a living, I don’t think is something that we want to do. I think we want people to be able to earn a living,” he said.

One day after President Donald Trump announced the federal government has purchased 150 million rapid tests

for the coronavirus, DeSantis said Florida will receive 6.4 million of the tests in addition to what’s being sent directly to the state’s nursing homes.

DeSantis said the state should be getting shipments by the end of the week and receive 400,000 test kits a week.

“You can also use it so that folks who are also more vulnerable will be able to enjoy life to the fullest. For example, if you have a senior who would like to have younger family members come, these will be available. This is a 15 minute deal. You can do that. It really lets people do more,” DeSantis said.

Van Voorthuijsen introduced council to members of the partnership’s Students Working Against Tobacco (SWAT) youth organization, Isabel Baxter and Chloe Baxter, Lecanto High School students, who spoke on cigarette litter and concerns with youth smokers.

“Every year, there’s 1.69 billion pounds of cigarette butts, which don’t break down, dumped on the Earth — as heavy as eight Washington Monuments,” Isabel said. “Discarded tobacco waste also releases toxic chemicals into our water.”

“Nearly nine out of every 10 smokers try their first cigarette by the age of 18,” Chloe added, “and, with the rising popularity of electronic devices, such as e-cigarettes, more youth are initiating the use of nicotine and, as a result, are becoming more addicted.”

During a second and final set of public hearings Monday, Council voted 5-0 to keep Crystal River’s current millage rate of 4.8 for the

2020-21 fiscal year.

City Manager Ken Frink said this would collect \$2.4 million in property taxes to fund 46% of the city’s \$5.23 million general fund, which council also approved unanimously along with a \$5.89 million budget for the city’s Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) District.

Frink said city staff is continuing to look for additional funding sources to keep Crystal River’s millage rate low, like establishing fees to launch commercial paddlecraft from Kings Bay Park.

Council members also voted 5-0 to have Mayor Joe Meek request Iberia Bank to reduce the interest rate on the CRA’s loan for the Riverwalk from 4.2% to 3.95%, saving the city roughly \$8,000 a year, according to Fitzpatrick, who helped secure the reduction.

Also at Monday’s council meeting:

■ Council voted 5-0 in a final public hearing to approve a developer’s modification to their lot’s zoning in order to build a high-end RV community of 652 units north of the Crystal River Mall, between North Turkey Oak Drive and West Auburn Lane.

This 85-acre, 5-to-7-year project, known as Hidden Lakes Preserve RV Resort, will also include up to 150 apartment complex, a club

house, amenities and surround an 80-acre conservation area of small lakes.

Before construction begins on the resort, city officials must approve its design plans.

■ Council voted 5-0 to pay \$37,500 for Kimley-Horn and Associates Inc. to develop and implement Crystal River’s very own Geographic Information System (GIS) database to help the city collect, review and show via interactive maps the geographic data of its lands.

Funding from a previously awarded grant from the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity will reimburse 100% of the city’s costs.

■ Council said goodbye to Citrus County Sheriff’s Office Deputy Jimmy Sudlow for leaving as the Crystal River’s community resource officer to become a marine patrol deputy for the county.

Deputy Jake Fischer will replace Sudlow, according to John Novy, captain of the sheriff’s West District Patrol Division.

“I’m really excited for this position,” Fischer told council members. “I look forward to working with everybody here to better the community.”

Utilities object to halt in disconnections

TALLAHASSEE — Arguing that turning off customers' electricity is a "last resort," four major utilities said Tuesday that a proposal to place at least a 90-day moratorium on disconnections because of the COVID-19 pandemic is unnecessary.

Florida Power & Light, Gulf Power, Duke Energy Florida and Tampa Electric Co. filed documents at the state Public Service Commission pushing back against a proposed emergency rule change that would halt disconnections for customers who can't pay their bills. The Earthjustice legal organization filed the proposal last week on behalf of the League of United Latin American Citizens of Florida and two utility customers.

The utilities pointed Tuesday to a series of efforts they have made to help customers who have struggled as the pandemic has caused widespread job losses and financial troubles.

"In summary, the petitioners' request for an emergency rule change does not

acknowledge the substantial accommodations and extensive options that are already available to customers in need of financial assistance today," attorneys for FPL and Gulf Power, which are sister companies, wrote in one of the filings. "In addition, the request fails to meet the high standard for the promulgation of an emergency rule (under state law). The proactive approach and the expansive set of initiatives instituted by the companies have provided unprecedented assistance to customers impacted by COVID-19 and mitigated excessive incremental bad debt due to COVID-19. Both FPL and Gulf reiterate that disconnecting power is the absolutely last resort, and the companies remain committed to working with their customers through these challenging times."

Utilities suspended disconnections after the pandemic began in the spring but recently have moved forward with plans to turn off electricity for non-payment of bills. Duke and Tampa Electric have resumed disconnections, while FPL this month announced it would resume in October.

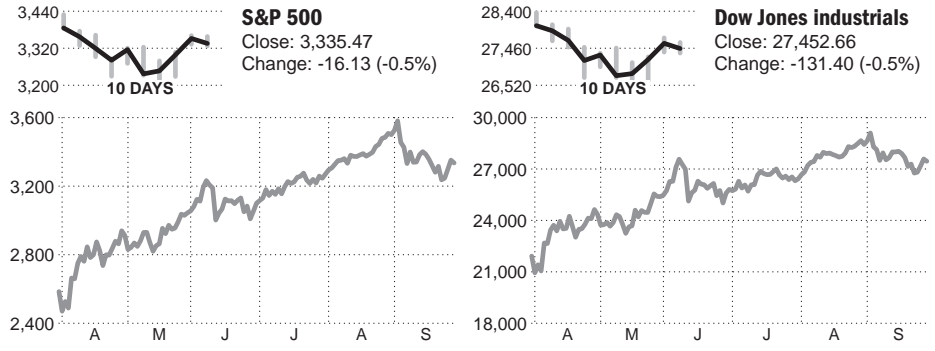

Stocks see losses ahead of first debate

Stocks ended with moderate losses Tuesday as investors waited for the first debate between President Donald Trump and Democratic challenger Joe Biden.

Banks, energy companies and stocks that depend on consumer spending had some of the biggest losses. The price of oil fell 3.2%, dragging much of the energy sector down with it.

Some technology stocks, which have long been the biggest driver of this year's stock market moves, posted gains. Advanced Micro Devices closed up nearly 3% and Facebook rose nearly 2%.

The Trump-Biden debate comes as coronavirus deaths worldwide crossed 1 million. Cases in the U.S. are on the rise again as states attempt to reopen schools and factories.

Investors remain uncertain whether the recovery that happened over the summer was sustainable, and whether the newest surge of cases will be as dramatic as the one in June.

will likely make headlines, Hackett said, but debates generally don't move the markets much.

"It's going to get attention and rightfully so, but there's so much time and motion that's going to happen between now and November," he said.

Investors' confidence has been supported by infusions of central bank support into struggling economies and hopes for development of a coronavirus vaccine.

Congress still is arguing over the size of a new support package after additional unemployment benefits expired.

Commission backs consultant's report, boosts financial aid

On the precipice of losing its county contract it's had for 20 years, Nature Coast EMS will see its annual county subsidy increase after approval by the County Commission.

The additional subsidy from the county will cause Nature Coast's current fiscal assistance jump from a zero net to about \$400,000. Under the previous funding arrangement, the county paid Nature Coast EMS \$244,000 on a schedule that is reduced by 5% each year.

In addition to the subsidy increase, the Commission has agreed to purchase Nature Coast EMS property and lease it back to the nonprofit organization as well as set response time standards.

The new agreement comes following a wholesale change of leadership at Nature Coast EMS, brought upon after county commissioners heard complaints from citizens about poor response times to emergencies, along with accusations of poor management from EMS employees.

The county in January gave Nature Coast two months to come into contract compliance. NCEMS CEO Mike Hall, who had been in that role for 12 years, resigned in February.

Scott Baxter, a former Nature Coast operations manager whom Hall brought back just two months earlier as director of operations, took over for Hall. Baxter has a lengthy history with Nature Coast, including

starting as an emergency medical technician in Citrus County before Nature Coast EMS existed.

The issue, which began in January with accusations and finger pointing recently ended quietly, with smiles all around.

Mike Hall and his team probably would have survived if the county made the investment it is now making.

Unfortunately, it's flabbergasting it took scores of complaints and a consultant's report to sway the commission to increase

funding for such a vital service.

Nature Coast EMS proved that trying to do more and more with less and less is not feasible, and for a commission with a history of trying to provide essential services on the cheap to keep property lows to enhance re-election prospects.

It appears the county might have learned the lesson that essential services have to be sufficiently funded to accomplish their missions. We have our fingers crossed that's the case.

But this a short-term fix and a long-term resolution is needed.

The county would be well-served to examine the process to combine EMS and fire rescue services. We're wasting taxpayer dollars by operating two agencies.

Hernando, Marion, Sumter and Pasco counties all do the same thing.

The benefits of hospice

Douglas S. had a very hard life. He was living in a hotel in Homosassa and was very ill when he was brought onto hospice service. When the admission nurse arrived she quickly realized he had little food and was unable to care for himself. He was unkempt, there were feces on the floor, an oxygen concentrator that was filthy, and the room had bed bugs.

During this visit, Douglas confided to the nurse that he was running out of funds to continue living in the hotel. Quickly, she admitted Douglas onto HPH Hospice services and communicated his living conditions and financial circumstances to the care team.

Because of the generosity of the Citrus County Community Charitable Foundation and a grant they awarded to the Citrus Hospice Care Center, HPH Hospice was able to immediately move Douglas to the care center. When he arrived he had a sore on the top of his foot from a rat bite, his beard was long and mangled, he was filthy and he had bed bugs in his belongings. The staff immediately gave

him several baths, a haircut, and shaved his beard. They fed him and treated him like he was royalty. They had won his trust and he confided in them some aspects of his life.

He shared that he had a son who had been estranged from him for many years. He also shared that he was a Vietnam veteran. With tears in his eyes, he shared what it was like when he returned home from Vietnam. He and other veterans were not respected, and once he was even spit on for being part of that war.

The team rallied and arranged for a bedside veteran pinning ceremony. During the pinning, Douglas became very emotional and cried. He stated that this was the first time anyone had thanked him for his military service. He could not thank the team enough for the recognition.

As an added blessing for the patient, the team worked diligently to locate Douglas's estranged son. They found that he lived in New York City and was working as a security guard at Mount Sinai Hospital. They contacted him and talked about his

dad. The son recounted that he also was a military veteran and was a decorated Marine.

Unfortunately, due to the stay-at-home orders from the COVID pandemic, the son would not be able to come and visit for one last time. The care team arranged to provide a FaceTime visit for the father and son, to allow them to reconnect and say their goodbyes.

During this very emotional encounter, Douglas asked his son for forgiveness for "being less of a father than he deserved" and thanked him for "growing to be a better man than he was."

Very shortly after the Face Time visit, Douglas developed respiratory distress. He died two days later. His son expressed that he was so very grateful to the team for the care they gave to his father. He was at peace knowing that he and his father had resolved their hard feelings and his father died with respect, dignity and honor.

What is going on in our United States?

On Aug. 12, 2017, neo-Nazis and neo-fascists clashed with counter protesters in Charlottesville, Virginia. The protest ended when a white supremacist drove his car into a crowd of counter protesters, killing one young woman and injuring 19 others.

Every state has a system called absentee voting and the military has been using it since the Civil War. Absentee ballots must be requested. Vote by mail automatically sends every registered voter a ballot.

In Florida, you must request your vote-by-mail ballot. Florida has a system that is referred to as VBM, but in our state, any registered voter can request a ballot by mail. You can also vote in person.

COVID-19 is requiring us to change how we cast our ballots and vote.

Election day is Nov. 3, and we have not yet controlled this virus and leaders in every state are trying to keep us safe and healthy. Florida already has a system in place that will allow at risk people to vote safely.

Research shows that voting by mail increases voter turnout. The U.S. trails other countries in voter turnout. We need to do everything we can to get more voters to the polls to vote.

Finally, voting by mail is a tested secure process in Florida. Only .0006% of mail-in votes have been considered fraudulent over the past 20 years. www.snopes.com/fact-check/absentee-ballot-fraud-heritage.

Cameron defends 'thorough and complete case'

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Kentucky's attorney general has acknowledged that he never asked the grand jury to consider homicide charges against police in the killing of Breonna Taylor.

Amid outrage over the long-awaited charging decision, Attorney General Daniel Cameron said he would agree with a judge's order to make public a recording of the proceedings, and that he wouldn't object if members of the panel want to speak publicly about their grand jury experience.

In his statement Monday night, Cameron also revealed that the only charge he recommended to the jury was wanton endangerment. He had previously declined to provide details on what charges prosecutors brought to the grand jury to consider when it met last week.

Cameron said the grand jury is meant to be a "secretive body," but "It's apparent that the public interest in this case isn't going to allow that to happen."

Cameron said a recording of the grand jury proceedings would be released Wednesday.

"Once the public listens to the recording, they will see that over the course of two-and-a-half days, our team presented a thorough and complete case to the grand jury," Cameron said.

But the public deserves to know if any other criminal charges were explored by the grand jury aside from Cameron's recommendation, said attorney Kevin Glogower, who is representing a grand juror who sued to have the recordings released.

"We still don't know what charges, if any, were presented outside of that recommendation," Glogower told reporters Tuesday morning. Cameron has "yet to answer what was actually presented as far as the charges and the individual they were directed to. I think that's important to know and my client feels the same."

Cameron said at a news conference last week that prosecutors "walked them (the grand jury) through every homicide offense and also presented all of the information that was available to the grand jury."

The grand jury in Louisville issued charges against one officer, Brett

Hankison, for endangering three of Taylor's neighbors by firing through her home, into an adjacent unit where bullets missed people.

None of the officers were indicted in the killing of Taylor, who was shot five times after officers knocked down her door to serve a narcotics warrant on March 13.

Cameron said last week that two of the officers, Jonathan Mattingly and Myles Cosgrove, were justified in firing their weapons because Taylor's boyfriend had fired at them.

Mattingly was struck by a bullet in the leg. There was no conclusive evidence that any of Hankison's bullets hit Taylor, Cameron said.

A coroner's report says Taylor was shot five times and died of multiple gunshot wounds. It says she was hit in the torso, her upper left extremity and both lower extremities. She tested negative for drugs and alcohol.

"Our prosecutors presented all of the evidence, even though the evidence supported that Sgt. Mattingly and Detective Cosgrove were justified in their use of force after having been fired upon by Kenneth Walker," Cameron said in the statement. "For that reason, the only charge recommended was wanton endangerment."

Hankison, who was fired from the force for his actions during the raid, pleaded not guilty on Monday.

Also Monday, an unidentified grand juror filed a court motion asking a judge to release the record of the proceedings, and to allow the panel's members to talk publicly about their experiences.

Cameron suggested that his office would not stand in their way: "We have no concerns with grand jurors sharing their thoughts on our presentation because we are confident in the case we presented."

The motion also said there was a "compelling public interest" to have the grand jury record released. The filing accused Cameron of "using the grand jury to deflect accountability and responsibility for (the indictment) decisions..."

Such a public disclosure of grand jury minutes is rare. Most states have laws that would make it impossible. Other states, such as California, allow it under very specific circumstances, and some places require a judge's order.

1 million+

Worldwide death toll from coronavirus

NEW DELHI — The worldwide death toll from the coronavirus has eclipsed 1 million, nine months into a crisis that has devastated the global economy, tested world leaders' resolve, pitted science against politics and forced multitudes to change the way they live, learn and work.

"It's not just a number. It's human beings. It's people we love," said Dr. Howard Markel, a professor of medical history at the University of Michigan who has advised government officials on containing pandemics and lost his 84-year-old mother to COVID-19 in February.

"It's our brothers, our sisters. It's people we know," he added. "And if you don't have that human factor right in your face, it's very easy to make it abstract."

The bleak milestone, recorded on Monday in the U.S. by Johns Hopkins University, is greater than the population of Jerusalem or Austin, Texas. It is 2 1/2 times the sea of humanity that was at Woodstock in 1969. It is more than four times the number killed by the 2004

earthquake and tsunami in the Indian Ocean.

Even then, the figure is almost certainly a vast undercount because of inadequate or inconsistent testing and reporting and suspected concealment by some countries.

And the number continues to mount. Nearly 5,000 deaths are reported each day on average. Parts of Europe are getting hit by new outbreaks, and experts fear a second wave in the U.S., which accounts for about 205,000 deaths, or 1 out of 5 worldwide.

That is far more than

any other country, despite America's wealth and medical resources.

"I can understand why ... numbers are losing their power to shock, but I still think it's really important that we understand how big these numbers really are," said Mark Honigsbaum, author of "The Pandemic Century: One Hundred Years of Panic, Hysteria and Hubris."

The pandemic's toll of 1 million dead in such a limited time rivals some of the gravest threats to public health, past and present.

Experts see national security concern in president's debt

WASHINGTON — Revelations that President Donald Trump is personally liable for more than \$400 million in debt are casting a shadow over his presidency that ethics experts say raises national security concerns he could be manipulated to sway U.S. policy by organizations or individuals he's indebted to.

New scrutiny of Trump, who claims great success as a private businessman, comes after The New York Times reported that tax records show he is personally carrying a staggering amount of debt — including more than \$300 million in loans that will come due in the next four years.

Sen. Elizabeth Warren, D-Mass., was blunt about the potential implications. "He may be vulnerable to financial blackmail from a hostile foreign power and God knows what else," said Warren, a frequent Trump critic.

The Times said the tax records also show that Trump did not pay any federal income taxes in 11 years between 2000 and 2018, raising questions about

the fairness of a president — who purports to be a billionaire — paying less in taxes than most Americans.

The politically damaging revelations about Trump's tax avoidance, however, are perhaps less concerning than word the president is holding hundreds of millions of dollars of soon-to-mature debt, ethics experts said.

"Americans should be concerned about the president's debt because it's a national security risk for our country," said Donald Sherman, deputy director of the nonprofit government watchdog group Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington (CREW). "This is information that the president has aggressively and repeatedly tried to keep away from the public."

Trump, citing an ongoing Internal Revenue Service audit, has refused to follow the post-Watergate precedent set by other presidents of releasing his tax returns, so the complexities of his financial interests and who he does business with have remained opaque. He's fighting ongoing court battles with New York's attorney general, Manhattan's district attorney and two House committees who want the records.

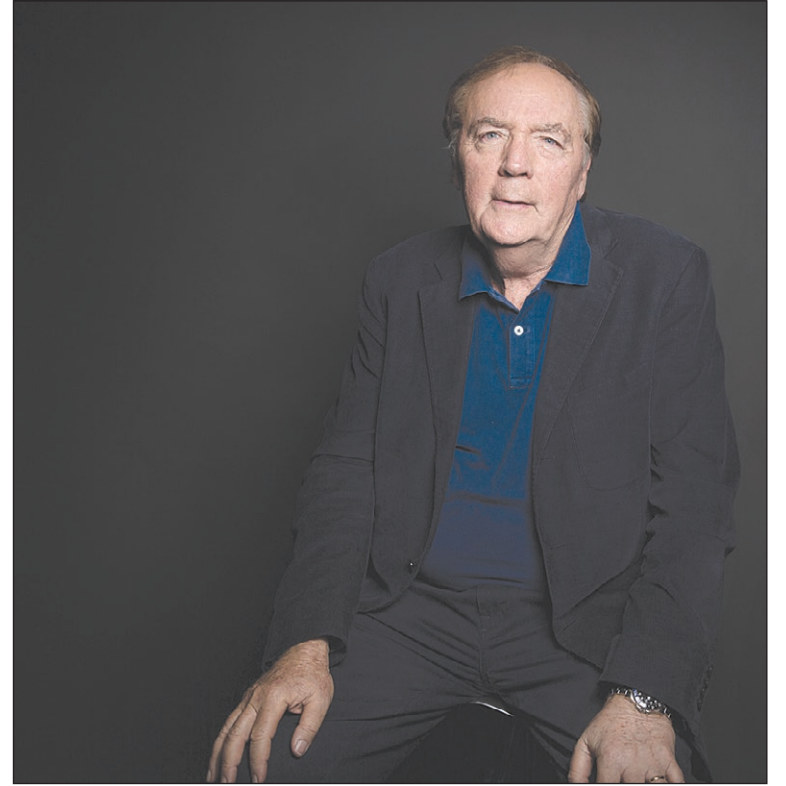
NEW YORK — Thousands of schoolteachers will receive \$500 grants from author James Patterson to help students build reading skills, especially as schools struggle to adapt to the coronavirus pandemic.

"Whether students are learning virtually at home or in the classroom, the importance of keeping them reading cannot be underscored enough," Patterson said in a statement Tuesday.

"Reading teaches kids empathy, gives them an escape when they most need it, helps them grapple with harsh realities, and perhaps most importantly, will remind them that they are not alone — even if they're unable to see their teachers, classmates and friends in-person," he said.

The grant program is administered by Patterson and by Scholastic Book Clubs, which will provide teachers 500 club points to go with the \$500 from Patterson. Out of more than 100,000 applicants, 5,000 teachers will receive grants and club points.

Tuesday's announcement marks the sixth installment in the Patterson Partnership for building home and school libraries. Patterson, one of the world's best-selling novelists, has given more than \$11 million to teachers, along with millions he has given to bookstores, libraries and literacy organizations.

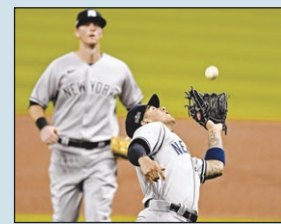

Lightning end marathon season with Cup

*First team to win
18 playoff games*

Defenseman Ryan McDonagh was preparing to answer one last question regarding the Tampa Bay Lightning's Stanley Cup championship when teammates Nikita Kucherov and Alex Killorn crashed the room, putting an abrupt and celebratory end to the news conference.

"Who's next? Next question," Kucherov said, looking into the camera.

With McDonagh stopping in mid-sentence, Killorn stepped behind the podium and said, "We're not staying here all night, man."

The wait for the Lightning — and the NHL — was long enough after Tampa Bay clinched the Cup with a 2-0 win in Game 6 against Dallas on Monday night in Edmonton, Alberta.

The Lightning raised the Cup 363 days after the first puck was dropped

on the 2019-20 season, and some 6 1/2 months after hockey was put on pause due to the coronavirus pandemic.

"We knew what we were capable of with our whole roster, and we were pretty thankful to get the opportunity to come back and play," McDonagh said. "Right from Day 1, we were focused and dialed in on a mission. And now, we can say mission accomplished."

The Lightning's title, their second after winning in 2004, was historic.

In becoming the first team to win the Cup after the month of June, the Lightning also became the first to win 18 playoff games, including two in a preliminary round seeding series, as opposed to the standard 16. And they did so while spending 65 days in the NHL bubble, starting in Toronto before relocating to Edmonton for the conference finals.

"Obviously, we can go back and look at what's going on in the world now," said Maroon, who won the Cup last year with St. Louis. "I think a lot of us are going to sit back and talk about this one a lot, because this one was a

Snell sharp, Margot HR, Tampa Bay beats Blue Jays 3-1 in opener

ST. PETERSBURG — Beyond ace lefty Blake Snell, the small-market Tampa Bay Rays are light on household names.

On the postseason stage, the American League's No. 1 seed showed just where all that dominance is coming from.

"Tonight was a pretty good representation of the Tampa Bay Rays — our players, how we go about winning games," manager Kevin Cash said. "We found success being really good in tight games. Pitching, the defense, and timely hits are the reasons for it."

With Snell taking a no-hitter into the sixth inning, shortstop Willy Adames making splashy defensive plays and Manuel Margot delivering a two-run homer, the AL East champions opened

the playoffs Tuesday with a 3-1 victory over the Toronto Blue Jays.

The Rays will try to advance in the best-of-three wild-card matchup Game 2 at Tropicana Field, where seats will be empty with the exceptions family and friends from both teams.

"It's a bigger stage right now and not a lot of our guys have really played in the playoffs before," the son of Hall of Famer Craig Biggio added, "but I think we learned from this one today."

Snell allowed just two baserunners until Alejandro Kirk singled leading off the sixth. The 27-year-old lefty retired the next two batters, but Cash didn't give him a chance to finish the inning.

Diego Castillo, Nick Anderson and

Pete Fairbanks followed the starter, limiting the Blue Jays to two singles, two doubles and Bo Bichette's eighth-inning sacrifice fly the rest of the way.

Fairbanks closed for his first save of the season as Cash kept taking a fresh and innovative approach to using his pitching staff.

Snell yielded one hit, walked two and struck out nine, tying a Rays postseason record.

"I'm getting into a groove. It usually takes me a little while to get going anyway," Snell said. "It's been two months but I usually start slow. I'm starting to get the hang of it, starting to feel it. The playoff energy always gets me a lot more excited, for sure."

LeBron and the Heat, together again

LAKE BUENA VISTA — LeBron James wants to beat the Miami Heat. The Miami Heat want to beat LeBron James.

These shouldn't be surprising notions to anyone, not with a title at stake.

Those looking for more acrimony than that, well, they may be disappointed.

The NBA Finals start Wednesday night and the James vs. Miami story line is shaping up as little more than a meeting of the mutual admiration society, albeit with a championship at stake. James is looking to bring the Los Angeles Lakers back to basketball's mountaintop for the first time since 2010 and the Heat are looking to cap a surprising season with their fourth crown.

"I'm here for one reason and one reason only, and that's to compete for a championship," James said on the eve of Game 1 of his 10th finals, where he'll be seeking ring No. 4.

James was asked any number of different ways Tuesday about his time in Miami, his thoughts on coach Erik Spoelstra, his opinion of Heat President Pat Riley. He never took the bait, speaking only with fondness for the four years he spent in Miami and the two titles the Heat won during that stay.

"Being a part of that culture allowed me to grow, allowed me to see what it takes to not only compete for a championship but also to win a championship," James said. "So, it definitely put me in a position where I knew what it took. I saw what it took. But also, I fit that culture as well because of how hard I worked. It was a perfect match for those four years."

James left Miami and the finals have been an almost-annual stop since; this is his fifth appearance in the title round in the six seasons that followed his Heat tenure. It's the first time Miami has been back since he left. During that time, the Heat did some rebuilding a couple of times and used 60 different players in those six seasons. Miami also endured the departure, return and then retirement of Dwyane Wade and the premature end of Chris Bosh's career for health reasons.

Spoelstra is designing a game plan with hopes of keeping

Yankees clobber Indians in opener, 12-3

*Twins' record
playoff losing
streak to 17*

CLEVELAND — Aaron Judge smashed a tone-setting, two-run homer on Shane Bieber's fourth pitch, Gerrit Cole struck out 13 and the New York Yankees opened the AL playoffs with a resounding 12-3 win over the Cleveland Indians on Tuesday night.

Just a few miles from where the Trump-Biden presidential debate took place, the Yankees made quite a statement in teeing off on Bieber, who was baseball's best pitcher in the condensed regular season but looked average in his playoff debut.

Judge and the rest of New York's hitters hadn't faced Bieber in 2020, but they were well prepared and took some meaty cuts against the 25-year-old ace, who gave up season highs in runs (seven) and hits (nine) over 4 2/3 innings — his shortest stint since June 9 last season against the Yankees.

The best-of-three series continues Wednesday night with Carlos Carrasco trying to save Cleveland's season against Masahiro Tanaka.

When Bieber's final pitch clanged loudly off the empty left-field bleachers on a two-run homer by Gleyber Torres in the fifth, the Yankees were up 7-2 and had delivered a boisterous postseason message to the rest of baseball: Don't forget us.

Bieber then handed the ball to acting Indians manager Sandy Alomar Jr. and walked slowly toward Cleveland's dugout, seemingly carrying all of the city's hopes for a long run with him. The Indians have lost seven straight playoff games.

Staked to an early lead on Judge's homer, Cole showed why

the Yanks shelled out \$324 million for him in the offseason. The right-hander gave up two runs — including Josh Naylor's homer in the fourth — and six hits in seven innings.

Naylor went 4 for 4 and became the first player with three extra-base hits in his postseason debut.

Cole's strikeouts were the second-most by a New York pitcher in postseason history.

Roger Clemens fanned 15 in Game 4 of the 2000 ALCS.

Astros 4, Twins 1

MINNEAPOLIS — Jose Altuve drew a bases-loaded walk to force in the go-ahead run in the ninth inning for Houston after a two-out error by shortstop Jorge Polanco, and the Astros beat Minnesota 4-1 Tuesday to open their AL playoff series and stretch the Twins' all-time record postseason losing streak to

17 games.

Manager Dusty Baker's Astros became the first team in major league history to win a game after reaching the postseason with a losing record.

Game 2 in the best-of-three wild-card matchup is Wednesday at Target Field.

Michael Brantley tacked on a two-run single in the ninth after Sergio Romo issued a full-count walk to the 5-foot-6 Altuve, the 2017 AL MVP

who had a quiet season at the plate.

Framber Valdez, who made 10 regular-season starts for the Astros, pitched five scoreless innings in relief of Zack Greinke for the victory to keep the bullpen fresh for the rest of the series. Valdez allowed his only two hits with one out in the ninth, but Williams Astudillo grounded into a double play to end the game.

Twins manager Rocco Baldelli called for Romo, the fifth of six pitchers, to start the ninth. The Astros loaded the bases on two singles to start the inning and then the crippling two-out error, when Polanco's throw to second base after a straight-at-him grounder was low to blow the forceout.

White Sox 4, Athletics 1

OAKLAND, Calif. — Lucas Giolito dazzled in his postseason debut, stymieing the Oakland Athletics through six perfect innings and sending the Chicago White Sox to a 4-1 victory in the opener of their best-of-three wild-card series.

Giolito (1-0) yelled in delight after striking out the side in the sixth, quickly walking back to the dugout with his arms to his side.

The right-hander, who pitched a no-hitter against Pittsburgh on Aug. 25, didn't allow a baserunner to the AL West champions until Tommy La Stella's single up the middle to start the seventh. Giolito gave up one run on two hits over seven innings, struck out eight and walked one before giving way to Evan Marshall after a stellar 100-pitch outing.

Giolito got plenty of support: José Abreu hit a two-run homer and Adam Engel also connected for Chicago. Yasmani Grandal homered in the eighth.

Alex Colome, Chicago's third reliever, worked the ninth for a save in the 2-hour, 53-minute game.

Before the single by La Stella, Jake Lamb's line drive to center in the fifth was the hardest-hit ball against Giolito by the powerful A's, whose offense struggled down the stretch.

Djokovic leaves French Open foe 'suffocated'

PARIS — Novak Djokovic's backhand clipped the net and landed wide, so he shook his head. That was it.

Later, a too-soft drop shot found the white tape and bounced back on his own side, finally ceding a game in a dominant debut performance at the 2020 French Open. Djokovic simply bowed and walked to the sideline.

And when he flubbed yet another drop shot — he kept using them on the slow red clay during a 6-0, 6-3, 6-2 win over 80th-ranked Mikael Ymer — and got broken Tuesday, Djokovic pulled an extra tennis ball out of his pocket and merely gave it a gentle tap with his racket strings.

The ball landed right behind him, safely in the middle of the court.

Playing his first Grand Slam match since his U.S. Open disqualification for smacking a ball after dropping a game and accidentally striking a line judge in throat, Djokovic never really gave himself reason for histrionics or shouts of dismay or displays of anger. Sure, there was some eye-rolling and one

sarcastic kiss directed at one of the few fans on hand under the roof at Court Philippe Chatrier.

But otherwise, what was there for Djokovic to be disturbed about?

"I just felt very suffocated out there. It's just corner, corner; very, very rarely miss. His position is unreal in the court," Ymer

explained.

"You know how the snake kills its prey?" Ymer said, pantomiming a boa constrictor's attack by bringing his arms around and putting his hands together. "That's a little bit how I felt being out there."

Ymer said he didn't pay any attention to Djokovic's mood or energy.

And Djokovic, for his part, said that what happened in Flushing Meadows was of no concern to him, either, as he began his pursuit of a second title at Roland Garros and 18th Grand Slam trophy overall.

"I have not had any traces of New York in my

mind. I'm over it. Honestly forgot about it. I'm not thinking about it," the No. 1 seed said after improving to 32-1 in 2020, the only blemish being that fourth-round default this month.

"Winning a 6-love first set is the best possible way to start a Grand Slam," he said. "This is exactly what my intentions will be — trying to get off the blocks very strong, with a good intensity, obviously, because players in the early rounds have nothing to lose."

Maybe that's why 17-year-old Clara Tauson of Denmark was able to earn her first tour-level win by knocking off U.S. Open semifinalist and No. 21 seed Jennifer Brady 6-4, 3-6, 9-7.

Or why No. 19 Alison Riske and No. 26 Donna Vekic also lost.

Australian Open champion Sofia Kenin found herself in quite a tussle but got through it, struggling a bit when a rain delay interrupting things after the first set, but emerging with a 6-4, 3-6, 6-3 victory against 125th-ranked Liudmila

Samsonova.

"Just relieved," the fourth-seeded Kenin said.

Others feeling that way on Day 3 at the year's last Grand Slam tournament included No. 2 seed Karolina Pliskova, who came back to beat 172nd-ranked qualifier Mayar Sherif 6-7 (9), 6-2, 6-4; and the two men who were finalists at the Hamburg tuneup event that ended Sunday, No. 5 Stefanos Tsitsipas and No. 13 Andrey Rublev.

Both dropped the first two sets before coming back to win. Tsitsipas trailed Jaume Munar before advancing 4-6, 2-6, 6-1, 6-4, 6-4, while Rublev knelt on court and covered his face with his hands after turning things around to beat Sam Querrey 6-7 (5), 6-7 (4), 7-5, 6-4, 6-3.

Another American who played a five-setter, Marcos Giron, did pick up a win, edging Quentin Halys 7-5, 3-6, 6-7 (5), 7-5, 8-6 to become the eighth U.S. man to reach the second round.

That's the most in Paris since nine got that far in 1996.

Give Them Shelter

If you have a pet at home, there's a good chance it came from an animal shelter.

Animal shelters care for millions of abandoned or injured dogs and cats each year. There are about 5,000 animal shelters in the United States.

What is a shelter?

Most shelters are places that care for animals for a short while. Few can care for animals for the rest of their natural lives.

Shelters care for the animals while workers search for good homes for them. They find homes for millions of animals every year.

Dogs and cats are the main animals in shelters. However, they also care for many other animals people have as pets. Sometimes wild animals end up in shelters, too.

What do shelters do?

Shelters take in abandoned or injured animals. Often they care for lost or stray dogs and cats until their owners claim them.

Animal control officers also rescue animals from situations where the animals are being treated cruelly. Animals that have been pets don't do well on their own. Shelters look after these animals.

Shelters provide food, water, housing and medical care. Workers pet and play with the animals.

Mini Fact:

Animal shelters take in many kinds of animals, including guinea pigs, lizards, ferrets and snakes.

This mother cat and her three kittens are feral (FAIR-uhl), or wild. They live by hunting.

Spaying and neutering

Experts say the most important thing people can do to help their pets is to get them spayed or neutered. This means the animals get an operation to be sure they can't have kittens or puppies. They are asleep during the operation, so they aren't scared or in pain.

Spaying and neutering are important because there are so many animals needing care and not enough homes or shelters for them. One cat or dog can have many litters in its life. Its kittens or puppies can have many litters, too. This can end up creating thousands of new cats and dogs.

Good homes needed!

Unfortunately, shelters cannot care for all the hurt or abandoned animals that come through their doors. Experts say that from 6 to 8 million dogs and cats are brought into shelters in America each year. About half of those are euthanized (YOU-thuh-NIZD), or painlessly killed.

How to help

If you see an animal you think is being mistreated, tell an adult you trust. *Never* approach a strange animal. Do not go onto someone else's property. Tell a parent, a teacher or a police officer. Animal cruelty is illegal everywhere in America.

You can volunteer at a local shelter. Because much of the country is still under COVID-19 restrictions, you might have to wait to volunteer in person, but you can do other things to help out the shelter workers.

You could:

- Stuff envelopes for the shelter's mailings.
- Collect and deliver items shelters need*, such as:

✓ pet food and treats

✓ kitty litter

✓ washable toys

✓ first-aid supplies

✓ soft towels and blankets



* Call your local shelter first to see which supplies they most need.

Annie offers advice

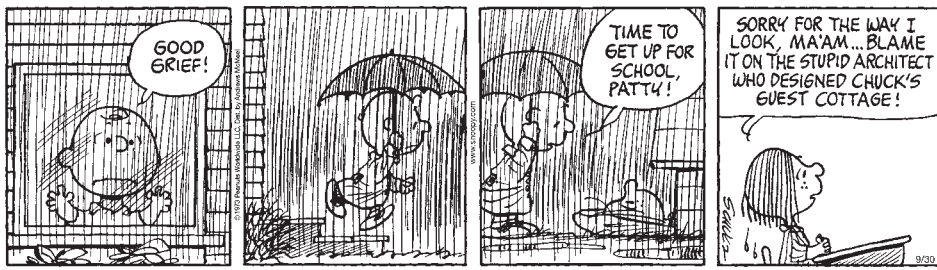
