Citrus County COVID-19 cases still on the rise

According to the Florida Department of Health, 16 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update.

One new death was reported, for a total of 433.

To date in the county, 10,697 people have tested positive (including 95 nonresidents).

Two new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 691 hospitalized.

Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

Vaccine registration system open for Citrus

DOH-Citrus' preregistration system to schedule COVID-19 vaccine appointments for all individuals 18 and older and frontline health care workers is now available.

Individuals can now be added to a waiting list for vaccine appointments and be notified when appointments are available in Citrus County by visiting myvaccine. fl.gov or by calling 866-201-0442; TTY is 833-476-1036.

As part of the statewide preregistration system, each county has a designated number that individuals can call and preregister with if they do not have internet access. Citrus County's designated helpline number is 833-540-2058.

Vaccine supply remains limited and appointments may not be available for several weeks.

Director or not, ready for storm

Search still on track for leader of Citrus County emergency management

Hurricane season is only a little over a month away and there is a chance Citrus County will have a permanent emergency management director in place by then.

But even if it doesn't, there are no worries, said Col. Elena Vitt with the Citrus County

Sheriff's Office.

Interim Director Troy Hess and his staff are "very capable" of handling a storm or other emergency that arises, she said.

Vitt said the search is progressing smoothly. To date, the emergency management office has received 15 applications. Of those, 10-11 appear qualified, she said.

In February, the county started putting together a job description for EOC director and applicants would be vetted through a hiring committee. The salary range is from \$58,968 to \$90,854.

The committee includes County Administrator Randy Oliver and representatives from the sheriff's "I definitely feel we're on office, Florida Department of

Health in Citrus County, the school district, county fire department and the cities of Crystal River and Inverness.

"Our first hiring panel meeting is coming up in a week and a half," Vitt said.

The interview process follows that meeting.

Self-taught Dunnellon artist: inspiration, determination

DUNNELLON master diver and self-taught marine sculpture artist has invented a unique method of sculpting that combines his two loves. "I went off the beaten path and did it my own way," Wilchynski said.

Wilchynski was born in Gulfport and grew up by the water. Has always loved the ocean, but his passion for sculpting came later in life.

Before becoming a sculptor, he was trying to learn how to paint.

"My painting was not that good," Wilchynski

said as he laughed.

However, he remembered enjoying sculpting

in his high school art class. "I went home and started working on some simple sculptures," he said. "One thing led to another and I started doing a lot of different oceantype sculptures."

He garners inspiration from his many ocean adventures.

"I try to do a study of each piece before I work on it," Wilchynski said.

He's observed everything from flying fish and sea turtles in Barbados to sailfish in Panama. "Every piece I've done usually has a story behind it," Wilchynski said.

Unused, not wasted

Website offers quick turnaround with vaccines

In the frenzy that followed the release of several COVID vaccines earlier this year, some found it exceedingly frustrating not being able to get a scheduled appointment through the Publix

website. Additionally, getting up in the dark morning was not appealing to drive to the first-come, firstserved Citrus Department of Health location.

Add to that, having to wait for hours in line and then be told the number of available vaccines had been filled at that site

added to that frustration. Although the vaccine issues have leveled out, as over 190 million Americans have received at least one dose, according to the CDC's COVID Data Tracker, there are still many in Citrus County who do not have the shot.

As of April 11, only a little more than 25% of the county's population has been fully vaccinated.

The latest COVID surge validates the need for more people to get the vaccine. Although seniors were the only age group not in the surge, younger people were.

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

Key votes for the week ending April 16. By Voterama in Congress

- **EQUAL PAY FOR WOMEN:** Voting 217 for and 210 against, the House on April 15 passed a bill (HR 7) to tighten current federal law against gender-based wage discrimination and prevent employers from paying women less than men for equivalent work. Daniel Webster, No.
- SELF-POLICING BY EMPLOYERS: By a vote of 183 for and 244 against, the House rejected on April 15 a proposed amendment to HR 7 that would have allowed employers accused of wage discrimination to avoid penalties if during the previous three years they had conducted a job and wage analysis and taken steps to remedy any disparities Daniel Webster, Yes.
- PROTECTING HEALTH CARE WORKERS FROM VIOLENCE: Voting 254 for and 116 against, the House on April 16 passed a bill (HR 1195) to order new Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) rules protecting health care and social service employees from workplace violence. Daniel Webster did not vote.
- **WENDY SHERMAN, DEPUTY SECRETARY** OF STATE: By a vote of 56 for and 42 against, the Senate on April 13 confirmed the nomination of Wendy R. Sherman to the number two position at the State Department. Marco Rubio, Rick Scott, No.
- **POLLY TROTTENBERG, DEPUTY** TRANSPORTATION SECRETARY: Voting 82 for and 15 against, the Senate on April 13 confirmed the nomination of Polly E.

Trottenberg, 57, to the second-ranking post at the Transportation Department. Marco Rubio, Rick Scott, No.

- **■** GARY GENSLER, CHAIR OF SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION: By a vote of 53 for and 45 against, the Senate on April 14 confirmed the nomination of Gary Gensler as chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission, the body that regulates Wall Street and publicly traded companies. Marco Rubio, Rick Scott, No.
- Kev votes ahead: The House will take up a bill conferring statehood on the District of Columbia in the week of April 19, while the Senate will debate a COVID-related hate crimes bill.



Today's Highlight:

On April 19, 1995, a truck bomb destroyed the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City, killing 168 people. (Bomber Timothy McVeigh, who prosecutors said had planned the attack as revenge for the Waco siege of two years earlier, was convicted of federal murder charges and executed in 2001.)

On this date:

In 1775, the American Revolutionary War began with the battles of Lexington and Concord.

In 1943, during World War II, tens of thousands of Jews in the Warsaw Ghetto began a valiant but ultimately futile battle against Nazi forces.

In 1993, the 51-day siege at the Branch Davidian compound near Waco, Texas, ended as fire destroyed the structure after federal agents began smashing their way in; about 80 people, including two dozen children and sect leader David Koresh, were killed.


Ten years ago: Cuba's Communist Party picked 79-year-old Raul Castro to replace his ailing brother Fidel as first secretary during a key Party Congress.

In Mexico, he saw a school of blue tangs while diving with his daughter. "I surprised her and made her a school of blue tangs that hangs on her wall now," Wilchvnski said.

He hopes that every time his daughter looks at the sculpture throughout her lifetime, she'll remember that moment with her father.

Wilchynski is inspired by Guy Harvey and Robert Wyland, both artists and conservationists. He also draws inspiration from his close friend and mentor, Curtis Arnett, who is a part of the famed group of painters, the Florida Highwaymen.

When Wilchynski first began sculpting, he attempted to take his finished clay molds to a bronze foundry. However, they were unable to help him because his sculpting is too intricate.

"Being upset, I went home and started to make molds," Wilchynski said.

One of his favorite pieces to date is his lionfish sculpture, which consists of 14 molds and pieces, took six months and cost him a small fortune.

"It doesn't matter how long it takes, I want it to look how I want it to look," Wilchynski said. With this determination, and no one to make molds for him, he developed his own technique. "They're not metal, they're not wood, they're in between.'

First, he sculpts with polymer clay and fires it.

"Once it's hard, I cut all the pieces," Wilchynski explained. He then makes silicone molds and pours resin into them with rods and pins to hold everything in place.

Then, he's tasked with assembling the pieces together again to look like the original. Finally, he sands it and coats it with his unique blend of patina chemicals.

Patina is what gives the sculptures "anything from lime green to a rust color," Wilchynski said. Although he can reuse his molds, the patina is what makes each piece unique.

He explained that it's up to Mother Nature to determine how the sculpture comes out depending on how the metal reacts with temperature conditions.

The use of patina also allow him to make his art more affordable than a typical bronze sculpture. They range anywhere from \$400 to \$1,200. Buyers get a "nice piece without the crazy prize," Wilchynski said.

"If anyone wants to see how I do it, I don't mind showing them," Wilchynski added. He isn't worried about other artists trying to replicate his method be $cause\ it's\ simply\ \bar{j}ust\ too\ complicated.$

The most important thing to Wilchynski is to make his sculptures as realistic as possible. Biologists have commented that his sculptures capture the natural movement of the sea

Currently, Wilchynski is working on two of his largest sculptures to date. One depicts a tuna in a feeding frenzy and the other captures three jellyfish floating in the current.

Wilchynski began trying to sell his pieces right when COVID-19 hit but kept persisting even as art shows got canceled. "I'll keep at it," he said.

His persistence carries over into other parts of his life as well. Wilchynski is now a three time cancer survivor. "I'm happy for every day," he said.

Wilchynski is also the owner of Suncoast Garage Doors & Operator Company Inc. and Butterflyworkx Butterfly Farm, both in Dunnellon.

However, his passion lies with art. "I'd like to be able to do full time if I

can," Wilchynski said. He is also extremely passionate about wildlife conservation.

Wilchynski expressed his shock at the recent incident in January when someone carved "Trump" into the algae covering the back of a manatee.

When "Guardians of the Galaxy" star Dave Bautista offered a \$20,000 award to anyone who could turn in the person, Wilchynski sent him a manatee sculpture to thank him for his efforts.

Wilchynski hopes to become a wellknown collectable artist and he's already starting to gain quite the following. 'We'll see where it goes," he said.


Sec. 5.6. - Preliminary Site Plan Required.

B. All plans for subdivisions shall be submitted to the City Council and be approved by it before they shall be recorded.

Opposition to voter law invalid

In recent years, some question of the use of voter ID is required to prevent fraud at the polls or whether showing an ID before voting is an unfair restriction on the right to vote.

Opponents of voter photo ID like to claim that this is an unfair imposition and insurmountable hurdle to voting. The requirement, they claim, will make people feel it is too difficult to vote and therefore reduce voter turnout at elections, especially among the poor and minorities. But is this a valid point?

Complaints against voter ID requirements is the thought that requiring voters to pay to

obtain ID is a defacto poll tax and can prevent poor and black people from casting their votes. ID they claim, is costly to obtain, and they claim that large percentages of various minorities don't have access to a photo ID. Georgia and other states offer free voter ID. When I lived in New Jersey, I got a free photo ID from Monmouth County. They came to our community and anyone who wanted an ID just went to the community center and got their photo taken and their ID card in less than five minutes.

Recently, Stacey Adams said around 200,000 minorities will be disenfranchised if photo ID is required to vote in Georgia. This claim is hyperbole. The reality is the photo ID is required to do a lot of things: board an airplane, cruise ship, train; cash a check: drive a motor vehicle; apply for a business license; secure employment; purchase a house; rent a car; purchase a firearm; get a hunting/fishing license; purchase alcoholic beverages; purchase tobacco; purchase a motor vehicle; purchase prescription medicine; purchase over-the-counter medicine containing pseudoephedrine; serve on jury duty; open a bank account.

It doesn't make sense that 200,000 people do not have photo ID. None of them work? Travel? Drive a car? Applied for Social Security, food stamps, welfare? They never went to the doctor?

The Democrats argument that requiring voter ID is somehow Jim Crow racial segregation and will suppress voter turnout just doesn't hold water.

The committee will recommend the best candidates to Citrus County Sheriff Mike Prendergast, who will make his selection and bring it to county commissioners for final approval.

The emergency management director's duties include emergency management planning and response and recovery for all county disasters.

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

Egypt: 11 killed in train crash north of Cairo

CAIRO — A passenger train derailed Sunday north of Cairo, killing at least 11 people, Egyptian authorities said.

Four train wagons ran off the railway at the city of Banha in Qalyubia province, just outside Cairo, the railway authority said in a statement. Videos on social media showed wagons overturned and passengers escaping to safety along the railway.

The train was travelling to the Nile Delta city of Mansoura from the Egyptian capital, the statement said.

The Health Ministry said in a statement that besides the dead, at least 98 people were injured, with most of them suffering from broken bones, cuts and bruises.

At least 60 ambulances were sent to the scene and the injured were taken to nearby hospitals, the ministry added.

Salvage teams could be seen searching for survivors and removing the derailed wagons. It was not immediately clear what caused the train to derail. Prosecutors said they were investigating the causes of the crash.

The state-run Ahram daily reported that authorities have detained at least 10 railway officials, including the train driver and his assistant, pending an investigation into the crash.

Sunday's train accident came three weeks after two passenger trains collided in the province of Sohag, killing at least 18 people and injuring 200 others.

Japanese leader asks Pfizer for more vaccines

TOKYO — Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga asked the U.S. drug maker Pfizer Inc. for additional supplies of the COVID-19 vaccine to speed up his country's inoculation drive, which lags behind many other nations.

Suga, after holding talks with President Joe Biden at the White House, wrapped up his Washington visit on Saturday with a phone call to Pfizer CEO Albert Bourla.

Taro Kono, a Cabinet minister tasked with vaccinations, told a Japanese television talk show Sunday that the two sides have "practically reached an agreement" over the

Suga requested Bourla provide additional supplies that would cover all eligible recipients by September, as well as to ensure the stable and prompt delivery of the ongoing vaccine shipments, Japanese officials said

According to the officials, Bourla told Suga that Pfizer planned to closely coordinate with the Japanese.

Japan, with its domestic vaccine development still in the early stages, has to rely on imports and has signed agreements with Pfizer, AstraZeneca and Moderna. The Pfizer vaccine is the only one Japan has approved so far.

Japan's government says it has secured 314 million doses, enough to cover its entire population by the end of this year.

Navalny's team calls for protests

MOSCOW — Associates of imprisoned Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny called Sunday for massive protests in the heart of Moscow and St. Petersburg on Wednesday, saying Navalny's health is deteriorating severely during a hunger strike.

Leonid Volkov, a top strategist for Navalny, said the demonstrations were called with three days' notice because "his life hangs in the balance ... We don't know how long he can hold on. But it is clear we do not have time.'

The 44-year-old Navalny, President Vladimir Putin's most visible and

strike more than three weeks ago to protest prison authorities' refusal to allow him to be seen by a private doctor. He says he is suffering from severe back pain and loss of feeling in his legs, and that the medical care in prison inadequate; the Russian penitentiary service says he is getting appropriate care.

Auction brings Ted Williams to NFT market

BOSTON — Teddy Ballgame is about to become Teddy Blockchain.

Hall of Famer Ted Williams is coming to the digital memorabilia market with a release of nine different cards that follow the No. 9's career from skinny rookie to Cooperstown inductee. The collectors' items offered by Williams' daughter are hand drawn by Brazilian illustrator Andre Maciel, known as Black Madre, who created the non-fungible tokens for football star Rob Gronkowski that sold out last month for \$1.6 million.

"I wrote to him. I told him who I was. I said, 'My dad is Ted Williams.' I said, 'Here's what I want to do," Claudia Williams said, adding that she didn't know whether Maciel would be familiar with the baseball star.

"For all he knows, I'm just some person reaching out saying, 'Hey, could you make me some NFTs?" she said. "Just the respect that he showed the art, I know that he knows who Ted Williams is."

Eight cards come in limited editions numbered 1-9, with the ninth — titled "The Splendid Splinter" — a one-of-a-kind release that comes with an autographed bat, three autographed pictures and an Airbnb stay at a house Williams lived in in Vermont. Each of the 73 cards include the digital autograph of the Red Sox slugger, who remains the last major leaguer to bat .400, hitting .406 in 1941.

The collection also recognizes Williams' achievements as a fishing hall of famer and a fighter pilot who missed parts of five seasons to serve in WWII and the Korean War. Claudia Williams wrote the text on the back of each card.

The auction begins Monday and runs through Saturday.

Jay Bruce retires after Sunday's game

NEW YORK — Jay Bruce had seen enough. Having made the New York Yankees' opening-day roster, he couldn't stomach his poor start to the season.

So the three-time All-Star outfielder decided to retire Sunday,

just 15 days past his 34th birthday. "Just the consistent underperformance for me," he said before the game against Tampa Bay, his voice quavering at times. "Felt like I wasn't able to do it at a level that was acceptable for

mvself." Bruce informed Yankees manager Aaron Boone of his decision during a 20-minute meeting in the manager's office on Friday, then made a public announcement before Sunday's game. Bruce received an ovation when shown on the video board before the eighth inning but did not get in the game.

He hit .118 with one homer and three RBIs in 39 plate appearances this year. He started the first eight games at first base but just two of the next seven.

Bruce had a .244 average with 319 homers and 951 RBIs in 14 major league seasons with Cincinnati (2008-16), the New York Mets (2016-18), Cleveland (2017), Seattle (2019), Philadelphia (2019-20) and the Yankees.



THIS DATE IN BASEBALL

1900 — The Philadelphia Phillies beat the Boston Braves 19-17 in 10 innings to set a major league record for most runs scored by two clubs on opening day. The Braves scored nine runs in the ninth inning to put the game into extra innings.

1920 — Al Schacht, who later became the "Clown Prince of Baseball," was all business as he pitched the Senators to a 7-0 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics.

1935 — Cy Blanton threw a one-hitter to give the Pittsburgh Pirates a 3-0 win over the St. Louis Cardinals at Forbes Field. Blanton, who also gave up a walk, gave up a second-inning single to Spud Davis.

1956 — The Brooklyn Dodgers beat the Philadelphia Phillies 5-4 in 10 innings at Jersey City's Roosevelt Stadium, the first major league game held in New Jersey.

1981 — In an International League night game, the Rochester Red Wings and Pawtucket Red Sox played to a 2-2 tie through 32 innings before play was suspended at 4:07 a.m. The game was completed later in the season with Pawtucket scoring the winning run in the 33rd inning of the longest game in professional baseball history.

1987 — Rob Deer hit a three-run homer to tie the score and Dale Sveum won the game with a two-run shot as the Milwaukee Brewers rallied for five runs in the ninth inning to beat the Texas Rangers 6-4 and set an American League record with their 12th straight victory to start the season.

If she still gives you a hard time, then it's time to give her some space and back away. But don't back away before you have taken all the steps to try to help your friend first.



Many scammers demand that you send money through money transfer services like Western Union or MoneyGram, or buy gift cards and send them the PIN numbers. Once you wire money, or give someone the gift card PINs, it is like giving someone cash. It's almost impossible to get it back.
- Toss offers that ask you to pay for a prize. If it's free, you shouldn't have to pay to get it.

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
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
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
