# New eatery debuts in Crystal River

## Waterfront Social replaces Margarita Breeze

atrons of Crystal River's Margarita Breeze saw quite a few changes when the restaurant opened its doors Wednesday, Nov. 18.

Firstly, it's not the Margarita Breeze anymore. The new name, now in effect, is Waterfront Social.

Secondly, there's a new menu. Diners will still find staples such as burgers, chicken wings and seafood options. Other entrees now include a mix of Southern-coastal foods.

Customers will notice new floors, newly painted walls, new fans and lighting and new china and glassware. A new blue-white color scheme replaces the old brown inside.

"It's pretty much a total revamp," said Richard Wiggins, new owner of the restaurant at the Port Paradise Resort & Hotel

There's still some tweaks to come but the major renovations are completed, he said.

Local urologist, hotelier and restaurateur Dr. Paresh Desai, whose family bought the property in 2003-04, tapped Richard and Tiffany Wiggins, owners of Lecanto's Katch Twenty Two Restaurant, to take over the renovated facility.

Desai said the Wiggins' have the culinary background and restaurant credentials to do the job at his Port Paradise, soon to undergo a major renovation of its own.

Desai said Wiggins knows what it takes to work in a "big-flag" hotel, which Port Paradise will soon become when it transitions over to a Marriott Hotel.

"He's the perfect candidate," Desai said. "We're lucky he's in Citrus County.

Richard Wiggins was 20 when he began his hospitality culinary career with Hyatt Hotels, working his way up to the Grand Hyatt Atlanta, **Hyatt Regency Grand** Cypress Orlando and Hyatt Regency New

Orleans. Until June of this year, Tiffany Wiggins worked as a catering and sales specialist for Marriott Hotels.

Wiggins stressed the renovated restaurant, which had remained open during all these changes, will be

laid-back. He will continue to own and operate the upscale Katch Twenty Two.

Meanwhile, Desai said bulldozing will start soon on part of the 7-acre Port Paradise property to make way for a new Marriott, which will have 75 hotel rooms, 35 condos, a bayside pool, grass courtyard, dive center and other amenities

Marriott will take care of management. operations once the redevelopment is complete and certain construction requirements are met. The price tag for all this is \$25 to \$35 million.

Wiggins said once the

hotel is built, probably in about two years, the existing restaurant will close and a new one still run by him — will move inside the Marriott.

What that restaurant will look like is too early to tell, he said.

Wiggins said the new Marriott should be a big success for Citrus County.

"I live for travel, the wilderness, meeting new people, places and cultures. I stay busy at work or filled with joy.

Norman died Nov. 6, 2020, as a result of a car crash. He was 22.

He was a good listener, gave wise counsel, made people laugh, pointed them toward God.

"At his core, he was about serving God and serving others," said his mother, Kristie Fish. "He would make care packages to give to homeless people in Gainesville, often running out of his own food and toiletries because he gave them all away.

"He sponsored a child in Africa and gave blood every six weeks. He just wanted to express his love for Jesus in how he served people,' she said. "The biggest thing about

him was his sweet, tender heart.'

Wyatt wanted to be an actuary, compiling and analyzing statistics to use in calculating insurance risks and premiums.

He LOVED math. For him, it was how he worshiped God, understanding that math was always true, that it was what God used to create the universe and uses to sustain it.

'Through math, Wyatt was able to glimpse just a sliver of the beauty of the mind of God," Kris-



### **CDC: Don't travel** for Thanksgiving

NEW YORK — With the coronavirus surging out of control, the nation's top public health agency advised Americans on Thursday not to travel for Thanksgiving and not to spend the holiday with people from outside their household.

It was some of the firmest guidance yet from the government on curtailing traditional gatherings to fight the outbreak.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention issued the recommendations just one week before Thanksgiving, at a time when diagnosed infections, hospitalizations and deaths are skyrocketing across the country. In many areas, the health care system is being squeezed by a combination of sick patients filling up beds and medical workers falling ill themselves.

The CDC's Dr. Erin Sauber-Schatz cited more than 1 million new cases in the U.S. over the past week as the reason for the new guidance.

The United States has seen more than 11 million diagnosed infections and over 250,000 deaths from the coronavirus. CDC scientists believe that somewhere around 40% of people who are infected do not have obvious symptoms but can still spread the virus.

### **Pompeo visits** Israeli settlement

JERUSALEM - U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo on Thursday became the first top American diplomat to visit an Israeli settlement in the occupied West Bank as the State Department in a major policy shift announced that products from the settlements can be labeled "Made in Israel.

MEXICO CITY - Mexico said Thursday it will no longer allow officials accused of corruption to be tried in the United States, a move that could end a decadesold tradition in which most of Mexico's high-profile drugtrafficking and corruption cases have been tried north of the border.

However, the extent of the new policy was unclear, and officials suggested some extraditions could continue.

There was no immediate comment from U.S. officials on Mexico's bombshell statement, but it came one day after the U.S. dropped a high-profile drug trafficking and money laundering case against a former Mexican defense secretary.

The announcement suggests the fallout from the arrest of former Gen. Salvador Cienfuegos - which enraged Mexico when the Justice Department announced it last month — is far broader than previously known.



### **Serial killer blamed for** Miami slayings in 1970s

ST. PETERSBURG — Two women who were slain in Miami in the 1970s were killed by the United States' deadliest serial killer, authorities said.

In a memo written by an assistant state attorney in Miami-Dade County on Thursday, Karen O'Donoghue, whose body has never been found, and Dorothy Gibson, who was

strangled outside a Miami hotel in 1977, were killed by Samuel Little, who has confessed to more than 90 killings.

Little, who is 80, is in prison in California and serving multiple life sentences. He won't be charged in the two Miami killings, the memo stated. He's been behind bars since 2012, and in 2018, told investigators he was responsible for about 90 killings nationwide between 1970 and 2005. The FBI said its crime analysts believe all of his

confessions are credible.

Miami Dade Chief Assistant State Attorney Kathleen Hoague wrote in a memo that the O'Donoghue and Gibson cases were being cleared as the "appropriate disposition for us and to give the next of kin closure" after so many years. The memo was first reported by the Miami Herald.

Little said he strangled his 93 victims, nearly all of them women. Some of his victims were on the margins of

society. Many were originally deemed overdoses, or attributed to accidental or undetermined causes. Some bodies were never found.

Little told investigators he met O'Donoghue outside of a home for the mentally ill in the early 1970s. Little knew certain details about O'Donoghue — including that she had been a nurse and that she had menstrual irregularities.







### Stocks rise amid tug of war between hope, fear

Wall Street capped a day of choppy trading with modest gains for stocks Thursday, as the market's tug of war continues between worries about the worsening pandemic in the present and optimism that a vaccine will rescue the economy in the future.

The S&P 500 rose 0.4% after spending much of the day flipping between small losses and gains. The benchmark index was coming off a 1.2% slide from the day before that pulled it away from its record of 3,626.91 set on Monday. The late-afternoon burst of buying erased nearly all of the S&P 500's losses for the week.

Technology companies accounted for much of the rebound. Companies that rely on consumer spending and communications stocks also helped lift the market, outweighing losses in the utilities and health care sectors. Treasury yields fell, a sign of caution in the market.

The S&P 500 gained 14.08 points to 3,581.87. The Dow Jones Industrial Average added 44.81 points, or 0.2%, to 29,483.23. The index had been down 210 points. The tech-heavy Nasdaq composite climbed 103.11 points, or 0.9%, to 11,904.71.

Small-company stocks had a good showing. The Russell 2000 index picked up 14.82 points, or 0.8%, 1,784.13.

Wall Street's huge November rally has slowed this week as fears about the economy buckling in the near term collide with hopes that stronger growth will arrive next year once effective coronavirus vaccines become available. A discouraging report on Thursday underscored the fears, showing that more U.S.



### **Swimmers too** close to manatee




Patrick Earhart, who heads the board's programming committee, said the theater already has events in store such as a musical "Christmas Carol" and Christmas caroling in the plaza.





# **Dolphins** safety Scott dies, 75 Super Bowl MVP of perfect 1972 season

MIAMI — Jake Scott, the star safety who was the most valuable player in the Super Bowl that completed the Miami Dolphins' 1972 perfect season, died Thursday in Atlanta. He was 75.

Scott died after a fall down a stairway that left him in a coma, former teammate Dick Anderson said.

Scott played in three consecutive Super Bowls, won backto-back championship rings and made the Pro Bowl five years in a row with Miami. He had two interceptions, including a 55-yard return from the end zone, against Billy Kilmer and the Washington Redskins as the '72 Dolphins won 14-7 to finish 17-0.

Following retirement, Scott became reclusive and harbored hard feelings toward Dolphins coach Don Shula and his coach at Georgia, Vince Dooley. Scott lived for years on a remote Hawaiian island and traveled the world but seldom attended Dolphins or Bulldogs reunions.

He was once close to Shula, but they went without speaking to each other for 28 years, and Scott was one of only two living players to skip the 1972 Dolphins' 25-year celebration in

The rift finally ended at a memorabilia show in 2010, where Scott and Shula had a brief conversation, shared laughs and posed with other ex-Dolphins for photos. Shula died in May.

Scott played with the Dolphins from 1970 to 1976 and remains their career leader in interceptions and punt return yardage. He also started for the Redskins in 1976-78 and finished with 49 career interceptions.

Scott paired with Anderson to form perhaps the NFL's best safety tandem during that era.

"If I had to be in a foxhole in a war and have somebody cover my backside," Anderson said, "Jake would be my first choice."

At Georgia, Scott was an All-American and the Southeastern Conference Player of the Year in 1968.

In six seasons with Miami, Scott never missed a game.

# Nadal ousts Tsitsipas to advance at ATP Finals

## Defending champ falls in three sets

LONDON — Rafael Nadal advanced to the semifinals at the ATP Finals for the first time in five years and knocked out the defending champion in the process, beating Stefanos Tsitsipas 6-4, 4-6, 6-2 Thursday at the O2 Arena.

It is the sixth time in 10 appearances that Nadal has reached the last four of the season-ending tournament, which is the biggest title he has yet to win in his illustrious career.







deals) and two concluding quizzes, with 24 for declarer and 16 for the defenders.

This deal from the book would catch out many players. How should South play in six notrump after West leads the spade nine?

South did not like to rebid in such a weak five-card suit, but his partnership treated a twospade reverse as promising extra values.

The careless declarer plays low from the board at trick one. However, if East is in midseason form, he will take the first trick with his spade king and shift to a diamond, removing declarer's vital hand entry.

True, many Easts would not find that defense, but why would South wish to risk it?

He has 12 top tricks: one spade, five hearts (given the 4-2 split), five diamonds and one club. South can take those tricks by winning with dummy's spade ace and unblocking the heart kingqueen. He crosses to hand with a diamond, cashes the rest of the hearts, returns to dummy with a club and claims the four diamond winners.

He should then receive a "well played" from partner!

It cost so much to get a hotel there, so I know I would need to find an apartment to rent pretty quickly. Can you give me some advice on what I can do as soon as I get there to get situated? I do not have a job lined up, but I would like to

have enough set aside to last at least three to six months. When calculating your living expenses, take into account rent, groceries, utilities and other daily expenses such as ordering out from restaurants. Be realistic now so that you're not sorry later.

If you can safely do so, travel to Memphis ahead of time to look at apartments. Having a place lined up makes the moving process simpler and less expensive. You'll be able to move right in, with no worries as to where to store your things, and no need to drop hundreds or thousands of dollars on staying at a hotel room indefinitely.

If you are apartment hunting from afar, then be cautious. On websites such as Craigslist, scammers will often advertise properties that they don't actually own, in an attempt to steal the fee for a "rental application" or security deposit. It would be safer to work with a rental agent or go through rental management companies.

Start applying to jobs before you move. It's harder to get a job in a city in which you don't yet live, but not impossible. Let potential employers know a firm date by when you will be in town and able to work. Having a job will make the transition smoother financially and also socially, as it gives you a chance to meet new people right off the bat.

Lastly, a big asterisk to all this: I'd strongly encourage you to wait on moving until the COVID-19 pandemic has subsided.

**Dear Annie:** I have complex PTSD from the first 18 years of my life involving sexual abuse and witnessing violent abuse on my brother and mother.

I have found a wonderful therapist and have quieted a lot of the guilt, shame and night terrors but I continue to have low self-esteem, anxiety and depression that I choose not to medically treat because of being 54 and not wanting to increase my chances at dementia. Because of this trauma, am I likely to get dementia because of the damage that was caused from years of abuse? — Concerned About

Consequences Dear Concerned: I am so sorry for what you went through and so relieved to hear you have a therapist whom you like. You raise an important issue. The available scientific research does indicate that the stress of PTSD can increase one's risk of dementia. A review published in September 2020 found that people who suffer from PTSD are up to twice as likely to develop dementia later in life. The exact reasons for this are unknown. A 2018 study noted that PTSD increases levels of cytokines (proteins that trigger immune responses), which cause inflammation that may damage the brain. So, it's important that you get appropriate and comprehensive mental health care. Talk to your physician and vour therapist about what the best course of treatment might be.
