Citrus County COVID update

According to the Florida Department of Health, 39 new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update. Two new hospitalizations were reported; two new deaths were reported.

To date in the county, 4,125 people have tested positive (including 21 non-residents), 384 have been hospitalized and 152 have died.

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County mulls Riverwalk funds

Officials may tap tourist dollars to contribute money to Crystal River project

Citrus County commissioners seem eager to help Crystal River's Riverwalk project make it to the finish line.

First, though, they want to make sure their plan

passes legal muster.

Commissioners agreed Tuesday, Nov. 17, to ask the county attorney's office for an outside legal opinion on whether they can spend tourist tax dollars to help fund the Riverwalk construction.

Commissioners also

want to know if tourist taxes can be used to pay for trails or trailhead parks.

The TDC on Nov. 4 voted unanimously to recommend the county commission provide the city of Crystal River \$500,000 toward the Riverwalk. The

city had asked for \$1 million.

Tourist taxes are collected on overnight stays in hotels, motels, campgrounds and the like. The money is used on projects that lead to "heads in a bed," the term officials use for tourists who spend at

least one night at a county accommodation.

Commissioner Ron Kitchen Jr., who chairs the TDC, suggested the county could go beyond the \$500,000 in tourist taxes for Riverwalk.

New eatery debuts in Crystal River

Waterfront Social replaces Margarita Breeze

Patrons of Crystal River's Margarita Breeze saw quite a few changes when the restaurant opened its doors Wednesday, Nov. 18.

Firstly, it's not the Margarita Breeze anymore. The new name, now in effect, is Waterfront Social.

Secondly, there's a new menu. Diners will still find staples such as burgers, chicken wings and seafood options. Other entrees now include a mix of Southern-coastal foods.

Customers will notice new floors, newly painted walls, new fans and lighting and new china and glassware. A new blue-white color scheme replaces the old brown inside.

"It's pretty much a total revamp," said Richard Wiggins, new owner of the restaurant at the Port Paradise Resort & Hotel.

There's still some tweaks to come but the major renovations are completed, he said.

Local urologist, hotelier and restaurateur Dr. Pares Desai, whose family bought the property in 2003-04, tapped Richard and Tiffany Wiggins, owners of Lecanto's Katch Twenty Two Restaurant, to take over the renovated facility.

Desai said the Wiggins' have the culinary background and restaurant credentials to do the job at his Port Paradise, soon to undergo a major renovation of its own.

Desai said Wiggins knows what it takes to work in a "big-flag" hotel, which Port Paradise will soon become when it transitions over

to a Marriott Hotel.

"He's the perfect candidate," Desai said. "We're lucky he's in Citrus County."

Richard Wiggins was 20 when he began his hospitality culinary career with Hyatt Hotels, working his way up to the Grand Hyatt Atlanta, Hyatt Regency Grand Cypress Orlando and Hyatt Regency New Orleans.

Until June of this year, Tiffany Wiggins worked as a catering and sales specialist for Marriott Hotels.

Wiggins stressed the renovated restaurant, which had remained open during all these changes, will be

laid-back. He will continue to own and operate the upscale Katch Twenty Two.

Meanwhile, Desai said bulldozing will start soon on part of the 7-acre Port Paradise property to make way for a new Marriott, which will have 75 hotel rooms, 35 condos, a bay-side pool, grass courtyard, dive center and other amenities.

Marriott will take care of management operations once the redevelopment is complete and certain construction requirements are met. The price tag for all this is \$25 to \$35 million.

Wiggins said once the

hotel is built, probably in about two years, the existing restaurant will close and a new one — still run by him — will move inside the Marriott.

What that restaurant will look like is too early to tell, he said.

Wiggins said the new Marriott should be a big success for Citrus County.

"Once the new hotel comes, everything changes in the area," he said.

Wyatt Norman: Zany, brilliant, with zest for life

Earlier this year, Wyatt Norman decided it was time to look for someone to share life with.

So, like many 22-year-olds, he made a profile on a dating app.

He wrote:

"I'm trying to follow Jesus more closely and seriously every day. Helping out and showing the love of Christ to our fellow humans is really important to me.

"I'm looking for a companion or even a friend to get to know and go through life with.

"I live for travel, the wilderness, meeting new people, places and cultures. I stay busy at work or

school. If not that, I'm reading anything I can get my hands on, running, spending time in the great outdoors or chilling with friends and family."

University of Florida mathematics student from Citrus Springs Wyatt Norman died Nov. 6, 2020, as a result of a car crash. He was 22.

Those who knew Wyatt described him as both zany and brilliant. A deep thinker and a scholar, goofy, light-hearted and filled with joy.

Postscript

He was a good listener, gave wise counsel, made people laugh, pointed them toward God.

"At his core, he was about serving God and serving others," said his mother, Kristie Fish. "He would make care packages to give to homeless people in Gainesville, often running out of his own food and toiletries because he gave them all away.

"He sponsored a child in Africa and gave blood every six weeks. He just wanted to express his love for Jesus in how he served people," she said. "The biggest thing about

him was his sweet, tender heart."

Wyatt wanted to be an actuary, compiling and analyzing statistics to use in calculating insurance risks and premiums.

He LOVED math. For him, it was how he worshiped God, understanding that math was always true, that it was what God used to create the universe and uses to sustain it.

"Through math, Wyatt was able to glimpse just a sliver of the beauty of the mind of God," Kristie Fish said.

Wyatt grew up at Seven Rivers Christian School with lifelong friends.

Inverness restructures Valerie Theatre oversight

Inverness City Council members applauded an invigorated, new Valerie Theatre Board and its plans for the facility during a presentation to the council this week.

The council also voted unanimously for a new memorandum of

understanding with the Valerie Board, which shifts operations and financial responsibilities back to the city and allows the theater board to focus on fundraising, community outreach, volunteerism and programming.

The board members told the council this week they managed to increase the board's size from four

members to eight, which will better reflect the city, county and utilize the talents of more members.

After a presentation by board members, council members said the theater was on the right track.

"This is something I've been waiting years to hear," said council president Jacquie Hepfer after the board's presentation.

City Manager Eric Williams said the board made good progress since the council first announced in June that it wanted to change how the city oversaw the operations of the theater.

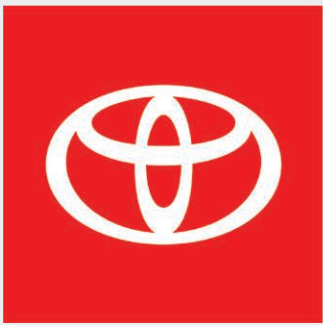
"It's amazing how far the group has come. This is the council's vision as I've heard it," Williams said.

City Mayor Bob Plaisted encouraged the board.

"You're doing a great job and continue to do so," he said.

Laura Lee Ritchie, the board's community outreach committee head, said that she will focus on creating partnerships with community groups and institutions as well as local schools.

Details scarce on local woman’s murder arrest

To protect their ongoing investigations, authorities are mum on details about a Homosassa woman’s arrest for murder out of Marion County.

Starr Mary Hunter, 25, was booked into the county’s jail Wednesday, Nov. 18, 2020, after Citrus County Sheriff’s Office

deputies arrested her Tuesday at her home off of West Pasco Place on a Marion County warrant alleging murder.

Hunter, per her arrest warrant, was jailed without a bond.

Citing Florida public records laws on active criminal investigations, representatives of the Marion County Sheriff’s Office

(MCSO) would not disclose how the homicide occurred between Dec. 26-31, 2019, who the victim is or if others were charged.

“Disclosure of this information could jeopardize the continuing investigation into this matter,” agency spokeswoman Valerie Strong said Thursday in an email. “When we have

further information to release, we will let you know.”

Strong released a heavily-redacted report on when MCSO authorities responded to and questioned Hunter and her unidentified friend on Feb. 1, 2020, about a buried body they told deputies about near a trailer on the 7400 block of Southwest 158th Lane in Dunnellon.

Pair of men face armed robbery, burglary charges

A pair of local young men face charges in connection with ambushing and robbing someone during a meeting over a drug-deal.

Citrus County Sheriff’s Office authorities on Wednesday, Nov. 18, 2020, arrested Strother Jones Natteal, of Homosassa, and Malaki Jaheim Bellamy, of Lecanto, on charges of grand theft, theft of a firearm, aggravated assault, armed burglary and armed robbery.

Bellamy faces an additional charge of battery. His bond was set at \$82,000; Natteal’s was set at \$56,000.

It’s alleged the 18-year-olds robbed

another man Monday near the intersection of West Constitution Lane and South Gettysburg Drive in Homosassa.

According to an arrest report, the man told sheriff’s office detectives Bellamy asked him to meet so Bellamy could pay him back for marijuana.

At the meeting location, down a dirt trail, the man said Bellamy and who would later be identified as Natteal mugged him, robbing him of his wallet, car keys and cellphone.

They also rummaged through the man’s vehicle, stealing marijuana and a firearm Bellamy then used to threaten the man’s life with before he and Natteal ran east on the trail, according to the report.

Child-porn, DUI-manslaughter, road-rage cases appear in court

Joshua Faciane is expected at his next court appearance in Citrus County to change his not-guilty plea in exchange for 10 years in prison for his 50 child-pornography charges.

Joseph Warren, attorney for the Belleview 40-year-old, told Circuit Court Judge Richard “Ric” Howard at Faciane’s Zoom conference hearing Thursday, Nov. 19, 2020, he and his client are in an understanding with the State Attorney’s Office.

Howard scheduled

Faciane’s next court showing for Jan. 12, but told Warren and Faciane an earlier date can be set if agreements are fast tracked.

According to prior reports, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children in July 2019 tipped off the Citrus County Sheriff’s Office High Tech Crimes Unit about Faciane’s alleged ownership of the unlawful images.

Detectives obtained a warrant to search Faciane’s former home in the 5500 block of South Barco Terrace in Inverness, where they seized

numerous digital storage devices and discovered roughly 3,000 illicit pictures and video files.

Faciane moved to Belleview after the raid, and was arrested by the Ocala Police Department in September 2019 on a Citrus County warrant alleging 50 counts of possessing child pornography. Each charge — a third-degree felony — is punishable to up to five years in prison.

Cheryl Lynn Reese, an Auburndale 61-year-old accused of killing her passenger and injuring another motorist in a May

2018 drunk-driving crash, is expected at her Jan. 12 hearing to either change her not-guilty plea or set a trial date.

Howard scheduled Reese’s next court appearance after Assistant State Attorney Rob Lewis told

him Thursday witness depositions were set for early and mid-December.

“It’s old; it’s very old but it’s very serious,” the judge told Lewis and Reese’s attorney, Angelica Jones. “I know you’re doing a lot of working on it.”

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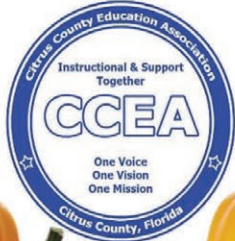

CDC: Don't travel for Thanksgiving

NEW YORK — With the coronavirus surging out of control, the nation's top public health agency advised Americans on Thursday not to travel for Thanksgiving and not to spend the holiday with people from outside their household.

It was some of the firmest guidance yet from the government on curtailing traditional gatherings to fight the outbreak.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention issued the recommendations just one week before Thanksgiving, at a time when diagnosed infections, hospitalizations and deaths are skyrocketing across the country. In many areas, the health care system is being squeezed by a combination of sick patients filling up beds and medical workers falling ill themselves.

The CDC's Dr. Erin Sauber-Schatz cited more than 1 million new cases in the U.S. over the past week as the reason for the new guidance.

The United States has seen more than 11 million diagnosed infections and over 250,000 deaths from the coronavirus. CDC scientists believe that somewhere around 40% of people who are infected do not have obvious symptoms but can still spread the virus.

Pompeo visits Israeli settlement

JERUSALEM — U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo on Thursday became the first top American diplomat to visit an Israeli settlement in the occupied West Bank as the State Department in a major policy shift announced that products from the settlements can be labeled "Made in Israel."

Thanksgiving generosity

The two moves reflected the Trump administration's acceptance of Israeli settlements, which the Palestinians and most of the international community view as a violation of international law and a major obstacle to peace.



Pompeo also announced that the U.S. would brand the international Palestinian-led boycott movement against Israel as "anti-Semitic" and bar any groups that participate in it from receiving government funding. It was not immediately clear which groups would be affected by the move.

Israel captured east Jerusalem and the West Bank in the 1967 war. The Palestinians claim both territories and say the sprawling network of settlements have all but extinguished their hopes for a viable, independent state.

Mexico says no more US trials

MEXICO CITY — Mexico said Thursday it will no longer allow officials accused of corruption to be tried in the United States, a move that could end a decades-old tradition in which most of Mexico's high-profile drug-trafficking and corruption cases have been tried north of the border.

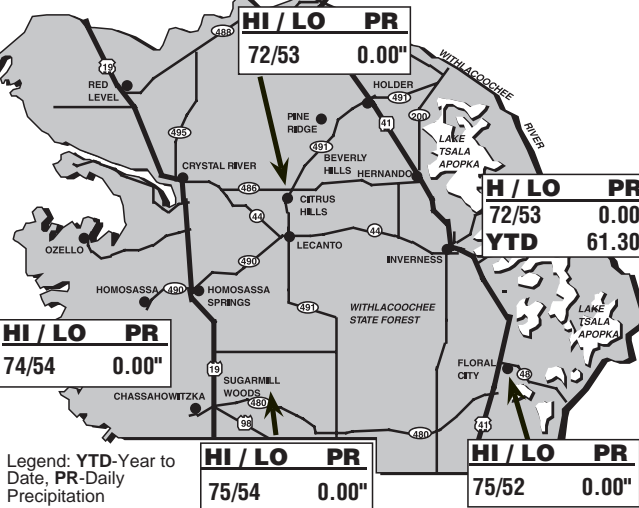
However, the extent of the new policy was unclear, and officials suggested some extraditions could continue.

There was no immediate comment from U.S. officials on Mexico's bombshell statement, but it came one day after the U.S. dropped a high-profile drug trafficking and money laundering case against a former Mexican defense secretary.

The announcement suggests the fallout from the arrest of former Gen. Salvador Cienfuegos — which enraged Mexico when the Justice Department announced it last month — is far broader than previously known.

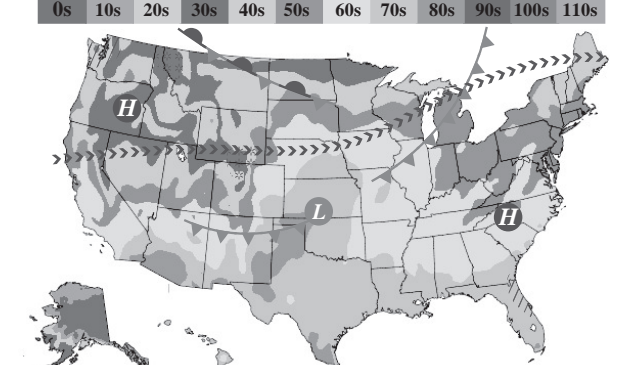

Serial killer blamed for Miami slayings in 1970s

ST. PETERSBURG — Two women who were slain in Miami in the 1970s were killed by the United States' deadliest serial killer, authorities said.

In a memo written by an assistant state attorney in Miami-Dade County on Thursday, Karen O'Donoghue, whose body has never been found, and Dorothy Gibson, who was

strangled outside a Miami hotel in 1977, were killed by Samuel Little, who has confessed to more than 90 killings.

Little, who is 80, is in prison in California and serving multiple life sentences. He won't be charged in the two Miami killings, the memo stated. He's been behind bars since 2012, and in 2018, told investigators he was responsible for about 90 killings nationwide between 1970 and 2005. The FBI said its crime analysts believe all of his

confessions are credible.

Miami Dade Chief Assistant State Attorney Kathleen Hoague wrote in a memo that the O'Donoghue and Gibson cases were being cleared as the "appropriate disposition for us and to give the next of kin closure" after so many years. The memo was first reported by the Miami Herald.

Little said he strangled his 93 victims, nearly all of them women. Some of his victims were on the margins of

society. Many were originally deemed overdoses, or attributed to accidental or undetermined causes. Some bodies were never found.

Little told investigators he met O'Donoghue outside of a home for the mentally ill in the early 1970s. Little knew certain details about O'Donoghue — including that she had been a nurse and that she had menstrual irregularities.

Floral City man charged in child porn case

A Floral City man faces almost a score of child-pornography charges after state authorities discovered illicit videos on his computer.

Florida Department of Law Enforcement Special Agent Dodi Pruitt arrested 35-year-old Patrick James Crocker on Thursday, Nov. 19, 2020.

Crocker was booked into the Citrus County

Detention Facility on one count of distributing child pornography, and 17 counts of possessing child pornography. His total bond was set at \$90,000.

According to Crocker's arrest report, Pruitt began an undercover internet operation between Sept. 15 and Oct. 12, 2020, to identify users sharing child pornography.

Pruitt was able to

download four files and learned they were linked to Crocker's IP address at his home in the 8100 block of East Penbrook Lane, which Pruitt searched

Wednesday after obtaining a warrant.

Crocker, in his interview with Pruitt, denied downloading the files but admitted to coming across them when he was searching for other files, according to his

arrest report.

He said his roommate, who had lived with Crocker from September before he left and was arrested Oct. 1 in Hernando County, also had access to his desktop computer. Pruitt verified Crocker's statement about his roommate's arrest, but noted the files she had downloaded came two weeks after Crocker's roommate moved out.

During a search of Crocker's computer, according to the arrest

report, Pruitt came across more than 200 video files with titles relating to child pornography, depicting children between 6 and 12 years old.

Pruitt downloaded several of the files to be used as evidence. According to an FDLE news release, additional charges may be pending.

However, authorities noticed injuries to Mentz' hands that were consistent with other accounts of the scuffle, giving them probable cause to arrest him.

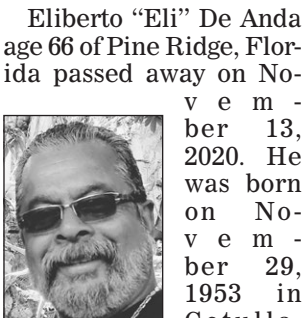

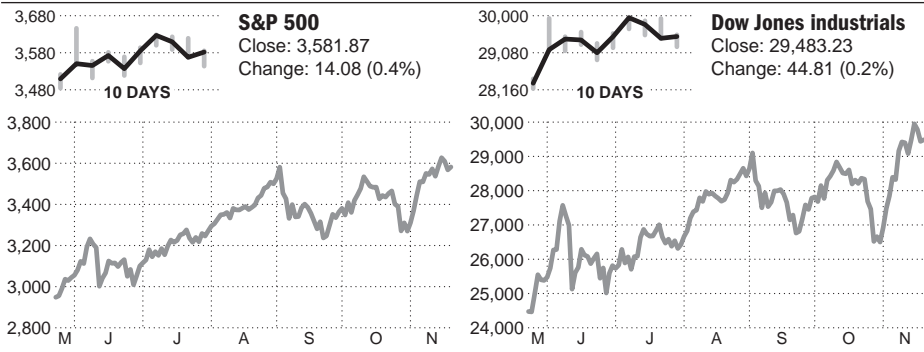

Stocks rise amid tug of war between hope, fear

Wall Street capped a day of choppy trading with modest gains for stocks Thursday, as the market's tug of war continues between worries about the worsening pandemic in the present and optimism that a vaccine will rescue the economy in the future.

The S&P 500 rose 0.4% after spending much of the day flipping between small losses and gains. The benchmark index was coming off a 1.2% slide from the day before that pulled it away from its record of 3,62

DANGEROUS INTERSECTION

Time to stop the carnage

The intersection of County Road 491 and State Road 200 just south of the Withlacoochee river is a poorly-designed, dangerous intersection. This fact has been accepted by state officials, who plan to install a traffic light at the intersection.

While officials are planning, more wrecks are occurring, and more people are dying.

THE ISSUE:

Continuing accidents at intersection of County Road 491 and State Road 200.

OUR OPINION:

Install the traffic light now.

Instead of intersecting squarely, where drivers have clear vision of traffic from either direction, C.R. 491 intersects S.R. 200 at about a 30 to 40 degree angle, which affects visibility for drivers of cars on C.R. 491. There is also a left turn lane on southbound S.R. 200 at the intersection, so if there is a car in the turn lane, the view of cars in the through lane is partially obscured to drivers entering the intersection from C.R. 491.

This means that the driver of a car turning left toward Ocala from C.R. 491 to S.R. 200 is looking back to northbound traffic on S.R. 200 at a sharp angle while also trying to determine if there is a car approaching from the direction of Ocala, if the car in the turn lane is really planning to turn, or if a car in the straight through lane is being hidden by a car in the turn lane.

A momentary loss of vision due to a turning car, or misjudging the speed of cars approaching on a 55 mph

roadway, or even a moment of hesitation, can lead to catastrophic results for someone turning left from C.R. 491 onto S.R. 200.

We will never know which of these caused the wreck that killed 25-year-old Ashley Constantine and injured her young son on Nov. 4, or if it was something else. All we know for sure is that she left work, picked up her 5-year-old son, strapped him in his car seat, and headed for her weekly Wednesday night church service, and as she turned left from C.R. 491 onto S.R. 200 toward Ocala, she pulled into the path of the southbound SUV.

What we also know for sure is that there is not a traffic light at the intersection; a traffic light that would have instructed Ms. Constantino when it was safe to turn, and a signal which would have stopped the SUV as it approached the intersection. This could have prevented this accident, just as it could have prevented previous accidents that have killed or injured motorists.

The danger of the intersection has been repeatedly discussed, and state officials have agreed that a traffic light should be installed. Our question is when? How many more deaths and injuries will there be until the light is installed. Any more of either is too many, so we encourage state officials to act now before these happen.

Tourists turned off by loose restrictions

Our BOCC and animal lovers in the county can view this updated shelter by going online (to) “Levy County Animal Services hosts grand opening for kennel” — WCJB June 17, 2020. Time for our BOCC to stop kicking the can down the road.

■ I am so disgusted with Wednesday’s headline, “Animal shelter gets cold shoulder.” All of my precious animals throughout my life were homeless. Some needed immediate vet care and lots of love, but the love and hope they gave back to me, I wouldn’t trade for \$1 million. I’m

alive because of my pets. They read my moods. They’re close when I’m sick. ... The commissioners have spent millions on consultants for ridiculous projects. They could have built two shelters with the money they’ve wasted. Ruthie (Schlabach), don’t let your guard down. Keep your promise that you’re going to get this done because there are so many needy pets and, in my opinion, they’re smarter than most people, but they’re so cruelly treated.

■ A new animal shelter is needed for Citrus County whether the BOCC has an interest or not. The statement that this new shelter would cost millions is tantamount to a “no” vote. There is a new air-conditioned shelter in Bronson and I believe those folks would share their cost per square foot. Any sixth-grade student in Citrus County could take this square-foot cost and multiply it against the needs for Citrus County for a starting point. I believe “millions” to be a gross exaggeration.

Inmates should pick up trash

Dolphins safety

Scott

dies, 75

Super Bowl
MVP of perfect
1972 season

MIAMI — Jake Scott, the star safety who was the most valuable player in the Super Bowl that completed the Miami Dolphins' 1972 perfect season, died Thursday in Atlanta. He was 75.

Scott died after a fall down a stairway that left him in a coma, former teammate Dick Anderson said.

Scott played in three consecutive Super Bowls, won back-to-back championship rings and made the Pro Bowl five years in a row with Miami. He had two interceptions, including a 55-yard return from the end zone, against Billy Kilmer and the Washington Redskins as the '72 Dolphins won 14-7 to finish 17-0.

Following retirement, Scott became reclusive and harbored hard feelings toward Dolphins coach Don Shula and his coach at Georgia, Vince Dooley. Scott lived for years on a remote Hawaiian island and traveled the world but seldom attended Dolphins or Bulldogs reunions.

He was once close to Shula, but they went without speaking to each other for 28 years, and Scott was one of only two living players to skip the 1972 Dolphins' 25-year celebration in 1997.

The rift finally ended at a memorabilia show in 2010, where Scott and Shula had a brief conversation, shared laughs and posed with other ex-Dolphins for photos. Shula died in May.

Scott played with the Dolphins from 1970 to 1976 and remains their career leader in interceptions and punt return yardage. He also started for the Redskins in 1976-78 and finished with 49 career interceptions.

Scott paired with Anderson to form perhaps the NFL's best safety tandem during that era.

"If I had to be in a foxhole in a war and have somebody cover my backside," Anderson said, "Jake would be my first choice."

At Georgia, Scott was an All-American and the Southeastern Conference Player of the Year in 1968.

In six seasons with Miami, Scott never missed a game.

Offseason sprints forward with free agency

Signings can start as early as today

NBA free agency is usually a weeklong frenzy. Deals get struck, then teams and players must wait a few days before they can sign those contracts. And from there, a few more months often pass before the player goes to work with his new club.

Not this year.

What promises to be a chaotic free-agent window opens in the NBA at 6 p.m. Eastern on Friday, just a couple days after the NBA draft, a mere 42 hours before signings can begin and about a week and a half before training camps around the league open. Asked what the player-movement landscape might look like in such a compressed time-frame, Philadelphia 76ers President Daryl Morey — looking exhausted early Thursday as the draft was winding down — offered a blunt prediction.

“Completely insane,” Morey said.

He may be right.

Deals are expected to start coming quickly Friday evening, and the NBA is investigating whether one — a widely reported sign-and-trade move that would have sent Bogdan Bogdanovic

from Sacramento to Milwaukee — happened earlier than league rules allow. A person with knowledge of the matter told The Associated Press on Thursday that the league is probing whether such an agreement existed, because if it did free-agent negotiations with Bogdanovic would have clearly started earlier than permissible.

The person spoke with AP on condition of anonymity because neither the teams nor the league acknowledged the investigation publicly.

Some deals likely won't take long to get done without raising league ire. Anthony Davis of the NBA champion Los Angeles Lakers is the biggest name on the free agency board; he turned down his option for this season with the Lakers but isn't expected to go anywhere else.

A likely scenario for Davis is to accept a three-year deal worth that would start at \$32.7 million this season and grow each year afterward, with the last year at his option. That way, when he completes his 10th year of service in 2021-22, he can cash in again for an even higher percentage of the salary cap than he would command now.

Gordon Hayward declined his \$34 million option for this season with Boston, a person with knowledge told AP on Thursday, and could potentially now be another big name on the move.

More than 100 other NBA

players are unrestricted free agents; another 75 or so can be restricted free agents. That's a lot of players, who might be doing a lot of moving, with a season coming up very quickly — and only a few teams have plenty of available salary-cap space to sign players easily.

Plus, teams are still figuring out coronavirus protocols for training camp. Nobody has seen the NBA schedule for a regular season that starts Dec. 22. Preseason games start Dec. 11; those haven't even been announced yet.

It's already hectic, and now free agency will ramp up the fever several more levels.

“With free agency starting as quickly as it does, we have some targets in mind there and we've got some other trade conversations going on as well,” said David Griffin, New Orleans' executive vice president of basketball operations.

Some players have even announced their free-agent plans: Udonis Haslem is going to re-sign with Miami for an 18th season, even though the Heat can't talk to him about that until Friday. The Eastern Conference champions will be awaiting decisions from several key players, including point guard Goran Dragic, forward Jae Crowder and center Meyers Leonard.

Villegas and Wallace each finished on the Seaside course at Sea Island with big putts. Villegas capped off a bogey-free round on the ninth hole for his lowest score on the PGA Tour in four years. Wallace hit into a hazard on the 18th and saved par with a 30-foot putt.

What's the ceiling for unexpected unbeatens?

Five G5 teams are still perfect

Before the pandemic forced most schools to tear up their schedules, Marshall had an interesting September slate.

The Thundering Herd was set to play rebuilding East Carolina and perennial MAC contender Ohio on the road and Pittsburgh and Boise State at home in Huntington, West Virginia.

None of those games were played, which is too bad because Marshall has a team that could have won them all.

No. 15 Marshall is one of five teams from outside the Power Five that are unbeaten and ranked in the AP Top 25, along with No. 7 Cincinnati, No. 8 BYU, co-No. 15 Coastal Carolina and No. 21 Liberty.

An unusual college football season has produced some unexpected unbeaten teams dotting the AP Top 25 with about a month left. Led by No. 7 Cincinnati and No. 8 BYU, five teams from outside the Power Five conferences have yet to lose.

What are the reasonable expectations for the five unexpected unbeatens as the season winds down?

No. 7 CINCINNATI

There is a legitimate path to the playoff and it doesn't requires outlandish results. For example: No. 1 Alabama wins out. No. 2 Notre Dame completes a sweep of Clemson. No. 3 Ohio State breezes through the Big Ten.

What becomes of the Bearcats if they do lose an AAC game, but still win the league? Can they fend off the possibility of an undefeated Coastal Carolina or Marshall for the G5's New Year's Six spot? Probably, but don't lose more than once.

No. 8 BYU

The Cougars are an independent and not eligible for that guaranteed spot that goes to the top-ranked Group of Five champion in the big bowls. They have to hope the committee ranks them high enough to get them

into one of the high-profile games. Top 12 should do it.

Next week's ranking will be key for BYU because it has only one more game left after this weekend: San Diego State on Dec. 12. The Cougars are still looking for games to beef up a resume short on rigor.

The Pac-12 has announced it will allow teams to schedule nonconference games on short notice if league opponents have to cancel. Maybe some team's COVID-19 misfortune creates an opportunity for BYU to boost its strength of schedule in December.

No. 15 COASTAL CAROLINA

The Chanticleers, picked last in the Sun Belt, have been a fun story and a quality team. They have at least two major tests left: Defending Sun Belt champion Appalachian State on Saturday and Liberty on Dec. 5. Who would have guessed the latter had a chance to be a battle of unbeatens when it was scheduled in August?

Win out, including a second victory against No. 24 Louisiana-Lafayette in the Sun Belt title game, and the Chants can make solid case to become the first team from its conference to play in a New Year's Six game.

No. 15 MARSHALL

The Thundering Herd clawed back some of the value they lost from their original nonconference schedule when they booked — and beat — App State.

They still have at least two more Conference USA regular-season games and

a league title game to take care of by Dec. 19. The thought of Marshall throwing together a game against BYU sounds fun, but realistically it would be tough to pull off.

“I'd love to play them,” Marshall coach Doc Holliday said. “Ultimately, what you're trying to do when you're in a conference is win a conference championship. The question you have to ask yourself is: Is playing somebody out of conference right now, is that worth it? Maybe it is?”

Marshall's best team since Holliday went 13-1 in 2014 is in danger of landing in a bowl game unbefitting their quality.

No. 21 LIBERTY

It took a while for Liberty to catch on as it played a weak early season schedule and wasn't dominant.

Now the Flames have two victories against ACC teams and could add another Saturday at North Carolina State. An independent, the Flames have no path to the G5's reserved spot in the New Year's Six.

The best resume Liberty could put together doesn't look like something the committee would be impressed with. It will be interesting to see where the Flames rank relative to BYU next week if they do beat NC State.

Nadal ousts Tsitsipas to advance at ATP Finals

Defending champ falls in three sets

LONDON — Rafael Nadal advanced to the semifinals at the ATP Finals for the first time in five years and knocked out the defending champion in the process, beating Stefanos Tsitsipas 6-4, 4-6, 6-2 Thursday at the O2 Arena.

It is the sixth time in 10 appearances that Nadal has reached the last four of the season-ending tournament, which is the biggest title he has yet to win in his illustrious career.

Tsitsipas won it on his first try last year but exited after a second loss of the group stage, done in by a shaky serve in the third set when he was broken three times.

Earlier, the already eliminated Andrey Rublev beat U.S. Open champion Dominic Thiem 6-2, 7-5 in a contest that had little real consequence for either player. Thiem was assured of winning the group after beating Tsitsipas and Nadal in the first two rounds.

Nadal never looked threatened on his serve against Tsitsipas until the final game of the second set, when he double-faulted to hand the

Greek a way back into the match.

“I think I was winning my serves quite comfortably until that moment,” Nadal said. “After that, everything changed.”

Suddenly, neither player could hold serve as the third set started with three straight breaks, with Nadal taking a 2-1 lead. The Spaniard finally held and broke again for a 5-2 lead before clinching the win on his second match point.

“I don’t even know what I was trying to do (in the third set), honestly,” Tsitsipas said. “Trying to be way, way too much aggressive. I was giving him free points without really, himself doing much or hurting me from the back. ... My serve was not there when I needed it, and these guys, you just have to be there. I wasn’t fully present. I wasn’t playing in the moment. Quite disappointed with that. But that’s life.”

Nadal, who improved to 6-1 against Tsitsipas, will play Daniil Medvedev in the semifinals on Saturday. Thiem will face the winner between Novak Djokovic and Alexander Zverev on Friday.

Nadal beat Medvedev at last year’s ATP Finals in a match where the Russian led 5-1 in the third set, but neither advanced from the group stage that time. Now Medvedev is in great form, having won the Paris Masters and his opening two matches in London.

“He’s playing great,” Nadal said. “I think last year he was very tired mentally at the end of the season. I think this year is a different story. He has plenty of confidence.”

The early match between Thiem and Rublev was delayed after the lights went out unexpectedly at the O2 Arena.

Thiem was short of energy, too, when play eventually began.

“It was difficult to keep that amazing intensity like I had in the first two matches,” Thiem said. “I wanted to win the match, 100%, but the first two matches were pretty tough, pretty long.”

“So with the fact I was already qualified, in the back on my mind it was difficult to keep the intensity alive.”

Rublev played like someone with nothing to lose, overwhelming Thiem with his serve and fierce groundstrokes to take the Austrian’s first two service games and clinch the first set in less than 26 minutes. He dropped only three points on serve and had no unforced errors in that set.

The second set was much closer, though Rublev was on top and serving at 4-3 when he lost eight straight points to get back on serve.

Rublev regrouped, broke Thiem after a long next game featuring some intense rallies, then served out the match for his first win in his debut at

the season-ending tournament.

Few people ill argue that this year has been anything but normal. Masks, closures, stay-at-home orders and the "new normal" all come to mind when thinking of 2020.

But, through it all, Citrus County has seen resiliency and community coming together to support one another, for which the Friends of the Library are grateful.

This past July, the Friends of the Citrus County Library System (FOCCLS) board met and came to the painful conclusion that the Fall Mega Book Sale planned for October would have to be canceled. After taking a few weeks to regroup and brainstorm, Friends knew it would need to pivot.

"Our inventory was piling up and we knew that we needed to make a plan and fast," said Sandy Price, FOCCLS president. "Everyone was at home, so they were cleaning off their bookshelves and donating, but with no book sale on the horizon, we were starting to worry about an increasing inventory and options to raise funds for our libraries."

Then, the idea came up: can it host a smaller sale outside? The more the board considered the idea, the more it started to see the beauty in it. The customers could shop in the open air, it would make it easier to social distance and the Friends could start emptying out some of the hundreds of banana boxes that were piling up! Its first "pop-up, mini sale" was at the new depot in Inverness, a perfect place to test the waters.

"We were thrilled with the turnout! Longtime book sale attendees came to us looking for puzzles and bestsellers and new customers who were just browsing stopped by as well," said Joni Billison, a FOCCLS volunteer. "It was exactly what we needed as a board and has been giving us all something to look forward to every couple of weeks. We have a way to raise funds for the library again."

Since the Labor Day weekend sale in September, the Friends have hosted six sidewalk sales this fall. In a typical year, the Friends will raise roughly
