### Clerk raises awareness of domestic violence

In recognition of October as Domestic Violence Awareness Month, the Citrus County Clerk of Courts is reminding county residents about its ongoing dedication to combat the offense.

"Domestic violence does not discriminate," Clerk of the Court Angela Vick said. "Anyone can be a victim regardless of age, race, religion, or gender. There is no shame in seeking protection from someone who means you harm, even if that person is a family member."

With delicacy, urgency and confidentiality, members of the clerk's Family Services Injunction Team help protect victims of domestic, repeat, sexual, dating and stalking violence by either connecting them to advocacy programs or aiding them with obtaining restraining orders.

### Road ranger hit by car while setting up detour

BROOKSVILLE — A Florida Department of Transportation road ranger who was setting up a detour following a crash on Interstate 75 early Thursday was hit by an inattentive driver who went around traffic cones, troopers said.

The ranger, who works for the Florida Department of Transportation, was taken to a hospital with serious injuries, the Florida Highway Patrol reported. He was later listed in stable condition.

The incident began around 2 a.m. Thursday when a southbound tractor trailer carrying frozen food overtook slower traffic, forcing the driver to take evasive action to avoid a crash, trooper said. The truck then crashed into an inside barrier wall and the tractor separated from the trailer. Parts of it ended up in the northbound lanes of I-75 and caught fire.

A vehicle heading north hit debris from the crash, the report said.

The road ranger was setting up a detour when an inattentive 71-year-old driver hit him, troopers said.

## Following a family tragedy, LHS paraprofessional promotes fire safety

Lecanto Primary School (LPS) paraprofessional Heather Renfroe is determined to make some good come from a family tragedy.

On Oct. 5, 2019, Renfroe's stepdaughter lost her two children in a house fire in Forsyth County, Georgia. Shaun Noe Jr. was 12 and Morgan Noe was 9.

The fire started at 2:43 a.m., Renfroe said. "It went up so fast," she said.

The master bedroom was located on the first floor, while the children's bedrooms were upstairs.

By the time Renfroe's stepdaughter was awoken by the fire, it had hit the gas line.

"The stairs were gone," she said. "There was no way to get to them."

Renfroe's family is a firefighter's family. Her husband is a retired firefighter and his father was a fire captain. The family had a fire plan, they had an escape plan, but without working smoke detectors, there wasn't enough time to get to Shaun and Morgan.

Renfroe said 30 years ago, a person had about 17 minutes to get out of a house fire. Because of synthetic material now used on sofas and other furniture and carpets, "you have less than five now."

After the fire, Renfroe said she needed to make sure this didn't happen to another family.

"I need something good to come out of it," she said. "We can help someone to not have to feel our pain."

For this reason, Renfroe goes above and beyond for Fire Safety Week at LPS, Oct. 4 through 8, to honor her grandchildren.

For pre-k and kindergarten classes, Renfroe wrote an interactive book to go along with her fire safety video. Students fill the book out and take it home to review with their parents or guardians.

When they return the book, they earn a little rubber duck dressed as a fireman.

## FWC backs osprey for state bird

Add the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to the supporters of doing away with the mockingbird as the state bird during the 2022 legislative session.

Commissioners agreed Thursday to offer the osprey as a potential replacement for the mockingbird — Florida's avian symbol since 1927.

Sen. Jeff Brandes, R-St. Petersburg, has filed a proposal (SCR 324) to rescind the designation of the mockingbird as the state bird. Meanwhile, Sen. Tina Polsky,

# Test-drive the roundabout

The roundabout test track will be available for any interested drivers to use between 9:30 a.m. and noon on Wednesday, Oct. 13, and from 4-6 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 14, near the school complex in Lecanto. The real roundabout will begin construction in November at the intersection of U.S. 98 and County Road 491 in northern Hernando County.



The intersection of U.S. 98 and County Road 491 has been the scene of numerous accidents. The Florida Department of Transportation plans to rework the intersection, establishing a roundabout designed to slow traffic and minimize the potential for wrecks.

## US 98/CR 491 circle may be experienced in Lecanto before it is constructed

Understanding that some drivers may have never driven through a roundabout, the Florida Department of Transportation, District Seven, is offering area residents the opportunity to drive their own vehicles through a test track, set up to the dimensions of the roundabout that will begin construction in November at the intersection of U.S. 98 and

County Road 491. Drivers participating in the test-drive sessions will be able to get a feel for how the roundabout will function, without the distraction of traffic. Staff will be available to answer questions and distribute informational materials.

A full-scale version of the future U.S. 98/C.R. 491 highway roundabout has been set up in Citrus County. This roundabout test track will be available for any

interested drivers to use between 9:30 a.m. and noon on Wednesday, Oct. 13, and from 4-6 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 14.

Directions to the test track roundabout: Take Citrus Way (C.R. 491) and turn west onto West Educational Path. Stay on West Educational Path as it turns into South Panther Pride Drive. Keep following South Panther Pride Drive to the dead end at the north. Guide signs to the test track will be posted

along West Educational Path and South Panther Pride Drive.

Drivers are invited to drop by during any of the listed hours. The mock roundabout will only be open to the public during the dates and times listed; do not show up outside these days/hours as access to the test track area will be locked.

As the weather begins to cool down, pots of delicious chili will heat us up. Citrus County foodies are invited to sample the labors of local cooks as they compete for the tastiest chili.

The 20th annual CASI Chili Cook-off for Charity is slated for Saturday, Oct. 9, and Sunday, Oct. 10, at Nature's Resort, 10359 W. Halls River Road in Homosassa.

The cook-off will benefit the Citrus Aid Cancer Foundation, Citrus County Anti-Drug Coalition, Citrus County Blessings and Lecanto Levi's 4-H Club.

On Saturday, chili cooks will go head-to-head for the 2021 CASI Florida State Chili Championship. The contest includes CASI, open and junior divisions. Participants will be asked to make two gallons of chili for public tasting.

Registration for judging cups will be on the clubhouse deck between 9 and 10 a.m. Gates will open at 10 a.m. and tasting will begin at noon. Public admission is \$5.

There will also be basket raffles, a 50/50 drawing, vendors, music and a Halloween themed golf cart parade at 4:30 p.m. Registration is \$10 and golf carts, bikes and ATVs are welcome.

On Saturday, the public will also have the option to participate in the traditional and nontraditional salsa contests with open and youth (17 and under) categories with a \$10 entry fee.

Traditional salsa is a spicy blend of tomatoes, onions and hot pepper, with secondary ingredients like garlic, salt and cilantro.

Anything goes in the non-traditional salsa category, including Pico de Gallo, Verde, Greek or fruit-based.

Any fruit, vegetable or spice is acceptable. Salsa will be judged based on color, appearance, aroma, flavor, texture and heat.

A pint of homemade salsa must be turned in by noon. This will be a judging only contest — no public tasting.

On Sunday, chili cooks may compete in the 2021 Sunshine State Chili Pod Cook-off. This is open to the CASI division only and costs \$20 to enter. Chili must be turned in by noon and will not be served to the public.

# Man arrested for trespassing into house to abuse woman while she slept

A Homosassa man is accused of entering a home where he was unwelcome to sexually abuse a woman while she slept.

Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies booked 36-year-old Billy Joe Roseberry into the county jail the afternoon of Saturday, Oct. 2.

Roseberry faces charges of burglary involving battery, trespassing, criminal mischief and sexual battery on a person over the age 18 without consent and without violence.

Deputies set Roseberry's bond at \$36,500 when they jailed him, but a judge increased the bond amount to \$126,500 during Roseberry's first court appearance on Sunday.

According to

Roseberry's arrest report, obtained Thursday, deputies responded Saturday morning to an undisclosed address in Citrus County.

A woman there told authorities Roseberry entered the home and touched her genitals while she was sleeping on the couch. She said Roseberry

was forced outside, where he then struck the side mirror of her vehicle with his fist before he threatened her and left.

Both the woman and the homeowner said Roseberry had been trespassing from the property before because he would harass the woman, claiming he

was trying to "get her back" when the couple was never in a romantic relationship.

Deputies met with Roseberry at his home and questioned him.

According to the arrest

report, Roseberry admitted to being at the woman's house but denied touching either her or her vehicle.

Roseberry is due to be arraigned on his charges Oct. 18.

## What's behind the Hollywood strike?

A major Hollywood strike could be on the horizon for some 60,000 behind-the-scenes workers in the entertainment industry. Over the weekend, members of the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees (IATSE) overwhelmingly voted in favor of authorizing a nationwide strike for the first time in its history.

Here we look at who is involved, what they're asking for and what's at stake.

### WHAT IS THE IATSE?

The International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees (IATSE) is a 128-year-old union representing over 150,000 artists, craftspeople and technicians in the entertainment industry in the United States and Canada. Comprised of cinematographers, costumers, set designers, script supervisors, hair and makeup artists, animators, stagehands and many, many more, the IATSE represents essentially everyone who works in any form of entertainment (including movies, television, theater, concerts, trade shows and broadcasting) who isn't an actor, director, producer or screenwriter.

### WHY ARE THEY IN THE NEWS?

The three-year contracts that cover about 60,000 of the union's members — one that primarily covers film and TV production in Los Angeles and Hollywood and another that covers other production hubs including New Mexico and Georgia — expired in July. For the past four months, the union

has been negotiating new terms with the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers (AMPTP). Those discussions fell apart on Sept. 20. The IATSE says that the AMPTP have failed to address their biggest workplace problems, and membership voted overwhelmingly to give the organization's president, Matthew D. Loeb, the ability to authorize a strike.

### WHAT ARE THE PROBLEMS?

The IATSE says its members are subjected to excessive working hours, unlivable wages for the lowest paid crafts and failure to provide reasonable rest, including meal breaks and time off between marathon working days and weekend work. Further, they say that workers on some "new media" streaming projects get paid even less. The Instagram account

@ia\_stories has been sharing anonymous accounts of some harrowing personal workplace stories and the effects of the excessively long hours on everything from personal safety to mental health.

### IS A STRIKE INEVITABLE?

No, and leadership on both sides have said they would like to avoid it if possible. On Tuesday, the IATSE and the AMPTP resumed negotiations.

### WHAT HAPPENS IF THEY DO STRIKE?

With 60,000 workers covered under the expired agreements, most productions would have to shut down in the U.S., including network shows and Netflix productions. But not all are affected: The IATSE contracts for "pay tv," including HBO, Showtime, Starz, Cinemax and BET, don't expire until Dec. 31, 2022.

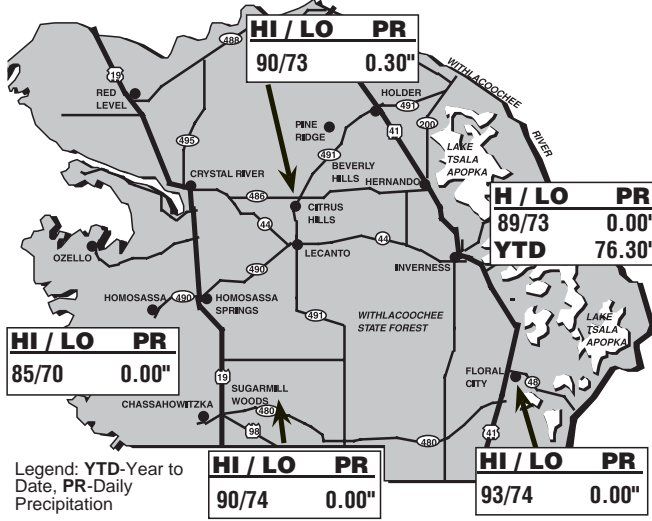

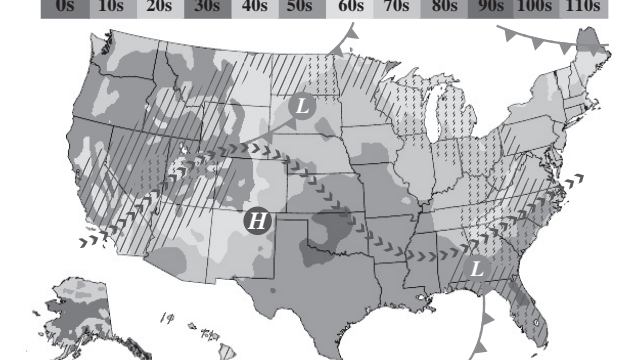

Grades one through five also watch the video and create posters, which are displayed in the hallways. The winning class from each grade level earns a popsicle party based on participation, quality of work and information.

Renfroe's video has two parts. The first part features a tour of fire trucks and station, given by Citrus County Fire Rescue. LPS kids asked questions of the firemen, which they answered. It even included a competition to see which firefighter could gear up the fastest.

In the second part of the video, Renfroe welcomes viewers into her home to discuss fire safety. She emphasizes the importance of changing smoke detector batteries and checking them monthly to make sure they work.

In addition, she said when a smoke detector is yellow, it means they're expired and need to be replaced.

"Have a plan with your family," Renfroe added. She stressed making sure young children understand how to unlock and open doors and windows to escape.

Before opening a door, Renfroe said, "you need to feel to see if it's hot." She explained to use the back of the hand to avoid burning the palm, which may be needed later to open a window.

While exiting the home, Renfroe said to stay low under the smoke and make way to the family rally point. Renfroe's family rally point is a lamppost.

"Get out, stay out and call for help," she said.

All of this information was taught to Marla Dusek's kindergarten class on the morning of Oct. 7.

The children listened attentively to the video, adorning red fireman

Afterward, the curious kindergarteners had some questions for Dusek and Renfroe.

One student said he didn't want to leave his dog. Dusek explained the firefighters always go back inside and try to help the animals out.

Another student asked about her stuffed animals.

"Everything can be replaced — you can't," Dusek said.

Renfroe said parents have written her notes to thank her. Some of them even tell her their kindergarteners are coming home and teaching them things they didn't even know.

The main goal, Renfroe said, is to make sure students know their safety plan and have working smoke detectors at home.

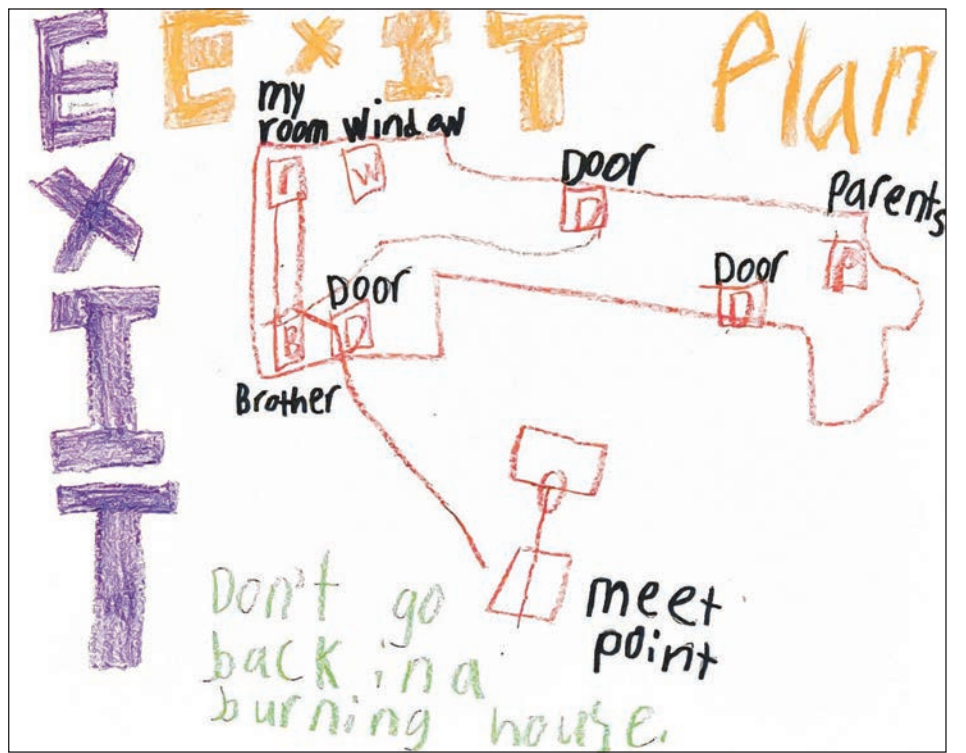
Over the years, she said schools have discovered an alarming amount that don't.

Renfroe's goal is to get her program in every school in the district. Citrus County School District spokeswoman Lindsay Blair said it would take a great deal of planning.

"I think this could be a very positive thing for the district," Blair said. "That's something that could definitely happen in the future."

Students accused of making bomb threats to school

GAINESVILLE — Three students are facing charges of making fake bomb threats at a north Florida high school, officials said.

The students arrested on Wednesday took part in bomb threats to Eastside High School in Gainesville on Sept. 28, Oct. 1, Oct. 5 and Oct. 6, the Alachua County Sheriff's Office said.

So far this school year, eight students from Alachua County Public Schools have been arrested in connection to 17 bomb threats since school started on Aug. 10.

The students arrested Wednesday include two boys, ages 15 and 16, and a 16-year-old girl, officials said. They each face charges of making a false bomb threat, using a phone to commit a felony and for interfering with a school function.

Man guilty of threatening Chauvin lawyer

MIAMI — A Florida man has pleaded guilty to threatening to kill a lawyer who represented the former Minneapolis police officer convicted in the death of George Floyd.

William John Hartnett made the threat in a phone call from Miami on April 6, the U.S. Department of Justice said Thursday.

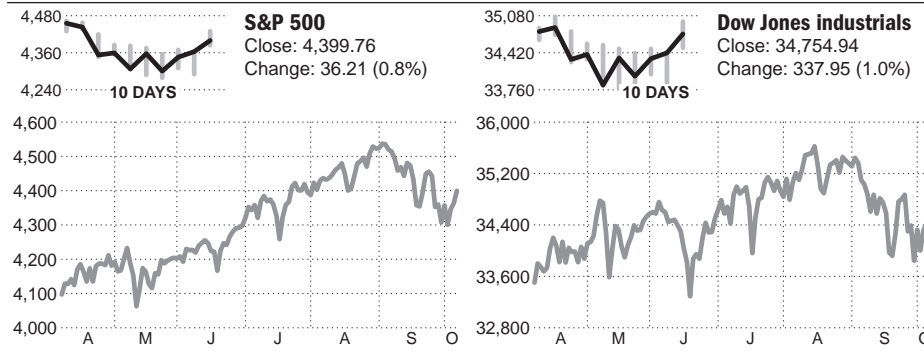
Hartnett, 42, faces a maximum of five years in prison at his sentencing Dec. 15. He pleaded guilty to one count of transmitting a threat through interstate communications.

Prosecutors said Hartnett called the Minnesota Police and Peace Officers Association, which was paying for Chauvin's defense. The 18-second message included several obscenity-laden threats against Eric Nelson, Chauvin's defense lawyer.

# Fingers crossed on growth management plan

The Citrus County Board of Commissioners has adopted a Mixed-Use Development plan (MUD) for the soon-to-be-opened Cardinal Street Interchange flowing off the Suncoast Parkway (State Road 589), part of the Florida Turnpike System. This plan envisions a small-town atmosphere of homes, restaurants, small businesses,

and multi-family housing in an environment promoting walking, recreation and nature. Minimum buildable lots are set at 8 and 18 acres.

This is encouraging for a variety of reasons, not the least is the increase to the county's tax base. However, to get to and then from this new Cardinal Street (C.R. 482) small-town "Smallville" one will need a motor vehicle. And there's the rub.

The county has an active Growth Management department that held public hearings to gather input on the Cardinal Street Interchange project.

In a virtual workshop in 2020, the MUD plan focused on population density, land use diversity, and pedestrian friendly design. The Growth Management Director, Michael Sherman, said that "we listened to the public" during the hearings. The ultimate result is the above-mentioned minimum lot size zoning. This is forward thinking and commendable.

But nowhere is there a county construction plan for three, four or more traffic lanes to handle the increase of vehicles expected on the current two lanes of Cardinal Street.

Sherman said this is because traffic will increase gradually so there should be minimal impact over the next several years. Let's hope so. Because not much is happening in terms of Cardinal Street traffic lane construction foresight. According to Sherman, the county is only monitoring

traffic volume so that as capacity approaches, the county can build a capital improvement plan.

This plan is supposed to address increased traffic lanes but will be segmented because of the cost to the county. In other words, construction will be parceled out with the first portion anticipated to be a mile or so westward from the Cardinal Street interchange.

Cardinal Street interchange. The result? The flow off the interchange will be orderly and reasonable — until the bottle neck is reached after that first mile. Then safety issues are really brought into play.

A shutting down of either — or both — of the current two lanes will become a traffic nightmare. Detours west to U.S. 19 or east to Lecanto Highway are few — and all are a jigsaw puzzle. One needs not doubt that tempers will flare.

If residents are reminded of the U.S. 19 traffic flow improvement project, well, we hardly need to go there.

Separate from the county is the Hernando/Citrus Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). The MPO does have thoughts for a four-lane plan for Cardinal Street, according to Randy Oliver, the Citrus County Administrator. "Probably looking at 5 to 10 years out," he said, depending on funding.

But all this is fuzzy, too, because there is no formal plan yet and the Cardinal Street interchange is scheduled to be opened soon, around April 2022 — admirably ahead of schedule.

But back to the county's Growth Management department. Indeed, it's well to be prepared with a MUD plan for land use development, but let's hope the department's traffic monitoring of this growth is sufficient without a construction plan in place.

After all, who wants mud thrown in their eye?

The current backlash against it is only from those trying to reduce participation. They believe that more voters reduces their chances to win elections. There is no significant fraud with vote-by-mail despite billions of votes being cast over many years.

**Florida could lift 30-year ban on catching goliath grouper**

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's wildlife agency is proposing to lift its three-decade ban on catching and killing goliath groupers, arguing that the species' numbers have rebounded. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission approved a draft proposal on Wednesday to allow recreational harvest of 200 goliaths per year from March to May. South Florida and the Florida Keys will be off-limits, and the size of the catch will be restricted to between 20 inches and 36 inches. The proposal remains tentative until a second vote in March 2022, and probably would not effect until 2023, according to agency spokeswoman Amanda Nalley. Meanwhile, the agency continues to gather public comment, which people can submit at myfwc.com/saltwatercomments, she said. The proposal is supported by fishing groups, and it calls for a lottery to issue licenses that allow each recipient to catch and kill one goliath. The goliath almost died off in the 1980s from over-fishing and pollution, and is not allowed to be caught in any other state or federal waters. Similar proposals have been under consideration for a few years.

family-law judge, I want to see people make decisions that are in best interest of their families. "I guess," Youmans added, "I'm trying to practice what I preach." Youmans' last day depends on when Gov. Ron DeSantis appoints a successor to the retiring circuit judge Youmans is replacing in Marion County, S. Sue Robbins. This wait, Youmans said, will help ease the transition for the incoming judge and keep ongoing cases from going unheard. "The judiciary is working hard to ensure that the dockets are not affected," she said. "We're going to try and ensure there's not going to be any delay." Members of the Judicial Nomination Commission (JNC) for the Fifth Judicial Circuit of Florida started taking applications Monday, Oct. 4, for who would become Citrus County's latest circuit judge. Applicants must live within the judicial circuit — which covers Citrus, Marion, Hernando, Lake and Sumter counties — and must have at least five years membership on The Florida Bar. Submissions are due Oct. 29. Afterward, the JNC will interview candidates and recommend nominees for DeSantis to choose from. DeSantis appointed Youmans to her current judgeship in July 2019. Youmans said her biggest takeaways from her

tenure as judge have been to be a good listener, full of respect and courtesy. "Everyone just wants an opportunity to be heard, and so if they feel like they got a fair shake in that respect then that's what I can give them as a judge," she said. "So that's what I try to do — give them their day in court." Before she donned the black robes, Youmans was a prosecutor for the State Attorney's Office in Ocala for eight years, and worked 11 years for a law firm in the same city — Blanchard, Merriam, Adel & Kirkland. For most of her two years as judge, Youmans handled the county's domestic violence injunctions, probate cases and 80% of its family-law docket. Youmans approved her first adoption in August 2019. "I don't think you could have wiped that smile off my face that day," she said at the time. "It was such a lovely day; it was a gift to be able to do that for that family." Youmans' current caseload has been a mix of dependency proceedings, juvenile delinquency matters, child support hearings, Baker Acts, guardianship and probate. If things go as expected, Youmans will take on a similar docket once in Marion County. "I enjoy working with families," she said. Overall, Youmans and her fellow judges have to be accessible to the public "in the most expeditious fashion" by taking on whatever's needed of

them until adaptations are made to better balance their duties. "We have to serve the community and all the responsibilities of the judiciary have to be divided among a set number of judges," she said. "You're trying to determine the best use of time for each judge, and the only way you can do that is work your dockets and report back." Youmans said her method will remain the same wherever she's a judge. "My underlying approach to this job is that

it's truly a pleasure to do it, and I'll always approach with it a promise to work hard for the fifth circuit — whatever county I'm in," she said. "I pledged to do my very best for that community." Leaving the camaraderie and affection she's experienced serving Citrus County will still be hard for Youmans to do. "There is just a real

friendliness, a real friendly environment that's certainly true in the courthouse," she said, "and that warmth extends outside of the courthouse and into the surrounding area." D-Boca Raton, and Rep. Sam Killebrew, R-Winter Haven, have proposed legislation (SB 378 and HB 207) to designate the scrub jay as the state bird. The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's approval of a resolution Thursday revived a 2008 commission project

tied to that year's presidential election. "It taught civics, taught birds and got a lot of young students, I think, from the fourth to seventh grade involved in voting," said commission Assistant Executive Director Thomas Eason. "Over 77,000 students were involved in that and actually voted on a slate of birds. And the osprey was the winner." The commission

unsuccessfully backed the change during the 2009 legislative session. Chairman Rodney Barreto said he's been approached about the commission's position on the bills and recommended "dusting" off the 2008 project. "That doesn't necessarily mean that that's the way it's going to go, if you know the Legislature," Barreto said. "But at least we can put a marker down."

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# Biden backs vax mandates

ELK GROVE VILLAGE, Ill. — President Joe Biden on Thursday championed COVID-19 vaccination requirements, determined that the roughly 67 million unvaccinated American adults must get the shot even as he acknowledged that mandates weren't his "first instinct."

Biden had ruled out such requirements before taking office in January, but they now are a tactic he feels forced into using by a stubborn slice of the public that has refused to be inoculated and has jeopardized the lives of others and the nation's economic recovery.

"There is no other way to beat the pandemic than to get the vast majority of the American people vaccinated," Biden said in suburban Chicago at an event promoting the mandates. "While I didn't race to do it right away, that's why I've had to move toward requirements."

In the coming weeks, more than 100 million

Americans will be subject to vaccine requirements ordered by Biden. And his administration is encouraging employers to take additional steps voluntarily that would push vaccines on people or subject them to onerous testing requirements.

Forcing people to do something they do not want to do is rarely a winning political strategy. Yet with the majority of the country already vaccinated and with industry on his side, Biden has emerged as an unlikely advocate of browbeating tactics to drive vaccinations.

"Look, I know that vaccination requirements are a tough medicine — unpopular to some, politics for others — but they're lifesaving, they're game-changing for our country," Biden said.

But the requirements have drawn widespread public support. People are hoping to put behind a pandemic that has taken the lives of more than 700,000 in the United States, and businesses see vaccinations as a road map toward a revitalized economy.

# Flash flooding kills four in Alabama

PELHAM, Ala. — Terrified drivers climbed out of swamped cars and muddy floodwater flowed through neighborhoods after a stalled weather front drenched Alabama for hours, leaving entire communities under water Thursday and killing at least four people.

Dozens of people had to be rescued Wednesday night in central Alabama,

where the National Weather Service said as much as 13 inches of rain fell, and a south Alabama town temporarily lost its main grocery store when a creek came through the doors of the Piggly Wiggly. Near the coast, heavy rains caused sewage to bubble out of underground pipes.

Metro Birmingham remained under a flash flood watch much of the day until storms moved into Georgia.

## Abortions resume in some Texas clinics

AUSTIN, Texas — Abortions quickly resumed in at least six Texas clinics on Thursday after a federal judge halted the most restrictive abortion law in the U.S., but other physicians remained hesitant, afraid the court order would not stand for long and thrust them back into legal jeopardy.

It was unclear how many abortions Texas clinics rushed to perform in the 24 hours after U.S. District Judge Robert Pitman suspended the law known as Senate Bill 8, which since early September had banned abortions once cardiac activity is detected, usually around six weeks.

Prior to the blistering 113-page order late Wednesday, other courts had declined to stop the law, which bans abortions before some women even know they are pregnant.

"There's actually hope from patients and from staff, and I think there's a little desperation in that hope," said Amy Hagstrom Miller, president of Whole Woman's Health, which operates four clinics in Texas. She said some of those clinics performed abortions Thursday but did not reveal how many.

"Folks know this opportunity could be short-lived," she said.

## Trump to invoke executive privilege in Jan. 6 probe

WASHINGTON — Donald Trump intends to assert executive privilege in a congressional investigation into the Jan. 6 insurrection at the Capitol, a move that could prevent the testimony of one-time aides, according to a letter sent by lawyers for the former president.

The letter went to at least some witnesses who were subpoenaed by the House committee and it makes clear that Trump plans to invoke

privileges meant to protect presidential communications from being shared with Congress. The substance of the letter was described Thursday by a person who has seen it and who spoke on condition of anonymity to The Associated Press because the letter was not yet public.

Spokespeople for Trump did not immediately return messages seeking comment. Trump said in a statement last month that he would "fight the Subpoenas on Executive Privilege and other grounds, for the good of our Country."

The move sets the stage for a likely clash with House Democrats who are investigating the roles of Trump and his allies in the run-up to the riot, when thousands of Trump supporters broke into the Capitol as Congress was certifying the results of the presidential election won by Democrat Joe Biden.

### Pentagon rolls out plans for climate change

WASHINGTON — A new Pentagon plan calls for incorporating the realities of a hotter, harsher Earth at every level in the U.S. military, from making worsening climate extremes a mandatory part of strategic planning to training troops how to secure their own water supplies and treat heat injury.

The Pentagon — whose

jets, aircraft carriers, truck convoys, bases and office buildings cumulatively burn more oil than most countries — was among the federal agencies that President Joe Biden ordered to overhaul their climate-resilience plans when he took office in January. About 20 agencies were releasing those plans Thursday.

"These are essential steps, not just to meet a requirement, but to defend the nation under all conditions," Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin wrote in a letter accompanying the Pentagon's climate plan.

It follows decades of U.S. military assessments that climate change is a threat to U.S. national security, given increased risks of conflict over water and other scarcer resources, threats to U.S. military installations and supply chains, and added risks to troops.

### Russia says it could boost gas supplies to Europe

MOSCOW — Russia has the potential to boost natural gas supplies to Europe, where surging gas prices have ramped up pressure on consumers, the Kremlin said Thursday.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said existing gas transit routes allow for bolstering supplies before the new Nord Stream 2 pipeline that will

carry Russian gas to Germany begins operating.

"There is a potential," Peskov said during a conference call with reporters. "It all depends on demand, contractual obligations and commercial agreements."

Europe's soaring gas prices dropped Thursday, a day after Russian President Vladimir Putin suggested his country could sell more gas to European spot buyers via its domestic market in addition to through existing long-term contracts.

Russian Deputy Prime Minister Alexander Novak said Wednesday that getting Nord Stream 2 launched would quickly stabilize European energy markets, a statement seen by some in Europe as an attempt to prod regulators into moving fast to certify the new pipeline.

Asked about Novak's comment, Peskov replied that Russia could boost supplies along existing routes.

The 27-country European Union imports about 90% of its natural gas needs. Prices are lower in the United States, which produces its gas.

### Magnitude 5.9 quake shakes Tokyo; 17 injured

TOKYO — A powerful magnitude 5.9 earthquake shook the Tokyo area on Thursday night, injuring at least 17 people and halting trains and subways. Officials said there was no major damage or danger of a tsunami.

The Meteorological Agency said the quake was centered in Chiba prefecture, just east of Tokyo, at a depth of 48 miles.

It caused buildings to sway and hanging objects such as signs to swing violently. Chief Cabinet Secretary Hirokazu Matsuno said there were no abnormalities at nuclear power facilities in the area.

He said a total of 17 people were injured, including one who was seriously hurt.

LECANTO — Brothers Josh and Noah Ambrose said they and their teammates knew the stakes heading into the final event on Thursday night.

As the sophomore Josh dove off the starting block into the water for the final leg of the 400-yard freestyle relay, it got very loud inside the partially enclosed pool at the Citrus Memorial Health Foundation YMCA.

The younger Ambrose sibling had already made up ground and gotten out in front when he first resurfaced, and pulled away as the lone Panther squad beat out two from Crystal River, rallying to win both the race and meet, 84-82.

"I tried to give it my all, because we got to win for the team," Josh Ambrose said. "I try to give my best for the team."

"It means a lot. To be county champs, that's a great feeling," Noah Ambrose said.

The Lecanto boys had previously beaten Citrus last month, although the two teams have decided to swim a second meet on Oct. 12. The Pirates still have to go up against the Hurricanes on Oct. 14.

Going into the 400 free, the meet was tied at 76-76, but with only one relay team the Panthers had to place first. Tyler Gonzalez, Noah Ambrose, Mateo Valach and Josh Ambrose combined for a 3:45.57, edging the Pirates' quartet of Garrett Hickman, Kenneth Witkovich, Landon Vincent and Dean Carey with a 3:48.92.

Josh Ambrose completed the anchor leg in 51.69, which was actually an improvement from his first-place time of 52.05 in the 100 free earlier in the meet.

"We knew we had to win it and

# Rays take Game 1

## Arozarena shines, Tampa Bay blanks Red Sox 5-0 in ALDS opener

ST. PETERSBURG — Randy Arozarena became the first player to hit a home run and steal home in a postseason game, and rookie Shane McClellan pitched the Tampa Bay Rays to a 5-0 victory over the Boston Red Sox in their AL Division Series opener Thursday night.

The breakout star of October last year, Arozarena made a breathtaking dash to the plate in the seventh inning for the first straight steal of home in the postseason since Jackie Robinson did it for the Brooklyn Dodgers against Yogi Berra and the New York Yankees in the 1955 World Series, according to the FS1 broadcast.

Nelson Cruz also homered and McClellan tossed five stellar innings for the Rays. Young Wander Franco also sparkled in his playoff debut, delivering an early RBI double that speedy 2020 postseason star Arozarena scored on from first base to get the defending AL champions off to a quick start.

Arozarena, a 26-year-old Cuban who's still a rookie despite setting a postseason record with 10 homers and 29 hits in 20 games a year ago, capped an exhilarating performance by stealing home on Boston reliever Josh Taylor to make it 5-0 in the seventh inning.

It was the first steal of home in a playoff game since Javier Baez of the Chicago Cubs did it against the Los Angeles Dodgers in Game 1 of the 2016 NLCS.

If not Arozarena's flashy, crowd-pleasing play and the hitting of the 20-year-old Franco, who was promoted to the majors in June, then McClellan's pitching may well have been the story of the night.

The 24-year-old lefty, who made his major league debut during Tampa Bay's run to last year's World Series, scattered five hits and struck out three in his first career playoff start.

Cruz, acquired at the trade deadline to add a potent bat to the middle of the lineup, hit his 18th career postseason homer for a 3-0 lead in the third inning. Arozarena also went deep against right-hander Nick Pivetta with the bases empty in the fifth for his 11th homer in 21 career postseason games.

With one of the lowest payrolls in baseball and a roster lacking household names, the Rays are in the playoffs for a third straight year after winning a franchise-record 100 games and their second straight AL East title.

Rookie right-hander Shane Baz, an Olympic silver medalist who began the season in Class AA and made his major league debut in late September, will start Game 2 for the Rays on Friday.

The Red Sox, who beat the New York Yankees at home in the AL wild card game to advance to the ALDS, will

counter with lefty Chris Sale, who returned from Tommy John surgery in mid-August and went 5-1 with a 3.16 ERA over nine starts down the stretch.

Boston lefty Eduardo Rodriguez took the loss in Game 1, allowing two runs, two hits and walking two in 1 2/3 innings. Pivetta spared manager Alex Cora from having to expend the bullpen by working 4 2/3 innings in relief.

Franco chased Pivetta with his second double of the night, an opposite field hit to left that sent Arozarena scampering from first to third base in the seventh. Four pitches later, Arozarena took advantage of Taylor not paying attention to him and took off for home.

The victory continues Tampa Bay's recent mastery of the Red Sox.

The Rays lost four straight to Boston before winning 11 of the final 15 meetings between the teams during the regular season. And they wasted no time hopping on Rodriguez this time, using their speed to turn a leadoff walk to Arozarena, Franco's double to left-center and Yandy Diaz's two-out, infield single into a quick 2-0 lead.

Cruz homered off one of the catwalks that support the roof at Tropicana Field, setting off another thunderous ovation from a yellow towel-waving sellout crowd of 27,419 that included college basketball television analyst Dick Vitale, a Rays season ticket holder who threw out the ceremonial first pitch.

# County rivals clash

*Lecanto seeks to repeat as champ*

"It's never been done at our school; we won 5-6 years ago, we won last year, but we've never gone back-to-back. It's one positive thing we can hang our hat on and continue to build toward the future."

"It would mean a lot to the kids, to the administration, to the alumni, everyone who is all about Lecanto. We've been playing football for 40 years now. We've had our ups and downs. Some would say more downs than ups. To achieve this would be monumental looking back at the history of our program."

Crystal River still has Citrus to play next Friday, but a win would at least give the Pirates a share of the county crown.

"It's a big deal, it's a county matchup. Both teams are not where they want to be, but both are coming off a win and have some momentum," Crystal River head coach Cliff Lohrey said. "Each team is trying to continue that momentum into the second half of the season."

# McCullers shines, Astros take Game 1

## Beat White Sox 6-1 in ALDS

HOUSTON — Lance McCullers Jr. was terrific. Yordan Alvarez delivered, and Jose Altuve scored on a nifty slide.

The Houston Astros sure love October.

McCullers pitched scoreless ball into the seventh inning, and the Astros beat Lance Lynn and the Chicago White Sox 6-1 in Game 1 of their AL Division Series on Thursday.

Michael Brantley added two hits and two RBIs as the AL West champions showed off their playoff experience in an impressive opening performance. McCullers allowed four hits in 6 2/3 innings in his eighth career postseason start.

"You get the ball in Game 1 and your team is expecting this from you," McCullers said.

While Houston is in the playoffs for the fifth straight season, winning the World Series in 2017 and making it to the AL Championship Series last year, Chicago is making a second straight playoff appearance for the first time in franchise history. It lost to Oakland in the first round in 2020.

Game 2 of the best-of-five series is Friday in Houston. The teams also met in the 2005 World Series, with the White Sox sweeping the Astros for the title.

It was Houston's eighth straight win in the opener of the division series dating to Game 1 of the 2004 NLDS against Atlanta.

"Everyone did their part, did their thing and we came out with a great win," McCullers said.

McCullers, playing the role of staff ace after the Astros lost Gerrit Cole in free agency and Justin Verlander to injury in recent years, struck out four and walked none. He set career highs with 13 wins, a 3.16 ERA and 185 strikeouts during the regular season, but he also led the AL with 76 walks.

The 28-year-old McCullers didn't allow a hit until Yoán Moncada singled with one out in the fourth. The right-hander left to a standing ovation after giving up consecutive singles with two outs

in the seventh. He waved to the cheering fans just before entering the dugout.

"The numbers speak for themselves," White Sox manager Tony La Russa said. "We didn't do much with him."

Alvarez hit an RBI double in the third and a solo homer in the fifth. Manager Dusty Baker is thrilled to have the 2019 AL Rookie of the Year back this season after he missed all but two games last year after surgery on both knees.

"You don't know when he's going to leave the yard and he's going to drive in some big runs," Baker said. "So, yeah life wasn't too pleasant last year without Yordan."

The 24-year-old Alvarez watched Houston's 2020 playoff run on television.

"To be able to be back with the team and be able to help it out is really special for me," he said through a translator.

Altuve wowed the crowd of 40,497 when he slid home and slapped the back of the plate just ahead of Yasmani Grandal's tag in the third.

"I think the turn of the game was that slide by Altuve ... that gave us the momentum," McCullers said.

Lynn was making his first playoff appearance since 2018 after posting a career-low 2.69 ERA this season. But the burly right-hander relies on his fastball, and the

Astros are one of the majors' best fastball-hitting teams.

Lynn was tagged for five runs and six hits in 3 2/3 innings. Five of the six hits that he allowed came off his four-seam or cut fastball.

"I gave up some two-out runs on pitches that could have been better," Lynn said. "When it's all said and done I just wasn't making quality pitches when I needed to. That's pretty much it."

Rookie Jake Meyers had two hits and drove in a run for Houston. Brantley chased Lynn with a two-run single.

Chicago got on the board on José Abreu's two-out single in the eighth. But Kendall Graveman retired Grandal on a liner to center for the final out.

# Taylor hits walk-off home run for Dodgers

## Deck Cards 3-1 in NL WC game

LOS ANGELES — Chris Taylor hit a two-run homer in the bottom of the ninth inning to lift the Los Angeles Dodgers over the St. Louis Cardinals 3-1 on Wednesday night in the NL wild-card game.

The 106-win Dodgers advanced to a best-of-five Division Series against the NL West champion Giants, who won 107 games to barely hold off rival Los Angeles for the division title. Game 1 is Friday night in San Francisco.

"That's gonna be fun. Yeah, two of the best regular-season records of

all-time. We've been battling all year, so I expect a hard-fought series," Taylor said.

The sellout crowd of 53,193 hung on every pitch as the tension of a tie game built from the fourth inning on. Fans waved blue towels, futilely urging out the few balls launched into the outfield only to see them caught in a winner-take-all matchup between two of the most storied and successful National League franchises.

Cody Bellinger drew a two-out walk from T.J. McFarland and stole second in the ninth, when nearly every fan was on their feet, waiting to see if the defending World Series champions could pull off a win. Alex Reyes came in to face Taylor, who sent a 2-1 breaking ball into the left-field pavilion, triggering an explosion of cheers.

"Honestly, I was just trying to hit a single. Not

trying to do too much," Taylor said after hitting the fourth walk-off homer in Dodgers postseason history. "And he gave me a good slider to hit and I was able to get it up in the air."

Tommy Edman dropped a one-out single into right off closer Kenley Jansen in the top of the ninth and stole second. Paul Goldschmidt took a called third strike and Tyler O'Neill went down swinging to end the threat.

Both teams had runners on in the sixth, seventh and eighth innings, but couldn't push a run across.

St. Louis finished 0 for 11 with runners in scoring position, stranding 11 overall.

Dueling aces Adam Wainwright of St. Louis and the Dodgers' Max Scherzer struggled with their control early in just

the second winner-take-all game in postseason history with two starting pitchers aged 37-plus. Wainwright is 40; Scherzer is 37.

They issued two walks apiece through the first three innings. Scherzer's wild pitch led to a run in the first and he hit Harrison Bader in the fourth.

Justin Turner tied it at 1 in the fourth on a leadoff solo shot into the Dodgers bullpen in left. It was the first homer Wainwright has ever given up on a curveball in the postseason. Turner's 13 postseason homers are the most in franchise history.

St. Louis led 1-0 when Edman scored on Scherzer's wild pitch. Edman singled leading off, stole second base and took third when O'Neill fouled out to right.

Scherzer left with one out in the fifth after giving up a leadoff single to Edman and a walk to Goldschmidt. He paced the dugout with his hands on his hips. Former Cardinal Joe Kelly got out of the jam after Goldschmidt reached third on Kelly's wild pitch.

Scherzer allowed one run and three hits, struck out four and walked three against his hometown team.

Wainwright gave up one run and four hits in 5 1/3 innings. He struck out five and walked two.

The Dodgers had Wainwright on the ropes in the third, loading the bases with one out. He was within one ball of walking in the tying run before Trea Turner broke his bat grounding into an inning-ending double play on a 3-2 pitch.

1908 — The Chicago Cubs won the NL pennant when Mordecai Brown beat Christy Mathewson 4-2 in the playoff of the disputed game Sept. 23 when Fred Merkle failed to touch second base.

1915 — The Philadelphia Phillies win their first World Series game, a 3-1 victory over the Boston Red Sox. Grover Cleveland Alexander allowed one run on eight hits and two walks.

1921 — The New York Giants beat the New York Yankees 1-0 in the first "Subway Series" to take the World Series, five games to three. The only run of the game scored on a first-inning error by Yankees shortstop Roger Peckinpaugh.

1929 — Howard Ehmke, a surprise starter for the Philadelphia Athletics, struck out 13 Chicago Cubs to win the opening game of the World Series 3-1.

1939 — The New York Yankees took advantage of four errors to beat the Cincinnati Reds 7-4 in 10 innings in Game 4 and win their fourth consecutive World Series. The Reds had a 4-2 lead going into the ninth inning.

1956 — Don Larsen of the New York Yankees pitched the only perfect game in World Series history for a 2-0 triumph over the Brooklyn Dodgers. Sal Maglie, the opposing pitcher, gave up five hits.

1961 — The Yankees' Whitey Ford set a World Series record for consecutive scoreless innings by extending his streak to 32 innings in a 7-0 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds in Game 4.

1973 — Rusty Staub's two home runs powered the New York Mets to a 9-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds and a 2-1 lead in the NLCS. Pete Rose of the Reds and Bud Harrelson of the Mets scuffled at second base in the fifth inning after Rose slid hard.

1986 — Mike Scott equaled a playoff record with 14 strikeouts and threw a five-hitter as the Houston Astros defeated the New York Mets 1-0 in the first game of the NLCS. Glenn Davis opened the second inning with a home run off Dwight Gooden.

2000 — Bobby J. Jones pitched the sixth complete game one-hitter in postseason history as the Mets eliminated the Giants with a 4-0 win in Game 4 of their NL division series.

2011 — Chris Carpenter tossed a three-hitter to out-pitch Roy Halladay, and St. Louis edged the Philadelphia Phillies 1-0 in the deciding Game 5 of their NL playoff series.

2016 — Travis Wood took over when starter Kyle Hendricks got hurt and became the first relief pitcher since 1924 to hit a postseason home run, helping the Chicago Cubs beat the San Francisco Giants 5-2 for 2-0 NLDS lead.

2018 — Manny Machado hit a three-run homer, David Freese came through again in the postseason and the Los Angeles Dodgers advanced to the NLCS for the third year in a row, eliminating the Atlanta Braves with a 6-2 victory.

2018 — Brock Holt became the first player to hit for the cycle in a postseason game, and the Boston Red Sox routed the New York Yankees 16-1 to grab a 2-1 lead in the ALDS.

## Ohtani wins Baseball Digest player of year; Scherzer top arm

NEW YORK — Two-way phenom Shohei Ohtani of the Los Angeles Angels was selected major league player of the year by Baseball Digest and eBay.

Max Scherzer was voted pitcher of the year and Josh Hader was picked as the top reliever in awards announced Thursday.

Ohtani received 16 first-place votes in balloting by a 19-member panel of baseball writers and broadcasters that included several former players, managers and executives.

At the plate, Ohtani hit 46 home runs — third-most in the majors — and had 100 RBIs while compiling a .965 OPS that ranked fifth. He scored 103 runs, stole 25 bases and even tied for the big league lead with

eight triples.

He became the only player in history with at least 45 homers, 25 doubles, 25 steals and eight triples in one season.

On the mound, the right-hander from Japan went 9-2 with a 3.18 ERA in 23 starts. He struck out 156 batters and walked 44 in 130 1/3 innings.

Scherzer, traded from Washington to the Los Angeles Dodgers on July 30, went 15-4 with a 2.46 ERA and 236 strikeouts in 179 1/3 innings. He was 7-0 with a 1.98 ERA in 11 starts for the Dodgers.

Hader was a runaway winner with 16 first-place votes after converting 34 of 35 save chances for NL Central champion Milwaukee this season. He went 4-2 with a 1.23 ERA and 102 strikeouts in 60 appearances covering 58 2/3 innings. The left-hander didn't give up a run in his final 21 outings.

we were hoping they'd pull it out," Lecanto boys coach Bill Wells said. "We had Tyler Gonzalez on the lead and he just started this year, so he's kind of a question mark, and he performed."  
 "... It shows that (Josh Ambrose) cares about his team because he went faster on relay than he did in the individual event, which shows character. It means he cares more about his team than himself."

It was a reversal from the 200-medley relay to start the meet, when the same four swimmers from each school went head-to-head and it was the Pirates who took first, 1:55.30 compared to 1:55.58 for the Panthers.

Josh Ambrose also won the 50 free in 24.13. Noah Ambrose, a senior, took the 100 fly (1:02.89) over Hickman (1:03.01), after Hickman took first in the 200 IM (2:21.35) ahead of Noah Ambrose (2:24.37).

"The fly was really tight, that was a really exciting race," Noah Ambrose said. "Really excited for Saturday (the Gulf Coast 8 conference meet), swimming again, same thing with the IM, against Garrett. Good matchup."

The freshman Valach captured the 200 free (2:01.98) and 500 free (5:31.15). Austin Pearcy, Jacob Gould, Daniel Wheeler and Nicholas Colitz teamed for a first-place 1:58.37 in the 200-free relay.

"We have so many new guys who did great," Noah Ambrose said. "Our breaststrokers, they killed it out there. They were a large part of that win. And then of course we have a freshman phenom, Mateo Valach. He's a beast."

Also for Crystal River, Justin Rieck took the 100 backstroke (1:17.21) and Witkovich was first in the 100 breast.

The girls meet came down to the 400 free, as well, although the actual race was far less dramatic. With Lecanto holding a slim 79-77 edge, Molly Maguire, Hayley Harris, Olivia Szylkowski and Baylie Wells dominated from start to finish to place

first, 4:17.31. The Pirates also took third and pulled out an 87-83 victory.

"This is a flip-flop because the last couple years the boys have won and the girls lost," Crystal River coach Chuck Gattton said. "It was a great night everywhere. I had kids swimming out of their skin, had some great improvements, getting ready for our big meet on Saturday."

"It was a nice boost for the ladies, because they had dropped two meets already this week. And it was tough on the boys because it was their first loss on the season."

Szylkowski rolled to first-place showings in the 200 free (2:14.05) and the 100 fly (1:07.56). She additionally teamed with Baylie Wells, Maguire and Harris for the win in the 200 medley (2:12.53).

"It's very exciting since we haven't won (against Lecanto) in two years. So being able to come back and be as strong as we were, it was very exciting," Szylkowski said. "I think I did pretty well. It wasn't at my best, but I know I'll get there eventually."

Maguire touched the wall first in the 200 IM (2:43.17), while Haley Henry won the 500 free (6:49.53).

For the Panthers, Grace Burkholder took first in the 100 free (56.89) and 100 back (1:06.20). Blakely Messer was the fastest in the 50 free (30.12), as was Arianna Bugner in the 100 breast (1:26.62). Messer, Emma Halleen, Lorilei Mohammadbhoj and Haileigh Swisher garnered a first in the 200-free relay (2:02.57).

"The girls swam great. They won the races that I knew we should be able to win and some of those girls that came in those third- and fourth-place finishes that I wasn't expecting them to," Lecanto girls coach Michelle Dickemann said. "It was a much closer meet than I was really expecting."

"I think it's about our mid-level girls. You've got your kids that train year-round, you expect them to win their races. But when your kids that just come in for that 2 1/2-month high school season? Man, they come in and they start dropping 4 to 10 seconds on a race, that's just exciting."

The Pirates enjoyed a very satisfying homecoming last Friday, a 50-0 drubbing of Lake Weir to start off a four-game stretch against sub-500 squads.

"It hasn't changed our practice in terms of our energy has been outstanding all year, our effort has been outstanding all year," Lohrey said. "But you don't feel as banged up coming off a win. You don't feel as tired. The fact that we're facing the defending county champions, we're ready to go. The guys will be ready to go Friday night."

Crystal River exhibited some much-needed offensive versatility against Lake Weir, with Michael Tovine throwing the team's first three touchdown passes of the season. But the Pirates continue to lean heavily on sophomore Joel Velazquez, who has rushed 90 times for 500 yards and run in four touchdowns.

"They're well-coached. (Assistant) Coach (Ron) Cline is a legend. Coach Lohrey does a good job with these kids. It's going to take our best game. We can't make mistakes. We can't miss blocks. We can't miss tackles. We can't have penalties. We have to play a flawless game."

Alexander believes the Panthers gained confidence and found their offensive rhythm in a 47-12 pounding of Fivay one week ago.

Senior Luke Malmberg piled up 212 yards and three touchdowns while running the ball 23 times, yet another big night in a season full of them. That marked his fourth straight game over 100 yards rushing, pushing his totals to county bests of 653 yards and 10 touchdowns.

"They're up front on both the O-line and D-line similar to Bellevue. They've got giants up there. They'll be physically bigger than us at the point of attack," Lohrey said.

The plan to stop Malmberg, Lohrey joked, was to sneak a couple extra defenders on the field and hope the officials don't notice.

"Luke is the focus of their offense, but they have weapons around him and complement him well," Lohrey said. "We've got to execute our assignments and keep them off-balance. Coach Alexander always has them in a

good position. They make you earn yards.

"... (Malmberg) does a great job of running hard. He's a hard-nosed football player. We have to tackle well, play gap control and run to the football."

No question, the Warriors (5-1) have enjoyed playing in front of the home crowd at Warrior Park. They're 4-0 within those friendly confines, and have outscored their opponents 152-46.

That makes games like this one extra significant. The Warriors are 14th in the SSAC 11-man rankings and a win over Bell Creek would assure a spot in the second division playoffs. Finishing up with another victory over ninth-ranked St. Edward's in two weeks would likely secure a high seed and home game, if not push them into the top eight and the first division bracket.

LECANTO — Jump out to an early lead, fight off a rally, pull away at the end. Wash, rinse, repeat.

The Lecanto volleyball team led Crystal River by scores of 10-2, 7-1 and 8-3 Thursday night at home and went on to claim a 25-14, 25-16, 25-17 sweep over their county rivals.

"We talk about if you get that lead first and the momentum going your way, and if you do give up a few points, it's not that big of a deal," Lecanto head coach Wanda Grey said. "If you lose the momentum to begin with, sometimes it can be hard to get it back.

"It's fun because a lot of the players know each other and a lot of the coaches know each other. We know it's usually going to be a tough match and it's nice to get those bragging rights if you can win."

The Panthers improved to 12-11 on the season — including 2-0 against Crystal River — while the Pirates closed out a busy week with a 5-12 overall mark.

"I think my girls are tired. We played three games this week. They didn't come in here with their heads right," Crystal River head coach Leslie Richardson said. "So we are going to just take a rest and hopefully get back at it Monday. It was a long week."

In what would be a big factor in the match, the Panthers jumped out early in

the opening set thanks to strong serving. Up 3-2, Mackenzi Grey stepped up to the service line and served seven straight points — including a pair of aces — for a 10-2 advantage.

"She's working hard on hitting spots. She sees the spots herself and she's done a really good job with that," coach Grey said.

The Pirates got three kills from Bailee Einspahr to close to within 11-8 and eventually made it a two-point Panther lead at 16-14.

But once again, Mackenzi Grey took over at serve. The junior tossed in two more aces to fuel a 9-0 run to end the opening set.

Kang already had nine birdies against one bogey when he hit 7-wood from a fairway bunker to 18 feet on the par-5 closing hole at TPC Summerlin and made the eagle putt.

"Last few weeks I wasn't driving it very good, but my iron play was pretty sharp and my putting was pretty good," Kang said. "So I was just thinking if I can get my driver somewhere in play I could actually score better."

Sungae Im made five straight birdies on the back end, along with an 8-foot eagle putt on No. 9 at the turn, shot a 63. He was joined by Charley Hoffman and Chad Ramey, who birdied all but two holes on the back nine.

Matthew Wolff, who lost in a three-way playoff last year at the TPC Summerlin, was among those at 64.

Sam Burns, coming off a victory last week in Mississippi, was poised to move closer to the lead until his tee shot on the par-3 17th hole found the water. He made double bogey — this after four straight birdies — and had to settle for a 66.

Las Vegas marked the return of six more Ryder Cup players on both teams, and the Europeans seemed to fare well. Viktor Hovland had a 67, with Paul Casey at 68 and Ian Poulter at 69.

Brooks Koepka also shot a 68, while Harris English was at even-par 71 and Scottie Scheffler opened with a 74.

Rickie Fowler failed to reach the FedEx Cup postseason last year. With his wife expecting their first child, he began the new season in Las Vegas and had to rally with three birdies over his last six holes to salvage a 72.

Kang missed only two greens, one of them a par putt from 15 feet on the eighth hole, and his lone bogey was a three-putt from 20 feet on the par-4 third.

The par on his penultimate hole is what he savored because of the momentum he saved, especially with how he finished. He hit a slight draw with his 7-wood out of the sand, and then Matt Kuchar was on the same line with a chip, allowing Kang to see it would snap off to the left. He knew the eagle putt was good before it reached the hole.

## Rahm off to strong start back home at Spanish Open

MADRID — Back in front of his home crowd for the first time in nearly two years, Jon Rahm didn't let them down.

The top-ranked golfer got off to a fast start on his return to Spain, shooting an 8-under 63 in the first round of the Spanish Open on Thursday to sit in third place.

Rahm was at 6 under after his first eight holes before making his only bogey and then finished with three more birdies on his back nine.

"There are quite a few fans out here and they are rather enthusiastic, they have been cooped up for too long and they have the chance to come out and watch me play," he said. "From the beginning, every single shot and every single putt I made they were really supportive and every time I missed a shot they were extremely supportive as well, so that always helps."

Rahm, who started on the 10th hole, was two shots behind clubhouse leader Ross McGowan, the Englishman who was even more impressive with eight birdies and an eagle in a course-record round of 61 at the Clube de Campo Villa de Madrid.

Rahm also had an eagle on his front nine, at the par-5 14th hole. He was outdone by countryman Sebastián García Rodríguez, who was one shot off the lead after making only one bogey in his round of 62.

## Ko has early LPGA lead, 11 straight rounds in 60s

WEST CALDWELL, N.J. — Jin Young Ko put a tough loss behind her quickly and ran off six birdies over a seven-hole stretch on the back nine for an 8-under 63 to build an early three-shot lead in the Cognizant Founders Cup.

It was her 11th consecutive round in the 60s, three short of the record that Annika Sorenstam set in 2005.

Sandra Gal had a 66 despite not making birdie on any of the par 5s at Mountain Ridge.

The large group at 67 included Nelly Korda, the No. 1 player in women's golf who had not played since the Solheim Cup a month ago, U.S. Women's Open champion Yuka Saso and two-time major champion So Yeon Ryu.

Ko, whom Korda replaced at No. 1 in the summer, had control of the ShopRite LPGA Classic last week in southern New Jersey until she missed a series of putts from the 10-foot range, including the last hole to finish one shot behind Celine Boutier.



# Annie offers advice

**D**ear Annie: I have a child with a woman who is 20 years younger than me. Having a child was not planned. I'm grateful for our child, but I'm not in love with her mother. I've tried to explain to her that I love her for the mother she is but that I'm not in love with her.

She found old letters in my closet from an ex that I was in love with over six years ago, and she wonders why I can't love her the way I did my ex. I tried explaining to her that she isn't my ex and what we have is completely different from that relationship.

Shortly after our daughter's birth, things got rough between us, and she took my daughter and everything I'd bought for her. I did not get to see her for two months. Through a lot of court and financial upsets, I finally got to see my daughter. We now live together, just so that I can see my daughter and know that she's taken care of — but I'm still not in love with her mother, nor do I trust her.

How do you get someone to understand you're not in love with them and it's best to go our separate ways co-parenting our child than to live in a distrustful, jealousy-filled environment? Avoiding each other isn't a healthy environment in which to raise our daughter. — **Loving Father, Concerned for his Daughter's Well-Being**

**Dear Loving Father:** Everyone comes into our life for a reason. Some are meant to stay forever. Some are meant to teach us something. Some are meant to offer companionship or love or guidance.

You share a child with this woman, and that is something very special. But it doesn't mean she is a good match as your life partner and vice versa. If she doesn't understand that message, it's best to speak with a couples therapist or mediator to help you two communicate.

And do let her know that although she is not the love of your life, she has given you something no one else can: your daughter.

**Dear Annie:** I live in New Mexico and had a longtime friendship with a lady who had tragic things happen in her life. Her oldest son committed suicide at 16. Her husband died at 49. My husband and I really went above and beyond to help her after both of these untimely deaths.

She has a younger married son and a grandson who moved from New Mexico to Austin, Texas, five years ago. This friend and her mother moved a year later, as she particularly wanted to be near her 9-year-old grandson.

I have tried to keep in touch with her, texting mostly, and I send "thinking of you" cards, etc. She only seems to text me after I have texted her first.

I have a feeling her life is different now in Texas.

My question is, should I keep trying to stay in touch with her, though sometimes hard from a distance, or let her make more of an effort if she really wants to keep our friendship? I would appreciate any advice on this. — **Marlene**

**Dear Marlene:** You sound like an extraordinary friend and continue to prove that in the way you show up for those who are important to you — be it years ago, when this woman experienced unimaginable loss and needed support through the grief, or today, in how you keep the door open for communication and friendship despite the physical distance between you two. Over time, friendships ebb and flow, and it seems right now, this one is ebbing. Be direct and ask what's going on for your friend in Texas. There may be a handful of reasons why she isn't putting in the same effort you are. It might be that you two have simply outgrown each other. If so, focus on your more fruitful friendships, but keep this door open for a future connection to flow.
