Citrus County COVID-19 update

According to the Florida Department of Health, 82 new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update. No new deaths were reported for a total of 296.

To date in the county, 7,588 people have tested positive (including 54 non-residents).

Three new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 545 hospitalized.

Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to later revision.

Reward offered for info on manatee

ST. PETERSBURG — The Center for Biological Diversity announced a \$5,000 reward for information leading to a conviction for the cruel and illegal mutilation of a threatened Florida manatee in north Florida's Homosassa River. Someone scraped the word TRUMP into the animal's back.

"It's heartbreaking that this manatee was subjected to this vile, criminal act," said Jaclyn Lopez, Florida director at the Center. "It's clear that whoever harmed this defenseless, gentle giant is capable of doing grave violence and needs to be apprehended immediately."

Officials with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Florida's Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission began investigating the crime after the manatee was discovered Sunday with serious scarring in the form of the president's name. Anyone with information can call the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation hotline at 888-404-3922.

Protected under the Endangered Species Act since 1963, manatees are slow-moving plant eaters with no natural enemies. Most years boat mortality makes up about 20% of known human-caused deaths.

Harassment of a manatee is a federal criminal offense punishable by a \$50,000 fine and up to one year in prison.

Impeachment moving fast

WASHINGTON — The U.S. House rushed ahead Tuesday toward impeaching President Donald Trump for the deadly Capitol attack, taking time only to try to persuade his

vice president to push him out first. Trump showed no remorse, blaming impeachment itself for the "tremendous anger" in America.

Already scheduled to leave office next week, Trump is on the verge of becoming the only president in history to be twice impeached. His incendiary rhetoric at a rally

ahead of the Capitol uprising is now in the impeachment charge against him, even as the falsehoods he spread about election fraud are still being championed by some Republicans.

The House convened Tuesday night to vote on urging Vice President Mike Pence to invoke the 25th Amendment to the

Constitution to remove Trump with a Cabinet vote. But shortly before that, Pence said he would not do so in a letter to House Speaker Nancy Pelosi.

He said that it would not be in the best interest of the nation or consistent with the Constitution and that it was "time to unite our country as we prepare to inaugurate Presi-

dent-elect Joe Biden."

Meanwhile, three three Republican lawmakers, including third-ranking House GOP leader Liz Cheney of Wyoming, announced they would vote to impeach Trump on Wednesday, cleaving the party's leadership.

Lollygaggers Sports Pub & Grill is coming to Floral City.

Morgan and Kason Sundberg, owners of the Crystal River Lollygaggers, bought the recently closed Old World Restaurant, which had been a landmark in Floral City for 30-plus years, gutted the inside and will transform the place into almost an carbon copy of the popular westside

pub/grill. The Sundbergs are shooting for an opening prior to March 1.

Morgan Sundberg said Floral City is in need of something like this, especially since it will have a full liquor bar. Sundberg stressed the Crystal River Lollygaggers is not closing.

"We're not moving, we're expanding," she said.

A sports bar-themed bar/restaurant is missing from Floral City and

Crystal River OKs plan for paddlecraft at park

Crystal River City Council set the stage for the future of Kings Bay Park and how it will host and capitalize on the local commercial paddlecraft industry.

Council voted 5-0 at its meeting the evening of Monday, Jan. 11, to approve three agenda items finalizing how six city-licensed paddlecraft businesses must operate at the city's waterfront park and pay fees for their clientele to launch there.

These measures go into effect Feb. 1.

This is the result of city officials' requirement for recognized paddlecraft vendors to launch from Kings Bay Park at the end

of Northwest Third Street, in an effort to quell overcrowding at Hunter Springs Park and obtain more city revenue from businesses profiting from a public park.

In its votes Monday, Council already committed \$101,000 in expected city-collected launch fees to restructure city staff to better monitor the park's paddlecraft operations, including the disbursement of prepaid wristbands to show proof of payment to launch.

Council also voted for up to \$30,000 to pay Jones Edmunds and Associates for a long-term development plan for Kings Bay Park so it can handle and move increased traffic and activity.

It's the city's intention to also use launch fees to

fund those capital projects designed in the plan, along with paying additional staff.

Dave Perry, owner of Hunter Springs Kayak, thanked city staff and Councilwoman Cindi Guy on Monday for negotiating the city's franchise agreements with his and the five other paddlecraft businesses running out of Kings Bay Park.

This included lowering the proposed launch fee from \$7.50 to \$5.

Perry asked council to allow paddlecraft businesses access to the park after-hours for night tours, noting the city wouldn't be liable for mishaps per the agreement.

"This is now our only option of where we can

DUI case set for plea; child porn cases move ahead

A trial date was set for Cheryl Lynn Reese's DUI-manslaughter case, but attorneys expect to resolve her felony charges with a plea deal instead of taking them to jurors.

Reese's attorney, Angelica Jones, told Citrus County Circuit Judge Richard "Ric" Howard at her client's hearing Tuesday, Jan. 12, she and Assistant State Attorney Rob Lewis are negotiating a plea agreement for Reese, a 61-year-old from Auburndale.

Jones said she shared a crash reconstruction

report with Lewis in hopes the prosecutor would compromise further.

"We have been working very tightly to get this resolved," Jones told Howard.

"I think we're pretty close," Lewis added.

Howard scheduled Reese's trial for March 15, with a final pretrial court date of March 1, but told the lawyers to contact his judicial assistant if a change-of-plea hearing is needed earlier.

In connection to the fatal head-on collision from May 13, 2018, in Lecanto, Reese faces

DeSantis warns off troublemakers

Governor vows to 'act very quickly' if disorderly protests erupt in state

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Ron DeSantis warned Tuesday that law enforcement “reinforcements” will be on hand if anyone plans to participate in armed protests at the state Capitol.

“If anything is disorderly, we’re going to act very quickly. Don’t worry about that,” DeSantis said during an appearance Tuesday in The Villages about COVID-19 vaccinations.

DeSantis comments were in response to a question about an internal FBI bulletin obtained by a number of media outlets indicating the federal agency has received information that armed protests are being planned at all 50 state capitols and the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C., in the days leading up to President-elect Joe Biden’s inauguration on Jan. 20.

“On 8 January, the FBI received information on an identified

group calling for others to join them in ‘storming’ state, local and federal government courthouses and administrative buildings in the event POTUS is removed as President prior to Inauguration Day,” the bulletin said, referring to outgoing President Donald Trump. “This identified group is also planning to ‘storm’ government offices including in the District of Columbia and in every state, regardless of whether the states certified electoral votes for Biden or Trump, on 20 January.”

Florida Senate President Wilton Simpson, R-Trilby, sent a memo to senators and staff members saying that at “this this time, it is our understanding that our Capitol remains secure and there have been no threats to our safety.”

“It is however very likely that we will have protestors gathering outside the Capitol this Sunday, January 17th,” Simpson wrote. “I understand that this time of year many members of our professional staff are working on the weekends. Out of an abundance of caution, I am requesting that staff work remotely this Sunday, rather than traveling to the Capitol Complex.”

Simpson also wrote that Senate Sergeant at Arms Damien Kelly “works in close cooperation” with the Capitol Police and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement to monitor potential threats to the Capitol.

“I want you all to know that security, as it relates to both the health and safety of our professional staff, our Senators, and visitors is my top priority,” Simpson wrote. “You are all already aware of our safety protocols related to health, specifically the COVID-19 Pandemic. Under the leadership of Sergeant Kelly, we have also made significant enhancements to the physical security of the

Senate. These enhancements, while confidential, are designed to ensure the safety of all those who visit and work in the Senate.”

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement also issued a statement indicating it is analyzing the situation.

“We are aware of the information regarding possible protests and violence at state capitols,” the statement said. “FDLE and Capitol Police continue to monitor the national situation and analyze information relevant to public safety. We regularly collaborate with our federal, state and local partners to discuss and implement security measures that enhance public safety at Florida’s Capitol.”

DeSantis, who is backing proposals in the upcoming 2021 legislative session to crack down on violent protests (SB 484, HB 1), added that the U.S. Capitol storming was “a really unfortunate thing.”

Report points to Visit Florida marketing providing return on investment

TALLAHASSEE — A new state report says Visit Florida provides a good return on investment, even as the tourism-marketing agency faced years of efforts by House leaders to shut it down.

Florida took in \$3.27 for every dollar the state spent on tourism marketing over a three-year period, before cuts in funding for the agency and before COVID-19 sent the travel and leisure industries into a tailspin, according to the report released Monday by the Legislature's Office of Economic & Demographic Research.

The return over three fiscal years that started July 1, 2016, was more than in the three preceding fiscal years, the economic research staff determined.

It helped that the state, with 1,350 miles of sunny shoreline and a variety of theme parks, was experiencing year-after-year tourism records, while lawmakers pro-

vided a “limited increase” in funding.

The research office found the estimated return, up from \$2.15 per dollar in the prior three-year period, “is reflective of Visit Florida’s return in periods of strong tourism growth and state investments at their current levels.”

The report equated tourist spending to exports of products from the state.

“The more tourists there are, the more ‘exported’ goods and services there are. While the services purchased by tourists add only broadly to the economy, the goods they purchase have the additional ROI value of being taxable in Florida,” the report said. “These purchases include lodgings at hotels, meals at restaurants, gifts at souvenir shops, tickets to amusement parks and Florida attractions and car rentals. All these goods are subject to state taxes, most to sales taxes.”

The report estimates Visit Florida from fiscal year 2016-2017 to fiscal year 2018-2019 helped generate \$744.64 million in

state revenue, \$15.85 billion in state gross domestic product, and, on average, more than 25,000 additional jobs each year. During that period, the state pumped \$227.99 million into the marketing agency, which teams with local tourism agencies to promote Florida across the nation and to foreign markets.

From fiscal year 2013-2014 to 2015-2016, with the state spending \$210.5 million on Visit Florida, the tourism-related revenue was \$453.2 million, and gross domestic product stood at \$13.5 billion, putting the return on investment at \$2.15 per each marketing dollar, the report said.

With the state putting \$115.50 million into tourist marketing between fiscal years 2010-2011 and 2012-2013, the return on each dollar spent was \$3.21, generating \$343.4 million in revenue and \$11.3 billion in gross domestic product.

In 2011, state spending on Visit Florida stood at \$35 million, while the tourist count was 87.3 million.

Man faces drug charges, driving with no license for sixth time

A Citrus County man sits in jail facing drug possession charges as well as his sixth charge for driving with a suspended driver's license.

Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies arrested Jason Kenneth Gloner, 35, after a traffic stop Saturday when the arresting deputy reported Gloner ran a stop sign at West Cardinal Street and South

Lew Drive in Homosassa, according to Gloner's arrest report.

The arresting deputy reported that he stopped Gloner and asked for his driver's license. The deputy reported that Gloner instead gave him a Florida identification

card, according to the report. The arresting deputy processed Gloner's identification through the agency's database and found that Gloner had five convictions for driving without a license, spanning from 2006 to 2020.

A second deputy obtained probable cause to search the vehicle when Gloner's passenger told deputies that he had a pipe that he used to smoke marijuana. The passenger pulled a glass pipe out of

his pocket and showed it to the deputies, according to Gloner's arrest report.

The arresting deputy searched the vehicle and found a black box on the driver's side floor. Inside the deputy reported finding 0.79 grams of methamphetamine, according to the report. The deputy also reported finding another substance, weighing 0.32 grams, in the vehicle's sunglass holder, and testing positive for fentanyl.

The arresting deputy also found 0.65 grams of marijuana in the same sunglass holder, the report stated.

One gram equals 0.035 ounces.

Deputies arrested Gloner and charged him with two counts of possession of a controlled substance, driving with a suspended or revoked license, and possessing drug paraphernalia.

His bond was set at \$6,000.

LOS ANGELES — **Spike Lee's** daughter and son have been chosen as the Golden Globe ambassadors to assist with the awards ceremony.

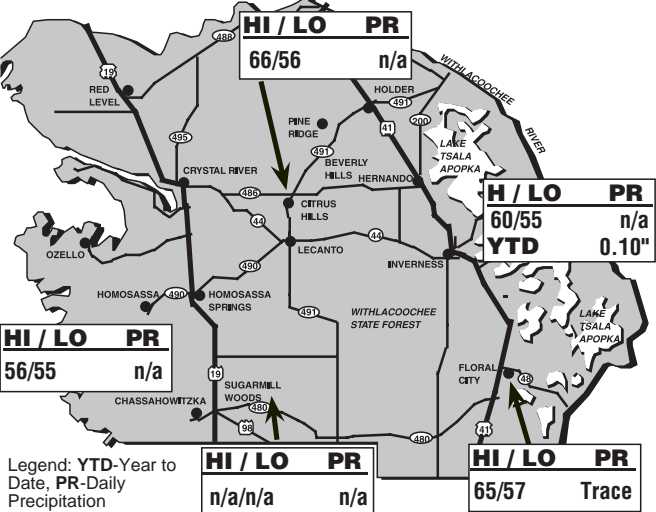

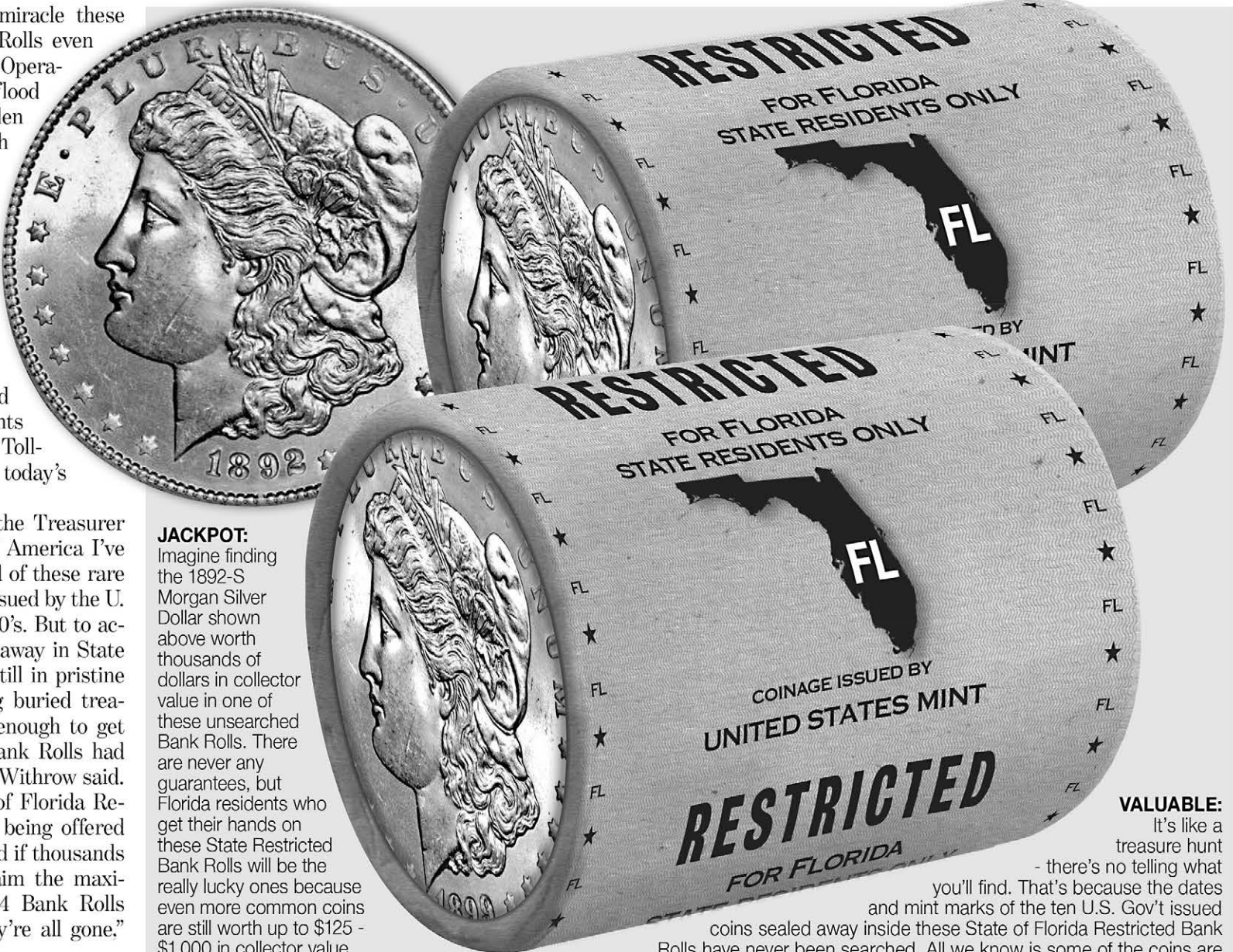

people must travel to Inverness, Brooksville or Bushnell, she said.
But it's just not business. The buying of Old World is an emotional experience for Sundberg. She remembers going there when she was a young girl. Up until it closed, she and her family would eat at the Bavarian-themed restaurant most Sundays.
"I definitely am blessed to be able to hold onto the building, make new memories and make sure the building stays even longer," she said.
When it closed last month due to the retirement of owners Olimpia and Danny Mundlean, it was a loss to that city, she said. The new Lollygaggers keeps the spirit of the building alive, she said.
Besides the two Lollygaggers, the Sundbergs also own Kane's Cattle

Co. and the Loft Bar & Grill. They also operate two food trucks.
Sundberg said she gets asked how she can handle so many places. She attributes it to the staff at each location.
"We would not do what we do or be as successful as we are without our team," she said.
The Floral City Lollygaggers will have the same layout and menu, but will also boast some entrees from The Loft, including a prime rib dinner and prime rib burger. With an awareness of COVID-19, the Sundbergs are also installing outdoor seating.
Sundberg said there will be about 25 employees, some new hires and some transferring from the other three restaurants.
Sundberg said she was born and raised in Floral City and feels a deep connection to that city.
"This building is near and dear to my heart," she said. "(I'm) happy to keep it local and keep it alive."

charges of DUI manslaughter, vehicular homicide and DUI involving serious bodily injury.
It's alleged Reese was driving intoxicated and the wrong way on State Road 44 when her vehicle struck another near South Thayer Avenue.
Pamela Jean Allen, Reese's 56-year-old passenger, died at the crash scene. Kaitlin Jean Carroll-Cruz, the other driver, and Reese were hospitalized with serious injuries.
Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) troopers arrested Reese on July 29, 2019, and Lewis filed formal charges against her in November 2019.
Howard asked Lewis to explain the delay between the crash and arrest dates. "I just don't understand why the Florida Highway Patrol took 14 months to make an arrest in this case," the judge said.
Lewis said it took FHP that much time to complete its traffic-homicide investigation, and he was in regular contact with the agency for status updates.
Also in court on Tuesday:
■ Howard scheduled

Joseph Steven Napolitano Jr.'s trial for the week of May 10, when the Citrus Springs 31-year-old will defend against accusations he forced a woman to have sex with him in March while he threatened her and an 8-week-old infant with a firearm.
Napolitano will also appear April 26 in court for a final pretrial hearing, Howard ordered.
Napolitano faces charges of sexual battery involving physical force and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.
■ Howard scheduled another court date of March 9 for John Warner, giving his attorney, Pamela Bauman, time to review the child pornography prosecutors accused Warner of having.
Warner, an Inverness 58-year-old, faces 10 counts of possessing 10 or more images of child pornography.
He was arrested in August after a February tip from the National Center of Missing and Exploited Children tipped the Citrus County Sheriff's Office off about the transfer of illicit images through a local email account.
Deputies searched Warner's computer, finding an alleged 234 files containing child pornography

associated with the email account they linked to Warner.
Warner, in his interview with sheriff's office detectives, admitted to owning the email account.
■ Attorney Bill Ezzell asked Howard for a two-month continuance so he can meet with client Wayne Alan Adams in person to go over an offer from prosecutors to resolve the Crystal River 57-year-old's child-pornography case.
Ezzell, who was hired in November to represent Adams, said he also needs time to review "a lot of electronic evidence."
Howard scheduled Adams' next court date for March 9.
Adams is charged with 13 counts of possessing 10 or more images of child pornography. He was arrested in October after sheriff's office investigators found illicit content on electronic devices inside his home.
■ Howard scheduled a another court date of March 9 for Ashlee Nicole Graham, the Dunnellon 20-year-old accused of texting nude photographs of herself to a teenager and forcing the boy to touch her inappropriately in August.
Graham's recently-hired

attorney, Robert Christensen, told the judge he's still obtaining discovery evidence from Assistant State Attorney Debra Munchel, and is already having discussions with the prosecutor on how to resolve the case.

"We're going to get things moving quickly," he said.
Graham, who was arrested in August, is charged with three counts of sending harmful material to a minor; two counts of lewd and lascivious

molestation and one count of soliciting a child for sexual activity.

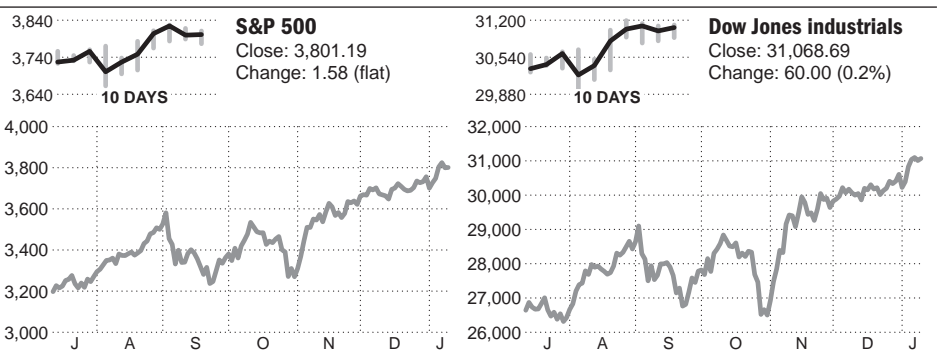

“The President of the United States summoned this mob, assembled the mob, and lit the flame of this attack,” said Cheney in a statement. “There has never been a greater betrayal by a President of the United States of his office and his oath to the Constitution.”

Reps. John Katko of New York, a former federal prosecutor, and Adam Kinzinger of Illinois, an Air Force veteran, said they, too, would vote to impeach.

As lawmakers reconvened at the Capitol for the first time since the bloody siege, they were also bracing for more violence ahead of Democratic President-elect Joe Biden's inauguration, Jan. 20.

“All of us have to do some soul searching,” said Democratic Rep. Jamie Raskin of Maryland, imploring other Republicans to join.

Trump, meanwhile, warned the lawmakers off impeachment and suggested it was the drive to oust him that was dividing the country.

“To continue on this path, I think it's causing tremendous danger to our country, and it's causing tremendous anger,” Trump said.

In his first remarks to reporters since last week's

violence, the outgoing president offered no condolences for those dead or injured, only saying, “I want no violence.”

Impeachment ahead, the House was first pressing Pence and the Cabinet to remove Trump more quickly and surely, warning he is a threat to democracy in the few remaining days of his presidency.

The House was expected to approve a resolution calling on Pence and the Cabinet to invoke the 25th Amendment to the Constitution to declare the president unable to serve. Pence, who had a “good meeting” with Trump on Monday, their first since the vice president was among those sheltering from the attack, was not expected to do so.

After that, the House would move swiftly to impeachment on Wednesday.

Trump faces a single charge — “incitement of insurrection” — in the impeachment resolution after the most serious and deadly domestic incursion at the Capitol in the nation's history.

RUINOUS PATH

Education dollars should stay in public schools

Despite his preference for the private sector in most matters, Thomas Jefferson viewed the education of our children as a public good to be included in the “articles of public care.” John Adams, another proponent of public schools, urged that they be “not founded by a charitable individual, but maintained at the expense of the people themselves.”

Contrary to the viewpoint of these founding fathers of our nation, Florida's Republican-dominated state government has pushed a growing expansion of private school choice as an alternative to public schools for over the past two decades.

Florida launched its first tax-credit school choice program in 1999 with the John M. McKay Scholarships for Students with Disabilities, followed by the Florida Tax Credit Scholarship Program and Hope Scholarship Program followed in 2001 and 2018.

Given that these programs are funded by tax credits in exchange for donations to scholarship funding organizations, the diversion of tax revenue impacts the funding of our public schools, especially in light of Tallahassee's growing list of unfunded state mandates and the pandemic's impact on state revenue.

Compounding the fiscal challenge of the state's public schools is Florida's Empowerment Scholarship Program. Enacted in 2019 to alleviate the Florida Tax Credit Scholarship Program waitlist, it has expanded school choice options for thousands of other low- and middle-income residents by siphoning public education dollars from scarce public school funds.

Because voucher-using families participating in the Empowerment Scholarship Program use public education dollars that would

otherwise go to Florida's public schools, one would think that state government officials would be highly concerned about the quality of the chosen private schools.

Wrong!

Despite Florida's continuing push toward investing billions on tax-funded school choice vouchers to pay private school tuition for an ever-widening eligibility of K-12 students in the coming years, private schools are inexplicably free of any state requirements.

Under current Florida law, private schools are permitted to establish their own system of school accountability, grading, reporting and evaluating that does not have to meet the standards for public schools.

To right this wrong, Sen. Linda Stewart, D-Orlando, has filed Senate Bill 254 that would mandate all private schools meet the same state requirements as public schools for school construction, academic standards, administering state exams, receiving state grades and requiring at least 20 minutes of recess for primary schools.

While most would agree that this is the common-sense thing to do in the interest of responsible stewardship of public education dollars, similar bills filed by Sen. Stewart in 2019 and 2020 failed to advance out of committee.

Diverting tax revenue and siphoning education funds from our public schools, which are charged with the responsibility of providing free education for every child, is a ruinous path that benefits unaccountable private schools while further weakening our underfunded public schools.

With nearly three-quarters of parents rating their own child's public school highly, one has to wonder why the powers that be in Tallahassee continue to choose this ruinous path.

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Mike Pompeo has canceled what would have been his final official trip abroad as concerns grow over potential violence at next week's presidential inauguration, the State Department said Tuesday.

Less than 18 hours after announcing that Pompeo would be traveling to Brussels this week to close out his tenure as America's top diplomat, the department said it had pulled down all senior-level overseas travel, including the secretary's. Pompeo was to have met with NATO chief Jens Stoltenberg and Belgium's foreign minister while in Brussels. Initial plans for a stop in Luxembourg had been already been scrapped due to the coronavirus pandemic, officials said.

Spokeswoman Morgan Ortogus said the decision had been made to assist in the transition to the incoming Biden administration, which will assume office on Jan. 20.

Pompeo, who was criticized for not immediately recognizing Biden's victory over Trump in November's election, met last week with his designated successor, Antony Blinken, in what a State Department official described as a cordial meeting.

Stocks notch gains on Wall Street; Treasury yields climb

Wall Street capped a wobbly day of trading Tuesday with modest gains, while Treasury yields extended their recent rally.

The S&P 500 inched up less than 0.1% after flipping between small gains and losses for much of the day. About 62% of companies in the index rose, with energy sector stocks notching the biggest gain as crude oil prices rose. Companies that rely on consumer spending also helped lift the market, outweighing declines in health care, communications and technology stocks.

Banks and other financial companies added to recent gains as Treasury yields marched higher for the sixth straight day amid expectations that the economy will pull out of its slump after a powerful recovery sweeps the globe later this year. Bond yields can influence interest rates on mortgages and other consumer loans, boosting bank revenue.

CDC: Test air flights

US to require all arriving passengers to get COVID-19 test

NEW YORK — Anyone flying to the U.S. will soon need to show proof of a negative test for COVID-19, health officials announced Tuesday.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention requirement expands on a similar one announced late last month for passengers coming from the United Kingdom.

COVID is already widespread in the U.S., with more than 22 million cases reported to date, including more than 375,000 deaths. The new measures are designed to try to prevent travelers from bringing in newer forms of the virus that scientists say can spread more easily.

The CDC order is to take effect in about two weeks, on Jan. 26.

It requires air

passengers to get a COVID-19 test within three days before their flight departs to the U.S., and to provide written proof of the test result to the airline.

Travelers can also provide documentation that they had the infection in the past and recovered.

Airlines are ordered to stop passengers from boarding if they don't have proof of a negative test or

a prior infection.

"Testing does not eliminate all risk," CDC Director Robert R. Redfield said in a statement. "But when combined with a period of staying at home and everyday precautions like wearing masks and social distancing, it can make travel safer, healthier, and more responsible by reducing spread on planes, in airports, and at destinations."

Law enforcement warned by FBI about chances for 'war'

WASHINGTON — The FBI warned law enforcement agencies ahead of last week's breach of the U.S. Capitol about the potential for extremist-driven violence and prosecutors are now weighing sedition charges against at least some of the Trump loyalists who stormed the building, U.S. officials said Tuesday.

The statements by FBI and Justice Department officials were intended as both a defense of federal law enforcement preparations before the deadly riot and a warning to participants that they are still subject to arrest and felony charges even if they have left Washington.

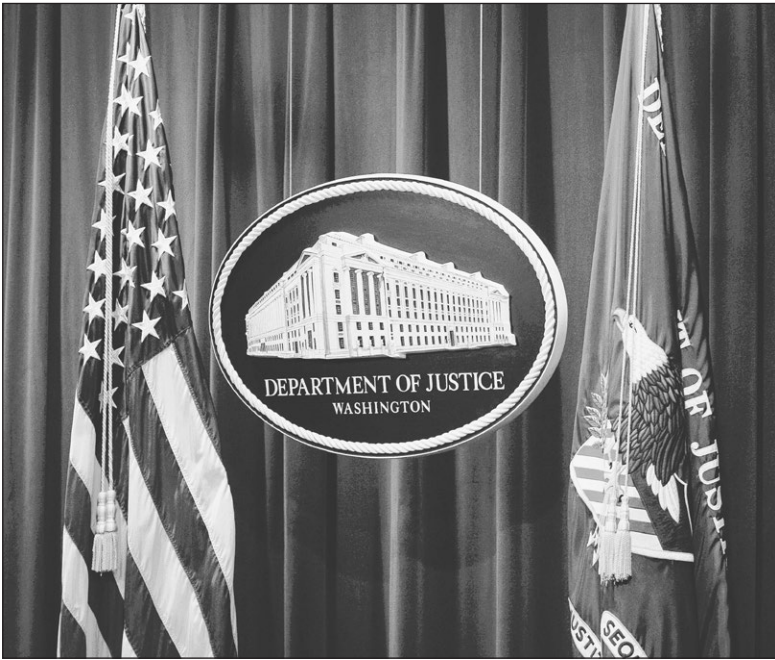
Misdemeanor counts against some of the dozens arrested so far may still be upgraded to sedition charges that are punishable by up to 20 years in prison and that carry the grave accusation of inciting an effort to overthrow the government, said acting U.S. Attorney Michael Sherwin in Washington.

"This is only the beginning," he said.

Even for those who have left Washington, "agents from our local field offices will be knocking on your door," said Steven D'Antuono, the assistant director in charge of the FBI's Washington field office in highlighting the nationwide effort to track down participants in the rioting.

The revelations contradict earlier pronouncements from law enforcement leaders about the potential for danger last week. Many, including the former Capitol police chief, said they were unaware of serious concerns and had prepared only for a free speech protest. Capitol police and others didn't immediately respond to questions about the discrepancy.

The press conference came hours after the Washington Post reported on the existence of a Jan. 5 report from the FBI's field office in Norfolk, Virginia, that forecast, in detail, the chances for "war" in Washington the following day. The existence of such a stark warning appeared to contradict the FBI's earlier assertions that it had no specific intelligence that violence could arise.

D'Antuono defended the handling of the information, saying it was shared in 40 minutes with other law enforcement agencies.

Even without intelligence from law enforcement, there had been ample warning about pro-Trump demonstrations in Washington. But U.S. Capitol Police did not bolster staffing and made no preparations for the possibility that the planned protests could escalate into massive, violent riots, according to several people briefed on the law enforcement response. Officials turned down help offered by the Pentagon three days before the riot.

When backup was finally requested, it took more than two hours for troops to mobilize near the Capitol. By then the mob had raged inside for more than four hours.

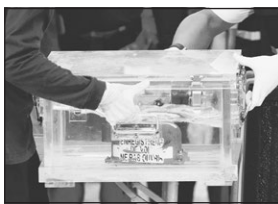
Once the mob began to move on the Capitol, a police lieutenant issued an order not to use deadly force, which explains why officers outside the building did not draw their weapons as the crowd closed in. Officers are sometimes ordered to keep their weapons holstered to avoid escalating a situation if superiors believe doing so could lead to a stampede or a shootout.

In this instance, it also left officers with little ability to resist the mob. In one video from the scene, an officer puts up his fists to try to push back a crowd pinning him and his colleagues against a door. The crowd jeers, "You are not American!" and one man tries to prod him with the tip of an American flag.

Meanwhile, President Donald Trump on Tuesday took no responsibility for the violent insurrection at the Capitol. He said that his remarks moments before his supporters marched to the Capitol were "totally appropriate." He made the comments during his first appearance in public since the Capitol siege, which came as lawmakers were tallying Electoral College votes affirming President-elect Joe Biden's victory.

The rampage through the halls of Congress sent lawmakers of both parties and Trump's own vice president into hiding, as crowds called for Mike Pence's lynching for his role overseeing the vote count. The scene also undermined the hallmark of the republic — the peaceful transition of power. At least five people died, including one Capitol Police officer.

Divers recover data recorder

JAKARTA, Indonesia — Indonesian navy divers searching the ocean floor on Tuesday recovered the flight data recorder from a Sriwijaya Air jet that crashed into the Java Sea with 62 people on board.

The device is expected to help investigators determine what caused the Boeing 737-500 to nosedive into the ocean in heavy rain shortly after taking off from Jakarta on Saturday.

The 26-year-old jet had been out of service for almost nine months because of flight cutbacks caused by the coronavirus pandemic, officials said. It resumed commercial flights last month.

More than 3,600 rescue personnel, 13 helicopters, 54 large ships and 20 small boats are searching the area just north of Jakarta where Flight 182 crashed and have found parts of the plane and human remains in the water at a depth of 75 feet.

So far, the searchers have sent 74 body bags containing human remains to police identification experts who on Monday said they had identified their first victim, 29-year-old flight attendant Okky Bisma.

In 2018, a Boeing 737 MAX 8 jet operated by Lion Air crashed, killing 189 people. An automated flight-control system played a role in that crash, but the Sriwijaya Air jet did not have that system on board.

Africa secures vaccine doses

NAIROBI, Kenya — The African Union has secured close to 300 million COVID-19 vaccine doses in the largest such agreement yet for Africa, a continental official said Tuesday.

Nicaise Ndembi, senior science adviser for the Africa Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, told The Associated Press in an interview that the current AU chair, South African President Cyril Ramaphosa, is expected to announce the news on Wednesday.

The 300 million doses are being secured independently of the global COVAX effort aimed at distributing COVID-19 vaccines to lower-income countries, Ndembi said.

India suspends new farm laws

NEW DELHI — India's top court on Tuesday temporarily put on hold the implementation of agricultural reform laws and ordered the creation of an independent committee of experts to negotiate with farmers who have been protesting against the legislation.

The Supreme Court's ruling came a day after it heard petitions filed by the farmers challenging the legislation. It said the laws were passed without enough consultation, and that it was disappointed with the way talks were proceeding between representatives of the government and farmers.

Ben & Jerry's launches frozen desserts for pets

Think your dog deserves dessert? So does Ben & Jerry's.

The venerable Vermont ice cream company said Monday it's introducing a line of frozen dog treats, its first foray into the lucrative pet food market. Doggie Desserts, sold in 4-ounce cups, go on sale in U.S. groceries and pet stores later this month.

The treats come in two flavors: pumpkin with cookies and peanut butter with pretzels. Both are made with a base of sunflower butter. They're made from the same ingredients Ben & Jerry's uses in its non-dairy human desserts.

Ben & Jerry's is the latest food company to pivot to pets, sensing opportunity as more Americans acquire furry friends. The number of U.S. households with pets rose 6.5% to 84.9 million between 2015 and 2020, according to the American Pet

Products Association, a trade group.

General Mills, which makes Cheerios and Haagen-Dazs ice cream, bought the Blue Buffalo pet food brand in 2018. Jelly maker J.M. Smucker Co. bought Big Heart Pet Brands — which makes Meow Mix and Milk Bone — in 2015. Three years later, Smucker acquired Ainsworth Pet Nutrition, which makes Nutrish brand pet food. And in April, Nestle bought British natural pet food brand Lily's Kitchen. Nestle has owned the Purina brand since 2001.

Spending on dog treats has ballooned, jumping 44% to \$5.5 billion between 2015 and 2020, according to Euromonitor, a data firm. Millennials in particular spend lavishly on their pets and look for pet products with human-grade ingredients, Ben & Jerry's said.

Lindsay Bumps, a global marketing specialist with Ben & Jerry's, said the company had been eyeing the

exponential growth in pet spending and started developing its dog treats early last year. The company consulted with a veterinary nutritionist, regulatory consultants and others to make sure the treats are safe and easy to digest, said Bumps, who is also a certified veterinary technician.

As with any treat, owners should go slow with the introduction, offering a spoonful at a time, Bumps said. She suggested putting the dessert in a bowl so dogs have an easier time navigating it. Bumps' 9-year-old French bulldog, Spock, is a big fan of the peanut butter flavor.

The treats — \$2.99 per cup or \$4.99 for four — will be placed near the popsicles in grocery store frozen food aisles, a few doors down from Ben & Jerry's ice cream.

"This is an opportunity for people to treat their dogs as they're treating themselves when they grab a pint off the shelf," she said.

ONE GOOD THING Midnight Cafeteria feeds Taipei's stray cats

TAIPEI, Taiwan — Pipi already dines well.

The plump, black-and-white street cat lives near a night market in a neighborhood of Taiwan's capital where volunteers have fed and taken care of strays for years. But Pipi and his fellow street cats got an upgrade of their dining situation recently with the "Midnight Cafeteria" project.

Launched in September, the "cafeteria" is actually 45 small wooden houses painted by Taiwanese artists and scattered across Taipei. The idea is to give the cats a place to rest while making feeding them less messy.

It began in math teacher Hung Pei-ling's neighborhood, where about 20 neighbors are helping stray cats in addition to their full-time jobs.

"We want to push forward this philosophy that you don't have to be part of a very top-level association or something that

takes up all of your time," she said. "You can just be one person doing something a little bit at a time, a little bit, and taken all together, you can achieve a lot."

Hung began volunteering after a good friend rescued and raised a stray cat. For five years, she has worked with other cat lovers in the neighborhood who buy the cats food, help clean the houses and coordinate with residents who may have complaints.

Hung also helps capture injured cats and cats that need spaying, takes them to get veterinary attention and then returns them to their haunts.

The wooden houses in Hung's neighborhood were hand-painted by a local artist Stefano Mistesti and feature smiling felines as well as street food that is loved in Taiwan such as stinky tofu. In addition to food bowls, one houses basic medicine for the cats. Neighbors have brought small cushions as well as decorated cardboard boxes to

add to the houses.

Started by Chen Chen-yi, a researcher at the Taiwan Animal Equality Association, the cat houses help ensure stray cats get fed well and local residents do not have to deal with a mess. They also raise awareness about the spaying program and the condition of stray cats.

"In Taiwan there are a lot of people who feed strays, but often they leave a mess, and then the public becomes annoyed by it and they become annoyed with strays as well," he said.

The cat houses were a multiteam effort. Chen applied for a grant from the Taipei city government to fund the project, and then connected with a local ward leader as well as volunteers to carry it out.

On a recent Sunday, Pipi and two of his friends were enjoying attention from Hung and another volunteer who came to feed them. After eating at the cafeteria, they settled in for a lazy morning nap.

NHL season that will be like '56 playoff games'

Shortened slate begins tonight

The NHL has started seasons of fewer than 82 games in January and played into the summer to award the Stanley Cup.

Just not like this.

When the puck drops on the regular season in five rinks today, it will be the start of a 56-game sprint to the playoffs with all divisional play until the semifinals. That will ramp up the rivalries, reduce travel during the pandemic and make this a once-in-a-lifetime chase for a title.

"We're going to see a 56-game season, but it'll be 56 playoff games," veteran New York Islanders general manager Lou Lamoriello said. "It's exciting. I think the divisions the way they're in front of us, it'll be great for the fans and I think the players will enjoy it, also, so I think the rivalries will just raise to a level we haven't seen in a long, long time."

If hockey can navigate the perils of the virus like other sports. Already three teams have been affected, with Dallas unable to start the season on time.

Fans won't be able to watch in person at the beginning except in a handful of U.S. Sun Belt markets. Tampa Bay on Saturday reversed course on beginning the season with a limited capacity of 3,800 in the arena that's also hosting the NBA's Toronto Raptors, citing the recent rise of COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations in the area.

Teams will play every division rival at least eight times, often consecutively like a baseball-style schedule.

That includes a never-before-seen all-Canadian North Division because of border restrictions. Four teams from each of the four divisions make the playoffs and play it out until there are four left in contention for the Cup by the start of summer.

"It's going to be a wacky year playing teams back-to-backs and playing the same team kind of repetitively,"

Washington defenseman John Carlson said. "It's going to be different than anything we've dealt with."

Far different than completing the 2019-20 season in quarantined bubbles in Canada with Tampa Bay winning it all. Being out in the world means coaches in masks behind the bench, no venturing outside the hotel and arena on the road, and six months of pure hockey in the hopes of

avoiding the kind of teamwide outbreaks that have already hit the Stars and have others on edge.

"You don't want to bring the virus into the locker room, and if it is, you want to do your job of eliminating it as soon as possible," St. Louis forward Brayden Schenn said. "I think the team that at the

Masters plans for a limited number of spectators

Some volume is returning to the Masters, just maybe not the head-turning roars.

Augusta National Chairman Fred Ridley said Tuesday the club intends to allow a limited number of spectators for the Masters on April 8-11, provided it can be done safely, given the coronavirus pandemic.

In other areas, the Masters in April will be a lot like the last one in November. Ridley said it will be conducted with similar health and safety standards. Those standards last fall included mandatory COVID-19 testing and masks being worn.

Ridley said holding the Masters with only essential personnel made the club confident in

its ability to stage a major championship with limited fans.

“Nothing is, or will be, more important than the well-being of all involved,” Ridley said. “While we are disappointed that we will be unable to accommodate a full complement of patrons this year, we will continue our efforts to ensure that all who purchased tickets from Augusta National will have access in 2022, provided conditions improve.”

The Masters was played Nov. 12-15 — the first time in the autumn since it began in 1934 — because of the pandemic that forced golf to reconfigure its major championship season and led to the cancellation of the British Open.

Ridley did not indicate how

many spectators will be allowed. The Masters does not publicize how many tickets it sells or how many people typically are on the grounds. It has been estimated at roughly 40,000, though it’s far easier to judge the attendance in volume decibels.

The roars are a big part of what makes the Masters, and they were missing in November when Dustin Johnson set the scoring record at 20-under 268 to win by five shots for his first green jacket.

The club is so confident that Ridley also said the Augusta National Women’s Amateur, which was canceled last year after its debut in 2019, and the Drive, Chip and Putt National Finals, will be held with a small number of spectators.

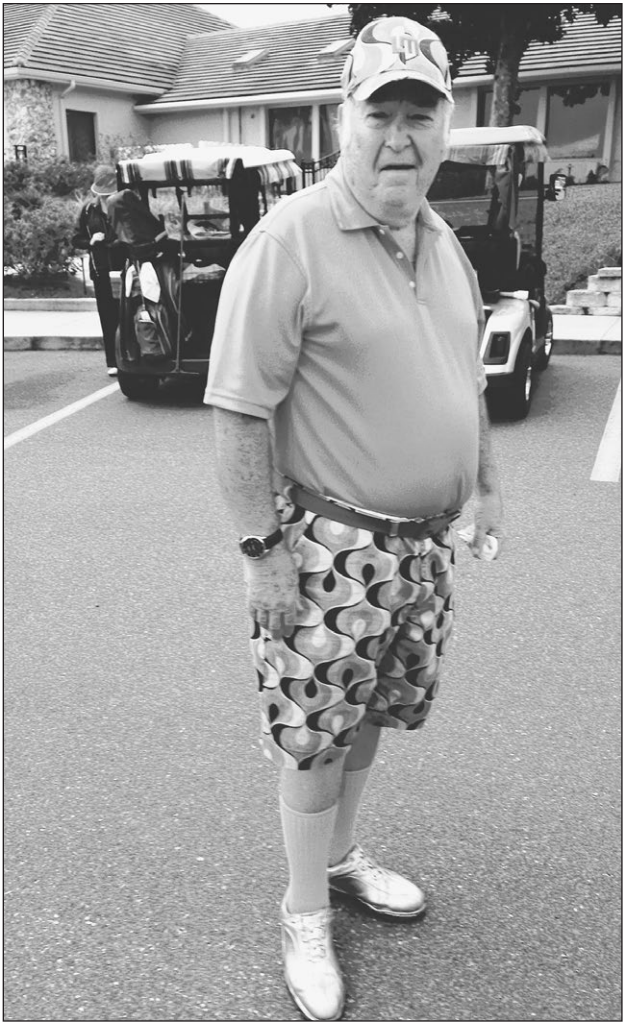

Alabama routs Ohio State

Sixth national title in past 12 years

MIAMI GARDENS — The celebration was at once familiar and unique. The confetti cannons sent a crimson and white shower into the air and Alabama players ran to the sideline to grab their championship hats and T-shirts.

It's a rite of passage if you have played for the Crimson Tide under coach Nick Saban.

This time, though, the band playing the fight song was a piped-in recording, and when "Sweet Home Alabama" blared, only a few thousand Tide fans were still in the stadium to sing along.

The final game of a college football season in a pandemic, a season that was uncertain to be played in the summer and filled with disruptions in the fall, ended in the most predictable fashion: Alabama as national champion for the sixth time in the last 12 years under Saban.

DeVonta Smith was uncoverable, Najee Harris unstoppable and Mac Jones impeccable as the top-ranked Tide won the College Football Playoff national championship game 52-24 against No. 3 Ohio State on Monday night. They finished the year 13-0 — a full season when many wondered if it would be possible to play any.

"I think we're the best team to ever play," Jones said.

For Saban, it was career title No. 7 overall, breaking a tie with Alabama great Paul "Bear" Bryant for the most by a major college coach.

"To me this is the ultimate team," Saban said. "There is more togetherness on this team than on almost any team we've ever had. They've had to overcome and to persevere so much through this season, and they have done it magnificently."

Ohio State (7-1) just couldn't keep up. Justin Fields, playing what might be his last game before heading to

the NFL, passed for 194 yards and a touchdown. Whether Fields was 100% after taking a brutal hit to the side during his brilliant semifinal performance against Clemson was hard to know for sure.

"I was able to be out there," was all the junior quarterback would say.

On the Buckeyes' first drive, they lost star running back Trey Sermon to an injury, and in a game they needed to be running at top speed, facing one of great offenses in recent history, they sputtered too much. Ohio State has never allowed more points in a bowl game.

"I think there's a feeling of, if you don't score you're going to get behind and then the pressure mounts," Buckeyes coach Ryan Day said of facing the Tide's prolific offense.

Only about 15,000 fans were at

Hard Rock Stadium, capacity 65,326, to see the last magnificent performance of Smith's college career. The Heisman Trophy winner had 12 catches for 215 yards and three touchdowns, all in the first half.

"Heaven knows what he would have done if he played the whole game," Saban said.

Jones, who finished third in the Heisman voting, was 36 for 45 for a CFP championship-record 464 yards and five touchdowns. In one of maybe the most overlooked seasons a quarterback has ever played, Jones set a single-season record for passer efficiency rating at 203.

Harris, who was fifth in the Heisman race, had 158 yards from scrimmage on 29 touches, scoring three times to give him an SEC record 30 touchdowns this season.

Perfect 'Bama finishes No. 1

MIAMI GARDENS — Alabama finished the season No. 1 in the AP Top 25 for the 12th time, extending its record by completing the program's first perfect season since 2009.

The Crimson Tide were a unanimous No. 1 in the final poll, getting 61 first-place votes, after beating Ohio State 52-24 in the College Football Playoff championship game Monday night.

Alabama was the preseason No. 3, but when it started playing this strange season amid a pandemic in late September it moved up to No. 2. The Tide jumped to No. 1 in early November and finished as major college football's only undefeated team.

The Buckeyes were second, followed by Clemson at No. 3. Texas A&M was fourth, finally passing Notre Dame for the Aggies' best finish in the AP poll since they won the national title in 1939. The Fighting Irish made the playoff but slipped to No. 5 after losing to Alabama in the semifinals.

Big 12 champion Oklahoma finished No. 6, Georgia seventh and Cincinnati was eighth.

Iowa State was No. 9, its best final ranking and only the third time the Cyclones have finished the season ranked. Northwestern finished 10th, the Wildcats' best final showing since they went to the Rose Bowl in 1995 and were eighth in the last poll.

The Big 12 finished with a perfect record in five bowl games. Oklahoma and Iowa State were joined by No. 19 Texas and No. 20 Oklahoma State in the final rankings from that conference.

The ACC's postseason was a dud at 0-6. Clemson, Notre Dame, No. 18 North Carolina and No. 22 Miami gave the ACC four ranked teams.

Cincinnati, the American Athletic Conference champ, was one of eight non-Power Five teams to land in the Top 25.

Independent BYU finished No. 11, the Cougars' best final ranking since they finished the 1995 season fifth.

Sun Belt rivals Coastal Carolina and Louisiana-Lafayette were Nos. 14 and 15, respectively. That conference had never finished with two ranked teams. Liberty, another independent, was 17th.

Rounding out the bottom of the poll were No. 23 Ball State, the Mid-American Conference champ, No. 24 San Jose State, the champ of the Mountain West, and No. 25 Buffalo, another MAC school.

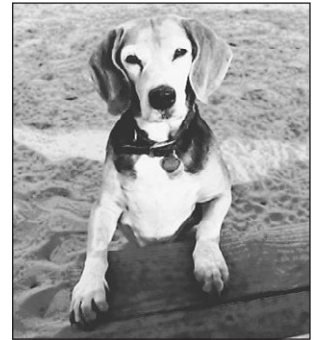

■ Pick up an intake and interview sheet and an information sheet at the time you make the appointment.

■ Complete intake and interview sheet to the best of your ability before your appointment.

■ Come on-time for your appointment — not more than 10 minutes early.

■ Bring your Picture ID and Social Security cards for all people on the return.

■ Tax-Aide will accept your information and will provide you with an ID number that can be used for security when we contact you.

■ Leave the site.

■ A Tax-Aide preparer will contact you for interview on the phone, providing you with the ID number assigned.

■ Tax-Aide will prepare your return.

■ The Tax-Aide quality review person will contact you for an interview, providing you with the ID number assigned.

■ Tax-Aide will complete your return.

■ Return to same site the following week at the same time.

■ Review return and sign (Your spouse must be there if it is a joint return).

■ Tax-Aide will transmit your return as normal. As in other years, there are limits on the tax situations that we can assist with. More information on our scope of service are available on the information sheet available at the library sites.

Appointments will be limited due to reduced volunteer staffing and more complicated procedures. Please be considerate of others. Do not make more than one appointment per person.

Appointments can be made at one of the five Citrus County Libraries (Central Ridge, Coastal Region, Floral City, Homosassa and Lakes Region) during normal operating hours. The libraries began making appointments on Jan. 6. Specific information on sites and operating dates and times are available at the libraries.

Wednesday, Jan. 20, 2021, will be an exciting day in Washington, D.C., and around the country. On that day, our country officially welcomes a new president, Joseph R. Biden Jr., and vice president, Kamala Harris.

The U.S. Constitution sets Inauguration Day as Jan. 20. This year’s ceremony will be the 59th inauguration.

The ceremony where the president and vice president are sworn in is called the **inauguration** (in-AUG-yur-AY-shun). It takes place on a specially built platform on the West Front of the U.S. Capitol.

The theme for the Biden/Harris inauguration is “Our Determined Democracy: Forging a More Perfect Union.”

A different look

During most inaugurations, hundreds of thousands of people gather on the Mall in Washington to witness the new president as he or she is sworn in. This year, because of the COVID-19 pandemic, planners are making changes to the ceremony itself and to other traditional events on that day.

For example, after the swearing-in and the **inaugural address**, the new president and first lady typically escort the former president and first lady to Marine One, the president’s helicopter. Then the president

and vice president traditionally go to Statuary Hall in the Capitol building to enjoy lunch with senators, representatives and other government officials.

Following lunch, past presidents have ridden or walked in a parade down Pennsylvania Avenue to the White House.

In the evening, the president, first lady and others usually attend many different parties, known as **inaugural balls**.

Transfer of power

Inaugural planners have a big job this year: trying to keep everyone safe while still celebrating the peaceful **transfer of power** from one president to another.

Until the late 1790s, there were no political parties in the U.S. But in the election of 1800, two parties, the Federalists and the Democratic-Republicans, competed for the presidency. When Thomas Jefferson, a Democratic-Republican, won the office, the Federalists accepted it and did not act against him.

Peacefully transferring power between two different political belief systems became an important feature of our democracy.

The president’s oath

People around the world find inspiration in the inaugural ceremonies of the U.S. president. Usually, U.S. presidents have taken their oath of office in public.

But sometimes, as when a president has died in office, the vice president takes the oath in private.



“I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States.”

The vice president’s oath

“I do solemnly swear that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter.”

Cook’s Corner

Apple Salad With Cubed Cheddar & Pecans

You’ll need:

- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 4 McIntosh apples, cored and cut into 2-inch pieces
- 1 cup cubed sharp cheddar cheese
- juice and zest of 1 lemon
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley



What to do:

Scientists in Los Alamos, New Mexico, have identified lightning “superbolts” that can be 1,000 times brighter and stretch hundreds of miles farther than regular bolts.
