

Citrus County COVID-19 cases still on the rise

According to the Florida Department of Health, 16 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update. One new death was reported, for a total of 433. To date in the county, 10,697 people have tested positive (including 95 nonresidents). Two new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 691 hospitalized. Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

Vaccine registration system open for Citrus

DOH-Citrus' preregistration system to schedule COVID-19 vaccine appointments for all individuals 18 and older and front-line health care workers is now available. Individuals can now be added to a waiting list for vaccine appointments and be notified when appointments are available in Citrus County by visiting myvaccine.fl.gov or by calling 866-201-0442; TTY is 833-476-1036. As part of the statewide preregistration system, each county has a designated number that individuals can call and preregister with if they do not have internet access. Citrus County's designated helpline number is 833-540-2058. Vaccine supply remains limited and appointments may not be available for several weeks.

Director or not, ready for storm

Search still on track for leader of Citrus County emergency management

Hurricane season is only a little over a month away and there is a chance Citrus County will have a permanent emergency management director in place by then. But even if it doesn't, there are no worries, said Col. Elena Vitt with the Citrus County

Sheriff's Office. Interim Director Troy Hess and his staff are "very capable" of handling a storm or other emergency that arises, she said. Vitt said the search is progressing smoothly. To date, the emergency management office has received 15 applications. Of those, 10-11 appear qualified, she said. "I definitely feel we're on

track," Vitt said. In February, the county started putting together a job description for EOC director and applicants would be vetted through a hiring committee. The salary range is from \$58,968 to \$90,854. The committee includes County Administrator Randy Oliver and representatives from the sheriff's office, Florida Department of

Health in Citrus County, the school district, county fire department and the cities of Crystal River and Inverness. "Our first hiring panel meeting is coming up in a week and a half," Vitt said. The interview process follows that meeting.

Self-taught Dunnellon artist: inspiration, determination

A master diver and self-taught marine sculpture artist has invented a unique method of sculpting that combines his two loves. "I went off the beaten path and did it my own way," Wilchynski said. Wilchynski was born in Gulfport and grew up by the water. Has always loved the ocean, but his passion for sculpting came later in life. Before becoming a sculptor, he was trying to learn how to paint. "My painting was not that good," Wilchynski said as he laughed.

However, he remembered enjoying sculpting in his high school art class. "I went home and started working on some simple sculptures," he said. "One thing led to another and I started doing a lot of different ocean-type sculptures." He garners inspiration from his many ocean adventures. "I try to do a study of each piece before I work on it," Wilchynski said. He's observed everything from flying fish and sea turtles in Barbados to sailfish in Panama. "Every piece I've done usually has a story behind it," Wilchynski said.

Unused, not wasted

Website offers quick turnaround with vaccines

In the frenzy that followed the release of several COVID vaccines earlier this year, some found it exceedingly frustrating not being able to get a scheduled appointment through the Publix website. Additionally, getting up in the dark morning was not appealing to drive to the first-come, first-served Citrus Department of Health location. Add to that, having to wait for hours in line and then be told the number of available vaccines had been filled at that site added to that frustration. Although the vaccine issues have leveled out, as over 190 million Americans have received at least one dose, according to the CDC's COVID Data Tracker, there are still many in Citrus County who do not have the shot. As of April 11, only a little more than 25% of the county's population has been fully vaccinated. The latest COVID surge validates the need for more people to get the vaccine. Although seniors were the only age group not in the surge, younger people were.

Nick plays varsity basketball at LHS and has been chosen both his sophomore and junior year for the Citrus County All-Star basketball team.

HOW YOUR LAWMAKERS VOTED

Key votes for the week ending April 16. By Voterama in Congress

- **EQUAL PAY FOR WOMEN:** Voting 217 for and 210 against, the House on April 15 passed a bill (HR 7) to tighten current federal law against gender-based wage discrimination and prevent employers from paying women less than men for equivalent work. **Daniel Webster, No.**
- **SELF-POLICING BY EMPLOYERS:** By a vote of 183 for and 244 against, the House rejected on April 15 a proposed amendment to HR 7 that would have allowed employers accused of wage discrimination to avoid penalties if during the previous three years they had conducted a job and wage analysis and taken steps to remedy any disparities based on sex that the audit revealed. **Daniel Webster, Yes.**

- **PROTECTING HEALTH CARE WORKERS FROM VIOLENCE:** Voting 254 for and 116 against, the House on April 16 passed a bill (HR 1195) to order new Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) rules protecting health care and social service employees from workplace violence. **Daniel Webster did not vote.**
- **WENDY SHERMAN, DEPUTY SECRETARY OF STATE:** By a vote of 56 for and 42 against, the Senate on April 13 confirmed the nomination of Wendy R. Sherman to the number two position at the State Department. **Marco Rubio, Rick Scott, No.**
- **POLLY TROTTEBERG, DEPUTY TRANSPORTATION SECRETARY:** Voting 82 for and 15 against, the Senate on April 13 confirmed the nomination of Polly E.

Trottenberg, 57, to the second-ranking post at the Transportation Department. **Marco Rubio, Rick Scott, No.**

■ **GARY GENSLER, CHAIR OF SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION:** By a vote of 53 for and 45 against, the Senate on April 14 confirmed the nomination of Gary Gensler as chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission, the body that regulates Wall Street and publicly traded companies. **Marco Rubio, Rick Scott, No.**

■ **Key votes ahead:** The House will take up a bill conferring statehood on the District of Columbia in the week of April 19, while the Senate will debate a COVID-related hate crimes bill.

Today's Highlight: On April 19, 1995, a truck bomb destroyed the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City, killing 168 people.

On this date: In 1775, the American Revolutionary War began with the battles of Lexington and Concord.

In 1943, during World War II, tens of thousands of Jews in the Warsaw Ghetto began a valiant but ultimately futile battle against Nazi forces.

In 1993, the 51-day siege at the Branch Davidian compound near Waco, Texas, ended as fire destroyed the structure after federal agents began smashing their way in; about 80 people, including two dozen children and sect leader David Koresh, were killed.





In Mexico, he saw a school of blue tangs while diving with his daughter. "I surprised her and made her a school of blue tangs that hangs on her wall now," Wilchynski said.

He hopes that every time his daughter looks at the sculpture throughout her lifetime, she'll remember that moment with her father.

Wilchynski is inspired by Guy Harvey and Robert Wyland, both artists and conservationists. He also draws inspiration from his close friend and mentor, Curtis Arnett, who is a part of the famed group of painters, the Florida Highwaymen.

When Wilchynski first began sculpting, he attempted to take his finished clay molds to a bronze foundry. However, they were unable to help him because his sculpting is too intricate.

"Being upset, I went home and started to make molds," Wilchynski said.

One of his favorite pieces to date is his lionfish sculpture, which consists of 14 molds and pieces, took six months and cost him a small fortune.

"It doesn't matter how long it takes, I want it to look how I want it to look," Wilchynski said. With this determination, and no one to make molds for him, he developed his own technique. "They're not metal, they're not wood, they're in between."

First, he sculpts with polymer clay and fires it.

"Once it's hard, I cut all the pieces," Wilchynski explained. He then makes silicone molds and pours resin into them with rods and pins to hold everything in place.

Then, he's tasked with assembling the pieces together again to look like the original. Finally, he sands it and coats it with his unique blend of patina chemicals.

Patina is what gives the sculptures "anything from lime green to a rust color," Wilchynski said. Although he can reuse his molds, the patina is what makes each piece unique.

He explained that it's up to Mother Nature to determine how the sculpture comes out depending on how the metal reacts with temperature conditions.

The use of patina also allow him to make his art more affordable than a typical bronze sculpture. They range anywhere from \$400 to \$1,200. Buyers get a "nice piece without the crazy prize," Wilchynski said.

"If anyone wants to see how I do it, I don't mind showing them," Wilchynski added. He isn't worried about other artists trying to replicate his method because it's simply just too complicated.

The most important thing to Wilchynski is to make his sculptures as realistic as possible. Biologists have commented that his sculptures capture the natural movement of the sea creatures.

He explained that it feels great to get

that kind of validation after all of his hard work.

Currently, Wilchynski is working on two of his largest sculptures to date. One depicts a tuna in a feeding frenzy and the other captures three jellyfish floating in the current.

Wilchynski began trying to sell his pieces right when COVID-19 hit but kept persisting even as art shows got canceled. "I'll keep at it," he said.

His persistence carries over into other parts of his life as well. Wilchynski is now a three time cancer survivor. "I'm happy for every day," he said.

Wilchynski is also the owner of Sun-coast Garage Doors & Operator Company Inc. and Butterflyworkx Butterfly Farm, both in Dunnellon.

However, his passion lies with art.

"I'd like to be able to do full time if I can," Wilchynski said. He is also extremely passionate about wildlife conservation.

Wilchynski expressed his shock at the recent incident in January when someone carved "Trump" into the algae covering the back of a manatee.

When "Guardians of the Galaxy" star Dave Bautista offered a \$20,000 award to anyone who could turn in the person, Wilchynski sent him a manatee sculpture to thank him for his efforts.

Wilchynski hopes to become a well-known collectable artist and he's already starting to gain quite the following. "We'll see where it goes," he said.

You'll know you've come across a Wilchynski piece when you see his signature trident medallion at the base, the symbol of Neptune and mark of his love for the ocean.

This younger group is socially active, attends bars and restaurants indoors with friends and goes to college.

They are now are eligible for the vaccine (the age was lowered to 18 recently) and the need is there for them to help slow this pandemic.

COVID vaccines are more readily available now, but if someone doesn't show up for their appointment, that dose could go to waste.

Once the vial is punctured, it can be placed back into the refrigerator at between 36 degrees and 77 degrees, but it must be discarded after 12 hours, per the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Until now, those vials, if not used, would have to be thrown away. However, recently, the website, "Dr. B - The Standby List for

COVID Vaccines" has become available in Citrus County to solve that problem.

Dr. B was launched in January with vaccine providers partnering to make sure unused vaccines would not be wasted.

Dr. B will send a text to the local registered user, but they will have a limited window of time to get to the provider and receive that dose. The site is free for both providers and vaccine recipients.

The website is named after the grandfather of the founder, Cyrus Masoumi, a technology executive and investor.

His grandfather was a physician, whose nickname was "Dr. Bubba."

During the Spanish flu pandemic, the grandfather had provided care to the Spanish flu patients.

When you register online, you provide your cell phone number. A code will immediately be sent to your phone.

Once you've entered the code and gone to the next

page, you fill in your name, ZIP code, (which is used to determine the location of the vaccine site), date of birth, email address, your occupation and health conditions.

Once the vaccine is available, a text message is sent. You then have to confirm that text, in order to receive the exact location of the provider.

Worried about your personal information? Dr. B uses "bank-level encryption" to protect that and they "will not sell, share, or transfer your data to any third-parties, other than as set forth in our privacy policy," according to its website.

Why not register to help yourself and prevent a COVID dose from being wasted?

To register on Dr. B is free, as well as the COVID vaccine.

The pandemic is not over

The entire country is COVID-weary. Everyone has had enough. The economy has suffered, our kids cannot go back to school, our lives are in turmoil. But finally there is some hope. The number of cases and deaths have been on a steady decline. We have three vaccines that are becoming more available. So we ask, is it over yet?

Several states seem to have decided it is over, including Florida. Our Gov. DeSantis says the state is open, there are no restrictions. He says people can live their lives as they see fit. As a result, restaurants and bars are crowded, beaches are packed, masks are considered an unnecessary burden.

The vaccination record in Florida is quoted as proof that all is well. As of early April we have about 3.6 million fully vaccinated. That is good. But the population of Florida is 21.5 million, plus millions of visitors on any given day. So at least 85% of all the people in Florida are not fully vaccinated and they are all at risk.

Also, let’s look at the case numbers. In January 2021 we had about 100,000 new cases every week. In February, this number dropped to less than half. In March, the number stabilized at about 33,000 every week, still too many. Now the daily numbers are again increasing and the first

Opposition to voter law invalid

In recent years, some question of the use of voter ID is required to prevent fraud at the polls or whether showing an ID before voting is an unfair restriction on the right to vote.

Opponents of voter photo ID like to claim that this is an unfair imposition and insurmountable hurdle to voting. The requirement, they claim, will make people feel it is too difficult to vote and therefore reduce voter turnout at elections, especially among the poor and minorities. But is this a valid point?

Complaints against voter ID requirements is the thought that requiring voters to pay to

obtain ID is a defacto poll tax and can prevent poor and black people from casting their votes. ID they claim, is costly to obtain, and they claim that large percentages of various minorities don’t have access to a photo ID. Georgia and other states offer free voter ID. When I lived in New Jersey, I got a free photo ID from Monmouth County. They came to our community and anyone who wanted an ID just went to the community center and got their photo taken and their ID card in less than five minutes.

Recently, Stacey Adams said around 200,000 minorities will be disenfranchised if photo ID is required to vote in Georgia. This claim is hyperbole. The reality is the photo ID is required to do a lot of things: board an airplane, cruise ship, train; cash a check; drive a motor vehicle; apply for a business license; secure employment; purchase a house; rent a car; purchase a firearm; get a hunting/fishing license; purchase alcoholic beverages; purchase tobacco; purchase a motor vehicle; purchase prescription medicine; purchase over-the-counter medicine containing pseudoephedrine; serve on jury duty; open a bank account.

The committee will recommend the best candidates to Citrus County Sheriff Mike Prendergast, who will make his selection and bring it to county commissioners for final approval.

Commissioners in February agreed to leave the emergency management department in the hands of the sheriff's office after Prendergast told the board he would be able to run operations more cost effectively than the county.

The emergency management director's duties include emergency management planning and response and recovery for all county disasters.

Hurricane season runs from June 1 to Nov. 30 and forecasters are already predicting an above-average season.

The Sarasota-based Climate Adaptation Center (CAC) forecasts 20 named storms, 10 which should be hurricanes. Five of those will be classified as major hurricanes (Category 3-5), the CAC said.

The greatest threat for Florida's west coast will come in October when the worst storms often form

and the climatology favors hits from storms forming in the Yucatan area, the CAC said.

Citrus County fared rather well during the 2020 hurricane season.

The worst storm came in November when Hurricane Eta slogged its way through the Gulf of Mexico and hit north of Citrus County as a weak tropical system.



Egypt: 11 killed in train crash north of Cairo

CAIRO — A passenger train derailed Sunday north of Cairo, killing at least 11 people, Egyptian authorities said.

Four train wagons ran off the railway at the city of Banha in Qalyubia province, just outside Cairo, the railway authority said in a statement. Videos on social media showed wagons overturned and passengers escaping to safety along the railway.

The train was travelling to the Nile Delta city of Mansoura from the Egyptian capital, the statement said.

The Health Ministry said in a statement that besides the dead, at least 98 people were injured, with most of them suffering from broken bones, cuts and bruises.

At least 60 ambulances were sent to the scene and the injured were taken to nearby hospitals, the ministry added.

Salvage teams could be seen searching for survivors and removing the derailed wagons. It was not immediately clear what caused the train to derail. Prosecutors said they were investigating the causes of the crash.

The state-run Ahram daily reported that authorities have detained at least 10 railway officials, including the train driver and his assistant, pending an investigation into the crash.

Sunday's train accident came three weeks after two passenger trains collided in the province of Sohag, killing at least 18 people and injuring 200 others.

Japanese leader asks Pfizer for more vaccines

TOKYO — Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga asked the U.S. drug maker Pfizer Inc. for additional supplies of the COVID-19 vaccine to speed up his country's inoculation drive, which lags behind many other nations.

Suga, after holding talks with President Joe Biden at the White House, wrapped up his Washington visit on Saturday with a phone call to Pfizer CEO Albert Bourla.

Taro Kono, a Cabinet minister tasked with vaccinations, told a Japanese television talk show Sunday that the two sides have "practically reached an agreement" over the vaccines.

Suga requested Bourla provide additional supplies that would cover all eligible recipients by September, as well as to ensure the stable and prompt delivery of the ongoing vaccine shipments, Japanese officials said Sunday.

According to the officials, Bourla told Suga that Pfizer planned to closely coordinate with the Japanese.

Japan, with its domestic vaccine development still in the early stages, has to rely on imports and has signed agreements with Pfizer, AstraZeneca and Moderna. The Pfizer vaccine is the only one Japan has approved so far.

Japan's government says it has secured 314 million doses, enough to cover its entire population by the end of this year.

Climate cooperation

US, China agree to meet crisis with urgency

SEOUL, South Korea — The United States and China, the world's two biggest carbon polluters, agreed to cooperate to curb climate change with urgency, just days before President Joe Biden hosts a virtual summit of world leaders to discuss the issue.

The agreement was reached by U.S. special envoy for climate John Kerry and his Chinese counterpart Xie Zhenhua during two days of talks in

Shanghai last week, according to a joint statement.

The two countries "are committed to cooperating with each other and with other countries to tackle

the climate crisis, which must be addressed with the seriousness and urgency that it demands," said the statement, issued Saturday evening U.S. time.

Meeting with reporters

in Seoul on Sunday. Kerry said the language in the statement is "strong" and that the two countries agreed on "critical elements on where we have to go." But the former secretary of state said, "I learned in diplomacy that you don't put your back on the words, you put on actions. We all need to see what happens."

China is the world's biggest carbon emitter, followed by the United States. The two countries pump out nearly half of the fossil fuel fumes that are warming the planet's atmosphere. Their cooperation is key to the success of global efforts to curb climate change, but frayed ties over human rights, trade and China's territorial claims to Taiwan and the South China Sea have been threatening to undermine such efforts.

Navalny's team calls for protests

MOSCOW — Associates of imprisoned Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny called Sunday for massive protests in the heart of Moscow and St. Petersburg on Wednesday, saying Navalny's health is deteriorating severely during a hunger strike.

Leonid Volkov, a top strategist for Navalny, said the demonstrations were called with three days' notice because "his life hangs in the balance ... We don't know how long he can hold on. But it is clear we do not have time."

The 44-year-old Navalny, President Vladimir Putin's most visible and

persistent critic, started a hunger strike more than three weeks ago to protest prison authorities' refusal to allow him to be seen by a private doctor. He says he is suffering from severe back pain and loss of feeling in his legs, and that the medical care in prison inadequate; the Russian penitentiary service says he is getting appropriate care.

Several doctors went Sunday to the prison colony about 60 miles east of Moscow where Navalny is serving time but were not allowed in to see him.

"It's cruel and monstrous to deny access to a dying patient," Anastasia Vasilyeva, the head of a Navalny-

backed doctors' union, said outside the prison.

A doctor said Saturday that test results he received from Navalny's family showed sharply elevated levels of potassium, which could lead to cardiac arrest, and signs of kidney failure.

"Our patient could die at any moment," the doctor, Yaroslav Ashikhmin, said.

There was no immediate comment from police or government officials about the call for protests, but the response is likely to be harsh. Police arrested more than 10,000 people during nationwide protests in January demanding Navalny's freedom.



Auction brings Ted Williams to NFT market

BOSTON — Teddy Ballgame is about to become Teddy Blockchain.

Hall of Famer Ted Williams is coming to the digital memorabilia market with a release of nine different cards that follow the No. 9's career from skinny rookie to Cooperstown inductee. The collectors' items offered by Williams' daughter are hand drawn by Brazilian illustrator Andre Maciel, known as Black Madre, who created the non-fungible tokens for football star Rob Gronkowski that sold out last month for \$1.6 million.

"I wrote to him. I told him who I was. I said, 'My dad is Ted Williams.' I said, 'Here's what I want to do.'" Claudia Williams said, adding that she didn't know whether Maciel would be familiar with the baseball star.

"For all he knows, I'm just some person reaching out saying, 'Hey, could you make me some NFTs?'" she said. "Just the respect that he showed the art, I know that he knows who Ted Williams is."

Eight cards come in limited editions numbered 1-9, with the ninth — titled "The Splendid Splinter" — a one-of-a-kind release that comes with an autographed bat, three autographed pictures and an Airbnb stay at a house Williams lived in in Vermont. Each of the 73 cards include the digital autograph of the Red Sox slugger, who remains the last major leaguer to bat .400, hitting .406 in 1941.

The collection also recognizes Williams' achievements as a fishing hall of famer and a fighter pilot who missed parts of five seasons to serve in WWII and the Korean War. Claudia Williams wrote the text on the back of each card.

The auction begins Monday and runs through Saturday.

Jay Bruce retires after Sunday's game

NEW YORK — Jay Bruce had seen enough. Having made the New York Yankees' opening-day roster, he couldn't stomach his poor start to the season.

So the three-time All-Star outfielder decided to retire Sunday, just 15 days past his 34th birthday. "Just the consistent underperformance for me," he said before the game against Tampa Bay, his voice quavering at times. "Felt like I wasn't able to do it at a level that was acceptable for myself."

Bruce informed Yankees manager Aaron Boone of his decision during a 20-minute meeting in the manager's office on Friday, then made a public announcement before Sunday's game. Bruce received an ovation when shown on the video board before the eighth inning but did not get in the game.

He hit .118 with one homer and three RBIs in 39 plate appearances this year. He started the first eight games at first base but just two of the next seven.

Bruce had a .244 average with 319 homers and 951 RBIs in 14 major league seasons with Cincinnati (2008-16), the New York Mets (2016-18), Cleveland (2017), Seattle (2019), Philadelphia (2019-20) and the Yankees.

Federer set to play at the French Open

PARIS — Roger Federer announced Sunday he will play at the French Open, and the Swiss star is preparing for it on home clay at a tournament in Geneva next month.

The 20-time Grand Slam champion revealed his plans on his official Twitter page.

"Happy to let you know that I will play Geneva and Paris. Until then I will use the time to train. Can't wait to play in Switzerland again," Federer wrote.

Federer will aim for his 104th career title at the Geneva Open, which takes place May 16-22 — shortly before Roland Garros begins in Paris on May 30.

Rays finish off Bronx sweep as the last-place Yankees lose 5th straight

NEW YORK — Gerrit Cole shook his head, disgusted. Aaron Hicks put hands on hips and bowed his head. By the end of the afternoon, pretty much all of the New York Yankees were appalled, along with their loudly booing fans.

Yoshi Tsutsugo hit a tiebreaking double off Cole in the seventh inning that lifted the Tampa Bay Rays to a 4-2 win Sunday and a three-game sweep that extended the Yankees' losing streak to five games. New York fell to an AL-worst 5-10, its poorest start since 1997.

"I'm frustrated, personally frustrated," said AL batting champion DJ LeMahieu, who concluded the Yankees were "tight and pressing."

"No one's going to feel sorry for us," he said. "No one's going to throw softer or throw easier for us. We've got to find it within ourselves to continue to get better and play the way we're capable of."

Opener Andrew Kittredge, Ryan Yarbrough (1-2), Diego Castillo and Jeffrey Springs (first big league save) combined on the Rays' second three-hitter of a series in which New York managed 11 hits in all. Tampa Bay outscored the

Yankees 17-7, and New York pushed across just three runs other than on homers.

"We got great players in that room," Yankees manager Aaron Boone insisted. "They do know that at their core, obviously, we're getting punched in the mouth right now."

Cole (2-1) was hurt by slipshod defense that made three mistakes in the Rays' two-run third inning alone, two by Hicks in center and one by Clint Frazier in left. One of the three runs off Cole was unearned, giving the Yankees a major league-high 10.

Joey Wendle added a ninth-inning homer off Darren O'Day, prompting boos from the crowd of 10,606, who saved their loudest jeers for the final out.

New York has lost five straight for the first time since Sept. 4-8, getting outscored 30-14.

"You have to strap your boots on and wade through the mud a little bit," Cole said. "If we stay in that mindset and we leave the field every day exhausted, good things are on the horizon, but I don't have the magic wand. I don't know when it's going to turn."

Aaron Judge struck out three times and is 4 for his last 28, Hicks has 1 hit in

his last 15 at-bats, Gleyber Torres 3 in his last 24, and Giancarlo Stanton, despite a second-inning home run, is 3 for his last 26. Frazier is 1 for his last 24 and does not have an RBI in 40 plate appearances this season.

New York's batting average is down to .210, one point above AL-worst Cleveland.

Boone said his hitters have to guard against "being obsessed with chasing a result, which is hard to do when you get off to a slow start individually. You want to get a hit so bad that that can sometimes work against you."

Yarbrough allowed one run and two hits in five innings, and the Rays beat the Yankees for the 16th time in 21 meetings, including in last year's Division Series. Tampa Bay swept a series for the second time in its last three visits to Yankee Stadium after sweeping just two of their previous 51 series of three games or more in the Bronx.

"It's just not an easy thing to do. It doesn't happen very often," Rays manager Kevin Cash said. "So you've got to enjoy it when it does."

Cole retired 13 in a row before Wendle singled with one out in the seventh. See SWEEP/Page B3

Palou get 1st IndyCar victory in Ganassi debut

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — Alex Palou celebrated his move to Chip Ganassi Racing with his first career IndyCar victory by beating a pair of series champions to win Sunday's season-opening race at Barber Motorsports Park.

The Spaniard used a two-stop strategy on the picturesque permanent road course to take control of the race but still had to hold off hard-charging Will Power and Scott Dixon over the closing laps. The 24-year-old beat Power by .4016 seconds to claim his first win in his first race driving for the storied Ganassi organization.

"We knew (a win) was possible because we knew we had the best team and the best cars," Palou said. "It's amazing to be part of the winning drivers."

Dixon, the six-time and reigning IndyCar champion, finished third and was followed by pole-sitter Pato O'Ward, who was on a three-stop strategy.

Strasburg on IL with right shoulder inflammation

WASHINGTON — The Washington Nationals placed right-handed pitcher Stephen Strasburg on the 10-day injured list Sunday because of right shoulder inflammation.

The 2019 World Series MVP was set to start against the Arizona Diamondbacks. He was replaced by right-hander Paolo Espino after the Nationals selected his contract. It was the fourth career start for the 34-year-old Espino.

"We shut him down, put him on the IL," manager Dave Martinez said.

"He had to get an MRI on the shoulder. He's got some inflammation on his shoulder so we want to be smart. There's going to be no timetable when he comes back. Hopefully we get him back soon," he said.

The move was retroactive to April 15. Strasburg, 32, is 0-1 with a 6.30 ERA in two starts this season. His move to the IL was retroactive to Thursday.

Twins-A's postponed Monday for virus issues

OAKLAND, Calif. — The game between Minnesota and the Oakland Athletics scheduled for Monday night at the Coliseum has been postponed because of the Twins' continued COVID-19 problems.

Major League Baseball made the announcement Sunday and said the delay will allow for continued virus testing and contact tracing. MLB said the Twins and A's are tentatively scheduled for a straight doubleheader Tuesday as a makeup.

Games between the Twins and the Los Angeles Angels in Anaheim were postponed Saturday and Sunday.

The Twins have had at least four positive coronavirus tests in the past week.

Tsitsipas captures the Monte Carlo Masters title

MONACO — Stefanos Tsitsipas won the Monte Carlo Masters without dropping a set, beating Andrey Rublev 6-3, 6-3 on Sunday for his first title this year and sixth overall.

Fourth-seeded Tsitsipas was in dominant form as he edged 4-3 ahead of the sixth-seeded Russian in their career meetings, having also beaten him on clay last year in the French Open quarterfinals.

"I had an unbelievable week. It is incredible that I am able to be in the position that I am ... I would consider it as the best week of my life so far," Tsitsipas said. "There were a lot of nerves coming into that match. Playing Andrey was a very difficult thing to do today, also considering that it was a final. I am definitely proud of the way I managed to behave on the court."

"This one is for Rowdy and his family. Miss him and Blakley every day," Bowman said.

Bowman's victory in the No. 48 Chevrolet for Hendrick Motorsports came on the same day the former driver of the car, seven-time champion Jimmie Johnson, made his debut in the IndyCar Series in Alabama. It was the first victory for the No. 48 since June 4, 2017.

Johnson was the only driver of the No. 48 when it was formed in 2001 and Bowman was hand-picked by sponsor Ally to replace him.

Bowman overcame a penalty on lap 247 for a loose tire on pit road to rally for the win.

For Hamlin, it was the third defeat in three races.

At the dirt race at Bristol Motor Speedway he didn't do enough to move Joey Logano out of his way to earn the win, and last week at Martinsville Speedway he was caught late by Joe Gibbs Racing teammate Martin Truex Jr.

In Richmond, Hamlin raced with the hashtag #fedexstrong on the back of his car and on his pit wall to honor the eight people who were fatally shot at a FedEx facility in Indianapolis on Thursday. He again had the dominant car and led 207 of the 400 laps. He's led 483 laps the last two weeks.

"First and foremost, we want to think of all of the families in Indy right now," Hamlin said. "Awful tragedy to happen there. Our thoughts and prayers are with these names. We will get (wins). We will keep digging. We are dominating — just have to finish it."

Hamlin won the first two stages and notched his eighth top-five finish in nine starts this season.

"We just didn't take off quite as good there at the end. I tried to warm it up and do everything that I could

— just the 48 had a little more on those last few laps and I couldn't hold the bottom," Hamlin said.

Last week, he led 276 laps at Martinsville Speedway, but lost the lead to Truex with 15 laps to go.

Hamlin did hang on Sunday to finish second, followed by Logano, Christopher Bell and Truex, who led 107 laps and overcame a penalty for speeding on pit road. Kyle Busch finished eighth, the second week in a row that all four JGR drivers finished in the top 10.

"Denny and I had a hell of a race," Logano said. "It was pretty fun there for a minute, but here we are third. It stings. We were up there all day."

"The 48 kind of snookered everybody."

WIPEOUT

Kevin Harvick raced in the top 10 for much of the race but his day was ruined about 20 laps from the end when a blown tire sent him into the Turn 1 wall. He finished 24th.

Cink-cess! Cink wins 3rd RBC Heritage title

HILTON HEAD ISLAND, S.C. — The golf was exceptional for Stewart Cink. What made his third RBC Heritage title truly special was that his family was there to experience his age-defying success.

Cink hugged son Reagan, his caddie, after he closed out his four-shot victory at Harbour Town with a stress-free par on the lighthouse-framed 18th hole. Wife Lisa, their other son, Connor, and his fiancée, Jess Baker, were in the gallery cheering Cink's second win this season.

"To have a posse like that waiting at the end to celebrate with," Cink said, "it's just an experience you don't get to have in your life that often."

Maybe the Cink family has more such joyous moments ahead with Stewart's resurgence on the PGA Tour.

He shot a steady, stress-free 70 to cap off a dominant, record-breaking week at an age — 47 — when many players are looking ahead to the PGA Tour Champions.

Instead, it was Cink

finishing four better than Emiliano Grillo and Harold Varner III. Grillo shot a 68 while Varner, who had the highest finish of his career, fired a 66.

The 30-year-old Varner took found plenty of encouragement in the man who beat him.

"He's old and he's kicking everyone's (butt)," Varner said. "Yeah, it inspires me. It inspires me to know that I can play golf for a long time."

The Cinks had their arms around each other to celebrate.

"I don't even know if I have the words," Stewart Cink said.

He won for the second time this season — only he and Bryson DeChambeau have done that. He broke an 11-year winless drought in the season's first tournament, the Safeway Open back in September.

That one seemed to come out of nowhere. But Cink backed it up with four more top-20 finishes, including a tie for 12th last week at the Masters.

He won \$1.278 million, nearly as much as the \$1.404 million for his two previous victories at Harbour Town combined.

The second win comes

with a major perk — Cink earned an exemption into the U.S. Open at Torrey Pines in June. It will be the first U.S. Open since 2017 for the former British Open champion.

Cink became the fourth player to win twice in the same PGA Tour season after turning 47. Sam Snead, Julius Boros and Kenny Perry, who accomplished it twice, are the others.

Cink put on a show for the ages by shooting 16-under 126 in the first two rounds — shattering the lowest 36-hole score at Harbour Town of 13-under 129 shared by Jack Nicklaus and Phil Mickelson. Cink added a 69 on Saturday to reach 18 under, two better than Justin Leonard's 54-hole score in 2002.

Cink carried a five-shot lead into the final round and dared all chasers to come get him. Nobody made a run at Cink, who led by at least three shots throughout.

PGA Championship winner Collin Morikawa, paired with Cink, opened with a birdie. But bogeys on the second and fourth holes took Morikawa out of the mix.

Maverick McNealy had

five birdies on the front nine to climb to 14-under, four back of Cink, in the middle of the round. Consecutive bogeys on the 11th and 12th ended McNealy's surge.

Grillo and Varner came the closest at 15-under and

were just three back until Cink's final birdie at the par-3 17th, which made it all but certain he would add another plaid winner's jacket to the ones he won in 2000 and 2004.

Catlin beats Kieffer on 5th playoff hole at Austrian Open

ATZENBRUGG, Austria — John Catlin beat Maximilian Kieffer on the fifth playoff hole on to win the Austrian Open for his third European Tour title.

The American easily wrapped up the victory after three shots from Kieffer landed in the water. The German earlier had a promising chance for his first tour victory, but narrowly missed a birdie putt at the first playoff hole.

"It's kind of relief. Kind of thought that playoff was never going to end and that we kept going back and forth," Catlin, who finished on 14-under 274, told Austrian TV.

"It's obviously nice to win but you never want to see your opponent finish like that. That's difficult."

It was Catlin's third win in 45 appearances, and the 246th win by an American golfer on the European Tour. Catlin has 10 wins worldwide, including four on the Asian Tour.

"Winning is never easy, it doesn't matter what tour you are playing on. So, to get this one is definitely special," the American said.

"I'd like to crack that top 50 in the world, just to get a chance to play in some more major championships. I never actually played in a major but I think this gives me a very good chance to play in the PGA Championship."

Stricker rallies to win Chubb Classic in his Florida home

NAPLES — Steve Stricker

figured someone could come out of the pack with a low score and win the Chubb Classic, and it turned out to be him.

Stricker closed with a 5-under 67, taking control with a wedge into 3 feet for birdie on the 16th hole. That carried him to a one-shot victory in Naples, where the 54-year-old from Wisconsin makes his winter home.

The U.S. Ryder Cup captain won for the sixth time on the PGA Tour Champions, his first title since the U.S. Senior Open in the summer of 2019.

"I felt like someone could shoot a low number, and I was hoping it would be me," Stricker said. "There's a lot of short irons on this course if you put it in play."

Robert Karlsson of Sweden, who shared the 36-hole lead with Fred Couples, and Monday qualifier Alex Cejka of Germany each made birdie on the final hole to tie for second.

Cejka is assured of getting into the next open Champions event without qualifying.

Ko collects Lotte Championship with tournament record

KAPOLEI, Hawaii — Lydia Ko is golfing like she is a kid again. In other words, she's tough to beat.

No one came close at this week's Lotte Championship. Ko torched Kapolei Golf Club and tournament records in the process. A final-round 65 Saturday left her at 28-under 260 and seven shots ahead of everybody.

It brought back vivid memories of the teenager from New Zealand who became the youngest golfer — female or male — to rise to No. 1 the world in 2015. She is the LPGA's youngest-ever winner, major winner, Rookie and Player of the Year.

Ko came up three strokes shy of the LPGA record of 31 under.
