#### **Jeremy Bulloch, Boba** Fett in first 'Star Wars' trilogy, dies

LOS ANGELES — Jeremy Bulloch, the English actor who first donned a helmet, cape and jetpack to play Boba Fett in the original "Star Wars" trilogy, died Thursday.

Bulloch died at a London hospital from health complications after years of living with Parkinson's disease, his agents at Brown, Simcocks & Andrews said in a statement. He was 75.

As the Mandalorian bounty hunter Boba Fett, Bulloch made off with a froze-in-carbonite Han Solo in 1980's "The Empire Strikes Back," then zoomed around the desert of Tatooine in a jet pack in 1983's "Return of the Jedi."

'Today we lost the best bounty hunter in the galaxy," Billy Dee Williams, whose Lando Calrissian appeared in key scenes with Bulloch in the films, said on Twitter.

Mark Hamill tweeted that Bulloch was "the quintessential English gentleman."

"A fine actor, delightful company & so kind to everyone lucky enough to meet or work with him," the Luke Skywalker actor said. "I will deeply miss him & am so grateful to have known him. #RIP\_DearJeremy."

Boba Fett had just a few minutes of screen time, though important ones, between the two movies, and speaks just four lines of dialogue that were performed by another actor. But Boba Fett quickly became a cult favorite and eventually would emerge as one of the most beloved figures in the "Star Wars" galaxy, inspiring characters and plotlines in other "Star Wars" properties, most notably "The

## Nursing homes to begin vaccinations

## CVS, Walgreens to administer shots

**ADRIANA GOMEZ-LICON** Associated Press

MIAMI - Florida Gov. Ron De-Santis and Walgreens' chief medical officer are announcing that Florida nursing homes are among the first in the country where residents will be vaccinated against COVID-19 through a federal government partnership with drugstore chains.

The company said it selected 10 nursing homes in Florida, Ohio and Connecticut to roll out the effort Friday. Next week, Walgreens will ramp up visits to 800 long-term care facilities in 12 states.

The plan is for the pharmacy to eventually visit 35,000 facilities and vaccinate 3 million residents. CVS and other companies are also part of the partnership to deliver shots at nursing homes and assisted living facilities.

DeSantis said the long-term care facilities scheduled for the first day through Walgreens were in Jacksonville. He said he was he was pleased to learn the drugstore chain was set to start ahead of schedule in Florida. Army Gen. Gustave Perna, who is leading Operation Warp Speed, had said earlier this week that the pharmacies would begin administering the shot in more than 1,100 nursing homes next week.

Wall Street capped a solid week of gains on a down note Friday as the wait drags on to see if Congress can reach a deal to send more cash to strugworkers and gling businesses.

The S&P 500 fell 0.4%, a day after it and other major indexes returned to record heights. The decline snapped a three-day winning streak for the benchmark index, but it still notched a 1.3% weekly gain that more than made up its prior week's loss.

Hope that Congress may be nearing a deal to offer more financial support for the economy has helped stocks set more record highs. The S&P clocked its 31st all-time high this year on Thursday. Enthusiasm about vaccines for COVID-

next year, has also fueled traders' optimism.

Friday's selling came on a particularly busy day on Wall Street. Index funds were expected to snap up more than \$80 billion worth of shares in Tesla as they moved to rebalance their holdings for the quarter ahead of the electric car maker's entry into the S&P 500, effective Monday. In addition, Friday was also quadruple witching day, Wall Street-speak for the quarterly expiration of stock options and futures contracts, which forces traders to tie up loose ends in contracts they hold. leading to particularly heavy trading volume.

Some 57% of the companies in the S&P 500 closed lower. Technology stocks, banks and companies that rely on consumer spending accounted for a big 19, which investors hope slice of the decline. They

will get the economy back outweighed gains by on the road to normalcy household goods makers and materials stocks, among others.

Much of the market's focus recently has been on Capitol Hill, where momentum has kicked back up for on-and-off-again talks for financial aid for the economy. Negotiations on nearly \$1 trillion in relief had seemed to be on the brink of success, but a final agreement has yet to be sealed. The package could include benefits for laid-off workers and cash payments sent to most Americans.

Economists and investors say the need for such action is urgent, as the worsening pandemic tightens its chokehold on the economy. Reports this week showed that more workers are applying for jobless benefits and that sales for retailers slumped by more last month than economists expected.

# **Calif. foresees crisis**

## State models predict overload of virus cases

**BRIAN MELLEY** Associated Press

LOS ANGELES When Gov. Gavin Newsom provided a dire view of California's outof-control surge of coronavirus cases and hospitalizations this week, he referred to projection models of future death and misery that he said were be-coming "alarmingly" more accurate.

If true, then over the next four weeks the state's hospitals could be overflowing with 75,000 patients — about five times the current level — and an average of 400 people will die every day.

Hospitals were on the brink of being overrun with nearly 15,000 coronavirus patients when Newsom made the announcement Tuesday. The hospitalization projection is based on cases continuing to increase at the current rate of infection without people taking additional precautions to prevent spreading the virus.

At that trajectory, it doesn't take long before the state is in a very bad place, said Marm Kilpatrick, an infectious disease expert at the University of California. Santa Cruz.

"One thing that's worrisome is that for quite a while in California we've had exponential growth in hospitalizations and cases, despite recent restrictions," Kilpatrick said. "That's kind of terrifying.'

#### Pence, wife, surgeon general get vaccines

WASHINGTON - Vice President Mike Pence became the highest ranking U.S. official to receive the first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine on Friday in a live-television event aimed at reassuring Americans the shot is safe. He celebrated the milestone as "a medical miracle" that could eventually contain the raging pandemic.

Conspicuously missing from the victory lap: President Donald Trump, who has remained largely out of sight five days into the largest vaccination campaign in the nation's history.

Pence, meanwhile, has taken an increasingly visible role in highlighting the safety and efficacy of the shots, including touring a vaccine production facility this week. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi also received a COVID-19 vaccine Friday, and Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell has said he will get vaccinated in the next few days. Presidentelect Joe Biden and his wife will be getting the vaccine on Monday, while Vice Presidentelect Kamala Harris and her husband are set to receive it the week after next

## **Report:** Protests overwhelmed NYPD

NEW YORK - The New York Police Department was caught off guard by the size of the spring protests after the killing of George Floyd and resorted to aggressive disorder control methods that stoked tensions and stifled free speech, the city's inspector general said in a report released Friday.

The Department of Investigation report followed a six-month probe that focused on the NYPD's institutional planning and response to the May and June protests after Floyd's killing by police in Minneapolis, rather than on the actions of individual officers.

It criticized tactics that included trapping demonstrators with a technique called kettling, making mass arrests, using pepper spray and batons, and detaining protesters for hours. Too few officers were deployed early in the demonstrations, the report said.

#### **Changes aim to remedy** segregation in NYC schools

NEW YORK - New York City is changing its admission system for hundreds of middle and high schools, officials said Friday in announcing one of the most significant steps the nation's largest school system has taken in years to address racial segregation.

Mayor Bill de Blasio said the city is suspending academic merit-based screening for its selective middle schools for at least a year, partly because the coronavirus pandemic has scrambled test, attendance and grading data that the schools have used to grant admission to top-performing elementary school kids.

It wouldn't be fair for schools to rely on two-year-old data about children so young, Schools Chancellor Richard Carranza said. Instead, a lottery would be used when schools have more applicants than available seats.

"It's time to start using every tool at our disposal to address inequality," said de Blasio, a Democrat. "The status quo in New York City public schools cannot continue."

#### **Freed Nigerian** schoolbovs welcomed home

KATSINA, Nigeria -Bleary, barefoot, apparently numbed by a week of captivity, more than 300 Nigerian schoolboys, freed after being kidnapped in an attack on their school, were welcomed by the governor of Katsina state and Nigeria's president on Friday.

Reunions with their parents began late in the day.

"Since this incident happened I have not been able to sleep, but now I can sleep," said Salisu Kankara, a parent of one of the schoolboys who was released.

The relatively quick release of the more than 330 boys took place after a prompt response by the government, which appears to have learned from earlier mass school abductions, especially of the Chibok schoolgirls, that did not have such a happy result.

Nigeria's Boko Haram jihadist rebels claimed responsibility for the abduction, saying they attacked the school because they believe Western education is un-Islamic.

# **Can Gators top Tide?**

No. 1 Alabama heavy favorite vs No. 11 Florida for SEC championship

ATLANTA — Alabama's slump lasted all of one season.

After failing to reach either the Southeastern Conference championship game or the College Football Playoff a year ago — what qualifies as a subpar season in Tuscaloosa — the Crimson Tide is back on track to claim another national title.

Nick Saban's top-ranked team (10-0, No. 1 CFP) has successfully navigated — dominated, actually - an SEC-only gauntlet of a regular season brought on by the coronavirus pandemic.

The Tide had won every game by at least 15 points. Its average margin of victory is a whopping 32.7 points.

Now, it's on to the league title game in Atlanta as a heavy favorite Saturday night against No. 11 Florida (8-2, No. 7 CFP), which likely ruined its hopes of reaching the four-team playoff with a shocking home loss last weekend to LSU.

'It's been a very disruptive year from the whole COVID standpoint," said Saban who was stricken with the virus himself and couldn't coach in an Iron Bowl victory over rival Auburn. "But our players have done a good job of handling that, shown a lot of maturity.'

Saban has built what is very likely the most dominant dynasty in college football history over his 14 years at Alabama.

Six SEC titles. Five national championships.

At age 69, he shows no signs of slowing down. Just this week, Alabama landed what appears to be the top-ranked recruiting class in the country for 2021.

"It's all part of the culture that we try to create," Saban said. "When people come here, that's the expectation that they have. That's what they buy into."

In his third year at Florida, coach Dan Mullen led the Gators to the SEC title game for the first time since 2016 behind the dynamic passing of Kyle Trask, who has thrown for 40 touchdowns in the shortened season -10 more than anyone else in the country.

But Florida's hopes of reaching the national playoff likely ended with a shoe-throwing, 37-34 loss to LSU.

No two-loss team has reached the playoff since it began in 2014.

Mullen tried to sound a confident tone for the Gators, who were a 17-point underdog to the Crimson Tide.

## Clemson-Notre Dame meet for ACC title

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — The stage is set for a marquee Top 25 showdown in the Atlantic Coast Conference title game this weekend.

Everyone watching will be eager to see if Notre Dame can upend Clemson again now that the Tigers have starting quarterback Trevor Lawrence back in the lineup.

The Fighting Irish beat then top-ranked Clemson in a thrilling 47-40 double-overtime shootout earlier this season. But Lawrence was sidelined because of COVID-19, and spent the game watching from the sideline in a mask.

But the projected No. 1 pick in the 2021 NFL draft will be front and center in Saturday's highly anticipated rematch.

"He's a proven winner," said Notre Dame defensive end Daelin Hayes. "He's played in a lot of big games. That calm, that cool. ... You can't put a price on that experience.'

Maybe not a price, but with him in the lineup, fourth-ranked Clemson (9-1, 8-1 ACC, No. 3 CFP) is a 10 1/2-point favorite to beat No. 2 Notre Dame (10-0, 9-0, No. 2 CFP) in the Atlantic Coast Conference championship and earn its sixth consecutive berth in the College Football Playoff.

Hayes has seen what Lawrence can do firsthand, remembering well how the long-haired QB led Clemson to a 30-3 win over the Irish in the Sugar Bowl national championship.

# Ramsey, No. 15 Wildcats try to end No. 3 Buckeyes' title run

INDIANAPOLIS — Northwestern quarterback Peyton Ramsey grew up around the Ohio State mystique, the son of a high school football coach in Cincinnati.

As others in the football-crazed state gathered round television sets to watch their beloved Buckeyes each weekend, Ramsey was never much of a fan. Still isn't.

So on Saturday, the quarterback for No. 15 Northwestern will try to cap his college career by knocking No. 3 Ohio State off its Big Ten perch - and perhaps out of the playoff.

"I was a Notre Dame fan growing up, but I was a Big Ten fan," Ramsey said. "This will be my fifth time playing against them, it's always been exciting. It's always been fun to go out and compete against the big boys.'

Even if the first four tries didn't exactly go Ramsey's way, all four while he was suiting up with Indiana. When he transferred to Northwestern after last season, it looked like Ramsey might be finished with the Buckeyes (5-0 Big Ten, No. 4 CFP).

Instead, Ramsey won the starting job and led the Wildcats (7-1) back to their second Big Ten championship game in three years.

The reward: Another date with East Division champion Ohio State.

Two years ago, the Buckeyes pulled away from Northwestern late to secure a 45-24 victory and a school-record tying second straight outright title. Now, they're back looking to make it four in a row and another playoff shot.

Ohio State has hung onto the No. 4 spot in the rankings for weeks and though some have argued the ACC should get two teams in -No. 2 Notre Dame and No. 4 Clemson — Ohio State coach Ryan Day insists his team belongs.

'We've had an amazing amount of challenges, way more than anybody else in the country, in my opinion," Day said. "The minute we went back in inside in November, December the (COVID-19) numbers just jumped through the roof. It's no secret why the Wildcats are back in the title game.

They rely on defense.

Northwestern has allowed a league-low 14.6 points per game, just 4.1 points in the second half and is ranked in top five in conference play against the pass, against the run and overall.

And Big Ten linebacker of the year Paddy Fisher is one of three Wildcats with 200 or more career tackles, making Northwestern the

contenders.

Now in coach Matt Campbell's fifth season, the No. 8 Cyclones (8-2, 8-1 Big 12, No. 6 CFP) play in the school's first-ever conference championship game Saturday. They take on No. 12 Oklahoma (7-2, 6-2, No. 10 CFP), the five-time defending Big 12 champion they beat earlier this season.

"It starts with Campbell and it bleeds to the rest of the guys on his staff. But I believed the plan they had, and the culture that they were trying to create," said Kolar, a fourth-year junior. "It sounded different than a lot of other places."

Kolar is now among many standouts for the Cyclones. Sophomore tailback Breece Hall is the Big 12's top rusher, Brock Purdy is a third-year starter and winningest quarterback in school history, defensive end JaQuan Bailey is the career sacks leader, and junior linebacker Mike Rose averages 8.1 tackles while tied for the conference lead with four interceptions.

"For me it's always been about people," Campbell said. "I think that's one of the great deals we've been able to kind of establish here, is to try to align this program with the right people and go about that same alignment in terms of developing and recruiting the right people who fit. ... That's hard to do in our world."

Oklahoma is in its 12th Big 12 championship game and no other team has played in more than six. The Sooners have been in all four since the title game returned after a six-season hiatus. They are 10-1 in Big 12 title games.

"The game is going to be what it should be," Oklahoma coach Lincoln Riley said. "It's going to be two really good football teams that have had really good years going at it."

The Sooners have a six-game winning streak since a 37-30 loss at Iowa State on Oct. 3, when they were 0-2 in Big 12 play for the first time since 1998.

"Really, our team has grown in the mental aspect of the game more than anything," center Creed Humphrey said. "We've had a lot of young players step up and doing really good things for us. The way our team has responded to adversity since then has been really good to see.'

#### **IMPROVING RATTLER**

Redshirt freshman Spencer Rattler, the fourth different starting quarterback for Oklahoma in a Big 12 title game in as many years, is the league's top passer with 279.1 yards per game. His 24 TDs are the most nationally for a freshman, with at least two in all but one game. He threw for 300 yards and two TDs against Iowa State.

"He is improving as we go," Riley said. "He is seeing things better as we go, without a doubt. Making a lot of improvements that I expected he would make and growing each week."

#### FORMER TEAMMATES

Campbell and second-year Oklahoma defensive coordinator Alex Grinch were defensive teammates at Mount Union from 1999-2001, and were part of two NCAA Division III national championships together. Grinch was also part of a championship in 1998, and Campbell got another in 2002.

reported by Knut Kjaernsro. How did Johansen play in four spades after West led the diamond

queen to dummy's king? Note that South's jump to four spades promised at least five

trumps. Since North might have raised with only three spades in a minimum 3=1=4=5 or 3=4=1=5 hand, South, with only four spades, should rebid three no-trump. Then North will pass with three spades or correct to four spades with fourcard support.

Declarer seemed destined to lose one heart and three clubs. How could he make one loser evaporate?

Johansen drew trumps in three rounds, played his second diamond to dummy's ace and called for the club 10. If East had covered with his queen, it would have clarified the position, but he played low. Now West, after winning with the club ace, wasn't sure what was happening. He shifted to the heart jack. South played low from the board and dropped the nine from his hand! West, thinking that he had found the killing defense, continued with the heart two. Declarer took East's queen with his ace, played the heart three to dummy's eight and discarded a club on the heart king. Cool!
