Citrus County COVID-19 cases

According to the Florida Department of Health, 21 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update.

One new death was reported, for a total of 434.

To date in the county, 10,718 people have tested positive (including 95 non-residents).

No new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 691 hospitalized.

Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

West Gate Plaza to close

Mama's Kuntry Kafe, two other stores, forced to move

Lisa and Dale White, owner of Mama's Kuntry Kafe in Inverness, survived the early days of the COVID-19 scare.

But there's one thing they couldn't live through: a termination of property notice.

The Whites, along with the two other tenants of West Gate Plaza, just east of Pleasant Grove Road, said they got notices last week in the mail signed by the landlord — Lee Radeker Jr. — that said they had until April 30 to move out.

"It was a shock to say the least," Lisa White said.

The Chronicle obtained a

document with the letterhead of an Orlando law firm postmarked April 12, which includes a letter, signed by Radeker, which states: "We write to inform you that the leased premises is under contract for sale. Accordingly, we write to provide you notice of termination of the lease."

The letter goes on to notify the tenants to remove all their personal property from the premises by April 30.

Radeker is listed as the plaza's property owner, according to the Citrus County Property Appraiser's Office.

When reached by phone Radeker declined to comment.

Lisa White, talking with the brisk breakfast crowd Monday,

took time to talk with a Chronicle reporter about the surprise turn-of-events. She had just finished remodeling the restaurant.

While obviously unhappy with the unexpected development, White said she is putting the best face on it and calls it a blessing in disguise.

She and her husband were able, on short notice, to secure a lease at a storefront in downtown Inverness, at 104 U.S. 41 — site of the old Townhouse restaurant. It's bigger and it's at a great location, she said.

Storms bring 2 inches of rain

From Saturday through Monday, Citrus County received 2 inches of rain, said Mark Fulkerson, chief professional

engineer with the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD).

That brings the total for April to 5 inches.

The annual average for April in Citrus County is only 2.7 inches.

"So far, Citrus County has received nearly twice as much rainfall as the monthly average for April," Fulkerson said.

Not bad for April which, along with November, is the driest month of the year.

All this precipitation should be out of here by Wednesday and residents should again see the sun shining.

The National Weather Service (NWS) is forecasting an additional half-to three-quarters-of-an-inch of rain Tuesday.

The culprit behind all this

rain is a series of low-pressure waves developing along a slow-moving front, the NWS said.

About 5 inches of rain is forecast across the entire central Florida region through Tuesday.

By Wednesday morning, the rain should slowly be edging into southern Florida, according to the NWS.

FDOH: 25% of Citrus residents fully vaccinated

Positivity rate climbs

Citrus County's rate of positive COVID-19 tests increased roughly 3% over the week as a quarter of its state residents became fully vaccinated against the disease.

According to the Florida Department of Health (FDOH) on Monday, April 19, the county's 7-day average positivity rate of new novel coronavirus cases for its Florida residents was at 8.34% — up from the average 5.35% reported April 12.

Health officials want to keep positivity

rates — the number of positive results out of total test results — below 10%.

COVID-19 data from the FDOH is subject to change as epidemiological investigations reveal new information on cases.

On Monday, the FDOH documented a total 10,718 COVID-19 cases for Citrus County, an increase of 178 infections since April 12, at an average 25 transmissions a day.

Also, over the week, six more locals were admitted to hospitals for COVID-19, raising the county's total number of hospitalizations to 691, according to the FDOH. Another person also died from COVID-19 since April 12, bringing the local death count to 434.

Gov. DeSantis signs Florida's anti-riot bill

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's top Republicans cited events in cities around the country — but not the Jan. 6 riots in Washington — as Gov. Ron DeSantis signed a bill Monday to create tougher penalties for people who participate in violent protests.

The so-called anti-riot bill was a response to protests around the country because of police violence against African-Americans. After the Jan. 6 insurrection at the U.S. Capitol by supporters of then-President Donald Trump, Republicans pushing the legislation used it as an example to support the effort.

"I think it's a positive change," White said. White said plans are still fluid but it is likely her existing restaurant will close April 25. She hopes to be in the downtown Inverness site by April 30. A few steps away from the restaurant, Leslie Covino and Beckie Greenwood have been co-owners of The Little Flower Shop there since 1999. "It's heartbreaking," Covino said. She and Greenwood will miss out on the lucrative Mother's Day season, the biggest holiday for flower-giving. Fortunately, the owners found a new home at 3816 State Road 44, in the Times Square Shopping Center about 1.5 miles west of their current shop. They said they are not happy about it and are not looking forward to the move but are hopeful their established customers follow them to the new store. Victoria Parr, owner of Vapor This Florida — the third tenant at the plaza — said she is angry "because it's costing me money" to move and refurbish a new place. Plus, she said she will lose business from

being closed while moving. Parr said she is in the process of securing a storefront at the Inverness Regional Shopping Center, off U.S. 41 by Planet Fitness. Parr said she got the termination letter April 13. "I think what you're seeing are the results of a free market economy," Inverness City Manager Eric

Williams said. "These people are selling their property and redeveloping it." Inverness, he said, has some valuable parcels. Earlier this month, a developer filed a site plan with the city of Inverness to build a new Chili's restaurant and a Capital City Bank on the property of the old, vacated Regions Bank site by State Road 44 and U.S. 41.

Inverness to review projects

State wastewater agreement, road, and park facility on agenda for city

The Inverness City Council on Tuesday, April 20, will vote whether to approve an agreement with state officials over a \$2.4 million project to change from commercial septic systems along State Road 44 to municipal sewer services.

The city's portion of the cost will be \$472,000 under the proposed deal the council will consider during their regularly scheduled April 20 meeting. The public is invited to attend. City Hall is a 212 W. Main St., Inverness.

In November 2020, the council hired North Carolina-based Kimley-Horn & Associates to oversee the 7,200-foot-long wastewater project along the west side of State Road 44.

The project will run from the Outback restaurant to Nick Nicholas Ford.

The city council paid the consultants \$191,500 to design and oversee the project. The state grant allows business to abandon their existing septic tanks and hook up to city sewer services. The wastewater project is also meant to attract future development along the highway leading into the city.

City Manager Eric Williams said once the council approves the agreement, money from the grant can be released and "from this point the design can proceed."

In other action, the council will:

■ Consider putting out to bid engineering work to do design and architectural work and oversee all the administrative oversight of a project for a new maintenance building at the popular Whispering Pines Park.

Williams described the current maintenance building as "beyond dilapidated" and said the building was "falling to pieces."

He said the structure was built in the late 1970s when the park

was constructed and has been added to and changed piecemeal.

■ Discuss whether to bid out work to reclaim Colonnade Street and add traffic control devices and build a sidewalk from the newly built affordable apartment complex to State Road 44.

The developer, for their part, built a sidewalk from the apartments to Whispering Pines park.

Williams said the project is not just development improvement in the area, but also it helps with pedestrian safety and connectivity and calms vehicle traffic.

The Green Mills' Colonnade Park apartments on Colonnade Street includes 106 units, pool, gym and community center.

■ Consider asking Citrus Fusion Volleyball to organize the city's volleyball program and tournaments at Wallace Brooks Park.

Feds to probe Pasco school policing plan

NEW PORT RICHEY — The U.S. Department of Education has opened an investigation into whether a Florida school district broke federal law when it shared private information about students with the local sheriff's office.

The Pasco County School District shared information on student grades, discipline and attendance with the Pasco County Sheriff's Office, the Tampa Bay Times reported. The agency then used the data to compile a list of students officials believed could "fall into a life of crime," the newspaper reported.

The agency is already facing a federal lawsuit that the intelligence-based policing program violates people's rights by improperly targeting and harassing them. Sheriff Chris Nocco rejects the claims

in the lawsuit filed last month in Tampa.

U.S. Rep. Robert C. Scott, who leads the House Committee on Education and Labor, called for a review of the program by the Department of Education. He said in a statement that he's "encouraged" the agency is looking into the program, which he called "disturbing."

Scott, a Democrat from Virginia, said evidence shows schools suspend or expel Black and Latino students more frequently than their white peers for

similar offenses. "Therefore, any law enforcement system that uses school discipline data to identify children as potential criminals would not only be illegal, but also racially biased."

The sheriff's office, in a statement, maintained that it takes a list of some 20,000 students flagged by the school district as being "at risk" and narrows it "to approximately 330 students who are considered 'at-risk' by the school district AND have had law enforcement-related

interactions with the Pasco Sheriff's Office."

In a statement, the school district said it looks forward to answering any questions the federal agency might have, adding that it has "safeguards for the proper use of student information" in its agreement with the sheriff's office.

"Their knowledge of our agreements with the Sheriff's Office appears to be based on recent news stories, which do not provide a full picture," the school district's statement said.

Sheriff's officials have also maintained that the program does not label students as potential criminals. Students are only added to the list if they have committed a crime, the statement said. Also, sheriff's employees can only see whether a student has been flagged by the district's early warning system — not whether they had been flagged for a specific reason, such as grades or attendance.

The sheriff's office said school employees are involved in selecting which students are added to the list.

The program has drawn criticism from some parents and teachers.

A Department of Education statement said it would offer no comments until the investigation has been completed.

Pasco County is just north of Clearwater, along the Gulf of Mexico coast.

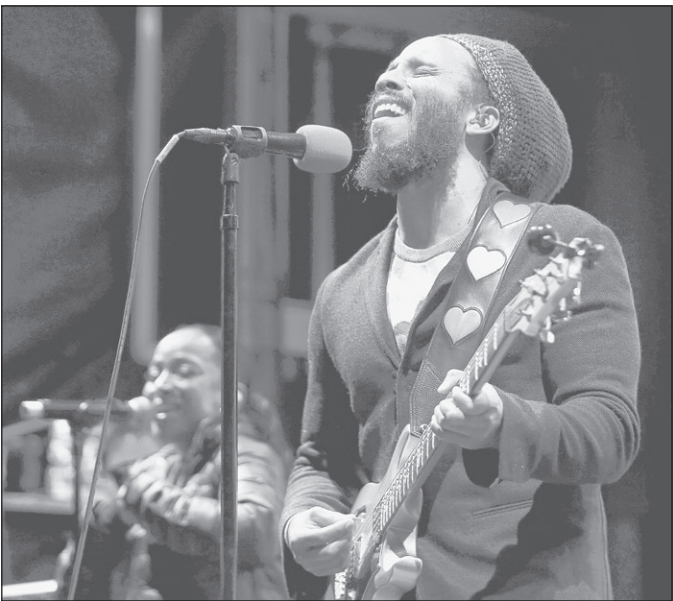

Police: Stalker
arrested at Taylor
Swift's apartment

NEW YORK — A stalker who claims pop star **Taylor Swift** is communicating with him on social media was arrested on a trespassing charge after trying to break into the singer's Manhattan apartment, police said Monday.

Hanks Johnson, 52, was arrested at 8:30 p.m. Saturday after a 911 caller reported he was inside Swift's Tribeca building without permission, a police spokesperson said.

According to the criminal complaint against him, Johnson told police, "She knows that I'm coming here, we're friends."

A security employee of Swift's told police that Johnson had rung the doorbell and tried to

enter the building at least five times over the past six months, the complaint states. The security guard said he had personally told Johnson he was not welcome there.

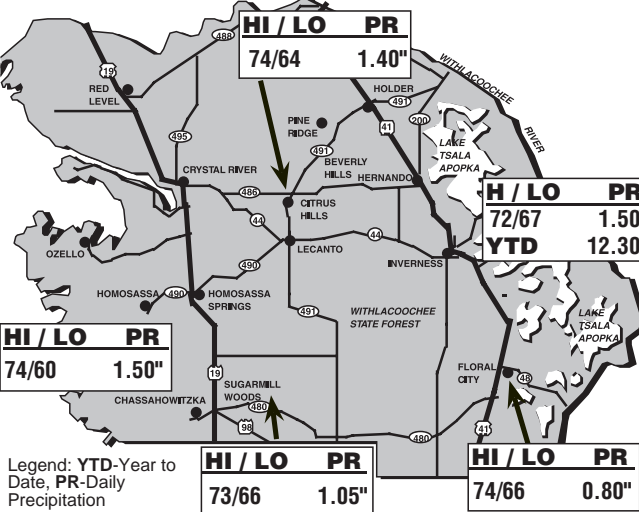
Johnson was charged with criminal trespass and released on his own recognizance after an arraignment Sunday night. It wasn't clear if he had an attorney who could comment.

The Daily News reports that outside the courthouse, Johnson made a show of sending direct messages to Swift's Instagram account and claimed the predictive text suggestions on his phone were replies from her.

He also showed off a restraining order barring him from contacting models **Bella Hadid**, who are friends of Swift's, the newspaper said.

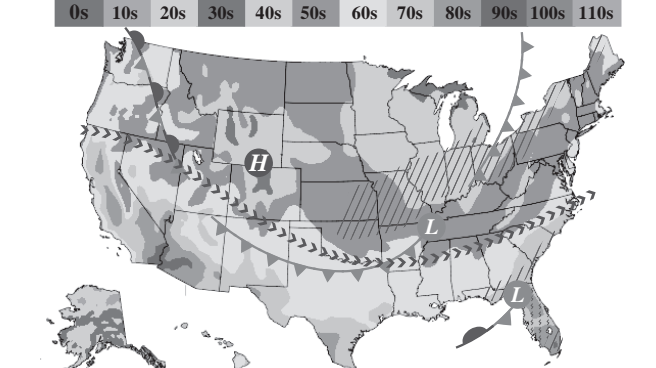

Today is Tuesday, April 20, the 110th day of 2021. There are 255 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight:
On April 20, 1999, the Columbine High School massacre took place in Colorado as two students shot and killed 12 classmates and one teacher before taking their own lives.

On this date:
In 1812, the fourth vice president of the United States, George Clinton, died in Washington at age 72, becoming the first vice president to die while in office.

In 1971, the Supreme Court unanimously upheld the use of busing to achieve racial desegregation in schools.

In 1972, Apollo 16's lunar module, carrying astronauts John W. Young and Charles M. Duke Jr., landed on the moon.

In 2010, an explosion on the Deepwater Horizon oil platform, leased by BP, killed 11 workers and caused a blow-out that began spewing an estimated 200 million gallons of crude into the Gulf of Mexico. (The well was finally capped nearly three months later.)

Ten years ago: Two Western photojournalists, including Oscar-nominated film director Tim Hetherington, were killed in the besieged Libyan city of Misrata while covering battles between rebels and government forces.

Five years ago: Five former New Orleans police officers pleaded guilty to lesser charges in the deadly shootings on a bridge in the days following Hurricane Katrina in 2005.

One year ago: The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said reports of accidental poisonings from cleaners and disinfectants were up about 20% in the first three months of the year; researchers believed it was related to the coronavirus epidemic.

Today's Birthdays: Former Sen. Pat Roberts, R-Kan., is 85. Actor George Takei is 84. Actor Carmen Electra is 49.

COVID-19 ‘passport’ ban added to emergency bill

TALLAHASSEE — A House committee Monday approved a proposal that would limit local emergency orders and make permanent Gov. Ron DeSantis’ executive order barring COVID-19 “passports” that would show people have been vaccinated.

The Health & Human Services Committee voted 14-8 to support a revised proposal (HB 7047) intended to “minimize the negative effects of extended emergencies.”

The most prominent change Monday was adding rules that would prevent government agencies from issuing COVID-19 passports and bar Florida businesses from requiring customers to show documentation that they have been vaccinated or have recovered from COVID-19.

Bill sponsor Tom Leek, R-Ormond Beach, called a passport system government overreach.

“If you accept, as I do, the media reports that our minority communities have the greatest degree of vaccination hesitancy, and if you accept that the minority communities are getting vaccinated in a much lesser degree than the majority population, then to do this and to allow that type of proof of vaccination has a disparate impact on those communities,” Leek said.

Under the proposal, businesses, government agencies and educational institutions requiring people to show proof of vaccination for entry or service could be fined up to \$5,000 by the Department of Health.

Leek said each passenger would count as a separate incident if a cruise ship required passengers

to show proof of vaccination.

Delta Air Lines CEO Ed Bastian on Friday told NBC News the company anticipates requiring proof of vaccination on international flights, while several major cruise lines, including Royal Caribbean, have announced plans for fully vaccinated journeys once they are allowed to again operate.

Rep. Nicholas Duran, a Miami Democrat who voted against the bill, called it “ironic” that the House allows members to sidestep weekly COVID-19 tests at the Capitol once they have been vaccinated.

“It’s hard for me to grasp this concept being proposed by the House that goes against what we’re already doing in the House,” Duran said.

Duran also questioned the potential ban on requiring students to show proof of COVID-19 vaccination at schools, when they must meet several immunization requirements for things such as polio, chickenpox and measles.

“Yes, maybe 20 percent of the total deaths in the state of Florida are folks who are under 64,” Duran said. “But still, there’s a lot of folks within all of those ranges who are going to be exposed. So, the idea that we’re kind of just discounting it to me is a little disingenuous.”

DeSantis on April 2 issued the executive order blocking COVID-19 passports, which he said would create “huge” privacy issues that could result in people handing over medical information to a “big corporation.”

“It’s completely unacceptable for either the government or the private sector to impose upon you the requirement that you show proof of vaccine to just simply be able to

participate in normal society,” DeSantis said before signing the order. “If you want to go to the movie theater, should you have to show that? No. If you want to go to a game, no. If you want to go to a theme park, no. ... I think it’s something that people have certain freedoms and individual liberties to make decisions for themselves.”

A House staff analysis of the proposal noted that countries historically have required evidence of vaccination for international travel.

Some states and countries have moved forward with COVID-19 vaccination documentation plans. Israel, for example, has a “green pass” that exempts people who are vaccinated from quarantining after contact with infected people or after travel and access to sports and cultural events.

In addition to barring COVID-19 passports, the House bill would require local emergency orders to be narrowly tailored to reduce “infringement on individual liberty” and to be extended in seven-day increments for a total duration of 42 days. Currently, such orders can be issued initially for seven days and extended indefinitely in seven-day increments.

Among other aspects of the bill, the state surgeon general would be required to develop a public health emergency plan and the Division of Emergency Management would have to stockpile personal protective equipment.

The bill also would let the governor, lieutenant governor, emergency management director, surgeon general, Senate president and House speaker conduct public-service announcements during declared states of emergency.

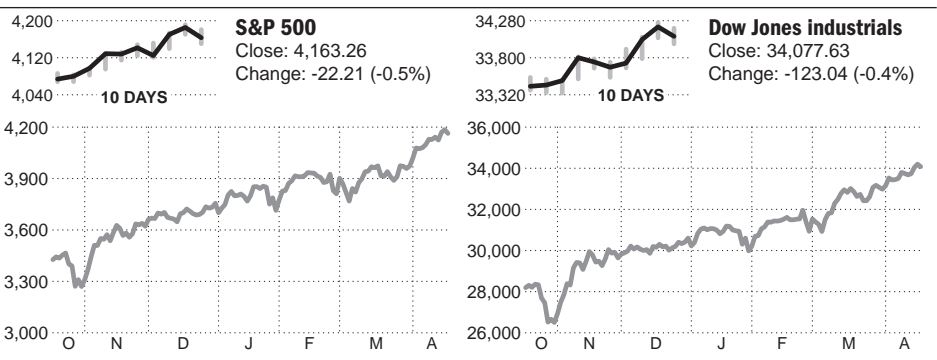

Company Spotlight

Treadmill dread

Peloton tumbled after safety regulators warned people with kids and pets over the weekend to immediately stop using one of its treadmills after a child died and others were injured. The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission said children and at least one pet were pulled, pinned and entrapped under the rear roller of the Tread+ treadmill, leading to fractures,



scrapes and the death of one child. New York-based Peloton, best known for its stationary bikes, said in a news release that the warning from the safety commission was "inaccurate and misleading." It said there's no reason to stop using the treadmill as long as children and pets are kept away from it at all times, it is turned off when not in use, and a safety key is removed. New boat ramp on the horizon

Discussion of building a boat ramp near the mouth of the never-finished Cross Florida Barge Canal in north Citrus County goes back for years, and it now looks as if this idea will become a reality.

While there has been general agreement that the county needs additional access to the Gulf, there has not been the same agreement on where the ramp should be located.

Four years ago, in the summer of 2017 there was discussion of using funds from the BP Deep Horizon settlement to build the ramp, but there was difference within the county commission on building the ramp along the barge canal. At the time, Citrus County businessman Dixie Hollins said a ramp on the barge canal had been discussed for at least the past 12 years.

The issue at the time was whether a ramp located 10 miles north of Crystal River would attract more out of county than county boaters and there was discussion about taking that project out of the county's list of priorities for the BP settlement money. However, in an August 2017 meeting, the proposal to build the ramp on the barge canal survived a 3-2 commission vote.

Less than a year later, in May 2018, commissioners made building the boat ramp

a top project on which to spend some of the money, and the commission has now approved the project, so the next steps are gaining approval of a design and going through the process for spending the funds. Assuming no roadblocks, construction of the project could begin in late 2022 or early 2023 and be completed by 2024.

The overall project is for a 10-lane boat ramp with 61 parking spaces, restroom facilities and covered picnic tables. The ramp and associated facilities will be located on 8 acres, but there is room to expand to over 18 acres.

This project should bring relief to the already overcrowded ramp facilities in the county, where boaters routinely line up to unload and load boats, and where pickups and boat trailers frequently overflow parking lots and end up parked alongside the roads leading into the ramps.

Aside from helping relieve congestion, locating the boat ramp on the barge canal with direct access to the Gulf should help ease some of the congestion along the Crystal River as boaters traverse from Kings Bay to the Gulf and then back at the end of the day.

This project has been discussed and debated for years. It is time to just build it.

Pay better attention to shelter

Fifty-odd years ago, Citrus County committed to caring for and housing our unwanted, lost, injured and abused animals.

For the past few years, shelter management has worked with the county to come up with a plan to retrofit or replace the shelter. Plans failed because the BOCC (Citrus County Board of County Commissioners) doesn’t want to use county funds for this county responsibility.

Now that the shelter buildings have deteriorated to such a degree as to be nearly unsalvageable, it seems that the BOCC prefers to throw a minimum amount at it to make it look less like it’s falling apart. For several years, the majority of the improvements and repairs to services and structures have been donated to the shelter by the community via nonprofit organizations committed to helping shore up the shelter and make it more habitable and safe for animals, staff and volunteers.

Regardless of the county’s and the taxpayers’ past commitment, the BOCC is again declining to use county (taxpayer) dollars to construct a new shelter, but are again putting the responsibility on the community to obtain funds by begging for donations.

Unless I am mistaken, I don’t see any other county department depending upon donations for their improvements and repairs. The current budget for Animal Services is roughly \$2,000,000 annually, half of which goes directly to the sheriff’s office for Animal Control, which the sheriff’s office supervises. The balance of the budget pays all shelter expenses, including those incurred by every cruelty case. Many of those cruelty cases go on for years, and the care and custody of those animals is borne by the shelter.

Animal Services is a department of the county, and the county should be entirely responsible for ensuring its viability.

Fall Proof Your Life? Yes, Please!

We spend most of our lives bumping into things or tripping over toys and pets, sometimes we even trip over imaginary objects. Hardly ever does it result in a fall, instead we Weeble-Wobble and move on; that's called balance. As we age, balance seems to diminish. Does it, or do we stop doing the things necessary to maintain or improve balance?

A friend of mine told me that this was the 3rd time he had fallen this week. I was amazed that he said it so nonchalantly. He saw my amazement and went on to tell me about the hundreds of "Jumps" (parachute type) he made in his life. Essentially, he did not fear falling because he knew how to fall safely.

Simply put, not thinking about falls is a major contributor to falling. Some reasons I've heard are: "I should have put my glasses on," "My medication made me drowsy," "I was carrying...", "I was in a hurry and just missed the step," and "I think I stepped in a hole." None of these reasons or lapses in judgment is worth a change in lifestyle. If the label on a medication container reads, "Do not operate machinery" or this "Medication can cause dizziness" it should be interpreted as "Caution: May contribute to falls!"

Life's journey can have many paths; not all are enjoyable and some cannot be prevented. A fall resulting in a lasting injury is one of those journeys that can have devastating effects on a person and their family. Many times, the family is also greatly impacted by a devastating fall. As we age the injuries from falls can be more severe and many times the recovery is less than complete. There is a lot of information available on how to "Fall Proof Your Home." This generally includes information on clearing anticipated fall zones, like the garage entrance to the house and removing potential trip items, like frayed rugs. Most of this guidance meant to minimize injury should a fall occur. I believe "Fall Proofing" is a great idea and should be considered for every home.

What about the fall that does not go according to your "Fall Proof" plan or occurs when you're not in your home? To avoid these falls wouldn't it require you to "Fall Proof Your Life?" The simple answer is..... Yes! How is that possible? The human body is like everything else:

When it is new, it can take abuse as it ages, it needs TLC. Do what is necessary to improve your balance and you have a "Fall Proof Your Life Plan." Reducing the likelihood of a fall is the best plan. It makes you safer and it does not require the monumental task of redecorating to fall proof every place you go. Businesses, friends, and family may get irritated when you move their furniture or remove rugs.

Eat Right – Your body cannot not operate on bad fuel or no fuel. Make sure you are getting adequate nourishment. Quantity of food does not equal nourishment; type of food matters most.

Exercise – Use it or lose it. Exercise to prevent falls. To improve balance, we only need to walk. Walking on a flat surface, on an uneven surface (grass), and walking a straight line are examples of simple balance exercises.

Remain Alert – Falls, like automobile accidents, often disrupt you from getting to your destination. If you are ill, emotionally distracted or just do not feel right, exercise caution when moving about.

Age or the first fall should not be the trigger for starting a "Fall Plan." Anyone taking medications that impact balance, or with illnesses such as UTI (Urinary Tract Infection), ear infections, blood pressure or sugar issues should be concerned about falls. Remember the 70's toy: "Weeble Wobbles" and the saying "Weebles Wobble but They Don't Fall Down;" Be A Weeble! If a fall plan is too much trouble the other choice is to learn how to fall. However, for most, learning to fall by jumping out of an airplane 100 times is not an option!!

3D imaging 2.0

I first did an article on three-dimensional imaging in 2017. We have had four more years of use of our three-dimensional scanner; this is an update on those four years.

Uncovering underlying pathology is probably the greatest benefit of the three-dimensional scanner. The facial bones are the most complex collection of bones in the body. There is even a recognized specialty of oral and maxillofacial radiology, just for the interpretation of these complex structures.

We have been able to see in clear detail what can only be surmised with a flat X-ray. Being able to visualize a tumor or a mass that has displaced normal anatomy is vital to not only an accurate surgery, but preservation of the healthy surrounding tissues.

Planning for surgical reconstruction when there has been trauma, pathology, or the loss of multiple teeth has been greatly accentuated by being able to visualize in three dimensions the area of the jaws that need to be rebuilt.

We can see the extent of bone loss, and therefore plan for proper bone grafting. Also, a surgical guide can be constructed utilizing a 3D printer from these same three-dimensional films, which many times is crucial for an accurate reconstructive effort.

Typically, my partner and I will sit in front of a computer screen and do a mock surgery on this three-dimensional image. We may then direct the construction of surgical guides, or even replacement parts.

In the not-too-distant past, if we knew that a large surgical deficiency would be created, that part of the jaw may have to be replaced with sterilize cadaver bone which would have to be shaped at the time of surgery, or a reconstruction plate which would have to be bent by hand during surgery to rejoin a section of jaw that has been removed.

This was extremely time-consuming and kept the patient asleep for a longer period of time.

My partner, Dr. Rushi Patel, trained with these 3D modalities, which did not exist in my residency in their modern form. He has taken several patients to surgery with pre-constructed titanium mandibles, created by a 3D printer, to replace segments that had to be removed because of tumors.

The time in surgery is dramatically reduced, and therefore the trauma of surgery is dramatically reduced. The contour of these premade elements is perfect and requires no time during surgery to make them fit.

In the office, we utilize three-dimensional radiography to plan the precise placement of implants and replacement of bone, so that your teeth can be replaced most accurately. This is called “guided surgery,” whereby a 3D printer is utilized to create a guide which is used during surgery for the absolute accurate placement of an implant.

As you can imagine, your teeth must match up properly. Doing virtual surgery, transferring that information to a physical model, and utilizing a guide at the time of surgery made from that model ensures that reconstruction of missing teeth and bone can be done not only in the most accurate way, but in the least amount of time, which translates into a quicker and easier postoperative recovery.

Are some COVID-19 vaccines more effective than others?

Are some COVID-19 vaccines more effective than others?

It's hard to tell since they weren't directly compared in studies. But experts say the vaccines are alike on what matters most: preventing hospitalizations and deaths.

“Luckily, all these vaccines look like they're protecting us from severe disease,” said Dr. Monica Gandhi of the University of California, San Francisco, citing study results for five vaccines used around the world and a sixth that's still in review.

And real-world evidence as millions of people receive the vaccines show they're all working very well.

Still, people might wonder if one is

better than another since studies conducted before the vaccines were rolled out found varying levels of effectiveness. The problem is they don't offer apples-to-apples comparisons.

Consider the two-dose vaccines from Pfizer and Moderna, found to be about 95% effective at preventing illness. Studies for those shots counted a COVID-19 case whether it was mild, moderate or severe — and were conducted before worrisome mutated versions of the virus began circulating.

Then Johnson & Johnson tested a single-dose vaccine and didn't count mild illnesses. J&J's shot was 66% protective against moderate to severe illness in a large international study. In just the U.S., where there's less spread of variants, it was 72%

effective. More importantly, once the vaccine's effect kicked in it prevented hospitalization and death.

AstraZeneca's two-dose vaccine used in many countries has faced questions about the exact degree of its effectiveness indicated by studies. But experts agree those shots, too, protect against the worst outcomes.

Around the world, hospitalizations are dropping in countries where vaccines have been rolling out including Israel, England and Scotland — regardless of which shots are given. And the U.S. government's first look at real-world data among essential workers provided further evidence that the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines are highly protective — 90% — against infections whether there were symptoms or not.

What is a COVID-19 vaccine passport, and will I need one?

What is a COVID-19 vaccine passport, and will I need one?

“Vaccine passports,” or vaccine certificates, are documents that show you were vaccinated against COVID-19 or recently tested negative for the virus. They could help you get into places such as stadiums or even countries that are looking to reopen safely.

The certificates are still being developed, and how and whether they'll be used could vary widely around the world. Experts say they should be free and available on paper, not just on apps, since not everyone has a smartphone.

In the U.S., federal officials say there are no plans to make them broadly mandatory. In some states, Republican governors have issued orders barring businesses or state agencies from asking people to show proof of vaccination.

Objections revolve mostly around privacy and security — how people's personal information will be stored — and fairness. Critics say the passports will benefit people and countries with more access to vaccines.



Supporters say they could make re-openings faster and easier. Proof of vaccination or a negative test could be a way for businesses and schools to reassure customers, students and parents that steps are being taken to limit transmission of the virus.

International travel bans by countries could also be eased if people are able to show proof they're

vaccinated. Some countries have long had requirements to prove vaccination against yellow fever.

Still, a challenge is creating certification systems that work across vaccine providers and businesses. More than a dozen initiatives are underway to develop a credential that could be stored on a smartphone or printed on paper, using a QR code.

Alex Smith retires after comeback from leg injury

Alex Smith is retiring from the NFL after making an improbable comeback from a broken leg.

Smith announced his retirement Monday on Instagram, saying he still has plenty of snaps left him but is calling it quits to enjoy time with his family. He turns 37 on May 7.

Smith earned AP Comeback Player of the Year honors for getting back on the field last season, two years removed from his gruesome injury that required 17 operations.

Washington released Smith in March and signed veteran quarterback Ryan

Fitzpatrick during free agency. Smith initially expressed his intent to keep playing but decided not to pursue another contract.

Smith was the No. 1 overall pick in 2005 and played 14 seasons for San Francisco, Kansas City and Washington. He threw for 35,650 yards and 199 touchdowns in 174 regular-season games and played in seven playoff games.

Smith broke his right tibia and fibula in November 2018 against Houston. He was hospitalized for almost a month and survived a life-threatening infection in addition to the operations.

He spent the next year and a half rehabbing and was back at practice when Washington assembled for training camp last summer. His first game action came in relief in October when Kyle Allen was injured, and he made his first start at Detroit weeks later.
