**Woman faces life in prison**

Jury finds 42-year-old guilty in connection with violent 2019 home invasion

Jurors convicted Dorothy Ball-McDuffie for her role in an Inverness home invasion, which left the homeowner unconscious and with a severed finger. A jury the afternoon of Thursday, Dec. 2, found Ball-McDuffie guilty as charged as a principal to armed kidnapping, a principal to armed robbery, a

principal to burglary with battery, a principal to witness tampering and conspiring to commit armed robbery. It took roughly 40 minutes for the four men and two women to reach their unanimous verdict, which Ball-McDuffie responded to with tears.

Citrus County Circuit Court Judge Richard

"Ric" Howard will sentence the Summerfield 42-year-old Jan. 26.

Prosecutors with the State Attorney's Office are seeking to have Howard designate Ball-McDuffie as a habitual felony offender, which, if the judge grants, would pit Ball-McDuffie up against possible life sentences for four of her five charges.

Ball-McDuffie decided not to testify during her trial, which began Wednesday with opening statements and most of the testimony.

Ball-McDuffie is the second of three defendants to resolve their felony case in connection to the violent Dec. 27, 2019, ransacking of Garry Krause's home off of East Quail Court.

Jessica Hill, a Dunnellon 35-year-old, pleaded

no contest Nov. 23, 2021, to her charges in exchange for six years in prison.

As a condition of her plea deal, Hill agreed to testify in the trials of her codefendants, and took the witness stand during Ball-McDuffie's trial.

Daytona 31-year-old William Olsen Jr. is due to stand trial the week of Jan. 31.

**Local man in wheelchair working to get beach access mat at Fort Island**

On a recent cool, clear afternoon at Fort Island Gulf Beach in Crystal River, 24-year-old Bruce Titus pronounced it a perfect day. "I love it here," he said. "Growing up in Citrus County, as a kid my family would come

here quite a bit, watching the sun set, swimming in the water, building sand castles. "It's the one thing I miss," he said. In 2016, as he rode his bicycle down Citrus Avenue in Crystal River heading home one evening, a car struck him from behind. The accident left him paralyzed from the chest down, consigned

to a wheelchair. Although Titus is keenly adept at getting around in his chair and doesn't let the chair stop him from living his life to the fullest, the beach is still a challenge. He can get from his car to the sidewalk next to the parking lot, and from the sidewalk to the restrooms pavilion, and maybe to one of the

covered picnic tables next to the restrooms. But he can't get to the water. "I can roll on grass and regular sand, but not sugar sand or beach sand," he said. "That's the issue ... I love nature. I love being outside. "There's a place in Old Homosassa where I go, off Mason Creek Road, a little trail that

goes to the water. It's off-road, but it's manageable," he said. "But it would be nice to swim at the beach again." His solution: install an (ADA) Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant beach access mat that would enable people in wheelchairs to travel across the sand to the water.

**Flood loan relief deadline is Dec. 9**

Citrus Countians who experienced flooding issues only have until Dec. 9 to apply for a low-interest disaster loan from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). The SBA on Monday opened a Disaster Loan Outreach Center at the Citrus County Canning Center, 3405 W. Southern St. in Lecanto. Numbers are only available for Tuesday, when about 15 applied. "We're trying to get the word out about it," Emergency Management

Director Amanda Woodward said. "I don't think a lot of people know about it." Record summer rainfall caused record flooding throughout Citrus County. Some homeowners lost everything. Woodward said the final assessed property damage value due to flooding was \$10.1 million for 157 properties. "We had people whose homes were basically destroyed," she said. One of the worst hit was the Singing Forest Mobile Home Park in Floral City. Heavy rains in August

**Even Christmas trees face supply crunch**

ALAMEDA, Calif. — Even Christmas trees aren't immune to the pandemic-induced shortages and inflation plaguing the economy. Extreme weather and supply chain disruptions have reduced supplies of both real and artificial trees this season. American shoppers should expect to have fewer choices and pay up to 30% more for both types this Christmas, industry officials said. "It's a double whammy — weather and supply

chain problems are really hampering the industry," said Jami Warner, executive director of the American Christmas Tree Association, an industry trade group. "Growers have been hard hit by floods, fires, smoke, drought, extreme weather conditions." Record-breaking heat and wildfires in late June took a heavy toll on Christmas tree farms in Oregon and Washington, two of the nation's largest growers. Warner could not provide an estimate of how many fewer trees there

will be this year but because it takes up to 10 years to grow, the crop loss will be felt for many seasons to come. The shortage of truck drivers is making it harder and more expensive to transport live trees from farms to stores and tree lots. Warner's advice: "Shop early. If you see something you like, buy it." At Crystal River Christmas Trees, owner Dale Pine and his nephew Stacy Valenzuela struggled to get

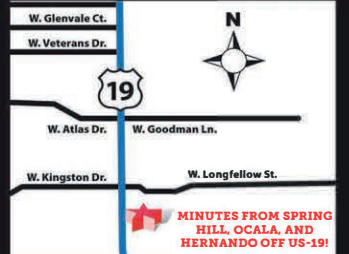

Rep. Dr. Ralph Massullo, chairman of the Citrus County Legislative Delegation, announced the annual Legislative Delegation public meeting will be from 1 to 4 p.m. Friday, Dec. 10, at the County Commissioner's Chamber, Room 100, in the Citrus County Court House, 110 N. Apopka Ave., Inverness.

The annual public meeting will be used to receive testimony from concerned citizens, elected officials and state and local organizations. Decisions regarding local legislation for the 2022 Legislative Session will be made at this time.

All proposals for local bills will be presented at the hearing and accompanied by a resolution from the local government supporting the proposed legislation. This information must be submitted to Rep. Massullo's office, 4067 N. Lecanto Hwy., Beverly Hills, FL 34465, on or before noon Monday, Dec. 6.

**Northern turnpike extension public meetings scheduled**

FDOT has scheduled two public meetings in early December to begin the process of a Project Development and Environment (PD&E) study for the Northern Turnpike Extension. The meetings will be held Dec. 7 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. at the College of Central Florida, 15390 U.S. 19, Chiefland, and Dec. 9, from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. at the College of Central Florida, 3800 S. Lecanto Highway, Lecanto.

Meetings can be attended either in person, or virtually VIA Computer, or by telephone. You can register for the meetings at <https://tinyurl.com/acbberdj>.

The Legislature directed in Senate Bill 100 that a report summarizing the status of the PDE study be presented to the governor and Legislature by Dec. 31, 2022. The study will evaluate alternative routes for the extension, in a generally northwestward direction from the current turnpike terminus at I-75 in Wildwood, to either U.S. 19 in Levy County, or to connect with the Suncoast Parkway future route and U.S. 19 in Citrus County north of Crystal River.

Four tentative corridors for the study have been placed on the map, two of which generally follow previously proposed corridors north and west through Sumter Marion, and Levy Counties. Two of the four corridors stay in the very southern edge of Marion County, Sumter and Levy Counties. One of these corridors ("Alternative Corridor Central") would appear to have comparatively less environmental impact.

## Nap at gas station leads to various drug charges

A Summerfield woman woke up on the wrong side of the car when she was found in the possession of 11.2 grams of various illicit substances, according to a Citrus County Sheriff's Office arrest affidavit.

Brianna Lewis, 28, was arrested Nov. 23 for possessing a controlled substance and introducing contraband into a detention facility. Bond was set at \$8,000.

Deputies arrived at an Inverness gas station after being advised there was a woman, later identified as Lewis, sleeping behind the wheel of her parked car near a gas pump.

According to the report, deputies asked Lewis where she was coming from. She said she picked her dog up at a friend's house and was traveling home to Summerfield.

While talking to Lewis, deputies reportedly smelled cannabis coming from inside the vehicle. When asked, Lewis told deputies she did not have a medical marijuana card.

Lewis reportedly told deputies she did not know why the car smelled like cannabis and there was nothing illegal in the car. Deputies told her they had reason to search the vehicle due to the smell and her lack of a medical marijuana card.

According to the report, Lewis said she understood and allowed them to search. Deputies noted she opened the door, but remained inside for an extended period of time. She was also reaching into the pocket of her sweatshirt.

After Lewis exited, deputies secured her dog and conducted a hand search of the car. They reportedly found two clear baggies on the floor of the driver's seat containing what looked to be methamphetamine and fentanyl.

Lewis was handcuffed and during a search of her person, deputies found another plastic bag with what looked to be crack cocaine in Lewis' sweatshirt pocket.

According to the report, each bag tested positive for their suspected substance with a field test kit. Lewis was placed under

arrest and transported to the Citrus County Detention Facility for booking and processing.

Later, detention facility staff advised deputies another clear plastic bag was concealed in Lewis'

undergarment. The contents of the bag reportedly tested positive for the presence of THC.

All four substances were weighed and yielded the following: meth, 2.8 grams; crack cocaine, 3.1 grams;

fentanyl, 0.5 grams; and cannabis, 4.8 grams.

## UK court backs Meghan in dispute with publisher

LONDON — The Duchess of Sussex won the latest stage in her privacy lawsuit against a British newspaper on Thursday, when three senior judges ruled its publisher breached her privacy by reproducing parts of a letter she wrote to her estranged father.

The duchess formally known as American actress **Meghan Markle** said the Court of Appeal ruling was a victory of "right versus wrong." She issued a call to "reshape a tabloid industry" that has long been the bane of both celebrities and British royals.

Losing claimant Associated Newspapers said it was considering an appeal to the U.K. Supreme Court.

Britain's High Court ruled in February that the publisher of The Mail on Sunday and MailOnline website unlawfully breached Meghan's privacy with five articles that reproduced a large chunk of a handwritten letter she sent her father, **Thomas Markle**, after she married Prince Harry in 2018.

The publisher appealed, and a hearing was held last month. Dismissing the appeal, senior appeals judge **Geoffrey Vos** said Thursday that "the Duchess had a reasonable expectation of privacy in the contents of the letter. Those contents were personal, private and not matters of legitimate public interest."

In a statement, Meghan, 40, said the ruling was "a victory not just for me, but for anyone who has ever felt scared to stand up for what's right."

"What matters most is that we are now collectively brave enough to reshape a tabloid industry that

conditions people to be cruel, and profits from the lies and pain that they create," she said.

Associated Newspaper' lawyers disputed Meghan's claim that she didn't intend the letter to be seen by anyone but her father.

## Alicia Keys teases new songs ahead of Miami art fair

MIAMI — R&B singer-songwriter **Alicia Keys** guided a few hundred people at a small show in Miami through a 10-minute meditation before asking them to make some choices.

Keys wanted concert goers gathering for an immersive exhibit on the eve of Art Basel Miami Beach to listen to her new material, and then pick either the

relaxing piano versions the Grammy-winning artist is best known for, or the more-produced tracks with a different beat for the same songs.

"I say that's even" said Keys, seemingly surprised after singing and then playing bits of "Is it Insane," a jazzy and melancholic tune. The three songs she teased will appear on her new album, which is being released on Dec. 10 with two versions she is calling "Originals" and "Unlocked," produced by **Mike Will Made-It**.

Keys headlined an experiential art show at Superblue Miami, appearing as one of the main performers trekking down to Miami for the international art fair that runs Thursday to Saturday.

Keys and her husband, producer **Swizz Beatz**, are no strangers to the art fair, having supported struggling artists allowing them to keep 100 percent of their commissions from the show.

# Florida law school creates Ben Crump social justice center

A South Florida law school on Thursday announced the creation of a social justice center named after Ben Crump, the Black civil rights attorney who has gained national prominence representing victims of police brutality and vigilante violence.

The Benjamin L. Crump Center for Social Justice, housed at the St. Thomas University College of Law in Miami Gardens, aims to nurture the next generation of civil rights lawyers while also pushing more racial and gender diversity in the legal profession, school officials told The

Associated Press ahead of the announcement.

Calls for racial justice grew louder in the wake of the 2020 protests over George Floyd's murder by a Minneapolis police officer. But the nation lacks a robust pipeline of social justice lawyers ready to take on such cases, said Crump, who has represented the families of Floyd, Trayvon Martin, Michael Brown and Breonna Taylor, among others.

"We really are trying to prepare an army — the next generation of social justice engineers," the Tallahassee, Florida-based attorney told the AP.

"We will have the next

Thurgood Marshall, the next Constance Baker Motley, or the next Kamala Harris, to light the way for our community and get the American promise of liberty and justice for all," Crump added.

Beginning with a \$1 million leadership grant from Truist Financial Corp.'s charitable fund, the Crump Center will support an incubator program for students looking to establish themselves in civil rights and social justice lawyering. The center also will increase need-based financial aid for students and will assist new lawyers with expanded pro bono service placements.

"No one becomes Ben Crump

on their first day as a lawyer, but mentorship is critical to building the confidence and the platform for people to excel," said Tamara Lawson, dean of the St. Thomas University College of Law.

Lawson said the center will focus on training students to be leaders in social justice lawyering. "It's not just about participating in the work, but creating the vision and taking it to the next level," she said.

On Thursday, the law school also will launch a \$35 million fundraising campaign to expand its ongoing training of lawyers who fight for social justice. The money is expected to be used for construction of a

new building for the Crump Center, as well as new classrooms and simulated courtrooms, Lawson said.

The university's announcement comes a week after Crump, with civil rights leader the Rev. Al Sharpton and the family of Ahmaud Arbery, heralded guilty verdicts in the murder trial of three white men in Arbery's death. The 25-year-old Black man was chased and then shot and killed in February 2020 as he jogged through the men's Brunswick, Georgia, neighborhood. The verdicts notched yet another high-profile victory for Crump, whom some call "Black America's attorney general."

“It started as a persuasive essay for an English class, writing about the benefits of a mat,” Titus said. He’s currently in his second semester of college, working toward a drafting career.

In his research for the essay, he discovered that many large beaches, including some in Florida, offer Mobi-mat beach access mats, which are self-maintaining.

The cost varies depending on size, but Titus estimated a mat from the parking lot to the water at Fort Island Beach would cost between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

So, what began as a school assignment turned into a crusade.

“I’m very driven to accomplish this,” he said. “At first, right after my

accident when I was in rehab, I couldn’t even sit up by myself — no stomach muscles. So, I learned to use my arms for everything.

“Your everyday life in a wheelchair is problem solving,” he said. “You’re always thinking about how to do things differently, because you can’t do them the way you used to. So, every day you’ve got problems to overcome, with new challenges.”

He said he hopes to get the attention of the county, especially after posting his idea on Facebook and getting a number of responses from others in his same position.

“One person made the comment, ‘Nobody thinks about how the other guy gets around,’” he said. “At first, it was about me, but after hearing from others, it’s not just for me but for so many others.”

Titus sent an email to Citrus County Parks &

Recreation proposing his idea, but it was denied.

“Parks & Recreation staff did explore additional accessibility options for Fort Island Beach,” wrote Veronica Kamp-schroer, county public information officer, in an email to the Chronicle. “However, it was not feasible at the time due to staffing and budgetary constraints.”

Even so, Commissioner Ruthie Schlabach said she thinks the idea is “brilliant” and she would love to pursue it and help make it happen. She also said she had just recently read about a similar situation in California with a young woman who launched a grassroots effort to get a wheelchair mat at her local beach, so she’s familiar with its importance to a community.

“The problem is, with government, even if the community raises the money to buy the mat and

install it, you need staff and you need storage, and we don’t have that,” she said. “You can’t just leave it on the beach overnight because someone will steal it.

“But this is something I’d be very interested in working on and promoting,” she said, adding that perhaps there’s an organization with volunteers and storage space that can step in and help out.

“Something like being able to go to the beach is something we take for granted,” she said. “And we should be able to have something that’s ADA compliant that could give people more freedom and to make their lives easier.”

Titus said he looks forward to presenting his request at a future county commission meeting and is hopeful that it would spark interest in the people who can make this happen.

“When you think about it, a mat would bring so much more business to the area,” he said. “People in wheelchairs come here and they’d like to use the beach and spend money here, so it would benefit everyone, residents and visitors.

“I’m really passionate about this,” he said. “I’m at the point where, now it’s time to go out on adventures and do new things and carry on with my life.

“It may sound crazy, but I like being in a wheelchair now. It took quite a while to get used to it, but now my confidence is through the roof and I feel normal again,” he said. “This is normal life for me.”

On the evening of Dec. 26, 2019, Krause picked Ball-McDuffie and her then-14-year-old daughter up from Marion County to bring them to his house.

Several hours later the next morning, a couple identified as Olsen and Hill broke through Krause’s garage door while Krause and his two guests were inside.

It’s alleged Olsen, with Hill and Ball-McDuffie’s assistance, held the then-65-year-old homeowner at gunpoint and threatened him to give the code to his bedroom safe.

When Krause refused, Olsen brandished a pocket knife and used it to almost cut one of Krause’s fingers off. Olsen also struck Krause with his fists, feet and pistol until the man lost consciousness.

After coming to inside his ransacked home, Krause was able to call the Citrus County Sheriff’s Office to report the names and descriptions of his attackers who had driven away and left the safe behind after it fell from the open bed of their getaway truck.

Deputies apprehended Olsen and Ball-McDuffie during a traffic stop off of State Road 44. Daytona Beach Police Department apprehended Hill driving Krause’s vehicle in Volusia County.

Olsen, Hill and Ball-McDuffie were arrested on similar charges, with

Hill and Ball-McDuffie being charges as principals to the offense.

Assistant State Attorney Kevin Davis told jurors Thursday in closing statements Ball-McDuffie aided Olsen and Hill “every step of the way,” starting with text messages she began sending hours before the break-in.

“We know the things that happened to the victim, but the most important thing for us is what she did to facilitate and make the crime happen,” the prosecutor said. “She’s already been talking to somebody about ‘hitting a lick.’”

Davis said Ball-McDuffie sent at least 10 texts about robbing Krause of the valuables inside his house, especially a large safe containing jewelry, medicine, Krause’s wallet and \$20,000 in cash. Ball-McDuffie also sent photographs of the safe to her accomplice.

“Then, an hour and half after those

communications, here comes Olsen,” Davis said.

Ball-McDuffie’s lawyer, Eric Evilsizer, argued in closing statements his client had no connection to either Olsen or Hill, and was in just as much fear as either Krause or her daughter during the incident.

“I’m not sitting here saying that stuff didn’t happen to Mr. Krause,” he said. “What I’m saying is that state cannot tie it to Ms. Ball-McDuffie.”

Davis reminded jurors of how both Hill and Ball-McDuffie were at Krause’s home the day before, aware of what could be stolen.

Citing Krause and Hill’s testimony, Davis went on to say Ball-McDuffie had no regard for Krause’s safety during the incident, and behaved more like a conspirator than a victim.

This, Davis said, included: when Ball-McDuffie asked Krause to surrender the safe’s code

to Olsen, when she told her daughter to turn off her cellphone, when she helped Olsen without being ordered, and when she lied to deputies during two prior traffic stops before her arrest.

Evilsizer said Ball-McDuffie acted the way she did because she was afraid and didn’t want further bloodshed.

Evilsizer then warned jurors not to consider how prosecutors want them to think about how someone should handle that situation.

“Unless you’ve been in a room or a house where someone had been brutally beaten, don’t tell me what you would’ve done,” he said. “It’s hard to say that’s what would’ve have done.”

“This is not about what she should’ve done, it’s about what she did,” Davis rebutted. “This isn’t our interpretation of it; this is what she did ... she’s a part of this ... there’s a ton of connections here.”

Evilsizer called one witness to the stand Thursday, Ball-McDuffie’s now-16-year-old daughter, who testified to being in a backroom of Krause’s house when Hill and a masked man known as “Ghost” broke in.

The girl said her mom told her to turn off her phone, and locked them both in the room before

the intruders forced their way inside and took their cellphones.

Evilsizer’s line of questioning focused on how the girl observed her mother’s behavior and actions during the home invasion.

“It was like she was scared for his life,” the girl testified, adding Ball-McDuffie didn’t appear to know the assailants. “My mom was trying to get me to calm down.”

During cross-examination, Davis pressed Ball-McDuffie’s daughter on several discrepancies between her courtroom testimony and what she told the sheriff’s office detectives.

Davis also questioned the girl on if she knew what her mother was doing at all times during the incident. The girl said her mother was mostly in her line of sight, but couldn’t remember every detail of her movements.

“It’s in bits and pieces,” she testified, “except for the important stuff.”

# Complaint: UF wants to ax 'critical race' from study title

ORLANDO — University of Florida administrators told faculty members they couldn't use the words "critical" and "race" together in describing a new concentration of study, out of fear that it would antagonize state lawmakers who are contemplating a bill to ban critical race theory in state government, according to a grievance filed by the faculty union last week.

During a meeting with College of Education faculty in October, an administrator relayed that the graduate school wouldn't approve anything with the word "critical" in the title of a curriculum initiative to examine race and anti-racism.

Faculty members concluded that the administration was asking the college "to change the name of a proposed concentration titled 'Critical Study of Race, Ethnicity, and Culture in Education,'

presumably to a title less offensive to the Florida legislature," said the complaint filed by Christopher Busey, an associate professor, who said he was threatened with discipline if he used the words "critical race" in his curriculum design.

The grievance is seeking to stop the university's attempt "to eliminate and/or whitewash" critical race theory from the curriculum.

The theory is a framework legal scholars developed in the 1970s and 1980s that centers on the view that racism is systemic in the nation's institutions and serves to maintain the dominance of whites in society. Many conservatives object to critical race theory, especially in grade school education. They argue it is a divisive ideology because it partitions society into oppressors and oppressed based on their race, and see it as a form of neo-Marxism derived from critical theory.

Administrators told

College of Education faculty members they would support a title that says "studies of race" but not critical studies of race," the complaint said. "The requirement that faculty eliminate 'critical race' from their curriculum under threat of discipline discriminates against faculty on the basis of the content of the material."

The brouhaha over using the words "critical race" is the latest accusation in recent months of University of Florida administrators curbing academic freedom in order to appease Florida politicians. The university in October prohibited three professors from testifying in a lawsuit challenging a new election law that critics believe restricts voting rights. A school official said that such testimony would put the school in conflict with the administration of Florida Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis, which pushed the election law. The university reversed that decision last month.

flooded the park area in front of people's homes and water seeped under the foundation and came up through the floorboards, creating unlivable conditions. Many there are still dealing with water issues, Woodward said.

Most of the flooding across the county has been resolved. But there are still roads underwater in the north Citrus Citrus Avenue area, Woodward said.

Dr. Mark Fulkerson, chief professional engineer with the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD), said aquifer levels remain high, propping up flooded areas and preventing

water from draining into the underlying soils.

"It will likely be a few more months before most of the flooded areas return to normal," Fulkerson said.

Since Jan. 1, Citrus has received an average 67 inches of rain, nearly 16 inches above average for the year, he said. Some parts of the county have already received 80 inches this year.

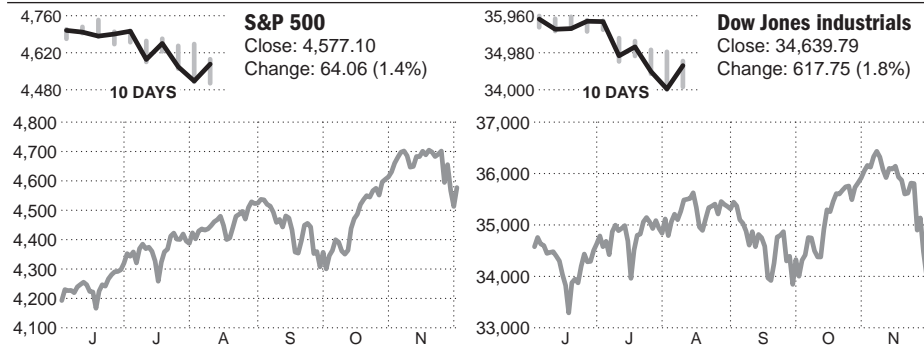

# Dueling contradictions a Catch-22 for impacted Floridians

In Joseph Heller's 1961 satirical war novel "Catch-22," B-25 bombardier John Yossarian was thwarted by contradictory policies that created a no-win paradox for him. On the one hand, Yossarian's willingness to fly combat missions proved he was insane, which allowed him to request exemption from further combat missions.

On the other hand, when he requested exemption, his concern for his safety proved he was sane, thereby making exemption impossible.

Although Yossarian's paradox was fictional, the politically charged COVID-19 vaccine mandate battle between the Biden and DeSantis administrations has created a real life paradox for impacted Floridians.

While both administrations accept in principal that the vaccine offers the most consistent individual protection against the virus and the best hope for ending the global pandemic, the contradictions of the dueling vaccine mandates place the livelihoods of impacted Floridians at risk.

The core contradiction of the Biden administration's "jab or job" executive order is that it's based on employment status. Consequently, it's only applicable to federal workers, members of the armed forces, government contractors, companies employing 100 or more persons, and health care providers participating in the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

Accordingly, employers and workers impacted by the mandate are faced with the loss of their livelihoods for noncompliance, whereas those not impacted by the

mandate are free to decline vaccination without any penalty.

This contradiction of the Biden administration mandate is further conflicted for impacted Floridians by the Legislature's recently passed anti-mandate bill trumpeted by the DeSantis administration.

Despite the DeSantis administration's core argument against the Biden administration "jab or job" mandate that employers, not government, should decide whether to require vaccination as a workplace policy, Florida's anti-mandate bill prohibits employers from imposing vaccine mandates and includes \$50,000 fines per violation for employers who fire a worker without allowing the bill's exemptions. Coming on the heels of employers struggling to recover from the pandemic, levying such fines could impact the livelihoods of both employers and workers.

Given the dueling contradictions of the Biden and DeSantis administrations, impacted Florida employers and workers eking out a living, like Yossarian's "Catch-22" no-win paradox, are damned if they do, and damned if they don't. This is not only patently unfair and wrong, but also serves to undermine trust and confidence in our political leaders and institutions, which are quintessential to effective governance.

As such, the time is past due for both administrations to end the pandemic polemics and allow public-health and medical experts to do their jobs unfettered.

**Electric vehicles, charging stations wave of the future**

Having written several editorials about electric vehicles (EV), I now own one, USA made. It is a three-wheeled motorcycle type, battery operated vehicle (BEV). It has a frame with has a plexiglass windshield that extends to a plexiglass roof. Mine has no doors or side windows, but there is a door option. It has full seats for two people. It can travel on highways up to 75 mph. At moderate speed it will travel 80 miles.

I do not consider it a car replacement, but more of a local runabout. It does not require a motorcycle license. I take one or two local trips a day and slow charge the battery at home. The charging electricity costs between \$2 and \$3 per 100 miles of travel. I am thinking of installing solar panels to my house for charging BEV.

At present, for most of us, I do not think it is a good time to buy an EV car type vehicle, because of their high price, limited range and insufficient commercial charging stations. What is important is the tremendous developments that are taking place.

I predict what I call the "2-3" future. That is: in two to three years, quality EVs will cost \$20,000 to \$30,000, get 200 to 300 miles of range, and fast charge in 20 to 30 minutes. It could also be that gasoline will cost two to three times what it does now.

In two to three years, you will find that the purchase of an EV will be the preferred choice. You will be able to take long trips and have many options for fast charging. The charging process will become very simple. Hopefully all charging stations will use the same connections. You could just plug your EV into any "pump" using a new

technology called "Plug&Charge." Once connected the process is both automatic and secure.

We are used to having gas stations on almost every corner. Many of these stations will convert to charging stations. Also, destination charging will become common. Motels, restaurants, and shopping centers will offer charging as a service. A tourist area such as Citrus County will (could) highlight its number of available chargers.

My final word is: if Citrus County wants to be a part of the future, then do not ignore this.

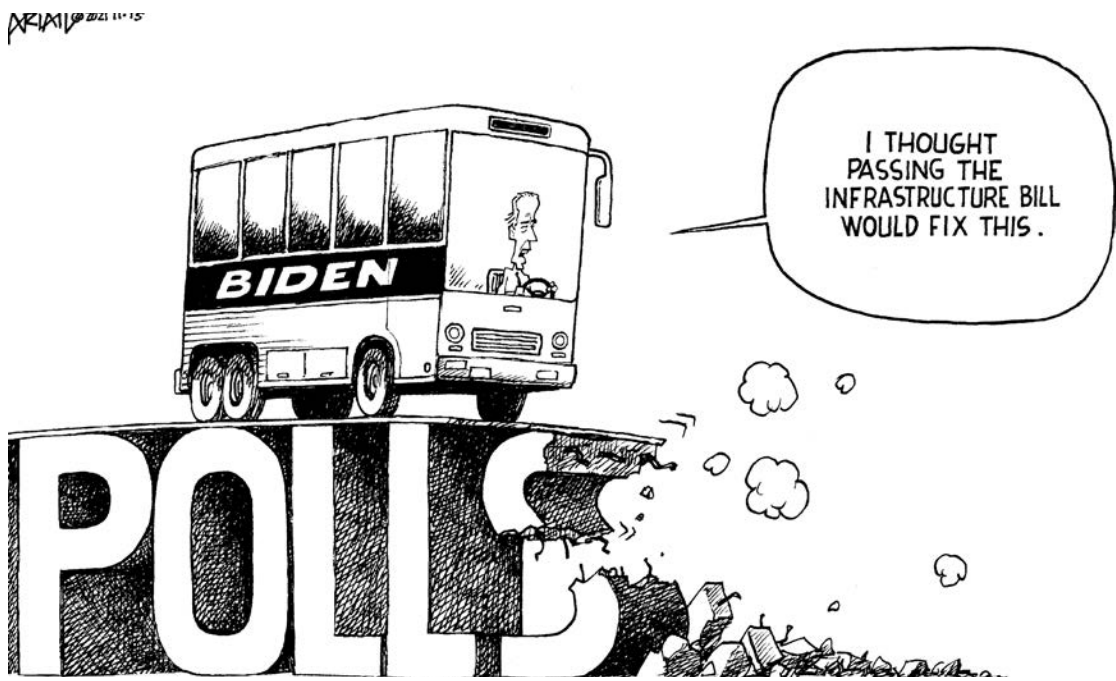

**Murder charge for Ohio deputy in Casey Goodson Jr. shooting**

COLUMBUS, Ohio — The Ohio sheriff's deputy who shot Casey Goodson Jr. in the back five times was charged with murder Thursday, as Goodson's family also filed a federal civil rights lawsuit and the now-retired deputy publicly shared details of what happened from his perspective for the first time.

The December 2020 shooting of Goodson, who was Black, by longtime deputy Jason Meade, who is white, led to protests in Columbus and many lingering questions, in part because the killing wasn't recorded on body or dash camera footage.

Meade's lawyer says the deputy fired when Goodson pointed a gun at him. Goodson's family has said he was holding a sandwich, not a gun, but noted he also had a license to carry a firearm.

**Charges weighed for Michigan shooting suspect's parents**

OXFORD TOWNSHIP, Mich. — A prosecutor on Thursday repeated her criticism of the parents of a boy who is accused of killing four students at a Michigan school, saying their actions went "far beyond negligence" and that a charging decision would come by Friday.

"The parents were the only individuals in the position to know the access to weapons," Oakland County prosecutor Karen McDonald said. The gun "seems to have been just freely available to that individual."

Ethan Crumbley, 15, has been charged as an adult with two dozen crimes, including murder, attempted murder and terrorism, for a shooting Tuesday at Oxford High School in Oakland County, roughly 30 miles north of Detroit.

Four students were killed and seven more people were injured. Three were in hospitals in stable condition.

The semi-automatic gun was purchased legally by Crumbley's father last week, according to investigators.

**China clears Boeing 737 Max to fly again after deadly crashes**

BEIJING — China's aviation regulator cleared the Boeing 737 Max on Thursday to return to flying with technical upgrades more than two years after the plane was grounded worldwide following two fatal crashes.

China is the last major market where the Boeing 737 Max was awaiting approval after the United States allowed flights to resume in December 2020 and European Union regulators gave permission in January. Brazil and Canada also have given approval.

**House votes to avert shutdown**

*But quick Senate OK in doubt*

WASHINGTON — The House passed a bill Thursday that funds the government through Feb. 18 and avoids a short-term shutdown after midnight Friday, but quick Senate approval was in doubt because of a fight over President Joe Biden's COVID-19 vaccine mandates.

An agreement among congressional leaders announced earlier in the day would keep the government running for 11 more weeks, generally at current spending levels while adding \$7 billion to aid Afghanistan evacuees.

The Democratic-led House passed the measure by a 221-212 vote. The Republican leadership urged members to vote no; the lone GOP vote for the bill came from Illinois Rep. Adam Kinzinger.

Lawmakers bemoaned the short-term fix and blamed the opposing party for the lack of progress on this year's spending bills. Rep. Rosa DeLauro, chair of the House Appropriations Committee, said the measure would, however, allow for negotiations on a

package covering the remainder of the budget year through September.

"Make no mistake, a vote against this continuing resolution is a vote to shut government down," DeLauro said during the House debate.

Before the House acted, President Joe Biden said he had spoken with Senate leaders and he played down fears of a shutdown.

"There is a plan in place unless somebody decides to be totally erratic, and I don't think that will happen," Biden said.

Conservative Republicans opposed to Biden's vaccine rules want Congress to take a hard stand against the mandated shots for workers at larger businesses, even if that means shutting down federal offices over the weekend.

It was just the latest instance of the brinkmanship around government funding that has triggered several costly shutdowns and partial closures over the past two decades. The longest shutdown in history happened under President Donald Trump — 35 days stretching into January 2019,

when Democrats refused to approve money for his U.S.-Mexico border wall. Both parties agree the stoppages are irresponsible, yet few deadlines pass without a late scramble to avoid them.

Republicans said during the debate that they had made it clear in the summer that they would not support spending bills that include "irresponsible spending increases and extreme policies."

"Unfortunately, that is exactly where we find ourselves," said Rep. Kay Granger, R-Texas.

Democrats were able to use their majority to advance the spending bill. They have a more difficult task in the 50-50 Senate, where objections by just one senator can slow a final vote past Friday's midnight deadline. That could mean a short-term shutdown into the weekend.

Sen. Mike Lee, R-Utah, said Democrats knew last month from a letter that several Republicans would use all means at their disposal to oppose legislation that funds or allows the enforcement of the employer vaccine mandate. He blamed Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., for not negotiating and for ignoring their position.

If the choice is between "suspending nonessential functions" or standing idle while Americans lose their ability to work, "I'll stand with American workers every time," Lee said.

**Omicron virus variant detected in NYC**

NEW YORK — Multiple cases of the omicron coronavirus variant have been detected in New York, health officials said Thursday, including a man who attended an anime convention in Manhattan in late November and tested positive for the variant when he returned home to Minnesota.

In addition to the convention; health officials said tests showed five other people recently infected with COVID-19 had the variant. They included a person in the city's Long Island suburbs who had recently traveled to South Africa, residents of

Brooklyn and Queens and another case possibly linked to travel.

"No cause for alarm. We just want to make sure that the public is aware of information when we receive it," said Gov. Kathy Hochul.

New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio said the geographic spread of the positive tests suggested the variant was undergoing "community spread" in the city, and wasn't linked to any one event.

The news came a day after the U.S. announced its first case of the variant had been detected in California, in a person who had recently traveled to South Africa.

Officials reported another case Thursday in a Colorado woman who had

recently traveled to southern Africa.

The Anime NYC 2021 convention Nov. 19-21 drew about 50,000 people, according to event organizers, and attendees were required to wear masks and show proof of having received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine.

Officials in New York said they were working to trace attendees of the convention, which was held at the Jacob K. Javits Convention Center as New York City prepared to host the annual Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade and braced for throngs of tourists to return after the U.S. opened up to vaccinated international travelers.

Officials in the city of 8.8 million said they expected it would be only a

matter of time before the new variant was reported in the city. City Health Commissioner Dave Chokshi urged people who attended the event to get tested.

"We should assume there is community spread of the variant in our city," Mayor Bill de Blasio said in a statement.

The Minnesota man began experiencing mild symptoms Nov. 22. He had been vaccinated and received a booster shot in early November, according to health officials in his home state. He sought COVID-19 testing Nov. 24, and his symptoms have subsided, officials said.

Minnesota Health Commissioner Jan Malcolm said the man had not traveled outside the U.S.

recently.

"Just given the timing ... it seems quite possible, perhaps the most likely, that this transmission happened at the arena convention in New York City but that's not definitive," Malcolm said.

Nov. 22 was the same day the person infected in the California case returned to the U.S. from South Africa. The California traveler, who was vaccinated, developed mild symptoms and tested positive Monday.

Much remains unknown about the new variant, including whether it is more contagious, as some health authorities suspect, whether it makes people more seriously ill, and whether it can thwart the vaccine.

The Blues recalled goalie Charlie Lindgren from Springfield of the AHL, but due to salary cap issues, he can't join the team until Friday. St. Louis had former Grand Valley State player Kyle Konin as the emergency backup goalie. The 23-year old resides in the Tampa area.

Buchnevich scored with the man advantage at 7:16 of the third, and Hedman put the Lightning up 3-2 from just inside the blue line 53 seconds later. Hedman was left alone in the slot and made a nifty move to beat Husso 2:20 later.

Hedman also had two minor penalties during the final period.

Cirelli had a power-play goal early in the third.

The Blues' second-ranked power play converted their second chance when Saad tied it at 1 at 14:07 of the second off a nifty pass from the blue line by Robert Thomas.

Thomas had two assists, giving him 20 overall.

Palat stopped a 10-game goal drought 7:16 midway through the first.

Steven Stamkos, who missed Tuesday's 4-3 overtime loss at St. Louis due to the birth of his son, assisted on Palat's goal and has a point (five assists, seven points) in each of his last five games.

Lightning coach Jon Cooper said RW Nikita Kucherov, out since Oct. 19 with a lower-body injury, is "inching towards" skating and remains out until probably after New Year's Day.

## Lengthy lockout?

*MLB's Manfred, Clark have divergent views*

ARLINGTON, Texas — Hours into Major League Baseball's first work stoppage in 26 years, Commissioner Rob Manfred and union head Tony Clark presented diametrically opposed views of each side's negotiating positions that point to a lengthy lockout.

In separate news conferences less than a day into baseball's ninth work stoppage, Manfred said the union's proposal for greater free agency and wider salary arbitration would damage small-market teams.

Clark, the first former player to head the union, accused Manfred of "misrepresentations" in his letter to fans explaining the lockout, and said "it would have been beneficial to the process to have spent as much time negotiating in the room as it appeared it was spent on the letter."

"It's unnecessary to continue the dialogue," Clark said of the lockout. "At the first instance in some time of a bumpy water, the recourse was a strategic decision to lock players out."

The dispute threatens the start of spring training on Feb. 16 and opening day on March 31.

In many ways, after 26 1/2 years of labor peace the sides have reverted to the bitter squabbling that marked eight work stoppages from 1972-95, including a 7 1/2-month strike that wiped out the 1994 World Series.

Owners locked out players at 12:01 a.m. Thursday following the expiration of the sport's five-year collective bargaining agreement.

"If you play without an agreement, you are vulnerable to a strike at any point in time," Manfred said. "What happened in 1994 is the MLBPA picked August, when we were most vulnerable because of the proximity of the large revenue dollars associated with the postseason. We wanted to take that option away and try to force the parties to deal with the issues and get an agreement now."

# Georgia looks to become top dog

## Against Alabama in SEC title game

ATLANTA — Nick Saban and the Alabama Crimson Tide have faced sporadic challengers during their long reign over the Southeastern Conference.

Auburn will pop up every few years to take on college football's greatest dynasty. Joe Burrow led LSU to a national title at Alabama's expense. Florida showed flashes of sticking it to the Tide.

None of them had any staying power.

Georgia could be different. Kirby Smart and the top-ranked Bulldogs look like a program built for the long haul, capable of going toe-to-toe with Alabama on an annual basis.

In a season of turmoil, Georgia (12-0, 8-0 SEC, No. 1 in CFP) has stood above everyone and appears to be a shoe-in for a spot in the College Football Playoff no matter what happens Saturday in the league championship game against the Crimson Tide.

"Georgia has been the No. 1 team in the country for good reason," Saban said. "They're probably the most consistent, most dominant team week in and week out."

No. 4 Alabama (11-1, 7-1, No. 3 CFP) likely needs an upset of Georgia to avoid missing out on the four-team playoff for only the second time in its eight-year existence, though there are certainly scenarios where the Tide could become the first team to get in with two losses.

"What our players need to do is just focus on one play at a time, winning as many plays as we can," Saban said. "Don't worry about the scoreboard and what the outcome means."

While Georgia has rarely been challenged — or even trailed — this season, the Tide has won four games by less than

a touchdown.

Alabama managed to escape the Iron Bowl last week with a victory over Auburn, rallying from a 10-point deficit in the fourth quarter to win 24-22 in four overtimes.

Georgia quarterback Stetson Bennett hasn't paid any attention to Alabama's close calls.

"Football is such a crazy sport, and there's so many different aspects that go into an individual game that determine a score," he said. "We have too much respect for who Alabama is this year as a team to allow ourselves to do that."

Smart, a former defensive coordinator under Saban, has yet to beat his mentor in three meetings since taking over at Georgia — including a crushing overtime loss in the national championship game at the end of the 2017 season.

That is a hurdle Smart must get over, of course, to be recognized as a true equal to his ex-boss.

"You appreciate the job he's done more when you leave," Smart said of Saban. "When you move on, you appreciate the fact that he works really hard. He doesn't ask any assistant to do anything that he doesn't do. He holds everyone to a high standard."

Overall, Alabama has won six in a row against the Bulldogs since 2007.

"This year is this year," Smart said. "I don't think there's any overlap between the two. I know people want to make it that, make it some kind of overlap, but every year is independent of the previous."

Saban lost to one of his former assistants for the first time this season when Jimbo Fisher and

the Texas A&M Aggies handed the Tide their only loss.

Now, Smart has a chance to join Fisher in that exclusive club.

### BENNETT VS. YOUNG

The quarterbacks present a striking contrast.

Alabama's Bryce Young was one of the nation's most highly recruited players and has fully lived up to the hype in his first season as the starter.

Stetson Bennett, on the other hand, walked on at Georgia, left for a year to get playing time at a junior college, and started this season as a third-teamer before claiming the starting job after JT Daniels was injured.

Despite their disparate backgrounds, both have played a huge role in their team's success this season.

Young has been mentioned as

a Heisman Trophy contender, throwing for 3,901 yards with 40 touchdowns and just four interceptions.

Bennett has thrown 21 TD passes with only five picks, along with showing an ability to extend plays with his running skills.

### BOWERS SOARS

Freshman Brock Bowers has been one of Bennett's favorite targets, creating all sorts of matchup problems for opposing defenses with his size and speed.

Bowers leads the Bulldogs with 37 catches for 652 yards and 10 touchdowns, setting a school scoring record for a tight end.

"He's probably as good a tight end as we've faced all year," Saban said. "He's got good size, very athletic, great hands, good route runner. He's very challenging to guard."

### DEFENSIVE STARS

Two of college football's best defensive players will have a chance to shine Saturday.

Georgia's Jordan Davis is a massive nose guard who anchors a defense that has allowed only 6.9 points per game.

Alabama linebacker Will Anderson Jr. is tied for the national lead with 14.5 sacks, while his 30.5 tackles behind the line are far more than any other player.

Anderson said it will be a challenge to contain Bennett.

"He's very fast. He has great feet. He can escape the pocket really well," Anderson said. "We can't let him run all over the field and make long drives with his feet."

### ROBINSON'S STATUS

Alabama running back Brian Robinson Jr. ranks third in the SEC with 1,016 yards rushing, but his status is uncertain due to a left leg injury.

Given Alabama's lack of depth at that position — Trey Sanders is the only other scholarship running back — Robinson's health is crucial to the Crimson Tide's chances of pulling off an upset.

# Michigan chases playoff bid

## In first Big Ten title game against Iowa

INDIANAPOLIS — Iowa opened this season as the trendy pick to finish second in the Big Ten West. Michigan was unranked in the preseason poll and wasn't even supposed to contend for the East Division title.

So much for predictions.

Two of the conference's traditional powers will play Saturday in Indianapolis for their first conference crowns since sharing the title in 2004 — and in Michigan's case a possible playoff bid.

It's the title game almost nobody expected.

"A lot of people were pretty low on us," Iowa safety Jack Koerner said. "They were saying we were overrated, things like that. We knew who we were, we knew our identity as a team."

Outsiders didn't think much of the second-ranked Wolverines (11-1, 8-1, No. 2 CFP), either. Lingering questions about coach Jim Harbaugh's future prompted him to accept a pay cut and change defensive coordinators after going a dismal 2-4 in a fan-less 2020 season.

Prognosticators didn't believe much would change. Narrow escapes against Rutgers and Nebraska and what seemed like a disastrous loss to Michigan State only reinforced those notions.

"There was a lot of noise on the outside," center Andrew Vastardis said. "But on the inside, we trusted each other, trusted the coaches."

It made a difference.

The Wolverines rebounded from their only loss with three straight wins. Then, just when the critics figured they'd lose yet again to archrival Ohio State, Michigan surprised everyone except themselves with a dominant performance against the Buckeyes to clinch its first trip to the Big Ten title game, which began in 2011.

Michigan inexplicably finds itself one win away from Harbaugh's first Big Ten title and potentially two wins away from a January return to Indy for a shot at its first national championship since 1997.

"Everything we envisioned, all the goals as a defense, all the goals as a team we envisioned, we're accomplishing those things," linebacker Josh Ross said. "Everything's in front of us and now it's just so exciting to be in this opportunity this week."

Koerner and his Iowa teammates understand.

But instead of cashing it in following a demoralizing 24-7 home loss against Purdue, a 20-point loss at Wisconsin two weeks later and a shoulder injury that sidelined quarterback Spencer Petras against Northwestern, the 15th-ranked Hawkeyes (10-2, 7-2, No. 13 CFP) rallied.

Backup quarterback Alex Padilla won three straight before Petras returned in the second half last weekend and bailed Iowa out of a 15-point deficit at Nebraska. Wisconsin's loss at Minnesota sealed the division title and now the Hawkeyes believe they can end their title drought.

"November football tends to be the most important time, and right now it shows for us," Hawkeyes running back Tyler Goodson said. "We're undefeated in November. We've been strong. We've faced a lot of adversity, whether it's losing two games in a row, or the injuries we've had. No matter what it is, we find a way to fight back."

### THE HANGOVER?

Some wonder how the Wolverines

will react to last week's emotional win, their first in a decade over the Buckeyes and just their second in 17 meetings. While fans stormed the field and Michigan savored the post-game party, Harbaugh said this week has been all business. There's a good reason for it.

"There's not one dude on this team that has a ring," quarterback Cade McNamara said.

### RECORD RATE

Iowa is well-known for producing stout defenses under longtime coach Kirk Ferentz. And in a league full of suffocating units, this year's defense stands apart for major reason — takeaways.

The Hawkeyes lead the Football Bowl Subdivision with 22 interceptions and are tied for third with 28 overall turnovers. Eleven players picked off at least one pass this season, and with two more interceptions, Iowa can break the single-season school record set in 1986 and matched in 1987 and 2008.

# Unexpected title match

## Wake Forest, Pitt square off for ACC Championship

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Two surprising programs with high-powered offenses will square off Saturday night when No. 17 Pittsburgh meets 18th-ranked Wake Forest in the Atlantic Coast Conference championship game.

It's the first time since 2014 that Clemson, with its recognizable sea of orange, won't be playing for the title after the Tigers dominated the ACC football landscape the past six seasons.

"It's going to be really weird not seeing orange in the championship, right?" said Eric Mac Lain, a college football analyst for the ACC Network. "Or the garnet and gold (of Florida State) — two colors we've been very accustomed to seeing on at least the Atlantic side for quite some time now."

Pitt was selected to finish fourth in the Coastal division in the ACC's preseason polls. Wake Forest was picked to finish fifth in the Atlantic.

"Clemson's been dominant, and they're still dominant," Pitt coach Pat Narduzzi said. "... They're going to be a force to be reckoned with every year. But Pitt, we hope, is the same way. Wake Forest, the same way. Virginia, the same way. Everyone's got a chance. That's the beautiful thing."

Both teams reached the title game behind strong quarterback play, which could lead to a shootout.

The Demon Deacons rank third in the country in scoring offense at 42.9 points per game, while the Panthers are fourth (42.8). Both teams also rank in the top 15 nationally in total offense, passing offense and touchdown passes.

The over-under for the game is listed at 72 1/2 points, according to Fan Duel Sportsbook.

Pitt is led by quarterback Kenny Pickett, who has thrown 40 touchdown passes this season.

He needs two more to break the conference record set by Clemson's Deshaun Watson in 2016. A projected top 10 pick in next year's NFL draft, Pickett's 79 career TD passes are tied with Dan Marino for the most in school history.

Sam Hartman spearheads Wake Forest's attack.

The sophomore has thrown for 3,711 yards and 34 touchdowns to lead a team with plenty of experience and loaded with "super seniors." Hartman is the first ACC quarterback since Louisville's Lamar Jackson in 2016 to have at least 30 TDs passing and 10 TDs rushing in a season.

"When we went into the season, I said this to the staff, 'We've been really good. We've been consistent. We've been to five consecutive bowls.' But we didn't ever have that one breakout season," said Wake Forest coach Dave Clawson, who recently signed a long-term contract extension. "I don't want to put pressure on us. But I really believed that if we were going to have that breakout year, this year's our best opportunity."

It will be a missed opportunity for the ACC because whoever wins won't advance to the College Football Playoff as Clemson has done for the last six seasons.

Pair of Bucs suspended for violating COVID rules

NEW YORK — Antonio Brown and two other NFL players have been suspended immediately for three games by the league for violating COVID-19 protocols.

The Tampa Bay wide receiver and teammate Mike Edwards were suspended Thursday. Free agent John Franklin III, if signed by a team, is also ineligible to play in the next three games.

All three players have accepted the discipline and waived their right of appeal. The suspensions are effective immediately.

The NFL Players Association, which developed the protocols along with the league, represented the three players during a review of the recent allegations that players misrepresented their vaccination status. Brown, Edwards, a cornerback, and Franklin, a defensive back who last played for the Bucs in 2019, were found in violation of the protocols.

"The health and safety of players and personnel is our top priority," the NFL and NFLPA said in a joint statement. "The protocols were jointly developed working with our respective experts to ensure that we are practicing and playing football as safely as possible during the ongoing pandemic. The NFL-NFLPA jointly reinforce their commitment and further

emphasize the importance of strict adherence to the protocols to protect the well-being of everyone associated with the NFL."

The Buccaneers issued a brief statement in response to the league action.

"We appreciate the league's timely handling of this matter and recognize the importance of the health and safety protocols that have been established," the statement read. "We will continue to implement all league COVID-19 protocols."

Brown joined Tampa Bay midway through last season after serving an eight-game suspension for violating the NFL's personal conduct policy. He helped the Bucs win the Super Bowl for the second time in franchise history.

The 33-year-old receiver, who has 29 catches for 418 yards and four touchdowns this season, has missed the past five games with an ankle injury. He also sat out the team's Week 3 loss to the Los Angeles Rams after testing positive for COVID-19.

The Bucs (8-3) are 5-0 when he plays this season, 3-3 without him.

Edwards, meanwhile, is a backup safety who's started two games and been a key contributor on a defense that's been riddled by injuries. The third-year pro leads the club with three interceptions, two of which he's returned for TDs.

Players gained salary arbitration in 1974 and free agency two years later, and most of the previous disputes centered on the rise of big salaries caused by both, along with demands, mostly by small- and middle-market owners, to control costs and increase their competitive ability.

Management gained an ever-increasing series of restraints over the last two decades, such as a luxury tax on high payrolls, leading to a decrease in average salary during the latter years of the most recent labor deal.

Now players want more liberalized free agency and arbitration, leading to a confrontation.

"It's a whole list of topics that they've told us they will not negotiate," said Bruce Meyer, the players' chief lawyer. "They will not agree, for example, to expand salary arb eligibility. They will not agree to any path for any player to achieve free agency earlier. They will not agree to anything that would allow players to have additional ways to get service time to combat service-time manipulation. They told us on all of those things they will not agree."

Since 1976, players can become free agents after six seasons of major league service. The players' association proposed starting with the 2023-24 offseason that it changes to six years or five years and age 30.5, with the age in the second option dropping to 29.5 starting in 2025-26.

Players want arbitration eligibility to decrease to two years of service, its level until the mid-1980s.

Central to the strife is the union's anger over a larger number of teams in recent seasons jettisoning veterans in favor of rebuilding while accumulating prospects. Teams sometimes conclude rebuilding — the players call it tanking — is a preferred strategy for long-term success, even though it can rankle their fans.

"We feel our proposals would positively affect competitive balance, competitive integrity," Meyer said. "We've all seen in recent years the problem with teams that don't seem to be trying their hardest to win games or put the

best teams on the field."

In the signing scramble ahead of the lockout, teams committed \$1 billion to contracts on Wednesday, including six nine-figure agreements that raised the total to nine in the last month and total spending to \$2.5 billion since Oct. 1.

"The fact that this year there seems to be more activity sooner by clubs in free agency than a normal year raises more questions than it answers about all the other years," Meyer said. "One good week of free agency doesn't address all the negative trends that we've seen."

MLB would keep existing free-agency provision or change eligibility to age 29.5.

"We already have teams in smaller markets that struggle to compete," Manfred said. "Shortening the period of time that they control players makes it even harder for them to compete. It's also bad for fans in those markets. The most negative reaction we have is when a player leaves via free agency. We don't see that, making it earlier, available earlier, we don't see that as a positive."

Clark spoke at the hotel where negotiations broke off and Manfred about 14 miles away at Globe Life Field, home of the Texas Rangers.

"The players' association, as is their right, made an aggressive set of proposals in May, and they have refused to budge from the core of those proposals," Manfred said. "Things like a shortened reserve period, a \$100 million reduction in revenue sharing and salary arbitration for the whole two-year class are bad for the sport, bad for the fans and bad for competitive balance."

An agreement by early-to-mid-March is needed for a full season.

"Speculating about drop dead deadlines at this point, not productive," Manfred said. "So I'm not going to do it."

Negotiations have made little to no progress since they began last spring. Manfred said a lockout was management's only tool to speed the process.

"People need pressure sometimes to get to an agreement," Manfred said. "Candidly, we didn't feel that sense of pressure from the other side during the course of this week."

# McIlroy part of 3-way tie in the Bahamas

NASSAU, Bahamas — Rory McIlroy has gone from tears at the Ryder Cup to some of his best golf of the year, and right now his only complaint is the calendar.

"I wish it was the end of March," McIlroy said Thursday after a 6-under 66 to share the lead with Daniel Berger and Abraham Ancer in the Hero World Challenge.

McIlroy was referring to the Masters, the only major keeping him from the career Grand Slam, and there is plenty of golf to be played between now and the first full week of April. But he's been on a roll since spilling his emotions about how much the Ryder Cup means after a rough week at Whistling Straits.

He won the CJ Cup in Las Vegas. He was leading the DP World Tour Championship in Dubai after 68 holes until a bad break led to a sloppy finish and Collin Morikawa passed him by.

And then on a warm and blustery day in the Bahamas, he had six birdies and chipped in for eagle on the reachable par-4 14th for another good start.

It was far from perfect, and he only has to point at a double bogey on the par-5 ninth when he hit his second shot into the

water. He failed to birdie two other par 5s, so this wasn't exactly a round where he got the most out of it.

But it was enough to make him slightly wistful the year was coming to and end.

"I wish it was a different time of the year the way I'm playing," McIlroy said. "But there's no reason why I can't pick up again

in January and keep playing the way I'm playing. I'm still going to keep myself ticking over these next few weeks. I'm not going to completely shut the clubs away. ... My game's in good shape and I want to keep it there."

On the opposite end of the spectrum is Berger, who hasn't even played since the Ryder Cup. He showed up on the

practice range at Albany on Monday, cell phone resting on his bag to play music, striped one drive and proudly announced, "Still got it!"

He was kidding on Monday, not so much on Thursday.

Berger birdied his opening four holes, made an eagle on the par-5 11th and stayed ahead of the 20-man field most of the day

until the end. From the 18th fairway, into the wind with water guarding the left side of the green, he missed well to the right, his chip didn't reach the green and he had to make a 5-footer to escape with bogey.

It was the first time every shot counted on his card since Sept. 4 when he closed with 64 at the Tour Championship. There's been a lot of pool time, and more time on the tennis court than the golf course. He played with his father, former Davis Cup player Jay Berger.

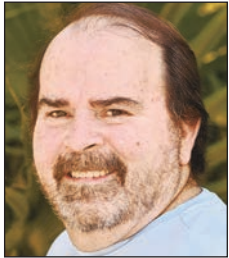
"It's probably the longest break I've had in my professional career," he said. "It was a little scary taking over a month off because I haven't done that in a while, wondering if you're going to come back and still have it. But mentally and physically, I needed the break."

Collin Morikawa had a reasonable start in his bid to cap off his year with a win that would take him to No. 1 in the world. He shot 68 with a pair of sloppy 8-iron shots from the fairway that led to bogey.

Webb Simpson one-putted his last seven greens, five of them for birdie, one for bogey on the 18th after hitting his tee shot into a palmetto bush. He was one shot behind along with Brooks Koepka and Justin Thomas.

# Keep track of what bites and when for better results

With deer season upon us, many fishermen have been spending time in the woods in an attempt to fill their freezers with venison. And while deer kill results have been mixed, hunters have slowly been making their way back onto the waterways with one question in mind...where are the fish?

Upon returning to the waterways, anglers should look for patterns that have worked in the past during the same time frames, hence the need to keep an outdoors journal.

An accurate journal is something that many fishing captains keep due to the fact that they fish for a living. Putting their clients on fish is what keeps food on their table and mortgage payments up-to-date, so it's vitally important to know what is going on during different times of the year.

Recreational anglers can also learn an important lesson by keeping track of what bites and when it bites. Keeping track of your past fishing success, such as recording tide charts, moon phases, water temps, what baits worked, how many fish caught, what patterns did you find, all this information can be invaluable from year-to-year.

Capt. Ray Dehn of Salty Vets Fishing Charter of Crystal River reports that both trout and redfish are being caught in area waters using shrimp fished under a poppin' cork. Dehn has been fishing in

two to four feet of water and he urges anglers to "slow it up" when it comes to the winter time bite.

"Going into the winter time, I tell my clients to slow up," Dehn said. "You want to basically land the bait on their head. Fish don't want to chase the bait all over the place and baits use less energy. They don't want to chase after food if they don't have to. Slow down your retrieval rate and you will get more bites."

Dehn is a big fan of using MirrorLures' Little Jon baits and says root beer with glitter and bourbon are the hot colors right now.

"Slow everything down and you will catch more fish," Dehn added.

On the freshwater scene, 44 Tackle Company in Inverness reports that specks are biting on the Tsala Apopka Chain. Anglers are using 1/16-ounce jigs in John Deere green color. Minnows are

also producing fish.

Speck fishermen can improve their chances by tipping their jigs with minnows and by presenting their baits at the correct water depth. By using several different rigs, anglers can see what depth range is holding fish and then zero in.

The fish can be picky when it comes to what color they are hitting, so try different colors until you find one that turns the fish on.

Bluewater Bait and Tackle in Homosassa reports that trout are being caught in the creeks by probing deep holes with light colored plastic baits or live shrimp. Reds are being caught on the outer islands using cut mullet, live shrimp or a gold spoon. Mangrove snapper are being caught up in the springs while grouper and bigger Mangroves are being caught in 30-40 feet of water using threadfin or Spanish sardines as bait.

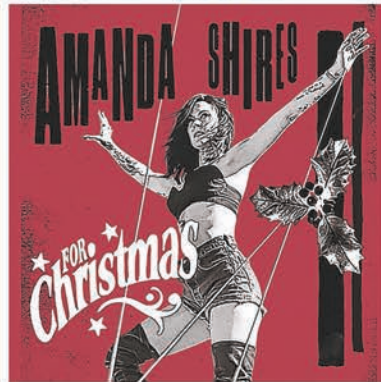

### Bring in holiday cheer with new albums by Kelly Clarkson, Pentatonix, more

It's that time of year to grab some hot cocoa, don your coziest sweater and put on some festive tunes. Whether you're dealing with holiday heartbreak or reuniting with loved ones after an uncertain two years, there's music for everyone this season.

Associated Press journalists sampled a variety of albums, offering up the early gift of holiday release reviews for Kelly Clarkson, Pentatonix, Pistol Annies, Norah Jones and more.

#### Pentatonix, "Evergreen" (RCA Records)

It's not really Christmas until the gang from Pentatonix release new material and this year they've stretched the definition of Christmas material.

The a capella quintet offer classics like "We Wish You a Merry Christmas" and "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear" but also tackle songs not often caroled, like Stevie Wonder's "I Just Called to Say I Love You" and Joni Mitchell's "River." It's risky and let's just say the originals are safe.

Better is when they give "I Saw Three Ships" a propulsive beat and when they ask Alessia Cara over to lead on "Frosty the Snowman." They even give the Beach Boys a run with their smashing cover of "Little Saint Nick."

Pentatonix boldly take on a Beatle — Paul McCartney's "Wonderful Christmastime" — and it's not half bad, as well as contributing a twangy original song, the title track "Evergreen," which, it's only right, must be covered by another artist for their Christmas album next year.

#### Kelly Clarkson, "When Christmas Comes Around..." (Atlantic Records)

Dealing with holiday heartbreak? Kelly Clarkson has you covered with "When Christmas Comes Around..."

The Grammy winner's 15 track Christmas album — featuring Chris Stapleton, Ariana Grande and Brett Eldredge — is filled with covers and originals to get everyone through the holiday season. It's an instant classic with songs that will surely get radio time for years to come.

"You ruined all my favorite things," she sings on the jubilant "Christmas Isn't Canceled (Just You)." "But you won't take Christmas from me." The song's playful, defiant cheer make it an early stand out.

Another album highlight is "Glow." Clarkson's voice melding with Stapleton's is intoxicating. "Nothing has changed, I still wish you could be wrapped up in my arms spending Christmas with me," they sing.

Whether she's reclaiming Christmas for herself or reminiscing on the ghost of Christmas past, Clarkson covers all the feelings brought on by the holidays with flare and fun.

"Harlan County Coal" is inspired by Presley's hillbilly family gatherings, complete with shotgun shell tree ornaments. The fun bop "Snow Globe" would be a great add to a

holiday party playlist, while their cover of "If We Make It Through December" is perfect for those dark chilly nights. The trio put a break on the hustle to remember the reason for the season by singing "Happy Birthday" to Jesus.

If the holidays have you both excited and exhausted, the Annies have enough cheer to get you ready to face the new year.

#### Hiss Golden Messenger, "O Come All Ye Faithful" (Merge Records)

It would be hard to find a better fit for Christmas in pandemic times than the new holiday release by Hiss Golden Messenger. Ultimately, an excellent band that just keeps getting better is a perfect match for a holiday season that comes upon us in less than perfect times.

Tom was scheduled to demonstrate at the 2020 affair, but that was cancelled due to COVID. But he is on the docket this year and we welcome him back.

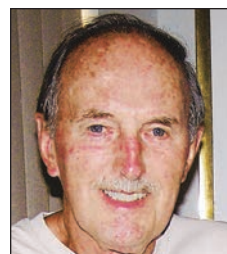

presents, so take a hike. Those are the sort of weirdly wonderful sentiments that appear on Shires' holiday record, "For Christmas," a collection of mostly original songs that feel a bit like a Christmas Eve fever dream.

With her high warbling vocals and her poetic lyrics over pianos, Shires wanders through the holidays with an eye on the little details. She's gussying up that pine tree on "A Real Tree This Year," and detailing a sexy holiday tryst on "Blame It on the Mistletoe."

Her "Silent Night" is depressing and gloomy, which, if we're being honest, is not an unusual feeling at the holidays, especially after the last two years.

But the best tracks are the ones where she's backed in harmony by the always impressive McCrary Sisters, such as "Magic Ooooooh" and "Gone For

Christmas." — Kristin M. Hall

## Norah Jones, "I Dream of Christmas" (Blue Note Records)

"I want to be a Jolly Jones," Norah Jones sings on the opener of "I Dream of Christmas."

And a Jolly Jones she is. On her 13-track debut holiday album, Jones' sultry vocals lend themselves well to Christmas songs. She reimagines some covers, bringing a Latin influence to "Run Rudolph Run" with bongos and maracas and doing a ragtime rendition of "Christmas Don't Be Late."

On others, she pays homage to the roots of the originals. The influence of Vince Guaraldi on "Christmas Time Is Here" is fully present. Likewise, Norah Jones does little to deviate from Elvis Presley's bluesy "Blue Christmas."

Also on the album are six originals by Jones. After two years of uncertainty,

Jones is ready to gather with loved ones and feel the comforts of Christmas again in "Christmas Calling (Jolly Jones)." In "You're Not Alone," she brings spiritual undertones to a time that's lonely for many ("If you are tired/And you are scared/You're not alone").

Perfect for curling up by the fire, a snowy road trip or a holiday dinner, "I Dream of Christmas" is easy listening Christmas jazz.

Pretty much everything Kristin Chenoweth touches is magical and Christmas is no different.

The dozen tracks on the Broadway and TV actor's "Happiness Is... Christmas" showcase an artist who can go from angelic to vixen, funny to heartfelt.

It's her first holiday offering since 2008's "A Lovely Way to Spend

Christmas" and it kicks off with a medley — "Happiness (Is Christmas)"/"Christmas Time Is Here" — that includes a sly tribute to one of her musicals, "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown." Later, try not to swing dance to another medley, the jazzy "Everybody's Waitin' For) The Man With The Bag"/"Jingle Bell Rock."

Her "Merry Christmas Baby" with Keb' Mo' is so sexy it might be raunchy (and, yes, a raunchy Christmas song is just what we need.) One tune later, "Christmas Lullaby," is ethereal and celestial. Her version of the Carpenters' "Merry Christmas, Darling" has a slight twang and deep melancholy.

And it's not all Christmas. In a nod to inclusiveness, she absolutely shines singing Stephen Schwartz's "The Chanukah Song (We Are Lights)." Later she will make you crack up with Andrew Lippa's "Santa, I've Got a Bone To Pick With You!" ("I got a thong/But then my mother got the same"). Chenoweth, Christmas, classic.

Annie's advice

Dear Annie: I have been with my fiancée for 15 years. She has two children from a previous relationship.

When I came into their lives, her son was 6 and her daughter had just turned 7. I almost immediately became a father figure to her children, as their father stopped all communication with them after the divorce.

I absolutely loved spending time with them, but I was 23 and had never been a father before. I made many, many mistakes and also developed a dependency on opiates that made me not such a good person at times.

Eventually, the children's father came back into his son's life but said he wanted nothing to do with my wife's daughter as he wasn't her real father. I was thrilled to be her father. I often thought of walking her down the aisle, being a grandpa to her children should she have any, etc.

As she got older, our relationship became strained. She developed new personality traits, and I struggled with addiction and didn't make her feel good about herself most of the time. I thought I was doing the right thing back then.

Eventually, I got sober, and she moved out and became a mother to an amazing little boy. Part of my recovery process is making amends to people I have hurt. I love her more than I can put into words, and her son is absolutely crazy about me and calls me "Grandpa."

I have told her many times how sorry I am, how wrong I was and how proud I am of her for what she has done with her life. I want more than anything to have a relationship with her and be a grandpa to that little boy. She has put up quite a wall, though.

Is there anything I can do, or do I need to just make peace with having to let her go? Please help. — Torn Apart in Illinois

Dear Torn Apart: Your step-daughter probably expects that you'll let her down again or abandon her entirely, like her biological father did many years ago.

The proof is in the pudding. Instead of telling her again how sorry you are for your mistakes, let your apology shine through your actions. Plant your feet and hang tough. Show her that you've changed and you aren't going anywhere this time.

It might take time for her to come around, but be patient. One of the most important things we can do as parents is show up for our kids. When her wall eventually crumbles, she will realize that standing on the other side is the good-hearted and loving father she's always had.

Bridge

Two of the most reliable bridge writers are Barbara Seagram from Canada and David Bird from England. They have joined forces again in "Play It Safe" (Master Point Press).

In the predictably workmanlike book aimed at intermediate players, there are 100 pages about handling a

single suit as effectively as possible; then 50 pages that cover full deals; and finally, there are 25 pages about matchpointed pair events, which are not known for safety plays. Each of the 18 chapters ends with Remember These Points and a quiz.

This deal would trip up many players. South is in six hearts. West leads the club jack. South takes the trick and cashes the heart ace, West discarding a low spade. How should South continue?

It's not often that you pick up a 30-point hand. Even though North promised nothing more than four-card heart support, South reasonably bid six hearts, expecting it to be at worst on a finesse.

There seem to be 12 sure tricks: two spades, five hearts, three diamonds and two clubs. But declarer must be careful. It would be easy to cash the spade ace and continue with the spade queen, establishing dummy's jack for a club discard. However, West takes the second spade and leads another round. When East ruffs dummy's jack, suddenly the slam is down one.

Instead of cashing the spade ace, lead the spade queen from hand. Suppose West takes the trick and plays another club. Now declarer cashes the spade ace, draws trumps ending in the dummy and safely pitches the club four on the spade jack.
