#### Many Citrus County nonprofits desperately seeking volunteers

olunteers are the backbone of any nonprofit organization. They help keep the doors open and the wheels running so organizations can deliver vital services and programs that serve as lifelines to a community.

According to a 2021 AmeriCorps report for the state of Florida:

- 3,876,534 volunteers contribute 340.7 million hours of service
- 22.8% of residents volunteer, ranking them 51st among states
- Volunteer service worth an estimated \$8.2 billion
- 95.4% of residents regularly talk or spend time with friends and family
- 50.9% of residents do favors for neighbors
- 23.6% of residents do something positive for the neighborhood
- 19.2% of residents participate in local groups or organizations
- 43.2% of residents donate \$25 or

more to charity However, 19 months into the coronavirus pandemic, volunteering is still a casualty of the disease

Just as employers report difficulty finding employees, nonprofits are hurting for volunteers.

This is happening all over the nation, not just Citrus County," said Laurie Diestler, Citrus County

Nature Coast Volunteer Center seasonal volunteers to begin with, and a lot are snowbirds and are just starting to return, so we'll see what happens," she said.

Besides tram drivers, the park also needs certified SCUBA dive volunteers to clean the underwater windows of the Fish Bowl Underwater Observatory and check the spring for hazards that could be harmful to manatees, from umbrellas and cellphones to fishing line and lures.

## Citrus schools hope to secure federal funding

The Citrus County School Board has a packed agenda for their upcoming meeting, including the pending approval of significant federal funding for secondary and post-secondary education.

Their regular meeting is slated for 4 p.m. Oct. 12 at the Citrus County School District administrative office, 1007 W. Main St. in Inverness

School board members will vote to approve the "Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act (Perkins V Grant)" in the amount of \$183,687. Its purpose is to help students grades six to 12 acquire academic and technical skills to prepare for future careers.

The grant will fund a full-time program specialist for career and technical education and site licenses, software and technical development for career and technical education (CTE).

The funds will be used at Crystal River High School (CRHS) for their anatomy and physiology, health science foundations and electrocardiograph technician programs, along with a cardiovascular technology course at Santa Fe College.

An additional Perkins V Grant in the amount of \$75,000 is pending approval from the board for educational materials for the Department of Juvenile Justice. Items will enhance food

## County, HOA to talk median mess

The median strip along a onemile portion of U.S. 98 from the Suncoast Parkway to U.S. 19 was supposed to be filled with pretty flowers, shrubs and other landscaping to make it esthetically pleasing.

For a while, it looked pretty good, thanks to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) installing and footing the bill for all the greenery.

But now, the median is dotted with overgrown grass, weeds and is not exactly the beautification the county expected.

What went wrong? want to know. They sent a letter to the county saying it's received complaints and what to know why

It all comes to a head Tuesday when commissioners will ask the Sugarmill Woods Oak Village Homeowners Association (HOA) why they are shirking their job of caring for the plants. A previous HOA board signed a stewardship agreement with FDOT to maintain the media.

But the HOA has a new slate of officers who don't want to spend the estimated \$37,000 a year to do

#### How we got here

In 2019, the HOA asked the county if it could help them apply for a \$350,000 FDOT landscaping grant wherein the state would pay 100% of the cost. The county applied for and received the grant, a local contractor was hired and last year, the median slowly was transformed into a colorful corridor

To protect its investment, FDOT wanted an annual maintenance agreement in place. The contractor agreed to do it the first year and the HOA would take over after that.

In the interval, a new HOA board took over and thought twice \$37,000-a-year Inverness. about the

The Chronicle reached out to maintenance cost to tack on to the 3,200-plus homeowners who were already paying \$135 annual dues.

"They've had a change in leadership in the HOA and the new leadership doesn't want to maintain it," Kinnard said.

At Tuesday's commission meeting, Kinnard said the board essentially has two options: either the county assumes the \$37,000-a-year price tag to maintain the median or establish a Municipal Services Benefit Unit (MSBU) where costs would be spread out among residents.

The board could also ask the contractor to remove all the landscaping and restore the median to its pre-improvement condition.

The county commission meeting starts at 1 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 12, at the Citrus County Courthouse, 110 N. Apopka Ave.,

## First 'Taste' to come to Crystal River



"If I have enough people, we're in the water three days a week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday," Spratt said.

Diestler said of the 529 Citrus County volunteers registered with the Ameri-Corps Seniors RSVP program that NCVC runs, currently about half are actually turning in hours.

'When COVID hit, a lot of our organizations that use volunteers scaled back or had their volunteers not come in at all," Diestler said. "When things started looking better (this past spring), people started going back to volunteering, but then when it started getting worse with the Delta variant, they got worried again.





"I was upset. I was ready to go home. It was time to get the helicopter and get out of here," Hendrick said. "We wrecked every-thing we had down there."



"For us, we're just eyes forward and happy to be moving on," Elliott said. "That's the big picture. We'll keep fighting.'

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## **Bucs blast Dolphins**

## Brady's 5 TD passes pace win for Tampa Bay

TAMPA — Antonio Brown is 33 years old and no longer the top playmaker on his team. With Tom Brady's help on and off the field, though, the oft-troubled receiver is making the most of an opportunity to revive his career with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Brady threw for 411 yards and five touchdowns, while Brown showed no signs of slowing down as a playmaker, becoming the fastest NFL player to 900 receptions as the defending Super Bowl champions rolled to a 45-17 rout of the Miami Dolphins on Sunday.

'I take so much inspiration from Tom. As a professional, as a leader, making sure that I'm doing my job, making sure that all the other 10 guys are doing their job," said Brown, who had seven catches for 124 yards and two TDs. "He just continues to up the standard and raise the

Brady threw for more 400 yards with five TDs in the same game for the first time in his 22-year career.

Brown, who joined the Bucs at midseason a year ago after serving an eight-game suspension for violating the NFL personal conduct policy, scored on receptions of 62 and 4 yards in the first half.

Brown, who has stayed out of trouble since signing with the Bucs and helping them win the Super Bowl, joined Julio Jones, Jerry Rice, Torry Holt and Andre Johnson as the only players in league history with 12,000 career receiving yards in fewer than 150 games.

Roethlisberger's No. 1 option for much of his career. After a brief stay in training camp with the Raiders, Brown played one game with Brady in New England before being released by the Patriots two years ago.

"I've played with some great quarterbacks. Roethlisberger. Tom Brady. It's a blessing," said Brown, one of a slew of dynamic targets on a deep, talented Tampa Bay roster also featuring Mike Evans, Chris Godwin, Rob Gronkowski and Fournette.

"When you got Chris and Mike, and AB's the third guy, it's ain't a fair fight," Bucs coach Bruce Arians said

Brown also extended the NFL's longest active streak with at least one catch to 141 consecutive games and also became the fastest to 900 career receptions on his first catch of the day. He reached the milestone in 143 career games. Hall of Famer Marvin Harrison was the previous fastest at 149.

"It's pretty amazing. Just give through a lot and he's shown a lot of mental toughness, a lot of resilience. Everyone just wants him to succeed," Brady said.

"We've got a unique group of guys. Very talented, but very

those guys are getting opportunities to make plays, and just fun to see when everyone's involved how fun it can be.'

Since entering the league as a sixth-round draft pick of the Steelers in 2010, Brown has 45 100-yard games receiving – second in the league behind Julio Jones (59). His 19 games with multiple TD catches are tied with Gronkowski for the most over the span.

Evans had TD catches of 34 and 22 yards, and Giovani Bernard also scored on a 10-yard reception from Brady, who finished 30 of 41 with no interceptions — the third straight game the Bucs have gone without a turnover.

The Dolphins (1-4) have lost The 11th-year pro was Ben four straight following a season-opening victory over New England.

'We didn't execute our game plan defensively. Just collectively as a defense we just didn't do enough. I'm concerned. We're out of sync," Miami coach Brian Flores said. "We've adjusted some things, but we're not seeproduction on the Sundays.

Jacoby Brissett completed 27 of 39 passes for 275 yards, two TDs and an interception in his third consecutive start filling in for the injured Tua Tagovailoa.

'Obviously it's cliche, it's him a lot of credit. He's been early in the season, but it really is," the Dolphins quarterback added. "We've got a lot of football ahead of us.'

## Red Sox bounce Rays in 13th

BOSTON — Saved by a bizarre bounce and an obscure ruling, the Boston Red Sox beat Tampa Bay 6-4 Sunday night on a walkoff, two-run homer by Christian Vázquez in the 13th inning to move one victory from eliminating the 100-win Rays from the AL Division Series.

The wild-card Red Sox took a 2-1 edge in the best-of-five matchup. Game 4 is Monday at Fenway Park — Marathon Day in Boston with Game 5 in St. Petersburg, on Wednesday, if necessary.

Tampa Bay rallied from a 4-2 deficit to tie it in the eighth inning and it was still 4-all when Yandy Diaz singled with one out in the 13th. Kevin Kiermaier lined a two-out shot to right-center that bounced off the short wall in front of the Red Sox bullpen, caromed off right fielder Hunter Renfroe and flew back into the bullpen as Renfroe leaped to try to keep it in play.

It's a good thing he didn't: After the umpires conferred and went to the headsets, they correctly awarded Kiermaier a ground rule double and sent Diaz, who had come all the way home, back to third.

Diaz was halfway from second to third and easily would have scored if the ball remained in play. But baseball Rule 5.05(a)(8) states: "Any bounding fair ball is deflected


In today's deal, South was in six spades. West led the heart king. Declarer won with dummy's ace and cashed his two top trumps, East discarding a club on the second. How did South continue?

North's four no-trump was Roman Key Card Blackwood. South's response showed (zero or) three key cards, counting the four aces and the trump king as key. North used the next step to ask for the spade queen and settled for six spades when South denied that card.

With a guaranteed trump loser, declarer had to discard both of his low hearts before West could ruff in and cash the heart queen. That required finding West with four diamonds and East with a singleton nine, 10 or jack. At trick four, South cashed the diamond queen, carefully unblocking the seven from the dummy. East's 10 was a hopeful start. Next came the diamond six. When West played the four, declarer didn't submit or yield: He called for dummy's five. The six won!

Declarer played three more rounds of diamonds, discarding his heart losers, and claimed.
