Citrus County COVID-19 cases

According to the Florida Department of Health, 19 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update.

No new deaths were reported, for a total of 435.

To date in the county, 10,457 people have tested positive (including 91 non-residents).

No new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 679 hospitalized.

Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

Register to get COVID vaccine

DOH-Citrus' preregistration system to schedule COVID-19 vaccine appointments for all individuals 18 and older and frontline health care workers is now available.

Individuals can now be added to a waiting list for vaccine appointments and be notified when appointments are available in Citrus County by visiting myvaccine.fl.gov or by calling 866-201-0442; TTY is 833-476-1036.

As part of the statewide preregistration system, each county has a designated number that individuals can call and preregister with if they do not have internet access. Citrus County's designated helpline number is 833-540-2058.

Capitol seige saga continues

U.S. judge sets another court date for Dunnellon pair charged in Jan. 6 attack

A federal judge set another court date for the Dunnellon couple and their handful of alleged paramilitary accomplices accused of storming the Capitol during the January riot.

During a telephonic court hearing Tuesday, April 6, U.S. District Judge Amit P. Mehta scheduled June 1 as the next case status date for husband and wife, Kelly and Connie Meggs.

Mehta said the lapse will give federal prosecutors time to

disclose the bulk of their expanding trove of evidence and witnesses to the defense lawyers for the dozen defendants indicted in the case.

Kelly and Connie Meggs were

arrested Feb. 17, along with several others, for their alleged roles in the Jan. 6 siege of the Capitol to stop Congress from certifying the 2020 election results.

According to the four-count indictment they pleaded not guilty to, the Meggses are charged with conspiracy, obstructing an official proceeding, destroying government property and entering restricted grounds.

It's alleged Kelly Meggs was the self-described leader of Florida's chapter of the Oath Keepers, one of many extremist groups involved in the Capitol raid.

Kelly Meggs trained alongside his wife and others before they traveled to D.C. donning tactical gear, and forced their way into the Capitol in an organized, military fashion.

U.S. Attorney Kathryn Leigh Rakoczy told Mehta on Tuesday prosecutors will keep sharing their evidence with defense teams "on a rolling basis" as federal investigations continue into the group's actions and connections with other conspirators who've yet to be indicted.

Medical professional: Colon cancer is on the rise among young, middle-aged

In July 2020, Karen Fisher had surgery to fight colon cancer. Today, she stays physically active and has recovered from the disease.

Karen Fisher did most things right: she exercised, didn't overindulge in bad food, and was mostly healthy.

But that didn't matter. She got colon cancer anyway.

What's unique for Fisher, who was 54 years old when diagnosed, is that she was relatively young to get the disease.

But that is changing.

New cases of colon cancer and rectal cancer are occurring at an increasing rate among young and middle-aged adults throughout the United States.

Those born around 1990 are twice as likely to get colon cancer and four times as likely to get rectal cancer than those born in 1950, according to the American Cancer Society.

In 2020, there were about 18,000 cases of colorectal cancer diagnosed in people under 50, or about 49 new cases per day, according to the Colon Cancer Coalition.

In adults who were between the ages of 40 and 54, colorectal cancer rates increased by 0.5% to 1% per year from the mid-1990s through 2013, according to the American Cancer Society.

The rate is increasing so quickly among relatively young people that the American Cancer Society now recommends that for people with no family history of colon cancer, or other risk factors, have regular colonoscopy screenings at age 45, rather than the previous recommended age of 50.

In the United States, colorectal cancer is the third leading cause of cancer-related deaths in men and in women, according to the American Cancer Foundation. It is the second most common cause of cancer deaths when men and women are combined. It's expected to cause about 52,980 deaths during 2021.

To make matters worse, the death rate among young and middle-aged people with cancer is also increasing.

The death rate for colorectal cancer in adults who are 20 years old to 54 years old increased by 1% each year from 2004 to 2014, according to a study published in 2017 in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Before then, from the mid 1970s through the 1990s, the death rate for that age group was decreasing by almost 2% each year, according to the same study.

In many cases involving young to middle aged people with colorectal cancer, the disease is found during the treatment of something else.

That was the case for Fisher.

'Ongoing feud' murder case moves forward

David Jerome Lemon Jr., the Citrus County man state prosecutors say shot and killed a man with whom he had an ongoing feud, saw his legal case this week move forward.

Lemon's lawyer, Charles Vaughn, asked Wednesday Citrus County Circuit Judge Richard Howard for a June 2 continuance to work on the case. Vaughn

reported to Howard that he's requested and received evidence from prosecutors about the case.

In June, both Vaughn and prosecutors will update Howard about their progress.

Prosecutors charged Lemon, 26, of murder in the first degree, shooting into an occupied vehicle, possession of a firearm by a felon,

and possession of firearm ammunition by a felon.

Prosecutors say he shot and killed Tyler Hopkins on Feb. 20, 2020, while he was in a car with his girlfriend and their 5-month-old child. Hopkins was the only one shot in the car.

Lemon and Hopkins had been arguing before the shooting and planned to meet and fight, according to

arrest documents. Lemon did not show up for the fight but appeared when the couple was about to leave for dinner, according to arrest documents.

Investigators say Lemon left for California after the shooting, but returned when his daughter died in an automobile accident. On Oct. 15, Citrus County Sheriff's deputies took Lemon into custody during a traffic stop in Inverness.

The pharmacist was a regular blood donor; something she began doing when she still attended college.

During one such visit in May 2020, the technicians told her that her hemoglobin level was low and she was anemic.

She had no history of colon cancer in her family and didn't suspect cancer. After all, she had no symptoms.

When Dr. Trupti Shinde performed a colonoscopy, she found a 5 cm mass in Fisher's colon. It was cancer and stage 2A, meaning the tumor had grown into the colon wall but not through it. It also hadn't reached Fisher's lymph nodes. That was good.

She never had a colonoscopy before then, despite recommendations from health care experts people should start by the time they're 50.

The plan was for Dr. Parth Patel, with Inverness Surgical Associates, to remove the tumor along with about 8 inches of colon.

Plans changed though when on June 8 she was diagnosed with the coronavirus.

Her focus switched from fears of the cancer to COVID-19.

"Everything happened in such a blur," she said, looking back at the frightening events.

Luckily, her virus case was mild and two weeks later she tested negative for COVID-19.

In July, Patel operated. The surgery was successful and she decided to forgo chemotherapy, but instead she's tested to make sure doctors know if the cancer returns.

"I learned a valuable lesson," she told the Chronicle about her experience. "I had every excuse in the book (not to get regularly screened). I was healthy. I'm running"

After the colon cancer scare, she got healthier:

"I cut out junk food," she said. "I eat differently now. I lost 25 pounds."

She walks nearly every day. Some days she jogs.

Fisher also encourages people to have colonoscopies regularly to detect cancer in its early stages or when it's in its precancerous form.

"If Karen had come to me one year earlier, it would have been (pre-cancer) and I would have cut it out," Shinde told the Chronicle.

Because regular screenings will detect growths in their

precancerous forms, colorectal cancers were declining.

But the American lifestyle is turning that trend around for young and middle-aged people who once rarely got colorectal cancer.

Diets that promote intestinal inflammation often increases the risk of colorectal cancer as well as specific gut bacteria, according to the National Cancer Institute.

"I think it's more diet related from all the processed foods ... many of us eat," Patel said.

"And I think it's going to get worse. Obesity is getting worse," he said

Obesity is important when it comes to colorectal cancer because people who are obese are about 30% more likely to develop colorectal cancer than people with a normal weight, according to the National Cancer Institute.

And more people are becoming obese.

For all age groups, from 1999-2000 through 2017-2018, the prevalence of obesity increased from 30.5% to 42.4%, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The prevalence of severe obesity increased from 4.7% to 9.2%.

Obesity among children is also increasing. That's bad for children, but studies have also shown that obese children are more likely to remain obese when they become teenagers and young adults.

"During the past three decades, the prevalence of childhood obesity has more than doubled in children and tripled in adolescents," according to the CDC.

The prevalence of obesity for those young people 12 years to 19 years was nearly 21% and more than 18% for children 6-11 years.

Patel said these are the kinds of statistics that explain why younger and middle-aged people are seeing an increase in colorectal cancer.

Patel thinks that 20%-30% of colorectal cases could be eliminated by people just changing their diet and losing weight.

While screening has worked with older people, Shinde thinks that young people don't get screened for colorectal cancer because they likely consider it a cancer associated with seniors.

Unfortunately, by the time they come and see Shinde those young people are having symptoms such as anemia or bleeding during bowl movements.

"They need to be recognized early. I don't take their symptoms for granted," Shinde told the Chronicle. "It's worrisome."

Meanwhile, other bad behaviors also contribute to an increased rate of colorectal cancer among young people. Shinde told the Chronicle that some studies have shown a possible link between high quantities of red meat consumption and alcohol and colon polyps and cancer.

For red meat, that's because red

earn good results, Shinde said.

Luckily for Fisher, Patel operates on many colorectal cancers using minimally invasive surgery. For Fisher, that meant only four relatively small incisions an inch long and less.

Years ago, surgeons made incisions about 9 inches long to get to the cancerous colon.

Although Patel said that while surgical techniques have vastly improved, the goal is to keep from getting the cancer in the first place, or at least catching it early.

Unless young people change their eating and exercise habits, Patel said, the cancer once associated only with older people, will keep making inroads with younger and those middle-aged.

Fisher continues to exercise and eat healthy. She admits exercise doesn't come natural to her. She jokes she hated doing it before the cancer and before she really appreciated the benefits of the cancer:

Now?

"I don't hate it anymore," she said smiling.

Her advice?

"Get the colonoscopy," Fisher said.

and processed meats contain high levels of sulfur, Shinde said. Gut bacteria metabolize the sulfur and during the metabolic process hydrogen sulfide is formed. Hydrogen sulfide has been shown to damage the gut's lining DNA and promote inflammation.

"We are creating our own problem," Shinde said.

Instead, Shinde recommends that people consume about 25 grams of fiber to help the digestive process. She said the average American diet supplies us with only about 10 grams of fiber.

Shinde also recommended exercise to reduce the chances of colorectal cancer.

A 2009 study published in the British Journal of Cancer reported that the most physically active people had a 24% lower risk of colon cancer than those who were the least physically active.

Meanwhile, only about one in four high school students get the recommended hour a day of physical activity, according to the American Heart Association.

The problem is we've become a society where we want fast food and fast results and don't want to put in the time to get healthy and

Ground Flax Seed

Flax seeds, also known as linseed comes from the flax plant (known as *Linum usitatissimum*). It has been consumed since the 8th century for its health benefits. It also has been used in Ayurveda for centuries. Flaxseed was cultivated as early as 3000 BC. It is one of the most powerful super foods on the planet.

So what makes flax seed so special? Let's find out.

Strong fiber content, antioxidant content and anti-inflammatory properties make flax seeds a plant based superfood.

Flax seeds contain very high amounts of omega 3 fatty acid, alpha-linoleic acid (ALA). ALA and omega 3 fatty acid have several cardiovascular benefits. They are also anti-inflammatory. The anti-inflammatory properties prevent hardening of the arteries and keep plaque from being deposited in the arteries. This can reduce the risk of heart attack and stroke. Some researchers have shown their benefit in lowering blood pressure and boosting heart health. Daily consumption also has shown to reduce bad cholesterol (LDL) in the blood stream.

Flaxseed also contains Lignans. Lignans are a form of phytoestrogen with anti-oxidant and anti-inflammatory properties. Among all the commonly eaten foods researchers list Flax seeds as a number one source of lignans. Lignans help to decrease inflammation associated with cardiovascular diseases, insulin resistance and some types of cancer. Studies have suggested potential protective effects against breast cancer, prostate cancer

and colon cancer. Some studies have shown beneficial effects in management of post-menopausal symptoms.

With high fiber content Flaxseeds have some impressive digestive benefits. Two tablespoons full provides 4GM of fiber. This helps to regulate bowel pattern and prevent constipation. Soluble fiber in flax seeds helps to slow down gastric emptying which boosts the absorption of nutrients by the small intestine. Flaxseed fiber also helps steady the passage of nutrients through the small intestine. As described above lignans in flax seeds reduce inflammation and cellular changes in the gut which in turn reduces the risk of colon cancer.

So how much should we should consume? Normally the recommended dose is 1 to 2 tablespoons a day. Start slowly and gradually increase to avoid bloating. I like ground flax seeds as they have a nutty flavor and can easily be added your food. Flax seed oil contains ALA but no lignans and fiber. You can sprinkle the ground flax seeds on cold or hot cereal, oatmeal and grits. Stir some in your yogurt. I love baking with flax seeds. Make a batch of healthy muffins and breads. You can use it as a thickener in lentil soups and chili. I like spicy flax seed chutney. This can be made by grinding flax seeds, sesame seeds, grated coconut, garlic, red chilli powder and rock salt. It is a nice condiment that adds extra spice to food.

SO please consider adding this super food in your daily diet. If you are on multiple medications then please consult with your health care provider as flax seeds may decrease the absorption of some medications.

CCSO deputies
charge man with
burglary, battery

A 24-year-old Inverness man allegedly battered a woman at her residence and took a pair of her cell-phones Thursday, April 1, according to a Citrus County Sheriff's Office arrest affidavit.

CCSO deputies found Jamerson Badger walking near the victim's home with the two stolen cell phones, charging and arresting him with burglary with battery, petit theft and violation of injunction for protection of domestic violence. No bond was set.

According to the report, Badger was not allowed at the residence or invited inside by the woman, who alleged he slammed her head against the wall inside of her residence. Deputies observed a dent on the bedroom wall and blood on the woman's left ear from her earring.

After the altercation, the woman ran to her neighbor's house and called the CCSO, the report said. Upon returning home, she realized that her cell phones, totaling \$280, were missing.

When deputies spoke to Badger, he admitted that he was at the residence, the phones were not his and advised that he was unaware of the injunction and that nothing physical had occurred.

Badger was placed under arrest and transported to the Citrus County Detention Facility for booking and processing.

AES board gets crash course

Receives training in Florida public meeting, records laws

After holding part of a prior public meeting behind closed doors, members of the Academy of Environmental Science board went through a crash course on the Florida Sunshine Laws.

Karen Gaffney, attorney for Citrus County's public charter school in Crystal River, said she trained its nine volunteer board members on the state's policies over public access to government meetings, records and communications.

"They were all very attentive," Gaffney told the Chronicle, which she also represents, about the academy board's emergency

meeting April 1, "they were receptive, they were listening, they were asking questions ... and they now fully understand what their job duties are."

Gaffney was tasked with hosting a Sunshine Law class for the AES board after the Chronicle reported its members had a backroom discussion in the midst of a public meeting March 18 to mull over two candidates who applied to be their school's principal.

AES board members and the Citrus County School District, which oversees and staffs the charter school for its freshmen and sophomores, have been looking for a principal after the academy's head administrator, Zachary Leonard, quit amid investigations

into his misconduct.

At the start of their March 18 meeting, AES board members publicly interviewed the pair of principal applicants. Afterward, they held a closed session to discuss their thoughts on the candidates before they reopened the meeting to publicly vote them down.

Mike Mullen, assistant superintendent of the county school district, told the Chronicle the position of AES principal was reposted Wednesday for district employees to apply for before it closes Friday.

Gaffney said the AES board's next meeting was set for 2:30 p.m. April 14 at the academy.

Mullen said if the board can't

decide on the academy's principal, the district will look into creating a hybrid instructor-administrator job, similar to Leonard's lead teacher responsibilities.

A handful of AES board members have voiced opposition to having the principal job available for just school district employees to apply for.

Mullen said while the school district is responsible for the academy's actions and spendings, and has the ultimate say on its next campus leader, it leaves those decisions up to the AES board to consider.

"We do the best we can to try and advise them to do things differently," Mullen said. "They sometimes misinterpret our guidance as an attempt to control them."

Inverness council
approves park
security cameras

Soon when someone visits Inverness' Liberty Park they won't be alone. They'll have the companionship of 18 security cameras recording the parks every event.

The city's council voted 4-0 to approve the \$68,028 expense with tentative approval for the city manager to add more security cameras if the need arises. Councilwoman Linda Bega was not at the Tuesday, April 5, meeting.

City Manager Eric Williams told the council during its regularly scheduled public meeting that the plan, during the park's renovations, was always to add security cameras.

Williams told the council there had been some juvenile delinquency at the park, vandalism, and other unwanted activity to warrant the cameras.

There had also been a robbery at gunpoint earlier this year.

To make the issue more problematic, "we didn't have a business plan" for the Depot District and as a result the design didn't take security into account, Williams said.

(Liberty and Wallace

Brooks), "they're basically open 24/7," Williams said, adding there was no fencing or gate at either park.

The city closes the parks in the evening but people still come in, he told the council.

He told the council that in today's society "there is more than a reasonable expectation for security cameras" if there was an issue at the park.

"This is not being done all of a sudden because something happened (at the park)," he said.

The camera recordings and other security data will be made available to law enforcement upon request, Williams said.

Williams said the camera purchases were part of a Florida state purchase agreement in order to get the best price.

Meanwhile, Williams told the council the city already has cameras installed at its other facilities, including city hall on Main Street.

Williams said the cameras are compatible with the city's existing security systems.

Councilwoman Jacquie Hepfer said she supported the move.

"I love it," she told Williams. "I'm onboard."

Man charged with possession
of controlled substances

After failing to come to a complete stop at a stop bar, a 51-year-old Pennsylvania man was caught in possession of multiple controlled substances in Beverly Hills on Tuesday, April 6, according to a Citrus County Sheriff's Office arrest report.

Chris Slater was charged and arrested for three counts of possession of a controlled substance and introduction of contraband into a detention facility. Bond was set at \$11,000. Slater was also issued a traffic warning for a stop bar violation.

A deputy initiated a traffic stop when the defendant's car, bearing a Pennsylvania license plate, failed to make a complete stop at the intersection of North Lecanto Highway and Beverly Hills Boulevard.

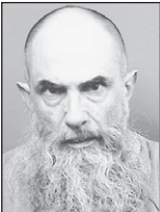
According to the report, the deputy attempted to identify Slater and the other passengers. A K-9 unit was then requested under the suspicion of narcotics in the vehicle. Deputies

conducted a walk around the vehicle with the K-9, who alerted them of the presence of narcotics.

Deputies located 21 round pills in a plastic bag with the markings "30" and "M," which the report stated was identified as 30 milligram oxycodone tablets. Deputies then found a black Samsung phone box in the center console of the vehicle, containing another bag filled with a leafy green substance, that later tested positive for marijuana and weighed approximately 40 grams.

Slater reportedly admitted that he did not have a prescription for the oxycodone and he had prior knowledge of the contents of the box, claiming that his friend left it in his car.

Slater was placed under arrest and transported to the Citrus County Detention Facility. Detention staff reportedly found another bag filled with a crystal-like substance in Slater's pocket. The substance tested positive for methamphetamine and weighed at approximately 1.5 grams.

year. The 2020 iHeartRadio awards telecast was canceled, with winners announced on radio.

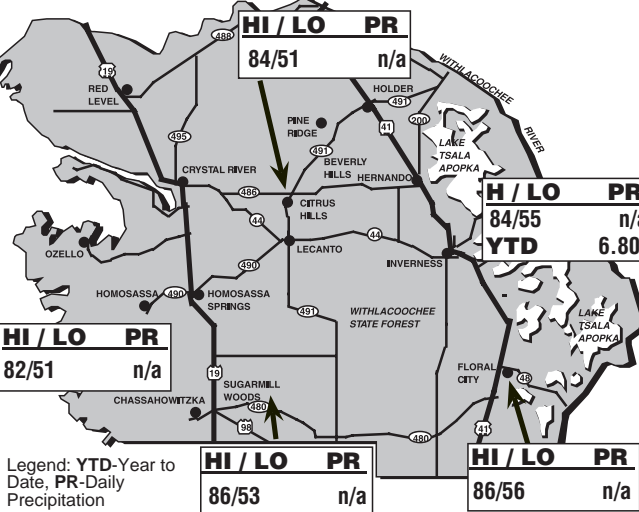

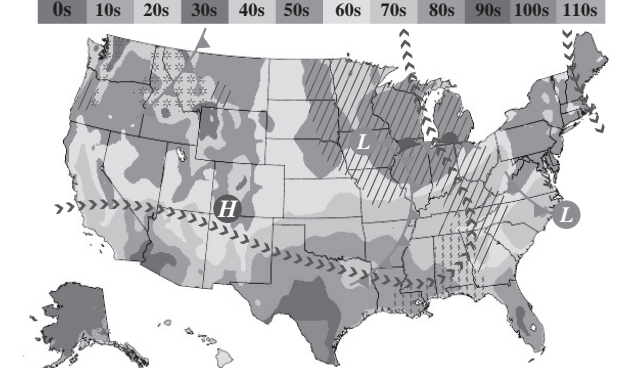

Mike Pence launches group

Trump officials line up new roles

WASHINGTON — Former Vice President Mike Pence launched a new advocacy group on Wednesday as he and other Trump officials look to boost their post-White House plans.

Pence's Advancing American Freedom, which could serve as a springboard for his own presidential campaign, will aim to promote the Trump administration's achievements and work as a counterpoint to the Biden agenda.

The new group is one of several launched in recent weeks by former aides of President Donald Trump. Shunned by corporate big money gigs, they are instead opening

their own shops and embracing Trump's legacy as they seek to capitalize on his continued popularity with the Republican base.

They include Trump's former senior policy adviser Stephen Miller, the architect of polarizing immigration policies, who on Wednesday announced the creation of America First Legal, a group that Miller envisions as an American Civil Liberties Union for conservatives.

In a statement, Trump lauded Miller and his group. The former president, whose administration was bombarded with lawsuits, said that conservatives "badly need to catch up" and "turn the tables" in court and that Miller's group would "fill this critical void."

He also acknowledged Pence's group, telling The Washington Examiner, which first reported its launch, "Nice to see Mike highlighting some of our many achievements!"

Maine couple celebrates bicentennial with hidden treasure

BANGOR, Maine — A pair of Mainers have hidden \$20,000 somewhere in the state and they're inviting treasure seekers to come and get it.

The creators of the treasure hunt and the company behind the hunt, Dirigo Treasures LLC, are Kurt and Kelly Stokes of Newcastle, the Lincoln County News reports.

The couple spent three years exploring and photographing locations around the state before creating an elaborate hide-and-seek game.

"We created the game to celebrate Maine's 200 years of statehood," Kurt Stokes told the

newspaper. "What better way to celebrate Maine than to get people out of the house, out of their town and exploring parts of the state they never knew existed?"

Finding the Dirigo treasure will involve solving a secret, a riddle and a puzzle. Getting started means ponying up for a deck of cards or flash cards for \$19.99 or \$39.99, with a dollar from each sale going to the Maine Cancer Foundation.

The couple ensured that the quest for the hidden treasure is legal, ethical and environmentally responsible.

"We abided by the principles of leaving no trace," Kurt Stokes said.

This includes, Rakoczy said, the results of government searches into the defendants' homes and more than 50 electronic devices involved in their case.

Citing the volume and complexity of ongoing investigations into the Capitol attack, U.S. attorneys filed a motion for Mehta to waive the timeframe to schedule speedy trials for the Meggses and the other codefendants who requested one.

"... the failure to grant such a continuance in this proceeding would be likely to make a continuation of this proceeding impossible," the motion states, "or result in a miscarriage of justice."

After receiving the defense attorneys' responses to the motion, Mehta said Tuesday he'll be filing an order soon.

Rakoczy told Mehta she's confident her office can provide the bulk of its criminal findings within the 60-day period she requested before the next court hearing.

"This is a very broad investigation," she said. "We're ... coming up with ways to make sure the evidence is reviewed and disclosed to the appropriate parties."

Defense attorneys did not voice major objections to Rakoczy's

request for a continuance, nor did they complain about how they were getting evidence, but they urged the judge and prosecutors to be quick so their clients don't continue to linger in custody.

Connie Meggs was released to house arrest, and Kelly Meggs has been incarcerated since his arrest.

Mehta denied bond for Kelly Meggs during a March 26 hearing, citing his greater involvement in the alleged offenses.

David Wilson, the Ocala-based attorney representing the Meggses, filed a motion Monday for the judge to reconsider the custody of Kelly Meggs.

Mehta gave U.S. attorneys until April 12 to file a response to Wilson's motion, two days before the judge plans to hear bond arguments.

In his motion, Wilson said federal prosecutors and investigators falsely assumed Kelly Meggs destroyed the Oath Keepers and military garb he and his wife wore during the Capitol attack, and attached photographs of the equipment in his motion.

"Because this new information directly contradicts the allegation of obstructionist conduct by Mr. Meggs," Wilson wrote in his motion, "it is respectfully requested that the Court revisit its factual findings and decision to deny Mr. Meggs pretrial release."

Also in court business, Judge Howard granted a May 26 pre-trial meeting over John William Campbell, the man who 10 years ago killed his father with a hatchet inside his father's home. He is now in prison.

At issue is whether Howard will rule to keep Campbell on death row or sentence him to life in prison.

During the hearing Wednesday, Campbell, 47, phoned into court from Florida's Union Correction Institute in Raiford.

During the hearing prosecutors and defense attorneys argued over whether some mental health information should be admissible during

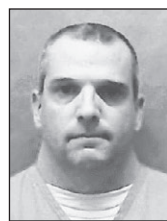
the future sentencing hearing.

Howard told them they were arguing nuance and almost the equivalent of how many angels could stand on the head of a pen.

Howard said "Mr. Campbell wants to have a decision" about his future.

Campbell has been in prison since March 2013, when Howard first sentenced him to death after a January 2013 trial conviction for the August 2010 premeditated murder of 68-year-old John Henry Campbell.

Howard vacated Campbell's original sentence — not his conviction — in August 2017 after U.S. and Florida supreme courts ruled in 2016 that Florida's 12-person juries must vote unanimously to decide a guilty defen-

dant's eligibility for death.

Campbell's jurors voted 8-4 recommending Howard impose a sentence of death by lethal injection.

Florida Supreme Court justices ruled in 2020 to recede their prior ruling from 2016 on juries voting on death penalties.

That resulted in prosecutors with the State Attorney's Office to file a motion for Campbell to reinstate Campbell's initial death sentence.

Campbell's public defenders filed a response to the motion arguing prosecutors never appealed Howard's ruling from August 2017 to reinstate Campbell.

So when attorneys present their cases later this year, Howard will decide Campbell's fate.

Roads come to the forefront in 2021

Citrus County leaders recently got an informative update from Department of Transportation (DOT) Secretary Kevin Thibault, whose Legislative Days meeting painted an optimistic picture of the future of roads in Citrus.

Big projects are progressing, and ideas that were once just a desired concept are moving forward with tenacity.

It's good to see that state officials are listening to the road infrastructure needs of our county, and are providing some clarity to the funding and maturation of multiple road changes in our area.

Thibault touched on transportation topics like the extension of the Suncoast Parkway beyond Citrus, the reclassification of Turkey Oak Drive, widening U.S. 41 north of Inverness and the Fort Island Trail multi-use path.

County officials and civic leaders posed questions to Thibault, who provided insight while covering funding resources and concept feasibility. Many who participated in the Tallahassee meeting walked away not only more informed, but pleased.

City Manager Ken Frink expressed his pleasure when Thibault said funding for a bypass around Crystal River using Turkey Oak drive might be available through

the County Incentive Grant Programs, along with the potential for two-lane arterial roads like Turkey Oak to be improved with the passing of SB 100.

And supporters of the long-anticipated widening of U.S. 41 from State Road 44 to the Withlacoochee Trail Bridge sighed with relief as Thibault said that portion of widening is fully funded with construction to begin in 2023.

Commissioner Jeff Kinnard reached out for guidance on the Fort Island Trail multi-use path, still in the strategic planning phase. Thibault actively listened to the merits of the project, offering his suggestion of attaching it to the state's SUN Trail Network.

Overall, the meeting was highly productive and outlined definitive movement in the county's top priority road projects.

Many of our collective county "wants" are turning into real actions. This is great progress being made thanks to a good group of politicians and community folks, like Josh Wooten and representatives from the Chamber of Commerce, who arrange these meetings and push these important projects.

Thanks to them, Citrus' transportation picture looks brighter.

Bill to help the economic crisis

My wife keeps asking why I write letters to the editor when we know my letters aren't going to convince any conservative to change their mind. I tell her my letters are to get people thinking and consider other ways to look at issues.

Thank you, Dennis Kudla and Doug Oxford, for responding to my letter. Your letters say that you've read my letter, considered what I said and rejected my truths for your own, and that is OK.

Kudla says the American Rescue Plan was not bipartisan. He is correct in that no Republican voted for the measure. However, isn't a bill supported by 75% of the American public, Republican and Democratic, bipartisan?

This law is the American Rescue Plan which includes COVID relief in the bill. While it might be true that only about 9% of this bill goes to fighting the virus directly, that figure does not include the vast majority of funds aimed at providing financial relief to those who have struggled through the pandemic. As Sen. Angus King (Maine) said, "There are two pieces to this bill. One is directly related to the health crisis, but the other, and the larger piece, is related to the economic crisis that the health crisis has created."

The implication is there is lots of "pork" in the bill. Pork is a "metaphor for the appropriation of government spending for localized projects secured solely or primarily to bring money to a representative's district." In that case, there is very little, if any, pork in this law. The elements in this bill are national in scope and not local.

An example of the pork Republicans have identified is a bridge from New York to Canada. They recognized this bridge as pork because the majority leader is from New York. However, this section of the law's history shows that the Trump administration first asked for bridge funding to offset the lack of bridge tolls caused by the pandemic.

The bill also allocates \$1.25 billion for federal transit capital investment grants. It does not specify a project in the Silicon Valley (Nancy Pelosi's district), as declared by Fox and the Republican leadership, but will allow transit lines to stay afloat with the decrease in fares and tax money brought about by the pandemic.

You may disagree with the law's funding priorities, but there is little to no pork here.

Discarded masks litter beaches

SANDY HOOK, N.J. — To the usual list of foul trash left behind or washed up on beaches around the world, add these: masks and gloves used by people to avoid the coronavirus and then discarded on the sand. In the past year, volunteers picking up trash on beaches from the Jersey Shore to California, the United Kingdom and Hong Kong have been finding discarded personal protective equipment.

The latest example came Wednesday when New Jersey's Clean Ocean Action environmental group released its annual tally of trash plucked from the state's shorelines. In addition to the plastics, cigarette butts and food wrappers that sully the sand each year, the group's volunteers removed 1,113 masks and other pieces of virus-related protective gear from New Jersey beaches last fall.

In the second half of 2020, more than 107,000 items of PPE were collected by volunteers around the world, according to the Ocean Conservancy group — a figure its members believe is a vast undercount of the year's true totals.

The group's spring 2021 beach sweeps will be held April 17 at locations up and down the Jersey Shore.

Red Nose Day shifts approach

NEW YORK — What happened to Comic Relief's Red Nose Day 2020, like so many philanthropic campaigns during the pandemic, was no laughing matter.

Back in February of last year, Alison Moore, the CEO of Comic Relief U.S., had said the charity was ready to do "amazing things" around its annual day of wearing bright red fake noses to raise money and awareness for needy American children. It had raised \$240 million since 2015 and helped 25 million children.

That mission will be on full display May 27, this year's Red Nose Day, when NBC will air a fundraising edition of its game show "The Wall" to cap nearly two months of buildup for one day of fundraising.

UK: Limit AstraZeneca in under-30s
Clot worry continues in Europe

LONDON — British authorities recommended Wednesday that the AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine not be given to adults under 30 where possible because of strengthening evidence that the shot may be linked to rare blood clots.

The recommendation came as regulators in the United Kingdom and the European Union emphasized that the benefits of receiving the vaccine continue to outweigh the risks for most people — even though the European Medicines Agency said it had found a "possible link" between the shot and the rare clots. British authorities

recommended that people under 30 be offered alternatives to AstraZeneca. But the EMA advised no such age restrictions, leaving it up to its member countries to decide whether to limit its use.

Several countries have already imposed limits on who can receive the vaccine, and any restrictions are closely watched since the vaccine, which is cheaper and easier to store than many others, is critical to global immunization campaigns and is a pillar of the U.N.-backed program known as COVAX that aims to get vaccines to some of the world's poorest countries.

"This is a course correction, there's no question

about that," Jonathan Van-Tam, England's deputy chief medical officer, said during a news briefing.

Van-Tam said the effect on Britain's vaccination timetable — one of the speediest in the world — should be "zero or negligible," assuming the National Health Service receives expected deliveries of other vaccines, including those produced by Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna.

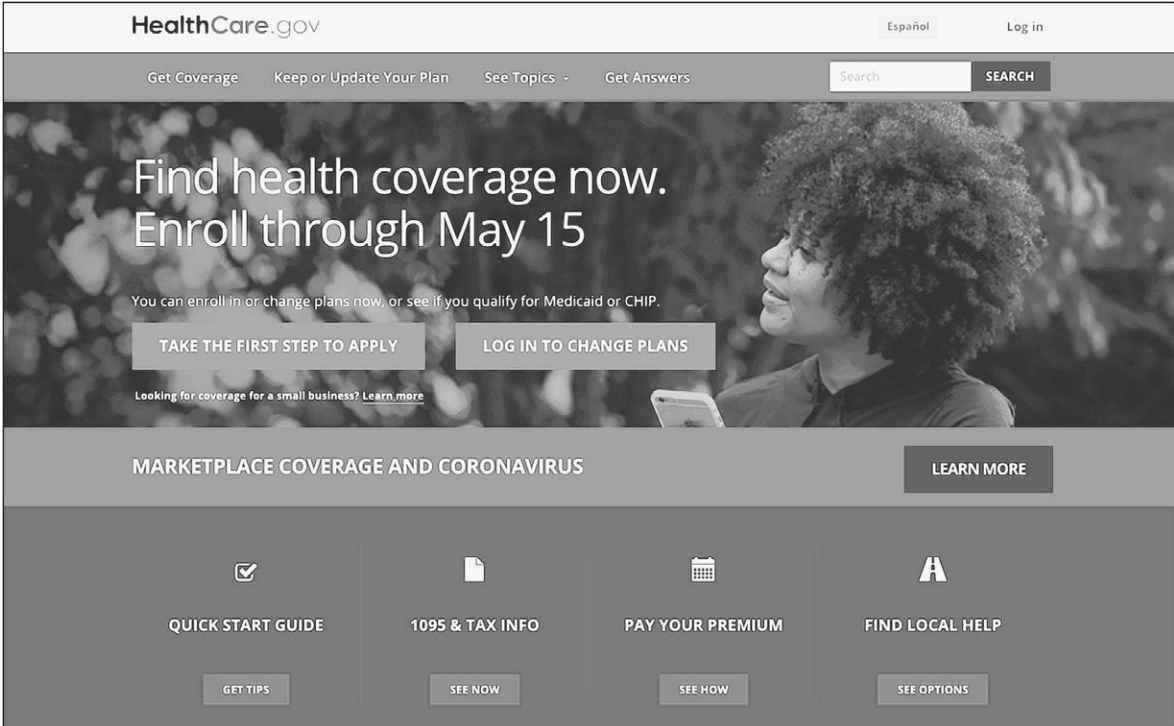
EU and U.K. regulators held simultaneous news conferences Wednesday to announce the results of investigations into reports of blood clots that sparked concern about the rollout of the AstraZeneca vaccine.

The EU agency described the clots as "very rare" side effects. Dr.

Sabine Straus, chair of its Safety Committee, said the best data was from Germany, where there was one report of the clots for every 100,000 doses given, although she noted far fewer reports in the U.K. Still, that's less than the clot risk that healthy women face from birth control pills, noted another expert, Dr. Peter Arlett.

The agency said most of the cases reported were in women under 60 within two weeks of vaccination, though it was unable to identify specific risk factors based on current information. Experts reviewed several dozen cases that came mainly from Europe and the U.K., where around 25 million people have received the AstraZeneca vaccine.

Insurance enrollment grows

More than a half million gain coverage under Biden

WASHINGTON — More than a half million Americans have taken advantage of the Biden administration's special health insurance sign-up window keyed to the COVID-19 pandemic, the government announced Wednesday in anticipation that even more consumers will gain coverage in the coming months.

The reason officials expect sign-ups to keep growing is that millions of people became eligible effective April 1 for pumped-up subsidies toward their premiums under President Joe Biden's coronavirus relief legislation. The special sign-up opportunity for Affordable Care Act plans will be available until Aug. 15.

Biden campaigned on a strategy of building on the Obama-era health law to push the United States toward coverage for all. As

president, he's wasted no time.

With the number of uninsured Americans rising during the pandemic, Biden reopened the law's health insurance markets as a backstop. Then, the virus aid package essentially delivered a health insurance price cut by making taxpayer subsidies more generous, while also allowing more people to qualify for financial assistance.

Those sweeteners are available the rest of this year and through the end of 2022. Consumers who were already covered by the health law at the beginning of this year are also entitled to the increased financial aid, but will have to go online or call to update their plan. People on average could save \$50 a month, the government says.

The numbers released Wednesday by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services show that 528,005 people newly signed up

for government-sponsored private plans from Feb. 15 to March 31.

But those figures are incomplete because they cover only the 36 states served by the federal HealthCare.gov insurance market. National enrollment will be higher when totals are factored in later on from states such as California and New York that run their own insurance websites.

The new report also showed that more than 870,000 people who went to the HealthCare.gov website or reached out to the call center were found to be eligible for Medicaid, the federal-state health program for low-income people.

Among the states showing strong gains in enrollment are several big ones that went for Trump in last November's election, including Florida, Texas, and North Carolina. Florida recorded the biggest gain, with more than 146,000 sign-ups.

Biden to unveil actions on guns today

WASHINGTON — President Joe Biden will unveil a series of executive actions aimed at addressing gun violence on Thursday, according to a person familiar with the plans, delivering his first major action on gun control since taking office.

He's also expected to nominate David Chipman, a former federal agent and adviser at the gun control group Giffords, to be director of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

Two people familiar with the matter told The Associated Press that Chipman's nomination is expected to be announced Thursday. The people could not discuss the matter publicly

ahead of an official announcement and spoke to The AP on condition of anonymity. If confirmed, Chipman would be the agency's first permanent

director since 2015.

Biden has faced increasing pressure to act on gun control after a spate of mass shootings across the U.S. in recent weeks, but

the White House has repeatedly emphasized the need for legislative action on guns. While the House passed a background-check bill last month, gun control measures face slim prospects in an evenly divided Senate, where Republicans remain near-unified against most proposals.

Biden is expected to announce tighter regulations requiring buyers of so-called "ghost guns" to undergo background checks. The homemade firearms — often assembled from parts and milled with a metal-cutting machine — often lack serial numbers used to trace them. It's legal to build a gun in a home or a workshop and there is no federal requirement for a background check.

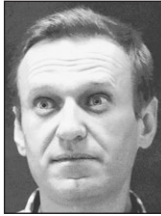

Lawyer: Navalny has double hernia

MOSCOW — A lawyer for imprisoned Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny, who has complained of serious back and leg pain in custody, says doctors have found him to be suffering from a double hernia.

Olga Mikhailova told the independent TV channel Dozhd on Wednesday that Navalny also is beginning to lose sensation in his hands. Navalny went on a hunger strike last week to protest what he called poor medical care.

Navalny, 44, is Russian President Vladimir Putin's fiercest domestic opponent. He was arrested in January upon returning to Moscow from Germany, where he spent five months recovering from a nerve-agent poisoning that he blames on the Kremlin. Russian authorities have rejected the accusation. Still, labs in Germany and elsewhere in Europe confirmed that Navalny was poisoned with the Soviet-era Novichok nerve agent.

A Russian court ordered Navalny in February to serve 2 1/2 years in prison for violating the terms of his probation, including when he was convalescing in Germany, from a 2014 embezzlement conviction.

Jordan king says 'sedition buried'

BEIRUT — Jordan's King Abdullah II addressed the unprecedented public rift within the royal family for the first time

Wednesday, portraying it as an attempted sedition involving his half-brother that had been "nipped in the bud," but caused him anger, pain and shock.

The monarch appeared to be doubling down on the allegations against Prince Hamzah, a former crown prince, while at the same time trying to reassure Jordanians that the nation was returning to business as usual. But even if the current crisis is eventually defused, major challenges loom for the Western-allied monarchy as it confronts growing internal dissent.

Wednesday's statement, presented by a newsreader on Jordan TV, dealt with the internal crisis that erupted over the weekend when Hamzah was confined to his home and accused of being part of a plot to destabilize the kingdom.

Hamzah has denied the allegations, saying he was simply calling out corruption and mismanagement in the kingdom.

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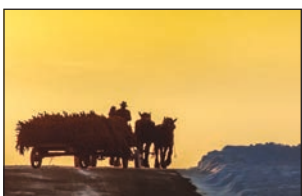
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Special day packs a punch

Recognizing ripe

Here are 10 tips to know when fresh fruits are at their peak

Keeping fresh fruit around the house provides a healthier alternative when your sweet tooth comes calling. Understanding how and when to buy at the peak of ripeness (or just before, in some cases) can help you avoid food waste while keeping your doctor happy.

Consider these simple tips for recognizing ripe fruits:

■ **Strawberries:** Check the area at the top of the berry near the stem and leaves. A ripe strawberry is fully red; green or white near the top means the fruit is underripe.

■ **Watermelon:** The "field spot,"

or the area where the melon sat on the ground, should be yellow, and a tap on the rind should produce a hollow sound.

■ **Cherries:** Flesh should appear dark with a crimson color and feel firm.

■ **Blueberries:** Similar to cherries, color should deepen to dark blue. A reddish or pink color may be visible in unripe berries.

■ **Blackberries:** Look for a smooth texture without any red appearance. Because blackberries don't ripen after being picked, they tend to spoil quickly.

■ **Cantaloupe:** You should detect a sweet smell, and the melon should feel heavy upon lifting.

■ **Peaches:** A sweet, fragrant

odor should be apparent. Skin should feel tender but not soft.

■ **Pineapple:** Smell is again an important factor for pineapple — a sweet scent shows it's ready, but a vinegary one likely means it's overripe.

■ **Raspberries:** Generally follow the same rules as blackberries. Best eaten within a couple days of purchase, a bright red color represents ripe berries.

■ **Bananas:** A ripe banana features a peel lightly spotted without significant bruising. Your best bet may be to purchase bananas still slightly green and allow them to ripen at home.

Empanadas, onion fritters and super-easy peach cobbler

It is so good to see Citrus County and all of Florida bustling and headed vibrantly into spring 2021! Caution should remain, but it appears we have met the enemy and mostly prevailed.

Annual festivals are drawing huge crowds and tourists seem to be finding a haven in the Sunshine State, judging by the number of visitors clogging the sidewalks and streets.

Gorgeous azaleas and other spring flowers are in bloom all over the area and it is a treat just to drive along city streets and view the spring floral bounty

Though it is still early, the Atlantic hurricane season is just around the corner starting June 1, so it is NOT too early to start checking your communication necessities (such as battery-operated radios) and essential food and water supplies.

With Easter 2021 now a pleasant memory, it is still time to look forward to delicious spring menus for your family and friends and I have some recipes today to whet your appetite

Let's start with empanadas, just because empanadas are celebrated on National Empanada Food Day today, April 8, according to <https://foodimentary.com/> that also lists

the following:

For starters, you might want to know an empanada is basically a single-serving turnover. It can be filled with sweet foods like fruits, sugars and syrups, or savory foods like meats, cheeses and oils.

They originated in northwest Spain, in a region known as Galicia.

Today they are most popular in Spanish-speaking countries across Europe and South America.

Originally they were made with bread dough, but now they are made with pastries as well.

From Goya Foods, a national supplier of all things Latino, comes this recipe for empanadas:

BEEF EMPANADAS

- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- 1/2 pound ground beef
- 1/2 medium yellow onion, finely chopped (about 1/2 cup)
- 1/4 cup Goya tomato sauce
- 6 Goya spanish olives stuffed with minced pimientos, thinly sliced
- 2 Tablespoons Goya sofrito
- 1 packet Sazón Goya with coriander and annatto
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic or 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1/2 teaspoon Goya dried oregano
- Ground black pepper, to taste
- 1 Package Goya Discos – Dough for turnover pastries (yellow or white), thawed
- Corn oil, for frying

Heat oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add ground beef and cook until browned, breaking up meat with a wooden spoon, about 10 minutes. Add onions and cook until soft, about 5 minutes more.

Stir in tomato sauce, olives, Sofrito, Sazón, garlic, oregano and black pepper. Lower heat to medium-low and

simmer until mixture thickens, about 15 minutes.

On a lightly floured work surface, using a rolling pin, roll out discos until 1/2-inch larger in diameter. Spoon about 1 tablespoon meat mixture into middle, fold in half to form a half moon; moisten edges with water and pinch to seal closed, or seal with a fork.

Fill a deep saucepan with oil to a depth of 2 1/2 inches. Heat oil over medium-high heat until hot but not smoking (350 degrees on deep-fry thermometer). Cook Empanadas in batches until crisp and golden brown, flipping once, 4 to 6 minutes. Transfer to paper towels to drain.

ONION FRITTERS

- 3/4 cup flour
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon panko
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 3/4 cup milk
- 2 1/2 cups chopped onions — about 3 small onions
- Oil for frying

Mix together dry ingredients. Add milk and stir. Batter will be thick. Add onions and mix thoroughly. Heat 1/2 inch oil in skillet over medium high heat and drop batter by tablespoons in hot oil.

Flatten slightly brown on both sides until nice and crisp. Drain, Good side dish with steak and other meats.

EASIEST PEACH COBBLER

- 1 cup sugar
 - 1 cup flour
 - 3/4 cup milk
 - 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- Mix all together.

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Melt 1 stick of butter in deep dish or a 9-inch by 13-inch pan. Pour above mixture over melted butter.

Do not stir. Pour 29-ounce can of sliced peaches (or fresh sliced peaches equivalent) over top. Bake at 325 degrees oven for 50 minutes.

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Citrus boys take second in GC8

Lecanto girls win conference title

LECANTO — Riley Dodd and Freddie Sansone battled through a marathon No. 1 doubles match that started in daylight and ended under the court lights.

When the final point was won, the Citrus duo found themselves on the winning end over the same players from Springstead they had lost to in singles a few hours earlier on Wednesday, 7-5, 5-7, 10-5.

The Eagles still won the two-day Gulf Coast 8 conference tournament at Lecanto, taking 13 matches compared to 11 by the Hurricanes. But Citrus got to leave on a celebratory note.

"It feels amazing. We lost to them the first time (in a previous match), but yeah we pulled it out this time," Dodd said. "I think we played some of the best doubles we've played so far and it was the best doubles match I've ever played with Freddie.

"I don't think me and Freddie have ever been in a tiebreaker. We communicated well. We were hitting good passing shots, good lobs. I think our communication was very key."

"I feel like we are tighter now as a team," Sansone said.

It was the one breakthrough the 'Canes had against Springstead during the second day of the tournament. Dodd dropped the No. 1 singles final to Oswaldo Cherubinim 6-2, 7-5, and Sansone fell at No. 2 to Raznu Chadnyski, 6-3, 7-5.

"I'm happy with that (second-place finish). Springstead's a tough team," Citrus boys coach Tia Nelson said. "We're excited and even more excited because of No. 1 doubles. They worked hard at that.

PSU transfer Jones to Florida

GAINESVILLE — Penn State's leading scorer is heading to Florida and could be a huge help right away.

Guard Myreon Jones announced his commitment to the Gators on Wednesday, joining fellow transfers Brandon McKissic from Kansas City and CJ Felder from Boston College as new additions for coach Mike White in Gainesville.

The 6-foot-3 Jones averaged 15.3 points last season and scored in double figures in all but two of the Nittany Lions' games. He closed the season with 10 consecutive games in double figures and finished as the Big Ten's 10th-highest scorer.

He shot 39.3% from the field and 39.5% from 3-point range.

He chose Florida over Arkansas, LSU, Ole Miss and others. The Birmingham, Alabama native was the top prospect in the state in 2018. He landed at Penn State after de-committing from Memphis after Tubby Smith was fired.

He will have two years of eligibility remaining with the Gators.

SPRING SWINGS

In an annual rite of spring, PGA's best will descend on Augusta in quest for green jacket

His final score at Augusta National wasn't all that set Dustin Johnson apart from other Masters champions.

No one else ever won the Masters and then didn't play another tournament the rest of the year. No other Masters champion was able to keep his green jacket at home for only five months before it was time to try to win it again. Then again, no one ever played the Masters in November.

Now it's back to being that annual rite of spring, and so much about this Masters that starts April 8 feels normal. Gone are the hues of autumn, majestic in a different way. Augusta National is blazing with pink, red and purple azaleas, along with the white blooms of dogwood in April. Inside the ropes — yes, there will be ropes this time — is a course that is expected to be play fast, firm and scary like always.

Johnson won by five shots at 20-under 268. It was the lowest score in tournament history, one of several records that fell in the soft conditions that were inevitable before the rye grass had taken root. Among other records that fell in November were 65 rounds in the 60s for the week, and 187 rounds at par or better.

"DJ, I think, would have won whether it was like it was in November or April," Justin Thomas said. "He played far and away better than anyone else."

So emotional when it was over, so satisfied with what he had done, Johnson took his green jacket home to Florida and didn't show up again until January. Asked if he felt shortchanged from only getting to keep it five months — only the champion can take his green jacket off property — Johnson laughed and replied, "It wouldn't bother me if I only had it for a day. It would be OK. I've got one. And five months, a year, one month, one day, it doesn't really make a difference to me."

Even with such a short turnaround, so much has changed.

Tiger Woods was host of the Masters Club dinner for past champions.

Now it's a question if he'll ever play again from shattering so many bones in his right leg and foot in a car crash in Los Angeles in late February. Jordan Spieth appears to have emerged from a three-year funk and was listed as among the favorites in Las Vegas. Rory McIlroy remains stuck in neutral and announced he was adding a new coach to his stable just three weeks before he tries again to win the Masters and complete the career Grand Slam.

And so much feels normal. The Masters returns sooner than ever, and not a moment too soon.

"I think it will be back to feeling like

a normal Masters," Johnson said. "I'm definitely looking forward to that."

THE ROARS

Another record set in November were 1,122 birdies for the week without a single roar. No spectators were allowed because of the COVID-19 restrictions. Augusta National is allowing a limited number of fans this year, although the club would not say how many weekly badges were sold. Minimal roars will be a welcome sound for the players. The Masters is as much about hearing as seeing. Fans have slowly been introduced at PGA Tour events since February. Even with a reduced number of spectators, the Masters still canceled the Par 3 Contest for the second straight year.

EXCLUSIVE COMPANY

Dustin Johnson set another Masters record with his 11 consecutive rounds under par. But that's not the record he wants. Only three players have ever won back-to-back at Augusta National, and Johnson would love nothing more than to join Jack Nicklaus, Nick Faldo and Tiger Woods. He won in his second tournament of the year at the Saudi International, but the month leading into the Masters has been curious for his level of play. Johnson has finished outside the top 25 in his last three tournaments.

THE COURSE

Jon Rahm hit a 4-iron into the par-5 15th hole that landed just short of the hole and wound up 3 feet behind. Any other Masters, he figures a shot struck like that would have bounded over the green and into the water on the 16th hole. That's one example of how different it played in November compared with April.

"I played with Sebastian Munoz on Sunday, and that was his first Masters. I pretty much told him, 'Anything you learn today, this week, forget about it.' Because it will never play like this again, period," Rahm said.

It still depends on the weather. Jordan Spieth won at 18-under par in 2015. Danny Willett won at 5-under 283 the next year. Both were in April, of course.

Annie offers advice

Dear Annie: My ex and I got married when I was 19. We stayed together for 10 years, during which I was dealing with untreated depression. That did not make life easy for either of us. Eventually, he left, leaving me to care for the kids. He gave us some financial support but was not present in their lives.

Unfortunately, I did not give my kids the attention I know now they badly needed. I was pre-occupied with my worry about being alone forever. I have tried to make up for this since, but my daughters still harbor a deep resentment for me. I have told them numerous times how much I regret my behavior and offered to hear all their sadness as a consequence of my actions without trying to defend myself. But they have both cut me out.

My son, the youngest, is still in my life and has reassured me that I was not a terrible mother. He also suffers from depression, and for years he abused drugs. I blame the fact that he had no father in the home for those important first years.

Even after all these years, I am still preoccupied with my time married to my ex. Random thoughts are always about him — what could have been — and I always feel on the verge of tears.

I'm about to turn 70. Is there a way to finally put this behind me? I've had much therapy over the years but still revert to the pain and sadness about the childhood I was unable to give my kids and the loss of my marriage. I think that if I go into therapy again, nothing will change. But should I try again? — **Regretful Mom**

Dear Regretful Mom: To the question of whether to try therapy again, my answer is always yes. In your case, especially so. You've been dealing with clinical depression since you were a teen. That black dog, as Winston Churchill called it, can't just be shaken off. Therapy won't wash away all your pain and regret, but it can help make your feelings more manageable and life more enjoyable.

Additionally, in light of your son's drug abuse, you might benefit from a support group such as Nar-Anon (www.nar-anon.org), LifeRing Secular Recovery (www.lifering.org) or Families Anonymous (www.familiesanonymous.org).

Dear Annie: I don't believe it is impossible for "In a Quagmire," who was "unable to use computers," to learn.

When I taught farmers how to use computers, I started out with how to turn the computer on and log on. After that, they played Solitaire until they learned how the mouse worked. Then let them do email until that is natural to them. The above process might take weeks. The important thing is to do something basic and not introduce other things until they are comfortable. It is not necessary to learn everything at once. It is overwhelming.

I learned that everyone learns differently. I had one user who took forever to learn anything, but once they had it down, they never made mistakes. I am 73 and have been working with computers for 55 years. If you want to learn, keep looking for an instructor who understands. Remember: One thing at a time. — **Wanda S.**

Dear Wanda: "One thing at a time" is good advice across the board. And I received a few follow-up letters to "In a Quagmire" that recommended playing Solitaire and other simple games to become more comfortable with the basics — smart tip.

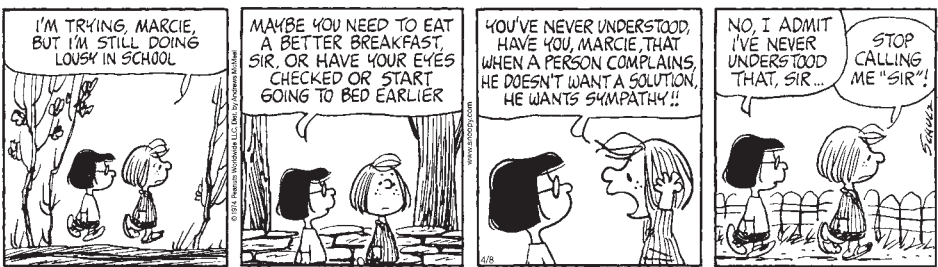

Turkey tips to be back by breakfast

Too many turkey hunters are loath to put in long hours, waiting on those midday gobblers to finally start traveling, in order to get a shot if they missed that opportunity at daylight. Not every hunt will allow that early morning success, but on those days when it all goes as planned, and you get to pull the trigger on a turkey shortly after his feet hit the ground, the excitement level is hard to beat. So, in hopes of increasing your score of gobblers fresh off the roost, I've got a few tips you may want to employ.

Know what tree he's in

It sounds fairly obvious ... but begin the hunt the evening before by listening for gobbling at last light as the turkeys fly up to roost. You need to know exactly where he's hanging out the night before your hunt to eliminate all the guesswork of where you

should set up to call the next morning.

Get in early

When I say arrive early, I'm not talking about just before daylight. I'm talking about slipping into position before the flock is even awake. If I'm setting up on a roosted bird, I try to be set up and in position a good hour before daylight. It sounds crazy, but you can literally slip in to his bedroom, and he'll never know you're in the world. But, if you're running late, he's going to spot you coming in and the hunt will be over before it begins.

Listen for the hens

If hens are roosted in the area, they will tell you when they are about to fly down. They'll start off soft and slow with their quiet tree yelps, mimic them. As they wake up a bit, you'll hear more intensity in their yelping and clucks and the fast and excited fly-down cackle is the obvious sound that they are

on their way to the ground. Copy that, too, then try to intensify the excitement with breeding yelps to seduce the gobbler into pitching down to you.

Have your gun ready and waiting

I've seen more hunts blown by hunters that got caught with their gun down. It's easy to get caught up listening to the gobblers and watching that big bird strutting into position that they forget to prepare for the shot.

Turkey hunting expert Chad Hodge of Quaker Boy Game Calls and I recently discussed this very thing. Don't get caught with your gun laying across your lap when that gobbler's feet hit the ground. Take advantage of the gobbling frenzy and birds in flight as they descend from the limb, to ensure that your gun is up and pointed in the right direction.

Hunting a roosted turkey is a perfect way to get out of the house during times when you just can't afford a full day of hunting. So, try following these few tips and they just might put you ahead of the game and have you back

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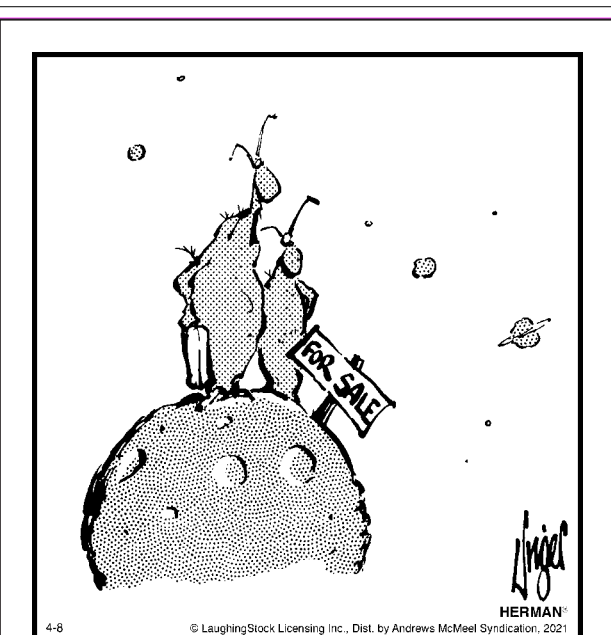
