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County reassures city on EMS

Emergency ambulance service in Citrus County will continue uninterrupted. That was the assurance Citrus County Administrator Randy Oliver gave Inverness City Council Tuesday after the Citrus County Commission voted Sept. 14 to take over the service from Nature Coast EMS by Oct. 1.

"We're actually going to take over Oct. 2, 8 a.m.," Oliver told the city council members. "There will be no lapse in coverage," he said.

Under the county's plan, the new ambulance service will be folded into Citrus County Fire Rescue and include 36 paramedics and 36 emergency medical technicians, he said.

Oliver said more than 50 have already applied

for the paramedic posts and more than 70 for the EMT jobs, which is a good sign that people want to be part of the county's service.

Oliver told the council that the county will give preference to Nature Coast EMS employees. The county will hire them and they will remain on probation for a year in their jobs, he said.

Commission votes on ambulance service takeover

The Citrus County Commission voted Wednesday to continue its state of emergency for an additional seven days to authorize its continued takeover of ambulance services.

The commission voted on Sept. 14 to take over the service from Nature Coast EMS.

Before the vote, County Administrator Randy Oliver presented estimated annual revenues and expenses for Nature Coast of \$12.98 million.

Oliver said his staff continue to work with Nature Coast about the changeover, as well as the transfer of assets such as ambulances.

Oliver said he's planning on proposing to spend about \$1.2 million thus far for upgraded equipment that

meets the county's standards. He said much of Nature Coast's equipment was problematic. He said he also will be asking for three additional ambulances, but that is a year-long process.

Commissioners also agreed to ensure all the Nature Coast employees who want to be transferred to the county find jobs with the county.

Bus drivers cope with challenges

COVID-19 pandemic has squeezed service, led to personnel shortages

School bus drivers are the forgotten ones. At least that's what a longtime educator once told Citrus County School District bus driver, Ken Balogh.

"It's very true," Balogh said. "We need more."

The national bus driver

shortage has become even more severe since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. Citrus is better off than some, but still experiencing a deficit.

Currently, the district employs 130 bus drivers. Five positions are open, with three substitutes currently in training and five more starting next week.

To cover routes without drivers, the district first calls a substitute, then trainers and finally any office staff or mechanic who is credentialed to drive.

Parents are notified about late buses and asked to transport their children if possible. Either way, children make it to school and are excused if

they are tardy.

To gain some insight on the ins and outs of the job, the Chronicle joined Balogh on his morning route, where he transports children in the Inverness area to Inverness Middle School (IMS) and Citrus High School (CHS).

School board OKs DJJ agreement, discusses policy

Citrus County School Board members approved the cooperative agreement between themselves and Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) at their Sept. 21 special meeting

and workshop.

The purpose of the partnership is to ensure mutual cooperation between both agencies to serve the educational needs of youths in juvenile justice settings.

"We have to do our due diligence to make sure DJJ is doing their fair part

in this agreement," Citrus County School Board member Doug Dodd said.

This includes DJJ's responsibility to notify the district of any no-contact orders. It is both parties' responsibility to ensure the safety of a victim.

"Victims have rights," Dodd added.

The cooperative agreement also outlines procedures, educational evaluations, curriculum, safety and other responsibilities.

Board members also continued workshopping a new school reunification policy, presented by the Citrus County School

District police chief, Dave Vincent.

The policy outlines the procedures of a safe reunion between parents/guardians and students in case of an evacuation as a result of a major incident.

Four motorists airlifted for treatment after two-vehicle crash near Homosassa

Details were released about a two-vehicle crash at a Homosassa intersection that severely injured a handful of Citrus County residents.

Emergency crews airlifted the four people involved in the 8:50 p.m. crash from Monday, Sept. 20, at West Grover Cleveland Boulevard and South Spring Song Terrace to be treated for incapacitating injuries, according to Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) and

Nature Coast EMS.

Prior to the crash, a red Dodge Ram was headed west on Grover Cleveland Boulevard, traveling behind a west-bound white Ford Expedition waiting to turn left onto Spring Song Terrace, according to FHP on Wednesday.

For an unknown reason, according to FHP, the Ram's driver, Homosassa 52-year-old Kevin Lee Cason, didn't stop for the Ford in front, causing his pickup truck to rear end the SUV at an estimated speed of 60 mph.

Before he was taken to Regional Medical Center Bayonet Point, Cason told an FHP trooper he didn't remember

the crash or what happened.

Cason's passenger, Homosassa 26-year-old Christian Shaun Myers, was transported to Ocala Regional Medical Center along with the Ford's passenger, Homosassa 47-year-old Robin Thornton Cumbie, according to FHP.

William Michael Cumbie, the Ford's 47-year-old driver from Homosassa, was taken to Bayonet Point.

Based on the physical evidence and a witnesses statement, FHP cited Cason for careless driving. Neither Cason or Myers were wearing seatbelts, according to FHP.

Oliver also said that as part of the changeover, the county will receive new ambulances and equipment. The county will also pay off Nature Coast's debts as part of taking over the nonprofit's assets, Oliver said, but told the Chronicle the debt is still being tabulated and he didn't yet know the amount.

Citrus County Fire Rescue Chief Craig Stevens told the Inverness council the county is reviewing Nature Coast's operations, taking stock of its assets, and focusing on taking care of the new employees.

Stevens said the county will honor Nature Coast's most recent salary negotiations and the county is working with Nature Coast's third-party billing company to move revenues to the county beginning next month.

Stevens also said the employees will be better off because they will join the state's retirement system.

Stevens also said response times to emergency calls will improve.

"We're going to put more ambulances on the road,

so we're going to improve our response time," he said.

Stevens told the Chronicle later that the county will put 13 ambulances on the road during peak hours. He said that while he didn't know how many Nature Coast used during hours of high demand, he was confident 13 was more.

He also told the council he is taking on additional administrative help to ensure good ambulance service and a smooth transition.

Council members told Stevens they felt better about the county's takeover following his visit.

Commissioner Scott Carnahan told the council it was not an easy vote to end the county's relationship with Nature Coast.

In the 6 1/2 years as a commissioner, Carnahan told the council taking over ambulance service was probably the toughest decision he's had to make.

Taking over the service in 16 days will not be an easy task he said, but "sometimes you have to take the bull by the horns."

But there will be issues in the future, he warned.

"There are going to be bumps in the road," he said.

"I'm standing tall behind them," he said of his

Inverness approves budget, employee raises, holiday parades

The Inverness City Council approved this week the city's new 2021-22 budget with a reduced millage rate for property owners.

The unanimous vote Tuesday setting the tax rate was the second and final vote on the issue.

The city's 2021-22 budget includes a millage rate of 7.8211, which will help create a general fund of \$7.9 million.

The revenues from ad valorem property taxes is expected to raise nearly \$4 million. That's up from \$3,883,787 in fiscal 2020-2021. The city's total revenues, including charges, fees and carryovers, is \$44,304,147 in fiscal 2021-2022. That's up from \$43,603,897.

One mill in property, or ad valorem taxes, is equal to \$1 for each \$1,000 of the property's taxable value. So if a property is worth \$75,000, after homestead exemptions, the property owner's city property taxes will be \$586.58. That does not include county or school taxes.

The proposed lowered millage will still generate more money because the taxable value of the city increased \$21.4 million from the

previous year, according to the Citrus County Property Appraiser's Office. Of that \$21.4 million, \$4.3 million is from new and improved development. The full taxable value of the city is \$534,147,532. That represents a 4.2% increase over the year before.

The rollback rate was 7.6690. The rollback rate is the millage that the council could have imposed that would have generated the same amount in revenues as this year.

Councilwoman Jacquie Hepfer said she was pleased that the city could lower the millage.

"This is a good budget," she said during Tuesday's budget meeting, a few minutes before the council's regularly scheduled meeting.

"God bless our staff" for coming in with a lower millage rate, she said.

■ Also in city business, the council voted unanimously to approve raises for Inverness government employees.

City Manager Eric Williams proposed the raises to his council bosses.

"Our employees are one of the greatest resources we have," he said.

City employees have received regular annual raises for the past

several years.

The council unanimously voted for a 3% increase for employees with annual salaries of at least \$33,351. For those earning \$33,350 or less, they will receive a pay increase equivalent to \$1,000.

To be eligible for the pay increases, the employee must have completed a minimum six-month tenure by Oct. 1, 2021.

Part-time employees will get a \$500 pay increase on their anniversary date.

Williams reported that 38 full-time and seven part-time employees would receive pay raises.

Williams said the increases were fair, especially in this economic climate as employers complain about a shortage of workers.

Council members agreed. "Employees are very valuable," said Councilman Ken Hinkle, adding that it sometimes takes several months to train a new employee.

Councilman Cabot McBride said of the pay hike that it was "by no means a huge increase" and that employees were "highly deserving of this."

■ Also in city business, the Inverness council approved Citrus County Chamber of Commerce's request to organize the annual

Christmas Parade in the city.

In 2020, because of the pandemic, the chamber held a reverse parade in which the parade participants were stationary and visitors drove or walked by to view the event.

This year the chamber requested to organize a traditional parade.

"We are pleased to work with you once again on the Chamber's Inverness Christmas Parade. This is truly a signature event for the city of Inverness and the community's families," Chamber President and CEO Josh Wooten wrote the city.

■ Also in city business, the council granted permission to the organizers of the Veterans Day Parade to hold a parade again this year.

The council agreed to allow parade organizers the use of State Road 44 for the 29th annual Veterans Day parade, Thursday, Nov. 11. The parade was canceled last year.

As part of the event, there will be speakers at the Old Courthouse Heritage Museum at 11 a.m. or soon after the parade.

■ The council renewed the city's contract for another year with Michael Kovach as its code enforcement magistrate. The contract calls for the city to pay Kovach \$250 per hour to hear cases.

Godfather of Black cinema dies at 89

NEW YORK — **Melvin Van Peebles**, the groundbreaking filmmaker, playwright and musician whose work ushered in the “blaxploitation” wave of the 1970s and influenced filmmakers long after, has died. He was 89.

In statement, his family said that Van Peebles, father of the actor-director **Mario Van Peebles**, died Tuesday evening at his home in Manhattan.

“Dad knew that Black images matter. If a picture is worth a thousand words, what was a movie worth?” Mario Van Peebles said in a statement Wednesday. “We want to be the success we see, thus we need to see ourselves being free. True liberation did not mean imitating the colonizer’s mentality. It meant appreciating the power, beauty and interconnectivity of all people.”

Sometimes called the “godfather of modern Black cinema,” the multitalented Van Peebles wrote numerous books and plays, and recorded several albums — playing multiple instruments and delivering rap-style lyrics. He later became a successful options trader on the stock market.

But he was best known for “Sweet Sweetback’s Baadasssss Song,” one of the most influential movies of its time. The low-budget, art-house film, which he wrote, produced, directed, starred in and scored, was the frenzied, hyper-sexual and violent tale of a Black street hustler on the run from police after killing white officers who were beating a Black revolutionary.

Made for around \$500,000 (including \$50,000 provided by

Bill Cosby, it grossed \$14 million at the box office despite an X-rating, limited distribution and mixed critical reviews.

Depp laments ‘cancel culture’

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain — Taking center stage in a prestigious Spanish film festival to receive a top career award, actor **Johnny Depp** presented himself as a victim of the “cancel culture” that, he said, has spread across the cinema industry.

Depp was addressing questions on Wednesday by reporters at the San Sebastian International Film Festival about the loss of Hollywood’s favor for new roles ever since his ex-wife, actress **Amber Heard**, went public with allegations of domestic violence against him.

A British judge last year found the allegations to be “substantially correct.”

“It’s a very complex situation, this cancel-culture, or this instant rush to judgment based on essentially what amounts to polluted air,” the 58-year-old actor responded.

“It’s got so far out of hand that I can assure you, no one is safe.

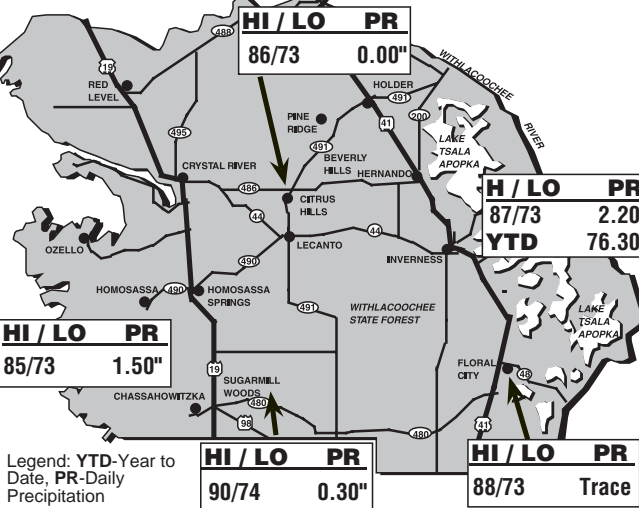
Not one of you, so long as someone is willing to say one thing.”

Female filmmakers and other groups had criticized the organizer’s decision to distinguish Depp with the Donostia Award, the festival’s highest honor, saying it tarnished the event’s image and delivered the wrong message to victims of gender violence.

In March, a British court refused Depp permission to appeal the ruling that he assaulted his former wife, Amber Heard, saying his attempt to overturn the decision had “no real prospect of success.”

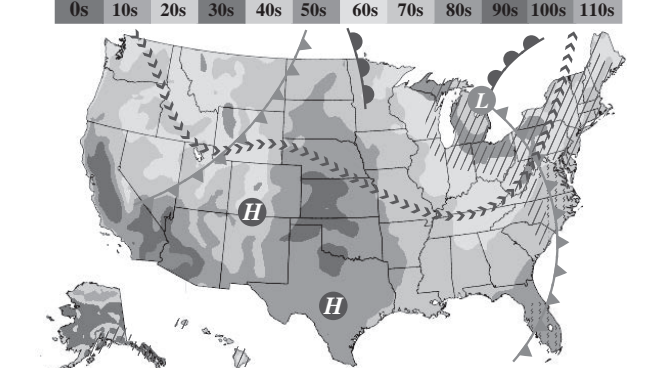

Crystal River public hearing on RV resort postponed

Crystal River City Council's second and final set of public hearings on development applications for a 325-lot RV resort between a neighborhood and golf course will have to wait.

A legal representative for the Plantation Outpost Club and Resort asked city officials in a Sept. 17 letter to move the discussion and vote to council's meeting on Nov. 8.

Crystal River's land development code allows for such a request to be automatically approved just once if the city manager receives it in writing at least seven days before the original public hearing, which, for the Plantation Outpost, was slated for Sept. 27.

Developers also have to

reimburse the city for costs of advertising to give proper notice for the rescheduling.

"We do not anticipate the need for further continuances," wrote Kami Corbett, attorney with the Hill Ward Henderson law firm out of Tampa.

While the public hearings will still be listed on council's Sept. 27 agenda, no action will be taken.

Owners of the Plantation on Crystal River have been asking council to OK a planned-unit development plan and rezoning to create the framework for its 68-acre RV and trailer-home resort in between West Fort Island Trail and West Plantation Lane.

Council members weren't impressed with an initial pitch for the development during the first public hearing Aug. 9.

City officials, along with

the Citrus County residents living around the proposed resort, expressed worries over the resort's poor evacuation plan for its mobile tenants, its environmental impact to the neighboring King's Bay, and its influences on traffic congestion and flooding events.

In her letter, Corbett said the continuance is needed so more information can be gathered to help address concerns with the development's stormwater management, impacts to water resources, "along with other issues discussed" during the first public hearing.

If approved by council and other regulatory agencies, the Plantation Outpost would be built in six phases over 10 years.

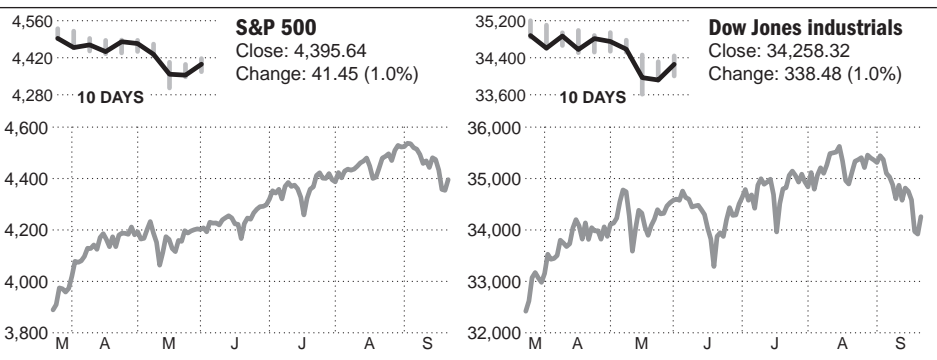

Stocks hold gains after Fed statement

Stocks on Wall Street closed broadly higher Wednesday after the Federal Reserve signaled it may begin easing its extraordinary support measures for the economy later this year. The central bank indicated it may start raising its benchmark interest rate sometime next year, earlier than it envisioned three months ago. It

also said it will likely begin slowing the pace of its monthly bond purchases "soon" if the economy keeps improving. The Fed's been buying the bonds throughout the pandemic to help keep long-term interest rates low. The S&P 500 rose 1%, breaking a four-day losing streak. The benchmark index initially climbed 1.4% after the Fed issued its statement. The other major indexes also received a bump, but shed some of their gains by

late afternoon. The Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 338.48 points, or 1%, to 34,258.32. The blue-chip index briefly surged 520 points higher. The Nasdaq composite gained 150.45 points, or 1%, to 14,896.85. Bond yields mostly rose. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note wobbled up and down after the Fed's announcement, but wound up little changed at 1.31% from 1.32% late Tuesday.

INTERNET CAFÉS

Commission takes proactive step vs. internet cafés

When they first appeared in the United States in the early 1990s, internet cafés, or cybercafés, emerged out of necessity — simply providing internet access to the public, mainly travelers, and charged a fee for such access at a time-based rate. In addition to the worldwide access in our society’s ever-increasing need to remain connected, these cafés may have also provided food and drink, much like a traditional café.

Over the years with the ever-increasing access to the internet more available and the advent of the smartphone, it would have seemed these once-convenient accessibility spots had outgrown their necessity for our

cafés answer back by re-emerging and relying on technicalities in frequently changing state laws to operate.

County Commissioner Jeff Kinnard brought the topic before the commission recently after being contacted by the Citrus County Sheriff’s Office and informed that these cafés had re-

established in the county following previous shut-downs. The concern for the public is that the cafés allow illegal gambling, which in turn brings other nuisance behaviors and dangerous criminal activity including drugs and armed robbery.

These establishments are not isolated to Citrus County alone, of course. Through-

out the state, there are internet cafés with similar simulated gambling devices, and several counties and cities are simply not standing for it. Nassau, Duval and Marion counties have made the move to look more closely at the issue and draft ordinances to crack down on illegal cafés. Last Tuesday, county commissioners voted unanimously to do the same and directed the county attorney to draft an ordinance with more severe fines and longer jail times for those found to be operating illegally.

There are several opportunities to gamble legally in Florida, with some just a short drive away. These establishments have the proper security, licenses and safety policies in place for those who wish to take a chance with lady luck. The commission’s decision to act swiftly and clamp down on those operations allowing illegal gambling is the right move.

Make Turkey Oak bypass a reality

In 1929, the residents of Crystal River could have never foreseen what the construction of U.S. 19 would do to their sleepy little fishing village.

No one would have believed it, if they hadn’t lived seeing the incredible negative effects that U.S. 19’s high volume, “through traffic” has had on life in Crystal River.

A beautiful town like Crystal River deserves better choices. Highway-oriented strip centers, gas stations, fast-food joints, and cheap motels, beset by the smell of 18-wheeler exhaust, and frequent gridlocks are not the foundation of a sound local economy, and never were. A more prosperous future for Crystal River will only come from recognizing that its people are its greatest asset, not U.S. 19.

Today, we have the opportunity to make a difference. Crystal River community leaders and public officials have had the foresight to craft strategies and goals that help our public officials (both county and state) visualize local needs; that not only builds prosperity but also a community that works for everyone.

As the opening of the new section of the Suncoast Parkway approaches, we need to assess our community’s transportation needs in a way that both serves the goals of our local communities and improves the quality of life for us today and generations to come. To accomplish this, we must understand the crucial distinction between a “road” and a “street.”

A “road” is what U.S. 19 has become. Its purpose, according to Florida Department of Transportation, is to move travelers at high speed from one productive place to another — in this case, from Tampa Bay to the Panhandle — with a minimum of friction or

interruption.

A “street,” on the other hand, is a platform for building local wealth. A street should be a destination, and it should be a welcoming place to linger. Traffic should be slow, people on foot, and bicycles, should be given priority in its design. This is what the Crystal River community envisions for U.S. 19 with the upgrading of Turkey Oak Drive to a “road.” If approved, this would reduce and slow traffic in Crystal River.

How did Crystal River get into this predicament, you may ask? Problems started with growth in Tampa and the additional traffic that came with it. Both U.S. 19 and State Road 44 were widened from two lanes to now six lanes, and Crystal River’s “streets” slowly became “roads” as the state struggled to move traffic quickly but also provide access to local businesses and destinations.

When this happens, what a community ends up with is called a “stroad,” which neither moves traffic quickly nor provides access to local businesses.

U.S. 19 and S.R. 44 through Crystal River have over the years become stroads to end all stroads.

Many residents will agree, U.S. 19 has become a horrible experience for locals, a horrible experience for travelers, and a stroad that has divided our beautiful little historic town and is slowly draining its wealth with every gas station, dollar store and fast-food restaurant that goes up.

The best reason to build the Turkey Oak bypass is to get heavy traffic and trucks bypass our town, so we can slow traffic down, have our street back and recreate a town where people feel safe visitors are welcomed and Crystal River can mend and prosper once again.

Put EMS back under county

I want to first thank all of the EMTs and paramedics for everything they do for all Citrus County residents.

With the ongoing debate about the financial stability of Nature Coast EMS and the substandard pay of our first responders, I would like to offer a few suggestions for our county commissioners to consider. As a longtime resident of Citrus County, I remember when the EMTs and paramedics were county employees. Previous county commission members decided years ago it would be a cost savings to the county to contract out the emergency medical services of its residents after they lost an over-time lawsuit brought on by the EMTs at that time. That has proven time and again not to have saved taxpayers any money.

I would suggest our commissioners seriously consider putting the EMTs and paramedics back under the county umbrella as full-time county employees. As our county has one of the oldest populations in the nation, it is imperative that we have the best emergency medical services in the nation. This is not a time to be cheap or “conservative” when it comes to emergency medical services and our very important first responders.

As a comparative, Sumter County gives their third-party emergency medical service provider over \$1 million a year in subsidies. Sumter has approximately 24,000 fewer residents than Citrus. In 2020, Levy County paid an assessment of \$154 per homeowner for emergency medical services of which they are county employees. Levy County has 41,000 residents compared to Citrus County’s 153,000 residents.

Biden, Dems talk budget

3.5T plan has party split

WASHINGTON — Time growing shorter, President Joe Biden labored to thrash out stubborn final issues with fellow Democrats on his “build back better” agenda Wednesday, working to bridge intraparty divisions in Congress ahead of crucial voting deadlines.

Biden and Democratic House and Senate lawmakers met in hours of back-to-back-to-back private White House sessions stretching into the evening, called at a pivotal juncture for Biden’s \$3.5 trillion package as lawmakers struggle to draft the ambitious effort. With Republicans solidly opposed, Democratic leaders are counting on the president to galvanize consensus between progressives and centrists in their party.

Biden first conferred with House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, while the White House’s communications team headed to Capitol Hill to huddle with other House Democrats. Biden listened intently, lawmakers said, but also indicated he wanted progress soon, even by next week.

“We’re in good shape,” Pelosi told reporters back at the Capitol after the hour-plus meeting.

The White House’s intense focus on Biden’s expansive domestic proposal showcases how much is at stake politically for the president and his party in Congress. The administration has suffered setbacks elsewhere, notably with

the Afghanistan withdrawal and prolonged COVID-19 crisis, and Democrats are running short of time, anxious to make good on campaign promises.

Meanwhile, the House and Senate are at a standstill over a separate package to keep the government funded past the Sept. 30 fiscal yearend and to suspend the federal debt limit to avert a shutdown and a devastating U.S. default on payments. Senate Republicans are refusing the House-passed bill, sparking a fiscal standoff.

Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell said at a press conference Tuesday that failing to extend the debt limit is “just not something we can contemplate or we should contemplate.”

As for Biden’s build-back plans, the House faces a deadline Monday to vote on the first part of Biden’s plan — a nearly \$1 trillion public works measure that was already approved by the Senate but has become tangled in disputes over the broader package.

Centrist Democrats support the slimmer bill but have raised concerns about the price tag of Biden’s broader vision — which entails revamping federal taxes and spending to make what the president views as overdue investments in health care, family services and efforts to fight climate change.

The \$3.5 trillion package would impose tax hikes on corporations and wealthy Americans earning beyond \$400,000 a year and plow that money back into federal programs.

Many migrants to stay in US, despite expulsions

DEL RIO, Texas — Three hours after being freed from a giant migrant camp under an international bridge, Mackenson Veillard stood outside a gas station and took stock of his sudden good fortune as he and his pregnant wife waited for a Greyhound bus to take them to a cousin in San Antonio.

The couple camped with thousands for a week under the bridge in Del Rio, Texas, sleeping on concrete and getting by on bread and bottled water.

“I felt so stressed,” Veillard, 25, said this week. “But now, I feel better. It’s like I’m starting a new life.”

Many Haitian migrants in Del Rio are being released in the United States, according to two U.S. officials, undercutting the Biden administration’s public statements that the thousands in the camp faced immediate expulsion to Haiti.

Haitians have been freed on a “very, very large scale” in recent days, one official said Tuesday. The official, who was not authorized to discuss the matter and thus spoke on condition of anonymity, put the figure in the thousands.

Many have been released with notices to appear at an immigration office within 60 days, an outcome that requires less processing time

from Border Patrol agents than ordering an appearance in immigration court and points to the speed at which authorities are moving.

The releases come despite a massive effort to expel Haitians on flights under pandemic-related authority that denies migrants a chance to seek asylum.

Ten flights arrived in Haiti from Sunday to Tuesday in planes designed for 135 passengers, according to Haitian officials, who didn’t provide a complete count but said six of those flights carried 713 migrants combined.

The camp held more than 14,000 people over the weekend, according to some estimates. Texas Gov. Greg Abbott, during a visit Tuesday to Del Rio, said the county’s top official told him the most recent tally was about 8,600 migrants. U.S. authorities have declined to say how many have been released in the U.S. in recent days.

The Homeland Security Department has been busying Haitians from Del Rio, a town of 35,000 people, to El Paso, Laredo and the Rio Grande Valley along the Texas border, and this week added flights to Tucson, Arizona, the official said. Criteria for deciding who is flown to Haiti and who is released in the U.S. are a mystery, but two officials said single adults were a priority.

FDA backs Pfizer COVID-19 boosters for seniors, high-risk

The U.S. moved a step closer Wednesday to offering booster doses of Pfizer’s COVID-19 vaccine to senior citizens and others at high risk from the virus as the Food and Drug Administration signed off on the targeted use of extra shots.

The FDA authorized booster doses for Americans who are 65 and older, younger adults with underlying health conditions and those in jobs that put them at high risk for COVID-19. The ruling represents a drastically scaled back version of the Biden administration’s sweeping plan to give third doses to nearly all American adults to shore up their protection amid the spread of the highly contagious delta variant.

However, more regulatory hurdles lie ahead before the dispensing of boosters can begin.

Advisers to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention opened a two-day meeting Wednesday to make their own, more specific recommendations about who should get the extra shots and when. And in their first day of discussions, some experts were so perplexed by the questions surrounding the rationale for boosters that they suggested putting off a decision for a month in hopes of more evidence.

United Airlines say 97% of US employees have been vaccinated

DALLAS — United Airlines says more than 97% of its U.S.-based employees are fully vaccinated against COVID-19 now that there is less than a week before a deadline to get the shots or get fired.

The airline said Wednesday that the new figure does not include a “small number” of employees who are seeking a medical or religious exemption from vaccination.

“Vaccine requirements work,” United said in a memo to employees.

Six United employees sued United this week claiming that the airline is discriminating against employees who get exemptions from the vaccine mandate by placing them on unpaid leave.

“United’s actions have left Plaintiffs with the impossible choice of either taking the COVID-19 vaccine, at the expense of their religious beliefs and their health, or losing their livelihoods,” lawyers for the employees say in their lawsuit, which was filed in federal district court in Fort Worth, Texas.

Fed on track to slow support for economy later this year

WASHINGTON — Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell signaled Wednesday that the Fed plans to announce as early as November that it will start withdrawing the extraordinary support it unleashed after the coronavirus paralyzed the economy 18 months ago.

Powell said that if the job market maintained its steady improvement, the Fed would likely begin slowing the pace of its monthly bond purchases. Those purchases have been intended to lower longer-term loan rates to encourage borrowing and spending.

“I think if the economy continues to progress broadly in line with expectations,” the Fed chair said at a news conference, “I think we can easily move ahead at the next meeting” in November.

At the same time, the Fed’s policymaking committee indicated that it expects to start raising its benchmark rate sometime next year — earlier than the members had envisioned three months ago and a sign that they’re concerned that high inflation pressures may persist.

Mother, daughter accused of ‘outlaw’ buttocks augmentations

LOS ANGELES — A mother and daughter have been arrested in Southern California on suspicion of performing “outlaw” buttocks augmentation procedures on women, including one

who died, police said Wednesday.

Libby Adame, 51, and Alicia Galaz, 23, are accused of performing the “inherently unsafe, FDA unapproved” cosmetic procedures at non-medical facilities, the Los Angeles Police Department said in a statement.

“Neither are a licensed medical provider in California and their clients were recruited through Instagram,” the statement said.

Afghan Taliban’s new UN envoy urges quick recognition

KABUL, Afghanistan — The Taliban’s newly appointed envoy to the United Nations on Wednesday urged quick world recognition of Afghanistan’s new rulers even as the World Health Organization raised the alarm of an impending health care disaster in the war-wracked country.

The humanitarian crisis is one of the many challenges the Taliban face since their takeover of Afghanistan last month, including renewed threats from the militant Islamic State group, which recently stepped up its attacks, targeting members of the Taliban in its stronghold in the country’s east.

In an emergency measure, the U.N. aid coordinator Martin Griffiths released \$45 million in life-saving support Wednesday for Afghanistan from the world body’s emergency fund.

The World Health Organization said Afghanistan’s health system is on the brink of collapse and that urgent action is needed.

In October, Balough will have been driving for the district for 12 years. He began as a substitute for one year before getting his own route.

Balough said he was skeptical when he first started the job because he had never managed children, but soon settled in to the role.

“They’re just like we were when we were kids,” he said. “They want to be respected.”

Every morning, Balough arrives at the bus lot behind CHS at 5:30 a.m. to check in. Then, he heads off to his bus to complete the required inspection.

Drivers are required to complete a daily checklist to ensure the proper functions of emergency exits, lights, turn signals, tires, etc.

“Our number one priority is keeping students safe,” Balough said.

In addition, with the spread of COVID-19, bus drivers are required to fill out daily seating charts, which are used for contact tracing purposes.

At each stop, Balough greets students with a

friendly “good morning” and periodically reminds them to fasten their seatbelts.

Along the way, Balough gives friendly waves and honks to vehicles who stop for the bus, which ensures the safety of his students. When students have to

cross the street, they know to wait for his signal.

During the drive, Balough provided some insight on Citrus County School District driver shortages. When he first started, Balough said it wasn’t as big of an issue. In fact, each bus lot even had

full-time relief drivers.

From then until present day, Balough wonders what happened.

“Why can’t we keep drivers?” he said. Balough chalks it up to a mixture of things: not everyone is happy with the pay, many people don’t want to drive a bus full of rowdy children and others are put off by how bus drivers are perceived.

At 65 years old, Balough said he’s fine with his pay, but he hears a lot about money from other drivers, especially young single parents.

The main issue, Balough said, is the inconsistency with consequences for misbehaving students.

Currently, there’s a referral system in place for bus drivers which consist of four steps:

Step 1: Warning.

Step 2: Parent call.

Step 3: Parent letter, warning of a potential suspension.

Step 4: Administration is notified.

With the fourth level of the referral system left up to administration’s

discretion, Balough said the consequences lack consistency.

“Administration wants them in school,” Balough said. In his opinion, this makes suspension less likely, which creates more grievances for bus drivers.

However, Balough said it’s not his goal to suspend students, but encourage behavioral improvement with clear disciplinary actions.

Balough said he would like to see a meeting with drivers and administration to discuss the issue.

“We need more support from administration,” he added.

“The rules on the bus are very simple,” Balough said. “The last thing a driver needs is distractions.”

However, Balough said his route is especially respectful and well-behaved in comparison to some.

“They deserve a pat on the back,” he said.

Despite the negatives of the job, Balough said there are many positives. He cited the district’s

excellent training staff and experienced drivers who are willing to help each other out.

In addition, driver pay is distributed year-round, although they only work 180 days per year, much like teachers. In addition, drivers receive full benefits.

However, Balough said one of the most rewarding parts of the job is the students.

“I get to see them grow and develop into adults,” he said. “My students respect me — and it’s mutual.”

Bus drivers are the first and last people to see students during the school day. Although it’s not where he’d like it to be, Balough said the appreciation for bus drivers has increased over the last few years.

People need to know, Balough said, “We’re not just bus drivers.”

“We try to prepare for a day we hope never happens,” Vincent said.

In the case of an incident, 18-year-old students are legally allowed to excuse themselves from the reunification site. In the case of a lost or missing student, district and law enforcement would coordinate to locate them.

“Our goal is 100% accountability,” Vincent said.

In addition, Vincent said there will be an in-person training including staff, law enforcement, school resource officers and guardians once roles are officially assigned.

Board members

reviewed the annual notification of rights concerning student educational records. All schools publish an annual notification distributed to parents/guardians or students 18 or older. Rights include:

■ The right to review educational records.

■ The right to request the amendment of educational records.

■ The right to object to disclosures of personally identifiable information from educational records.

■ The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education if these rights are not respected.

However, student directory information may be released without the written consent of a parent/guardian or student over 18. This information

includes names, images, attendance, academic work intended for publication/display, etc.

This information will not be released if permission is refused by Sept. 15 or within 30 days of receiving the notice, if the student or an immediate family member is an active or former law enforcement employee, firefighter or an investigator with the Department of Children and Families or if the person has been the victim of certain crimes.

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From one generation to the next

New great-granddaughter arrives amid memories of old-fashioned recipes

OVER EASY

While awaiting word on progress of the impending birth of our newest great-granddaughter in California, it was difficult to concentrate on writing today's Over Easy column.

After a couple false starts — because I kept checking on the status of mom-to-be Haviland — I finally decided to delve into my repertoire of old family recipes that have lost nothing due to age.

Some of the best memories reflected some penny pinching meals devised by my own mother, based on her pot-pourri of recipes handed down by her mom over the years.

Breakfast during our busy school years was usually hasty and simple, but one of our favorites was fried mush — two words that usually evoked scorn from my own kids — until they tried it.

Fried cornmeal mush was a staple in our home, passed along from my Grandma Bess who drew on her Pennsylvania Dutch heritage for many satisfying meals.

● Serve this dish with your favorite sausage or bacon and a couple of eggs for an easy breakfast that will keep you in fine form all day long:

Grandma's Cornmeal Fried Mush

- 3 cups water
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup yellow cornmeal (I use Quaker)
 - 1 tablespoon butter
- In a medium saucepan, heat water to boiling. Reduce heat to medium; stir in salt and cornmeal. Cook, stirring regularly, until mixture is thick. Spoon cornmeal mixture into a lightly greased 9 X 5-inch loaf pan. Cool then cover and

refrigerate overnight.

In the morning, melt butter in a skillet over medium high heat. Slice cornmeal mush into 1 inch wide slices. Cook in melted butter until golden brown on both sides. Serve with maple syrup.

● Lunch in the small town where I grew up in Indiana, was almost always at home since our schools were within walking distance. Mom worked full time as a news reporter, so she had to come up with some quick and easy noon meals:

Baked Tuna Melts

Here's an easy way to make a tuna melts: Using a muffin pan is a good way to make single-serving tuna melts for a family, and it will minimize clean-up, too.

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 12 slices honey oat or honey wheat bread, (or bread of choice) crusts removed
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted

- 2 6-ounce cans chunk white tuna (water pack), drained
- 3 tablespoons mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 4 ounces Havarti (or other favorite cheese) cut into small cubes
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped green onions

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Generously coat twelve 2 1/2-inch muffin pan cups with cooking spray; set aside. Lightly brush one side of bread slices with melted butter.

Press bread slices, buttered sides up, into the prepared muffin cups.

In a small bowl combine tuna, and mayonnaise. Stir in cheese, shallot, and dried cranberries. Divide tuna mixture among bread-lined muffin cups.

Bake about 15 minutes or until filling is hot and bubbly. Remove tuna cups from muffin cups; let stand for 5 minutes before serving. If desired, garnish with fresh dill. Makes 12 servings.

● On hot summer days we all liked fresh salads and especially our family favorite sweet-sour lettuce dressing:

German Style Wilted Lettuce Salad

- 5 slices bacon
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 3 tablespoons vinegar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1/3 cup red onion rings
- 1 medium head lettuce

Fry bacon in skillet until crisp. Drain well on paper towel. Cool bacon drippings and add sugar and vinegar; Heat. Wash lettuce and dry. Tear into bite size pieces and place in large bowl. Add onion ring and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Add the hot vinegar/sugar/bacon drippings mixture and crumbled crisp bacon crumbled and toss lightly. Makes 6 servings.

● Another version was shared by family friends who owned a sporting goods and bait store at a nearby lake. When our parents visited there in the summer, my sister Judie and I worked part time counting fish worms to

place in plastic cups for sale in their store. At about age 8, we thought earning the three cents per worm was a big deal — but don't let that visual distract you from trying this simple tasty recipe:

Rollies Dressing

Slice green onions with large amount of fresh leaf lettuce. Make dressing using 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1/4 cup vinegar, one small can of condensed milk, a touch of garlic salt. Heat and pour over lettuce so it gently wilts before serving.

● Desserts in our home were almost always home-made and I still crave one my mom often made and one I bake now about once a month, though I cheat a bit and use a Jiffy cake mix in the recipe:

Cherry Cake, Cherry Sauce

Mix a Jiffy yellow cake mix according to package directions. Open a can of sour (not sweet) cherries; drain and reserve juice to make sauce. Butter an 8 X 8 casserole dish and pour drained whole cherries in dish. Sprinkle about 1/4 to 1/2 cup of brown sugar evenly over cherries. Pour cake mix evenly over cherries and brown sugar.

Place dish in preheated 350 degree oven, Bake for 5 to 10 minutes longer than box directions.

In small saucepan, Pour reserved cherry juice in a small saucepan. Add about 1 1/2 cups of water mixed well with two to three tablespoons of cornstarch. Stir in three tablespoons brown sugar. Heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens slightly. Add tablespoon butter and reduce heat to very low.

Serve squares of cherry cake topped with enough warm sauce to cover. A dollop of whipped cream on top doesn't hurt anything and folks will ask for another helping.

● Oh yes. By the time this Over Easy was finished, the news we were waiting for arrived via Facebook chat, that little Frankie was born and we were treated to photos of our newborn great-grandbaby girl and her very happy family.

Apple pie bars make for a tasty autumn treat

I blinked my eyes and checked again. Where is Daniel? I checked the children's bedrooms to see if he was caring for one of them—no Daniel. Stepping over to the window overlooking our driveway, I blinked again and smiled, looking at the field beyond. Way back, in the back section of our 11-acre field, were the headlights of our tractor as he drove back and forth in the blackness of the wee hours of the early morning.

I nestled back in bed, excited for the day ahead, yet thankful for not carrying the responsibility of planting 1,150 chestnut trees in the next two days, before the heavy rain, which was in the forecast for Tuesday night.

Now I don't know how familiar you are with chestnuts; I was not familiar with them last winter when Daniel first talked about them. Okay, so most chestnuts are imported, making the demand much higher. Daniel is always on the lookout for things that will enhance our children's lives and help build character. He was impressed with the thought that by the time we have a houseful of teenagers, we'd Lord willing have a family project of harvesting chestnuts and caring for the grove. I was fascinated to learn of the health aspects of this nut and its ability to be used in many ways, including ground to make flour.

I admit, at first, I was a bit on the skittish side, till one day I was like, "Of course I'll support his idea with my whole heart!" Since then, we've had untold blessings as we discussed how to approach the planting days and

dreamed of having a picnic area among the trees (once they're taller than the two to three feet they are now) and fixing up a camping spot.

Now we've eagerly been waiting on the day of their arrival, which happened to be on Daniel's birthday. The next "wait" was the soybeans, which needed to be harvested first to have the field emptied, ready for grass seed, then trees. On the day the beans were harvested, Daniel began

preparing the area for planting, including cutting down some trees in the woods surrounding the field.

Now the day was here. No more waiting; the race was on. Hubby was out planting grass seed.

After a few more hours of sleep for me, the break of dawn was here. I met Daniel in the field with two breakfast sandwiches (made with fresh quail eggs) and juice. The grass seed was all planted, and he was ready to work on squaring off the field and put in flags where the trees were to be planted in 20 feet increments throughout the entire area. That was a significant job all its own. Daniel enjoys nice straight rows of whatever he does, and marking off a big field was no small task. With much diligence and help from his dad, they worked their way across the field.

The children were on pins and needles waiting on this big day when friends and family would pitch in and lend a helping hand, making the job more pleasant and doable. Now, this morning it only took moments for them to be wide awake. As soon as they had breakfast and did their morning jobs,

we joined the men starting to distribute stakes, guards, and ties in preparation for planting. Little Joshua was thrilled to be in on the action and took it all in.

Daniel's goal was to have the last trees in the ground by Tuesday night. My guess is that optimistic Hubby overshot a bit. Monday went well. Perhaps the best part of all for me was at night, having guests relaxing in the yard after supper. It felt so good to sit down, chat, and catch up on news.

Tuesday morning, I took the children out in the field again. Thanks to Grandma for baby-sitting Joshua as we dug in and gave it all we had. By mid-afternoon, Daniel contacted those who planned to help in the evening and told them that we're working on the last section and they don't need to feel obligated to come.

White protector tubes stripped over the trees and tied to the stakes, all stood in rows of hundreds of trees. As we did those last rows, I gazed over the field in wonder. Overhead, dark clouds were gathering. I thanked God for the rain, which I was confident would be coming one time or other.

I hadn't mapped out all my menus ahead of time to feed those who came to help. So I just took a meal at a time and asked God to plan it for me. I was amazed at how well it all came together. Several ladies brought in food which was a rich blessing.

That night as we slept soundly, rain fell in torrents, watering these young trees. We are hearing stories from old-timers, how they used to roast chestnuts over a fire on autumn days. Do any of you remember those days before the blight went through, killing most chestnut trees in North America?

We'll see, and perhaps in a couple of years, we'll have some to offer to you! With this blight-resistant type, we hope for a good harvest.

Apple Pie Squares

Dough:

- 3 3/4 cup flour
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 1/2 teas salt
- 3/4 cup vegetable shortening
- 1/3 cup butter
- 1 cup cold water

Filling:

- 10 cups chopped apples
- 1 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup flour
- 2 teas cinnamon
- 1/2 teas salt

Mix dough ingredients together and roll out like pie dough. Place half of dough in the bottom of a 15 by 11 inch rimmed cookie sheet. Now mix filling ingredients together and spread on top of unbaked crust. Dot with several tablespoons butter. Place other half of rolled out dough on top of filling mixture or cut in strips and place on filling, lattice style. Beat an egg and brush on top crust. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes or until lightly golden brown. Enjoy hot from the oven or chilled. Yummy with homemade vanilla ice cream!

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United States seeks Ryder Cup answers

Europe has won nine of past 12 meetings

SHEBOYGAN, Wis. — The Americans bring the type of credentials that make them favorites in just about every Ryder Cup, and this year is no different.

All but one of their players is among the top 20 in the world — the lone exception is Ryder Cup rookie Scottie Scheffler at No. 21. Six of them are major champions. They have the FedEx Cup champion and the Olympic gold medalist on their side.

It just rarely translates into winning the Ryder Cup, and only Europe seems to have the answer.

A few Americans at least tried to find an explanation.

“They just play better. It’s really simple,” Dustin Johnson said Wednesday. “Whoever plays better is going to win. I mean, it’s not rocket science.”

Patrick Cantlay, whose thoughts tend to run a little deeper, took a longer view when searching for reasons why Europe has won nine of the last 12 times in the Ryder Cup.

Cantlay has been playing gin rummy since he was a teenager and referred to a few books he has read on the game, throwing in some analogies to the roulette wheel and flipping coins for good measure.

This wasn’t rocket science, either, but it was far more entertaining.

“If you play enough gin hands, a 1 or 2% difference in skill translates to almost an assured win over many, many, many hands of gin,” he said. “But you could have a big difference — maybe a 60 to 40% skill level difference — and gin is still chancy

enough to where you could play 10 hands and lose six or seven of the hands than someone much worse than you skill-wise.”

Golf is “chancy” in any format, and the Ryder Cup is played once every two years, at least when it’s not postponed by a pandemic.

“So would it surprise you if the U.S. went on a similar run to what Europe has been on for the next 20 years? Wouldn’t surprise me,” Cantlay said.

He then switched to roulette, with a mostly 50-50 chance of winning, skewed ever so slightly to the house. It could hit red six times in a row and no one would blink. But take another 50-50 gamble, such as flipping a coin.

“If the quarter flips tails, heads, tails, heads, tails, heads, then you would think something trippy was going on,” he said.

Back to the Ryder Cup. Cantlay pointed out variables such as

the captains, players, golf courses and even the weather changing from one Ryder Cup to the next one. And then he reached his conclusion.

“You’re really going to ask a question like that and think you’re going to get the right answer?” he said with a smile. “I don’t have the answers to that. This is my first one.”

Maybe that counts as a slight edge for the Americans. This is their youngest team ever, with an average age of 29. Only three of their 12 players have competed in more than one Ryder Cup.

“It is puzzling how I think we’ve lost a lot in the handful of years looking back,” British Open champion Collin Morikawa said. “But that’s the past. We’re here, and we’re about the present, or hopefully what the future is going to be like. It’s about this week, and hopefully we can turn that round and turn that tide in our

ST. PETERSBURG — Hit by a pitch two days after scooping up a Toronto scouting report and setting off a flap, Kevin Kiermaier hopes to see the Blue Jays in the playoffs.

“Oh yeah, it was intentional,” Kiermaier said after reliever Ryan Borucki hit him on the back with his first pitch in the eighth inning Wednesday.

Tampa Bay’s 7-1 victory clinched its third straight postseason berth. When asked why he wants to face Toronto

again, Kiermaier replied: “The motivation is there. That’s all that needs to be said.”

“Pretty much almost went behind me,” Kiermaier said. “I thought it was a weak move, to be quite honest. It’s over: It’s didn’t hurt by any means, so I don’t care. Whatever: We move on. We got a series win, and I hope we play those guys, I really do.”

Borucki was ejected after the umpires met, which prompted Blue Jays manager Charlie Montoyo and enraged pitching coach Pete Walker to storm out of the dugout to argue as played spilled onto the field. Walker also was tossed, and

there were no incidents between the players.

“I wanted to go down and away, as I was coming forward I felt the ball slip out of my hand and I missed up and in, and I accidentally hit him,” Borucki said. “They can think want they want over there in their locker room, but it is what it is.”

Borucki was tossed by crew chief Joe West.

“I was just like, I missed arm-side, like I miss arm-side a lot,” Borucki said. “I pitch inside all the time, and he was like, ‘You’ve just got to go.’”

THIS DATE IN BASEBALL

1908 — In a crucial game with the Chicago Cubs, Fred Merkle of the New York Giants failed to touch second base as the apparent winning run crossed home plate. This resulted in a great dispute and the game was eventually declared a tie and played over on Oct. 8 when the Cubs and Giants ended the season in a tie.

1939 — Brooklyn's Cookie Lavagetto went 6-for-6 to lead the Dodgers' 27-hit attack in a 22-4 rout of the Philadelphia Phillies.

1952 — The Brooklyn Dodgers clinched the NL title, the first time since 1948 that the pennant wasn't decided in the season's final game.

1957 — Hank Aaron's 11th-inning homer gave the Milwaukee Braves a 4-2 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals and the NL pennant. It was the first time since 1950 that a New York team hadn't finished first.

1979 — Lou Brock stole base No. 938, breaking Billy Hamilton's record, as the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Mets 7-4 in 10 innings.

1983 — Steve Carlton of Philadelphia recorded his 300th career victory with a 6-2 win over the St. Louis Cardinals at Busch Stadium.

1984 — The Detroit Tigers beat the New York Yankees 4-1, making Sparky Anderson the first manager to win more than 100 games in each league.

1986 — Rookie left-hander Jim Deshaies set a major league record by striking out eight batters to start the game and finished with a two-hitter and 10 strikeouts to lead the Houston Astros past of the Los Angeles Dodgers 4-0.

1987 — Albert Hall of the Atlanta Braves hit for the cycle in 5-4 win over the Houston Astros.

The snook are biting

Great news for snook anglers coming from Bluewater Bait and Tackle in Homosassa. Owner Bill Korade says that many li- nesiders are being caught on the Outer Islands, Mason Creek and St. Martin using live shrimp and cut mullet. The big hitting snook also have been loving light-colored plastic baits in white or Glo. Korade also reports that trout are plenty in the 4- to 6-foot water range north of the channel.

Captain's Cove in Inglis reports that the redfish are being found around the intake and the hot water discharge. Mangrove snapper are still on the rocks.

"The grouper have started moving in to the 15 to 20 feet range of water," said spokesman Andrew Fagan. "There are also plenty of flounder being caught in the same areas as redfish."

On the freshwater side, heavy,

record-setting rainfall totals have made bass fishing tough, coupled with the summer heat. Your best bet is to get out early and throw topwater lures. Don't be afraid to down-size your baits. Schools of smaller bass may often be found schooling. Once the sun has started to beat down on you, go to flipping. Bigger bass will hide in the heavy stuff, so make sure you have enough weight to get through all of the vegetation. As dusk nears, get the topwater baits back out. Once it starts cooling down specks and pan-fish should be readily available.

Riverland Bait and Tackle out of Dunnellon reports that shiners are still catching some bass. A guest reportedly caught a 9 1/2-pound hawg on Rousseau using a domestic shiner.

In other outdoors news, there will be a Hunter's Safety Internet Class on Oct. 16 from 9 a.m. to completion. The FWC is hosting this class. Go to www.public.myfwc.com to request enrollment.

Bow season for deer is underway and it ends on Oct. 17. Scallop season ends tomorrow, while fall turkey season opens Nov. 6, the same day the general gun season opens for deer.

favor for however many years I'm able to play this."

Europe is all about team and its rich history. Captain Padraig Harrington began the week by giving each player a number that represents their chronological place among the 164 players from Europe who have competed in the matches.

And then he set out to win over a crowd that, because of the pandemic and travel restrictions, will be overwhelming cheering for the Stars and Stripes. The team colors Wednesday were green and gold, just like the Green Bay Packers, and he had his players wear foam Cheesehead hats when they walked onto the practice range.

They received a standing ovation and more cheers when they flung them into the gallery.

It was reminiscent of 2004 at Oakland Hills, where there was an agreement not to sign autographs during practice. But the Europeans signed everything, endearing themselves to the crowd, or maybe just taking away some of the sting in a record margin of victory.

"A bit of fun and we got a nice reception with it," Harrington said. "That's

kind of what you want on the practice days. Obviously, business starts on Friday. But at the moment, the players are enjoying it and having a good time with it."

Europe has the experience of Lee Westwood and Sergio Garcia — 21 Ryder Cup appearances between them — and only three rookies. They all talk about inspiration from seeing European greats before them, in the room as players and assistant captains, or in photos on the wall. They talk about winning and nothing more.

The Americans are on home soil, and while recent dominance belongs to Europe, the home team has won six of the last seven.

Johnson is the most veteran member — and the oldest at 37 — of the U.S. team. His role hasn't changed in his view ("Win as many matches as I can," he said). The hope is that such a young team could signal a fresh start.

"The teams I've been on the past, I feel like we've had tons of experience and it hasn't worked out so well," Johnson said. "We've got some really talented players, young guys that maybe don't have all the memories of losing all these Ryder Cups. Maybe this is the recipe."

Annie offers advice

Dear Annie: I've been very happily married for several years to a man I love deeply. Suddenly, his son from a previous marriage, who lives in another state, wants Dad to move to his state to be close to him, as he and his wife are planning a family. His son and I have never been close.

My husband works for himself and has a major client — a very attractive woman, mind you, whom he talks to online several times a week — in his son's city.



DEAR ANNIE

After doing some “homework,” I discovered the state we would be moving to is not a community property state ... which our current state is. My husband has all the money in this marriage, as I left my career behind to tend to his business, home and family, and his son gets everything that I won't in the event of a death or divorce.

Being currently married, do I have any recourse, such as a post-marriage “prenup,” to make sure I'm OK financially if we move and my stepson and this businesswoman break us up? — **Worried in Wyoming**

Dear Worried: You say you are “very happily married” to a man you “love deeply.” Why would a female client or a son who wants his children to know their grandfather change that?

Based on your letter, it seems like your husband has honored the commitment he made to you on your wedding day. By assuming the worst, you may be causing yourself undue anxiety. The first thing you should do is communicate with your husband about where these fears are coming from — perhaps they are being triggered by anxiety about the move itself and the life changes that surround it.

If you are genuinely concerned about your assets in the event of a divorce, consult an attorney. I would not assume that “his son gets everything”; in fact, such an outcome is unlikely.

Dear Annie: My girlfriend and I met about two years ago. She has two younger kids, ages 3 and 6. I have older kids, 15 and 16. She's a “helicopter parent” who wants to micromanage everything her kids do. Well, when it comes to my kids, she wants to scrutinize everything they do, too. She says she doesn't agree with my parenting and basically calls me a crappy parent when I don't do things her way. She also thinks that it is a requirement for my kids to speak to her, even if they are busy or having a bad day. She will text my kids and say mean things to them and even drag their mom into it.

My kids don't do drugs. They don't lie. They are heavily involved in sports, on the honor roll and don't get in trouble. But my girlfriend has caused so many issues that my kids don't even want her around. I'm also a retired Army veteran with severe PTSD, and I rage when I'm mad. She wants to argue about who ate the last rice cake or took the last drink. It's one argument after another. What do I do? — **Confused From Indiana**

Dear Confused: It's time for you to set some boundaries with your girlfriend. Micro-managing is one thing; insulting your kids via text, offending their mother and starting arguments over rice cakes are quite another.

Assuming your relationship with her progresses, you will be one big family someday — all six of you. If you can't squash her argumentative and overbearing tendencies now — toward both you and your children — they will only get worse.

Talk to your girlfriend about what is appropriate and what isn't. Having a mediator or a couples counselor present will prevent your confrontation from escalating to a(nother) full-blown argument.

game-force, so East was in a defensive, not constructive, position.

At the first table, West led the club five, an obvious singleton. Declarer won in hand and cashed his two top trumps, revealing the 4-1 break. Now he turned to the diamond suit, and luckily he found West with three. What could West do on the fourth round of diamonds? Whether he ruffed low, ruffed high or discarded, South would lose only two tricks, either one spade and one heart or two spades. Plus 650.

At the other table, West led a heart to his partner's ace, and East, seeing no future in the minors, made the excellent play of returning a second heart. This conceded a ruff-and-sluff but put declarer in danger of losing trump control.

This defense should have made South suspicious of a bad spade break. He should have ruffed in hand and immediately led a low trump toward the jack. But he actually ruffed in hand and cashed his two top trumps. He was banking everything on a 3-2 spade split, but the actual 4-1 division defeated him. He had to lose one heart and two spades. Minus 100. The swing was 13 international match points.
