Citrus County COVID-19 cases

According to the Florida Department of Health, 10 new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update.

No new deaths were reported, for a total of 463. To date in the county, 11,411 people have tested positive (including 99 nonresidents).

One new hospitalization was reported, for a total of 742 hospitalized.

Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

County officials issue new burn ban

The Citrus County Board of County Commissioners issued a countywide burn ban on Wednesday, June 2, due to continuing drought-like conditions and the high potential for wildfires. This temporary burn ban will remain in effect until the drought-like conditions resolve. This burn ban includes open burning, campfires, bonfires, fireworks, burning of yard debris, refuse and other debris.

Outdoor burning is hereby banned except where the outdoor burning is being performed pursuant to an outdoor burning authorization issued by the Florida Forest Service.

Citrus wins big with budget

Gov. Ron De-Santis on Wednesday vetoed \$1.5 billion in projects and not one of them is in Citrus County.

DeSantis signed a state budget that includes \$14.4 million in local projects, plus funding for a third county judge position.

'We got everything. Absolutely everything," state Rep. Ralph Massullo, R-Lecanto,

projects is \$3.9 million for sewers to remove septic tanks from about

200 homes along the Homosassa River head spring just outside the state wildlife park. Senate Presi-

dent Wilton Simpson, R-Trilby, gave direct praise to Commissioner Ruthie Schlabach, who sought the Homosassa sewer funds before taking office.

"Our new commissioner made it a priority of hers," Simpson, who

DeSantis signs state budget, vetoes \$1.5B in spending

TALLAHASSEE — While pointing to an economic resurgence amid the coronavirus pandemic, Gov. Ron

DeSantis on Wednesday used

his line-item veto power to

slash \$1.5 billion as he signed

a record \$100 billion budget

Gov. Ron for the upcoming fiscal year. **DeSantis** DeSantis described the spending plan as reflecting "a state government that is meeting the core concerns of Floridians," during a bill-signing ceremony at The Garlic

restaurant in New Smyrna Beach.

"Once I sign this budget, we will be signing a budget that responsibly supports our men and women in

law enforcement, our K-through-12 education students and teachers, conserves and protects our great environmental and natural resources throughout the state of Florida, but does so in a way that has the lowest per-capita tax burden of any state in the country," DeSan-

tis said. "If you would have said that a year ago, no one would have believed that that would have been possible.'

Inverness to use road study to decide repairs

Until now, Inverness fixed its paved roads as the need arose.

There was not much of plan, admitted the city's new manager Eric Williams.

That changed this week when the Inverness council accepted a longawaited roadway construction assessment

that reviewed all of the 56 miles of the city's paved roads and determined their condition, need for repair, and estimated cost to do the work.

The assessment showed that, for the most part, the city's roads were acceptable.

"We have really stepped up the game," Williams told his council bosses before the assessment presentation.

cheap and gets costlier as the road's conditions worsens, the consultant's engineer, Chris Towne, told the council.

Roads rated at 1 will not likely need repairs for the next 10-15 years, Towne said. Roads rated at 2 will not likely need repairs for the next five to seven years. Roads rated at 3 will need a 1-inch asphalt overlay at a cost of about \$220,000 per mile for a two-lane road. Roads rated at 4 need a variety of repairs including overlays and resurfacing. The cost typically about \$360,000 per mile for a two-lane road.

Roads rated at 5 will need more extensive reclamation work and overhaul, usually at a cost of about \$510,000 per mile for a two-lane road.

The maps and assessment will also work to help the city to decide where to spend its road repair money and how to do it most efficiently, Williams said.

Commnity chips in for good cause

Barbecue among friends raises \$3k for teen with Tourette syndrome

On a recent Friday evening, a group of friends got together for a barbecue and among them raised more than \$3,000 for Jeremy Schreifels, the 18-year-old teen who hopes an experimental brain surgery will give him relief from a severe case of Tourette syndrome.

Stephen Quinn, who works for the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, had read about Jeremy on Facebook and got together with some friends with an impromptu idea for a fundraiser of their

"One guy said he'd cook and another said let's use his house," Quinn said. "We invited a bunch of friends, and friends of friends showed up and we had about 30 or 40 people.

He said an anonymous donor gave \$1,000 and his girlfriend's employer donated \$500. On the surgery only has a 40% suc-Monday, Quinn said he's still getting money from people.

"We know that the \$130,000 (goal) is for the surgery, but he's to \$60,000 more for after care or other therapies," he said. "The community really has come together on this.

The surgery, Deep Brain Stimulation (DBS), is to implant a device that sends electrical signals to areas of the brain that are responsible for body movement. Electrodes placed deep in the brain are connected to a stimulator device that's similar to a heart pacemaker; a neurostimulator uses electric pulses to regulate brain activity.

Jennifer Schreifels, Jeremy's mother, said although they don't have a date for the surgery, they're moving forward.

Currently, they're pursuing finding an intensive outpatient psychiatric therapy called Cognitive Behavioral Intervention for Tics (CBIT), which will focus on reducing Jeremy's anxiety prior to the surgery.

"If he can't reduce his anxiety, cess rate," Mrs. Schreifels said.

Five arrested for separate BUIs over holiday weekend alcohol coming from him, prompt-registration

State authorities jailed five men on accusations they were boating drunk in Citrus County waters over the Memorial Day weekend.

Officers of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC's) Division of Law Enforcement arrested Christopher Richard Smith, Jesse Daniel Strickland and Mike'll Lee Coleman on Saturday, May 29, for a first offense of boating under the influence.

 $FWC\ officers\ arrested\ Coleman$ John Blommel and Gaven Shane Westlotorn Sunday on a similar charge. Westlotorn also faces another charge of possessing alcohol under 21 years old.

Leibovitz's shot of a stylish but relatively casual Noovi, wearing a dark sweater and pants, will appear on the cover of Nooyi's memoir "My Life in Full," scheduled to come out Sept. 28.

Noovi is expected to write about her childhood in India, her experiences as an immigrant at Yale University's busi-

ness school and how she became the rare woman and person of color to reach the highest levels of corporate power.

She worked at PepsiCo for 24 years, 12 of them as CEO, before stepping down in 2018.

"It is not so much that Indra is a CEO but it is who she is," Leibovitz said in a statement Wednesday. "I have always been interested in what someone does. Indra has paved the way for so many women in business. As a mother, I would like my three daughters to read her memoir."

David Diop wins International Booker Prize with WWI story


LONDON — A harrowing but poetic tale of comradeship, colonialism and the horrors of war won the International Booker Prize for fiction on Wednesday.

"At Night All Blood is Black" by French writer David Diop beat five other finalists to take the 50,000-pound (\$70,000) prize, which is open to fiction in any language that has been translated into English. The prize money will be split between the author and his translator, **Anna Moschovakis**.

The novel is narrated by Alfa Ndiaye, a Senegalese soldier fighting for the then-imperial power France during World War I, and charts his descent into madness on the battlefield.

British author Lucy Hughes-Hallett, who chaired the judging panel, said the "hypnotically compelling" book was both "appalling" and poetic, "entering the reader's consciousness at a level that bypasses rationality and transcends the sub-

away from it changed," she said.

Diop's novel was chosen by majority decision of the five judges over contenders including Jewish-Russian family history "In Memory of Memory" by Russian writer Maria Stepanova and imaginative short-story collection "The Dangers of Smoking in Bed" by Argentina's Mariana Enriquez.

Born in France and raised in Senegal, Diop teaches 18th-century literature at the University of Pau in southern France.

He is the first French author to win the prize, a counterpart to the prestigious Booker Prize for English-language fiction.

Diop's novel, which was published in French in 2018, resonates with present-day debates about racism and colonialism.

Hughes-Hallett said the book didn't win "because if speaks to the current conversation about racial politics," but because "it spoke to us with the most power." - From wire reports





More charges likely for man in child porn case

A local man facing a lifetime in prison for his alleged trove of child pornography could be pitted against additional charges after authorities discovered a couple thousand more illegal images.

Assistant State Attorney Blake Shore told Citrus County Circuit Court Judge Richard "Ric" Howard on Wednesday, June 2, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement identified roughly 2,000 possible files on two computers seized from Patrick James Crocker's Floral City home.

Shore said he's expecting a more detailed report to be released next week, adding he could tack on more charges against Crocker, depending on what's found.

Sarajane Olsen, Crocker's lawyer, told the judge she's waiting for a psychologist to evaluate her client, and is planning to depose the FDLE employee who analyzed Crocker's computers.

Howard scheduled July 28 as Crocker's next hearing date.

After his arrest in November, 36-year-old Crocker was charged with 16 counts of possessing 10 or more images of child pornography. If convicted as charged, Crocker could be sentenced to up to 240 years behind bars.

An undercover FDLE operation working to identify internet users sharing child pornography connected Crocker's IP address from his house to downloads from a digital source of illicit images.

During an initial search of one of Crocker's computer and hard drives, authorities found more than 200 files and titles relating to child pornography, depicting children between 6 and 12 years old.

Wear orange June 4 to raise awareness

In 2013, 15-year-old Hadiya Pendleton was shot and killed in Chicago. After her death, her friends wore orange to raise awareness about gun violence in their community. Then, Hadiya's friends asked all of us to wear orange to honor Hadiya and the hundreds of Americans killed and injured by gun violence every day. They inspired Wear Orange, which now includes a broad coalition of nonprofits, cultural influencers and elected officials working to reduce gun violence in America.

Orange has become the defining color of the gun violence prevention movement – and on June 4 we'll wear orange to draw our nation's attention to gun violence.

Every year, more than 3,000 children and teens are shot and killed in the United States, and another 15,000 are shot and wounded — an average of nine children and teens shot and killed and 42 shot and wounded every day.

Gun suicide claims the lives of over 23,000 people in the U.S. each year. Having access to a firearm triples one's risk of death by suicide. Two thirds of all gun deaths in the U.S. are suicides.

Every month an average of 57 women are shot and killed by an intimate partner. Access to a firearm makes it five times more likely that the abusive partner will kill his female partner.

Fifty-eight percent of American adults or someone they care for have experienced gun violence in their lifetime. Approximately three million American children witness gun violence every year.

Consider the shelter in overall budget

The initial plan to build a new animal shelter was to finance \$8-9 million dollars, not including the nice extras; voted on without conducting any cost/ benefit analysis. At the last meeting, the commissioners finally agreed to take the proceeds from the sale of excess land to pay down this debt.

Lake County's newly built animal shelter, a 25,000-squarefoot facility, paid for by the county's penny tax, can house 100-plus cats, 165-plus dogs, exotic animals such as pythons, and also pigs, horses, sheep, etc. The price was \$7.8 million. The facility includes a barn that was built with donations. Lake County's estimated 2021 population is 387,914 according to the U.S. census. By comparison, Citrus County's estimated population is 153,607 and it has a much lower growth rate, according to the same source. Lake County's population is 2.5

times greater than Citrus County's population.

By this comparison alone, Citrus County does not need a 25,000-square-foot animal shelter. Construction costs have increased but. I think the proposed price tag can be reduced substantially and paid for without incurring any debt.


If folks want to donate to expedite construction, that's fine, but it's the Board of County Commissioner's responsibility to cover the cost, only if it is warranted and, only if there aren't any other critical projects that need to be taken care of first.

There is nothing measurable regarding size, cost, capacity, etc. The only fixed variables are the price tag, that some or all of the cost may be financed and, that some commissioners do not care how the price tag will impact taxpayers. The blind is leading the blind and it's being determined helter-skelter.

We have limited revenue which will increase this year because of new construction. But, equally true, is that there are upcoming expenses. The courthouse has to be retrofitted, which can cost \$2 million; emergency reserves need to be built-up in case of a natural disaster. We need money for roads and Nature Coast EMS needs a subsidy increase. A constitutional officer wants a budget increase of \$200,000. Some want dog parks, swimming pool maintenance, child care grants, business funding, plus our local government wants to be all things to all people.

There comes a time when you have to factor in how these projects are going to be funded but, the conversation seems to be silent on this

the gas stations and seek a new grocery store like Aldi's.



Netanyahu opponents reach coalition deal to oust Israeli PM

JERUSALEM — Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's opponents announced Wednesday that they have reached a deal to form a new governing coalition, paving the way for the ouster of the longtime Israeli leader.

The dramatic announcement by opposition leader Yair Lapid and his main coalition partner, Naftali Bennett, came shortly before a midnight deadline and prevented what could have been Israel's fifth consecutive election in just over two years.

"This government will work for all the citizens of Israel, those that voted for it and those that didn't. It will do everything to unite Israeli society," Lapid said.

The agreement still needs to be approved by the Knesset, or parliament, in a vote that is expected to take place early next week. If it goes through, Lapid and a diverse array of partners that span the Israeli political spectrum will end Netanyahu's record-setting but divisive 12-year rule.

Netanyahu, desperate to remain in office while he fights corruption charges, is expected to do everything possible in the coming days to prevent the new coalition from taking power. If he fails, he will be pushed into the opposition.

Under the agreement, Lapid and Bennett will split the job of prime minister in a rotation. Bennett, a former ally of Netanyahu, is to serve the first two years, while Lapid is to serve the final two years — though it is far from certain their fragile coalition will last that long.

Stocks manage modest gains overall; AMC nearly doubles

Wall Street wrapped up another wobbly day of trading Wednesday with modest gains for the major stock indexes, as energy and technology companies kept losses elsewhere in the market in check.

The benchmark S&P 500 rose 0.1% after wobbling between a gain of 0.4% and a loss of 0.1%. Strength in technology, energy and real estate stocks offset a pullback in retailers and other companies that rely on consumer spending. Communication, industrial and materials stocks also fell. Treasury yields mostly eased after rising a day earlier.

Movie theater operator AMC Entertainment nearly doubled in another bout of heavy trading as the company embraced its status as a "meme" stock being driven higher by hordes of individual investors. Other stocks like GameStop that have been championed on online message boards and social media also rose.

The market's modest moves for the second straight day come as investors look ahead to Friday's U.S. jobs report, which the market hopes will lead to fresh clues about the

Federal Reserve's next interest rate policy moves later this month, when the central bank holds its next meeting of policymakers.

The S&P 500 rose 6.08 points to 4,208.12. The index is coming off its fourth straight monthly increase. The Dow Jones Industrial Average gained 25.07 points, or 0.1%, to 34.600.38. The Nasdag recovered from an early slide, adding 19.85 points, or 0.1%, to 13,756.33.

NASA picks Venus as hot spot for two new robotic missions

CAPE CANAVERAL — NASA is returning to sizzling Venus, our closest yet perhaps most overlooked neighbor, after decades of exploring other worlds.

The space agency's new administrator, Bill Nelson, announced two new robotic missions to the solar system's hottest planet, during his first major address to employees Wednesday.

"These two sister missions both aim to understand how Venus became an inferno-like world capable of melting lead at the surface," Nelson said.

One mission named Da-Vinci Plus will analyze the thick, cloudy Venusian atmosphere in an attempt to determine whether the inferno planet ever had an ocean and was possibly habitable. A small craft will plunge through the atmosphere to measure the gases.

It will be the first U.S.-led mission to the Venusian atmosphere since 1978.

The other mission, called Veritas, will seek a geologic history by mapping the rocky planet's surface.

Iran's largest warship catches fire, sinks in Gulf of Oman

TEHRAN, Iran — The largest warship in the Iranian navy caught fire and later sank Wednesday in the Gulf of Oman under unclear circumstances, the latest calamity to strike one of the country's vessels in recent years amid tensions with the West.

The blaze began around 2:25 a.m. and firefighters tried to contain it, the Fars news agency reported, but their efforts failed to save the 679-foot Kharg, which was used to resupply other ships in the fleet at sea and conduct training exercises. State media reported 400 sailors and trainee cadets on board fled the vessel, with 33 suffering injuries.

The ship sank near the Iranian port of Jask, some 790 miles southeast of Tehran on the Gulf of Oman near the Strait of Hormuz the narrow mouth of the Persian Gulf. Satellite photos from Planet Labs Inc. analyzed by The Associated Press showed the Kharg off Jask with no sign of a fire as late as 11 a.m. Tuesday.

Photos circulated on Iranian social media of sailors wearing life jackets evacuating the vessel as a fire burned behind them.

In a statement late Wednesday, the FBI attributed the attack on Brazil-based meat processor JBS SA to REvil, a Russian-speaking gang that has made some of the largest ransomware demands on record in recent months. The FBI said it will work to bring the group to justice and it urged anyone who is the victim of a cyberattack to contact the bureau immediately.

Prosecutors want 30 years for Chauvin

MINNEAPOLIS — Prosecutors are seeking a 30-year sentence for the former Minneapolis police officer convicted of murder in George Floyd's death, but a defense attorney is asking that Derek Chauvin be sentenced to probation and time already served, according to court documents filed Wednesday.

Chauvin is scheduled to be sentenced June 25 following his conviction on charges. Judge Peter Catop out at 15 years.

Prosecutors said Chauvin's actions were egregious and a sentence of 30 years would "properly account for the profound impact of Defendant's conduct on the victim, the victim's family, and the community." They said that Chauvin's actions "shocked the Nation's conscience."

U.S. players have a good day at Roland Garros

PARIS — Her superior serve back at its unreturnable best, Serena Williams was in full control of her French Open match — until, suddenly, that stroke wasn't as dominant and neither was she.

And then, pushed to a third set by an opponent offering up all sorts of spins and speeds and angles, Williams regained her form and forged to the finish.

Williams got back to the third round at Roland Garros, where she has won three of her 23 Grand Slam singles titles, by

pulling away to beat 174th-ranked Mihaela Buzarnescu 6-3, 5-7, 6-1 Wednesday on Court Philippe Chatrier.

Her serving, especially at the outset, was much better than in her first-round win. In that one Monday, she only put 51% of first serves in play and got broken three times in 10 games.

"I've been practicing my serve a lot. I've been playing, in practice, unbelievable on my serve. The other night was, 'Wooooow,' she said, rolling her eyes. "I'm glad it came better today. My coach told me it's good that I'm doing it well in practice, because eventually it will be good in the match."

It sure was, especially at the outset against Buzarnescu, who didn't manage to put any serves in play in the first game.

By the end of the first set, Williams had won 20 of 23 points

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Bob Baffert is on track to have his record seventh Kentucky Derby victory taken away and won't be able to run any horses in the prestigious race for the next two years.

Churchill Downs on Wednesday suspended the Hall of Fame trainer for two years after an additional drug test of Medina Spirit confirmed the presence of the steroid betamethasone in the Kentucky Derby winner's system. The next step could be the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission disqualifying Medina Spirit, and now Baffert won't be able to enter any horses in the Derby or other races at the storied track through the spring of

"Reckless practices and substance violations that jeopardize the safety of our equine and human athletes or compromise the integrity of our sport are not acceptable and as a company we must take measures to demonstrate that they will not be tolerated," Churchill Downs Inc. CEO Bill Carstanjen said in a statement. "Mr. Baffert's record of testing failures threatens public confidence in thoroughbred racing and the reputation of the Kentucky Derby. THIS DATE IN BASEBALL

Red Sox pitched his second no-hitter, blanking the Detroit Tigers 5-0.

1932 -- Lou Gehrig became the first American League player to hit four home runs in a game, helping the New York Yankees beat the Philadelphia A's 20-13. The event was overshadowed by the resignation of John McGraw as manager of the New York Giants.

1954 -- Henry Thompson of the New York Giants hit three home runs and drove in eight runs in a 13-8 win against the St. Louis Cardinals. Willie Mays drove in the other five runs with two homers.

1971 -- Ken Holtzman of the Chicago Cubs pitched his second no-hitter, beating the Cincinnati Reds 1-0.

1978 -- Dave Johnson became the first major leaguer to hit two pinch-hit grand slams in a season. His grand slam in the ninth inning gave the Philadelphia Phillies a 5-1 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers.

1989 -- Los Angeles and Houston played 22 innings at the Astrodome in the longest night game in National League history — 7 hours and 14 minutes. The Astros won the game on Rafael Ramirez's RBI single off Jeff Hamilton, normally the Dodgers' third baseman. When the game ended,

1918 -- Dutch Leonard of the Boston Fernando Valenzuela was playing first and Eddie Murray was at third.

1989 -- Nolan Ryan pitched his 11th career one-hitter and struck out 11 as Texas beat Seattle 6-1. It was Ryan's 16th low-hit game (no-hitter or onehitter), breaking Bob Feller's record of 15.

1995 -- Pedro Martinez of Montreal pitched nine perfect innings against San Diego before giving up a leadoff double to Bip Roberts in the 10th inning of the Expos 1-0 win.

2003 -- Sammy Sosa was ejected in the first inning of Chicago's 3-2 win over the Tampa Bay Devil Rays after umpires found cork in his shattered bat.

2006 -- Damion Easley hit three homers and had seven RBIs in Arizona's 13-9 victory over Atlanta.

2008 -- Randy Johnson took sole possession of second place on baseball's career strikeout list after getting the Milwaukee Brewers' Mike Cameron to go down swinging in the first inning. It was Johnson's 4,673rd career strikeout, breaking a tie with Roger Clemens and leaving the Arizona Diamondbacks' veteran ace behind only Nolan Ryan, who had 5,714 strikeouts in his career.

prevented him from entering any horses in the Belmont Stakes.

The stunning ban by Churchill Downs could have a domino effect that takes off the trail completely the only trainer to win the Triple Crown since 1978.

A Maryland Jockey Club spokesman did not expect to make any kind of formal announcement Wednesday. New York Racing Association spokesman Patrick McKenna said its suspension remains in effect and that the NYRA "will make a determination regarding the length and terms of Mr. Baffert's suspension at the appropriate time and based on information generated by the ongoing investigation in Kentucky."



In today's deal, South was in four spades. West had led the club queen and continued the suit two more times when declarer correctly played low from the board. How did South continue?

Declarer noted that he would have to lose a heart trick to go with the two clubs already conceded. So he needed East to hold the diamond king. Also, if East had at least three diamonds, South would need to take two diamond finesses, which would require two dummy entries. Where were they?

Declarer saw that he could get to the board twice in trumps, with the king and the five, but only if he was careful with the spade four.

At trick three, South ruffed with his spade 10. He cashed the spade ace and overtook with dummy's queen, happy to see the 2-2 split. (If trumps had been 3-1, declarer would have needed East to have exactly king-third of diamonds.) South played a diamond to his queen, overtook the carefully conserved spade four with dummy's five, repeated the diamond finesse. cashed the diamond ace and ruffed his last diamond on the board. Declarer took five spades, one heart, three diamonds and the diamond ruff.

visible. I often feel symptoms of imposter syndrome due to this, and I deny myself help. I have abandoned trying to find medicines that could help me because my body has proven to be resistant to many pain medications. I do not use my cane, and I surely won't use the assistance of a wheelchair, should I need it.

Years of ridicule have left me exhausted, and I feel aged beyond my years. The public eye is far too judgmental for me to feel comfortable using the aids that I sometimes so desperately need, and this has led me to be a shut-in. I want to live my life freely, but I am too afraid of repercussions from appearing as a healthy young person "imitating the disabled." For all of those battling the illnesses beyond visibility, how do we feel free to own our lives? — *Invisibly Ill*

Dear Invisibly Ill: In pain, afraid to live freely, ashamed to reach out for help how incredibly isolated you must feel. But you're not alone. In fact, I'm sure someone reading this has been nodding their head all the way through, recognizing their own story in your letter. Millions of Americans live with invisible or "nonapparent" disabilities, and I think you'd find great relief in talking with some of them. The Invisible Disabilities Association hosts an online support community at https://www.inspire.com/ groups/invisible-disabilitiesassociation.

Another resource is the Invisible Disability Project, whose website is https://www. invisibledisabilityproject.org. You may not be able to reduce the physical hardships of your disability, but you can at least lighten the emotional burden.


Dear Antonia: I'm glad you brought this up. There were so many outrageous parts of that letter that I didn't have time to get to them all!







How to Avoid a Fake Check Scam

- INSIST ON CASH
- Don't accept a check for more than the selling price. You can bet it's a scam.
- Inform the Buyer that you'll wait two weeks before sending any merchandise.
- Never use money from a check to send gift cards, money orders, or wire money to strangers or someone you just met. Many scammers demand that you send money through money transfer services like Western Union or MoneyGram, or buy gift cards and send them the PIN numbers. Once you wire money, or give someone the gift card PINs, it is like giving someone cash. It's almost impossible to get it back.
- Toss offers that ask you to pay for a prize. If it's free, you shouldn't have to pay to get it.


