#### **COVID** patient hospitalizations below 5,500

Florida hospitals reported Friday that 5,414 inpatients had COVID-19, with 1,425 in intensivecare unit beds, according to data posted online by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The numbers continued a steady decrease in people needing hospitalization because of COVID-19.

The Department of Health and Human Services' website Thursday showed that 5,797 Florida inpatients had COVID-19, which was down from 6,258 on Wednesday. By comparison, Florida had 15,177 patients hospitalized with COVID-19 on Sept. 1. Also, the number of intensive-care unit patients Friday was down from Thursday, when it totaled 1,529.

Hospitals were hit with surges of patients in July and August as the highly contagious delta variant of the coronavirus spread across the state.

# Child airlifted after dog bite

A child had to be flown out for treatment after a dog bit them at a Homosassa-area house.

Emergency crews were dispatched Friday afternoon to respond to the reported attack off of South Minnesota Terrace.

Citrus County Fire Rescue (CCFR) later setup a helicopter landing zone on the parking lot of the Homosassa Springs Area Recreation Park, also known as Grandmarch Park, where Nature Coast EMS brought a 6-year-old to be airlifted for hospitalization, according to CCFR.

Animal control officers with the Citrus County Sheriff's Office fore they could remove it from the home. Its owners signed custody of the

dog over to Citrus County Animal Services, which then euthanized the canine, according to County Administrator Randy Oliver.

"It will be sent off to the lab to determine if any diseases or rabies are present," Oliver said.

Sheriff's office authorities also responded to the house to investigate, but details about the incident were unavailable Friday.





## Deal makes Florida company largest marijuana retailer

TALLAHASSEE — Trulieve, the state's largest medical marijuana operator, is now the nation's biggest cannabis retailer, after closing on a \$2.1 billion deal to acquire former competitor Harvest Health & Recreation Inc.

The transaction marks a major development in Florida, where Harvest held one of 22 licenses to cultivate, process and sell medical marijuana to a growing patient population, and in the nation's rapidly expanding pot industry.

Trulieve CEO Kim Rivers called the closing of the deal a "transformational milestone" in her Gadsden County-based company's brief history.

"When we really started five short years prior, I wasn't taking a salary and I was in the back making capsules and ensuring that shipments went out on time. Obviously, there's been incredible growth.

With the acquisition of Harvest finalized, Trulieve will have 149 retail locations in 11 states including Florida, more than 3.1 million square feet of cultivation and just over 8,500 employees. Before the deal closed, Trulieve had 85 retail sites in Florida.

"We'll have approximately 37% more retail locations than the next closest competitor and 50% more, or a million square feet more, cultivation than the next closest competitor," Rivers said of Trulieve's national footprint.

Trulieve is establishing a "a regional hub strategy" across the U.S., with hubs in Florida, Pennsylvania and Arizona, Rivers said, to be better positioned as more states approve medical marijuana and others legalize adult recreational use of marijuana.



#### **Pat Robertson** steps down as host of '700 Club'

NORFOLK, Va. — Pat Robertson, who turned a tiny Virginia television station into a global religious broadcasting network, is stepping down after a half-century running the "700 Club" on daily TV, the Christian Broadcasting Network announced on Friday.

Robertson, 91, said in a statement that he hosted the network's flagship program for the last time on Friday, and that his son Gordon Robertson will take over the weekday show starting Monday.


"I will no longer be the host of the '700 Club," Robertson said on the show Friday, although he vowed to return from time to time, if he's had a "revelation" he needs to share. "I thank God for everyone that's been involved. And I want to thank all of you."

Robertson's Christian Broadcasting Network started airing on Oct. 1, 1961, after he bought a bankrupt UHF television station in Portsmouth, Virginia. The "700 Club" began production in 1966.

Now based in Virginia Beach, CBN says its outreach extends to more than 100 countries and territories in dozens of languages through TV and video evangelism, online ministry and prayer centers. The "700 Club" talk show can be seen in the vast majority of U.S. television markets.

Robertson attracted a large audience and went on to have several U.S. presidents as guests, including Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan and Donald **Trump**, the network said.

Robertson was the son of a U.S. senator and received a law degree from Yale. He ran for

# Stocks rebound

#### Ends worst week since winter

STAN CHOE Associated Press

Wall Street rebounded on Friday, led by companies that would benefit most from a healthier economy, but not by enough to keep the stock market from its worst week since the winter.

The S&P 500 rose 49.50, or 1.1%, to 4,357.04 following another choppy day of trading. It swung between a loss of 0.4% and a gain of 1.6% through the day.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average climbed 482.54 points, or 1.4%, to 34,326.46, and the Nasdaq composite gained 118.12, or 0.8%, to 14,566.70.

Merck helped pace the market and leaped 8.4% after it said its experimental pill to treat COVID-19 cut hospitalizations and deaths by half. Prospects for an additional tool to tame the pandemic helped lift shares of airlines, hotels and companies hurt by restrictions on travel and other activities.

United Airlines soared 7.9%, casino owner Caesars Entertainment swept 6.4% higher and Live Nation Entertainment jumped 8.3%.

Energy producers, financial companies and other businesses whose profits are often closely tied to the economy's strength were also helping to lead the way.

The market's widespread gains weren't enough to make up for a dismal last few days. The S&P 500 still dropped to a weekly loss of 2.2%, its worst since February. A swift rise in interest rates earlier this week rattled expected.

the market and forced a reassessment of whether stocks had grown too expensive, particularly the most popular ones.

September was also the worst month for the S&P 500 since March 2020, when markets plunged as COVID-19 shutdowns took hold. Among the worries that have weighed on the market: The Federal Reserve is close to letting off the accelerator on its support for markets, economic data has recently been mixed following an upturn in COVID-19 infections, corporate tax rates may be set to rise and political turmoil continues

in Washington. There's also high inflation still enveloping the world. Oil prices rose roughly 2% this week, approaching a seven-year high, while natural gas prices were up about 7%.

The Federal Reserve has said that it expects high inflation to be only transitory and that it's the result of an economy roaring back to life from its earlier shutdown. But if it's wrong, the Fed may have to raise interest rates earlier or more aggressively than it's telegraphed to markets.

Economic reports on Friday were mixed.

The nation's manufacturing grew faster than expected last month, but an August reading for the Federal Reserve's preferred measure for inflation was a bit higher than forecast. They follow a disappointing report on Thursday showing more people filed for unemployment benefits than

#### **Auto sales slump**

DETROIT — In a normal month before the pandemic, Con Paulos' Chevy dealership in Jerome, Idaho, sold around 40 new vehicles. In September, it was only six. Now he's got nothing new in stock, and every car, truck or SUV on order has been sold.

Last month, what happened at his dealership about 115 miles southeast of Boise was repeated across the country as factory closures due to a worsening global shortage of computer chips crimped U.S. new vehicle shipments.

U.S. new vehicle sales tumbled about 26% in September as chip shortages and other partssupply disruptions cut into the selection on dealer lots and raised prices once again to record levels. That sent many frustrated consumers to the sidelines to wait out a shortage that has hobbled the industry since late last year.

For the third quarter, sales were 3.4 million, down 13% from the same period a year ago.

"September results show that there are simply not enough vehicles available to meet consumer demand," said Thomas King, president of data and analytics at J.D. Power.

The average sales price of a new vehicle hit a record \$42,802 last month, breaking the old record of \$41,528 set in August, J.D. Power said. The average U.S. price is up nearly 19% from a year ago, when it broke \$36,000 for the first time, J.D. Power said.



#### Parkway won't attract travelers

A report in the Chronicle tells us we need the Turkey Oak bypass because the Suncoast Parkway will dump a huge amount of traffic on State Road 44. That is unmitigated hogwash. Here's why:

It is all about traffic counts. The northbound traffic count on U.S. 19 leaving Pasco County is an average of 32,000 per day. Upon entering Citrus County, this has filtered down to 13,000 per day. In comparison, the northbound traffic on the parkway entering Hernando County is only 5,600 per day and virtually all of that exits within Hernando County. Parkway traffic continuing north to the Citrus County border is near zero every day.

There is a reason for this. The majority of the population in the four counties south of Citrus County is clustered near the west coast. U.S. 19 runs through this entire area. The parkway is several miles to the east and vehicles must travel seven to 10 miles to reach the nearest access point. Therefore, U.S. 19 is the preferred route north for west coast traffic. The alternate route would be Interstate 75, where there is an average of 55,000 vehicles per day traveling north about seven miles east of Citrus County.

interchange. This is not going to happen either. We must compare development at other parkway interchanges northbound out of Pasco County. At four interchanges there has been almost no development other than a total of two gas stations, a couple of fast food facilities, one Publix, one Kohl's, and one Target. A fifth interchange at Cortez Boulevard is different because a developed area had already existed to the west before the Parkway arrived. However, the stores, restaurants and other facilities now located on Cortez

absorb the parkway traffic long before it gets to Citrus County.

The parkway has not created significant development at four interchanges in Pasco or Hernando County. This will be important, combined with traffic flow numbers, in determining that the Cardinal Street interchange cannot support any level of development enough to bring traffic into Citrus County.

I conclude that U.S. 19 will continue to be the preferred route north for west coast traffic. I further conclude that the Suncoast Parkway will have little or no effect on Citrus County, other than destroying too many miles of our environment.

#### **Venezuela introduces** new currency with 6 fewer zeros

CARACAS, Venezuela - A new currency with six fewer zeros debuted Friday in Venezuela, whose currency has been made nearly worthless by years of the world's worst inflation.

But the new bills were nowhere to be found in the capital, where consumers' fears that prices will continue to spiral upward proved to be right.

"Today, I went to the supermarket and everything was marked in dollars," Lourdes Pórtelo, an office worker, said in a shopping center in the east side of Caracas. "In the end, I couldn't buy anything, I didn't have enough money."

Before the adjustment, the highest denomination was a 1 million bolivar bill that was worth a little less than a quarter as of Thursday. The new currency tops out at 100 bolivars, a little less than \$25 — until inflation starts to eat away at that as well.

#### **Biden administration** urges judge to block **Texas abortion law**

AUSTIN, Texas - The Biden administration on Friday urged a federal judge to block the nation's most restrictive abortion law, which has banned most abortions in Texas since early September and sent women racing to get care beyond the borders of the second-most populous state.

U.S. District Judge Robert Pitman, an appointee of former President Barack Obama, did not say when he would rule following a nearly three-hour hearing in Austin. At least one Texas abortion provider said it stood ready to resume offering services at its three clinics if the law known as Senate Bill 8 is temporarily shelved.

"Every day that S.B. 8 is in effect, we turn away patients in droves," Amy Hagstrom Miller, president of Whole Woman's Health, told the court in a filing.

#### **Scientists decipher Marie Antoinette's** redacted love notes

WASHINGTON - "Not without you." "My dear friend." "You that I love."

Marie Antoinette sent these expressions of affection — or more? — in letters to her close friend and rumored lover Axel von Fersen. Someone later used dark ink to scribble over the words, apparently to dampen the effusive, perhaps amorous, language.

Scientists in France devised a new method to uncover the original writing, separating out the chemical composition of different inks used on historical documents. They tested their method by analyzing the private letters between the French queen and the Swedish count, which are housed in the French national archives.

That allowed them to read the original words and even identify the person who scratched them out - Fersen himself.

"It's always exciting when you discover that you can know more about the past than you thought you could," said historian Rebecca L. Spang, who studies the French Revolution at Indiana University, and was not involved in the study.

## US on the brink of 700,000 dead

MINNEAPOLIS — A decline in COVID-19 cases across the United States over the past several weeks has given overwhelmed hospitals some relief, but administrators are bracing for yet another possible surge as cold weather drives people indoors.

Health experts say the fourth wave of the pandemic has peaked overall in the U.S., particularly in the Deep South, where hospitals were stretched to the limit weeks ago. But many Northern states are still struggling with rising cases, and what's ahead for winter is far less clear.

Unknowns include how flu season may strain already depleted hospital staffs and whether those who have refused to get vaccinated will change their minds.

An estimated 70 million eligible Americans remain unvaccinated, providing kindling for the highly contagious delta

"If you're not vaccinated or have protection from natural 2 1/2 weeks. infection, this virus will find you," warned Mike Osterholm, director of the University of Minnesota's Center for Infectious Disease Research and Policy.

Nationwide, the number of people now in the hospital with COVID-19 has fallen to somewhere around 75,000 from over 93,000 in early September. New cases are on the downswing at about 112,000

# Who goes first?

'n a recent Chronicle Sound-Off, a caller said: "I read ... where another church is collecting food and supplies for Haiti, but I have not seen one church or one group collecting for the people of Louisiana or the fire victims out in California.

'Shouldn't we be taking care of the U.S. first? I'm an American citizen and I watch out for Americans first, not other countries.'

When I read that in the paper I cut it out because I wanted to think about it for a while.

First, I know of several local churches and organizations that are helping both Haiti and Louisiana, so it's possible to do both.

But I think the Sound-Off caller's "America and Americans first" is something that I've heard a lot from people. Maybe people have always said or thought that? I don't know the answer to that.

But I do know that the inscription on the Statue of Liberty famously says: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, the wretched refuse of your teeming shore.

"Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door."

At least one time in history, America, meaning Americans, thought of others beyond our borders and eagerly welcomed them.

That said, I can absolutely see the caller's point, the desire to take care of oneself first.

However, that's not to be true of the church and of Christians. Jesus said those who want to be first will end up being last.

It's a hard thing. I am all about me first, and I have to fight against that all the time.

Jesus taught that his followers are to love others as they love themselves, to be welcoming and gracious, giving to others sacrificially, to be forgiving and merciful and to offer hospitality, even to people who are different, even to those we don't like.

Or maybe we like them, but we don't want to include them.

My pastor sometimes reminds us about when our church was young, when we got to a certain size that was comfortable, and some people started saying they hoped the church would stay that size — no more, "just

I can understand that. But the Christian life is never about "just us," but about "them," about the tired, the poor, the "huddled masses yearning to breathe free," the "wretched refuse of your

teeming shore." It's about opening up our doors, our hearts, our wallets, our lives to the refugees and immigrants, the outcasts and the sinners, because that's who we all are apart from Christ.

Another thing my pastor sometimes says: "We are chosen, but we're not 'choice.' We're chosen, not because we're good, but because he

(God) is good." If we who call ourselves Christians would remember that we are "chosen but not choice," I think we would have an easier time loving others the

way Jesus would have us love. I've heard preachers say we are "blessed to be a blessing," and it's

God gives to us so we can give to others and not hoard for ourselves. Likewise, he has welcomed us so we can extend welcome, mercy and grace to all who need it, regardless if they're from Haiti or Louisiana, Mexico or Mars.

Jesus said: "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, thirsty and you gave me something to drink. I was a stranger and you invited me in ... Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it for me"

(Matthew 25:35-40). We do it for him, because he did it

first for us.



## Rays win series opener 4-3

NEW YORK — Gary Sánchez and Rougned Odor both struck out with two runners on to blunt a ninth-inning rally and the New York Yankees' lead atop the AL wildcard race got even tighter with a 4-3 loss to the Tampa Bay Rays on Friday night.

The Yankees' edge fell to one game over Boston and two games over Toronto after those contenders each won. Seattle was two games back of New York going into the night.

New York needed a win plus a loss by either Boston or Seattle to clinch its fifth straight playoff appearance. Instead, the Yankees fell short against the AL East champion Rays in the opener of a season-ending three-game series.

The Yankees lost for only the second time in 10 games. Rookie Wander Franco gave the Rays a 4-1 lead by chopping a grounder up the middle for a two-run single in the ninth. His hit came a few pitches after he missed a three-run homer by lining a ball a few feet foul in left.

Franco's hit also came a night after he went 0 for 4 to snap a 43-game on-base streak, which tied Frank Robinson in 1956 for the longest such string in MLB history among players 20 or younger.

After Franco gave the Rays a three-run lead, the Yankees nearly pulled off a comeback.

The Wildcats (4-0, 2-0 Southeastern Conference) are tied for last in FBS with 11 turnovers and next to last in margin at minus-9. Fortunately for them, those giveaways haven't hurt much because of a stingy, resilient defense that has made clutch plays to preserve close SEC wins over South Carolina and Missouri.

Those wins have put them in early SEC East contention entering Saturday night's showdown against No. 10 Florida (3-1, 1-1). Staying there means not giving the Gators easy opportunities.

'There's no excuse when we have to clean up the turnovers, the fumbles in particular," Kentucky coach Mark Stoops said this week. "I believe it's something that we can get corrected, and we will.'

The Wildcats are off to their best start since beginning 5-0 in 2018, a breakthrough season boosted by their road upset of the Gators that snapped a 31-game series losing streak. Expectations are just as high this season and meeting them starts with Kentucky earning its first home win over Florida since 1986.

To pull off another upset, Kentucky will need a sustained offensive effort and that's been a struggle in recent weeks. Three turnovers each time haven't helped, though Kentucky's defense has limited the damage in instances such as last week's 16-10 win at South Carolina. They held the Gamecocks to just a late field goal after stopping them on downs consecutive fourth-quarter possessions.

"You view the situation as a detriment or as a challenge, an opportunity to do something really special," defensive coordinator Brad White said of the response. "We've got some great senior leaders, and that entire unit believes they can rise up beaten because of their ability to make freshman was the Gators' best player the SEC play.

The Gators come in with the nation's ninth-ranked FBS offense (540.8 yards per game) that has succeeded by rushing the ball more than last season. They've built the SEC's top ground game at 322.5 yards (third in FBS) and ran for 283 against a Volunteers defense that was allowing just 54.3 per outing.

Florida faces another challenge from a Kentucky defense allowing just 260 yards per game (ninth in FBS) and only 87.3 on the ground. While the Wildcats have work to do closing that turnover gap, they're un-

slim leads stand.

"They're a big, physical defense and that's what they play but they have a lot of experience," Gators coach Dan Mullen said. "They understand the scheme inside and out. They're very sound in what they do and when you have your guys that are confident in what they're doing and they know the scheme and defense, they're there and able to make plays.

"As the season goes, one of the things you want is to try to be as healthy as you can," Mullen said. "(The) healthier you are, the better you are. Not just him but every position. So, we're excited to have him back and to have him ready to go play because he's a dynamic player.'

#### RELIABLE ROBINSON

Kentucky receiver and native Wan'Dale Robinson has quickly become a key target with team highs of 25 receptions for 402 yards and two touchdowns. The Nebraska transfer has at least 400 yards for the third consecutive season and is just 59 yards from topping last fall's career best set in eight games with the Cornhuskers.

#### **GATOR PRESSURE**

Florida ranks eighth nationally with 14 sacks, including three last week against the Vols. Defensive end Zachary Carter had one and leads the Gators with 4.5, which is tied for the SEC lead.

#### **HAND IT TO C-ROD**

Though Kentucky running back Chris Rodriguez Jr. has struggled with fumbles this season including two last week, he continues to lead SEC rushers with 522 yards. Stoops is confident the junior will correct his mistakes, and 77 fourth-quarter rushing yards against South Carolina demonstrate his offensive effectiveness.



#### THIS DATE IN BASEBALL

1908 — Addie Joss of the Cleveland Indians pitched a perfect game, defeating the Chicago White Sox, 1-0.

1916 — Grover Alexander pitched a 2-0 three-hitter against the Boston Braves for his 16th shutout and 33rd victory of the season.

1920 — The only tripleheader in this century was played, with the Cincinnati Reds defeating the Pittsburgh Pirates in the first two games. The Pirates won the nightcap, which was called after six innings because of darkness.

1938 — Bob Feller struck out 18 Detroit Tigers to set a single-game record that stood until Steve Carlton broke it in 1969.

1968 — Bob Gibson set a World Series record by striking out 17 Detroit Tigers in Game 1.

1978 — In a one-game playoff for the AL East title, Bucky Dent hit a threerun homer off Mike Torrez to lead the New York Yankees to a 5-4 victory over the Boston Red Sox at Fenway Park.

1986 — Dwight Gooden of the New York Mets became the first pitcher in baseball to strike out 200 batters in each of his first three seasons as he fanned seven en route to an 8-2 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

1991 — The Toronto Blue Jays clinched the American League East title and became the first team in sports history to draw four million fans in one season.

1995 — The Seattle Mariners, behind Randy Johnson's three-hitter, beat California 9-1 in a one-game playoff for the AL West title.

2005 — Roy Oswalt got his 20th win to lead the Houston Astros over the Chicago Cubs 6-4, clinching the NL wild-card berth and capping a historic comeback. Houston started the season 15-30 and became the first team since the 1914 Boston Braves to make the postseason after falling 15 games under .500.

2009 — B.J. Upton became the first player in Tampa Bay history to hit for the cycle. He went 5 for 5 with a career-high six RBIs in a 13-4 win over the New York Yankees.

2013 — Tampa Bay posted another must-have win on the road, beating the Cleveland Indians 4-0 in the AL wildcard game. The Rays playing in their third city over four days advanced to the best-of-five division series.

2016 — Baltimore's Matt Wieters homered from both sides of the plate and Kevin Gausman gave the Orioles a clutch pitching performance to beat the New York Yankees 5-2 and snag a playoff spot on the final day of the regular season.

2018 - Tony Wolters hit a tiebreaking single with two outs in the 13th inning, and the Colorado Rockies beat the Chicago Cubs 2-1 in an epic NL wild-card game.

# Aiming for rare Stanley Cup three-peat

## Confident, talented Lightning have won past two NHL titles

TAMPA — Scotty Bowman knows a thing or two about winning consecutive Stanley Cup championships.

The Hall of Famer has won nine titles as a NHL head coach and five more in front office roles. He's currently a senior advisor to hockey operations with the Chicago Blackhawks, spends most of his winters in Florida, and is a frequent visitor to Amalie Arena — home of the two-time defending champion Tampa Bay

With an ultra-talented nucleus featuring Conn Smythe Trophy winner Andrei Vasilevskiy, playoff scoring phenoms Nikita Kucherov and Brayden Point, top defenseman Victor Hedman and veteran leaders such as Steven Stamkos, Ryan McDonagh and Pat Maroon, the Lightning are set up for continued success.

Bowman, nevertheless, knows it's not a sure thing.

The last team to claim at least three straight Stanley Cup crowns was the New York Islanders, who won four in a row under Al Arbor in the early 1980s.

'It's easy to say: 'Yeah, we'd like to win three in a row.' There's no question about that," Bowman said. "I think the biggest danger would be to lose your focus is, but that's not coming until April." during the regular season.'

Bowman won four straight Stanley Cup championships with Montreal from 1975-76 through 1978-79.

The 88-year-old also won two in a row with the Detroit Red Wings in 1996-97 and 1997-98 and was behind the bench when the 1991-92 Pittsburgh Penguins repeated as champs following the death of Bob Johnson.

"I don't think you should be thinking about winning three in a row when you're playing early in the 82-game schedule. You don't even have to think about that until the playoffs start," Bowman said.

'Number one, every year is different. You can't get too far ahead of yourself," Bowman added. "They've got two Cups. Nobody can take them away from them. But they're not going to win the third Cup in October, November. ... Once you win, there is a magic potion. You know what it that.'

## Zalatoris shoots 61 to share lead at Sanderson Farms

The person spoke to the AP on the condition of anonymity because the move Friday had not been made public. It comes in the wake of claims of misconduct, including sexual coercion, leveled by two former players against North Carolina coach Paul Riley.

Riley was fired by the Courage on Thursday and the allegations touched off a wave of condemnation by players that forced this weekend's games to be called

Additionally, FIFA on Friday opened an investigation into the case. It is rare that soccer's international governing body gets involved in a controversy involving a member association. U.S. Soccer also announced an independent investigation

U.S. Soccer was instrumental in founding the NWSL in 2013 and helped support the league until last year, when it became independent. The federation continues its financial support of the league.

U.S. Soccer suspended Riley's coaching license Thursday after The Athletic published claims of abuse made by former NWSL players Sinead Farrelly and Mana Shim.

FIFA told The Associated Press it was "deeply concerned" by the case and will now be seeking further details from American soccer authorities about the issues raised.



We get used to the norms of the game. For example, if we find an eight-card fit in a major, it will be the correct strain most of the time; but when it isn't, there are few guidelines in the literature that will help us play elsewhere.

In today's deal, what happened in four hearts? What was North-South's better game contract? How might they have gotten into



North's two-diamond cue-bid showed at least game-invitational values with heart support. South, with some extras, happily jumped

to four hearts. However, West led his singleton diamond. East won with the ace and returned the diamond three, his lowest being a suit-preference signal for clubs, the lower-ranking of the other two side suits. West ruffed and shifted to a club. East took the trick and led the diamond 10, a suit-preference signal for spades. West ruffed again, and a spade to the ace resulted in down

As you have noticed, North-South would do much better in three no-trump. Even if West is on lead and selects a club, that gives the defenders only four tricks. But how do North-South get there?

North has a soft hand with three quacks and 4-3-3-3 distribution. He might advance in no-trump, hiding his heart support. Also, South might rebid three no-trump to offer a choice of contracts. This looks weird with a singleton club, but he can see the risk of diamond

ruffs by the defense. Finally, East might have opened one no-trump, his hand being worth 15.55 points on the Kaplan-Ruben scale. Then find three no-trump!






