## Hallowell found guilty of murder

### Faces life for adoptive mother's premeditated killing

After Carlos Hallowell would argue with Denise Hallowell, he'd chop wood outside and picture the words of his adoptive mother below his swinging axe.

On July 13, 2019, when he was 17 years old, Hallowell's imagination crept into reality.

Enraged by a recent dispute over his schooling, Hallowell took an axe to the back of Denise Hallowell's skull, killing the 57-year-old while she was napping in their Inverness-area home.

Roughly a year later, on Friday

afternoon, July 9, a jury of six found 19-year-old Hallowell guilty of premeditated murder, ending a three-day-long trial. Deliberations toward a verdict lasted roughly an hour and 25 minutes.

Circuit Court Judge Richard "Ric" Howard scheduled Sept. 9-10 for Hallowell's sentencing.

Hallowell faces a prison term of up to life. He isn't eligible for death row because he was a minor when he committed the capital felony.

As a bailiff escorted him out of the courtroom after his conviction was announced, Hallowell, dressed in a suit, brought his cuffed hands together in a prayer.

In closing statements, Assistant State Attorney Blake Shore described to jurors the actions Hallowell took for around 26 minutes before the murder happened, which included getting the weapon from a locked shed outside and sharpening it while "stewing" with anger over his intent to harm Denise Hallowell.

"Each of those steps was a chance for him to turn back ... but each of those steps is also going to show you his determination ... to carry out his plan to kill his mother," the prosecutor said, "and his plan came to fruition."

## State defaults D.A.B. on Pasco project

State transportation officials say an Inglis road builder defaulted on a contract for an interstate interchange project in Pasco County.

D.A.B. Constructors Inc., which also has the Citrus County neighborhood road-resurfacing contract, defaulted on a Florida Department of Transportation contract for missing deadlines and construction milestones for an Interstate 75 project at State Road 56 in Wesley Chapel, an FDOT spokeswoman said.

FDOT officials said the project was behind schedule and raised those concerns to D.A.B. in November 2020. The result was the state setting a series of deadlines for the company to meet; on June 25, D.A.B. notified the state it was demobilizing from the project, FDOT spokeswoman Kristin Carson said.

FDOT has raised similar concerns about work delays for D.A.B. road-widening projects on U.S. 19. The state is considering liquidated damages for D.A.B. for the Homosassa project that is more than a year past due, and set milestones for D.A.B. to ensure the widening between Jump Court in Homosassa and Fort Island Trail in Crystal River finishes on time.

Updates on those projects from state officials were unavailable Friday.

D.A.B. also has a \$3.4 million contract to resurface Citrus County neighborhood roads. The company in May sought a delay due to a shortage in labor and materials. The county commission agreed to extend the contract deadline to September; as of Friday, D.A.B. had completed 43% of the work and is on pace to finish by the new deadline, Public Works Director Randall Olney said.

### Citrus local investigates family's genealogy

It can be difficult to tell if those family legends told at Christmas dinner are fact or fiction. Wesley "Wes" Brockway was curious enough to find out for himself.

Wes was born in Bronx, New York, on Feb. 24, 1943. He retired in 2000 and currently lives in Citrus County.

Wes's interest in his family's genealogy sparked in 1992. At the time, he knew his father was born in Cuba and that the family had moved there from Mexico, but not much else.

He began to start a serious search in 1996 when his daughter sent him a copy of ancestry.com. Wes said she told him, "You've been talking about this for a long time. Now do something!" So he did.

### The Brockways and the Mexican Revolution

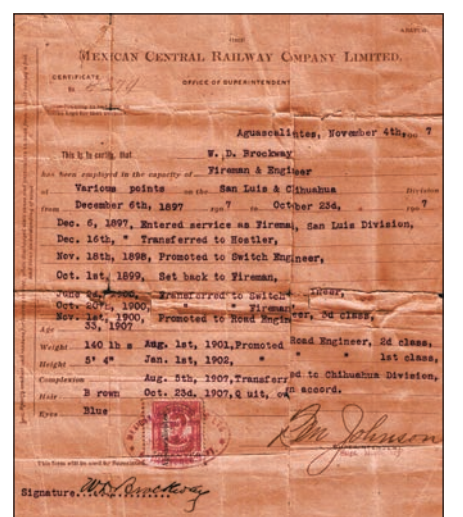
According to Wes, his father and uncles were jokesters.

"One of them would start a story that was a complete fabrication and they'd all build onto it like they were there," Wes said.

They told stories about the Brockway family's involvement with Pancho Villa, a revolutionary general in the Mexican Revolution. It was said that Wes's grandfather was indentured to him as a train conductor.

It turned out there were family photos to prove it. The first photo depicts Wes's grandfather, Wesley Brockway, and great-grandfather, William Brockway, standing alongside four Mexican revolutionaries and a train. "This was the proof," Wes said.

However, Wes discovered that the

men belonged to Emiliano Zapata, not Pancho Villa. "You can tell by the weapons and the uniform," Wes said.

## 'Heartbreaking': Death toll in condo collapse now 78

### Rescue workers continue searching

**SURFSIDE** — The death toll in the collapse of a Miami-area condo building rose to 78 on Friday, a number the mayor called "heartbreaking" as recovery workers toiled for a 16th day to find victims in the rubble. Another 62 people remain unaccounted for.

Miami-Dade Mayor Daniella Levine Cava said the work to recover victims was "moving forward with great urgency" in order to bring

closure to the families of victims who have spent an agonizing two weeks waiting for news.

"This is a staggering and heartbreaking number that affects all of us very deeply," Levine Cava said of the latest death toll.

"All those who have passed — all 78 — are leaving behind loved ones. They're leaving behind devastated families. The magnitude of this tragedy is growing each and every day," she said.

**Woman arrested for striking inmate**

A Brevard County woman who agreed to not fight accusations she fatally struck her infant son faces new allegations she struck another inmate while awaiting her punishment.

Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies arrested Merritt Island 37-year-old Jessica Figueroa on July 5 at the county jail after watching surveillance footage purportedly showing Figueroa

slap her cellmate in the face during an argument.

Figueroa was booked under a charge of battering an inmate. Her bond was set at \$2,000.

Deputies questioned Figueroa's cellmate, who said she and Figueroa had a misunderstanding about a statement made about Figueroa being a "baby killer," prompting a dispute before Figueroa struck her, according to

Figueroa's arrest report, obtained July 9.

Deputies also documented a redness on the woman's cheek that was consistent with a slap wound.

Figueroa was originally jailed in September 2020 after sheriff's office authorities arrested her on accusations she struck her 3-month-old son twice and didn't seek treatment for him as he succumbed to his injuries.

On June 22, Figueroa pleaded no contest to her resulting felony charges of aggravated manslaughter of a child, aggravated child abuse and child neglect involving great bodily harm.

Figueroa's plea-change spared her from serving up to 75 years in prison. Instead, Circuit Court Judge Richard "Ric" Howard will sentence Figueroa on Sept. 17 to up to 22 years.

Figueroa's parental rights over her two daughters were also terminated, court records show.

**Attempted traffic stop leads to lengthy pursuit**

Failure to pull over during a routine traffic stop led a two-hour long chase by several Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies and a helicopter and ended with an arrest of a Crystal River man.

The arrest of Peter Thomas Ianello Jr., 36, began during the early hours of July 9 when the arresting deputy reported they spotted a black pickup not coming to a complete stop at a stop sign along West Pine Circle, according to the arrest report.

The deputy reported that they initiated a traffic stop by turning on their lights and siren but that Ianello kept driving out onto West Gulf-to-Lake Highway and headed east. The deputy reported he contacted the sheriff's office and told dispatchers he was in pursuit of Ianello.

The deputy reported Ianello made several turns in the Citrus Hills neighborhood, Crystal River, Rock Crusher, and Connell Heights area, according to records.

The deputy called in a neighboring agency's helicopter for help as additional deputies arrived and helped follow Ianello, according to records.

The deputy reported that Ianello eventually turned onto Ottawa Avenue before circling the Citrus Hills neighborhood and then returned to State Road 44

and headed west. The deputy reported that Ianello then yet again returned to the Citrus Hills neighborhood and circled the area several times before his pickup became disabled and came to a stop on Citrus Hills Boulevard north of East Keller Court.

According to records, two deputies at the scene shouted for Ianello to get out of the truck but he refused. To better see inside the cab of the pickup, one of the deputies used his bean bag shotgun to try and shatter the rear window, but it did not shatter.

Another deputy sent his K-9 unit to the truck to force out Ianello, according to records. When Ianello came out of the truck he refused to put his hands behind his back to be handcuffed and deputies had to force his hands behind him.

The arresting deputy reported that the pursuit lasted nearly two hours. Ianello was charged with two counts of fleeing law enforcement and one count of resisting arrest without violence.

Ironically, fleeing from the deputies caused Ianello to violate his probation, according to records. That's because Ianello had started serving probation in May for felony fleeing and attempting to elude law enforcement. Fleeing again violated his probation.

His bond was \$3,000 and deputies took Ianello to county jail.

**Spelling bee champ makes history with flair**

LAKE BUENA VISTA — Zaila Avant-garde understood the significance of what she was doing as she stood on the Scripps National Spelling Bee stage, peppering pronouncer Jacques Bailly with questions about Greek and Latin roots.

Zaila knew she would be the first African American winner of the bee. She knew Black kids around the country were watching Thursday night's ESPN2 telecast, waiting to be inspired and hoping to follow in the footsteps of someone who looked like them. She even thought of MacNolia Cox, who in 1936 became the first Black finalist at the bee and wasn't allowed to stay in the same hotel as the rest of the spellers.

But she never let the moment become too big for her, and when she heard what turned out to be her winning word — "Murraya," a genus of tropical Asiatic and Australian trees — she beamed with confidence. It was over.

Declared the champion, Zaila jumped and twirled with joy, only flinching in surprise when confetti was shot onto the stage.

"I was pretty relaxed on the subject of Murraya and pretty much any other word I got," Zaila said.

The only previous Black champion was also the only international winner: Jody-Anne Maxwell of Jamaica in 1998. The bee, however, has still been a showcase for spellers of color over the past two decades, with kids of South Asian descent dominating the competition. Zaila's win breaks a streak of at least

one Indian-American champion every year since 2008.

Zaila has other priorities, which perhaps explains how she came to dominate this year's bee. The 14-year-old from Harvey, Louisiana, is a basketball prodigy who owns three Guinness world records for dribbling multiple balls simultaneously and hopes to one day play in the WNBA or even coach in the NBA. She described spelling as a side hobby, even though she routinely practiced for seven hours a day.

"I kind of thought I would never be into spelling again, but I'm also happy that I'm going to make a clean break from it," Zaila said. "I can go out, like my Guinness world records, just leave it right there, and walk off."

Many of top Scripps spellers start competing as young as kindergarten. Zaila only started a few years ago, after her father, Jawara Spacetim, watched the bee on TV and realized his daughter's affinity for doing complicated math in her head could translate well to spelling. She progressed quickly enough to

make it to nationals in 2019 but bowed out in the preliminary rounds.

That's when she started to take it more seriously and began working with a private coach, Cole Shafer-Ray, a 20-year-old Yale student and the 2015 Scripps runner-up.

"Usually to be as good as Zaila, you have to be well-connected in the spelling community. You have to have been doing it for many years," Shafer-Ray said. "It was like a mystery, like, 'Is this person even real?'"

Shafer-Ray quickly realized his pupil had extraordinary gifts.

"She really just had a much different approach than any speller I've ever seen. She basically knew the definition of every word that we did, like pretty much verbatim," he said. "She knew, not just the word but the story behind the word, why every letter had to be that letter and couldn't be anything else."

Sometimes she knew more than she let on. Part of her strategy, she said, was to ask about roots that weren't part of the word she was given, just to eliminate them from consideration.

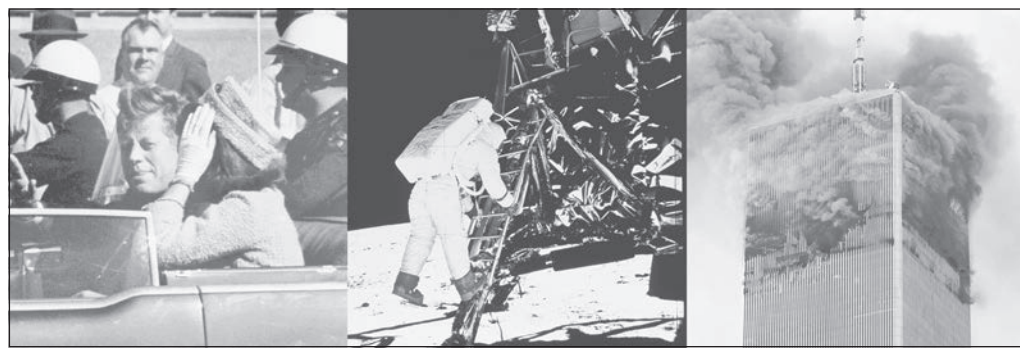

## Podcast revisits how the biggest stories unfolded on TV news

NEW YORK — For a broadcast journalist, they are the moments that MSNBC's Brian Williams says you can almost feel people watching you.

Planes crash into the World Trade Center.

A president is assassinated. An election is thrown into turmoil.

The first human walks on the moon.

Daily life is cast aside and people gather around televisions to soak in the news.

How TV and radio journalists handle it when history is suddenly thrust upon them is the subject of a new podcast based on Joe Garner's 1998 book, "We Interrupt This Broadcast."

The 12-episode series, which Williams narrates, becomes available on July 20, and new seasons are already in the works.

Hearing some of these moments as they unfolded is chilling, particularly if you were around to hear them the first

time. In many cases, a journalist's mundane day suddenly turned into one of the most impactful of their career and all skills are brought to bear.

"You can't measure it when it's happening, but you do your level best," Williams said. "You will be remembered when people look back and see how we covered these stories."

Episodes in the first season explore the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks, John F. Kennedy's assassination, the shooting of President Ronald Reagan, the moon landing, Columbine, Princess Diana's death, the D-Day invasion and the Hindenburg explosion.

While recordings from those days are obviously a big part of the series, Garner said he knew it wouldn't be enough for a podcast.

So the series draws on interviews from the people involved to give a richer perspective.

That's when you hear, for example, NBC News producer Beth O'Connell tell how she called staff members into a conference room after the planes hit the World Trade Center to urge

them to take a few moments to buy some shirts and toiletries at Rockefeller Center. They were likely to be at work for a long time.

In 1968, annoyed astronaut Wally Schirra refused to turn a camera on during the Apollo 7 mission, illustrating how television coverage wasn't exactly a top priority of NASA. A year later, Schirra sat in a CBS studio beside Walter Cronkite describing the Apollo 11 mission that landed on the moon.

Cronkite figures heavily in the series. It was a seminal TV moment in 1963 when he took off his glasses to briefly compose himself after telling the nation that Kennedy had died.

One of Cronkite's former desk assistants, Mike Russo, is interviewed in the moon landing episode, as is Richard Nafzger, a NASA official responsible for making sure Neil Armstrong's first step on the moon was captured on camera.

"No one knows who I am," Nafzger said. "But if it failed my name would be all over the place."

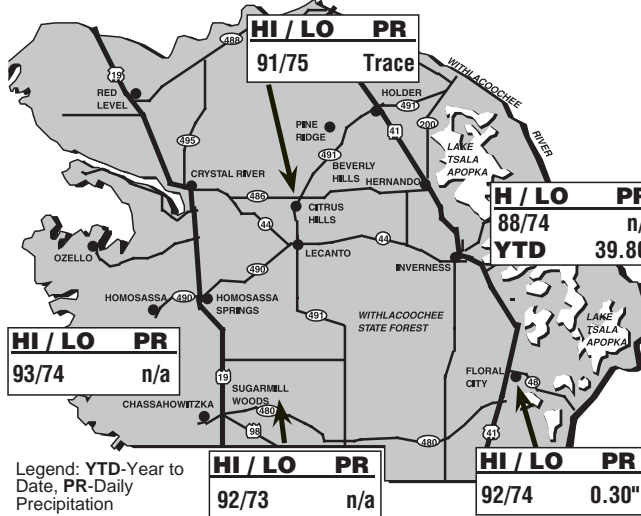

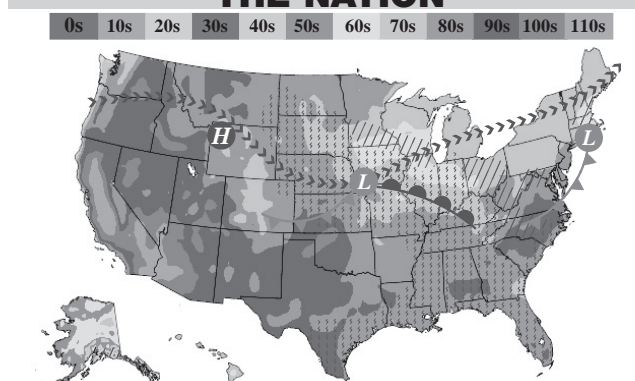

CAIRO — Jehan Sadat, widow of former Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, the first Arab leader to make peace with Israel, died on Friday. She was 87.

In recent weeks, the Egyptian press reported that Sadat had been hospitalized and was battling cancer. Last year, she received medical treatment in the United States but shortly after she returned home as her condition had deteriorated, her family told local papers. No further details about her illness were made available.

On Friday, President Abdel Fattah el-Sissi's office said she had been a role model for Egyptian women, and granted her a national award posthumously. They also announced the naming of a key highway in Cairo after her. She will be buried after a military funeral on Friday.

In August 1933, Jehan Safwat Raouf was born in Cairo to an Egyptian middle-class father and a British mother.

In 1949, at age 15, she married Anwar Sadat, a military officer at the time who later served as Egypt's president from 1970 until his assassination by Islamic extremists in 1981.

The couple had four children: daughters Noha, Gihan, Lobna and a son, Gamal.

Sadat consistently defended her husband's decision to sign a peace agreement with Israel in 1979 after nearly three decades of war, a move that was controversial.

After his assassination, she largely withdrew from public life. But in recent years, she emerged as a supporter of former military general el-Sissi and his government, after the country's 2011 popular uprising forced her husband's successor, Hosni Mubarak, to resign.

Fighting to get a lesser conviction of manslaughter for his client, Assistant Public Defender Ed Spaight argued in his closing statements for jurors to consider the overly-strict and mentally-abusive parenting Hallowell had under Denise Hallowell, who adopted Hallowell from Guatemala when he was 4.

"He wasn't planning to kill his mother; he was lost, confused and rejected," Hallowell's lawyer said. "He wasn't thinking, he just acted, and now he has to live with the consequences of his actions ... what he did was wrong."

Shore said Denise Hallowell was trying to keep her son on the right path, but Hallowell wanted it his way. Hallowell decided not to take the witness stand during his trial.

Hallowell called 911 the evening of July 13 to report finding his mother's dying body inside their home off of South Dodge Point. He said he made the discovery after barks from the escaped family dogs woke him from

a two-hour nap.

Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies testified to discovering Denise Hallowell lying on her bed with three-fourths of an axe blade embedded in the back of her head.

Forensic crews also testified to finding no signs of a forced entry into the lakefront home surrounded by acres of woods.

After interviewing him July 13, sheriff's office detectives released Hallowell to the Florida Department of Children of Families, but their investigations continued into his questionable statements.

From the bottom of a lake neighboring the Hallowell home, a sheriff's dive team recovered Denise Hallowell's iPhone and three security cameras removed from her house.

Investigators testified to extracting data from the cameras and cellphones of Hallowell and Denise Hallowell to refute Hallowell's statements he was napping before his mother's death.

Using cellphone GPS and time-tables of device activities, authorities were also able to map out the movements of Hallowell's iPhone in between the house and lake while he was calling 911.

A second photo shows the revolutionaries without William and Wesley — or so it seems.

If you look closely, Wesley is also in the second photo, poking his head out of the train and smoking his corn cob pipe.

"That's my grandfather," Wes said as he pointed at the photo.

Based on background details in both photographs, Wes was able to determine that these two photographs were taken at the same instance in history.

"If you go to places in Mexico and many Mexican restaurants in the United States, you'll find this photo," Wes said as he pointed at the second photo.

**The Brockways: From the New World to Mexico**

"That led me to not only do genealogy, but to get interested in history," Wes said, noting he began looking even farther back in the family tree. Wes discovered that the first Brockway to come to the New World from England was Wolston Brockway in 1638.

Since the Brockways were already established in America, Wes wondered why his great-grandfather, William, moved the family to Mexico in the 1880s. So, he started looking for Brockway names in the Massachusetts newspaper around that time.

"What I found was a lot of advertisements looking for people in the railroad business to go to Mexico," Wes said. "I presume that's why he picked up and went."

With him, William brought his wife, Sarah, and their family. At a certain point, William and Sarah went their separate ways.

Wes found a document where Sarah listed herself as a widow, but William was still alive at the time.

"She was Catholic and so the fact that they were separated, or maybe divorced — she just listed herself as a widow," Wes said.

It also took Wes 15 years to find Sarah's death certificate and where she was buried.

"I was in a library and I almost yelled," Wes said.

With Sarah out of the picture, William began having children with a Mexican woman named Delfina. At the time, she was 15 and he was 55. After William's death, she became the Brockway matriarch until her death in the '60s.

"When I was growing up, we used to go to her house every Sunday," Wes said.

**The Mayflower and mayhem**

Then, Wes looked back even farther. His great-great-great-great-grandfather, Joseph Brockway, married a woman named Jane Doty, who was the great-great-great-granddaughter of Edward Doty.

Edward was an indentured servant who came to the New World on the Mayflower. Therefore, Wes is the eighth great-grandson of Edward, making him a direct Mayflower descendant.

According to Wes's research, Edward was quite the troublemaker at Plymouth. The following are just a few of his endeavors:

● 1621 — Edward engaged in a sword and dagger duel with a

Sgt. Chris Holloway, of the sheriff's Major Crimes Unit, testified Friday to bringing Hallowell in for a second round of questioning on Sept. 16, 2019, the day of Hallowell's arrest. A Citrus County grand jury indicted Hallowell of first-degree murder in October.

Before resting their case early Friday afternoon, Shore and co-prosecutor Richard Buxman played a recording of the police interview for jurors.

When Holloway confronted him with the new evidence, Hallowell continued to deny the detective's suspicions, but later admitted to throwing the cameras and his mother's cellphone into the lake because he "panicked" after seeing his mother's body.

"It doesn't make any sense to do that," Holloway replied. "The only person that could've done this is you. ... There's no evidence for anyone else."

Hallowell then slowly changed his original story.

Hallowell said he and Denise Hallowell had a history of bickering, and got into an argument the afternoon of July 13 while they were driving home from a funeral in St. Petersburg.

He said his mother was going to stop paying for his schooling because he wanted to pursue technical college instead of a

four-year degree.

"That really hurt," Hallowell said, adding his mother abused him verbally leading up to her death because she was disappointed in his poor grades and friend group. "She let me have it, big time ... telling me I'm a worthless piece of (expletive) because of what I want to do."

While his mother was napping, he told the detective, Hallowell grabbed the axe from a shed and took it to the garage to sharpen it.

To get his anger out, after he and Denise Hallowell argued in the past, Hallowell said he would chop wood and use the axe to strike down his mother's words "into oblivion."

"You killed your mom, right?" Hallowell asked.

"I mean, yeah," Hallowell responded before expressing his relief. "It's been killing me, eating me up real bad."

With the axe in hand, he said, Hallowell opened the door to his mother's bedroom, blacked out and came to find the tool embedded in Denise Hallowell, prompting him to dispose of the cameras and cellphone.

"I remember sharpening the axe, and now, all of sudden, it's in the back of her head," Hallowell said. "It was kind of on the fly ... I didn't intend for it to happen."

trade to Florida while his sister stayed in Cuba and married Antonio Perez.

One of their descendants, Manuel Perez-Benitoa, became the secretary of defense and secretary of the treasury for Fulgencio Batista, the ninth president of Cuba. Batista soon became Cuba's dictator.

Wes said the night Castro took over, Manuel escaped Cuba with two of Batista's sons and two trunks filled with money from the treasury.

Although he does not have a close familial relationship with Manuel, "We're connected genetically," Wes said.

**Wes and his family today**

These stories are just the tip of the iceberg of Wes's genealogical and historical findings. He started gathering information on his living relatives at a family reunion.

"There was 135 of us," Wes said.

For his children, Wes put together a family history book. When they ask him questions about his research, he jokingly says, "Read the book."

Wes also made sure that his findings and information on his own life is easy to find for future generations. He's compiled all the addresses he's lived at, all the pet's he's had, etc.

**How to start your own research**

Wes joined the Citrus County Genealogical Society in 2003 and has been the treasurer for four years. He's also a part of the Florida Genealogy Society of Tampa and the New England Historic Genealogical Society.

In Citrus, the club meets monthly at Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, 3474 S. Southern St. in Lecanto and via Zoom.

"We have a different program every month," Wes said. "We also collect money and buy books for the Lakes Region genealogy section."

Rescue workers and emergency support teams from Florida and several other states have labored in 12-hour shifts, 24 hours a day at the site of the devastated beachfront condominium in Surfside — physically and emotionally taxing work performed amid oppressive heat and in dangerous conditions.

"We know that there will be long-term impacts for the teams on the front line," Levine Cava said. "They have given so much of themselves in these first two weeks."

Miami-Dade Fire Chief Alan Cominsky said taking care of the mental health

and well-being of the first responders is a priority. He said it is critical that the first responders communicate with each other. "It's important for us to talk," he said.

To that end, Levine Cava said officials have added peer support personnel at the fire stations.

No one has been found alive since the first hours after a large section of the 12-story Champlain Towers South came crashing down on June 24.

Hope of finding survivors was briefly rekindled after workers demolished the remainder of the building Sunday night, allowing access to new areas of debris. Some voids where survivors could have been trapped did exist, mostly in the

basement and the parking garage, but no one was found alive. Instead, teams recovered more than a dozen additional victims.

On Wednesday, workers shifted their mission from search and rescue to recovery after concluding that there was "no chance of life" in the rubble.

Levine Cava said the deaths of so many is "an aching hole in the center of this closeknit family here in Surfside."

On Thursday, Paraguay's foreign minister said in a radio report that the body of the sister of

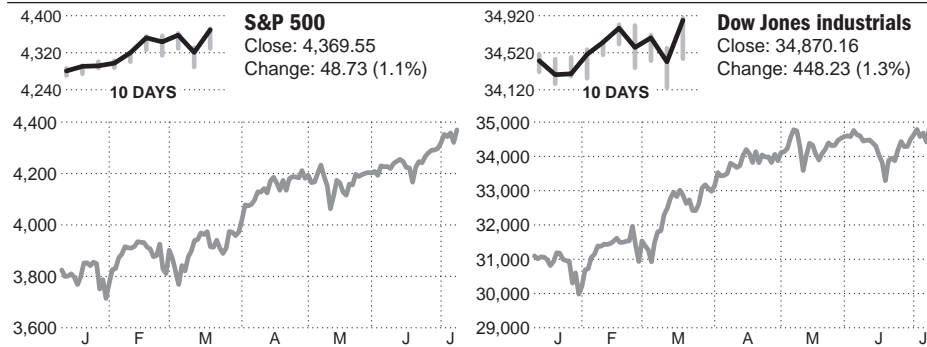

# Records point to Citrus' continued growth, desirability

**D**on't blink. Citrus County's housing market is so hot, homes are staying on the market for only a few hours before a flood of bids come in for listed properties.

If you take your eye the ball, you will likely miss out; inventory is on the low side and the housing market remains competitive for buyers and profitable for sellers.

For many, it's a welcome contrast to the housing market crisis of the early 2000s.

Real estate in Citrus is a current hot commodity, and shows no signs of a slowdown. Right now, it's clear that our county is an incredibly popular place to relocate to and build within.

However, if you've been paying attention to local real estate trends for the past few years, that's not exactly breaking news. As many local dignitaries have recently noted in public presentation: "Citrus has been discovered."

We are no longer a hidden gem; Citrus County is a focal point of Florida travel and the leisure lifestyle.

And recent tourism numbers, taxable values and median home prices collectively point to that fact.

The median price of a single-family home in May was up 33.4% to \$239,000 from the past year, according to the

latest data from Florida Realtors. Citrus had more new listings, closed sales and increased pending inventory compared to a year ago.

Realtors report that sellers continue to receive multiple offers on their listing and interest rates remain low for buyers. Inventory is rebounding and Realtors remain optimistic.

Despite the pandemic, sales have been great in Citrus for the past few years.

However, what goes up at times surely must come down. And in many ways, the market is a mixed bag; it's great to be an owner, but immensely difficult to find affordable housing as a renter.

As home prices soar, affordable housing moves further out of reach for the average local worker. That's an issue that needs more attention than it currently gets. There is an immense need for workforce housing at an attainable price as more housing is built throughout the county. That's something we'd like to see more of in the coming days.

It's impossible to say how long the hot market will last, but the continued reports of a fast-paced market are a bit of a broken record people don't mind hearing. Things are good right now for local homeowners and the trends point to Citrus' popularity growing and thriving.

# Schools get new rules

## CDC: Vaccinated students, teachers no longer need masks

NEW YORK — Vaccinated teachers and students don't need to wear masks inside school buildings, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said Friday in relaxing its COVID-19 guidelines.

The changes come amid a national vaccination campaign in which children as young as 12 are eligible to get shots, as well as a general decline in COVID-19 hospitalizations and deaths.

"We're at a new point in the pandemic that we're all really excited about," and so it's time to update the guidance, said Erin Sauber-Schatz, who leads the CDC task force that prepares recommendations designed to keep Americans safe from COVID-19.

The nation's top public health agency is not advising schools to require shots for teachers and vaccine-eligible kids. And it's not offering guidance on how teachers can know which students are vaccinated or how parents will know which teachers are immunized.

That's probably going to make for some challenging school environments, said Elizabeth Stuart, a John Hopkins University public health professor who has children in elementary and middle schools.

"It would be a very weird dynamic, socially, to have some kids wearing masks and some not. And tracking that? Teachers shouldn't need to be keeping track of which kids should have masks on," she said.

Another potential headache: Schools should continue to space

kids — and their desks — 3 feet apart in classrooms, the CDC says. But the agency emphasized that spacing should not be an obstacle to getting kids back in schools. And it said distancing is not required among fully vaccinated students or staff.

All of this may prove hard to implement, and that's why CDC is advising schools to make decisions that make the most sense, Sauber-Schatz said.

The biggest questions will be at middle schools where some students are eligible for shots and others aren't. If sorting vaccinated and unvaccinated students proves too burdensome, administrators might choose to just keep a masking policy in place for everyone.

"The guidance is really written to allow flexibility at the local level," Sauber-Schatz said.

### Lebanon

### Aftershocks from quake rattle California, Nevada

SAN FRANCISCO — Aftershocks have hit the region between Northern California and Nevada Friday after a magnitude 6 earthquake sent large boulders rolling into highways and knocked smaller items off shelves.

The quake shortly before 4 p.m. Thursday was centered south of Lake Tahoe near Walker, a rural community of a few hundred households in the eastern Sierra Nevada. It was felt as far off as Las Vegas and San Francisco, authorities said. Days of aftershocks are expected.

California state emergency crews worked overnight and found minor road damage but no significant impacts to infrastructure, said Brian Ferguson, spokesman for the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services. No injuries were immediately reported.

"We were relieved it wasn't anything more substantial," he said.

Thursday's earthquake was followed by scores of aftershocks, including at least a half-dozen of magnitude 4 or above, according to the U.S. Geological Survey. Friday's shocks are magnitude 3.7 and below.

### Warrants: Tape bound 2 bodies at Ga. golf course

KENNESAW, Ga. — Two of the three men found fatally shot at a suburban Atlanta golf course had their hands, legs and mouths bound with tape when police discovered their bodies in the bed of a pickup truck last weekend, according to court records released Friday.

The details were included in arrest warrants for 23-year-old Bryan Rhoden, news outlets reported. He was arrested Thursday by Cobb County sheriff's deputies and U.S. marshals on charges of murder, aggravated assault and kidnapping related to the July 3 slayings.

Investigators say Rhoden fatally shot Gene Siller when the 46-year-old golf pro went to find out why a white pickup truck had driven onto the 10th green at Pinetree Country Club in Kennesaw, northwest of Atlanta.

Investigators believe that Siller was slain because he came upon a "crime in progress," police have said.

### Hunter Biden paintings pose ethical challenge

WASHINGTON — The White House has established an arrangement that would allow President Joe Biden's son Hunter to sell his artwork for tens of thousands of dollars without knowing the identity of the purchaser, an agreement established in attempt to avoid any potential ethical concerns

surrounding his sales. Under the arrangement, a private art gallery owner will set prices for his work and sales, but will not share any information about buyers or prospective buyers with Hunter or anyone in the administration. The deal was first reported by The Washington Post.

White House press secretary Jen Psaki said Friday that the gallerist would reject "any offer out of the normal course" and that the administration believes the agreement "provides quite a level of protection and transparency."

"After careful consideration a system has been established that allows for Hunter Biden to work in his profession within reasonable safeguards," she told reporters. "Of course he has the right to pursue an artistic career, just like any child of a president has the right to pursue a career."

### G20 ministers take up plan to deter tax dodging

A sweeping effort to deter cross-border tax dodges by multinational companies that have cost governments billions tops the agenda as finance ministers from the world's major economies meet in Venice.

Approval of the international tax package seems likely at the Group of 20 gathering that started Friday and continues Saturday. But the proposals backed by U.S. President Joe Biden face a key hurdle in the U.S. Congress, where Republicans have vowed to oppose them.

Prospects for a reaching a final deal later this year improved after Biden proposed setting a 15% global corporate minimum tax rate, resulting in a breakthrough in stalled international talks. An agreement was reached July 1 among 131 countries in negotiations convened by the Paris-based Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development.

The deal aims to discourage the use of often-complex accounting schemes to move profits to where the least tax is due.

### 52 dead in Bangladesh factory fire

DHAKA, Bangladesh — A fire engulfed a food and beverage factory outside Bangladesh's capital, killing at least 52 people, many of whom were trapped inside by an illegally locked door, fire officials said Friday.

The blaze began Thursday night at the five-story Hashem Foods Ltd. factory in Rugganj, just outside Dhaka, sending huge clouds of black smoke billowing into the sky. Police initially gave a toll of three dead, but then discovered piles of bodies on Friday afternoon after the fire was extinguished.

# New details about Haiti killing

## 17 suspects in custody; many are apparently from Colombia

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — The Colombians implicated in the assassination of Haitian President Jovenel Moïse were recruited by four companies and traveled to the Caribbean nation in two groups via the Dominican Republic, the head of Colombia's police said Friday, while the U.S. said it would send senior FBI and Homeland Security officials to help in the investigation.

Haitian National Police Chief Léon Charles said 17 suspects have been detained in the brazen killing of Moïse that stunned a nation already reeling from poverty, widespread

violence and political instability.

As the investigation moved forward, the killing took on the air of a complicated international conspiracy. Besides the Colombians, among those detained by police were two Haitian-Americans, who have been described as translators for the attackers. Some of the suspects were seized in a raid on Taiwan's Embassy where they are believed to have sought refuge.

At a news conference in Colombia's capital of Bogotá, Gen. Jorge Luis Vargas Valencia said four companies had been involved in the "recruitment, the gathering of these people" implicated in the assassination, although he did not identify the companies because their names

were still being verified.

Two of the suspects traveled to Haiti via Panama and the Dominican Republic, Vargas said, while the second group of 11 arrived in Haiti on July 4 from the Dominican Republic.

In Washington, White House Press Secretary Jen Psaki said senior FBI and Department of Homeland Security officials will be sent to Haiti "as soon as possible to assess the situation and how we may be able to assist."

"The United States remains engaged and in close consultations with our Haitian and international partners to support the Haitian people in the aftermath of the assassination of the president," Psaki said.

Another eight suspects are still at large, said

Haitian National Police Chief Léon Charles.

"We are going to bring them to justice," the police chief said, as the 17 handcuffed suspects sat on the floor during a news conference Thursday.

Investigative Judge Clément Noël told the French-language newspaper Le Nouvelliste that the Haitian-Americans arrested, James Solages and Joseph Vincent, said the attackers originally planned only to arrest Moïse, not kill him. Noël said Solages and Vincent were acting as translators for the attackers, the newspaper reported Friday.

The attack, which took place at Moïse's home before dawn Wednesday also seriously wounded his wife, who was flown to Miami for treatment.

# Biden warns Putin about cybercriminals

WASHINGTON — President Joe Biden told Russian President Vladimir Putin in a Friday phone call that he must "take action" against cybercriminals acting in his country and that the U.S. reserves the right to "defend its people and its critical infrastructure" from future attacks, the White House said.

The warning to Putin was largely a repetition of the tough rhetoric Biden had used during their meeting in Geneva last month, when he warned that there would be consequences for continuing cyberattacks emanating from Russia. Since then, a new ransomware

attack linked to the Russia-based REvil hacking group has caused widespread disruption, placing Biden under growing pressure to this time marry the warning with actions — though none were immediately announced.

"I made it very clear to him that the United States expects when a ransomware operation is coming from his soil even though it's not sponsored by the state, we expect them to act if we give them enough information to act on who that is," Biden said. Asked whether there will be consequences, he said, "Yes."

The call with Putin underscored the extent to which the ransomware threat from criminal hacker gangs has mushroomed

into an urgent national security challenge for the White House, and it suggested a possible concession by the administration that earlier warnings to the Russian leader had failed to curb a criminal activity that has taken aim at businesses across the globe.

A White House statement announcing the hourlong call also highlighted a U.S.-Russian agreement that will allow humanitarian aid to flow into Syria. The dual prongs of the agenda show how even as Biden pledges to get tough on Russia over hacking, there's an inherent desire to avoid aggravating tensions as the administration looks for Russia to cooperate, or at least not interfere, with U.S. actions in other


areas, including Syria, the Afghanistan withdrawal and climate change.

In his call with Putin, besides reiterating the need for Russia to take action and that the U.S. stands ready to act in response, Biden also "emphasized that he is committed to continued engagement on the broader threat posed by ransomware," the White House said.

Biden told reporters that the U.S. and Russia have "set up a means of communication now on a regular basis to be able to communicate with one another when each of us thinks something is happening in another country that affects the home country. And so it went well. I'm optimistic."

# Bug experts seeking new name for destructive gypsy moths

Bug experts are dropping the common name of a destructive insect because it's considered an ethnic slur: the gypsy moth. The Entomological Society of America, which oversees the common names of bugs, is getting rid of the common name of that critter and the lesser-known gypsy ant. The group this week announced that for the first time it changed a common name of an insect because it was offensive. In the past they've only reasigned names that weren't scientifically accurate.

"It's an ethnic slur to begin with that's been rejected by the Romani people a long time ago," said society president Michelle S. Smith. "Second, nobody

wants to be associated with a harmful invasive pest."

The society is taking a hard look at some of the more than 2,000 common insect names to remove derogatory and geographically inaccurate ones. About 20 years ago, a committee of fish experts re-named the jewfish into the goliath grouper.

The moths are invasive and destructive critters in the caterpillar stage. They have a voracious appetite that can denude entire forests of leaves, said University of Illinois entomologist May Berenbaum, a past society president.

The moths likely got their name because as larvae they have hair with small air pockets that act like balloons allowing them to float for miles, wandering like the group

of people they were named after, Berenbaum said. Another theory is that male adult moths have a tan color that could be similar to Romani people.

The Entomological Society is now on the hunt for a new common name, a

process that will take months, Smith said.

Until then, even though it's a mouthful, Smith said the moths should be called

by their scientific name, Lymantria dispar or L. dispar.

Berenbaum — who has written about weirdly named plants, animals and

gene mutations — said given the moths' destructiveness, she and other would have some ideas for a descriptive new name.

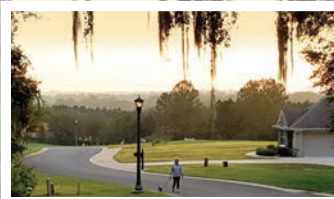

## All puffed up, ready to pop

The other day I told my husband that some people on Facebook were saying some really nice things about me and that I'm afraid it will go to my head.

"It won't," he replied. "I think you learned your lesson."

My lesson happened the year I turned 50.

I had lost a lot of weight and discovered mirrors and the incredible joy of looking at myself in them.

Also at that time, my column took a turn, reflecting my love affair with my reflection in the mirror.

One day I got an email from an editor at a newspaper in Indiana who passed on a reader's criticism: "She certainly is stuck on herself."

That stung, but I just wrote it off as some snarky comment from some cranky pants reader in Indiana.

To cheer myself up, I went shopping and bought a twirly white skirt — and then wrote an entire column about it, weaving in a parable Jesus told about proper wedding attire, thinking that it was probably the single most clever column I had ever written.

The day my twirly white skirt column came out in the paper, I followed my husband around the house reading it to him, completely enamored with myself.

That's when he told me that I was (a) in love with myself and (b) he was tired of hearing about it.

How dare he say that to me, I thought.

So, I grabbed my keys and drove off in a huff, ending up on a bench at the mall, making snarky observations about the people passing by.

One time Jesus spit in dirt to make mud, which he rubbed on a blind man's eyes to make him see.

That day Jesus didn't put mud on my eyes, but he opened them nonetheless.

It's not money or weight loss or fame or power that makes a person a jerk. They just reveal the monster that already resides within.

In his mercy, God opened my eyes to my arrogance and inflated ego, and when I saw it, I was so ashamed.

I still cringe when I think about it.

At the same time, I'm grateful for it, for every time God let's me know my ego is running amok, because that means he loves me.

When I'm puffed up with pride, he is faithful to poke me until I pop.

My husband's words stung, and I didn't appreciate them at first, but I came home that day deflated and humbled.

"God resists the proud but gives grace to the humble," it says in James 4:6.

God gave me the grace to apologize to my husband for my self-absorption and my in-loveness with myself.

The good news of the gospel is that Jesus died to save sinners and he rose from the grave to give new life to jerks like me.

Years later, the twirly white skirt no longer fits and the mirrors aren't as flattering as they once were, and that, too, is grace.

Amazing grace, how sweet the sound, that saved a jerk like me.

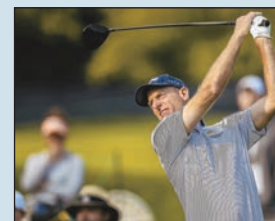

# Djokovic to face Italy's Berrettini

## Men's final all set at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England — The victories keep adding up for Novak Djokovic: 20 in a row at Wimbledon since the start of the 2018 tournament, 20 in a row in all Grand Slam matches since the start of this season.

Get both streaks up to 21 on Sunday by beating Matteo Berrettini in the final at the All England Club, and Djokovic will tie rivals Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal with a 20th major championship, the most for a man in tennis history.

"It would mean everything," the No. 1-ranked Djokovic said. "That's why I'm here. That's why I'm playing."

He worked his way in and out of trouble against a much younger, much-less-experienced opponent Friday until eliminating No. 10 Denis Shapovalov 7-6 (3), 7-5, 7-5 in the semifinals at Centre Court.

Each set was tight and intense. Each appeared to be within Shapovalov's grasp — until it was in Djokovic's.

"He was serving for first set. He was better for most of the second set; had a lot of opportunities and just didn't manage to close it out when he needed to," said Djokovic, who at 34 is 12 years older than Shapovalov. "In important moments, I think I probably held my nerves better than he did and just (made) him play an extra shot, (made) him do an unforced error."

Djokovic made just 15 unforced errors, Shapovalov 36. The other key stats: Djokovic saved 5 of 5 break points in the second set, then 3 of 3 in the third.

"What hurt so much this time was just that I felt like the game is there and it's possible to go and play for the trophy," said Shapovalov, who walked off in tears after falling to 0-7 against Djokovic. "It's a feeling I've never had before, so that's why it just hurt so much. I felt like I was outplaying Novak in parts of the match. If you're outplaying Novak, you can beat anyone."

So true. Now another new-to-these-stages foe, No. 7 seed Berrettini, will give it a shot. Cries of "Vai!" (Go!), "Forza!"

(Let's go!) and even "Andiamo, amore mio!" (Let's go, my love!) rang through the All England Club's main stadium earlier,

supporting Berrettini in his native tongue on his way to becoming Italy's first Grand Slam male

## Tampa Bay's bullpen dominates again in 7-1 victory over Blue Jays

ST. PETERSBURG — Three Tampa Bay relievers combined on five more scoreless innings, Ji-Man Choi drove in three runs and the Rays won their fifth consecutive game, 7-1 over the Toronto Blue Jays on Friday night.

Andrew Kittredge (6-1) and Jeffrey Springs each worked two perfect innings, with Springs striking out five. J.P. Feyereisen allowed a one-out single in the ninth to Randal Grichuk before completing a five-hitter.

Five Rays relievers went seven hitless innings during a bullpen day in a 4-0 win over Cleveland in Game 2 of a doubleheader Wednesday.

Choi was hit by a pitch around the left knee with the bases loaded in the fourth and made it 5-1 with a sixth-inning two-run single. He also fouled a ball sharply off his right foot before drawing a walk during the third.

Blue Jays rookie Alek Manoah went just 3 2/3 innings, allowing three runs, three hits, three walks, hitting two batters and striking out nine during an 88-pitch outing. The right-hander was coming off a start July 2 in which he had 10 strikeouts and limited the Rays to three hits over seven scoreless innings in an 11-1 win.

Austin Meadows flared a two-out, two-run single to right in the third that put the Rays up 2-1.

Taylor Walls had a two-run double in the seventh for Tampa Bay.

Rays starter Shane McClellan allowed a two-out, RBI single to George Springer in the third. The lefty avoided a pair of big innings by getting a two-out, bases-loaded grounder from Grichuk in the first and striking him out with two on to end the third.

McClellan lasted four innings, throwing a career-high 91 pitches. The rookie gave up one run, four hits, three walks and struck out five.

## 'Fast and furious' offseason to unfold

### Lightning face inevitable change

Pausing the Stanley Cup celebration and with his voice still hoarse from partying, Alex Killorn acknowledged the back-to-back champion Tampa Bay Lightning will not be back together on the ice when the NHL returns in the fall.

"We're all grown men, and we understand that in a salary-cap system, the team is definitely going to look different now than it will next season," Killorn said. "Whatever happens, happens."

Whatever happens is going to happen quickly. Before the Lightning even enjoy their second Stanley Cup boat parade, the rest of the league is already deep in preparations for next season as part of a frantic offseason that could see NBA or NFL-level player movement of big names to new places.

"There's a number of teams that — there's just really big decisions to be made," former Lightning general manager Brian Lawton said. "Now it's fast and furious trying to figure out what they can get done."

And not much time to do it. Lawton, now an NHL Network analyst, said it's going to feel like the shortest offseason in league history.

It will soon be a far cry from a team president joking to Lawton, "This is like the Not Happening League: nothing happening." The buyout window opened Friday, teams must submit expansion draft protected lists by next Saturday, the Seattle Kraken reveal their picks July 21, the entry draft starts July 23 and free agency opens July 28.

The entire hockey landscape will look very different, all in the next three weeks.

By the time the calendar flips to August, the list of players traded could include Columbus defenseman Seth Jones, St. Louis winger Vladimir Tarasenko, Buffalo captain Jack Eichel and teammate Sam Reinhart, Washington center Evgeny Kuznetsov, Carolina

# Furyk shoots 64, up 2 shots in US Senior Open

OMAHA, Neb. — The combination of wind, heat and humidity made it difficult to go low at the U.S. Senior Open on Friday.

Jim Furyk and Greg Kraft found a way.

Furyk shot a 6-under 64, the best round in days at Omaha Country Club, to take a two-stroke lead over Stephen Ames. The 2003 U.S. Open champion and 17-time PGA Tour winner rebounded from an opening 72 to get to 4 under.

"I was able to see some putts go in, and I hit a lot of fairways, a lot of greens today, kept the ball in good places," Furyk said. "When I missed it, I missed it in the right spots for the most part. Just really kind of got on a roll and got some momentum."

First-round co-leader Ames bogeyed four of the first six holes on his second nine and shot 73. Two-time U.S. Senior Open runner-up Miguel Angel Jimenez (71) was 1 under.

Kraft, who hadn't played in a tournament since September 2019, had four straight birdies on his second nine and shot 65 for the best round of the afternoon session.

"I just got it going," said Kraft, who shot 75 on Thursday. "I actually played not that bad yesterday, but I was on the wrong side of the hole all day. Today I got it under the hole, which made a big difference."

Kraft was in a logjam of 10 players at even par. Among them were first-round co-leader Billy Andrade (75), Fred Couples (71), David Toms, Thongchai Jaidee (71) and the oldest player in the field, 67-year-old Jay Haas (71).

"You know, there's such a long way to go, but I'm playing OK," Haas said. "I don't think I'm playing just amazingly — golf that I can't even fathom. I can play better, I think, but I have to do it. I feel good. Health, I love the heat. It keeps me loose."

Alex Cejka (74), the winner of the first two majors of the year, was in a group of 12 at 1 over along with major winners Mike Weir (74), Mark O'Meara (71) and Retief Goosen (69).

With thunderstorms in the forecast Saturday, the first tee times for the third round were moved up to 7:15 a.m. with threesomes going off Nos. 1 and 10.

Temperatures were in the low 70s when Furyk went out Friday morning, but wind swirled and was gusty. The wind calmed by the afternoon, but heat and humidity set in to create feel-like temperatures near 100, and the conditions coupled with the hills of OCC wore on the 50-and-over players.

Furyk hit 12 of 13 fairways and 15 of 18 greens in regulation and had three birdies on each side.

The turning point, he said, was making a 30-foot putt to save par after his tee shot landed in a greenside bunker on the 240-yard, par-3 third hole. Birdies on three of the next four holes got him under par for the tournament.

"Then you're kind of playing with house money," he said. "You can relax a little bit and just think fairways and greens."

Furyk ended his round with a birdie on the par-4 18th. He hit a knocked-down 8-iron about 15 feet

under the hole and made the putt to secure his lowest score in an official event since last September.

The 51-year-old Furyk has two victories and nine top-10s in 15 events since he joined PGA Tour Champions last year. He's never been out of the top 25 as a senior. His highest finish in a senior major is sixth in the Senior Players Championship at Fires-tone two weeks ago.

Andrade followed a bogey-free 65 with a 75 that included six bogeys.

"I felt like I played better than 75, and I'm still in it," Andrade said. "So just go prepare for tomorrow and go out and hit some drives in the fairway and see if we can make a few birdies."

## Luke List goes on a birdie binge for 63 to lead John Deere

SILVIS, Ill. — Luke List has a happy and healthy home life with his newborn son, and he felt pretty good about his golf game in the John Deere Classic.

List ran off seven birdies in an eight-hole stretch in the middle of his round, his only par on a 12-foot birdie chance on the 15th hole, and posted an 8-under 63. That gave him a one-shot lead over Sebastian Munoz going into the weekend at the TPC Deere Run.

List was at 13-under 129. Munoz played early and shot a 4-under 67, getting all his birdies on the back nine and then finishing with 10 pars.

Former tournament winner Ryan Moore had a chance to catch List until he ran into trouble off the 18th tee and made bogey, giving him a 66 and leaving him among seven players two shots off the lead. That group included Lucas Glover and Chase Seiffert, each with 63.

List is still searching for his first PGA Tour victory, though that wasn't front and center over the last month. His son, Harrison, was born June 5 and had to return to the hospital because of a respiratory virus that had him intubated for a few days and in intensive care for two weeks.

List, who is No. 117 in the FedEx Cup with the season winding down, stayed home the last two weeks to help with their 2-year-old daughter.

"It was tough, but it's been amazing to come back," List said. "Everyone has been asking and praying and thinking about us, so it's kind of cool. It's a big family out here, and it's nice to know that you've got everyone's support when it's not going great."

Harrison is home and gaining weight. "Everything is great now," List said.

The key to his round Friday was simple. While all eight of his birdies were about 10 feet or closer, there's a reason for that. List missed only one fairway. On two of the par 5s, he had eagle putts from 25 feet and 10 feet.

"I was able to keep hitting the fairway, which out here is premium, and I was able to attack from the fairway," List said. "I think there's a lot of wedge opportunities out there, and if I can keep it in the fairway, then I'll have some scoring options."

The scoring was so good, as it often is at the John Deere, that the cut was at 4-under 138.

Among those making it to the weekend was Steve Stricker, the 54-year-old Ryder Cup captain and three-time John Deere Classic winner. Stricker wanted to be part of the 50th anniversary of the tournament, so he skipped his title defense at the U.S. Senior Open.

His play on Friday suggested that was a good move, with six birdies in his round of 66 that left him seven shots behind in the middle of the pack.

"This tournament has meant a lot to me over the years. It's a special place for me," Stricker said. "It's hurt the last few times I haven't been able to come here. ... I wish the two events were at different times. I could have played both of them. But this is the spot for me to be this week."

One of his birdies was on the par-5 second hole, which he reached in two with an iron. Calling the action was 22-year-old daughter Bobbi Maria Stricker, who plays for Wisconsin.

"Looks like it's right on it to be honest with you," she said.

Also making the cut was Nick Watney, who was hovering close to the line with a bogey on the fifth hole (his 14th of the round) and responded with back-to-back birdies. He shot 66, significant because it ended a nasty patch of 18 consecutive missed cuts.

## Mclroy misses cut after spectator swings his 6-iron on tee

NORTH BERWICK, Scotland — Rory Mclroy was waiting to get his second round underway on the 10th hole at the Scottish Open when a spectator wandered on to the tee, had a dig into the four-time major winner's golf bag, and started taking swings with his 6-iron.

It wasn't long before the interloper, who smelled of alcohol according to Mclroy's playing partner, Jon Rahm, was ejected from the tournament.

Mclroy didn't last much longer.

After an even-par round of 71, Mclroy missed the cut at the European Tour event and will be making

an earlier-than-planned journey to the south of England for next week's British Open.

He was 1 under for the tournament, 10 shots off the lead held by the top-ranked Rahm and Belgium's Thomas Detry — after their rounds of 6-under 65 — and first-round leader Jack Senior (67). They were all on 11-under 131 overall.

Mclroy was reluctant to speak in detail about the incident on his first hole, which took place about 8 a.m. local time.

"I was surprised," he said. "It was handled efficiently and everything was OK. I had no idea who it was."

Rahm said alcohol could be smelled on the spectator's breath.

"He came in so confident and we thought he was going to take a picture or something," the U.S. Open champion said. "We thought he was maybe part of the camera crew or a photographer."

"After a little bit, when he walked back and they were taking him out, you could smell the reason why it happened. Me and Rory didn't say anything. He was holding a 6-iron and I didn't want to get hurt."

Rahm didn't think the incident unnerved Mclroy.

"It didn't put anyone off," the Spanish player said. "If anything, it put a smile on our faces. It will be a pretty good story to tell in the future."

Footage of the incident was spread widely on social media. The man was eventually escorted off the tee by a security guard after handing the club to Mclroy's caddie, Harry Diamond.

David Wilson, a member of nearby club Kilspindie who posted the footage, said in The Scotsman newspaper: "The players laughed it off, saying they knew he wasn't a golfer when they saw his grip."

The European Tour said the matter was being dealt with by Police Scotland, which told Britain's Press Association that the man had been taken to the hospital in Edinburgh and that "enquiries are ongoing."

This week marks the first time that spectators have been allowed in to

watch a British golf event since the start of the coronavirus pandemic. Around 4,000 were being permitted entry per day.

They didn't help Mclroy, who was seventh in the U.S. Open at Torrey Pines last month but was tied for only 59th in the Irish Open last week.

Rahm has retained the form that led him to his first major title, adding a 65 to his opening 66.

He reached the turn in 29 shots — and was 6 under for his round at that stage — and added a seventh birdie of the day at No. 1.

Rahm could cover the front nine only in even par.

"The elements changed and I was playing some holes in a wind I had never played before. I got a little hesitant," Rahm said.

"I made some aggressive swings without thinking about it as much as I could have because I was playing so well and maybe could have taken a step back. Swing-wise, it's good. If I just clean up some little mistakes, it could be better."

George Coetzee (66), Lee Westwood and Matt Fitzpatrick (66) were a stroke behind Rahm, Detry and Senior.

No.3-ranked Justin Thomas was a further shot back after a 69.

## Hataoka stays on top at Marathon LPGA Classic with late birdie burst

SYLVANIA, Ohio — Nasa Hataoka needed another birdie streak to hang onto the lead in the Marathon LPGA Classic.

A day after making six straight birdies in an opening 10-under 61, the 22-year-old Japanese player had four in a row on Nos. 14-17 to salvage a 69.

"My shots were not as good as yesterday," Hataoka said. "Didn't have that many chances. I had a lot of problems, but I was able to fix that for the last part and bring it back up."

Her lead was cut from four to two strokes, with American Mina Harigae second after her second straight bogey-free 66.

After collecting trophies on the hard courts of Melbourne Park in February, and the red clay of Roland Garros in June — defeating Berrettini in the quarterfinals there — Djokovic seeks a triumph on the grass of the All England Club to get three-quarters of the way to a calendar-year Grand Slam, with only the U.S. Open remaining.

No man has pulled off that three-title stretch within one year — let alone all four — since Rod Laver won the Grand Slam in 1969.

This will be Djokovic's 30th major final, Berrettini's first. Much as it was Djokovic's 41st major semifinal, Shapovalov's first.

“Obviously, the job is not

done yet,” said the 25-year-old Berrettini, who lost his only previous Slam semifinal, at the 2019 U.S. Open. “I want to get the trophy now that I'm here.”

He owns an 11-match winning streak on grass courts, including the title at the Queen's Club tuneup last month, when he became the first man since Boris Becker in 1985 to win the trophy in his debut at that event.

“Matteo played (an) unbelievable match,” said Hurkacz, who arrived at Wimbledon on a six-match losing streak but beat Federer and No. 2 Daniil Medvedev to reach his first Slam semifinal. “I didn't have many chances, basically. Probably zero.”

## Cavendish equals record of 34 Tour stage wins

CARCASSONNE, France — Thirteen years after his maiden stage win at the Tour de France, Mark Cavendish added yet another mass sprint to his tally and equaled Eddy Merckx's all-time record of 34 stage wins on Friday.

Merckx amassed his wins in the 1960s and 70s, an era during which his domination was so outrageous that he earned the nickname of “The Cannibal.”

Unlike Merckx — who did it a record five times — Cavendish has never won the Tour.

“I don't think I can ever be compared to the great Eddy Merckx, the greatest male road cyclist of all-time,” he said.

Cavendish's abilities are more limited, but his speed prowess and longevity among his fellow sprinters have no equal at the Tour. Particularly this summer, in the absence of teammate Sam Bennett, whom he replaced at the last minute — and after Caleb Ewan crashed out early in the race.

Taking part in cycling's biggest race for the first time since 2018, the 36-year-old former world champion posted his fourth stage win in the southern city of Carcassonne, at the end of a long and hot day on the bike.

“I haven't realized it,” he said when asked about the record. “It's still just another win on the Tour de France. It's like my first one. I've won a stage of the Tour de France. It's what I dreamed of as a kid and it's what I dream of now. I've worked so hard for it.”

There was no significant change in the general classification as race leader Tadej Pogacar enjoyed a quiet day in the peloton. Pogacar kept his 5:18 lead over second-placed Rigoberto Uran, with Jonas Vingegaard in third, 5:33 off the pace.

## UF men, women to compete in Jumpman Invitational

GAINESVILLE — Florida men's and women's basketball will compete in the newly-formed Jumpman Invitational in Charlotte, with the inaugural event set for Dec. 20-21, 2022. The three-year agreement with the Charlotte Sports Foundation and Jordan Brand features both the men's and women's teams from the four schools — Florida, Michigan, North Carolina and Oklahoma — that were the first to sign partnership deals with Jordan Brand in basketball and football.

All games will be played in Charlotte's Spectrum Center in partnership with Hornets Sports & Entertainment, which owns the NBA's Charlotte Hornets and operates the facility. The schedule will feature two games each night, with matchups

and game times still to be determined. ESPN networks will air all four games.

Florida will face each of the three other teams over the course of the three-year event. Morrison said the possibility exists to expand the event to include more Jordan-affiliated schools in 2023 or 2024, or to extend the partnership into subsequent years.

## Posey to miss All-Star Game with bruised thumb

SAN FRANCISCO — Giants catcher Buster Posey will have to find something fun to do with his two older children to make up for not going to the All-Star Game.

Posey went on the 10-day injured list Friday with a bruised left thumb, costing him his starting spot in next week's game at Coors Field. His 9-year-old twins, Lee and Addison, had planned to attend.

“Obviously disappointed, it's an honor to play in the game,” Posey said Friday, his tender thumb wrapped. “My oldest two were pretty excited about being there, but these things happen. Just move on.”

Posey has been out since July 4, when he was hurt by a foul tip.

The 34-year-old Posey was chosen for his seventh All-Star team.

“He has some disappointment about not being able to participate in that event,” manager Gabe Kapler said. “He's a competitor and he wants every opportunity. At the same time I think he understands that what's best for him right now is to get as healthy as he can possibly be for the second half of the season. We're going to work really hard to get him ready to be available right away after the break, potentially the first game.”

Posey opted out of playing last year during the coronavirus pandemic to care for prematurely born adopted twin girls. The former NL MVP has been in top form this season, batting .328 with 12 home runs and a .968 OPS for NL West-leading San Francisco.

“Honestly I couldn't catch right now anyway,” Posey said. “I couldn't catch or swing a bat right now. All in all I'm pretty lucky, it doesn't seem like I'll miss too much time.”

The Giants made the move before opening a weekend series with Washington.

## Former defenseman Bryan ‘Bugsy’ Watson dies at 78

Former NHL defenseman Bryan “Bugsy” Watson, who played for Scotty Bowman, with Doug Harvey and coached Wayne Gretzky during his time in hockey, has died. He was 78.

A Washington Capitals spokesman said Friday that Monumental Sports & Entertainment, which owns the club, learned of his death Thursday from a member of Watson's family. A Pittsburgh Penguins spokeswoman said the team was told Watson died at his home in St. Michaels, Maryland. The cause of death was not revealed.

A native of Bancroft, Ontario, Watson played 1,009 games in the NHL for Montreal, Detroit, Oakland, Pittsburgh, St. Louis and Washington from 1963-1978 before finishing his on-ice career with Cincinnati in the World Hockey Association in 1979.

Watson was the Edmonton Oilers' first coach for their inaugural NHL season in 1980 after moving over from the WHA. General manager Glen Sather replaced Watson behind the bench after the team started 4-9-5.

defenseman Dougie Hamilton and Philadelphia winger Jakub Voracek.

“It's huge names,” Lawton said. “It'll be pretty much unprecedented if it all were to happen.”

And that's even before considering the free agents who could hit the market: wingers Taylor Hall, Gabriel Landeskog and Mike Hoffman, Hamilton and fellow defensemen Alec Martinez and Tyson Barrie as well as goaltenders Philipp Grubauer, Frederik Andersen, Petr Mrazek and Chris Driedger.

The salary cap remaining flat at \$81.5 million because of pandemic revenue losses could hurt those players and hamstring some movement. Lawton estimated a better than 70% chance of Jones getting traded before training camps open in September but was less bullish on other big moves of players with hefty contracts.

No extra cap room definitely hurts Tampa Bay, a team that needed extraordinary circumstances to stay together this year. Knowing the band is getting broken up, players are savoring their final few days together before dispersing rather than worrying about next season just yet.

“I'm just trying to enjoy the Cup and winning and being around that group and whatever's next is going to come in the next few weeks and I'll have time to think about it when I get home,” pending free agent defenseman David Savard said. “Right now I think it's just about enjoying the moment, enjoying the last few days I have with the whole group before

everybody starts kind of going back home.”

At least one Lightning player could take a detour to Seattle for the expansion draft and could become the face of the NHL's 32nd franchise. Maybe it's forward Tyler Johnson, who has three years left on his contract at a \$5 million price tag Tampa Bay can ill afford and just happens to be from Spokane, Washington, where the Kraken will play their inaugural exhibition game.

The Lightning like every other team except the Vegas Golden Knights — which is exempt from the expansion draft four years after theirs — will lose at least one player to Seattle. But there could be an upside for teams willing to give up something extra for the Kraken to take a big contract.

So, while the cap isn't going up, at least \$60 million of room is coming with Seattle.

“That might open up some opportunity,” Lawton said.

This offseason is a big opportunity for teams to chart a course to attempt to follow the Lightning as Stanley Cup champions. Playoff disappointments by Edmonton, Toronto and Washington could prompt change; Buffalo needs another overhaul and Philadelphia would like to shake up a roster that just wasn't working.

Tampa Bay would love to run it back, but change is inevitable, and Killorn said players have embraced that.

“That's part of being a professional: You know that can happen,” he said. “Everyone understands the reality.”

For the Lightning and 31 other NHL teams, the reality is everything will happen fast. Then the puck drops on an 82-game season in October.

# Giannis has been dominant, now he needs help

PHOENIX — Giannis Antetokounmpo and his bum left knee bulldozed through the Phoenix Suns defense for most of Thursday night, once again giving the Milwaukee Bucks more than they could have dreamed in these NBA Finals.

The problem for Milwaukee is he's not getting enough help.

Antetokounmpo finished with 42 points, 12 rebounds and three blocks but couldn't push the Bucks past the Suns, who took a 2-0 series with their 118-108 win. The one-man gutsy show was impressive, but ultimately for naught.

"When he's got it rolling like that and he sees a crowd, we've got to be able to help him out," Bucks forward Khris Middleton said.

Milwaukee's two-time MVP missed the final two games of the Eastern

Conference finals with a hyperextended left knee. But Antetokounmpo made a quick recovery and surprisingly played in Game 1, finishing with 20 points and 17 rebounds. In Thursday night's Game 2, he was even better.

Antetokounmpo was able to finish with his

usual array of athletic moves around the basket. In the third quarter, he nearly single-handedly kept the Bucks in the game, scoring 20 points while aggressively crashing the offensive glass. That was the most points for one player in a quarter in a finals game since 1993, according to Elias.

"I think he wants us to learn on him hard," Bucks coach Mike Budenholzer said. "He wants as much responsibility as we can give him. That's part of what makes him great."

But the box score was pretty ugly for the rest of the Bucks.

Jrue Holiday scored 17 points but needed 21 shots to get there. Middleton was non-existent for much of the night, finishing with 11 points on 5 of 16 shooting. Brook Lopez had a quiet night. Other than Pat Connaughton's 14 points, the Bucks' bench didn't contribute much.

"I think we had a lot of open shots that we didn't make," Holiday said. "I know me personally there were a couple of layups that I usually make that kind of rimmed in and out. I had some good looks."

Budenholzer said he isn't down on Holiday and Middleton, even if their first two games have been mostly mediocre.

"You always give credit to the defense," Budenholzer said. "Those guys do a good job. There's probably a few looks that they've got to go in, when you're playing a good defensive team and you get a good clean one. Jrue was getting to the paint a lot. I liked his aggressiveness. I think we need all 3 of those guys. I think they just keep working, they'll be good."

There were too many moments for Milwaukee like one late in the fourth quarter: Middleton drove to the basket for a layup, only to be denied by Deandre Ayton. Middleton helplessly tumbled to the ground and watched forlornly as the the Suns grabbed the ball and sprinted downcourt.

It became apparent that if Antetokounmpo wasn't making it happen, it probably wasn't going to happen for the Bucks.

When Antetokounmpo was on the court, the Bucks outscored the Suns

by 3. In the eight minutes he didn't play, Milwaukee was outscored by 13.

While the Bucks were struggling, the Suns' role players were difference-makers.

Mikal Bridges had 27 points. Jae Crowder had 11 points and 10 rebounds. Cam Johnson hit two 3-pointers. All five starters scored at least 10 points.

Phoenix's balance is beating the one-man heroics of Antetokounmpo.

That almost certainly has to change if the Bucks want to make this a series. Game 3 is on Sunday in Milwaukee.

"We're going back to Milwaukee," Antetokounmpo said. "We've been here before. We know what the deal is. We've just got to be aggressive, keep enjoying playing together, keep enjoying playing basketball and hopefully our good habits throughout the year can take over and we can put ourselves in position to win the game."

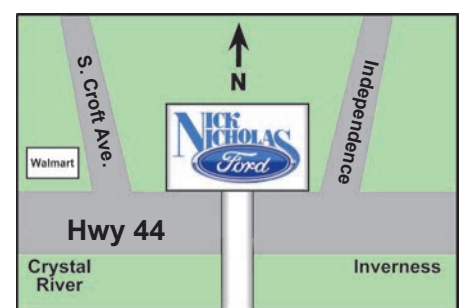
