



Attorney: Cruz to plead guilty to school massacre

FORT LAUDERDALE — The gunman who killed 14 students and three staff members at a Parkland, Florida, high school will plead guilty to their murders, his attorneys said Friday, bringing some closure to a South Florida community more than three years after an attack that sparked a nationwide movement for gun control.

The guilty plea would set up a penalty phase where Nikolas Cruz, 23, would be fighting against the death penalty and hoping for life without parole.

Cruz attorney David Wheeler told Circuit Judge Elizabeth Scherer that he will plead guilty Wednesday to 17 counts of first-degree murder in the February 2018 shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School. The pleas will come with no See PLEAD/Page A8

According to Florida Highway Patrol (FHP), which did not identify the couple involved in the 11:54 p.m. crash from Thursday, Oct. 14, the 42-year-old woman was riding as a passenger with the 43-year-old man.

As they were northbound on U.S. 98, approaching Museum Court, the man lost control of the motorcycle, which overturned while taking a curve in the road, struck a curb and then a wooden pole, according to FHP.

Emergency responders pronounced the woman dead at the crash scene, and treated the man for serious injuries. Neither the man or the woman was wearing a helmet, according to FHP.

Task force makes recommendations on condo safety

TALLAHASSEE Florida legislators should overhaul the state's condominium laws in the wake of the Surfside building collapse that killed 98 to address inspections, ensuring proper reserves are in place to make major safety repairs and other issues, according to a task force report prepared by a section of the Florida Bar.

The Real Property, Probate and Trust Law Section of the bar formed the task force bringing together lawyers specializing in condominium and association laws.

The goal was not to

While the report said the vast majority of condominium associations are operating in a reasonably safe manner, there needs to be more consistency with inspections and the information provided in them needs to be available to residents.

"Unit owners and boards may also resist such maintenance because of cost, lack of reserves, disruption and inconvenience," the report said.

The report also recommends allowing condominium boards to borrow

repairs so the cost could be spread out over years.

Local governments should also have a higher level of accountability for inspection reports, including stripping them of sovereign immunity protections, which limit civil claims against government agencies to \$200,000.

"Condominium residents should be entitled to rely on the inspections and reports performed by or on behalf of local governments, and local governments should not be able to avoid responsibility for the content and conclusion of building inspection reports," it said.

Cher sues heirs of **Sonny Bono over** song and record revenue

LOS ANGELES — Cher has sued the widow of her former musical partner and ex-husband Sonny Bono over royalties for Sonny and Cher songs including "I Got You Babe" and "The Beat Goes On."

In a federal lawsuit filed in Los Angeles on Wednesday, Cher alleges that former Rep. Mary Bono and other defendants have attempted to terminate provisions of business agreements Cher and Sonny Bono reached when they divorced in 1975 that entitled each to 50% of songwriting and recording royalties.

The lawsuit says that Sonny Bono's heirs filed notice in 2016 that they were terminating some of his song licensing agreements, but they "did not terminate, and could not have terminated" his agreements with Cher.

The breach-of-contract lawsuit alleges that the damages to Cher total at least \$1 million.

Mary Bono's attorney said the family's moves are within their rights and the law.

"The Copyright Act allows Sonny's widow and children to reclaim Sonny's copyrights from publishers, which is what they did," attorney Daniel Schacht said in a statement. "Representative Bono remains open to continuing a private discussion about this, but we are confident that, if necessary, the court will affirm their position."

Cher, the 75-year-old Grammy, Oscar and Emmy winning singer and actor known for solo hits including "Believe" and film roles including "Moonstruck,"

began performing as a duo with Sonny Bono in 1964. The two later had a TV variety show. They were married from 1969 to 1975.

Sonny Bono become mayor of Palm Springs and later a California congressman for the area. He died in a skiing accident in Lake Tahoe in 1998, and Mary Bono, his fourth wife, won his seat.

Cambridge college to return looted bronze statue

LONDON — A Cambridge University college said Friday that it would return a looted bronze cockerel to Nigeria later this month, making it the first U.K. institution to hand back one of the artifacts known as the

Benin Bronzes.

Jesus College announced in 2019 that it would return the Okukor, a statue that was taken from the Court of Benin in what is now Nigeria. British colonial forces took the artwork in 1897, and it was given to the college in 1905.

The college removed it from public view in 2016 after students protested, saying it represented a colonial narrative. The college set up a working group to examine the legacy of slavery, and the group concluded that the statue "belongs with the current Oba at the Court of Benin."

The Oba of Benin is head of the historic Eweka dynasty of the Benin Empire, centered on Benin City in modern-day Nigeria.

Troopers: Florida man grabbed steering wheel, caused crash

TAMPA — A 20-year-old Florida man is accused of grabbing the steering wheel and causing a woman to lose control of the car she was driving as they traveled on Interstate 75, officials said.

Nathaniel Allen Klippel was arrested Thursday afternoon in Tampa, the Florida Highway Patrol said. He

is accused of attempted murder and witness tampering and bond was set at \$150,000. The incident happened Sept. 4 in Alachua County as Klippel was arguing with a 20-year-old driver, a news release said. She lost control of the car and crashed.

They were both taken to a hospital, where multiple witnesses heard Klippel trying to intimidate the woman into not reporting what caused the crash, troopers said in the report. But a week later, she

contacted the highway patrol to report that that Klippel had grabbed the steering wheel while she was driving.

Rewards offered for information in alleged smuggling ring

MIAMI — The U.S. government is offering two \$1 million rewards for information leading to the arrest of a 40-year-old Pakistani man described as a "prolific human smuggler," and for information leading to the financial disruption of his smuggling network.

Abid Ali Khan is accused of leading an operation that has profited from the trafficking of hundreds of migrants from the Middle East and southwest Asia into the United States without legal permission since 2015, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement said. Investigators said Khan conspired with others in the network to coordinate the international travel, including false paperwork that let the migrants travel through multiple countries.

"Abid Ali Khan is alleged to be a prolific human smuggler who commands a criminal organization that spans the globe," Anthony Salisbury, special agent in charge of Homeland Security Investigations in Miami, said in a statement. "Khan is a very dangerous individual whose activities and associations may pose a national security risk to the United States and our partner nations."

Man pleads guilty to fatal shooting

TAMPA — A Florida man has pleaded guilty to fatally shooting another man for interfering in his drug business.

Corey Small, 43, of St. Petersburg, pleaded guilty Thursday in Tampa federal court to murder, as well as several gun and drug charges, according to court records.

Court documents show that Small was working with an employee of a night club to sell cocaine for him in 2018. Later that year, a friend of the nightclub employee attempted to persuade the employee to leave the club and stop selling drugs for Small. Prosecutors said this led to an argument between Small and the friend, which ended with Small shooting the other man four times.

Small also pleaded guilty to an unrelated armed robbery from 2014. Investigators said he stole \$51.41 from a dry-cleaning business after holding a clerk at gunpoint.

S&P 500's best week since July

Wall Street added to its recent gains Friday as stocks closed higher, driving the S&P 500 to its best week since July.

The S&P 500 rose 0.7% for its third straight gain and ended the week 1.8% higher. The Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 1.1% and the Nasdaq composite gained 0.5%.

The latest rally came as investors welcomed encouraging quarterly report cards from several companies. Leading the way for the S&P 500 was freight deliverer J.B. Hunt Transport Services, which jumped 8.7% after reporting stronger profits for the summer than Wall Street expected.

The positive company earnings dovetailed with a report showing people spent much more at U.S. retailers last month than Wall Street expected. Sales at stores, restaurants and other retail establishments rose 0.7% from August instead of falling, as economists forecast.

'We saw retail sales this morning come in pretty strong," said Sameer Samana, senior global market strategist at Wells reasonable valuapretty tions with another earnings season having just ticked on, and thus far at least, some pretty good results.'

It's a turnaround from a shaky few weeks, when the benchmark index fell as much as 5.2% from its record set on Sept. 2. Worries about stubbornly high inflation, reduced support for markets from the Federal Reserve and a slowing economy helped to knock stock prices around. The S&P 500 is back within 1.5% of its all-time high.

Earnings reporting season has just begun, but early indicators are encouraging. All but one of the 19 companies in the S&P 500 that reported quarterly results this week topped analysts' profit forecasts. Such strength is crucial after climbing interest rates heightened worries that stock prices had grown too expensive relative to profits.

The stronger-thanexpected reports on the economy also help calm chatter about "stagflation," which is the feared marriage of a stagnating economy and high inflation.

Of course, all is not clear yet. A report on Friday showing consumer sentiment was weaker than expected amid inflation worries helped limit the market's gains.

Still, stocks of compa-Fargo Investment Insti- nies whose profits are tute. "(Stocks) are still at most closely tied to the strength of the economy including retailers, automakers and travel-related businesses, led the way higher Friday. Amazon rose 3.3%, Tesla added 3% and Marriott International gained 3.1%. Other than financial companies, which benefited from the better-than-expected profit reports from several bigname banks, industrial and health care businesses were also among the strongest gainers. Caterpillar rose 2.4%, while UnitedHealth added 1.8%. Johnson & Johnson

gained 0.7% after a Food and Drug Administration panel endorsed booster doses of the company's single-shot COVID-19 vaccine. The panel said Friday that the booster should be offered at least two months after immunization but didn't suggest a firm time.

Treasury yields also rose following the much stronger-than-expected report on retail sales. The yield on the 10-year note climbed to 1.57% from 1.52% late Thursday.

"The biggest surprise on rates continues to be how low they are relative to all the anecdotal evidence and all the data about inflation that we see," Samana said.

Higher Treasury yields in recent weeks have been holding back technology and other high-growth stocks recently. When bonds are paying more in interest. investors aren't as willing to wait as long a time for big profit growth expectations to come to fruition or to pay as high prices for them.

Tech stocks in the S&P 500 fared a little better Friday, matching the broader market with a 0.8% gain, while the communication-services sector that includes many internet companies slipped 0.1%.

Stock markets overseas also notched gains. In Europe, Germany's DAX returned 0.8%, and France's

The S&P 500 rose 33.11 points to 4,471.37. The Dow gained 382.20 points to 35,294.76, and the Nasdaq rose 73.91 points to 14,897.34.

Friday's gain follows up on a 1.7% jump for the S&P 500 Thursday, its best day since March, which was driven by stronger-thanexpected earnings reports and encouraging data on the job market.

Goldman Sachs' profits jump 60%

NEW YORK — Goldman Sachs' profits jumped 60% in the third quarter, as the deal-making bonanza that dominated financial markets this summer brought in hundreds of millions of dollars in fee revenue for the investment bank.

The New York-based firm said Friday that it earned a profit of \$5.28 billion, or \$14.93 per share, compared with a profit of \$3.23 billion, or \$8.98 a share, in the same period a year earlier. The results were significantly better than the \$10.10-per-share profit that analysts had been expecting, according to FactSet.

Much of the jump in profit came from Goldman's advisory and investment banking business, where the firm helps companies go public or buy other companies. The firm brought in \$3.7 billion in investment banking revenue last quarter, up 88% from a year earlier.

The economic recovery after the pandemic has pushed many companies to seek new ways to grow, which has gone straight to Goldman's bottom line. Just in the U.S., there have been 94

States to get OK to order vaccines for younger children

NEW YORK - U.S. health officials are setting the stage for a na-COVID-19 tional vaccination campaign for younger children, inviting state officials to order doses before the shots are authorized.

Pfizer's coronavirus vaccine is currently being given to people as young as 12 in the U.S. In the next three weeks, federal officials plan to discuss making smaller-dose versions available to the nation's 28 million children between the ages of 5 and 11.

To help states and cities prepare, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention this week sent out a seven-page document with guidance on how to set up expanded vaccination programs.

Cities, police unions clash as vaccine mandates take effect

Police departments around the U.S. that are requiring officers to get vaccinated against COVID-19 are running up against pockets of resistance that some fear could leave law enforcement shorthanded and undermine public safety.

Police unions and officers are pushing back by filing lawsuits to block the mandates. In Chicago, the head of the police union called on members to defy the city's Friday deadline for reporting their COVID-19 vaccination status.

Seattle's police department sent detectives and non-patrol officers to emergency calls this week because of a shortage of patrol officers that union leaders fear will become worse because of vaccine mandates.

The standoffs are playing out at a time when many police departments already are dealing with surging homicide rates and staff shortages unrelated to the vaccine. Cities and police leaders are now weighing the risk of losing more officers to resignations, firings or suspensions over their refusal to get vaccinated.

the local Fraternal Order of Police, accusing him of "engaging in, supporting and encouraging work stoppage or strike" by saying the city's more than 12,000 uniformed officers should ignore the order to report their vaccination status.

On Thursday, Mayor Lori Lightfoot said officers would not be sent home if they showed up to work Friday and refused to provide their information. Instead, she said, they would be put on unpaid leave after the weekend, because confirming compliance would take a few days.

Refusing to provide the information, Lightfoot said, would constitute an act of insubordination.

John Catanzara, president of the FOP local in Chicago, said about half of his members have not been vaccinated and called a mandate requiring inoculation "absolutely wrong."

"They were willing to go into a no-pay status at midnight tonight and get sent home," he said, suggesting during an appearance on Fox News that the city could not afford to lose police officers.

"You know, the reality is we have a profession nobody else wants to do right now. They cannot get anybody to go into this police academy," he said.

UK officers probe lawmaker's stabbing death

LEIGH-ON-SEA, England A long-serving member of Parliament was stabbed to death Friday during a meeting with constituents at a church in England, an attack that united Britain's fractious politicians in shock and sorrow. A 25-year-old man was arrested at the scene.

Police said that counterterrorism officers were leading the investigation into the slaying of Conservative lawmaker David Amess but that they had not yet determined whether it was a terrorist attack.

They did not identify the suspect, who was held on suspicion of murder.

"The investigation is in its very early stages," Essex Police Chief Constable Ben-Julian Harrington said. "It will be for investigators to determine whether or not this is a terrorist incident."

Biden reassures progressives on spending bill

HARTFORD, Conn. -President Joe Biden said Friday that although he expects his social safety net and climate spending package to shrink, "we're going to come back and get the rest" after it's passed, a seeming effort to assuage progressives worried their priorities may get cut in the negotiations. "We're not going to get \$3.5 trillion. We'll get less than that, but we're gonna get it. And we're going to come back and get the rest," he said during remarks at a child care center in Connecticut. Democrats on Capitol Hill are working to reduce the sweeping package down to about \$2 trillion in spending, which would be paid for with higher taxes on corporations and the wealthy. The proposal includes everything from free child care and community college to dental, vision and hearing aid benefits for seniors and a number of significant provisions meant to combat climate change, all key items for progressives, but moderates have balked at the original \$3.5 trillion price tag.

"If this year has shown us anything, it's that climate change poses an ongoing urgent and systemic risk to our economy and to the lives and livelihoods of everyday Americans, and we must act now," Gina McCarthy, the White House national climate adviser, told reporters.

China crackdown hits holy book apps, Audible

Amazon's audiobook service Audible and phone apps for reading the holy books of Islam and Christianity have disappeared from the Apple store in mainland China, the latest examples of the impact of the country's tightened rules for internet firms.

Audible said Friday that it removed its app from the Apple store in mainland China last month "due to permit requirements."

The makers of apps for reading and listening to the Quran and Bible say their apps have also been removed from Apple's China-based store at the government's request.

Apple didn't return requests for comment Friday. A spokesperson for China's embassy in the U.S. declined to speak about specific app removals but said the Chinese government has "always encouraged and supported the development

WASHINGTON — A commission tasked with studying potential changes to the Supreme Court has released a first look at its review, a draft report that is cautious in discussing proposals for expanding the court but also speaks approvingly of term limits for justices.

The 36-member bipartisan commission, largely composed of academics, has been studying court reform and holding hearings, but it was not charged with making recommendations under the White House order that created it. As a result, much of the some 200 pages of materials the commission released Thursday night are history and context for reform proposals.

A final report from the committee, which was meeting Friday, is expected in about a month and would go to the president then. Even when the commission does finish its work, however, any proposals for change

Biden, an institutionalist at heart, had told advisers that he was not inclined to do so, in part because it would open the door for the Republicans to do the same when they had the chance.

WH targeting economic risks from climate

WASHINGTON - The Biden administration is taking steps to address the economic risks from climate change, issuing a 40-page report Friday on government-wide plans to protect the financial, insurance and housing markets and the savings of American families.

The report lays out steps that could potentially alter the mortgage process, stock market disclosures, retirement plans, federal procurement and government budgeting.

It's a follow-up to a May executive order by President Joe Biden that essentially calls on the government to analyze how the world's largest economy could be affected by extreme heat, flooding, storms, wildfires and the broader adjustments needed to address climate change.

Attack on mosque in Afghanistan kills dozens

KABUL, Afghanistan -Suicide bombers attacked a Shiite mosque packed with worshippers attending Friday prayers in southern Afghanistan, killing at least 47 people and wounding 70, a Taliban official said. It was the deadliest day since the U.S. military withdrawal.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the carnage at the Fatimiya mosque in Kandahar province. The attack came a week after a bombing claimed by the local Islamic State affiliate killed 46 people at a Shiite mosque in northern Afghanistan.

The sectarian bloodletting has raised fears that IS - an enemy of both the Taliban and the West - is expanding its foothold in Afghanistan.

Hafiz Sayeed, the Taliban's chief for Kandahar's department of culture and information, said 47 people had been killed and at least 70 wounded in the attack.

IS has claimed a number of deadly bombings across the country since the Taliban seized power in August amid the withdrawal of U.S. forces. The group has also targeted Taliban fighters in smaller attacks.

If the attack was carried out by IS, it would be the first major assault by the extremist group in southern Afghanistan since the U.S. departure enabled the Taliban to consolidate control of the country.



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In the auction, North's response was the Jacoby Forcing Raise, showing four-plus trumps and at least game-forcing values. South's threeno-trump rebid denied a singleton or void but promised some 14-16 points. Three control-bids followed, and South, liking his excellent trumps, jumped to six spades. Fine bidding but not a good slam!

West led a trump primarily because any other choice risked losing a trick.


Declarer could see that, even though he had avoided the lethal diamond lead, he was still facing two probable minor-suit losers. Was there any chance to make the slam?

South realized that he had to collect three club tricks, discarding dummy's two diamond losers in the process.

With this in mind, declarer drew two rounds of trumps, led a club to dummy's ace and followed with the club six. East defended well, playing low smoothly. But South, enjoying one of his more lucid moments, realized that he had to put up his queen. When it did win the trick, declarer conceded a diamond and claimed his slam.

South asked West, "Did you have jack-third of clubs?

"Of course I did," was the reply. "Otherwise, my partner wouldn't have ducked the club king."





Fournette adding balance to Bucs' offense

Had 81 yards rushing and two scores in win

TAMPA — Tampa Bay's injury-riddled defense has yet to hit its stride this season. However, the Buccaneers continue to thrive with an offense that's become even more potent with the re-emergence of Leonard Fournette.

The talented running back, in his second season with the defending Super Bowl champions after wearing out his welcome in Jacksonville, is making the most of an opportunity to re-establish himself as a featured back.

The Bucs have made a conscious effort to get the fifth-year pro more involved in the passing attack the past three games, and Fournette has embraced the expanded role that's eased some of the burden on Tom Brady, who leads the NFL in passing

Although the Bucs (5-1) have yet to have a 100-yard rusher this season, the running game is showing life after Fournette accounted for 139, 110 and 127 total yards from scrimmage in wins over the Patriots, Dolphins and Eagles within a span of 12 days.

In addition to rushing for 81 yards and two touchdowns in Thursday night's 28-22 victory at Philadelphia, he caught all six passes Brady threw to him for another 46 yards.

"To be honest, it is just hard work," Fournette said. "Throughout the week, we had a game plan and I try and follow that as much as I can down to the core to help my team out and put us in a better position. That is all I am doing."

Brady made a call to Fournette when the running back was released by the against the Eagles, finishing with nine Jaguars, encouraging him to consider joining the Bucs. The two of them frequently spend extra time after practice working on pass routes.

'He's trying to tell me what he likes, what he thinks the route should be, and I just follow," Fournette said.

"He's a great back. He's big, tough, catches it, runs, blocks, does everything for us," Brady said. "Great to have him in there. Obviously when he's rolling, it's tough to stop us.'

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

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
