#### **Tropical storm** expected to move toward **Keys, Gulf**

South Florida, particularly the Florida Keys, is expected Friday to start experiencing wind and rain from Tropical Storm Fred, but it remains too early to forecast the exact path and size of the storm, according to the National Hurricane Center.

"There is a risk of wind and rainfall impacts in Florida beginning Friday in the Keys and spreading northward through portions of the peninsula and the Panhandle this weekend," the center said Wednesday morning.

Gov. Ron DeSantis posted an advisory on Twitter for residents to "review their disaster plans" and to follow the state Division of Emergency Management for updates. As of 11 a.m. Wednesday, the center of Fred was close to the southern coast of the Dominican Republic, moving west-northwest at 16 mph with maximum sustained winds of 45 mph. A tropical storm watch had been issued for portions of Cuba.

While the forecast "cone" included all of Florida, the center of the cone had the system remaining a tropical storm while southwest of Key West on Saturday morning, in the Gulf of Mexico off Tampa Bay on Sunday morning and approaching Port St. Joe in the Panhandle on Monday morning.

#### No COVID in inmate population at county jail

## Global electronic component scarcity makes it hard to keep lots filled

While the chips are down, local car dealerships are finding ways to drive business.

If you're looking to buy a new car or truck right now, good luck.

There are not that many out there.

Manufacturers are having a tough time getting computer chips due to factories being closed for so long during the pandemic.

"Another month from now we're going to sell out of our current inventory," said Vic Sietsema, general manager of Love Honda in

Inverness. Fortunately, the dealership had some excess vehicles before the shortage hit and that's allowed staff to keep a

good supply. Sietsema said he has 85 new cars on his lot, which he expects will all be gone by the end of August.

Love Honda, he said, is taking in less tradeins and it's driving up the demand for used

That, combined with consumer demand, is creating a nightmare for new-car buyers. And even if you are fortunate enough to find a vehicle, the manufacturer incentives are fewer and far between.

And dealerships are forced to raise prices.

## Judge clears way for protest law challenge

TALLAHASSEE - A federaljudge has refused to toss out a legal challenge to a controversial new law that creates a host of crimes and enhances existing penalties for protests that turn violent or block traffic, a priority of Gov. Ron DeSantis during this year's legislative session.

Chief U.S. District Judge Mark Walker on Monday allowed the lawsuit filed by a coalition of groups including the Dream Defenders to proceed, leaving De-Santis and three sheriffs as defendants but dismissing Attorney General Ashley Moody from

Walker's 72-page order came after Moody, DeSantis and the sheriffs — Walt McNeil of Leon County, Mike Williams of Jacksonville and Gregory Tony of Broward County — asked that the lawsuit be dismissed. The defendants argued, among other things, that the plaintiffs lacked standing and the legal issues weren't "ripe" enough to be considered by the court.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs last month asked Walker for a preliminary injunction to block central provisions of the measure (HB 1). which includes a wide range of steps that supporters said are needed to crack down on violence and property damage related to protests.

The groups challenging the law argued that a definition of "riot" in the measure is vague and overbroad and may criminalize "merely being present at a demonstration where violence or Jacksonville Inc.

property destruction occurs." Also, they argued the law gives police too much enforcement discretion and violates First Amendment rights.

Walker's order allowed the challenge to proceed on certain sections of the law. Those provisions create the new riot definition; make it a noncriminal traffic infraction to obstruct public streets; and require people arrested for the misdemeanor offense of "unlawful assemblies" to be held without bail until their first appearances in court.

Because the provisions "arguably sweep up peaceful protests or other protected speech" and have forced plaintiffs "to divert resources to respond to these sections" of the law, the groups have standing to challenge those sections, Walker found.

The part of the law creating the new riot definition, which is the focus of the lawsuit, is "perhaps the most pernicious," Walker wrote.

"This is because it arguably criminalizes mere presence at a protest where violence occurs even if that violence is caused by counter protesters," he wrote.

Also in rejecting the arguments that the plaintiffs lack standing, Walker ruled that the legal challenge is "germane to plaintiffs, whose core purpose is to organize and participate in support of racial justice." Plaintiffs include Miami-based Dream Defenders, Black Collective Inc., Chainless Change Inc., Black Lives Matter Alliance Broward, the Florida State Conference of the NAACP and the Northside Coalition of

drug test their employees after their hire date, Blair said, "unless there's reasons for us to drug test." There must be a reasonable suspicion to do so.


Blair said the district did not know about any illegal conduct by Brake prior to this incident.





## Inglis unveils Elvis statue

When it comes to entertainers that keep giving long after they've put away their mics and recorded their last album, Inglis need look no further than Elvis Presley.

The Withlacoochee Gulf Area Chamber Wednesday dedicated a touch-screen kiosk and a life-sized statue of Presley as a photo op attraction in hopes that visitors will get "All Shook Up" over the attraction.

It was "Now or Never" in hosting the ribbon cutting ceremony, timing it with the 60th anniversary of the Presley movie "Follow That Dream." Some of the movie was filmed in the Inglis area as well as at the historic courthouse in Inverness

The kiosk, which will allow visitors to learn about area attractions, will not be "In the Ghetto," but rather at 167 W. State Road 40 in Inglis.

The chamber hopes visitors will not be "Lonesome Tonight," but rather enjoy the city and kiosk when chamber representatives cannot be in the city's chamber building. The kiosk is to ensure people "Can't Help Falling In Love" with the community.

were paid for using the Resources and Ecosystems Sustainability, Tourist Opportunities, and Revived Economies of the Gulf Coast States Act, said Tisha Whitehurst, tourism director of Levy County. "Elvis has been part of the history of the area since the movie 'Follow That Dream' (released in 1962)," Streeter said.

A street guardrail still stands by the chamber building where Presley sat and rested during shooting of the film.

Whitehurst said the city couldn't have selected a better icon than Presley.

'Elvis is an international celebrity," she told the Chronicle.

"We do cater to international (visitors) pleasantly surprised to see something familiar in an unfamiliar area.

Janet Streeter, wife of Richard Streeter, recounted 50 years ago when the couple were vacationing outside Las Vegas and had enough money for only a motel room or tickets to a Presley show and opted for the tickets.

Luckily, Janet played the slots and won enough so the couple could do both.

"It was fantastic," she said of



City officials however made it clear to Monday's audience of county residents from the Indian Waters community: if their price tag isn't reduced to at least \$6,000, the project will pause for a year.

"If it doesn't get down to where it needs to get to from a financial standpoint," Mayor Joe Meek told a crowd of around 20 people, "we're going to pull back.'

City staff has until Sept. 13 to find roughly \$500,000 more to get the cost down to their target before council votes on whether or not to finalize an assessment.



## Pat Hitchcock dead at 93

NEW YORK — Patricia Hitchcock O'Connell, the only child of Alfred Hitchcock and an actor herself who made a memorable appearance in her father's 'Strangers on a Train" and championed his work in the decades following his death, has died at age 93.

Hitchcock died Monday in her sleep at home in Thousand Oaks, California, her daughter Tere Carrubba said Wednesday. She died of natural causes, said Carrubba.

"She was always really good at protecting the legacy of my grandparents and making sure they were always remembered," said Carrubba, meet on a train and agree one of Patricia Hitchcock's three daughters. era now that they're all

More recently, she worked for Alfred Hitchcock's Mystery Magazine, appeared at numerous merous Hitchcock documentaries and contributed photographs and a foreword to "Footsteps in the Fog: Alfred Hitchcock's San Francisco," by Jeff Kraft and Aaron Leventhal. Pat Hitchcock was married for more than 40 years to Joseph O'Connell, who died in 1994. They had three children.

At home, the director once painted a clown face on her while she was sleeping, anticipating her shock when she awoke the next morning and first looked in a mirror. During the filming of "Strangers on a Train," knowing her fear of heights, he bet her \$100 that she wouldn't ride a Ferris wheel on the set. She disputed a story from cock: The Woman Behind raphy "The Dark Side of Genius" that he left her stranded, and terrified, for an hour.

> 'What happened is they turned off the lights and pretended they were going away — for all of what I'd say were 35 seconds — and put the lights on and we came down," she told the Chicago Tribune in 1993. "The only 'sadistic' part is that I never got the hundred dollars.'



Banks and industrial companies helped lift stocks on Wall Street mostly higher Wednesday, pushing the S&P 500 and Dow Jones Industrial Average past the record highs they set a day earlier.

The S&P 500 rose 0.2% after another wobbly day of trading. Nearly threefourths of the companies in the benchmark index notched gains, including energy stocks, which rose along with the price of crude oil. Health care was the only sector to fall.

After a stumbling start to the week, stocks have been moving higher on the back of strong earnings and better-than-expected economic data.

Traders got a dose of decent economic news Wednesday when the Labor Department said that consumer prices rose 0.5% from June to July, down from the previous monthly increase of 0.9%. Year over year, consumer prices have increased a substantial 5.4%.

#### More research needed on potential treatments

In June 2016, scientists at the Salk Institute in California published their findings "that THC another compounds found in marijuana care promote the cellular removal of amyloid beta toxic proteins (amyloid plaques) associated with Alzheimer's disease."

This was an amazing discovery that could have had a major positive impact on the 6 million Americans presently suffering from this progressive debilitating condition.

Unfortunately, because the federal government considers marijuana, or scientifically named cannabis, a Schedule 1 drug, they forced the Salk Institute to stop the research or lose their funding for other research projects.

In June 2021, the FDA approved the new drug called Aducanumab for early Alzheimer's disease. It's a human monoclonal antibody which means it's expensive to produce and has some very unusual side effects. When they tested this drug in the laboratory, it did dissolve amyloid plaque (like cannabis) but they never did show that in real humans it had any significant efficacy. But for some reason, even over the objection of three FDA advisers who quit over this, the drug passed muster and is now available for a prescription.

Aducanumab has side effects that include micro hemorrhages in the brain, brain swelling and headaches. The manufacturer of the drug Biogen set the price at \$56,000 a year for a prescription. If we put every patient with Alzheimer's on this drug, we would be spending \$336 billion yearly. Yes, this would be coming out of our healthcare insurance premiums and increased taxes to pay for Medicare.

People are wise to critically analyze this convoluted health care system that has given us \$600 epinephrine pens, an opioid crisis and insulin for \$300 a bottle. Patients who use medical cannabis know it has been around since recorded history, is inexpensive, and has an excellent safety profile. It may well be the best medication for slowing the progression of Alzheimer's, but as long as we don't do more research, we will never know for sure.

Another bill, SB 1890, currently challenged by the ACLU, limits funding for citizen initiatives. The funding cap, hypocritically limits citizen initiatives but not candidate funding. In limiting funding for citizen initiatives, SB 1890 intentionally curtails political speech. Citizen initiatives have become the preferred democracy vehicle for the people when legislatures refuse to honor the will of their constituents.

Both Senator Wilton Simpson and Rep. Ralph Massullo voted "yes" on SB 1890 which did pass, but is now in question as U.S. District Judge, Allen Winsor, recently blocked the bill, indicating that it goes against the first amendment to the U.S. Constitution:

"Binding decisions from the U.S. Supreme Court and the 5th Circuit (Court of Appeals) applied those principles and concluded that the First Amendment forbids limitations like those SB 1890 imposes."

These bills, deliberately make it more difficult for citizens to enjoy the democracy promised by the Constitution, and have a largely classbased component. The people who have no voice stand to lose the most. When a person, for example, has no vehicle, no internet, he/she is at a disadvantage, and easily runs afoul of the system.

In a recent reading of Dr. Ralph Massullo's words in his July 18 article, "Parkway with purpose," I couldn't help but ponder his motives.

He said, relating to citizen engagement:

"That is why it is so important that our country prioritize and labor diligently to keep our outlets of communication open, available, and adhering to the first amendment of the Constitution. The critical step to any tyranny: be it totalitarianism, socialism or communism is to control communication to the masses and promote propaganda favorable to its particular cause."

I hate to be the one to point this out, but beyond Rep. Massullo's words, he and his Senatorial counterpart's actions (votes) in Tallahassee seem to be leading us down the path of actual totalitarianism.

Aristotle once said, "Democracy is when the indigent, and not the men of prosperity are rulers."

I cast my lot with Aristotle.

#### **SMART** solution could alleviate waterways

## California requires teachers, staff to get vaccines or tests

SAN FRANCISCO — California will become the first state in the nation to require all teachers and school staff to get vaccinated or undergo weekly COVID-19 testing, as schools return from summer break amid growing concerns about the highly contagious delta variant, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced Wednesday.

The new policy applies to both public and private schools and will affect the state's 320,000 public school teachers, more than 250,000 support staff — from cafeteria employees to cleaners – and at least 80,000 private school employees, according to the California Department of Education and labor unions. It will also apply to school volunteers.

Newsom announced the new policy at a San Francisco Bay Area school that reopened earlier this week to in-person classes. Many California schools are back in session, with others starting in the coming weeks.

#### Florida kids head back to school amid **COVID-19** surge

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Doctors in Florida say they're seeing many more coronavirus infections among children just as students begin to return to classrooms

There has been "an enormous increase" in COVID-19 cases among children in July and August at Joe DiMaggio Children's Hospital in Hollywood, Chief Medical Officer Dr. Ronald Ford said.

Most of these children have been treated in the emergency room and sent home, but "those that are admitted are sicker than what we've seen before, and many of them are requiring care in our intensive care units," Ford said.

But Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis says the share of pediatric hospitalizations is still between 1.1% and 1.4% in the state, which is how it has behaved throughout the pandemic. On Wednesday, 177 of the 15,071 patients with COVID-19 about 1.2 % — were children, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

"There's been no change in the proportion of pediatric patients who are COVID positive," he said. "Obviously we have more people that are COVID

positive in hospitals than we did six weeks ago, so the raw numbers are increasing for everybody."

About 20 children who had the virus sought treatment at the South Florida hospital's emergency department in June, Ford said.

"That number went to well over 200 in July and, even at this point in the month of August, we are already up to over 160. So we're well on the way to breaking July's record," Ford said.

On Tuesday, the hospital had nine positive patients admitted, with five in the ICU, Ford said.

Ford's advice to parents sending their children back to school: Get information from authoritative sources.

"There's a lot of misinformation out there about COVID-19, about testing, about the vaccine," Ford said. "The best thing you can do to protect your child is to keep them away from the virus. This virus is extremely infectious. And it doesn't take much virus to infect and cause symptoms and disease."

Masking works, reducing the incidence of transmission and the chances

of children getting the virus, he said. "So first and foremost, masking is going to be one of the best defenses we

have," Ford said.

## US holds back from Afghan collapse Taliban victories piling up faster than many had anticipated

WASHINGTON - Afghan government forces are collapsing even faster than U.S. military leaders thought possible just a few months ago when President Joe Biden ordered a full withdrawal. But there's little appetite at the White House, the Pentagon or among the American public for trying to stop the rout and it probably is too late to do so.

Biden has made clear he has no intention of reversing the decision he made last spring, even as the outcome seems to point toward a Taliban takeover. With most U.S. troops now gone and the Taliban accelerating their battlefield gains, American military leaders are not pressing him to change his mind. They know

would be for the president to restart the war he already decided to end.

The Taliban, who ruled the country from 1996 until U.S. forces invaded after the 9/11 attacks, captured three more provincial capitals Wednesday, giving them effective control of about two-thirds of the country. The insurgents have no air force and are outnumbered by U.S.-trained Afghan defense forces, but they have captured territory with stunning speed.

John Kirby, the chief Pentagon spokesman, said the Afghans still have time to save themselves from

'No potential outcome has to be inevitable, including the fall of Kabul," Kirby told reporters. "It doesn't have to be that way. It really depends on what kind of political and military leadership the Afghans that the only significant option can muster to turn this around.'

Biden made a similar point a day earlier, telling reporters that U.S. troops had done all they could over the past 20 years to assist the

"They've got to fight for themselves, fight for their nation," he

The United States continues to support the Afghan military with limited airstrikes, but those have not made a strategic difference thus far and are scheduled to end when the U.S. formally ends its role in the war on Aug. 31. Biden could continue airstrikes beyond that date, but given his firm stance on ending the war, that seems unlikely.

"My suspicion, my strong suspicion, is that the 31st of August timeline's going to hold," said Carter Malkasian, who advised U.S. military leaders in Afghanistan and Washington.

#### **Heat wave hits** Northwest. sending people to cooling centers

PORTLAND, Ore. — People headed to cooling centers Wednesday as the Pacific Northwest began sweltering under another major, multiday heat wave just over a month after record-shattering hot weather killed hundreds of the region's most vulnerable people.

Temperatures soared to 95 degrees Fahrenheit by mid-afternoon in Portland, Oregon. In a "worst-case scenario," the temperature could reach as high as 111 F in some parts of western Oregon this week before a weekend cooldown, the National Weather Service said. It's more likely temperatures will rise to 100 F or above for three consecutive days, peaking around 105 F on Thursday.

Sizzling weather also was expected in other parts of the country. The weather service said heat advisories and warnings would be in effect from the Midwest to the Northeast and mid-Atlantic through at least Friday.

The high temperatures in Portland, part of a usually temperate region, would break all-time records this week if the late June heat wave had not done so already, meteorologist Tyler Kranz said. Seattle will be cooler than Portland, with temperatures in the mid-90s, but it still has a chance to break records, and many people there, like in Oregon, don't have air conditioning.

#### **DA: Landlord in** tenant shooting handled eviction 'his way'

LAS VEGAS — A homeowner accused of shooting three tenants, killing two of them, after an argument over unpaid rent at his Las Vegas home told a witness that "he didn't want to go through the eviction process," a prosecutor said Wednesday.

Arnoldo Lozano-Sanchez "wanted to handle it, quote-unquote, 'his way," Chief Deputy District Attorney Tim Fattig told a judge.

The judge decided Lozano-Sanchez, 78, should remain jailed without bail pending his arraignment on murder and attempted murder charges in the slayings of two women and the wounding of a man who authorities said was shot nine

Lozano-Sanchez "made statements about the victims not paying rent and that he was certainly upset about it," Fattig said.

Police reported arriving at his small home early Tuesday to find one woman dead outside, the wounded man stumbling out the front door and another woman dead in a bedroom.

The wounded man was hospitalized in critical condition but is expected to survive, police said.

#### **Dems renew** push on elections bill that GOP vows to block

WASHINGTON — Democrats are renewing their push to enact their marquee voting bill, pledging to make it the first order of business when the Senate returns in the fall even though they don't have a clear strategy for overcoming steadfast Republican opposition.

Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer announced early Wednesday his plan for floor action in September on the bill, known as the For the People Act, which Democrats have tried to pass for months. The measure, blocked by Republicans from debate in June, would affect virtually every aspect of the electoral process, curbing the influence of big money in politics, limiting the partisan considerations in the drawing of congressional districts and expanding options for voting.

#### **Belarus denies** entry to US ambassador, cuts **US Embassy staff**

KYIV. Ukraine — Belarus on Wednesday rescinded its permission for the U.S. ambassador's appointment and told the U.S. to cut its embassy staff in retaliation for Washington's sanctions.

President Joe Biden's administration slapped Belarus with new sanctions Monday, the anniversary of last year's election in Belarus that was denounced by the opposition as rigged. Authoritarian President Alexander Lukashenko responded to protests against his re-election to a sixth term with a sweeping crackdown that saw more than 35,000 people arrested and thousands beaten by police.

#### **Israel tightens** coronavirus restrictions as new cases surge

JERUSALEM — Israel's government on Wednesday advanced a raft of new coronavirus restrictions, including sweeping implementation of a digital vaccine passport and tighter restrictions on mass gatherings, as the country struggles with skyrocketing new infections.

The country that had appeared to put the coronavirus pandemic behind it a few months ago after a world-leading vaccine drive is now re-imposing regulations in a bid to clamp back down on infections.

The Cabinet gave its approval for the tighter measures — including limitations on people gathering indoors and restricting entry to venues and restaurants to "Green Pass" holders — as new cases of the highly infectious delta variant of the coronavirus surge despite widespread vaccination against COVID-19.

## Rice pizza, noodle ices:

## Food shows Japan's punk rock soul

YOKOHAMA, Japan — Countries' foods are also windows on their souls.

Take hamburgers. Hand-held, quick to assemble and wolf down, they embody a quintessentially American idea that founding father Benjamin Franklin put to paper in 1748 and which still powers the ambitious on Wall Street and beyond. "Remember," Franklin wrote, "that time is money."

In China, food is so omnipresent in the national psyche that people greet each other with the phrase "chi fan le ma?"

- have you eaten? And French food snobbery prompted the famously omnivorous President Jacques Chirac to once quip unkindly of the British that: "One cannot with — excuse the pun trust people whose cuisine is so bad."

Which leads us to the Cup Noodles Museum in Yokohama, Japan.

Yes, there is such a place. And, yes, instant noodles have plenty to say about Japanese traits of inventiveness. risk-taking and an openness to adapting and upgrading foreign influences that helped Japan recover after World War II to become an economic, cultural and gastronomic — titan.

Some of those same traits have, these past two weeks, also helped Japan pull off the improbable feat — or folly, the jury is out — of hosting the Olympic Games in the midst of the pandemic. Allowing 11,000 athletes to come from around the world, some bringing the coronavirus with them, testified to Japanese resilience, hospitality and flexibility.

Now back to ramen, a potted history.

The Japanese cribbed noodles from neighbor China, where they are called "lamian." Over the years, Japanese chefs elevated ramen into an art, a tastebud-blowing spectrum of flavors, textures and choices.

In short, Japan absorbed a foreign influence and improved on it. The same would later be true with automobiles, gadgetry and — for fans of "Demon Slayer," "One Piece" and other mangas cartoons, to name just those few.

Back to noodles, though. Horrified by food shortages that ravaged post-war Japan, impoverished former credit union worker Momofuku Ando hit upon the idea of turning surplus American wheat into ramen that hungry people could prepare with just hot

water and a few minutes. Ando's eureka moment

came while watching his wife deep-fry tempura. That gave birth to the idea of flash-frying noodles to dehydrate them. Ando's first instant noodles were launched in

Cup Noodles followed in 1971. The brainchild for that idea came on a fact-finding trip that Ando made to the United States in 1966, when he saw consumers of his instant noodles rehydrate and eat them from paper cups. This according to Nissin Foods, the company Ando founded. Worldwide cumulative sales of Cup Noodles surpassed the 40-billion mark in 2016.

Ando died in 2007, at age 96. But his inventive spirit lives in what must rank as one of the world's most unique flavor experiences: the Cup Noodle ice cream.

Served only at the Cup Noodles Museum, in its fourth floor cafeteria, it's made with the same

powdered soup and freeze-dried toppings onion, shrimp, chunks of egg and meat — used in actual Cup Noodles.

Museum visitor Noriyuki Sato, who tried it, described it as "saltysweet," neither here nor there. "I'm not sure if that word makes sense to foreigners," he said. "It's not sweet and it's not salty, either.'

But it is a monument to thinking out of the box and to a Japanese knack for fusing together seemingly incompatible things to make wholly new ones. It's hard to imagine an Italian gelato maker veering so audaciously off the beaten track.

Nissin Foods spokesperson Kahara Suzuki says the ice cream having tasted it, one hesitates to call it a dessert - embodies "what I would call a punk rock spirit that many Japanese people have.

"Who would ever come up with an idea like this?

I mean it's very unique," Suzuki said. "You can see that punk rock spirit in every aspect of Japanese life.'

Certainly on Japanese plates. A few other examples include fruit sandwiches sold in corner stores and popular rice burgers. Since May, they and their likes have been been joined by rice pizzas — developed by Sachie Oyama, an innovation chef and manager of the Menu Innovation Department at Domino's Pizza Japan Inc.

The Domino's Deluxe version is, in effect, a pizza built on a base layer of compressed, precooked Japanese-cultivated white rice, instead of a usual base of pizza

dough. The rice base is then smothered with rich tomato sauce and topped with traditional pizza ingredients: mozzarella cheese, onions, peppers, pepperoni and Italian sausage. Domino's sells the product line only in Japan. Oyama calls it "a pizza you can eat by yourself," rather than sharing slices.

"Japanese people are good at rearranging things," she said. "A combination with pizza and rice is not a weird thing at all."

Perhaps not. But foods like that do help explain why Japan seems to never stand still. After all, there are always new tastes to invent.



hat a combination. It's 6 a.m., the birds outside my window are trying to outdo each other, all six little children are sound asleep, and Mommy is ready to write! All we need is a stretcher to lengthen the next hour til we're in full swing of the

My mind travels across the country to the millions of homes, with many who are rising, getting ready for the day. For thousands, it will have been their last day, for many, there is poverty and sickness, making their days unbearable.

My day ahead looks like it's filled with the norm of making breakfast for our children, telling Bible stories, helping little ones with their morning chores, teaching them to work and play with a common goal of building the family instead of teasing. Then I stop and realize that I'm not promised what will happen between now and the moment I lay my head on the pillow for the night. I truly do not know what my day may hold.

So for today I will cherish the moment, tucking deep into my heart these priceless moments with little ones. What's better than those first days of having a 1-year-old toddle all around the house? As he rounds the corner going from the sewing room to the kitchen and he calls, "Ma-ma!" As he spies me, his entire face beams and his big blue eyes light up like a light bulb. Surely it's worth being a mom despite the rough nights and the many questions with no answers, which I keep bringing before the Lord. On my own, I do not have all the expertise needed with raising Godly children.

In regards to my days, I am endlessly thankful for my dear husband who diligently works five days a week to give me the opportunity of staying home with our dear little ones in this brief stage of their young lives. So you wonder, "Do all Amish wives just work at home and not of butter and press into a pursue any careers?" In recent years I have discovered that there are Amish mothers in some communities that do take the responsibility of working away from home, so yes it is done here and there, but for the most part Amish wives choose to stay home with their families.

In our homes it is of great value to have mothers working along side their daughters, (and sons for that matter) as they teach them many basic concepts of cooking, gardening, sewing, and the likes. For me personally, there are few things I enjoy more than to have all the children with me in the kitchen or garden and watch the delight on

their innocent faces as they help do things for our family.

I am double spoiled, beside spending entire days with my lambs (as I call our children), we have the rare privilege of having Daddy own a furniture business right here at home. Each day at 11:30 he joins us for lunch.

On days when 6-yearold Austin or 9-year-old Julia make lunch, we all get the treat of taking it out to Daddy while they shut down for noon break. If you happen to know anything about eating with six little children you can perhaps imagine the scene.

Who doesn't want to sit beside Daddy in his shop, and what little boy wouldn't have fun looking for the chance to slip off and sprint through the shop when Mom isn't looking? Since we've harvested our hundred onions we've been enjoying them in all sorts of versions, with this being on the top of the

#### CHEESY ONION PIE

- 30 saltine crackers
- 1/3 cup butter, melted
- 3 cups onions, diced ■ 1 /4 cup butter
- 1 cup shredded
- Cheddar cheese
- 3 eggs, beaten ■ 1 1 /2 cup milk
- 3/4 teaspoon Salt
- 1/4 teaspoon Pepper

Mix crackers and 1/3 cup 9-inch baking dish.

Saute onions in 1 /4 cup butter until onions are slightly tender.

Spread onions over cracker mixture and sprinkle with cheese. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over cheese.

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Remove from oven and serve.

# Good gourds!

## Longtime Crystal River residents show versatility, creativity

race and David Chen are awash in Chinese gourds this summer, grown at their Crystal River home for ornamental use, gifts and so much more.

The Chens say they were startled to discover that a few weeks of constant rain early this summer spurred growth of the bottle gourds and they knew just what to do with them, including a bounty of recipes they are sharing today.

Grace and David are longtime Crystal River residents, chefs, and owned several Chinese-themed restaurant before their retirement.

"A friend gave me two bottle gourds last year," Grace said. "She said maybe they are not good anymore. But David put them outside the sun until they completely dried. Then he cut off the tops, removed the seeds and planted them in two

She said her husband, who was brought up on a farm, tended to the gourds until they ripened, giving them homemade natural fertilizer.

"The gourds make great gifts," she said. "Especially if you let them dry completely and then paint designs on them and even etch designs. Some people hollow them and make lamps and water bottles and other containers.'

Gourds enjoy a rich historical backgroud and are mentioned in the Bible numerous times: "Gourds were used ornamentally in Solomon's temple (I Kings 6: 18a.)'

And: "King James Version of 1611, 'qiqayon' is translated as "gourd": And the LORD God prepared a gourd, and made it to come up over Jonah, that it might be a shadow over his head, to deliver him from his grief. So Jonah was exceeding glad of the gourd."

Gourds prefer full sun and rich, well-drained soil that is rich in organic material. Sow the seeds outdoors after all danger of frost has passed and the weather is warm. Gourds grow well on trellises or supports, keeping the fruits off the ground.

Gourd seeds have hard seedcoats. To hasten germination, soak gourd seeds in water overnight or up to 24 hours. When starting gourds indoors, sow seeds in peat pots about 3 to 4 weeks before their intended outdoor planting date. Gourd seedlings should be planted outdoors after the danger of frost is past.

The most commonly eaten gourds are Asian. They are picked young and underripe to ensure less harsh flavor. Among these are sponge (or Luffa) and bottle (or Calabash). There is also an Italian gourd called cucuzza.

Planting the gourd has a long history in China. There are many folk legends about it. According to legends, the gourd is a treasure used by Gods to hold wine and elixir. It is naturally contaminated with the spirit of immortality, so it has always been regarded as a symbol of good

"Besides eating, and decorating, a gourd has many uses," Chen said.

"You can cut them in half to make ladles and rice scoops; hollow out the insides to fill with wine or water. You can see many laughing Buddha figures carrying gourds — I guess inside they have wine because it shows a happy Buddha.'

"The gourds we planted was originally named 'Hulu,' a kind of melon vegetable. It has a long history of cultivation in China. According to the different shapes of gourds, they can be divided into several types, called gourds, and other names such as opo, Calabash, gourd squash, Chinese squash and more," she

explained. "The ones we have, round ends and a narrow waist makes it hard to shave the skin, so it's unpopular. Therefore, it is rarely seen in the market here ... even in Taiwan

where I grew up. "I remember my mom cooked gourds, but she always used the straight, long-shaped gourd. It's the more popular gourd, you can easily find it in oriental markets," Grace

"Our bottle gourd has an interesting appearance and is so beautiful; it's suitable for enjoyment. When I gave it to friends they all loved the shape and don't want to cook it. They like to keep them as a

souvenirs. "Among the processed gourd products, some are engraved with patterns. The most common ones are the blessing, longevity and dragon. The patterns should be carved on the tender skin of the gourd when it is still young. As the fruit grows, the lines of the pattern will also become prominent and enlarged. people can engrave, paint and make different kinds of decorations or hanging ornaments after it

dried. It's a great gift. you can find

different kinds of gifts made of gourd in Asian gift shops," she explained.

"After the gourd is picked and exposed to the sun for about two months, the flesh and seeds will shrink and you can scoop it out so that they can be stored for a long time. David made a dough used for making bottle gourd dumplings for dinner:

"Beyond burger' (a vegetable meat substitute) has a good flavor so when we made dumplings, we just used 1/4 of shredded bottle gourd with chopped scallion, minced ginger, salt and pepper, and 1 tablespoon of sesame oil. It's very delicious." she described a making a recent dish.

#### SAUTEED SHRIMP WITH BOTTLE GOURD

- 1. Halve a gourd, peel and remove
- seeds and slice (about 1 inch thick). 2. Chop 2 scallions to taste.
- 3. Mix 1/2 pound of medium-size, shelled shrimp with 1 egg white and 2 tablespoons corn starch (or 2 tablespoons of olive oil instead) mixed well.
- 4. Turn heat to medium. Pour 5 tablespoons of olive oil in the skillet. When pan is hot, stir the shrimp until changed to pink color. Remove and put on one plate.
- 5. Stir-fry chopped scallion until you smell the fragrance; pour the sliced gourd into pan and stir-fry for 4 minutes; put shrimp back in the pan for another 4 minutes and add one teaspoon of seasame oil, one tablespoon of balsamic vinegar, a little
- salt and pepper to taste. 6. Cook until gourd is medium soft.



## Red Sox roll Tampa Bay 20-8 in their highest-scoring game since '15

BOSTON — Bobby Dalbec drove in a career-high five runs, Xander Bogaerts and Hunter Renfroe each had four RBIs and the Boston Red Sox routed the Tampa Bay Rays 20-8 Wednesday night.

The Red Sox moved within four games of the AL East-leading Rays with their highest-scoring game since 2015.

Tampa Bay had won five in a row overall and six straight against Boston. The Rays had not not allowed at least 20 runs since 2007.

## Field of Dreams game arrives Inspired by 1989

More than three decades after "Field of Dreams" seeped into the country's cultural consciousness, with a one-year delay caused by the pandemic, one of the most famous cornfields in Hollywood history finally gets the opportunity to host real major league ball.

"Is this heaven?" the ghost of John Kinsella asked in the movie that inspired the game to be played Thursday between the Chicago White Sox and New York Yankees next to the actual site used in the 1989 film, which is maintained as a tourist attraction.

"No, it's Iowa," dutiful farmer Ray Kinsella — played by Kevin Costner — responded to his father with a smile before they played catch under the lights in the movie's most poignant scene.

This week, the ball playing isn't fiction.

"Shoeless" Joe Jackson and other long-ago players who took the field in the movie will be replaced by José Abreu and Aaron Judge.

The proud and quintessential Midwestern state, usually only in the spotlight every four years during presidential campaigns, will be hosting a Major League Baseball game for the first time when the White Sox and Yankees play at a temporary venue built for about 8,000 fans in tiny Dyersville population "about 4,400, we're hoping for in the next census," said mayor Jim Heavens.

The event, part of MLB's increased effort to grow the game by setting up shop in places without in-person access to the highest level of the sport, has been in the works for years. The original plan to play in 2020 was postponed when the coronavirus forced a shortened schedule at mostly empty ballparks, but if the White Sox, the Yankees or the Iowans became impatient then they were out of

step with the spirit of the film. "The one constant through all the years," as the sage author Terence Mann declared to Ray Kinsella in the film, "has been baseball.'

Dversville found its place on the map through the movie that starred Costner, James Earl Jones, Ray Liotta and Amy Madigan, but the sport has been

**LAKE ROUSSEAU** — Bill Burgess of Lake Rousseau RV and Fishing said fishing has slowed a little bit due to poor water conditions. Flooding to the east in the Withlacoochee has made the water dingy and black, and has lowered the water level. There are a few bluegill hitting on wigglers, as well as cut-up hot dogs, in 6-8 feet of water. Crappie are hitting on Rapalas, while bass are out by the stumps away from the bank, biting on Texas-rigged speed worms along the bottom. Only a few have been caught on the topwater.

#### **SALTWATER**

CRYSTAL RIVER/BARGE CANAL -Ed's Tackle Shop reports redfish are biting on shrimp, while snook are hitting on cut mullet and topwater plugs. Grouper are out in 80 feet of water and beyond.

HOMOSASSA RIVER — Bill Korade of Blue Water Bait and Tackle said there were a couple good grouper reports offshore in 35-40 feet of water, use Spanish sardines or thread-fin herring. Mixed in were a few mangrove snapper. Redfish and snook are around the outer islands, in the mouth of Mason Creek and St. Martins. Go with cut mullet or artificial lures in white or glow.

KING'S BAY — Captain Louie Argiro of Florida Fishing Adventures (352-601-1963, www.floridafishingadventures. com), based out of Pete's Pier in Crystal River, said, "This week is just one of those dog days of summer kind of weeks. It's hot out there, and if you don't believe me, come give it a try. I've been redfishing early in the morning to try and beat the heat. The fishing has been fantastic till about 10 a.m. when that water starts to heat up quickly. I saw 90-degree water today on my way in.

### THIS DATE IN BASEBALL

1948 — In the second game of a doubleheader, the Cleveland Indians beat the St. Louis Browns 26-3 with a 29-hit barrage. The Indians set a major league record as 14 different players hit safely.

1964 — Mickey Mantle hit a home run both left- and right-handed in a 7-3 win over the Chicago White Sox. It was the 10th time in his career and a major league record for switch-hit homers in a game.

1966 — Art Shamsky of the Cincinnati Reds connected for three home runs in a 14-11, 13-inning loss to the Pittsburgh Pirates at Crosley Field. Two of the homers came in the 10th and 11th innings.

1970 — Curt Flood lost his \$41 million antitrust suit against baseball.

1974 — Nolan Ryan of the California Angels set an American League record by striking out 19 in a 4-2 win over the Boston Red Sox. Ryan, who walked two, bettered the 18 strikeouts set by Bob Feller in 1938 and tied the major league record set by Steve Carlton in 1969 and Tom Seaver in 1970.

1984 — Perhaps one of the ugliest brawl-filled games in major league history took place in Atlanta. Atlanta's Pascual Perez hit San Diego's Alan Wiggins in the back with the first pitch of the game. It escalated as the Padres pitchers retaliated by throwing at Perez

all four times he came to the plate. The game had two bench-clearing brawls, the second of which included several fans and 19 ejections including both managers and both replacement managers. The Braves beat the Padres 5-3. San Diego manager Dick Williams would be suspended for 10 days and fined \$10,000 while Atlanta manager Joe Torre and five players each received three-game suspensions.

1986 — Don Baylor of the Boston Red Sox set an AL record when he was hit by a pitch for the 25th time for the season, breaking the record he had shared with Bill Freehan (1968) and Norm Elberfield (1911). Kansas City's Bud Black was the pitcher as the Royals completed a doubleheader sweep with a 6-5 victory.

1988 — The Boston Red Sox set an AL record with their 23rd straight victory at home, beating the Detroit Tigers 9-4. Boston surpassed the league mark of 22 set by the 1931 Philadelphia Athletics.

1994 — Major league baseball players went on strike for the sport's eighth work stoppage since 1972.

2010 — Casey McGehee set a franchise record with his ninth straight hit, going 4 for 4 and leading the Milwaukee Brewers to an 8-4 win over the Arizona Diamondbacks. McGehee had a solo homer, a two-run double, an RBI single and another single.



#### **NCAA** hands Baylor probation, fine in scandal

The NCAA said Wednesday that its long investigation of the Baylor sexual assault scandal would result in nothing more than probation and other relatively minor sanctions because the egregious, "unacceptable" behavior at the heart of the case did not violate its rules.

The NCAA ruling came more than five years after the scandal rocked the world's largest Baptist university, leading to the firing of successful football coach Art Briles and the departure of athletic director Ian McCaw and school president

The NCAA said the allegations centered on conduct never before presented to the Committee on Infractions, which has existed since 1951 — that Baylor "shielded football student-athletes from the institution's disciplinary process and failed to report allegations of abhorrent misconduct by football student-athletes, including instances of sexual and interpersonal violence.'

The panel said Baylor admitted to moral and ethical failings in its handling of violence on the Waco campus but argued "that those failings, however egregious, did not constitute violations of NCAA legislation."

"Ultimately, and with tremendous reluctance, this panel agrees," the ruling

#### **Houston NCAA sprinting** champ Burrell dead at 26

HOUSTON — Former NCAA national champion sprinter Cameron Burrell has

died. He was 26.

The University of Houston, where he starred from 2013-2018, announced his death. The school said he died Monday

but did not provide further details. Cameron Burrell won the national title in the 100 meters in 2018 in Eugene, Oregon. He won a second national title with his team that season by running the anchor leg of the 4x100-meter relay.

Burrell became the 121st man to run the 100 in less than 10 seconds when he posted a time of 9.93 seconds on June 8, 2017.

#### Rose selected to receive **Payne Stewart Award**

PONTE VEDRA BEACH — Justin Rose of England has been selected to receive the Payne Stewart Award, one of the premier awards on the PGA Tour that recognizes character, sportsmanship and a commitment to charity.

The award is named after the threetime major champion who died in a private plane accident in 1999, four months after he won the U.S. Open at Pinehurst No. 2 and a month after a U.S. victory in the Ryder Cup.

Rose, a former U.S. Open champion and Olympic gold medalist, and wife Kate have established a foundation geared toward feeding and educating children. Most recently, they created the Rose Ladies Series to provide women playing opportunities when the Ladies European Tour and other circuits shut down because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

He will be presented the award on Aug. 31 at a ceremony in Atlanta the week of the Tour Championship.



Where did the expression about getting out of bed on the wrong side originate?

When playing in a trump contract with a side suit that needs to be established and cashed, it is usually right to play on that suit first, before drawing trumps. That was true in this deal from a knockout teams match.

Both declarers were in four hearts. (Don't even think about





rebidding two clubs with that North hand.) Each received a club lead to the jack and ace. The first South immediately played a heart to the king, burning up a dummy entry far too early. The 0=5 trump break was a big shock. In desperation, South played a diamond to his jack and West's ace. Now, though, West gave his partner a diamond ruff, and East exited with the heart nine. South couldn't find 10 tricks.

If South had won the first trump trick in his hand, he might have survived. After East takes a diamond ruff, declarer can play a heart to dummy's king and lead winning diamonds through East. When he ruffs, South overruffs, returns to dummy with a trump and enjoys the remaining diamond winners.

However, the second declarer made the best play: He led the diamond jack at trick two. The defense had no riposte. If they took the ruff, South would enjoy the diamonds as just mentioned. If West ducked his ace once before shifting to spades, South had several routes to 10 tricks.

Richard Brome, an English dramatist who died in 1652, wrote, "You rose o' the wrong side today." Do you know of an earlier reference?

## Annie offers advice

ear Annie: I am a 29-year-old woman, and I've been having an ongoing debate with my boyfriend of 10 years.

I wear makeup because I am insecure about my skin and my face in general. I have tried any and all products recommended to me to help clear up my skin.

I have suffered from eating

disorders in the past and have constant fixation and amplification of every flaw, so I'm aware of the fact that might be body dysmorphia that is in

part driving my anxiety about my face. I am going into therapy and seeing a dermatologist next month, and I will start my process there.

But in the meantime, when I look in the mirror at my bare face, I see a monster. Makeup takes away some of that anxiety — gives me confidence in myself, allowing me to enjoy life a little more.

While I know that it is not healthy to be so dependent on cosmetics, they are helping me get through these feelings for

The problem is that my boyfriend hates that I wear makeup. He constantly insists that I stop wearing it, to the point that we regularly get in heated arguments about this. He even jokingly says he will break up with me if I continue to wear it. I tell him that not wearing makeup just doesn't work for me. I tried it once for a year. It didn't clear up my skin, and it was horrible emotionally.

I really don't know what to say to him at this point other than that I am in the process of hopefully solving this problem, but even if my blemishes clear up, the mental and emotional aspects will take time. I understand others will say: "It's just makeup. Ditch it for him if you really love him!" But I don't think people understand how much I really can't stand seeing the face I have naked in the mirror. It brings me to tears and causes anxiety attacks — which I feel like my boyfriend would resent me even more for. He doesn't have much patience for insecurity of any kind. I'm not sure what to tell him other than, "Let's wait and see." Any advice? -Can't Face the Mirror

Dear Can't Face the Mirror: Just as it would be wrong for your boyfriend to demand that you wear makeup, it's wrong for him to demand that you don't. It's your face, and it's up to you what to do with it. His threats of breaking up hardly qualify as "jokes" in my book. That kind of talk smacks of bullying. Enlist the help of your therapist in setting and enforcing boundaries in your relationship so that you can focus on healing yourself and reducing your anxiety.

**Dear Annie:** My soon-to-be 40-year-old daughter seriously needs help for her mental health. She is a recovering addict. She's been sober for five years. Earlier this year, she got out of a two-year relationship, and it's as though she's been traumatized ever since. She walks around like a zombie. I'm wondering whether she's back on drugs. What can I do? - Worried Mom

Dear Worried: You can encourage your daughter to seek help through in-patient or out-patient treatment centers and/or support groups such as Narcotics Anonymous (www. na.org) or LifeRing Secular Recovery (www.lifering.org). Even more importantly, I would urge you to lead by example and attend meetings of Nar-Anon Family Groups (www.nar-anon.org). Living with the disease of addiction is too much for most of us to bear alone. The solidarity found in support groups can make even the most daunting problems a little bit more manageable.
