Seven new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest FDOH update. No new hospitalizations were reported; no new deaths were reported. To date in the county, 291 people have tested positive, 38 have been hospitalized and 13 have died.

Gas prices rising again

New wave of COVID-19 could soon send them back down

Gas prices shot up 10 cents overnight Monday in many stations throughout Citrus County and prices for regular unleaded are now over \$2 for the first time since mid-March.

But they may be going back down soon, if the recent spike in COVID-19 cases continues and people once again start staying home and keeping their car in the garage.

Several stations in Citrus

County are reporting \$2.09 per gallon, according to GasBuddy. The average price for gasoline in Florida is \$2.03 per gallon, a penny more than a week ago and 14 cents more than last month. Despite the recent uptick, Florida drivers are still paying 51 cents per gallon less than this time last year.

There's growing concern in the fuel market that rising cases of coronavirus will interfere with the recovery in fuel demand, which took a

State won't help with Riverwalk

Budget doesn't send Crystal River home empty-handed, however

After investing so much on its own, Crystal River wanted Florida to help support the final piece of its Riverwalk along its downtown's borders with King's Bay.

None came after Gov. Ron DeSantis included the project in his \$1 billion veto list accompanying the state's \$92.2 billion budget he signed Monday, June 29, 2020, to go into effect July 1.

DeSantis said vetoes were expected because of state revenue shortfalls from COVID-19.

"It's disappointing," City Manager Ken Frink said June 30.

"What I was hoping to do was

get some buy-in from the state." Frink said the city will get \$200,000 from the state for a study to evaluate the quality of its sewer system.

DeSantis also approved \$1.5 million in legislative appropriations toward Save Crystal River's (SCR) King's Bay Restoration Project, SCR Vice President Steve Lamb said June 30.

"We're thrilled that made it through the budget," Frink said about SCR's initiative, which has been cleaning the bay of unwanted vegetation since 2015 and replacing it with natural eelgrasses.

Inverness connector trail cut from budget

When Florida Governor Ron DeSantis signed the new state budget vetoing more than \$1 billion worth of local projects and line items, one of those getting the ax was Inverness' proposed connector trail between the Withlacoochee State Trail and Forest Drive through Whispering Pines Park.

The cost of the 1.25-mile project was predicted to be between \$750,000 and \$1 million, with the state chipping in \$200,000.

City Manager Eric Williams said he was not surprised that DeSantis pulled the plug on the state's share of the funding, despite it being a worthy project.

"The revenue shortfalls (because of the coronavirus) are not known. That is a situation you have to be very careful with," Williams said.

Had the pandemic not occurred, Williams said he was confident the project would not have been cut from the state budget.

He said he will try again.

Local hospitals return to stricter visitation policies

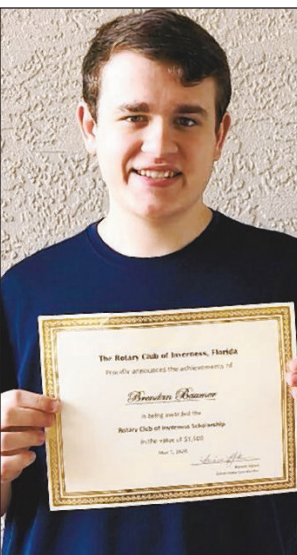

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Infections could rise for weeks to come

ST. PETERSBURG — As Florida enters the height of summer tourist season, the state's largest cities and counties are closing beaches, mandating masks and halting business reopenings, hoping the measures will slow a steep resurgence of coronavirus cases.

Many of the new cases are among younger adults and attributed to relaxed socializing in bars and at parties. When these patients wind up in hospital beds, their conditions are less acute than those of people infected during the deadliest phase of the state's outbreak.

Still, there are concerns that older and more vulnerable people will be exposed as Florida seeks a jump restart of its economy with theme park reopenings, major sports events and the Republican presidential nomination celebration.

In every crowd, there will be asymptomatic people, many of them refusing to wear masks and seeding the infections that will prompt more severe illnesses in the weeks ahead, experts say.

"Any time you have these reopenings, you're depending on people do to the right things, to follow the rules. I think that's where the weak spots come in," said Dr. Cindy Prins, an epidemiologist and medical professor at the University of Florida.

She warned that things are likely to get worse before they get better.

"Unfortunately we're a couple of weeks late to the game of really being able to get this under control," said Prins.

New confirmed cases have spiked significantly over the past week. The Florida Department of Health reported on Tuesday more than 6,012 new confirmed cases of COVID-19. More than 8,000 new cases were tallied each of three days late last week. In total, the state now has more than 152,434 confirmed coronavirus cases and more than 3,500 deaths.

Air conditioning could be a factor among states across the South were new cases have been spiking. Air conditioned areas where the virus can re-circulate can pose greater health risks than places where fresh air is brought in from outside, said Dr. Kristin Englund, an infectious disease physician at Cleveland Clinic.

"I definitely think the air conditioning and the oppressive heat in the South are going to play a role in this," said Englund. "Typically we see respiratory viruses worsen in the winter time because people are more enclosed. It's cold inside so people are more inside their houses where they're in close contact with people."

The big spike in Florida's confirmed new cases so far hasn't translated into a deluge of critical hospitalizations statewide. State and hospital officials say these cases are milder on average and also include people in hospital for other reasons who test positive in routine scanning.

Crystal River man among indicted

Played a role in health care scheme

A Citrus County man and nine other business people were named in a federal indictment for their alleged involvements in a \$1.4 billion, multi-state health care scheme.

Sean Porter, 52, of Crystal River, faces charges of conspiracy to commit money laundering and two counts of money laundering, according to the indictment unsealed

Monday, June 29, 2020, at the U.S. District Court in Jacksonville.

Others charged include: Miami-Dade County residents Jorge Perez, Aaron Alonzo, Nestor Rojas and Ricardo Perez; Seth Guterman, of Chicago, Illinois; Aaron Durall and Neisha Zaffuto, of Broward County; Christian Fletcher, of Atlanta, Georgia; and James Porter Jr., of Marion County.

From November 2015 to February 2018, the indictment alleges, the defendants conspired to bill private insurance companies with fraudulent claims for urine-and-blood lab testing, and laundered roughly \$400 million for themselves.

Sean Porter is accused

of laundering money through TYSI LLC, which he owned and managed out of Crystal River, and made off with around \$3.06 million in proceeds from the scam.

According to the indictment, some defendants bought and took over four financially-troubled hospitals in rural areas of Florida, Georgia and Missouri.

Cambellton-Graceville Hospital in Graceville, Florida; Regional General Hospital in Williston, Florida; Chestatee Regional Hospital in Dahlonega, Georgia; and Putnam County Memorial Hospital in Unionville, Missouri were the medical facilities listed in the indictment.

These hospitals then

entered into lawful contracts with several private insurers — including Florida Blue and Aetna — to decide reimbursement rates for medical claims.

Insurers were willing to pay higher reimbursements to rural hospitals for expensive urinalysis and blood tests because the facilities weren't best equipped to handle large-scale testing.

According to the indictment, the alleged conspirators would bill insurers for testing at the hospitals but conducted most of the tests at outside laboratories they also controlled.

"This was allegedly a massive, multi-state scheme to use small, rural hospitals as a hub for millions of dollars in

fraudulent billings of private insurers," Assistant Attorney General Brian A. Benczkowski, of the Justice Department's Criminal Division, said in a June 29 news release.

Some tests weren't even medically necessary, according to the indictment, as the alleged conspirators provided kickbacks to recruiters, substance-abuse treatment centers and sober homes for urine specimens.

Sean Porter is scheduled to be arraigned on either June 30 or July 1 before U.S. Magistrate Judge Joel B. Toomey.

Citrus County deputies nab Ocala man

Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies apprehended an Ocala man wanted out of Marion County for allegedly striking a woman while kidnapping her from another vehicle.

William Thomas Lindo II, 20, was jailed Monday, June 22, 2020, on an Ocala Police Department warrant charging him with burglary of a conveyance, battery and kidnapping.

Lindo's bond, according to his

arrest affidavit report obtained Monday, June 29, 2020, was set at a total \$55,000.

He was denied bond for his alleged battery as it was domestic in nature.

According to the Citrus County Detention Facility on June 29, no date has been scheduled to transport Lindo to Marion County's jail.

According to the report, Ocala Police Department officers pulled Lindo over near

the Pine Plaza Shopping Center, where three people met with Lindo to drive his white Ford F150 pickup truck.

Due to issues between Lindo and two of the women who arrived at the traffic stop to help him, a third person agreed to drive Lindo to the Paddock Mall while the women followed.

Once at the mall, according to the arrest report, Lindo exited his truck, opened the door of the women's

vehicle, grabbed its passenger by her shirt collar and pulled her out, causing her head to strike against a pillar.

Lindo then picked the woman up and pushed her against the vehicle, denting it, before forcing the woman into his pickup truck.

When the woman tried to escape, Lindo struck her in the face, before driving away, according to his arrest report.

Sir Patrick Stewart is writing memoir, publisher announces

NEW YORK — Nearing his 80th birthday, **Sir Patrick Stewart** is finally ready for the project he once feared taking on — his memoir.

The award-winning actor best known as Capt. Jean-Luc Picard of "Star Trek: The Next Generation" has a deal with Gallery Books for a "revealing and heartwarming look" into his life and times, the publisher announced Tuesday. A title and release date will be determined later.

"The idea of writing a memoir based on my life and career has been in my mind for several years, but always the demands of work have pushed it into the background. Today there are no demands, nor is there a prediction when there might be," Stewart, who turns 80 on July 13, said in a statement.

"I am caught in the middle of shooting a new series, 'Star Trek: Picard,' and I passionately want to see it through, but in the meantime ... what? Well, I have a beautiful study in our house in Los Angeles, sunny and peaceful. I am 80 in a little over two weeks' time. I have just treated myself to a gorgeous office chair. And ... I have the time. But most important, I am loving what I am doing, even though I never thought I would or could."

Stewart will write about everything from "Star Trek" to his award-winning stage performances to his voice work on "American Dad." He had expressed concern in the past about bringing back memories of his abusive father, but he will "reflect on his childhood in Yorkshire, England, marked by poverty and domestic violence;

Ex-husband of 'Real Housewives' star is charged in assault

NEWARK, N.J. — The ex-husband of a "Real Housewives of New Jersey" cast member hired a reputed mobster to carry out an assault of the woman's current husband in exchange for a lavish wedding reception, federal prosecutors in New Jersey said Tuesday.

Thomas Manzo, 55, of Franklin Lakes, and **John Perna**, 43, of Cedar Grove, were each charged with conspiracy and committing a violent crime in aid of racketeering activity. Manzo is the ex-husband of **Dina Manzo**, while Perna was identified as a soldier in the Lucchese crime family, according to prosecutors.

Perna was also charged with conspiracy to commit wire and

mail fraud related to the submission of a false car insurance claim, while Thomas Manzo was charged with falsifying and concealing records related to the federal investigation of the violent crime. Both men were arrested Tuesday and made their initial court appearances later in the day via videoconferencing.

Thomas Manzo hired Perna in the spring of 2015 to assault his ex-wife's then-boyfriend in exchange for a deeply discounted wedding reception at a Paterson restaurant where Thomas Manzo is an owner, prosecutors said. The alleged assault occurred in July 2015.

Manzo's attorney, **Michael Critchley**, said his client is "absolutely innocent, and the allegations more resemble a fictionalized plot of a reality TV show, and will be proven to be nothing more than that."

An attorney representing Perna didn't return an email message Tuesday.

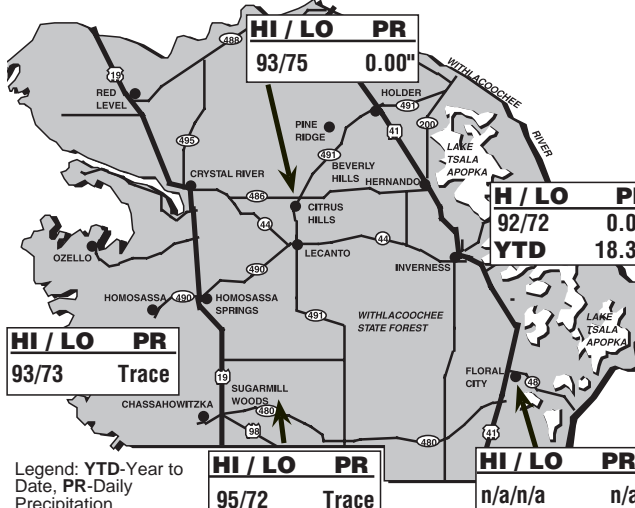

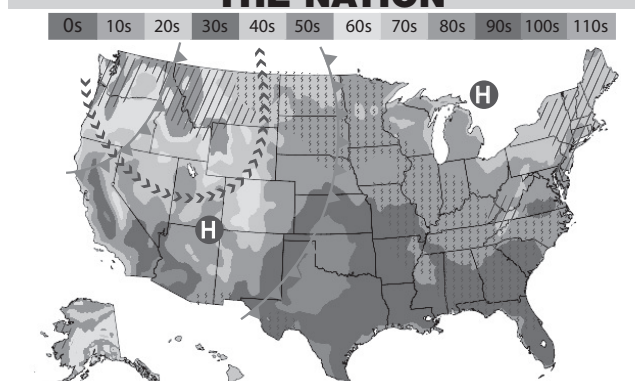

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DeSantis creates first state preserve in 32 years

Gov. Ron DeSantis on Tuesday, June 30, 2020, created the Nature Coast Aquatic Preserve, the first of its kind in the state in 32 years.

The preserve, which includes Citrus, Pasco and Hernando county coastal waters, will span about 800 square miles. The area is known for its world-class manatee-watching, scalloping and fishing, according to a news release provided by PEW Charitable Trusts.

Seagrass-dependent activities generate approximately \$600 million for the tri-county region annually, provide more than 10,000 jobs and fuel more than 500 businesses.

The new preserve will border several existing ones in Pinellas County, St. Martin's Marsh, and the Big Bend, creating a large, contiguous protected area for the Gulf of Mexico's largest seagrass meadow, as well as a mosaic of

marine habitats that include salt marsh, mangroves, oyster reefs and hard bottom. These habitats provide nursery grounds and shelter for manatees, sea turtles, scallops, crabs, shrimp and approximately 70% of the species that fishermen target in Florida, including redfish, grouper and tarpon.

The preserve becomes the 42nd in the state and will also be designated as an Outstanding Florida Water, which is the state's highest level of water quality protection and is assigned to areas worthy of special safeguards.

Florida lawmakers passed legislation in March to create the preserve. The bills, HB 1061 and SB 1042 sponsored by Rep. Ralph Massullo (R-Lecanto) and Sen. Ben Albritton (R-Wauchula), garnered widespread support and cleared six legislative committees before approval by the full House and Senate.

"We're starting to see a spike in cases in the state and locally," said Katie Myers, spokeswoman for CMH.

Visitors who are allowed into CMH will be screened for flu-like symptoms and asked questions about their health. They will also be required to practice hand sanitization when entering the hospital and entering and leaving a patient's room.

The new CMH visitation rules are as follows:

- Inpatient units: No visitors are permitted. Exceptions must be approved by the hospital administration. Exception can be made for end-of-life situations.

- Labor and delivery: one visitor is allowed.

- Post-partum: two visitors are allowed and may stay overnight.

- Emergency Room: one visitor is allowed per patient in the ER. Once a

patient is admitted to the hospital, the visitor must leave as visitors are not allowed in inpatient areas.

- Outpatient procedures: One visitor is allowed per patient who is having an outpatient surgery or other outpatient procedure requiring sedation. The visitor must remain in the designated waiting area. If the patient is admitted as an inpatient, the visitor must leave as visitors are not allowed in inpatient areas.

Anyone under the age of 18 will not be considered for visitation unless they are the parent of a hospitalized child.

All persons authorized to enter the hospital must wear a mask at all times.

Patients are encouraged to consider using phone, Skype, or FaceTime to communicate with family and friends during this time.

Bayfront Health Seven Rivers spokeswoman Jennifer Siem said the new visitation rules are a result of trying to keep patients safe.

"Our patient care philosophy depends greatly on engaging families to be part of the healing process. However, as (COVID-19) cases in the community and state increase, we must take extra steps to protect our patients, employees, physicians and the community," Siem said.

Effective July 1, 2020, these will be Bayfront Health Seven Rivers' visitation rules:

- One parent, guardian or caregiver for patients under the age of 18.

- One caregiver or partner of patients utilizing the Emergency Department.

- One caregiver or support person for outpatient services. The person will be asked to wait in a designated area.

- One birthing or care partner for obstetric patients.

- One coach for Bone and Joint Center patients.

- Visitors will be allowed during end-of-life situations.

Everyone entering the

hospital will be screened for COVID-19 and is required to wear a face mask, Siem said. No visitors under the age of 18, except under extraordinary circumstances or if they are the parent of a minor patient.

"We are committed to providing our community with quality medical services," Siem said in a media release. "You can count on us to maintain a safe environment of care in these unprecedented times."

"If family and friends would like to drop off a card, gift or message of encouragement, we are happy to deliver those to patients," she said. "They may also call a patient's room or visit patients using Facetime or another video communication app."

Oak Hill Hospital is also implementing a stricter visitor policy as a result of the increase in the community spread of COVID-19 in Hernando County.

The 350-bed hospital also serves patients from northern Citrus County.

"No visitors will be permitted for admitted inpatients to help ensure the safety of our patients and caregivers (with) limited exceptions noted below," said that hospital's spokeswoman Katie Stacy. The policy is as follows:

- Inpatient units: No visitors are allowed. Exceptions must be approved by the hospital administration. Exceptions include end-of-life situations.

- Labor and delivery: One visitor is allowed.

- Post-partum unit, neonatal intensive care unit (NICU), and pediatrics unit: One visitor is allowed and may stay overnight.

- Behavioral health units: a patient's attorney of record, a state of federal representative on official duty, and end-of-life situation visitors are allowed

Other visitation rules are the same as those for CMH.

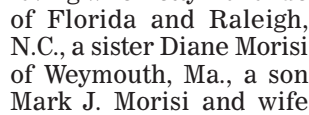

Carl Reiner dies at 98

NEW YORK — Carl Reiner, the ingenious and versatile writer, actor and director who broke through as a "second banana" to Sid Caesar and rose to comedy's front ranks as creator of "The Dick Van Dyke Show" and straight man to Mel Brooks' "2000 Year Old Man," has died. He was 98.

Reiner's assistant Judy Nagy said he died Monday night of natural causes at his home in Beverly Hills, California.

He was one of show business' best-liked men. The tall, bald Reiner was a welcome face on the small and silver screens: In Caesar's 1950s troupe, as the snarling, toupee-wearing Alan Brady of "The Dick Van Dyke Show" and in such films as "The Russians Are Coming, the Russians Are Coming" and "It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World."

In recent years, he was part of the roguish gang in the "Ocean's Eleven" movies starring George Clooney and appeared in documentaries including "Broadway: Beyond the Golden Age" and "If You're Not in the Obit, Eat Breakfast."

Tributes poured in, with Van Dyke calling Reiner "kind, gentle, compassionate, empathetic and wise," and Clooney saying he made "every room he walked into funnier, smarter, kinder."

Betty White described herself as privileged to work with Reiner and "heartbroken." Steve Martin said goodbye to "my greatest mentor in movies and in life. Thank you, dear Carl." Billy Crystal said "all of us in comedy have lost a giant," and Sarah Silverman said "his humanity was beyond compare."

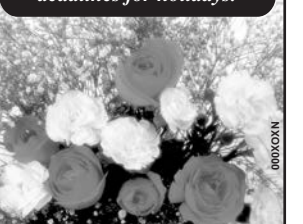
Brooks said he and Reiner had been best friends since meeting on "Your Show of Shows."

"Carl was a giant, unmatched in his contributions to entertainment," Brooks said. "When we were doing 'The 2000 Year Old Man' together there was no better straight man in the world. So whether he wrote or performed or he was just your best friend — nobody could do it better. He'll be greatly missed. A tired cliché in times like this, but in Carl Reiner's case it's absolutely true. He will be greatly missed."

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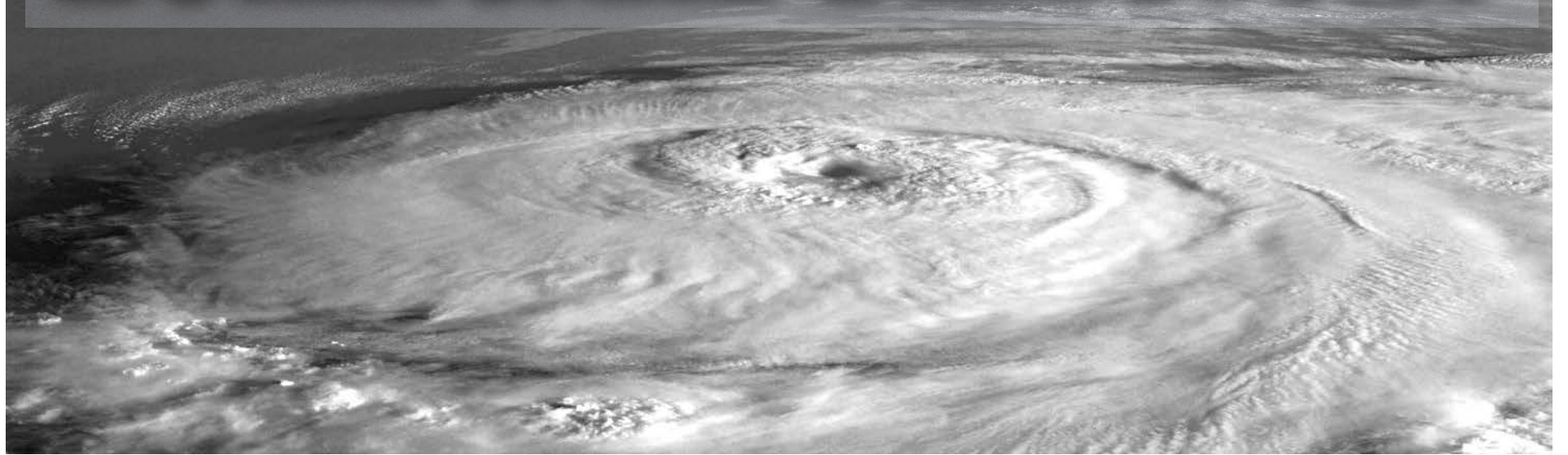

significant hit during the height of the state's stay-at-home orders, according to AAA — The Auto Club Group.

During that time, fuel demand was down as much as 80% in some Florida metro areas. Since reopening, the deficit shrunk to 20%.

The fear of how rising COVID-19 cases could cause people to drive less is what alleviated the upward momentum of both

crude oil and wholesale gasoline prices. Crude oil set a 3-month high of \$40.46 per barrel on Monday, AAA said.

But as rising cases set in, the price of oil dropped 5% by Friday, June 26, to a closing price of \$38.49 per barrel. Wholesale gasoline took the biggest hit, falling 10 cents last week.

"Demand concerns are beginning to creep back

into the market, now that cases of coronavirus are on the rise in Florida," said auto club spokesman Mark Jenkins. "State numbers suggest demand is holding steady, but market analysts worry about an eventual downturn. With wholesale prices turning lower, it's possible drivers will begin to see slightly lower prices at the pump this week."

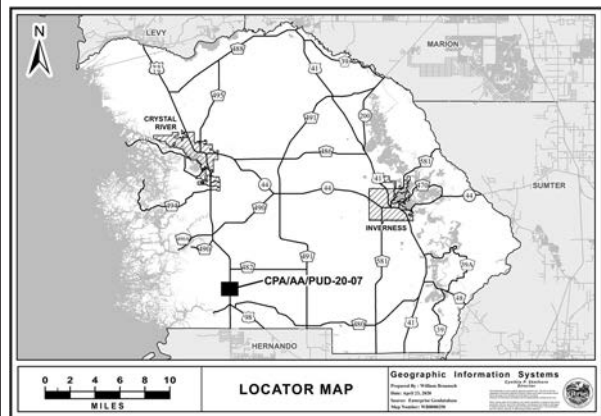

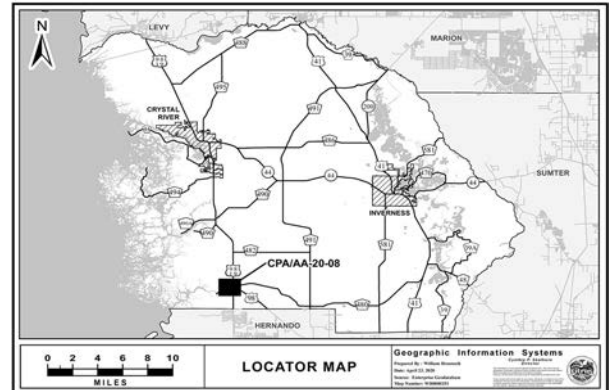

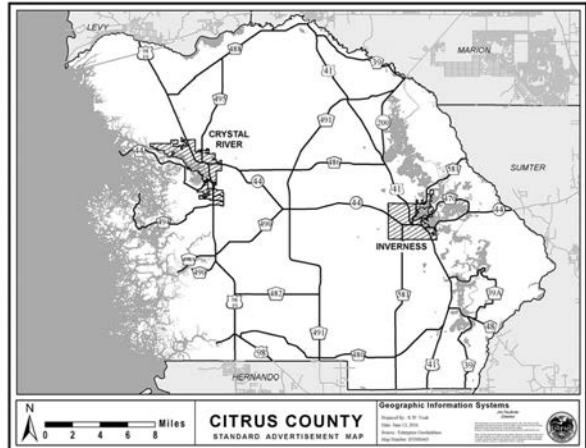

With the state funding, SCR could reach its project's target milestone of restoring a total 45.43 acres by November 2020, depending on the width and congestion of private canals.

Almost 40 acres of the bay's bottom have been rehabilitated by SCR's project since it began.

"It's going to be real close," Lamb said.

It's SCR's ultimate goal to clean a total 92.6 acres by Crystal River's 100th birthday on July 2, 2023.

Lamb said the Homosassa River Restoration Project, a similar environmental endeavor, also received \$1.5 million.

Even though Crystal River missed out on \$200,000 in state monies to add a restroom and paved parking to its Riverwalk job list, Frink said the city will press on to break ground in June/July 2021.

"We're still planning for next year," he said.

Riverwalk progression, Frink noted, depends on the city getting a remaining pair of property owners to approve its requests for easements to build pathways on private parcels.

Frink said the completed Riverwalk will draw more visitors to the area, boosting local economies, something state officials should back.

"It's a much larger project than the city and Citrus County," he said, "and we really thought the state should have some buy-in on that."

Crystal River has invested roughly \$3 million in the Riverwalk's multi-phase construction, Frink said.

Its first phase opened in March 2018 with an incomplete route of beautified sidewalks down Northwest Second Avenue and along streets surrounding Kings Bay Park.

To fill in the missing, waterfront sections of its Riverwalk — especially a

boardwalk from Charlie's Fish House to Cracker's restaurant — the city has secured funding and signatures for easements.

City officials in August 2019 requested \$2 million from state lawmakers to help fund the Riverwalk's second and final phase, which, based on 2017 estimates, would cost between \$2.8 and \$3.2 million.

Lawmakers reduced Crystal River's funding request to \$200,000.

"We know the costs of construction have gone up since then," Frink said, adding the city is reevaluating those expenses.

Citrus County commissioners also dedicated \$1.7 million toward the Riverwalk from its federal allotment of money awarded from the BP Deepwater Horizon oil spill lawsuit, known as the RESTORE Act.

Crystal River has around \$1 million to make up, which the city has in its coffers — but it's a price tag, Frink said, the state could have covered.

Frink said he's happy

with DeSantis designating the 800-mile-long Nature Coast Aquatic Preserve, which protects 400,000 acres of seagrass habitats along coasts from Citrus to Pasco from well drilling and dredging.

Other impacts to the city from the state's budget include a loss in sales tax allocations, but Frink said Crystal River doesn't get much of those appropriations to begin with.

Crystal River City Council will meet July 13 to approve the city's Truth-In-Millage (TRIM) rate, which must be adopted to advise the public of the potential tax on properties for the coming fiscal year.

A pair of public hearings must be scheduled before council votes on a final millage rate.

Frink said the county's property appraiser has yet to advise him of the city's current taxable value, but he's not presenting a tax increase. Crystal River's current millage rate is 4.8.

Council will continue

workshopping the city's 2020-21 budget on July 16. "We will be presenting a budget where we'll be living within our means," Frink said. "The city, state and country are hurting

enough, financially, and the city needs to live within its means."

"We will begin in earnest next fall (to get state approval)," he said.

The project got House and Senate support, which was encouraging

and warranted another try, he said.

The state had an interest in the project because it connects to the state-owned Withlacoochee State Trail, connects to a high-density area in Inverness, and creates a multi-modal transit facility, Williams said.

Williams said the city could go it alone and move forward with the

project without state help, but the city is in the same financial predicament as the state and unsure about revenues.

The safe and better move would be to try and get state funding again next year, he said.

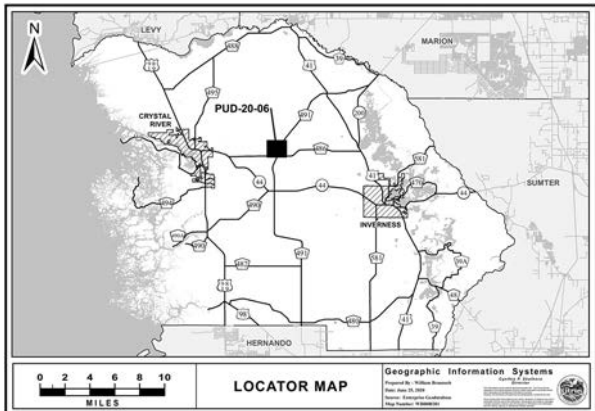

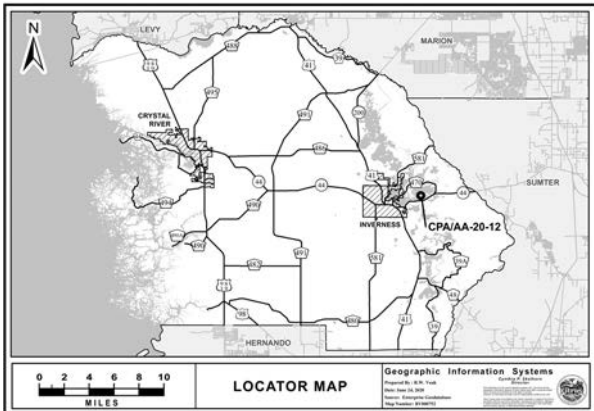

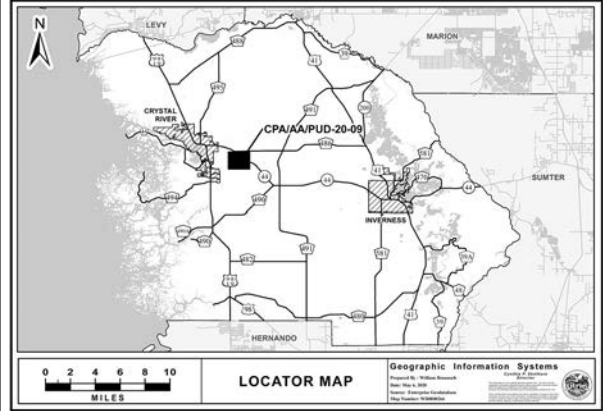

Baseball's minor leagues cancel 2020 seasons

Many teams could fold

NEW YORK — Baseball's minor leagues canceled their seasons Tuesday because of the coronavirus pandemic, and the head of their governing body said more than half of the 160 teams were in danger of failing without government assistance or private equity injections.

The National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, the minor league governing body founded in September 1901, made the long-expected announcement. The minors had never missed a season.

"We are a fans-in-the-stands business. We don't have national TV revenues," National Association president Pat O'Conner said during a digital news conference. "There was a conversation at one point: Well, can we play without fans? And that was one of the shortest conversations in the last six months. It just doesn't make any sense."

O'Conner estimated 85-90% of revenue was related to ticket money, concessions, parking and ballpark advertising. The minors drew 41.5 million fans last year for 176 teams in 15 leagues, averaging 4,044 fans per game.

MLB teams are planning for a 60-game regular season and most of their revenue will derive from broadcast money.

"I had a conversation with the commissioner, and we weren't able to find a path that allowed us to play games," O'Conner said. "It wasn't an acrimonious decision on our part."

O'Conner said many minor league teams had received money through the federal Paycheck Protection Program Flexibility Act.

"That was a Band-Aid on a hemorrhaging industry," he said. "Many of our clubs have gone through one, two, maybe three rounds of furloughs. In our office here, we've had varying levels of pay cuts between senior management, staff, and we've furloughed some individuals, as well, and are just about to enter in a second round of furloughs."

He hopes for passage of H.R. 7023, which would provide \$1 billion in 15-year federal loans from the Federal Reserve to businesses that had 2019 revenue of \$35 million or less and "have contractual obligations for making lease, rent, or bond payments for publicly owned sports facilities, museums, and community theaters."

In addition, the Professional Baseball Agreement between the majors and minors expires Sept. 30, and MLB has proposed reducing the

minimum affiliates from 160 to 120.

"There's no question that what the pandemic has done is made us somewhat weaker economically," O'Conner said. "I don't think it's challenged our resolve. I don't think it's impacted our desire to stick together and get a good deal."

There have not been substantive talks for about six weeks.

"There are very many teams that are not liquid, not solvent, not able to proceed under normal circumstances, and these are anything but normal circumstances given the PBA and the uncertainty of the future for some of these ballclubs," O'Conner said. "So I think the coronavirus has really cut into many clubs' ability to make it."

And I think that we're looking at without some government intervention, without doing something to take on equity partners, you might be looking at half of the 160 who are going to have serious problems."

MLB already has told clubs to retain expanded 60-player pools, of which 30 players can be active during the first two weeks of the season starting in late July.

Conner said the financial impact of the pathogen might extend until 2023.

"As serious as the threat from Major League Baseball was," O'Conner said, "this threat from the coronavirus, it transcends any list that anybody wants to make with respect to the possibility of teams not being around in the future."

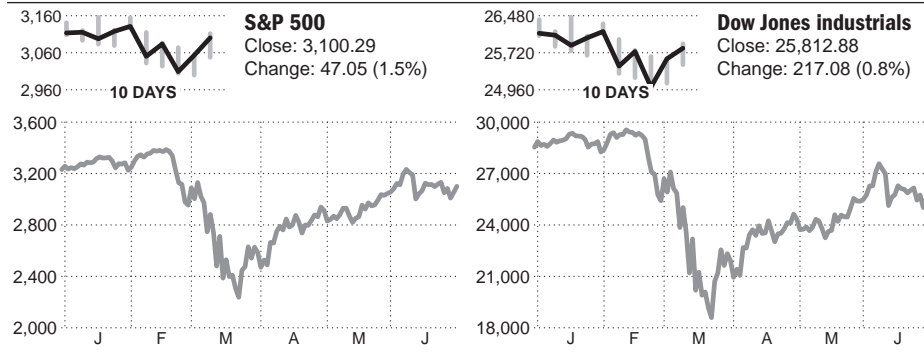

ROAD SAFETY

Be mindful of construction zones

One does not have to travel far to recognize Florida has myriad road construction projects under way, including locally. Those projects pose a threat: to the workers present in those construction zones.

According to NIOSH/CDC, Florida really is hazardous to workers in road-construction zones. From 2003-2017, 1,844 workers lost their lives at road construction sites. The number of fatal work-related injuries at road construction sites averaged 123 per year. During a 15-year period, Florida ranked second in the nation for deaths. On a side note, SUVs and pickup trucks are responsible for the most fatal events.

Recently, the Florida Highway Patrol indicated it had multiple purposes for staging troopers along U.S. 19 to include seat belt compliance and monitoring speed as motorists enter a construction zone south of Crystal River.

Although construction zones have reduced speed limits posted, too many motorists fly through them without regard for the workers' safety. With the dearth of congested construction zones, requiring extra attention and caution, should they be monitored and enforced by FHP and sheriff's deputies on a routine basis rather

than occasionally? Construction zones should be a top priority for deploying the limited enforcement resources of the FHP and CCSO; however, that is not the norm. For enforcement to be effective, it has to be on a recurring basis, "not here and there." Nonetheless, FHP should be applauded for its most recent enforcement effort and it, as well as the CCSO, be encouraged to make it a more frequent occurrence.

Drivers assume that since this is an FDOT project that the people working out there aren't local; they are. FHP and CCSO should continue to stage enforcement out there, because lately, Citrus County roads are a race-track. Drivers need a reminder that the next fatal accident could be their own. It's not just Citrus County drivers who have become somewhat lackadaisical when it comes to construction zones because they are so common to us. This becomes a potentially even more deadly problem in the construction zones.

Sure, construction is a major nuisance for businesses and commuters, but let's not be so selfish that we ruin someone's life by speeding through a construction zone. Save a life and slow down.

Senate extends small business relief program

WASHINGTON — Democrats drove a temporary extension of a popular subsidy program for small businesses through the GOP-controlled Senate late Tuesday, an unexpected development that came as spikes in coronavirus cases in many states are causing renewed shutdowns of bars and other businesses.

The move by Maryland Sen. Ben Cardin came hours before a deadline for applying for the program, which was created in March and modified twice since. Cardin, the top Democrat on the Small Business Committee, asked for unanimous approval of the extension of the Paycheck Protection Program through Aug. 8.

Minority lawmakers are hardly ever successful in such attempts, but the pressure swayed Republicans controlling the Senate, who have delayed consideration of a fifth coronavirus relief bill and are preparing to go home for a two-week recess.

About \$130 billion remains of \$660 billion approved so far for the subsidy program, which provides direct subsidies to businesses harmed by the coronavirus pandemic, which slammed the economy as consumers and workers were forced to stay at home through much of spring.

The subsidies come in the form of federal loans that can be forgiven if businesses follow rules such as utilizing 60% of the loan for payroll costs.

Fauci, CDC chief raise concerns about full flights

The government's top experts in infectious diseases on Tuesday criticized American Airlines' decision to pack flights full while the coronavirus outbreak continues to grow across much of the United States.

"Obviously that is something that is of concern. I'm not sure what went into that decision making," Dr. Anthony Fauci told a Senate panel. "I think in the confines of an airplane that becomes even more problematic."

Several U.S. airlines say they are limiting capacity on planes to between 60% and 67% of all seats. However, United Airlines never promised to leave seats empty, and American said last week that starting Wednesday it would drop its effort to keep half of all middle seats empty.

"When they announced that the other day obviously there was substantial disappointment with American Airlines," said Dr. Robert Redfield, director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. "I can say this is under critical review by us at CDC. We don't think it's the right message."

Trump pressed on bounties

Response sought over threat to troops

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump on Tuesday came under growing pressure to respond to allegations that Russia offered bounties for killing American troops in Afghanistan, with Democrats demanding answers and accusing Trump of bowing to Russian President Vladimir Putin at the risk of U.S. soldiers' lives.

Frustrated House Democrats returning from a briefing at the White House said they learned nothing new about American intelligence assessments that suggested Russia was making overtures to militants as the U.S. and the Taliban held talks to end the conflict in Afghanistan. Senate Republicans who attended a separate briefing largely defended the president, arguing along with the White House that the intelligence was unverified.

The intelligence assessments were first reported by The New York Times, then confirmed to The Associated Press by American intelligence officials and others with knowledge of the matter.

White House press secretary Kayleigh McEnany said Tuesday that Trump had been briefed on the intelligence, a day after saying he hadn't because it had not been verified. McEnany added that there were still reservations within the intelligence community on the veracity

of the allegations.

"Make no mistake. This president will always protect American troops," she said.

Majority Leader Steny Hoyer and a small group of other House Democrats met with White House officials as Trump downplayed the allegations. The Democrats questioned why Trump wouldn't have been briefed sooner and pushed White House officials to have the president make a strong statement about the matter.

House Intelligence Committee Chairman Adam Schiff, one of the Democrats who attended the briefing, said it was "inexplicable" why Trump won't say publicly that he is working to get to the bottom of the issue and why he won't call out Putin. He said Trump's defense that he hadn't been briefed was inexcusable.

"Many of us do not understand his affinity for

that autocratic ruler who means our nation ill," Schiff said.

Rep. Mikie Sherrill, D-N.J., a freshman and former Navy helicopter pilot and Russia policy officer, said White House chief of staff Mark Meadows briefed the group. She said the Democrats told the White House briefers that the president should make a statement.

"These are very concerning allegations and if they're true, Russia is going to face repercussions," Sherrill said. "We really pushed that strongly in the meeting."

She wouldn't say how the White House officials reacted or say if the briefers told the Democrats that in fact Trump had been briefed.

Trump and his aides set a high bar for briefing a president since it is rare for intelligence to be confirmed without a shadow of doubt before it is presented to senior govern-

ment decision-makers.

McEnany declined to say why a different standard of confidence in the intelligence might apply to briefing lawmakers than for bringing information to the president.

Some House Republicans who were briefed by the White House on Monday also said they left with questions.

Texas Rep. Mac Thornberry, the top Republican on the Armed Services Committee, said the panel would "leave no stone unturned" in seeking further information. Rep. Liz Cheney of Wyoming insisted there would be "ramifications" for any targeting of Americans.

But Senate Republicans seemed less concerned and questioned the media reports. Majority Leader Mitch McConnell said he didn't think Trump should be "subjected to every rumor."

"Conclusions, apparently, were not reached," McConnell said.

Sunbelt states rush to line up beds

Fauci: infections could reach 100,000

ST PETERSBURG — Florida and other states across the Sunbelt are thinning out the deck chairs, turning over the bar stools and rushing to line up more hospital beds as they head into the height of the summer season amid a startling surge in confirmed cases of the coronavirus.

With newly reported infections running about 40,000 a day in the U.S., Dr. Anthony Fauci, the nation's top infectious-disease expert, warned on Tuesday that the number could rocket to 100,000 if Americans don't start following public health recommendations.

Over the past few days, states such as Florida, Arizona, Texas and California have reversed course, closing or otherwise clamping down on bars, shutting beaches, rolling back restaurant capacity, putting limits on crowds at pools, or taking other steps to curb a scourge that may be thriving because of such factors as air conditioning and resistance to wearing masks.

"Any time you have these reopenings, you're depending on people to do the right things, to follow the rules. I think that's where the weak spots come in," said Dr. Cindy Prins, a University of Florida epidemiologist. She warned that things are likely to get worse before they get better.

Hospitals in the new hot spots are already stretched nearly to the limit and are scrambling to add intensive care unit beds for an expected surge in COVID-19 cases in the coming weeks.

Newly confirmed cases in Florida have spiked over the past week, especially in younger people, who may be more likely to survive the virus but can spread it to the Sunshine State's many vulnerable older residents.

The state reported more than 6,000 new confirmed cases Tuesday.

More than 8,000 were recorded on each of three days late last week. Deaths have climbed past 3,500. Floridians ages 15 to 34 now make up 31% of all cases, up from 25% in early June. Last week, more than 8,000 new confirmed cases were reported in that age group, compared with about 2,000 among people 55 to 64 years old.

Hospital ICUs are starting to fill up in South Florida, with a steadily increasing number of patients requiring ventilators. Miami's Baptist Hospital had only six of its 82 ICU beds available, officials said.

In hard-hit Arizona, hospitals are looking for ways to cram more beds into their facilities and hiring out-of-state nurses. State officials have authorized "crisis standards of care" telling hospitals which patients should get a ventilator or other scarce resources if there is a shortage.

Dignity Health, which operates several hospitals in the Phoenix area, is converting more areas to treat COVID-19 patients and preparing to put multiple patients in private rooms, spokeswoman Carmelle Malkovich said. It's bringing nurses from underutilized hospitals in its system to Arizona, and hiring traveling nurses and respiratory therapists throughout July.

Republican Gov. Doug Ducey shut down bars, movie theaters and gyms and banned groups larger than 10 at swimming pools.

Air conditioning could be a factor in hot-weather states where new cases have been spiking, because it recirculates air instead of bringing it in fresh from outside, said Dr. Kristin Englund, an infectious-disease physician at Cleveland Clinic.

"I definitely think the air conditioning and the oppressive heat in the South is going to play a role in this," she said.

The coronavirus has been blamed for over a half-million deaths worldwide, including about 130,000 in the U.S., where the number of new cases per day has soared over the past month, primarily in the South and West.

"I would not be surprised if we go up to 100,000 a day if this does not turn around, and so I am very concerned," Fauci said on Capitol Hill.

Elsewhere, the European Union will reopen on Wednesday to visitors from 14 countries — but not the U.S., which has barred most Europeans. The EU also kept its ban in place for visitors from China and from countries such as Russia, Brazil and India where infections are running high.

Netanyahu signals delay in annexation plan

JERUSALEM — Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said Tuesday that discussions with the U.S. on his plan to annex occupied West Bank territory would continue "in the coming days," indicating he would miss a July 1 target date for beginning the controversial process.

Netanyahu made the comments shortly after wrapping up talks with White House envoy Avi Berkowitz and the U.S. Ambassador to Israel David Friedman. The sides have been holding talks for several months on finalizing a map spelling out which areas of the West Bank will be annexed by Israel.

"I spoke about the question of sovereignty, which we are working on these days and we will continue to work on in the coming days," Netanyahu said.

Netanyahu has been eager to begin annexing West Bank territory in line with President Donald Trump's Mideast plan. The plan, unveiled in January, envisions turning over some 30% of the territory under permanent Israeli control, while giving the Palestinians autonomy in the remaining land.

But the plan to redraw the Mideast map has come under fierce international criticism. The U.N. secretary-general, the European Union and key Arab countries have all said Israeli annexation would violate international law and undermine the goal of establishing a viable independent Palestinian state alongside Israel.

China approves Hong Kong national security law

HONG KONG — China on Tuesday approved a contentious national security law that will allow authorities to crack down on subversive and secessionist activity in Hong Kong, a move many see as Beijing's boldest yet to erase the legal firewall between the semi-autonomous territory and the mainland's authoritarian Communist Party system.

President Xi Jinping signed a presidential order promulgating the law after it was approved by the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress, the official Xinhua News Agency said. It will be added to the Basic Law, Hong Kong's constitution.

Few details were given but China's liaison office in Hong Kong issued a statement warning opponents of the law not to "underestimate the party center's determination to safeguard Hong Kong's national security" or its willingness and ability to enforce the new rules.

The Juniors project was written up in the Chronicle a month or so ahead with a phone number for appointments. We checked in the patients throughout the day and were surprised when the doctor took brief "intermissions" and came out of the examining room and flipped on the office TV to watch the Saturday cartoons and we laughed at them right along with the doctor.

Laughter and humor goes right along with serious endeavors at volunteer organizations. It keeps the membership strong and is a great recruitment tool.

Many groups have catchy slogans. The Lions Club often speaks of the "3 F's": Fund, food and fellowship. And most of the time, the "tail twister" brings good-humored fun to a meeting. One time I participated in a "crazy" tail twister exercise meant to shine the light on the gender roles of Lions. Always the one to say "yes" to a volunteer opportunity, little did I realize I would be dressing up in men's clothing and the male volunteer would be dressing up in women's attire. It was at a 35-R district meeting and the crowd of Lions had plenty to roar about.

The Kings Bay Lions, formerly the Crystal River Lioness, participated with the Crystal River Lions Club with Art in the Park Projects in the Park behind the City Hall annually for many years. The Lioness handled the reservations with Lioness Jackie Smith as chairperson. Nonprofit CCFAP raising money for shelter X-ray machine

Throughout Citrus County, there are many organizations who work to make the community a better place for all who inhabit it.

Citrus County Foundation for Animal Protection (CCFAP) is one of those organizations, and is currently working to raise money to fund the purchase of a new X-ray machine for Citrus County Animal Services (CCAS).

"There are over 4,000 animals admitted to CCAS each year," said Wanda Moak, president of the CCFAP. "Many arrive sick or injured. They do not have an X-ray machine on the premises."

The foundation is raising funds for the X-ray machine in hopes to reduce stress on animals caused by transporting them to a location that offers X-ray services.

"The veterinarian currently prioritizes which animals are sent for X-rays due to budgetary constraints," Moak said. "Having an X-ray machine at CCAS would eliminate the expense of off-site services and would also be used to timely diagnose conditions such as cancers, hernias, bladder stones, broken bones and other internal injuries."

CCFAP has currently raised nearly half of their goal to purchase the machine.

"The cost of an X-ray machine and accessories is \$76,000," Moak said. "This important project can only be accomplished by the kindness and generosity of the community. Whatever amount anyone can give towards this purchase will go far in reducing suffering of animals that arrive sick or injured."

County Animal Services (CCAS). The CCFAP was formed in 2012 with the sole mission of reducing suffering and improving the quality of life for those animals within the shelter system. They work closely with CCAS to help meet the needs of those animals requiring attention and care.

Frequently, the CCFAP will take on new projects that contribute to the overall well-being of the animals within Citrus County. In the past, they have built play yards for dogs in need of additional space and exercise. They also host off-site adoption events and kennel-enrichment programs, which help to keep animals both physically and mentally healthy while they are

housed in the shelter awaiting adoption.

"Our support for the animals is multi-faceted," Moak said. "One of the important things that CCFAP does is fund surgeries for pets that arrive sick or injured. To date, we've funded 22 surgeries for pets that, otherwise, would not have had other options."

Each year, the foundation focuses on one major project in support of the shelter. This past year, they worked to improve the major surgery suite for the animals, by purchasing anesthesia machines, a patient warming system, various surgical instruments, an autoclave sterilizer among other necessary tools and supplies.

Where there's a will ... Scholars don't let COVID-19 lockdown slow them down

It was the rock and the hard place for three Withlacoochee Technical College students whose health care-career studies were caught in the pandemic and lockdown. Two are in the practical nursing program and one is in the medical administrative specialist program, with all of them planning to finish before the end of the year.

Two of the three are single mothers. And just before the COVID-19 pandemic closed everything, including the college, the three were awarded \$1,000 each by the Business Women's Alliance of the Citrus County Chamber of Commerce to complete their training.

It may have looked like an insurmountable wall, but the three were determined, and their instructors were innovative. They all kept going, and anticipate finishing on time.

Rebekah Frazier and Amanda King are in the Practical Nursing program. Shifting to distance learning was difficult, since so many important skills derive from hands-on experiences, and they had to forego attending clinicals at hospitals and skilled nursing facilities.

However, said Frazier, "my instructor Mrs. Dillard has done an amazing job coming up with interactive scenarios, and keeping the class on pace with the same structure as the classroom; just now we are virtual. I'm beyond grateful that we were able to band together as a class and school to make that happen."

Fortunately, she said, her daughter was allowed to remain in daycare so Frazier could continue her schooling.

This bump in the road has not stopped her. "In some ways I wish I was already a nurse, and could contribute to helping people who need it at this time. I think that there will continue to be different outbreaks and viruses that advance over time. Being there for people in our community and making a difference in people's lives are why I am becoming a nurse," Frazier wrote to the BWA.

Amanda King also is determined, and even looking beyond the current issues. "I am still attending the LPN program at Withlacoochee Technical College," she wrote to BWA. "The pandemic has not in any way changed my mind in pursuing my nursing goals. I will graduate in November 2020, then continue at

CF for my surgical registered nurse career dream."

Ashley Tame, in the Medical Administrative Specialist program, also felt her education was turned upside down when the pandemic closed classrooms and prohibited group gatherings.

"It's not the same," she said, and it has "made it harder to take a test or get a better understanding of some of my bookwork."

The silver lining in all this, according to Tame: "My teacher, Ms. Godwin, has understood that it not easy for anyone in her class and has tried her best to work with all her students. I honestly think this pandemic has brought a lot of us together in ways a classroom hasn't. I have seen the way my friends in class have come together to help one another engaging in ways that I normally don't see in the classroom."

Tame isn't deterred in her career plans, either. "The pandemic has not changed my views on what I want to do with my life," she wrote to BWA. "If anything, it makes me want to continue learning. I still want to be in the medical field no matter what pandemic hits us next. There is still hope for everyone during these times, sometimes you just need to look at the bigger picture to see it."

Fortunately, WTC has a medical simulation lab with lifelike "patients" that can be programmed to evince symptoms and reactions. In June, the practical nursing students began doing their clinical practice in the sim lab, under tightly controlled conditions and observing CDC precautions.

Both the practical nursing and medical administrative specialist programs are expected to finish on time at the end of 2020.

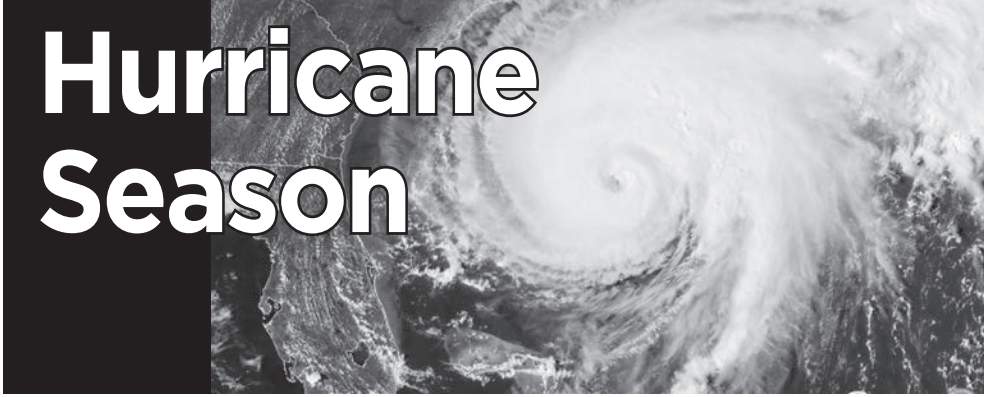

Mini Fact:

In the western Pacific Ocean, hurricanes are called typhoons.

According to the National Hurricane Center, the season for these sometimes dangerous storms runs from June 1 to Nov. 30 in the Atlantic Ocean, Caribbean Sea and Gulf of Mexico. This week, The Mini Page learns more about hurricanes.

Making a hurricane

These storms need the following elements to form:

- 6 higher than normal atmospheric pressure above the forming storm. (Atmospheric pressure is the pounds of air per square inch.)
- 6 warm ocean waters (at least 80 degrees).
- 6 moisture from the evaporating warm waters.
- 6 warm rising air.
- 6 winds meeting at the surface of the ocean.
- 6 winds blowing mostly from the same direction at the same speed and height.
- 6 a wind that blows so it makes the air go in circles and spiral inward.



Hurricane stages

Weather experts carefully watch the development of storms over the ocean. They have given each stage a name, depending on the strength of the winds.

1. **Tropical depression:** Clouds and thunderstorms swirl in a circle with winds of up to 38 mph.
2. **Tropical storm:** Swirling winds reach 39 to 73 mph.
3. **Hurricane:** Winds reach at least 74 mph.



A hurricane brings:

- Storm surges, huge domes of water that might stretch as wide as 100 miles and be as high as 25 feet when they reach land. This is the most dangerous part of a hurricane.
- High winds destroy mobile homes and can damage buildings. As a hurricane moves inland, the winds can keep blowing and cause damage hundreds of miles from shore.
- Heavy rain and floods along the shore and inland.
- Tornadoes that add to the wind and rain damage.

Hurricane safety

- If you live near an ocean, make a hurricane plan with your family members.
- A hurricane watch means that one is possible within 36 hours. A hurricane warning means that one is expected within 24 hours.
- Evacuate immediately if you are told to leave. Have plenty of gas in the car.
- Bring in lawn furniture, garbage cans and loose objects.
- Take your pet with you if you can. If you can't, leave out water and food.

Hurricane names

Hurricanes are given names so that we can keep track of them. When a hurricane forms, weather experts call it by a name from a special list. The names go in ABC order. There is one name for each letter except Q, U, X, Y and Z.

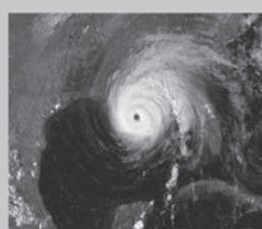

Bridge game hand with North, West, East, South cards and dealer information.

Bridge features a difference in scoring systems. In a duplicate pairs event, overtricks are very important. You receive one matchpoint for each pair sitting in your direction (North-South or East-West) that you outscore, whether by 10 points or 1000. In teams matches and Chicago, you just concentrate on making your contract.

Overtricks are small fry when compared to a game bonus.

In today's three-no-trump contract, how should South play in each form of the game after West leads his fourth-highest spade?

South starts with eight top tricks: three spades (given trick one), four hearts and one club.

To score a ninth trick without risk, declarer should lead a diamond from his hand at trick two; that is the right play in a teams match or at Chicago, with money on the line.

In a pairs event, though, South should try to collect an overtrick or two. In clubs, by intending on taking two finesses, declarer has a 92% chance for two tricks and a 67% chance for three tricks.

Here, though, disaster strikes. With every minor-suit honor offside, three no-trump will now go down. But South will have a lot of company.
